





Iowa Shows Good Sense

The process of nominating candidates for the American presidency normally resembles a circus with many rings. The people love the spectacle, but when it comes to making their choices, they usually demonstrate their good sense.

If it were not so, democracy would be in danger of being overwhelmed by press agency, one-upmanship and appeasement. The American people proved a long time ago that they could make sensible decisions no matter what. And that is what the good people of Iowa just demonstrated.

The heavy surge in the Iowa caucuses for President Carter showed that the magic of the Kennedy name and the Kennedy myth did not deter the participating Democrats from a critical analysis of the qualifications of Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., for this country's highest office.

The president's decision to cancel grain sales to the Soviet Union was supposed to hurt him in a farm state. But apparently the Iowa voters recognized the president's decision as necessary, despite its effect on Iowa farmers.

Nothing Changes In Soviet Union
The crime of Russian dissident and Nobel laureate Andrei D. Sakharov is to be a good and moral hypocrite of the closest Communist society in which he is confined. His arrest demonstrates that in the Soviet Union nothing changes. After 63 years of absolute power, the regime still cannot brook criticism that lays bare its sham concern for human rights.

Any degree of tolerance depends upon the regime's interests of the moment in cynically cultivating foreign approval. When foreign anger at the Russian occupation of Afghanistan was at its height and there was no prospect of finding favor abroad, the regime silenced Sakharov. To that extent, he is a casualty of renewed Cold War. There was, of course, the additional imperative to clear Moscow of embarrassing dissenters before the summer Olympic Games.

Rationing: America May Suffer

With every threat of a disruption in foreign oil supplies, the Carter administration feels the itch to apply gas rationing. If Congress allows the administration to employ these controls, the American people will suffer cruelly.

Rationing means miscalculation of supplies. Alan Reynolds, vice president and economist of the First National Bank of Chicago, threw light on this situation in a recent speech. He traced the history of energy controls in the 1970s:

"If anything was in short supply in a few cities," he said, "and abundant in most suburban or rural areas, it would have paid some middleman to move it from one place to another. With gasoline, the allocation system made this illegal. Rather than send fuel to where it was most in demand, as the price system does naturally all the time, the Energy Department required that shortages be shared fairly."

Reynolds explained that "in practice, that meant a cutback of 20 percent, after 15 percent had been delivered to politically-favored users, had to be applied to all dealers based on where the motorist had been buying gasoline in 1974. That left a glut in remote vacation spots and on interstate highways, and a shortage in several urban centers. The exact same thing happened in 1974."

Reynolds pointed out that in World War II the government spent a total of \$68.2 billion (about \$2.8 billion today) to produce large quantities of synthetic rubber. "Today," he said, "the Energy Dept. spends about \$13 billion each year and employs 25,000 people to produce absolutely nothing but paperwork and obstructions." It is this do-nothing agency that is supposed to solve America's energy problems. What a farce.

Incidentally, until mid-February last year the government's strategic petroleum reserves continued to pour oil into storage areas with no provision for pumps to get it out. With such planning, the administration is programming more disasters for the U.S. public.

When will the American people learn that Government isn't the solution to problems, and that it is the problem?

Cement Crisis Coming?

NEW YORK (UPI) — Cement is a scarce commodity in some areas of the country, and the shortage could lead to a supply and price situation as critical as that of oil, claim industry spokesmen.

Chairman James E. Stewart of Lone Star Industries, the country's biggest producer, said in a recent speech acute cement shortages in some areas during the peak building season of the past two years caused severe construction delays.

Eighty-five percent of cement is made from limestone, which is plentiful, the rest from clay, marl, oyster shells and a variety of substances. "There are regional shortages of sand and gravel to mix with cement," he said. "In some areas it even is becoming economical to send up old concrete and reuse it."

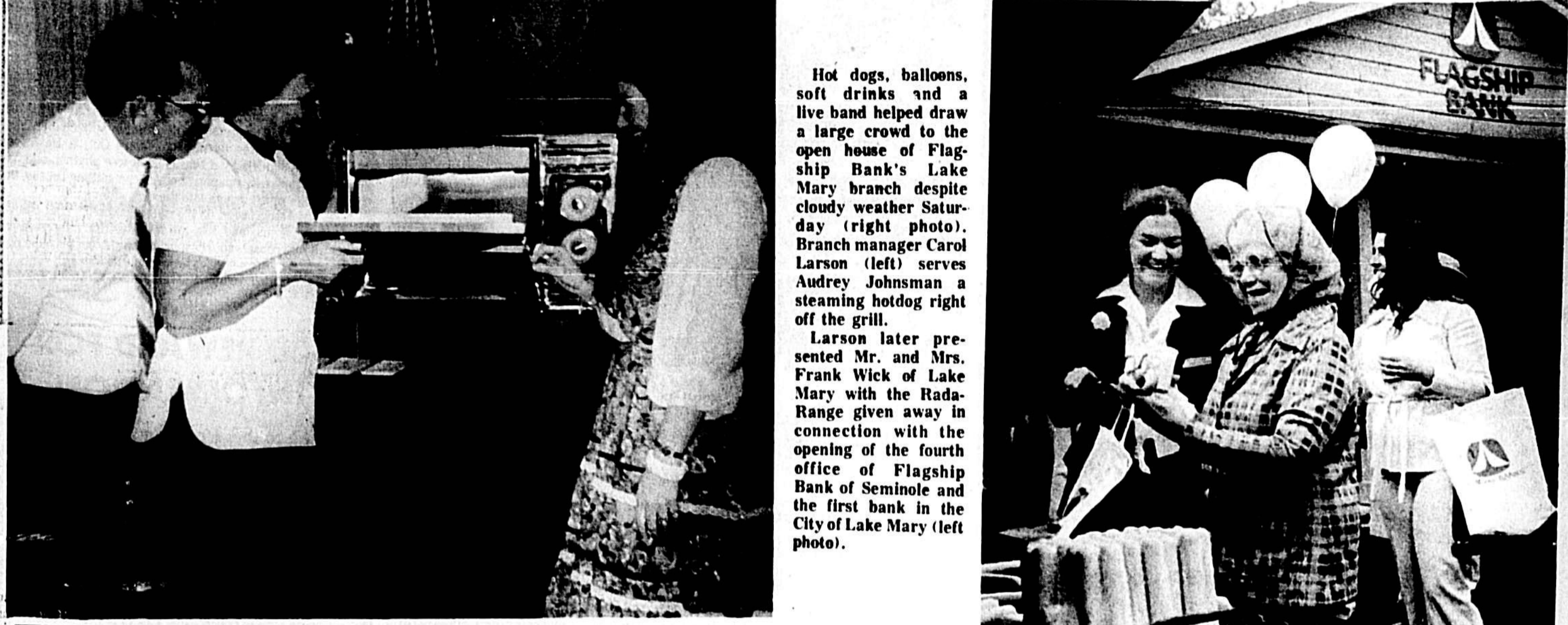
I found myself, a Dartmouth professor, participating in what was, in effect, a celebration of... Alger Hiss.

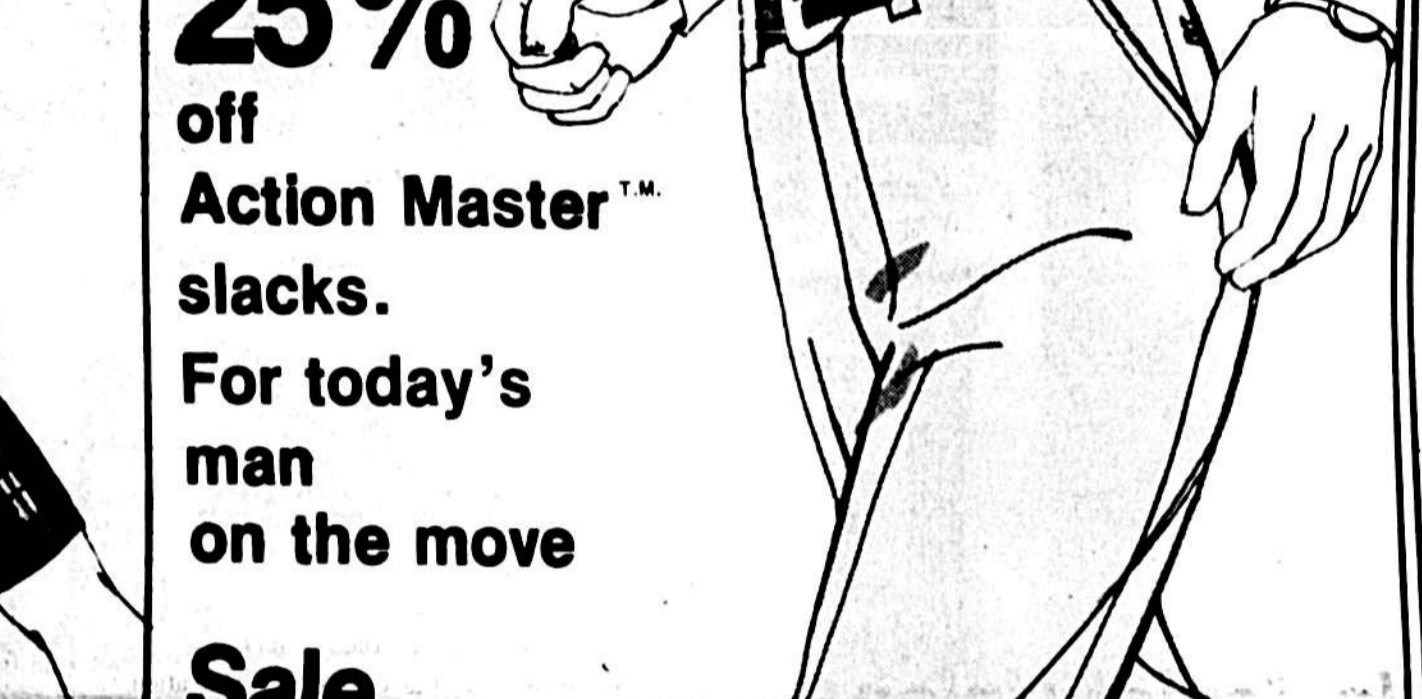

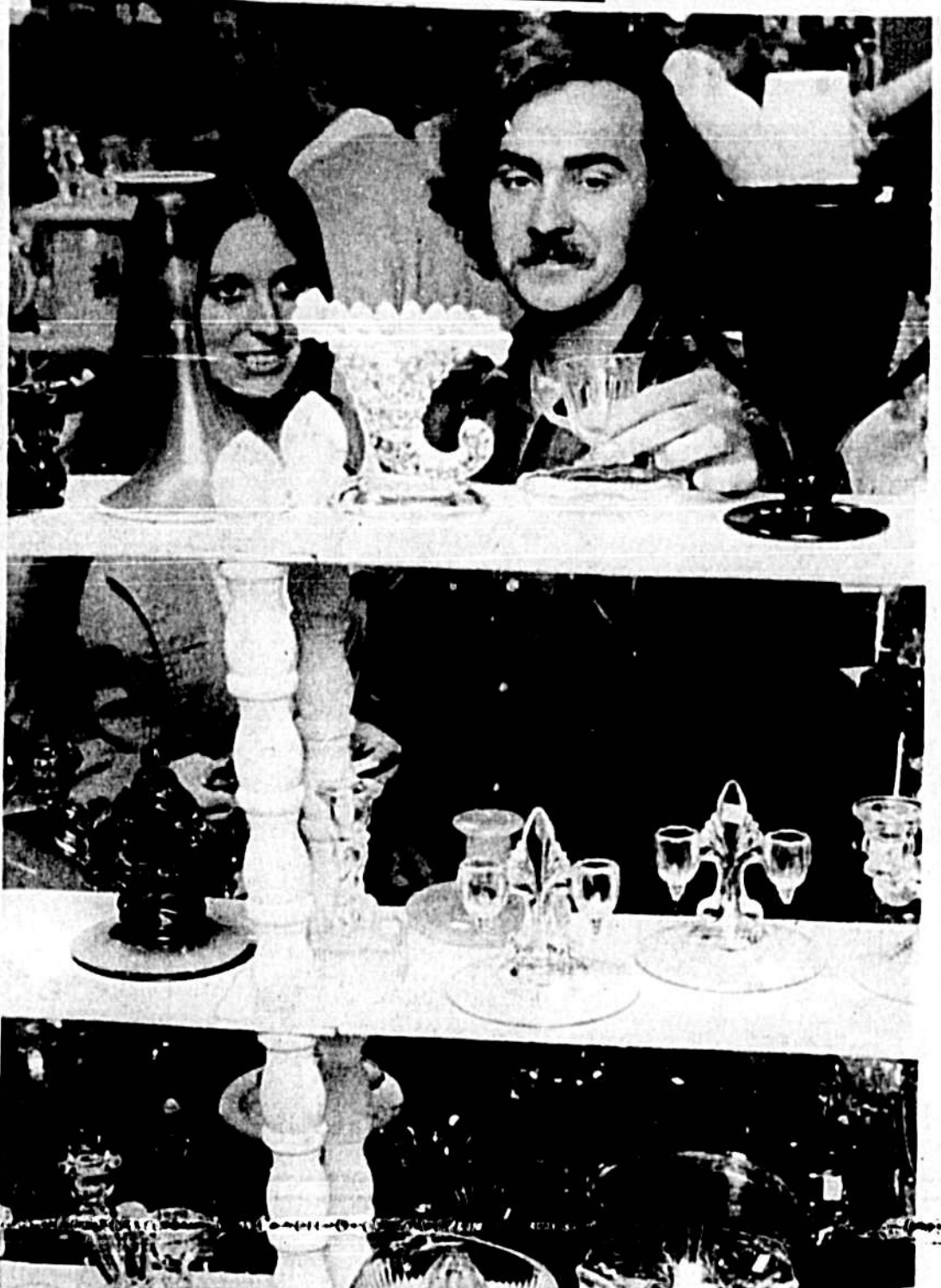

**Inspector Saves Wildlife**

MIAMI (UPI) — J. Robert McMorris has a snakey job. He opens cartons and sacks marked "venomous reptiles" at Miami International Airport, once a free entry point for poisonous creatures.

The drug smuggling trade has forced inspectors like McMorris and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service in Miami to delve into baggage and cargo for the writhing reptiles. It used to be that boxes said to contain dangerous animals went uninspected, but the drug smugglers knew that and inspections have been stepped up.

"We weren't trained to handle things like cobras," said Don A. Williams, lead inspector for the Wildlife Service in Miami. McMorris has been an inspector since Oct. 1. He's been bitten on the knuckle by a New Guinea tree python and has handled an unmarked shipment of African spitting cobras, the kind that can squirt venom into the eyes of a victim.

"In a way I'm crazy to do it," said McMorris. "But I have strong convictions, and I'm an idealist. I'm interested in seeing wildlife conserved. It's a losing battle, but perhaps my efforts can keep a few species around a little longer."

The Internal Revenue Service has reminded Florida employers that Thursday is the deadline for providing "Wage and Tax Statements," Form W-2, to their employees.

Charles O. DeWitt, IRS District Director for Florida, also noted that payers of interest, dividends, commissions and other types of income should furnish recipients with their information statements by the same date.

The IRS is urging taxpayers to file their tax returns as early as possible this year. "Early filers generally will receive their refunds quicker providing they file complete and accurate tax returns," DeWitt said.

The IRS is estimating that nearly three out of every four Floridians will receive refunds this year and it may take up to 12 weeks for some taxpayers to receive their checks if they file later in the tax season. "Failure to provide W-2 forms and information statements by the end of the month would penalize many Floridians who are expecting refund checks," DeWitt added.

DeWitt urged employers who do not receive their W-2 forms by Thursday to contact their employer immediately. "If employees are unable to obtain the form from their employer or former employer by February 15, they should contact the IRS by calling the toll-free number listed in the telephone directory," DeWitt stated. Only after February 15 will the IRS assist employees in obtaining the forms by contacting the employers involved.

The IRS Director reminded taxpayers that they must have a W-2 form from every employer during the year. "People should not file their returns until they have all their W-2 forms since an amended return would be required later to include the missing tax statement," DeWitt cautioned.

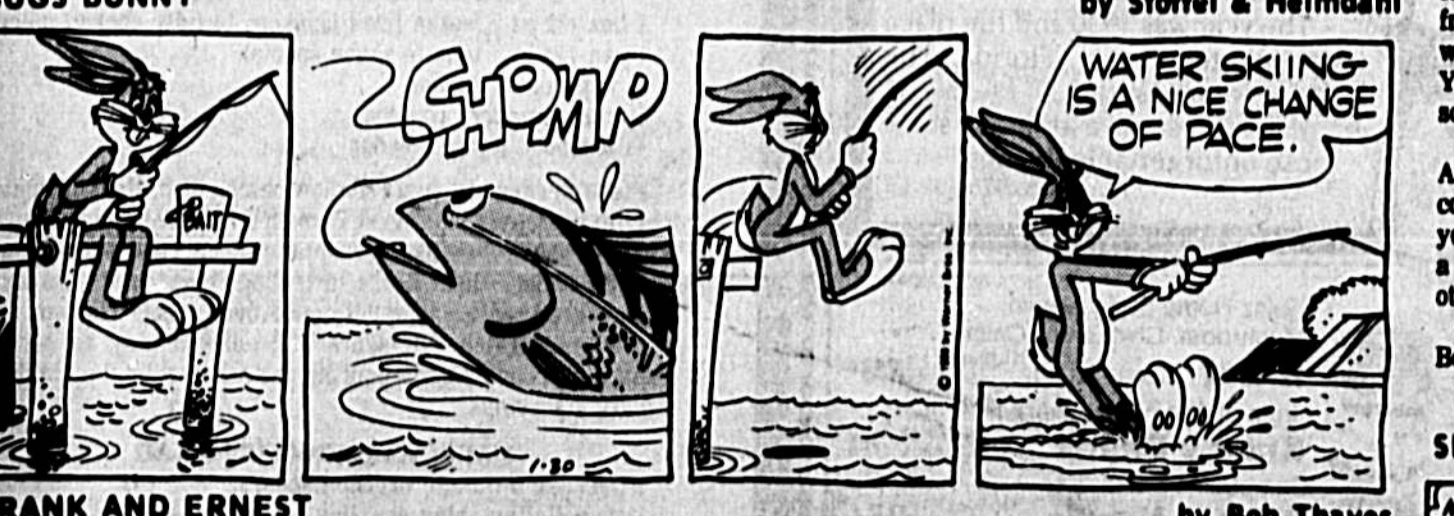
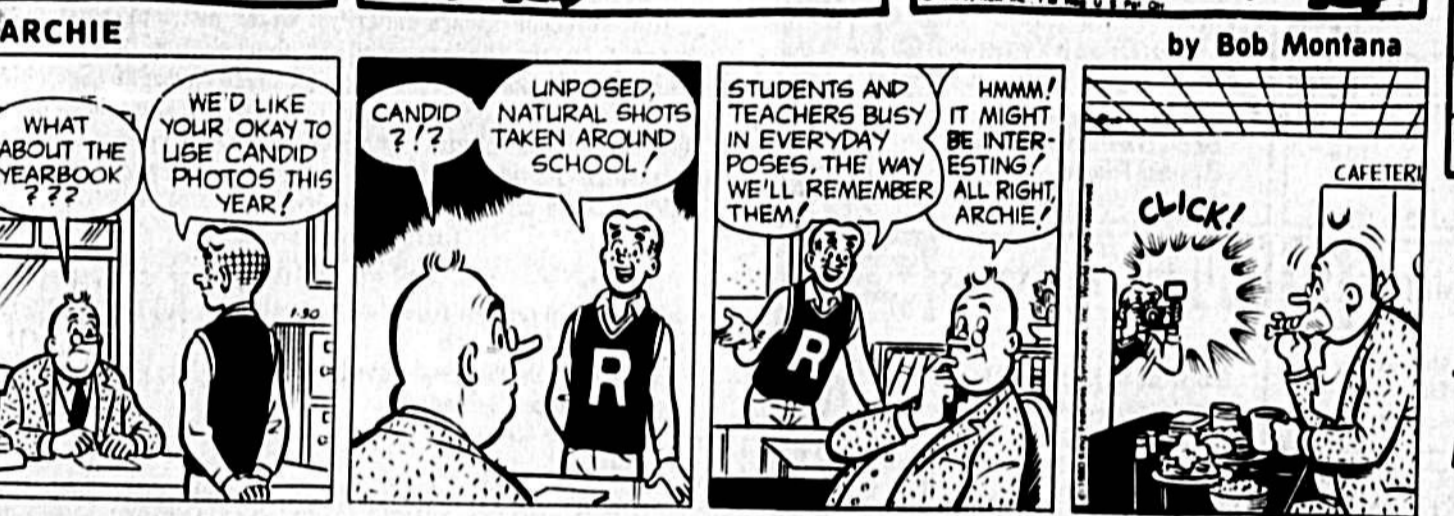
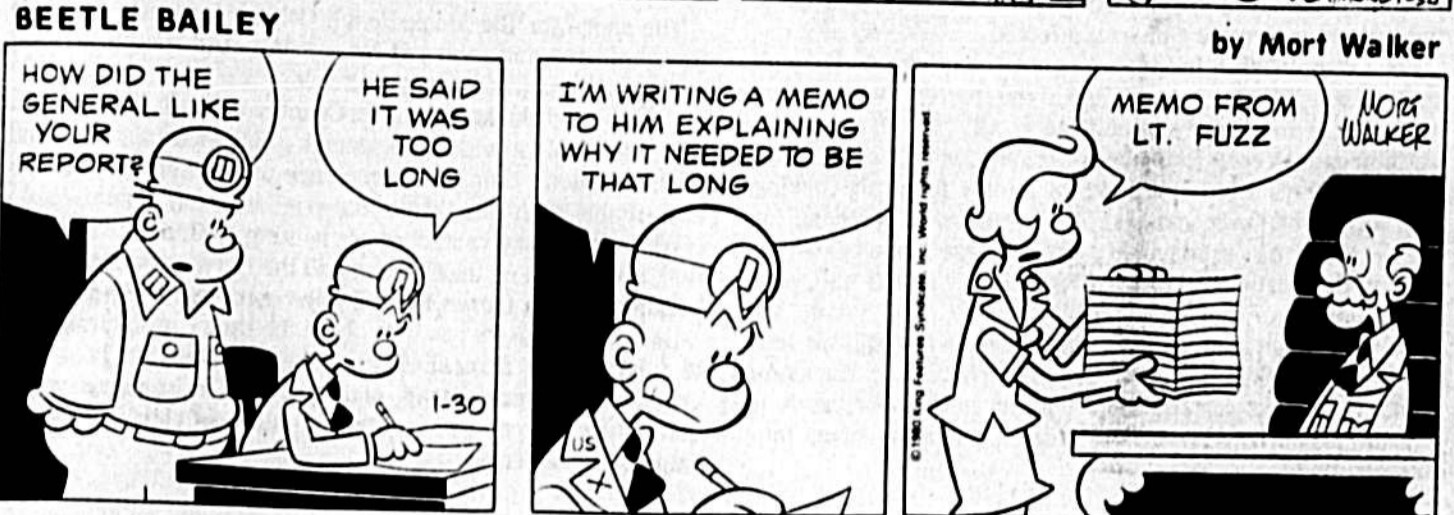

**A Tinnitus Masker Controls Ear Ring**

DEAR DR. LAMB - I read your column about the woman who had ringing in her ears and I would like your advice. I used to have this problem and I went to my doctor and he took me out of my right ear and the ringing went away. The last time this happened and I was having a buzzing noise, just taking wax out of my ear didn't help.

I am 72 years old and have a constant buzzing in my ear. He sent me to an ear, nose and throat specialist who said the nerve in the ear was degenerating and that because of that and my age there wasn't anything he could do to help me. I also have sinus trouble and am a very nervous person. Now that I've learned that there are some methods of treating this problem, I'm wondering if I really couldn't get some help for it.

DEAR READER - At least you could try. The methods of helping people who have buzzing and ringing in the ear, called tinnitus, are fallacious. Nevertheless, they are very useful. "They won't help everybody" but unless you try, you'll never know.

You say in the rest of your letter that you have excellent hearing. If you have nerve degeneration with some hearing loss, you might not know it because it might involve sound frequencies that aren't in the range of normal conversation. Sometimes because of nerve damage, hearing aids are of limited use. However, even if one is of partial benefit, it may eliminate the buzzing sound that people complain about.

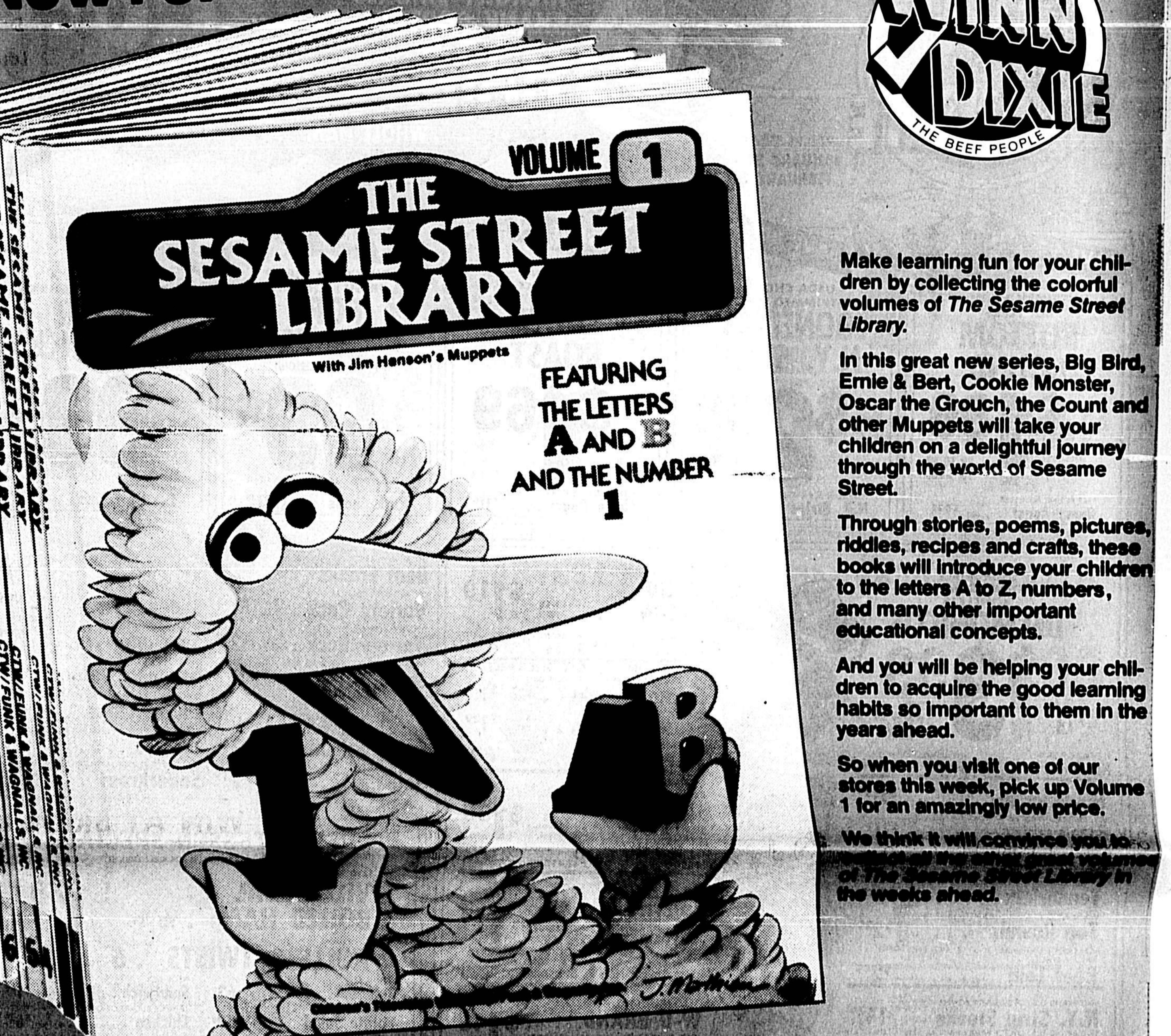
If your hearing is perfect, then at least a tinnitus masker can be tried. These devices present a constant sound to the ear and literally mask the annoying buzzing or ringing sounds that a person may have.

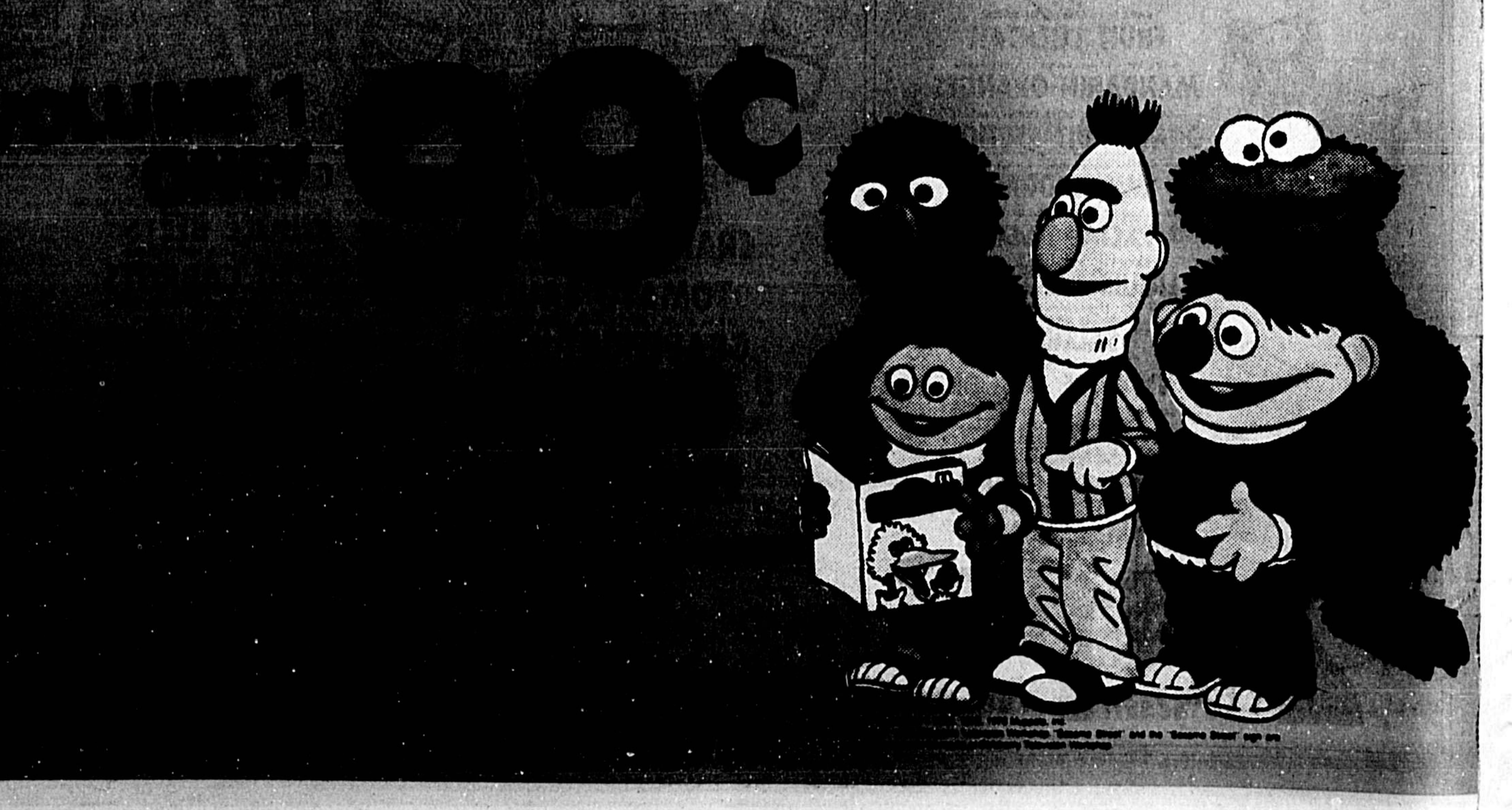
One of the problems that's still present in trying a tinnitus masker is that not everyone is instructed to do it them. Like any device that puts noise into the ear, it must be properly adjusted for the individual. If not, excessive noise put into the ear could even cause a problem. At this date, because it's a recent development, not every hearing specialist has yet qualified to provide this service to patients.

You might try a home tinnitus masker method. Use your FM radio and tune it between stations. Then turn up the volume and sit close by. If the sound masks your buzzing noise, that is a clue that a properly adjusted tinnitus masker might help you. Some people who have trouble sleeping because of ear noises get benefit from this method.

## 'Agent 99' Gets Smart

### Barbara Feldon Makes Big New York Splash

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — Barbara Feldon, who starred for five years as Agent 99 in the defunct "Get Smart" TV series, interrupted her life dramatically two years ago, abandoning her home, friends and career to move to New York.

As Barbara puts it, "When I left Hollywood, I threw my life in the air and let it fall down in new shapes."

One of the elements contributing to Barbara's decision to radically change her life style was the end of a long live-in affair with a television producer. Another was a compelling desire to escape tedium.

"I went to New York to see what would happen," Barbara said. "To me a person's life is like a kaleidoscope. You hold it still and look at all the beads making a set pattern. Then you turn it a little and everything changes."

"Well, I needed that sort of change. I gave the kaleidoscope of my life a real big twist. It was a tremendous upheaval for me. I'd lived in New York 12 years earlier, but I didn't have friends there anymore."

"I sold my sailboat here in the marina, closed up my house, packed my clothes and restructured my private life entirely."

"I bought part of a Manhattan townhouse and tried to meet the kind of people I hoped would become my friends. I accomplished this by accepting every invitation that came my way."

"The result was that I did meet hundreds of people. I now have the seedlings of satisfying friendships along with the adventure and excitement of new discoveries and challenges."

Barbara's career has flourished, too. She completed several TV movies in 1978-79, including "Before and After" with Patty Duke and "Vacation From Hell" with Lorne Greene.

Another factor in Barbara's abrupt move was her participation in the feminist movement and work for the equal rights amendment.

Barbara makes a clear distinction between her efforts on behalf of ratification of ERA and the social and personal implications of the women's liberation movement.

"ERA is a legal matter," she said, "not an extension of the battle between the sexes. They're two different things. ERA is a battle all of us are waging against a handful of reactionary hold-outs in a few states."

Barbara became passionate about the women's movement when she discovered subtle but effective discrimination against women in the lucrative field of "voice-over" TV commercials. Those are blurbs in which a performer extols a product's virtues without being seen on screen.

Barbara's agent said she was not getting that sort of work because 93 percent of all voiceover jobs went to men.

"When I asked why," Barbara said, "he told me that ad-

vertisers are convinced feminine voices don't carry the essential authority to sell product.

"It's just another misconception that men — and women — have had of women in our culture since the beginning of time. I saw it as another challenge to meet in the fight for equal rights. It brought me into the women's movement."

Barbara began attending meetings and fundraisers for ERA in Hollywood, branching out to other cities. New York, however, is the nerve center of ERA and Barbara wanted to be where the action was.

"I'd like to convey the thought that this isn't a militant cause. It isn't an issue. It's a just cause."

ERAs needs an injection of passion at this stage. Not as much attention is being paid to it as four or five years ago when it was a hotter issue. People are getting tired of it.
