

Change Of Jobs By Wickard Analyzed By Correspondent

WASHINGTON. The story is current here and so far as I know unbroken, that when Claude R. Wickard first suspected that his resignation as Secretary of Agriculture might be accepted, he went to President Truman and asked if he might step out of the post of Rural Electrification Adminis-

tration.

When the change was made many observers and even some of Wickard's close friends shook their heads in the memory of the oldest living Potomacans when a cabinet member had stepped down to a lesser government post. Getting kicked upstairs in Washington is one thing; getting kicked down or even stepping down of one's own accord is quite another.

But it very well may turn out that Wickard is crazy like a fox.

In the first place, the food position is going to be bad all along the line, with out of the agricultural reins in the hands of new Secretary Clinton P. Anderson. Under the pre-Anderson set-up, with authority scattered over the whole government quadrangle, it was utter confusion, but no single agency, department or executive head can be blamed for that.

In the second place, REA is being launched in the greatest year of its history with \$200,000,000 to spend, exactly twice as much as had to be loaned in 1941, and 1942,



Minute Corner Of Europe Is Seen As Bone Of Contention

WASHINGTON. As peace conferences and border settlements approach we are going to hear a lot about stray corners of Europe over which two or more countries have been bickering for years—if not for centuries.

One of these is the district of Teschen, a patch about 30 miles square (area, 852 square miles) "in the east where Poland, Germany, Poland and Czechoslovakia came together. It has been a bone of contention ever since World War I, when both Poland and Czechoslovakia were set up. It had been part of Austrian Silesia.

Both countries wanted it then. It was finally split between them. In 1938, just after Germany had occupied the Czech Sudetenland,

Council of Ambassadors.

The ambassadors awarded the water, two thirds to Czechoslovakia, including the important north-south railroad, called the Oderberg line, and the Karvin coal-producing area.

Poland, however, got the city of Teschen and the agricultural section east of the Oder. The city of Bielsko in Polish areas is an important textile manufacturing center, populated heavily by Germans. It is tied economically with Bielsko in Polish Galicia. Czechoslovakia got the western suburbs of the city of Teschen, called Czeka Teschen.

As far as nationalities go, the ambassadors seem to have drawn a questionable line.

Dr. Isadore Bowman, now a State Department adviser, included a map in his report. The New York map shows the Polish-German boundary as well to the west of the ambassadors' line. The Encyclopedia Britannica says that in 1921 Poles made up more than three fourths of Teschen's 145,000 population. Czechs were only 3 percent, according to the Encyclopedia, and the rest were Germans and Jews.

It was this sparse and population situation which the Poles claimed as justification for taking all Teschen in 1928. The last year German conquerors Poland and gave Teschen to its original, Silesians, formerly part of Czechoslovakia.

The Karvin coal mines supplied Czechoslovakia with more than half its fuel before the war. They produce the only good bituminous coal in the country. It is inferior to the bituminous produced in Poland but good enough for both gas and coke, essential in smelting iron. Teschen iron ore is good, but the Czechs always had to import more.

The Karvin area also produces "brown coal" or lignite, suitable for heating but not smelting.

Florida As Hub Of Commerce Is Seen By Economic Group

WINTER Haven, Fla.—Florida will make the hub of commerce with nations to the south if plans of the Inter-American Economic Development Commission appointed today by Dr. A. J. Hanna, chairman of the Inter-American Affairs Division of the Florida State Chamber of Commerce, are successful.

Each state in the United States named chairman of the commission. Its program will include interpreting to the people of Florida the advantages and the necessity of widely expanded exports and imports. It will analyze and publicize the long-range development plans of the respective countries with particular attention to the opening of new lines of business activities which the business of the United States can most successfully undertake and upon the imports which we can most advantageously receive.

Two special projects will be worked out by the commission. They are:

1. Provision of necessary research facilities, rayon, primary

Anglo-American
Co-operation In
Films Predicted

NEW YORK, July 19.—It is con-
jectured that British and American
co-operation in film making
would be more extensive than
ever before, it was predicted today.
Arthur Rank, general manager of
the British film industry, told
the press today. Mr. Rank has
just concluded a business trip
to the United States. Part of his activities
have been connected with the
American Film Distributors' Exchange
Films, Inc., a subsidiary of the
