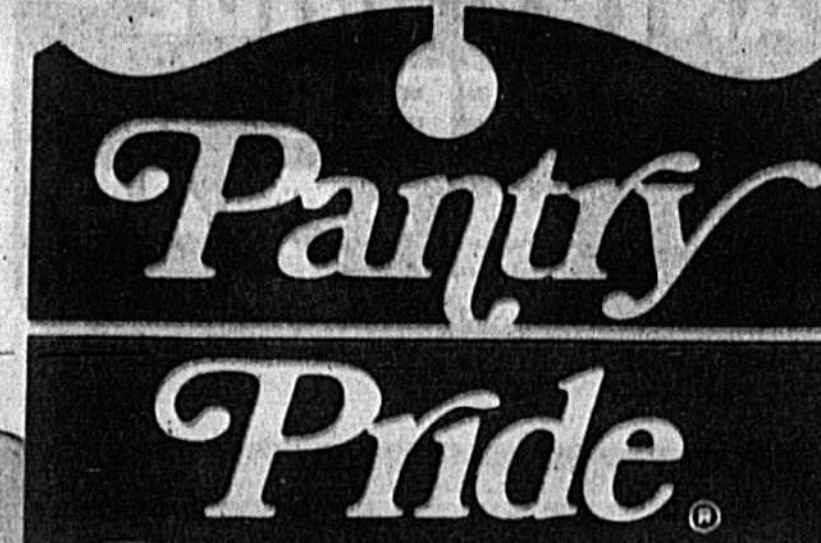


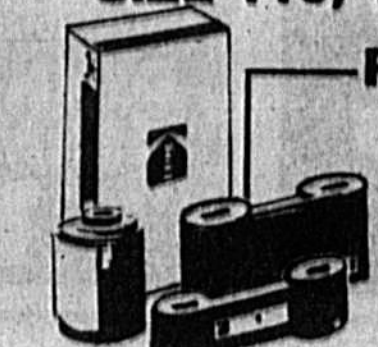

## At Casselberry Forum

### A Son Defends, Stumps For His Father

"Maybe we should replace the father with the son," was the response of one person in a crowded audience of citizens Wednesday night attending and participating in a candidates' forum at the Casselberry City Hall.

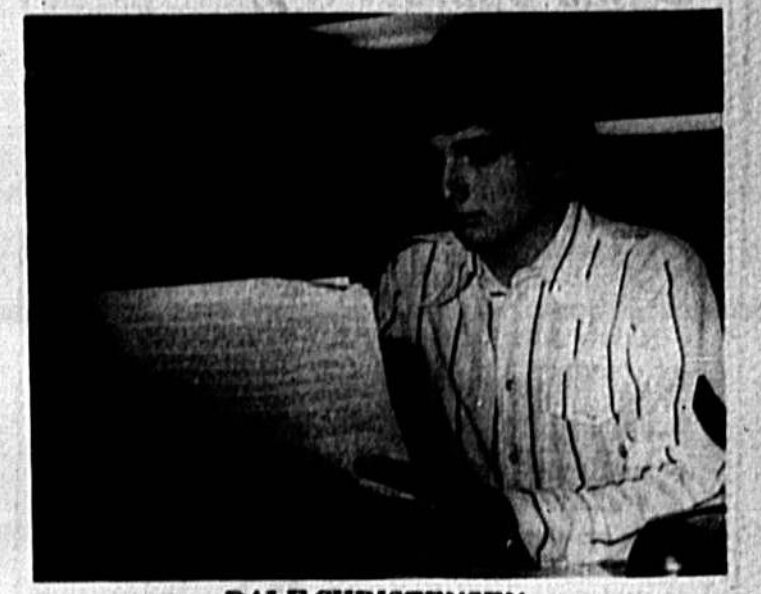
The remark was directed toward a poised and calm 18-year-old Dale Christensen, who spoke on behalf of the candidacy for re-election of his father, Mayor Gerald Christensen. At the conclusion of the forum, the young Seminole Community College student who is working toward a degree in public

administration and hopes to be a city manager ultimately accepted handshakes and congratulations for his presentation. He said his father told him at 2:30 that he had a previous commitment and could not make the meeting. "He asked me to appear for him and I started to

cram then," he said, adding that he hoped he had presented his father credibly. Dale attends most meetings of the city council. Dale in brief opening remarks gave credit to his father, the city council and the county-at-large for advances and progress during the two-year

Christensen administration of city government. Among the accomplishments he cited were: reduction of property taxes; the cleaning of Gee Creek by prison labor; acquisition of the 60 kilowatt emergency generator at no cost for the city; the city's AAAA bond credit rating; the

annexation of the Deer Run Planned Unit Development and the acquisition of the development's utility system at no cost to the city. Young Christensen said his father opposes double taxation and would support a class action suit by all the

## SCIDA-SCOPA Merger Study Panel Urged

A Seminole County Commissioner who has been critical of operations at the county port Wednesday proposed the establishment of a study committee to help commissioners decide whether the port should be merged with Seminole County Industrial Development Authority (SCIDA).

Commissioner Harry Kwiatkowski, who proposed setting up the committee at a Wednesday work session, said the group could make its recommendation to commissioners in time for the commission to submit a Seminole County Port Authority (SCOPA-SCIDA) merger bill to the state legislature in late January or early February.

During the county commission's budget deliberations last August, Kwiatkowski urged that an independent auditor be hired to audit the port's books. Commissioners voted to give \$75,000 in county property tax support to the port—the first time in three years such financial support was requested by port officials.

Commissioners are preparing legislative proposals for submission next Tuesday to the county's state legislative delegation. Commissioners will meet with the four-person delegation next Tuesday at 3 p.m. in Courtroom B at the courthouse in Sanford. Four of the five county commissioners have said they support some type of merger between the two agencies, whose goal is to increase industrial development and jobs in Seminole County. Commissioners favoring a merger are Dick Williams, Bob French, Bill Kirchhoff and Harry Kwiatkowski.

"Let's tell the delegation next Tuesday what we're doing so they will expect proposed legislation on this later," Kwiatkowski said. "The county attorney's office says the two agencies could be combined by state legislation. We should take some time to evaluate advantages and disadvantages of a merger." Commissioners will resume consideration of a proposed legislative program in a work session Monday at 9 a.m. in commission offices.

In memorandum to commissioners, Kwiatkowski said if the agencies were combined, he favors establishment of an industrial development advisory board to help guide the county's efforts to increase its tax base by encouraging industries to locate here.

"I don't know if I find any value in that way of operating the port," said Commissioner John Alexander. "I agree there's a margin of doubt as to how productive our industrial development efforts are, but I don't know if I can necessarily find a solution by combining the two. We need solid facts to see if a merged operation would be better."

Kirchhoff suggested the possibility of creating a single board of directors for both organizations but maintaining each organization separately. "The drawback of state legislation is the legislature might not adopt the kind of bill we want. What you get back might not be what you anticipated."

County commissioners could merge the boards of directors by appointing members of the SCOPA board. Until the state law governing the port was changed last year, the governor made appointments of the board. SCIDA board members are appointed by commissioners as well.

Commissioners could merge the boards of directors by appointing SCIDA board members to the SCOPA board. The commission recently appointed SCIDA board member Georges St. Laurent to the SCOPA board.

"We're paying two people to administer two programs doing the same job," said French, also a member of the SCOPA board. "I'm against the current set-up."

## And How About Barbers?

### Can Bartender Spot Mental Illness Sign?

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (UPI)—Specialists at the Western Mental Health Center are launching a program to arrest emotional disturbances at an early stage by teaching barbers, beauticians and bartenders to detect telltale signs of mental illness. "I think there is real potential in this," said Dr. Robert Pogue, a psychiatrist at the center. "These people are often in situations to pick up the first signs of severe mental problems." About 30 persons turned out for the first in a series of seminars designed to teach

barbers, beauticians and bartenders symptoms of the various forms of mental illness. They are also being made aware of the services that area mental health clinics offer. Pogue said steps have been taken to caution participants in the program against offending their patrons. "We want them to try to make a person aware of the help he may receive at the center, or just to lend a sympathetic ear. That often is the best therapy," Pogue said. "We don't want them to alienate people."

Shandra Jackson, a mental health consultant, said barbers, beauticians and bartenders with regular clientele are often the first to spot a deviation in a person's behavior. Armed with effective listening and counseling skills, Miss Jackson said the problem may be handled without ever having to resort to in-patient treatment, which she said still carries a stigma. "Of course, they don't leave here feeling they can go and handle the world," Miss Jackson said, "but it's a start."

## Engineering Firm Selects Seminole For New Plant

Seminole County's economic future continues to brighten today, according to Jim Daniel, executive director of Seminole County Industrial Development Authority (SCIDA), with the announcement another industry is locating here which will initially employ up to 100. The newest company to locate in Seminole County is Arnold Engineering Co. of Marengo, Ill., a wholly-owned subsidiary of Allegheny Ludlum Industries of Pittsburgh, Pa., according to Daniel.

His emphasized, however, the industrial bond issue will be paid for by the company from earnings, "and no taxpayer money is involved." Daniel said it will take about 90 days to complete the industrial bond financing and a company spokesman estimated actual plant construction should occur in early or mid-1978. "I think we are experiencing a healthy economic trend," Daniel added today, pointing out: "We are presently negotiating with four or five other companies looking seriously at locating in Seminole County and that could mean up to 800 more jobs. Not all at first, of course, but at different stages of development leading up to an ultimate 800 jobs."

Why the continued interest by industry in Seminole County? Daniel pinpointed the answer: "I think Seminole County is beginning to get the kind of recognition it deserves from the industrial sector. We currently have high-caliber industry here, and indications are this county now is being looked at by high caliber industries around the nation, and just as significantly, by those industries in the northeast part of the country."

Industry from around the nation, Daniel pointed out, is continuously looking at the south and more specifically Florida to locate plants. "And Seminole County is beginning to get the recognition that will lead to our getting a share of that new industry," he asserted.

## Keeping Public In The Dark

Some members of Congress have expressed suspicion that the bureaucracy may be circumventing the new "sunshine law." It has been noted that meeting announcements were published after the meetings were held.

It is doubtful that any member of the legislative branch of government was very surprised at the disclosure. Most of them know many ways to keep the public in the dark whenever it suits either them or government agencies.

Where much controversy might take place, the so-called open meetings are generally staged after the differences are ironed out. About the only source of information concerning how decisions are forged is brought to the people by energetic newsmen who have developed good inside sources.

For a newsmen to keep his sources he must protect their identity or lose them. If he is forced by some judge to reveal the identity of the people who have trusted him, his pipeline of information has been blocked and the people are deprived of pertinent knowledge of how their affairs are being handled.

There is just no way to keep lawmakers or bureaucrats from decision-making out of public sight. The members of any group can meet in many ways without oversight by the press or the public. Then, when an accommodation has been reached, a scenario can be devised for the "open meeting," and the public will then see only a staged production.

Most newsmen will protect their sources even when some automatic judge decides to send them to jail on a contempt of court charge. A good many have been jailed when they refused to reveal their sources.

It is our belief that no judge has ever been given the right, through state or federal legislative action, to sentence a newsmen for failure to reveal identities. The judiciary has assumed that right out of the British Common Law which came down from the idea of the "divine right of kings."

If they followed our constitution and upheld the principle which is supposed to protect us by "due process" they would file a complaint, let the district attorney bring an action in another court and give the defendant the right of a trial by jury.

If this were followed it is highly improbable that any newsmen would be forced to serve time like a common criminal on the whim of some judge. The people of this nation can be far better served in this manner than by all the ideas on any type of "sunshine law."

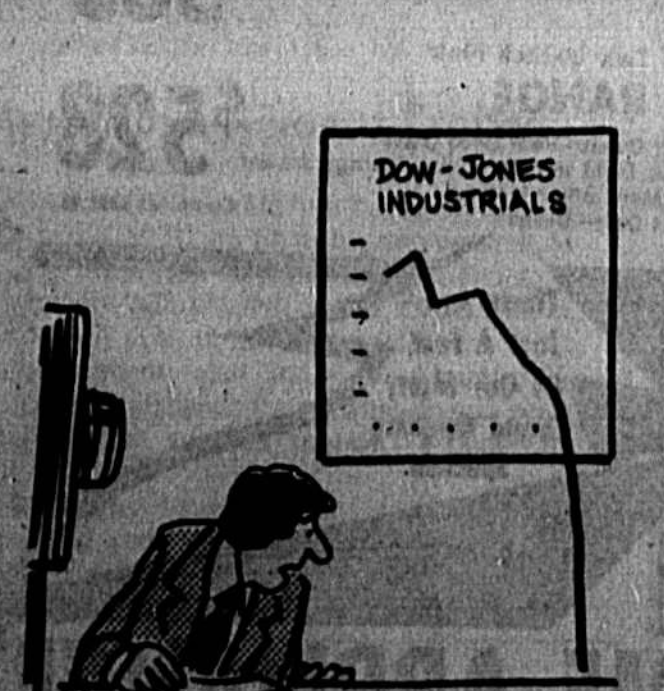
We do not need the formation of new laws. We do need a whole lot of law repealing leading to getting government more and more out of our lives. How this turn-about can ever be started is the big question.

It is not in politicians' interest to move in that direction. The people generally have been so conditioned to "There ought to be a law," that it does not seem in the cards to hope for a people-forced change.

It would seem it should be easy to convince most everyone to trust themselves before they place trust in the political arena. Perhaps we should all begin to use our own thought processes, gather all information possible, then act and react to self-attained logic.

Could that be the path out of our present morass?

**ANGLE-WALTERS ERA Fight: The Last Crusade**

WASHINGTON—In the heat of a year of struggle, it is always tempting to say that everything which can be done to enhance the prospects for victory should be done.

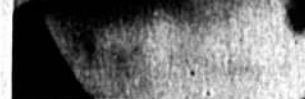

JERUSALEM (UPI) — Egypt came to Israel today, breaking through the barrier of war and bitter stalemate that has been the hallmark of Arab-Israeli relations for three decades and spurring hopes for peace.

A 60-member Egyptian delegation arrived at Ben Gurion Airport to help pave the way for President Anwar Sadat's arrival Saturday. They were greeted with applause by hundreds of spectators intent on witnessing history.

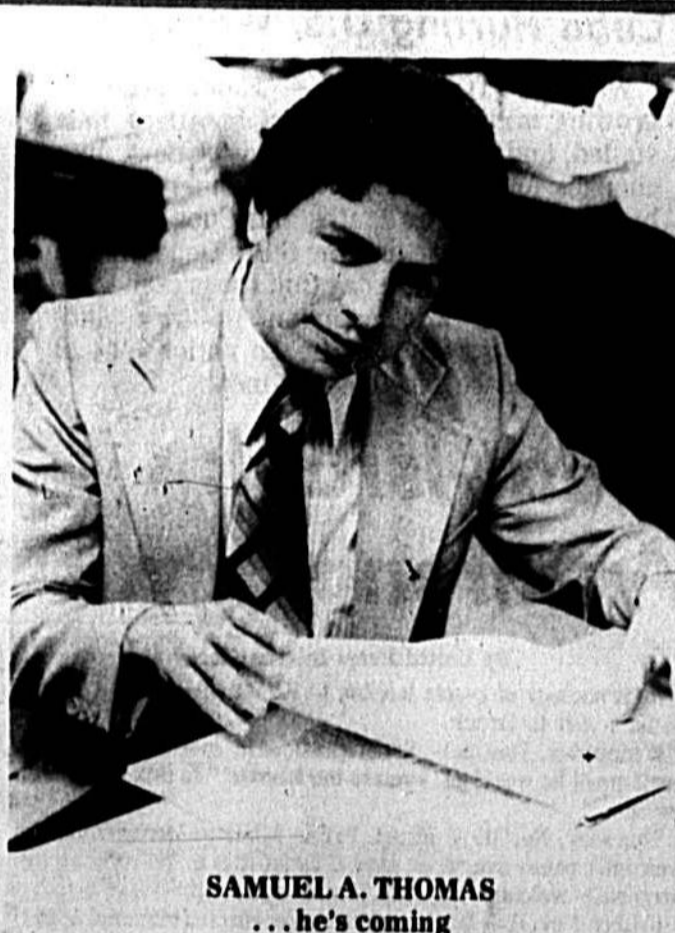
Hasan Kamel, the director of Sadat's cabinet, told Israeli officials at his side. Kamel, wearing a diplomatic pin-striped suit and dark striped tie, was welcomed by Ephraim Evron, the director-general of the Foreign

Ministry. The two men shook hands (amid broad smiles). Prime Minister Menachem Begin summoned his 17-member cabinet into special session and sent a telegram to President Carter expressing his "deep

gratitude for your efforts, which contributed so magnificently to bringing about the momentous meeting in Jerusalem."

"People here and abroad contend that this is an historic moment," Begin's wire said. "You have created it, Mr. President, and I express my deepest heartfelt thanks."

Begin also paid tribute to Romanian President Nicolae Ceausescu, who, he said, played a "serious role" in bringing him and Sadat together. Ceausescu long has played a role as an intermediary between the Arabs and Israelis.

## Unpaid School Insurance Claims Of Workers Could Hit \$350,000

The Seminole County School Board's problem of how to deal with unpaid insurance claims for some school employees tripled today, according to estimates of how much those claims may total.

Until today, the school board had given estimates that the total of unpaid claims would be about \$100,000, but the figure may reach \$350,000, according to Gene Grooms, executive director of Seminole Education Association (SEA).

The problem first came up in mid-October when Old Securities Insurance Company went bankrupt, leaving some employees with thousands of dollars in unpaid medical, dental and life insurance claims. Grooms said one reason his original estimate was low was "I knew nothing about the life insurance. There is one unpaid life insurance claim alone of \$50,000," Grooms said. He indicated the largest non-life insurance claim he has seen is for \$22,000 for a

teacher, "who spent all summer in the hospital, and died of cancer."

Grooms also lowered the original estimate of 650 families to "between 500 and 600 families who may have unpaid bills or claims."

SEA is preparing a suit against the school board to obtain payment of the claims. Grooms said, and he hopes to have the suit ready for filing by Tuesday.

The bills were left unpaid, or paid by checks drawn on insufficient funds, when Old Securities went bankrupt in October. Grooms noted that there are "26 pregnancies, and doctors here are unable to give an exact figure on what the cost of those might be. We included a lump sum estimate of \$1,200 each for those in the overall figure," he said.

"The only way we can get an exact figure is to let those claims be worked through First Equity Company in Fort Lauderdale," Grooms said.

"In June 1976 Old Securities made First Equity its claims administrator. They processed all Old Securities claims, keeping up with deductibles, what was allowable under the policies and what was not. Since the Old Securities bankruptcy proceedings began, First Equity has kept all the claims in Fort Lauderdale, dated and unopened," Grooms explained.

"To get those claims processed would take a court order or the 'We are checking an attorney general's report... in a similar case'—School Superintendent William P. Layer

Seminole County school board saying it would pay for First Equity to work up the claims and give it an exact amount," he said.

School Superintendent William P. Layer said his office has checked with the state auditor general's representative, to determine whether paying the bills would be legal use of public funds.

"He concurs with Mr. Stenstrom's opinion as to the lack of legality of that payment," Layer said. Douglas Stenstrom, school board attorney, has repeatedly warned the board that, in his opinion, paying the claims or bills without a court order would be illegal.

Layer also said "we are checking an attorney general's report issued a couple of years ago in a similar case to see what he ruled."

He said consideration was not yet being given to areas in the budget from which the money might be taken if the court should order payment.

"We will cross that bridge when we come to it," he said.

Layer said he had not yet received the estimate of number and dollar amounts of claims which is being prepared by Walter Meriwether, internal auditor and risk manager, "but I think it could exceed \$50,000."

**5th County Man Gives Up In Series Of Bank Holdups**

The fifth Seminole County man charged in a series of three bank robberies has surrendered to federal officials.

Original FBI statements had linked only three Seminole County men with two bank robberies.

John Michael Cusack, 21, of Caselberry surrendered to the federal marshal in Orlando Thursday on a bank robbery charge.

Here is a chronological listing of the robberies as described by the FBI:

On July 23, 1976, four men robbed the temporary bank facilities at the Heritage Federal Savings and Loan Association in Altamonte. At least three of the men were armed and they escaped with \$18,000, the FBI reported. The spokesman said it is believed Cusack, Gvoruhik, Pinnoch and Shewan were involved in the robbery.

On Sept. 27, 1976, two men robbed the Allendale bank again. However, by this time safety devices including an automatic film machine had been installed and Shewan and Greenstein were charged with the robbery.

Last Jan. 26, 1977, three men robbed the Tucker Federal Savings and Loan Association in Altamonte escaping with \$7,000.
