County School Dropout Rate Shows Increase

More and more Seminole County high school students are opting to drop out and work as the recession deepens, a Florida Education Department survey shows.

The trend here is in opposition to statewide statistics which show fewer students dropping out of high school and increasing enrollments at community colleges and vocational schools.

"When employment opportunities are down, the high school student who might have dropped out and taken a job doesn't," Education Commissioner Ralph Turlington said.

"He stays in school, in some cases, because there's no place to go."

But the bleak job opportunities here due, in part, to the slowed-down construction industry, prompted a number of students to drop out and get a job to help out at home, according to School Supt. William

Layer.

"I think they're looking for short term answers," Layer said. "Of course when you're hungry — you've got to look at short term results rather than long term."

Layer said counselors are urging students to stay in school and ride it out "until the economy turns around."

Ivan Bowers, the school system's director of pupil personnel, agreed, in part, with Layer that the increasing number of dropouts was tied to

the economy, but Bowers also has additional theories.

Bowers said many high school students drop out of the county school system and enroll at Seminole Junior College, where students are able to get a high school diploma in less time.

The catch is, strictly academic subjects aren't taught at SJC. Also, Bowers said, a school board policy on expulsions may be responsible for Seminole County's showing.

Bowers said students after

the third suspension face automatic expulsion.

"Lots of kids just quit in place of facing expulsion," Bowers noted.

The recession has not affected all Florida schools the same, the survey found.

For example, in Duval, Brevard, Palm Beach and Okaloosa there has been no decline in dropouts. And in Alachua County, dropouts were down by 30 per cent.

Officials said 1,104 youngsters dropped out of

Hillsborough County school this year compared with 1,986 for a comparable period last year.

Two large Polk County high schools reported dropouts down to 158 from 213 during the first four months of the 1973-74 school year.

Turlington warned Gov. Reubin Askew at budget hearings last month that the recession which is squeezing the state treasury also will lead to greater demands on education.

"How to meet this problem —

to provide education opportunities for more people with fewer dollars — has educators over the state caught between the proverbial rock and a hard place," Turlington said.

Seminole County school officials are already preparing for the squeeze in case the state treasury is down again next year because of a decline in funds flowing into state coffers.

Asst. School Supt. Roger Harris has said funds here could be slashed as much as \$1.5 million next year.

If it happens, Harris says Layer will be forced to ask the school board for emergency measures — including even a possible cutback in salaries.

Although the state has used up its \$100 million surplus shoring-up this year's shortage in revenues, some officials predict the economy will spring back.

If so, perhaps those students in Seminole who dropped out to help out will get back in school and reverse what Layer sees as a "bad" trend.

Harvester Schedule Pondered

In an effort to trim the county's budget for the operation of the hyacinth harvester, Intergovernmental Coordinator Bob Ellis and Department of Natural Resources representative Jerry Perryman have been meeting to figure a projected "work schedule" for the machine.

Last week, the state extended their deadline for county certification of the \$60,000 budget so that the county could re-evaluate budget needs.

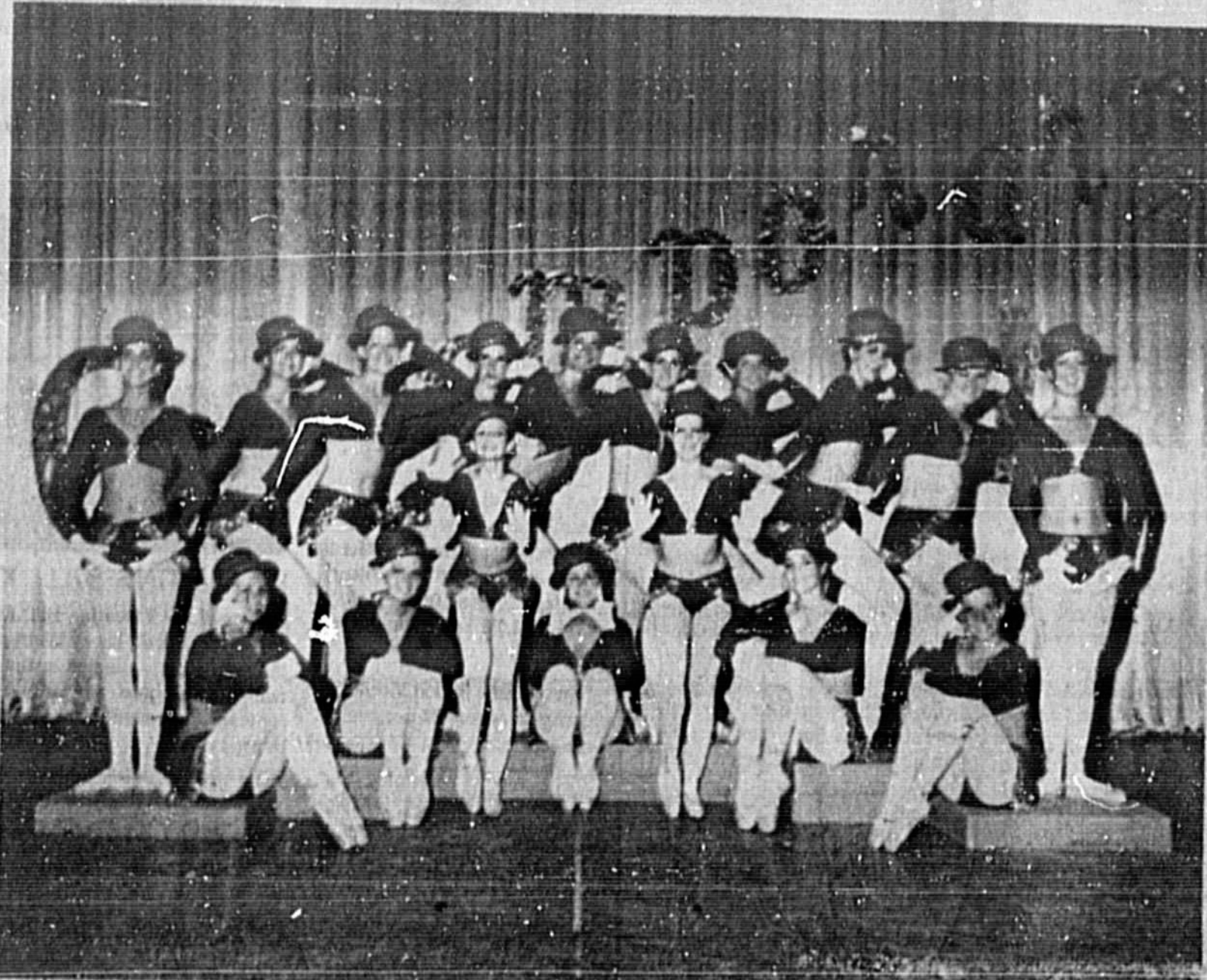
Over \$30,000 in state matching funds for harvester operation are being delayed until commissioners certify the budget — which they hope to do tomorrow.

Ellis said that meetings with Perryman, and with county engineer Bill Bush should result in a cost analysis that will give a more realistic estimate of how long the harvester will be in operation, the amount of weeds it will pull from waters, and the man hours necessary to maintain the machine.

Problems arose last week after commission Chairman Sid Vihlen Jr., said he was surprised that the harvester's output of hacked hyacinths would be so prolific. During a demonstration of the machine in the Lake Monroe harbor several weeks ago, the harvester had a much higher production level than the one budgeted truck and front end loader could handle.

Vihlen said that because of the air in the root systems (of the hyacinth plant) that most of the loads of hyacinths carried away in dump trucks were virtually weightless. Many trucks and drivers would be needed instead of the anticipated single vehicle, he said.

But Ellis said that he had since learned that "if the (harvested) plants can be stored five or six days, they lose 90 per cent of their volume — which is mostly water," Ellis

Firemen To Fight City Plan Cutting Personnel, Budget

CASSELBERRY — Firemen will be showing up at city hall here tonight, not to douse a fire, but to fight city officials who have chopped their budget.

"I'm going to ask for a complete reconsideration of my budget," Fire Chief Roger Rasooli said today.

What Rasooli and other firemen are miffed over is a proposal to cut three paid firemen and a fire inspector and slash the firefighters' budget by \$5,000.

City officials proposed cutting the paid positions of a fulltime paid fire chief could be hired. The cuts took place at a work session that Rasooli wasn't invited to attend.

Rasooli time and time again has accused Mayor Bill Grier of

seeking to remove him from the chief's position. Thus, Rasooli viewed the reduction in force and budget cuts as a move toward getting rid of him.

A still as yet unexplained letter was mailed from City Manager Harry Hug's office, advising firemen the Civil Service Examinations for the firefighters' positions had been cancelled.

The letter was mailed even though the decision to cut the firefighters from this year's budget was unofficial because it was made during a work session.

Grier denied any knowledge of the letter, and Hug said he hadn't realized it had been mailed. But, it was signed by the city manager.

Rasooli theorized that by May or June, city officials will be prepared to make the big step and hire a fulltime chief.

The feud between Grier and Rasooli has simmered and often bursts into the open. Rasooli says the mayor's motive for removing him is "political," while the mayor says he just wants a fulltime chief.

At the 7:30 p.m. meeting, officials also are scheduled to set the date for the Oakwood Drive public hearing.

Also, a financial report for December will be discussed, mayor's reports will be heard, and an ordinance designating the city planning department as the land planning agency will come up for second reading.

Southern Bell Split Gets 'Busy Signal'

Public Service Commissioner (PSC) Paula Hawkins called today for splitting Southern Bell Telephone and Telegraph Co's Florida operation from the rest of the southeast.

"I feel it is incumbent upon this commission to insure Floridians that they are not subsidizing the Bell system operations of any other state," Mrs. Hawkins said in a statement.

Seminole County Southern Bell officials issued a brief statement in reply to Mrs. Hawkins' proposal.

"We have not had an opportunity to evaluate the full impact of such a measure. At this time it's impossible to comment further until we could make a full assessment of what this would do to our company and to our subscribers," Southern Bell Commercial Manager Tom Hunt said.

However, Hunt did promise additional in-

formation once the phone utility has had an opportunity to study the proposal.

"Following an assessment we would be willing to make a more comprehensive statement," Hunt noted.

It's no secret that such a proposal has been discussed in the past by PSC members.

Also, company officials have privately discussed the possibility of turning the Florida operation into a separate company.

Due to Florida's high rate of growth, speculation is that a "Florida Bell" would be a highly lucrative firm and a leader in the Bell system.

However, company officials are reluctant to put their ideas on record, especially in answer to a commissioner who sits on the decision-making board which sets rates for Florida's utilities.

The most recent decision by the PSC to grant an interim rate hike will cost consumers \$2.85 a month because of an increase in one-party residential customers from \$7.65 to \$9.40 a month.

The request was granted Southern Bell last Monday. The firm is the largest Telephone utility in the state.

Mrs. Hawkins asked to file a separate explanation today of her affirmative vote in the PSC order granting Southern Bell a \$85.9 million interim rate increase to bring its profits back to a level previously approved by the P.S.C.

Mrs. Hawkins said Southern Bell's Florida operation is big enough to be an independent corporate entity. It makes up 40 per cent of the Atlanta-based operation which includes Georgia, North Carolina and South Carolina, she said.

Mrs. Hawkins said that she voted for the interim rate hike because of a previous Supreme Court ruling. But she objected to the increase which, was granted under bond for possible refund as the first step in a requested \$216.5 million increase.

"It is my feeling that as a result of the Supreme Court's ruling in 1973, this \$85.9 million interim increase, which is the largest telephone increase in Florida's history, was granted without sufficient staff examination," Mrs. Hawkins said.

The Supreme Court opinion in another Southern Bell case said that an interim increase must be granted if no one disputes a company's claim that its profits have fallen below the approved level.

PSC lawyers advised the commission last week that Southern Bell's claim was supported in hearings.

Condemnation, Annexation Hearing Pace City Agenda

Public hearings to consider the city's condemnation of 10 buildings and to consider the second readings and adoption of five rezoning ordinances head the agenda at tonight's 7 o'clock

meeting of the Sanford City Commission.

The buildings which the city are seeking to condemn are labeled "Group 32."

During the second public

hearing, Commissioners will consider the annexation to the city of property between Pear Avenue and Peach Avenue and between 18th Street and 19th Street.

Commissioners also will consider an ordinance restricting the height of construction in the approach pattern to the Sanford Municipal Airport.

Commissioners will consider a replacement for David Berrien who has resigned from the Planning and Zoning Commission.

Berrien announced his resignation last week in a letter to P-Z chairman Arthur Harris. Berrien said the reason for his resignation was because of "the pressure of business and other community commitments which must take priority."

Berrien had served on the P-Z Commission for four years.

NATION IN BRIEF

Congress Energy Plan Endangers Ford Program

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congress is moving on a course that would result in junking President Ford's energy program within the next two weeks.

Democratic leaders say they are developing an alternative to the Ford program, which is based on conserving energy by making it more costly.

At least two dozen Democratic members of both houses have offered their own substitutes for the Ford plan, but it's unclear whether they will reach agreement on an alternative.

The House, which now is in the middle of a 10-day recess, already has passed by a wide margin a bill blocking for 90 days Ford's \$2-billion special tax on imports.

The Senate Finance Committee, which is continuing hearings on the measure today, aims to approve the bill this week and send it to the full Senate for final action next week.

Ford On New Tour

WASHINGTON (AP) — After witnessing the installation of his second cabinet-level appointee, President Ford is embarking on another stump tour for his economic-energy program.

James T. Lynn, former secretary of Housing and Urban Development, was to be sworn in today at a Cabinet Room ceremony as Ford's director of the Office of Management and Budget.

Lynn succeeds Roy Ash, who is retiring from the Cabinet-level post. Edward H. Levi was sworn in as attorney general last week and thus became the first Ford appointee to the Cabinet.

Nixon 'Tormented' Man

SAN CLEMENTE, Calif. (AP) — Former President Richard M. Nixon, his transition to private citizen now officially completed, is a lonely man tormented by the scandal that led him to resign, a friend says.

"This man is as drained, so emasculated that I dare say it will not be months, it will be years, if indeed he recovers," Rabbi Baruch Korff told reporters here Sunday.

Sunday marked six months since Nixon stepped down because of the Watergate scandal, and with it came the loss of most of his staff, his fleet of 11 cars and his office complex.

Jackson, Humphrey Demand Action Arabian Troop Probe Being Urged

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sens. Henry M. Jackson and Hubert H. Humphrey have called for a congressional investigation of the Defense Department's contract with a private corporation to train Saudi Arabian troops to protect oil wells in the Persian Gulf.

Jackson, D-Wash., said he would ask Sen. John C. Stennis, D-Miss., chairman of the Senate Armed Services Committee, to conduct hearings.

Humphrey, D-Minn., in calling for an investigation of the contract, said, "The possibility of having American forces training another country's troops in the Middle East is fraught with danger."

"I think the armed services committees of the House and Senate should promptly look into it and see what it involves," Humphrey said in a telephone interview Sunday.

The president of Vinnell Corp. of Los Angeles was disclosed Sunday by The Associated Press.

Vinnell is hiring former U.S. special forces soldiers and other war veterans to send to Saudi Arabia on a job usually handled by the U.S. government — training a foreign army to fire its weapons and fight wars.

There apparently is no shortage of experienced recruits for the 1,000-man force Vinnell is assembling to train Saudi Arabia's 26,000-man internal security force, which is responsible for protecting the rich Saudi oil fields and providing body guards for the Saudi Arabian royal family.

The contract was awarded last month. The Vinnell force is to assemble in Saudi Arabia in July to start the training session.

The Vinnell mission is to train three newly mechanized infantry battalions of 1,000 men each and a 105-mm howitzer artillery battalion of similar size.

Meany Warns Nation Enters Economic Depression Fight

WASHINGTON (AP) — With the latest unemployment figure standing at 8.2 per cent, AFL-CIO President George Meany says the rate could climb to 10 per cent by July.

"We're past a recession. We're going into a depression," he said Sunday on CBS. "Face the Nation."

To cope with the surge in joblessness, Meany said there should be more public service jobs, public works grants and prompt congressional action on tax relief.

"We're now fighting a war to preserve our way of life... and we have people in Congress and the White House who seem insensitive to the problems of the American people," Meany said.

The government reported last week that unemployment in the United States climbed to 8.2 per cent of the work force, the highest since the end of the Depression in 1941 when it averaged 8.8 per cent for the full year.

There were 58 million persons in the work force that year. Today the work force totals about 91 million.

The Ford administration's most recent forecast is for an 8.2 jobs rate later this year.

Meany also called for 6 per cent mortgages to help revive the housing industry. He said 8 per cent loans are made in the Soviet Union and should be available to Americans.

Rep. Henry S. Reuss, D-Wis., chairman of the House Banking Committee, said he felt Meany's call for 6 per cent credit might be asking too much.

Odhams Agrees With Meany

"The economic weapons the nation has to fight the war of unemployment are in the hands of a man who is opposed to using them and if this continues we are going to have the depression George Meany is speaking of," said Braley Odham, Central Florida land developer today.

Odhams, who recently announced plans to build a large scale housing development in Sanford, said he did not announce it because he thought the economy was going to be as strong as it was. My feeling is there is some market and at the present time in the Sanford area, no builder is fulfilling that market need."

"I don't think all the markets have dried up," he said, adding "some could be re-established fairly easily," by the national leadership, meaning the president, were really anybody but Gerald Ford."

"Ford is a nice person and an honest fellow, but he is just a rock rib conservative, who does not believe in the use of governmental agencies and funds to stimulate the economy and serve the people," Odham said.

"Certainly for some people now is a depression. It has been a depression for the housing industry — one need only to look at how many foreclosures of apartments and construction have taken place all over the area."

"People need jobs and to create jobs there has to be money available at reasonable rates," Odham said.

Approximately 50 persons attended the breakfast which officially opened the four-day drive, which chamber officers hope will increase the chamber's membership to over 600.

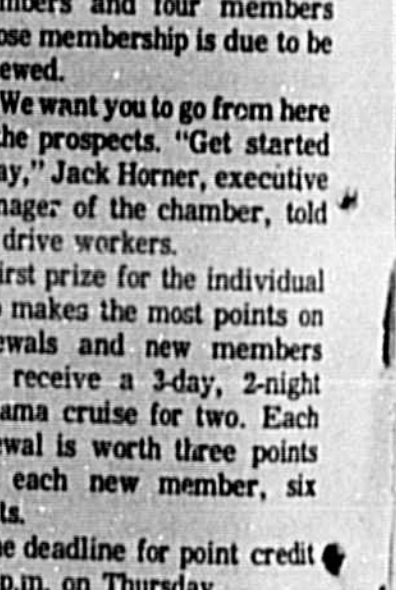

Subdivision Ordinance Tops Lake Mary Agenda

— Consider entering into an Annual Control agreement with Seminole County.

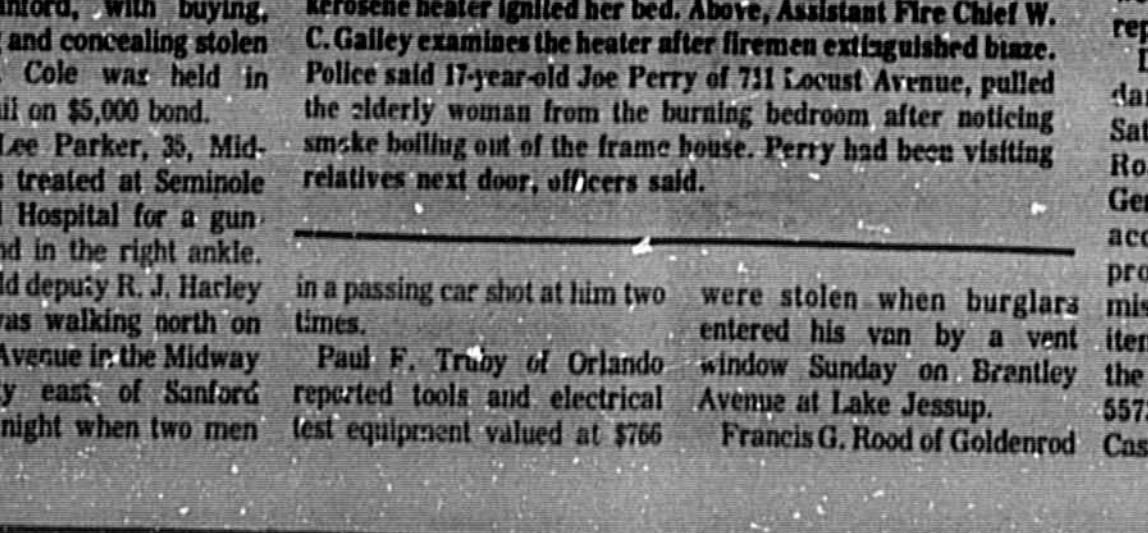
— Consider acquiring more space for city hall.

FLORIDA IN BRIEF

Adkins Denies Askew Asked Him To Retire

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Supreme Court Justice James Adkins today denied a report that Gov. Reubin Askew had asked him to step aside as chief justice a year ago.

"It's not true, it's a silly piece of reporting," Adkins said in the story by the Palm Beach Post.

"They're just trying to create a rift between me and the governor, which is not going to happen," Adkins added.

Askew has refused to comment, and Adkins earlier refused to confirm or deny the report when asked by a Post newsmen.

Appointment Check Eyed

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Senate President Dempsey Barron says the legislature will look more closely than usual at all appointments by Gov. Reubin Askew.

"I'm not too pleased with the way we've been confirming everybody the governor appoints," Barron said.

"I think we should take that responsibility a little more carefully and look at these gubernatorial appointments." Among those who must be confirmed by the Senate is A. J. Keller, secretary of Health and Rehabilitation Services, who has been in trouble with Barron, D-Panama City.

Keys Control Plan Seen

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Secretary of State Bruce Smathers urged the Cabinet today to hold a meeting in the Florida Keys before deciding whether to put state development controls on the island chain.

"If open government is to be responsive, we must not only hold public hearings, but hold the hearing where the public is," Smathers said in a letter to Gov. Reubin Askew and other Cabinet members.

The state Planning Division is considering a recommendation for the Cabinet to declare the Keys an area of critical state concern, as it has done for the Big Cypress and Green swamps.

Such a declaration would establish Cabinet supervision over development regulations.

Sewer Plant Report Tops Longwood Meet

LONGWOOD — A brief agenda is scheduled for tonight's 7:30 p.m. meeting of the city council.

In addition to mayor's and city council reports, George Nader, a principal of Longwood Utilities Inc., owners and operators of the sewer package plant which serves most of the developments in the E. E. Williamson Road area, will appear to discuss the sewer plant.

City Atty. Ned Julian Jr. reported to council several weeks ago that owners of the package plant are willing to sell the facility to the city for \$75,000.

Cam Corp., developers of Skylark subdivision, will discuss water tapping fees.

Water, Sewer Fees Slated For Altamonte Springs Okay

Altamonte Springs — Ordinance setting new water, sewer and drainage connection fees and levying a \$2.50 monthly charge on homeowners for city garbage and trash collection are expected to pass first reading at the 6:30 p.m. city commission meeting Tuesday.

The new utility connection fee will total \$700 and including \$200 each for water and drainage and \$300 for sewer. Currently, charges are \$150 each for sewer and water and nothing for drainage.

The city some months ago, however, received a report from consulting engineer Bill Palm estimating the cost of installing city-wide drainage at nearly \$4 million.

The resulting revenues are to be placed in a utility trust fund with the money used only for extensions and improvements in the utility systems.

City Auditor Charles Lansing told commissioners Friday afternoon that the city over the past three years collected approximately \$600,000 in sewer connection fees or deposits on sewer connection fees which were included in revenues (and spent) while the property owners as of the date of the audit (Dec. 27, 1974) are not connected to the sewer system.

Lansing, in the audit report, added it has not been determined the amount, if any, of this money that is refundable and therefore it is impossible to determine the extent of the city's liability, if any, at this time. He said no provision has been made for this contingency liability.

County Studies Legal Aid Fee

County commissioners tomorrow night will consider an ordinance that would lack a nominal surcharge on the filing of legal documents in order to support a legal aid program for indigents in the county.

County Attorney Tom Freeman said that he expects a surcharge to generate about \$2,000 annually for the program. With a \$8,000 grant, and an additional \$4,000 in donated services from the Seminole County Bar Association, the legal aid program could be funded, he said.

If the Board approves the ordinance, it would become effective once it is filed in the Secretary of State's office in Tallahassee.

The local Bar Association, which will administer the project, Freeman said.

In other business Tuesday night, the Board has scheduled a review of two ordinances that will, if approved — by a significant step towards a county-owned, regional utilities system.

The ordinances provide for the donation of new water and sewer systems to the county by builders who develop outside of an existing "certified" utility area. The county would then maintain the utility lines, and would tie into a nearby utility plant via a "master meter" in order to regulate cost and service. According to county Utility Director Bill Dale, the program could be funded, he said.

The unification of the many independent private systems in the county would facilitate service, and eventually result in lower rates to customers than private operations would, Dale said.

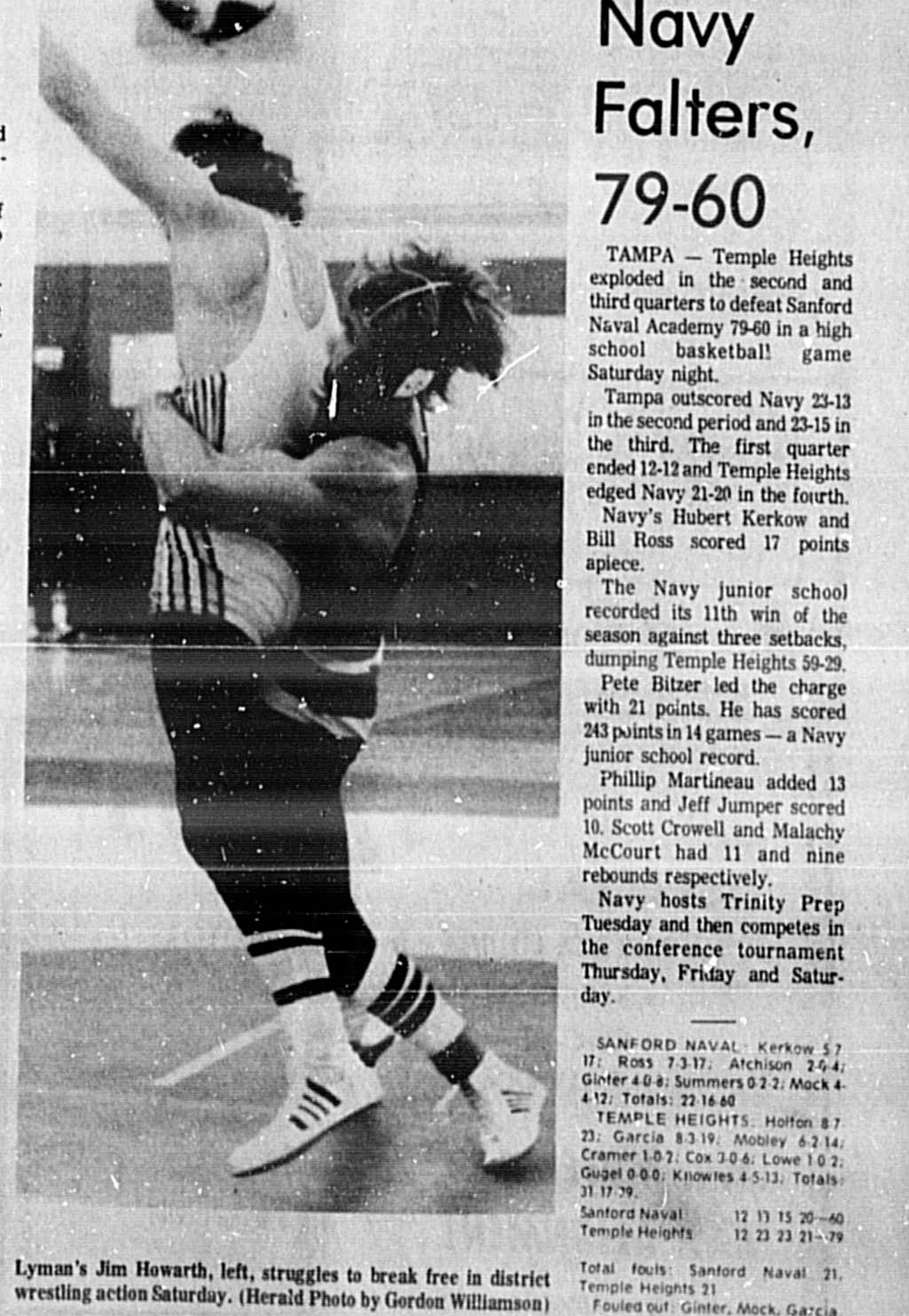

DEAR DR. LAMB — I'm one of the 50 per cent of Americans who are overweight. I've been battling overweight for 10 years, ever since my hysteresomy. I'm 62 now, 5-foot-6 and weighed around 125 to 130 pounds until 10 years ago. That's when I had surgery and the trouble began.
I've been on the Weight Watchers plan but gained on their allotment of 1400 calories a day. Only by cutting the diet in half to 700 calories a day could I lose weight. At this level it took me 16 weeks to lose 6 pounds.
I've kept records of everything I eat for months and calculated it all on postage scales to calculate my calories. Doctors just brush aside my data and give me diet lists that cause me to gain weight, not lose it. Dieticians are just as bad. When I get a 1200 calorie diet with 80 grams of protein, I start gaining weight.
