**SCIDA-SCOPA** Merger **Study Panel Urged** 

### Herald Staff Writer

A Seminole County Commissioner who has been critical of operations at the county port Wednesday proposed the establishment of a study committee to help commissioners decide whether the port should be merged with Seminole County Industrial Development Authority (SCIDA).

Commissioner Harry Kwiatkowski, who proposed setting up the committee at a Wednesday work session, said the group could make its recommendation to commissioners in time for the commission to submit a Seminole County Port Authority (SCOPA-SCIDA) merger bill to the state legislature in late January or early February.

During the county commission's budget deliberations last August, Kwiatkowski urged that an independent auditor be hired o audit the port's books. Commissioners voted to give \$75,000 in ounty property tax support to the port-the first time in three years such financial support was requested by port officials.

Commissioners are preparing legislative proposals for subission next Tuesday to the co Commissioners will meet with the four-person delegation nex Tuesday at 3 p.m. in Courtroom B at the courthouse in Sanford. Four of the five county commissioners have said they support some type of movies between the two agencies, whose goal is to increase industrial development and jobs in Seminole County. Commissioners favoring a merger are Dick Williams, Bob French, Bill Kirchhoff and Harry Kwiatkowski.

"Let's tell the delegation next Tuesday what we're doing so they will expect proposed legislation on this later," Kwiatkowski said. 'The county attorney's office says the two agencies could be combined by state legislation. We should take some time to valuate advantages and disadvantages of a merger.'

Commissioners will resume consideration of a proposed egislative program in a work session Monday at 9 a.m. in com sion offices. In memorandum to commissioners, Kwiatkowski said if th

agencies were combined, he favors establishment of an industrial evelopment advisory board to help guide the county's efforts to increase its tax base by encouraging industries to locate here. "I don't know if I find any validity in that way of operating the port," said Commissioner John Alexander. "I agree there's a margin of doubt as to how productive our industrial development efforts are, but I don't know if I can necessarily find a solution by combining the two. We need solid facts to see if a merge peration would be better."

Kirchhoff suggested the possibility of creating a single board of directors for both organizations but maintaining each organization separately. "The drawback of state legislation is the legislature might not adopt the kind of bill we want. What you get ack might not be what you anticipated.'

County commissioners since last year have had the power ppoint members of the SCOPA board. Until the state law overning the port was changed last year, the governor made appointments of the board. SCIDA board members are appointed y commissioners as well.

Commissioners could merge the boards of directors by ap ointing SCIDA board members to the SCOPA board. The commission recently appointed SCIDA board member Georges S Laurent to the SCOPA board.

"We're paying two people to administer two programs doing the same job," said French, also a member of the SCOPA board. I'm against the current set-up."



### **Firemen Strike: 2 Killed**

LONDON (UPI) - British troops abandoned a burning \$125 million power station on the third day of a firefighters' strike and parttime firemen were unable to prevent a blaze from killing two children in Northern Ireland.

A fire at the power station at Tilbury, Essex, east of London - the biggest since the walkout began three days ago — roared unchecked Wednesday and the choking, inexperienced troops finally gave up trying to douse it.

### Palestinians: Killed 20

BEIRUT, Lebanon (UPI) - Palestinian guerrillas say they have gunned down 20 Israeli soldiers and officers and clashed with Israeli tanks in fighting that stood in sharp contrast to this week's diplomacy toward a Middle East peace.

The Popular Front for the Liberation of Palestine said gunmen opened fire on a packed Israeli military bus Wednesday af-ternoon near the border town of Metullah.

### **Cuban Buildup Stalls Talks**

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Improvement of American-Cuban relations are stalled by the buildup of Cuban military forces in Africa, administration officials said today in a newspaper report. Sources told The New York Times that 4,000

to 6,000 more Cuban soldiers have been sent to Angola since July despite private assurances to President Carter that Fidel Castro intended to reduce the troop strength.

On Feb. 16, Carter made disengagement in Africa a precondition for normalization of relations with Cuba.

### Wales, Scotland Home Rule

LONDON (UPI) - The British government has won a crucial victory in its campaign to grant limited home rule to Wales and Scotland, subduing Labor Party rebels who opposed the legislation.

The Labor government was able to muster a comfortable majority Wednesday on limiting debate on two bills setting up provincial assemblies with limited powers in Scotland and Wales.

**Composite Made** In Lake Robbery

Lake Mary Police today were preparing composite pictures of the two suspects involved in an abduction and robbery at gunpoint of \$8,000 cash Tuesday of a Lake Mary self-employed jewelry

"We are making composites of both suspects from information and descriptions supplied by Louis Gill Cuddihee, the victim," said Police Lt. George Myers today. Myers said that the vehicle, owned by Cuddihee, and in which he was abducted, has been dusted for fingerprints. The prints, he said, will ultimately be matched with those of the suspects when they are apprehended. Cuddihee told police a man in his early 20s, with long blonde

hair, wearing blue jeans and a beige T-shirt, jumped from another car into his vehicle on the passenger side Tuesday as Cuddihee was stopped at a stop sign at Old Lake Mary Road and Airport Boulevard.

Cuddihee said the young assailant ordered him at gunpoint to drive to an orange grove off County Club Road at Ridge Road in Lake Mary where he demanded the cash. The money in \$20 bills and \$100 bills was carried by Cuddihee in an airline ticket envelope secured with a rubber band.

The assailant left the robbery scene and met his accomplice who had followed the Cuddihee car from the abduction site and both left in a car described as a black Granada or Monarch. The driver of the escape car was described by Cuddihee as a white male with black hair, Myers said.

Cuddihee told police he had been in the area only a few weeks, had no jewelry in the car and could not explain how the assailants knew he was carrying the large amount of cash. The young businessman told police the robber told him, "I know you got money. Give it to me."



# **Keeping Public** In The Dark

Some members of Congress have expressed suspicion that the bureaucracy may be circumventing the new "sunshine law." It has been noted that meeting announcements were published after the meetings were held.

It is doubtful that any member of the legislative branch of government was very surprised at the disclosure. Most of them know many ways to keep the public in the dark whenever it suits either them or government agencies.

Where much controversy might take place, the so-called open meetings are generally staged after the differences are ironed out. About the only source of information concerning how decisions are forged is brought to the people by energetic newsmen who have developed good inside sources.

For a newsman to keep his sources he must protect their identity or lose them. If he is forced by some judge to reveal the identity of the people who have trusted him, his pipeline of information has been blocked and the people are deprived pertinent knowledge of how their affairs are being handled.

There is just no way to keep lawmakers or bureaucrats from decision-making out of public sight. The members of any group can meet in many ways without oversight by the press or the public. Then, when an accommodation has been reached: a scenario can be devised for the "open meeting," and the public will then see only a staged production.

Most newsmen will protect their sources even when some autocratic judge decides to send them to jail on a contempt of court charge. A good many have been jailed when they refused to reveal their sources.

It is our belief that no judge has ever been given the right, through state or federal legislative action, to sentence a newsman for failure to reveal identities. The judiciary has assumed that right out of the British Common Law which came down from the idea of the "divine right of kings."

If they followed our constitution and upheld the principle which is supposed to protect us by "due process" they would file a complaint, let the district attorney bring an action in another court and give the defendant the right of a trial by jury.

If this were followed it is highly improbable that any newsman would be forced to serve time like a common criminal on the whim of some judge. The people of this nation can be far better served in this manner than by all the ideas on any type of a "sunshine law."


We do not need the formation of new laws. We do need a whale of a lot of law repealing leading to getting government more and more out of our lives. How this turn-about can ever be started is the big question.

It is not in politicians' interest to move in that direction. The people generally have been so conditioned to "There ought to be a law," that it does not seem in the cards to hope for a peopleforced change.

It would seem it should be easy to convince most everyone to trust themselves before they place trust in the political arena. Perhaps we should all begin to use our own thought processes, gather all information possible, then act and react to self-attained logic.

Could that be the path out of our present morass?

WASHINGTON - Utah's vexatious Judge Willis W. Ritter, who has become a pain in the federal judiciary, may be in difficulty over his payroll practices. The Justice Dept. was all set to lay the payroll

## JOHN D. LOFTON, JR. A Tale Of Two **Energies**?

WASHINGTON - President Carter's second nationally televised address last week about the energy problem differed significantly from his first nationwide TV talk on April 18.

First, Carter was much more low-key than he was nearly eight months ago. We heard no more talk about "the moral equivalent of war" or "national catastrophe" as the only alternative to his energy plan.

Secondly, in his most recent talk, the president abandoned his Chicken Little rhetoric, failing to assert even once what he repeated several times last April: that we are "simply running out of gas and oil." Last week. the president mentioned several times the need to ' "encourage production" of oil and gas. The fact that he would say this means that he believes that we are not running out of these fuels, that there is something left to produce.

Unlike last April: Carter did not say again that "each new inventory of world oil reserves has been more disturbing than the last." Perhaps the president did not say this because during the past several months there have been studies - for example, one published by the United Nations - which have estimated far more recoverable oil and gas than the president had previously alleged. In September, the U.S. International Trade Commission published a eport which declared:

"Although crude petroleum supplies may tighten between now and 1985, no disruptive shortage is foreseen. World production will be able to satisfy world demand."

The president did say last week that with every passing month, "our energy problems have grown worse." But what he didn't say is that there are some reasons to be optimistic, at least in the near future. The supply and demand committee of the Independent Petroleum Association of America has issued a study which outlines a generally favorable picture for 1978. The IPAA predicts more domestic petroleum supplies and a reduced rate of petroleum demand for next year.

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Former CIA Director and Ambassador to Iran Richard Helms has opened an international consulting firm that will seek to develop Iranian business opportunities in the United States. "I might be a go-between or represent

Iranian interests who would want to do something in this country," Helms, 64, told the Washington Post Wednesday

Helms was fined \$2,000 and given a two-year suspended sentence Nov. 4 after pleading no contest to charges that he failed to testify fully and acccurately when he appeared before a Senate committee that was considering his appointment as ambassador in 1973.

### Food Prices Facing Hike

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Increased charges by middlemen and higher costs for imports will boost food prices for American consumers as much as 6 percent in 1978, the Agriculture Department said today.

And for the second year in a row, consumers will pay more to get the food from the field to the grocery store than they pay the farmer to grow it.

### Shah Hopeful On Arms

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The shah of Iran has concluded a demonstration-scarred trip to the United States, hopeful that a stalled U.S. weapons order would be approved by the nation that asked him to help hold down the international price of oil.

The Iranian leader was dogged for three days by hooded, placard-waving protesters and blanketed by heavy security at every turn. He took advantage of the friendly crowd Wednesday and walked the airport fence for five minutes with his wife and Secretary of State Cyrus Vance to shake hands with admirers.

### **Proxmire: Tax Cut Essential**

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Sen. William Proxmire, D-Wis., urged President Carter today to seek a tax cut of \$20 to \$25 billion early next year to reduce unemployment and offset increases in Social Security payments.

"A major tax cut - in the neighborhood of \$20 to \$25 billion - early in 1978 is vital if the economy is to grow, if unemployment is to be reduced and if government spending is to be cut." he said.

### **Brush Fires Quelled**

WESTLAKE VILLAGE, Calif. (UPI) -Firemen declared victory today over two lateseason brush fires which flamed through the suburban canyons and hills near the Pacific Ocean west of Los Angeles.

In three days, the two fires chewed through 2,550 acres of brush and destroyed four houses, a mobile home, two outbuildings and about 10 structures described as shacks.

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The United States faces an increase in drug abuse and retailers will continue to lose billions of dollars from dishonest employees if lie detectors are banned, a drug store industry spokesman

The 32-year-old native of Gaton, Panama, winner of five batting titles in the last six years, won the prestigious award by a decisive point

# Scalp Needs **Good Treatment**

DEAR DR. LAMB - I am 33 years old and have been having a noticeable scalp problem for the last three years. My scalp gets very greasy, little sores like pimples appear at different parts and sometimes my hair is very sore at the roots.

What is sebum? DEAR READER - I would strongly recommend that you see a dermatologist. Home treatments for oily scalp often do work and are helpful, but there is always the exception when other measures are required. I suspect from your description and question that you have very active sebaceous glands. These are the oily glands that form a natural skin oil. They care common over the face and scalp. The oily secretion they produce is called sebum. showing on an elec-trocardiogram? Could it happen more than once? DEAR READER - The term heart attack can be used for several disorders of the heart, including attacks of rapid heart rate, transitory heart pains and for serious damage to the heart muscle(myocardial infarction). Today, it seems to be used mostly for the last condition. If you mean myocardial infarction, the answer to both of J your questions is yes. People do have the severe chest pain of a heart attack and may not have electrocardiographic changes

This can spread somewhat like an eczema to other parts of the body. The skin irritation, if not controlled, can damage the hair and cause hair loss. What you have is something more, but you will get some benefit from this information. Nevertheless, you will need to see a dermatologist to really get some useful help for a complicated problem like yours. 




