Mills returns to county

TALLAHASSEE - A death row inmate who avoided execution last month deserves a hearing on whether his trial lawyer failed to raise evidence about his mental impairment, the Florida Supreme Court ruled Thursday

The 64 ruling returns the case of Gregory Mills to the Seminole County circuit court where he was convicted in the 1979 murder of an elderly homeowner during a burglary

The high court had earlier blocked Mills execution, scheduled for Jan. 16, and issued its written reasons for doing so Thursday

Circuit Judge William Woodson had rejected Mills' bid for an evidentiary hearing on whether he suffers any mental impairment that would mitigate his pointshment for the murder of Vincent Ashley, killed with a shotgim when he investigated a burglary in his hous



Land use restrictions loom; developers try to counter

SANFORD - Hoping to beat tight development restrictions that may be imposed by the state and county in 1991, developers are seeking 15 amendments to the county's land use plandouble the usual amount.

The proposals will be considered in what may be two marathon-length meetings before the Seminole County Planning and Zoning Commission beginn ing at 5 p.m. next Wednesday and Thursday County commissioners will review the proposals in

Seminole County will change its land use requirements in April 1991 to prevent any development unless roads, water and sewer capacity and other services are available at or before the time the development is completed. These "concurrency" requirements are mandated by the state to slow papillation growth to match government's ability to keep page with it.

This is double the mumber of amendments we normally see," says Judy Stewart, county principal planner. We usually see seven or eight large scale proposals. This time, we have 15, I suspect many of



Agents seize ton of cocaine, arrest six

FORT LAUDERDALE - A ton of cocaine hidden in a fruit shipment along with more than \$500,000 was seized from a Broward County home, and six Colombians were arrested on

drug charges, federal agents said Thursday.

The cocaine was seized Wednesday night as it was delivered by rental truck to a home in the affluent Weston subdivision. said John Fernandez, spokesman for the Drug Enforcement Administration in Miami.

The six Colombian nationals were arrested and charged with drug smuggling and drug trafficking charges. Agents also seized the money and six vehicles, he said.

The arrests were the result of a three-week investigation and surveillance by the Florida Joint Task Group, which includes agents of the federal Drug Enforcement Administration and U.S. Customs Service.

Mom charged with strangling children

TAMPA — A state grand jury has charged Dorothy Dianne Rose with two counts of first-degree murder in the January strangling deaths of her two children.

The indictment was handed down Wednesday despite the defense attorney's efforts to short-circuit the grand jury's decision by presenting reports from five psychiatrists and a psychologist saying Rose. 31. was legally insane when her 13-month-old daughter and 2-year-old son were killed Jan. 23. Rose refuses to believe that her children are dead, and

continually asks to see them, said Barry Cohen, her attorney. The indictment moves the case to circuit court, and sets up the possibility of a court hearing to determine whether Rose is mentally fit to stand trial.

investigators have said they believe the woman, who was struggling through a bitter divorce, killed her children to prevent their father from gaining custody.

Parents sentenced under new gun law

PALATKA - The parents of a 9-year-old boy who accidentally shot and killed a playmate have been given probation and fined after pleading no contest to misdemeanors related to the shooting.

Heather C. Bell. 41, was found guilty of a second-degree misdemeanor for allowing unsupervised use of a firearm by her non-Brendan Bell. The boy was playing with with a .22-caliber rifle in his room last Oct. 8 when the gun went off, hitting Scott Cariton, 10, in the stomach and killing him.

Putnam County Judge Peter T. Miller withheld adjudication

against Calvin R. Bell, 40, the boy's stepfather, who was not at the house at the time of the shooting. Bell will not have a criminal record, but he and his wife must both serve six months probation and each pay a fine of \$356.50.

The Bells were indicted by a grand jury on the misdemeanor charge in November after the panel found insufficient evidence to charge them under the state's new law that makes it a felony to leave a loaded gun within reach of a child.

Palm Beach County Circuit Judge Emery Newell ordered the 7-year-old boy to undergo a psychological evaluation after the hearing Wednesday. He was being held at a Juvenile detention





Shuttle mission still cloaked in secrecy

CAPE CANAVERAL - The shuttle Atlantis's military astronauts pressed on Friday with their clandestine space mission, conducting experiments under a cloak of secrecy nin the primary flight - launch of a top-secret spy satellite - believed to have been successfully accomplished.

As usual with such military missions, the identity of Atlantis's major payload was classified, but the astronauts reportedly carried a \$500 million photo-reconnaissance satellite into orbit Wednesday to spy on the Soviet Union.

While details could not be immediately confirmed, sources who requested anonymity said the spacecraft was successfully ejected from the ship's payload bay and that it was operating

normally.

But NASA and the Air Force refuse to discuss any aspects of Atlantis's payload, and all communications between the astronauts and mission control in Houston are blacked out for the duration of the 34th shuttle

The Air Force allowed NASA to lift the veil of secrecy somewhat Thursday when agency spokesman Kyle Herring announced that Atlantis is scheduled to land Sunday at Edwards Air Force Base in California's Mojave Desert northeast of Los-

However, the Air Force refused to release a three-hour shuttle landing period as promised. raising some questions about the progress of the mission.

"The (landing) announcement normally includes the landing day and a three-hour period." Capt. Marty Hauser, an Air Force spokesman at the Johnson Space Center, sald on Thursday.

"However, all public affairs announcements during (Department of Defense)-dedicated missions are provided based on mission progress," he said. "The planned landing day is the only information DOD is prepared to release at this time. Based on mission progress, we would hope to make an announcement 24 hours before landing."

Hauser could provide no other

explanation for the departure from a NASA-Air Force public affairs plan hammered out prior to the first post-Challenger military shuttle flight in December

Earlier in the day, Herring, reading an Air Force-approved five-man, all-military crew were "expected" to land Sunday at Edwards, adding "meanwhile, the ... crew is doing well and the orbiter Atlantis continues to perform satisfactorily."

The statement was NASA's first comment on the hush-hushmission since one hour and 50 minutes after takeoff Wednesday from the Kennedy Space Center when the space agency ceased public affairs commentary about the clandestine shuttle flight, the second of nine flights scheduled for 1990.

In the meantime, Navy Capt. John "J.O." Creighton, 46. Atlantis commander, Air Force Col. John Casper, 46, the co-pilot, Marine Lt. Col. David Hilmers, 40, Air Force Col. Richard "Mike" Mullane, 44, and Navy Lt. Cmdr. Pierre Thuot, 34, went about their

Along with launching the satellite, the astronauts were expected to conduct military and scientific experiments, along with the usual slate of medical studies to learn more about the effects of weightlessness on

As for the primary goal of the mission, Aviation Week & Space Technology magazine reported last month the astronauts planned to launch a 19-ton digital reconnaissance satellite Thursday during Atlantis's 18th 90 minute orbit, or some 27 hours after liftoff.

The magazine reported the solar-powered satellite was equipped with a high-tech photographic system capable of beaming back super-sharp digital pictures of ground targets around the world to gather basic intelligence and to help monitor compliance with weapons

The spacecraft also is believed to be equipped with electronics gear to eavesdrop on supposedly secure Soviet military communications.

CIA building talks continue despite commissioner conflicts

LAKE MARY - The city will continue negotiations for the purchase of the Lake Mary Community Improvement Association building on Country Club Road, but city commissioners said last night they may meet stumbling blocks in striking a deal because of the club's representation on the commission.

The city commission last night authorized City Manager John Litton to continue negotiations for purchase of the building. which the city has proposed as a home for its developing parks and recreation department, CIA is asking for the appraised value of \$151,000 plus \$2,000 for appliances in the facility.

The 4,800-square-foot multi-purpose building sits on about three acres of city property at 260 N. Country Club Road. between Alma and Grandbend Avenues. CIA holds a 99-year lease for the property at \$1 a.

Litton said the cost of building a similar facility would range between \$400,000 and the commission continuing negottations for an initial \$76,500 payment at closing and a second payment of \$84,150 to be paid

Commissioners had several with CIA. With five CIA members, two past presidents and early in negotiations. one CIA director on the commission, the five commissioners agreed there may be conflicts

"We're negotiating to buy out of a lease I negotiated? I may have a problem with that."

Mayor Dick Fess, CIA's first president, said.

Commissioner Tom Mahoney said he will be deciding whether to cast a vote on the commission or on the CIA board of directors. As a member of both groups, he said, conflict will keep him from making a decision on the purchase for one of the boards either the city or the non-profit community organization. Mahoney dropped his position on the negotiating committee because of the conflict, passing his responsibilities to former CIA president Commissioner David Mealor.

Commissioner George Duryea also argued that Lake Mary residents should not be forced to pay for the building twice by the city's purchase of the facility with lax dollars. Private donations from local groups and residents, who began contributing to the building fund before groundbreaking in 1983, paid for the building.

I am adamantly against having (taxpayers) pay for it again." Duryea said.

Mealor disagreed, saying most of the money that paid for the \$500,000. He recommended to building came from a few individuals and organizations, not the entire Lake Mary population.

'Anything less than fair market value would be an insult." he said

Litton said the CIA board had concerns about negotiations rejected a proposal for the group to give the building to the city



Junk in, junk out

In the 1980s, junk bonds took Drexel Burnham Lambert from Wall Street's back ranks to the top of the securities world. In 1990, junk bonds took Drexel down, forcing the firm into bankruptcy and liquidation. Once again, events have confirmed the basic maxim of investing which junk bond promoters thought they had repealed: anything that goes up can come down.

In the recidess speculative atmosphere of the 1980s, a climate that Drexel promoted and profited from, junk bonds were held out as a kind of free lunch: high-interest securities of debt-heavy companies that were supposed to carry no more risk of default than bonds of investment grade. The rosy picture, based on a small selection of companies operating in a fast-growing economy, crashed last fall against a different reality: the crumbling of poorly structured junk bond deals, rising interest rates, declining earnings in a torpid economy and buyer flight to quality. Junk bond prices fell sharply, forcing Drexel to write down its extensive junk bond holdings and eventually driving it into bankruptcy.

Remarkably, Drexel's fall has sent only small ripples through the financial world. Without Drexel and its customers to provide capital, the already depressed junk bond secondary market has few buyers and faces a long recovery. That will especially hurt insurance companies and thrifts in the Drexel orbit, which had heavily invested in Drexel's deals and have seen the value of their portfolios shrink.

But the stock market, which had watched junk bond values plunge last fall, seems already to have adjusted to the fact that junk bond financing will no longer be readily available to drive leveraged buy-outs and stock prices. The calm with which Wall Street has greeted Drexel's collapse seems to have vindicated the judgment of the Federal Reserve and the Securities and Exchange commission that Drexel could fail without damaging the nation's financial markets.

If Drexel's collapse caused the country little harm, the same cannot be said of its tenure as the darling of Wall Street. The junk bonds it ploneered helped many small companies without established credit ratings to tap the bond markets for cash to expand their businesses. But they also became the driving force behind a speculative merger mania on Wall Street, in which first Drexel and then other securities firms financed corporate raiders in acquisitions and leveraged buy-outs that had no other purpose than to break up companies for the profit of the speculators and provide fat fees to the companies that arranged the financing.

Much of this activity yielded no ideas, products or increases in the nation's productivity; often it cost jobs and destroyed useful businesses. It was capitalism at its worst, with Drexel as greed's handmaiden and cheerleader. Few Americans will mourn its passing.

Voters, why not sue the DNC?

WASHINGTON - With Bulgaria moving toward democracy - including such subversive devices as elections and secret ballots - perhaps the Democrats of Iowa, and the Democratic Party, should consider the same ideas in choosing a presidential nominee.

What exists now is a scam. The presidential nominating rules of the Democratic Party whatever that may be - are made by a fascinating body called the Democratic National Committee. The are 406 DNC members. There are quotas for blacks, Hispanics and women, but no one clae. The language of prejudice

BOSTON - It's been a long time since I believed that "names can never hurt me." By kindergarten we all learn that words can be as damaging as sticks and stones.

The vocabulary of prejudice in particular can be as destructive as a physical weapon. Words like wop, kike, nigger, bitch, fag are thrust deliberately to wound another.

But so are the other words with which we tongue-lash each other these days. Racist, bigot, anti-Semite, homophobe, sexist. In theory, these words were created and stockpiled as an arsenal of self-defense. Yet we use them as aggressive implements all their own. They have become a public and pre-emptive strike. A deadly silencer

In the past few weeks. Andy Rooney was struck by one of those accusing words. He was cast, and cast out from CBS, as a racist for allegedly telling a magazine that "blacks have watered down their genes.

Next Ann Richards, candidate for governor of Texas, was colored in rucist hues when some heard through her Texas (wang the remark that "no judge and no bureaucrat has any business in determining whether a white woman has an abortion." Political linguists poured over the tapes to decipher if she said whether a white woman" or, as Richards claims, "whether or why a woman.

Then in Massachusetts, Hoston University President John Silber, running for governor, was attacked by a rainbow coalition. Once, for calling the city of Lowell the Cambodian capital of America. Twice, for comparing Jesse. Jackson's oratory to Hitler's. Thrice tperversely) for alluding to racism among Jews. And finally, for sexism in using the phrase, "sons of bitches."

These were just the most public cases of the past month. Charges of "anti" or "ism" — the big verbal guns to be drawn out against serious attacks — now seem to be the Saturday night special of discourse. They are part of a random civic violence.

Who was caught in the verbal nets this time? Rooney, who was arrested to 1942 for integrating the back of a bus. Richards, whose autobiography is a civil-rights story. And Silber, who is to all appearances, an equalopportunity misanthrope.

For the most part, those who speak up for these and others accused of some bigoted remark have hinged their defense on the First Amendment. Freedom includes the rights of Americans to say things that are cruel or stupid, outrageous as well as inspired. In Eastern Europe, after all, neo-Nazi skinheads now roam uttering anti-Semitic remarks. People there are discovering the hateful side of

Hut what I am struck by is something else: the disparity, the gap between our current hypersensitivity to public speech and our relative and lingering insensitivity to private

This year a slew of truly racist, sexist, auti-gay, anti-Semitic acts took place on campuses across the country. They were followed by protests and then by administration speech bans and then by debates on the First Amendments versus Harmful Speech. The pattern became familiar.

I wondered, then and now, how many of the

students had ever personally confronted someone else's stupidity and bigotry eye to eye. Had the undergraduate spoken up when her friend was called a Jewish-American Princess? Had the young man ever challenged his buddy on a casual slur about their black team-mate? Had a female student who'd been harassed at a fraternity party ever phoned the president of the house with a personal complaint? Had the black who'd been hasseled in a campus bookstore

called the manager

before calling the protest meeting?

In our work lives, in our social lives, it happens time and again. Something is said. Not knowing how to reply, whether to reply, we say nothing. We may avoid the people, avoid the situation, but they go on, not knowing their offense.

The right to free speech was never meant to silence opposition. I can defend your right to say what you think and fight to change what you think. If over the years, Americans have learned to hold their tongues and change their minds, it is partly because of the personal reactions to bigotry. On the other hand, those who truly ply hate in public have often tried it out first in private.

Names can hurt. To hurl them indiscriminately in the name of self-defense is dangerous. It seems that we have become trigger-happy in public. What we need is more courage against prejudice in private.

Ambassadors must pay for the party

WASHINGTON - Today, we criticize the federal government for being too cheap. This may be a first.

In a budget-cutting move, the State Department is now charging new ambassadors for their formal awearing-in ceremonies. That's right. The president appoints you to be ambassador to Outer Slobovia and you have to pay the elevator mechanic in the State Department to stand around while you get

aworn in, just in case something breaks. For years, it has been understood that new ambassadors and assistant secretaries of state pay the punch and cookle bill" if they want to make a party out of their awearing in ceremonies.

But now the State Department has gone too far. According to an internal departmental memo. the honorees either get the no-frills package or they pay through the nose for utilities, photogra-phen, elevator oper-ators guards and



assorted hangers-on. The State Department's excuse is that its fanciest rooms must be protected. The department is justifiably proud of its eighth-floor Diplomatic Reception Rooms. They have been meticulously decorated by the chairman of the department's Fine Arts Project, Clement E. Conger, who coaxed about \$2 million out of donors in 1988 for the work. Conger is assembling one of America's finest collections of antique furniture in those rooms.

The rooms are "primarily intended for official entertainment of high-level foreign visitors," according to a recent departmental memo. In the past, the rooms have also been available for swearing-in ceremonies for high-level administrative appointees and

The nickle-and-dime bills for that privilege are new. The State Department memo on the policy offers a defense: "When these rooms are used, certain key administrative personnel are required to be available to ensure that the event runs smoothly, to correct any possible mechanical malfunctions, to provide electronic or photograpide services and heating or air conditioning and electricity, and to coordinate and supervise all support functions."

That's the way the bureaucracy talks when it wants to justify spending a bundle on a uncless doodad. In this case, the ambassador-to-be is the one who gets the bill 821.04 an hour for the manager of the Diplomatic Reception Rooms, \$21.04 an hour for the elevator operator, \$28 an hour for the elevator mechanic, \$21.04 an hour for the photographer, \$21.04 an hour for a technical troubleshooter, \$32 an hour for utilities. \$23.29 an hour per guard and \$20 an hour for something called "allied personnel" to do who knows what. The personnel and prices vary depending on the hour of day and the number of guests. Out of the goodness of its heart, the State Department has kept the freeble - in and out during the lunch hour. no food, no drinks, no leitering.

The price structure is the ultimate insult for career foreign service officers who have earned their way to the top - an unenviable posting in some backwater country where they will spend their term trying to solve the visa problems of angry foreigners. As far as we can see, the only people who deserve to have the bill handed to them are the ones who assumed from the beginning that a diplomatic post is something one buys. These are the political cronies of the president and George Bush has plenty of them - who are made ambassadors because they are big campaign contributors. Bush, and presidents before him, pluck these fat cats from the contributors list and give them the jobs.

agement District three-county task force is reviewing building restrictions for the entire Econ that would allow no construction closer than 550 feet from the river's edge and at least 50 feet from wetlands beside the river. The task force is expected to

vote on the proposal March 13. P&Z members last month delayed their decision until April to approve a reconing for 233 acres owned by Hi-Oaks due west of the Econ adjacent to the 663acre site. The Chytona sought to build 840 homes and develop 19.5 acres of the site into offices arid stores. Committee members said the proposal should wait until the Econ task force has

completed their work.

Most of the Hi Oaks project cast of the river is 1,000 feet or more from the river's edge.

Seminole County planners oppose the plan saying the proposed density of nearly two homes per acre is too high for the area where one acre or greater lots are the norm. Sylvester Chang, owner of Sanford Mobil Service and vice president of Service Station Dealers of Florida, has lobbled for the store regulations in larke Mary, Sanford and Seminole County. Although he has asked Seminole County commissioners for more security measures than included in Sanford's ordinance. he said last night he was satisfied with Lake Mary's scaled-down version

"I will take whitever we can get to protect lives and to protect. our citizens." Chang said.

Representatives from convinience store chains last night asked commissioners to work

with merchants instead of adopting an ordinance restricting their businesses.

The problem that exists is crime, not convenience store crime." said Ed Thomas of Miller Enterprises, parent company of the two Handy Way stores in Lake Mary. As an example, he cited Police Chief Charles Lauderdale's statistics showing the same number of convenience store robberies as card shop

Thomas said he approved of language in the Lake Mary ordinance applying the provisions to all retail stores open between 10 p.m. and 8 a.m., excluding stores in shopping centers. Convenience stores have been singled out by other cities where the regulations are in place, he said.

Lake Mary's four convenience stores are currently the only stores affected by the regulations, but commissioners fashloned the language to include gas stations, liquor stores and any other stores that may open during those hours in the future.

John Pearman, Retail Grocers Association of Florida president, told commissioners the two-

clerk provision would only expose more employees to violence. Commissioners rejected his request to delay a vote on the ordinance until industry representatives were able to meet with the commission.

Convenience store regulations could become state law. Brian Rush, state House of Representatives majority whip, has introduced a bill requiring two clerks on duty overnight and installation of security measures.

Seminole County will hold a public hearing on a similar convenience store ordinance March 13. The ordinance requires two clerks on duty between 9 p.m. and 5 a.m. or bullet-proof glass to protect a single clerk, installation of drop sales, cash limits and sign regulations.

The Lake Mary regulations are now in effect, but Lauderdale said he will work with merchants to allow time for staff adjustments and installation of lighting. Stores have 60 days to install security cameras.

SRINAGAR, India - Indian authorities, fearing unrest on an Islamic holiday coinciding with the most important Moslem prayers of the week, imposed an indefinite curfew today on the Kashmir Valley, a day after troops killed at least 60 pro-independence protesters.

Friday marked the climax of a weeklong observance of Miraj, an Islamic holiday and one of the few times each year when a hair - believed to be from the beard of the Prophet Mohammed - is displayed at the Hazrat Bal, the most sacred shrine in predominantly Moslem Kashmir.

MANAGUA, Nicaragua -Sandiniata-controlled labor groups threatened to demand an immediate wage increase from President-elect Violeta Chamorro, and government and opposition leaders held transition talks.

The warning increased the pressure on Chamorro, who has raised expectations about her ability to reverse the nation's economic decline and is trying to wrest away the institutional power of the ruling Sandinistas. especially their control of the army, in transition talks.

High-level government officials, including President Daniel Ortega's brother, Defense Minister Humberto Ortega, met Thursday with four repre-sentatives of the U.S.-backed opposition, said Ernesto Palacios, a spokesman for the National Opposition Union, or UNO, a coalition of 14 political parties that backed Chamorro.

The discussions are being held in several sites in Managua and include observers from the United Nations and the Organization of American States. Vice President-elect Virgilio Godoy said the talks dealt more with pro-

tocol than politics. "They are negotiating the administrative rather than political aspects of the transition." Godoy said.

Congress probes CIA-

WASHINGTON - Rep. Frank Annunzio. D-III.. chairman of a House panel overseeing financial institutions, has asked the House Intelligence Committee to investigate alleged links between the CIA and several fatled thrifts.

Annunzio sald Thursday that a former Justice Department prosecutor told a House Banking subcommittee staff member that while looking into a thrift failure "he was told by FBI agents to drop the investigation of one of the individuals connected with the bank failure because that individual had 'CIA connections.'

The prosecutor was also told that the individual involved had a 'get out of jail free card." Annunzio said in a letter to Rep. Anthony Beilenson, D.Calif., chairman of the House Permanent Select Committee on

Intelligence. Annunzio also said that during his panel's preliminary inquiry, staff members in-terviewed on FBI agent who said the former prosecutor's comments were correct and that statements about CIA connections were

In his letter to Bellenson, Annunzio said his panel began its inquiry after recent news reports, including a series in The Houston Post, about CIA connections to failed thrift Institutions.

Annunzio said he was at first skeptical but has become convinced "that at least some of the allegations have validity."

CIA spokesman Mark Mansfield said the agency "will fully cooperate with the House Permanent Select Committee on Intelligence in any investigation the committee might choose to conduct concerning The Houston Post allegations."

Report mixed on success of anti-narcotics effort

WASHINGTON - Last year was a banner year for drug arrests and seizures, but it was an even better year for illicit narcottes producers around the world, the State Department reports.

In its annual International Narcotics Control Strategy Report released Thursday, the State Department concluded that "results in international narcotics control efforts were mixed during 1989.

"Worldwide narcoties pro-

duction reached new levels. corruption undermined enforcement efforts and a number of governments still failed to exhibit a serious commitment to reducing drug production." the report said.

The report singled out Bolivia, Thailand, Laos and Syria as countries that fell short of full cooperation in the war on drugs.

Although exact information is difficult to get, the report said. 'It also seems clear that worldwide abuse of illegal drugs is rising."

Median age climbs for baby boomers

WASHINGTON - The median U.S. age has risen to 32.3 years and aging baby boomers have made the 25-34 age group the largest segment of the population, the Census Bureau said.

Since the early 1970s, the population of the United States has seen major shifts in its distribution by age, race and Hispanic origin," the bureau said Thursday in a wide-ranging report looking at population estimates over the past decade.

The report brings together figures from a number of different surveys taken at slightly different times.

The new report put the total U.S. population as of Jan. 1. 1989, at 247,635,000, an increase of 2,404,000, or just under I percent over the previous Jan. 1 and 20.5 million or 9.1 percent more - from April 1, 1980, when the last decennial census was taken.

In the report, Census said that the 32.3 year median age as of July 1, 1989, was up from 30 years in 1980 and 27.9 years in 1970 and reflected the aging of the vast number of people born between 1948 and 1964, the so-called Baby Boom.

More than 79 million people are considered between 25 and 44 years old, the Baby Boom years. In particular, Census said the group between 35 and 44 years old increased four times faster than the total population between midyear 1980 and midyear 1988, with the number of people in this age group increasing by 9.5 million during the period, a 3.9 percent average annual growth.

But the largest population group consisted of those born near the end of the boom, who are now between 25 and 34 ears old. There were 43,886,000 people in that age group, Census said, an increase of 6,260,000 people, or 16.6 percent.

However, Census added, the trend in the rate of growth for this group will be downward over the next decade as the much smaller population of young adults aged 18-24 ages -26,888 people in 1988 — and the baby boomers move into the middle years of between 45 and 54 years old.

At the same time, the population aged 14 to 24 years old dropped by 5.6 million, as the last of the Baby Boomers

reached aged 25. But in what has been termed the Baby Boom Echo, the number of children aged 5 to 13 began to grow in the latter part of the decade as many of the 'thirtysomething" generation began to have children.

Those aged 14 to 17 were in the most rapidly declining age group, with just 13,983,000 people falling into that group in 1988, compared with 16,142,000 in 1980.

Among other highlights of the

report: -The nation's black population, 12.3 percent of the total population, has surpassed 30 million people, hitting the 30.6 million mark on Jan. 1, 1989, a growth of 1.5 percent during the year and nearly double the white increase of 0.8 percent. The annual growth rate of blacks has been larger than that of whites since 1950.



It took them only six months to find my sister. She's living in Florida. They told her how to reach me, and she called me this morning. We both burst into





ciples power was not equal to the demand. On the other, Peter and John had just experienced a real surge of power and demand, but they knew they needed more for the demands ahead. In our spiritual walk, we cannot tolerate a power shortage, nor rolling blackouts. We need power for every demand.

The "connector" to power is prayer. Jesus said the distples were powerless because "this kind can only come out by prayer and John went to the prayer meeting.

Finding work that we are all equal to is not the answer. While we may have enough power to live for Christ in the daily, normal demands of life from a minimal prayer life. Where will we turn when life gets tough? God has a great work for us to do. Thousands of our neighbors do not know Jesus as Saviour. If we would have real power, we must learn to pray.

A new rite for black Catholics?

The dissent and then rapid move to self-excommunication of the Rev. George Stallings has raised for Catholics - both black and white - fundamental questions about the church in the United States.

While the specifics of the Stallings episode may fade - his autocratic statements on abortion, birth control, celtbacy and women's ordination resulted not only in his excommunication but also cost him many of his followers - the issue of how a

racial and cultural minority relates to a dominant white institution will not.

The reality is that a split exists in the American church just as it exists in American society, and its cause is racism." Stallings said at the first worship service of his breakaway Imani Temple.

Church leaders disagree with how to deal with the issue. One suggestion has been the

call for the creation of an autonomous "African-American Catholic Rite" that would develop its own worship patterns.






























Endometriosis can cause infertility

please discuss endometriosis and endometrial biopsy?

DEAR READER: The uterus is lined by tissue (endometrium), containing many blood vessels, that is influenced by the hormonal cycles in a woman's body. Ordinarily, menstruating women shed this inner lining each month.

Endometriceis, a common condition, is the presence of endometrial tissue in abnormal locations, outside the uterus. Nests of endometrium in the abdominal cavity, bowel, umbilicus, vagina, nose — even the lungs — will, along with the normal uterine endometrium. bleed each month. Thus, women with endometriosis will experi-ence cyclic, sometimes bizarre bleeding into the intestine or abdominal cavity - or, depending on the location of the endometriosis, from the nose or lungs.

Endometriosis frequently causes infertility because aberrant endometrium interferes with reproduction by blocking the Pallopian tubes. In many cases, experts do not understand how endometriosis disrupts reproductive ability.

Women with endometricels usually experience recurring abdominal pain and cramps, as the endometrial nests bleed but cannot drain.

Treatment consists of medicine to suppress menstruation: continuous use of birth control pills, danazol or progestin. Surgery to remove abnormal endometrial tissue may be neces-sary to reverse infertility.

The degree of success depends on the severity of the disorder: about 60 percent of women who are moderately affected can conceive after the operation, whereas only about 35 percent with severe disease will become pregnant.







Today's theme is "lost oppor-tunity." At trick one declarer was certain of his contract," but" he made a mistake. No matter -West did not do the right thing either. Declarer was home free, but he erred once more. So the defense accidentally emerged victorious. Declarer ducked the queen of spades lead in dummy. If West now shifted to a club, four hearts would easily be set, but West continued spades. Declarer ruffed the second spade, played two rounds of hearts and ruffed another spade. Now he played a club. When East won the club, he got off lead with the jack of diamonds. Declarer played the Q-K-A of diamonds.

East took two more club tricks to set the contract. Declarer had an easy play for the contract after West played a second spade. He should play as described before, ruffing dummy's tast spade, but then he should play out the diamonds. They don't split, but that doesn't matter. South can play the last diamond and discard a club from dummy. East wins the diamond and must lead away from the A-Q of clubs or give declarer a sluff and ruff by playing a spade. As to lost opportunity, declarer can always be assured of getting the endplay if he covers the opening lead with dummy's king. That way West will not be on lead to shift to a club. Recounting this deal but the last diamond was not a like watching the turnovers in a winner. So declarer had to play high school basketball game.




