FIGHT TO PASS FENN BILL HAS BEEN STARTED

Plan Desiring Reapportionment For House On New Census Holds Interest

Show-down Upon Bill Is Expected

28 States Will Either Win Or Lose On Basis Of New Allotment

WASHINGTON, Dec. 6.—(INS)—The congressional battle for reapportionment legislation in the House on the basis of the 1930 census got under way today when Rep. Fenn (R) of Connecticut requested the committee on which he is chairman to report the bill for passage.

It is expected that the bill will pass in the House by a vote of 215 to 185.

The bill, which was passed by the House on July 1, 1928, would increase the number of Representatives from 435 to 480.

States which probably would gain representation in the House under the Fenn bill are: Arizona, California, Connecticut, Florida, Michigan, New Jersey, North Carolina, Ohio, Oklahoma, Texas, Washington.

Unwanted Guest Is Still Resisting All Ejection Efforts

HAVANA, Dec. 6.—(INS)—This was the fifth day that Miss Frances Porter Dromer, former American show girl and Atlanta newspaper writer, flew the "Red" flag above her "border" private yacht, the Malvern, off the coast of Havana.

C. T. Whitehead, an Atlanta newspaper editor and owner of the yacht, which brought Miss Porter from Florida as his guest, was unable to exhibit that hospitality to her because of the southern states, for he would go on board.

Four Are Missing After Boat Sinks

BOPEL (AN OVERSEA) The four missing persons were accounted for early this morning following the sinking of the yacht Avon four miles off Melbourne beach during the night. The only known survivor of the disaster was George Burgess of Jacksonville. Hope for the safety of the other four members of the crew was maintained as the search was pushed up by a small launch belonging to the U. S. Johnson and Sons Company, which put out from Port Canaveral to search for any surviving members of the crew. The explosion and fire aboard the yacht was seen from here. An all night search was made for the other members of the crew. The yacht, owned by Melbourne, Fla., was carrying four persons and a dog. The yacht was carrying a 1000 gallon gas tank which exploded.

ARMY ENGINEERS VETO PROPOSED CANAL PROJECT

River Traffic Does Not Warrant Waterway, Avers Jadwin

The federal government yesterday has turned a flat no to the proposed waterway project linking the St. Johns River with the Indian River. This information was obtained in a message received today from Major General Ed. Jadwin, chief of the army engineers, who has placed his formal disapproval on the canal.

In his report to congress, Gen. Jadwin said that the construction of a canal between Sanford and Titusville, and a channel from Salt Run to Lake Pointe, other river and harbor projects in Florida, which Jadwin turned thumbs down were the following:

Sarasota Inlet, Florida, maintenance of privately dredged canal, work held expensive and unjustified in view of no large amount of commerce in prospect.

Kissimmee River, Florida, to maintain water at constant level and strengthen channel, no important development held in prospect.

NEW MACHINE WILL SET TYPE BY TELEGRAPH

Teletypewriter Will Be Operated From Central Point Over Special News Wire

Printing Industry Greatly Affected

Device Is Slated To Be Placed On Market In Six Months

ROCHESTER, N. Y., Dec. 6.—A teletypewriter, a new invention which sets type by telegraph, was publicly demonstrated here today for the first time.

A machine similar to a typewriter, operated by a rapid type, pictures the operator sitting in New York, for example, a message to be sent to a printer in Rochester. He starts "pushing" type. Pressed at once simultaneously the printer's story comes out in type in complete rooms miles away.

Coolidge To Block Senatorial Battle Against Appointee

WASHINGTON, Dec. 6.—(INS)—President Coolidge plans to block a threatened senatorial battle against the confirmation of Roy O. West of Illinois as secretary of the interior, by simply keeping him in the cabinet under his recent appointment. It was rumored today in Capitol Hill.

A group of Western insurgents, it was said, will join with a militant group of Democrats in fighting West's confirmation on account of his long connection with the public utility and power interests of Illinois. Knowledge of this pending fight, the President was said to feel it could be avoided by retaining West under his present appointment. This would enable West to serve until Mar. 4 without confirmation by the Senate.

NORTHCOTT, SICK SLEUTHS FOLLOW WITH INFLUENZA, GANGLAND TRAIL FACES CHARGES ROTHSTEIN LEFT

Has Unique Position Of Being Confronted By 2 Trials For 1 Crime

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Dec. 6.—(INS)—Ill with influenza, Grand on Stuart Northcott, whose false confessions of murder and his equally false repudiations of the confessions has marked him as one of the strangest prisoners ever in custody here, today found himself confronted with a unique situation.

He is charged with the same murder in two counties and in each county on a separate day. After being brought to Riverside, Cal., from a search of the Meade Desert for the graves of his asserted victims, a quest which was fruitless, he pleaded not guilty to the murder of Alvin Gothen, whose headless body was found near Puente, Cal.

Following his plea he was returned here and made a similar plea. Date of his trial at Riverside was set for Jan. 2. The court set Jan. 3 for the date of his trial. The court stipulated, however, that the Los Angeles date would be changed in the event that Northcott was brought to trial at Riverside on the designated date.

NEW YORK, Dec. 6.—(INS)—Peter Kudzinowski, a 30-year-old Polish immigrant, today boasted of murdering two small boys in Jersey.

He confessed to the slaying of two boys, aged 10 and 12, in a park in Jersey City, N. J., in 1927. He said he had killed them with a knife.

Detectives Search For New Evidence In Atlanta Murder

ATLANTA, Ga., Dec. 6.—(INS)—Police were off on another track for the murderer of Robert M. Brandon, prominent Atlanta business man, today following the explosion of their theory which linked the husband of a "beautiful blonde" with the killing.

J. D. Parramore, 49, salesman and husband of the blonde who had been sought, surrendered last night, proved an alibi and was released. He asserted that he had been out of the city since a short time before the killing.

Brandon was shot to death by his automobile on a main thoroughfare here, three nights ago. Police have sought a "man in grey," who was seen to jump from the Brandon automobile following two revolver shots, and flee into the darkness.

TAMMANY HIDES ROTHSTEIN FACTS THOMAS INSISTS

Underworld And Cops Linked By Slaying, Says Socialist Head

NEW YORK, Dec. 6.—Charges that the Walker administration is "sparring for time to find a scapegoat and mix the whitewash" in the Rothstein murder case in order to suppress "uncomfortable revelations concerning the relations between the leading of the underworld, the Police Department and high-placed Tammany leaders," were made yesterday by Norman Thomas, President of the Socialist Party, speaking at the Rand School of Social Science.

Mr. Thomas asserted that the Rothstein case threatened the Tammany movement with a collapse that at any time since the Yan Wyck administration. He assailed former Mayor Hylan, saying that the Queens sewer and Health Department scandals had their inception under his administration. Mr. Hylan's announced candidacy for Mayor would do no "positive good," Mr. Thomas said, but would do some negative good by dividing "the opposition to a constructive movement."

Favors Fusion Movement
The Socialist leader attacked the Walker administration on the score of corruption, housing, transit and the Police Department. He indicated that conditions would afford a good opportunity next year for a fusion movement to dispose of Tammany rule in the city. He suggested Morris Hillquit as a Socialist majority candidate, but declared that his party would not "reject alliances of the proper sort."

"In 1929," said Mr. Thomas, Tammany will have a fight all over the city. No Mayor in recent years has a worse record on the fulfillment of promises which he carelessly threw about in 1925 than our Prince of Wisecrackers. No administration in recent years has been involved in so many scandals which, on the most favorable showing, it failed to prevent or adequately to punish. On such burning issues as housing and transit the administration's record is a bad joke.

"In the field of housing it has done nothing worth while. The new dwelling house law on which Republicans and Democratic politicians and real estate speculators seem to be agreeing, gives legal whitewash to the continuance of our disgraceful old law tenements and tenements, the reduction of New York to a city of barracks."

Speaks Tammany Threatened
The speaker insisted that even if the Supreme Court should reverse the lower courts in the severest case the city administration still would have a record of "doing not one constructive thing to make possible a unified operation at a five-cent fare."

"Meanwhile the Rothstein case threatens the new Tammany," continued Mr. Thomas. "It is possible that Tammany, with its notorious control over the police and over most of our judicial system in New York County, can manage to find a scapegoat and suppress uncomfortable revelations. One can only explain Mayor Walker's ultimatum and withdrawals of them, the curious actions of the Police Department, with their strange mixture of sowed knowledge and professed ignorance, and District Attorney Barker's refusal to drop the indictment of Rothstein's file on the theory that Tammany was sparring for time to find a scapegoat and to mix the whitewash."

Bilbo Sends Guards Upon Secret Mission

JACKSON, Miss., Dec. 6.—(INS)—Thirty members of the Mississippi National Guard, armed with machine guns and tear gas bombs, were dispatched on a secret mission by Governor Bilbo today after the chief executive had received a threat upon his life. The Governor was threatened because he stayed the execution last week of Robert Perry Lofton convicted slayer of Police Chief E. B. Westbrook, of McComb, Miss. It was believed that the troops were sent on the trail of an assassin who made the threat.

MOTHER OF CZAR DENIES CLAIM OF BOGUS DAUGHTER

Madame Tschakowski Reputed By The Last Of Romanoffs

BERLIN, Dec. 6.—(INS)—The claims of Madame Anastasia von Tschakowski, that she is the Grand Duchess Anastasia Nikolaevna, the only surviving child of Nicholas II, the last of the Romanoffs, has been repudiated in a formal statement issued by the surviving members of the Romanoff family.

The statement has been approved by the late Emperor's Maria Feodorovna, the mother of the Czar, and Grandmother of the Grand Duchess Anastasia.

The statement as published in the German papers reads: "The press has frequently reported about a woman who calls herself Madame von Tschakowski and asserts to be the Grand Duchess Anastasia Nikolaevna, daughter of Czar Nicholas II. She claims to have escaped death in a mine, which was according to newspaper reports several persons are supposed to have recognized her as the Grand Duchess."

Study identifications. We are hereby asked as to whether these identifications are true. Inasmuch as our silence may be interpreted as confirmation of these reports we consider it our duty to make an end to all rumors and false assumptions by making the following declaration: "The Grand Duchess Olga Alexandrovna who was intimate with the children of the Czar, her brother, has seen and talked with the woman who calls herself Madame von Tschakowski. The Grand Duchess now declares positively that this woman has nothing in common with the Grand Duchess Anastasia Nikolaevna."

The Lady-in-waiting of Her Majesty, Baroness Buxhoeveden, Mr. Gillard, the principal teacher of the Czarovich and at the same time the French language teacher of the daughters of the Czar, and Mrs. Gillard who guarded the latter all these personalities who were together with the family of the Czar up to their confinement in Jekaterinburg in May 1918 have also seen Mme. von Tschakowski and conversed with her and they have declared emphatically that by no means could they recognize in this woman the Grand Duchess Anastasia Nikolaevna.

Mr. S. Kistritsky, the dentist of the Imperial family who treated the teeth of all the children of the Czar and saw them last at Tobolsk in 1918, has examined reproductions of the teeth of Mme. von Tschakowski. He could only affirm that these reproductions do not correspond with the jaw formations and the teeth of Grand Duchess Anastasia Nikolaevna.

Professor Bischof, director of the institute for police science at the University of Lausanne, has likewise made a close scrutiny and comparison of the photograph of the Grand Duchess Anastasia Nikolaevna and those of Mme. Tschakowski, two declares:

Called impostor. "It is impossible that Mme. von Tschakowski could be identical with the Grand Duchess Anastasia Nikolaevna."

"Supported by all this testimony we herewith declare our firm conviction that the woman who calls herself Mme. von Tschakowski and who at the moment is in the United States of North America is not the Grand Duchess Anastasia Nikolaevna."

The declaration is signed by Grand Duchess Xenia Alexandrovna (sister of the Czar), Grand Duchess Olga Alexandrovna (sister of the Czar), Grand Duke Dimitri Pavlovitch, Grand Duchess Maria Pavlovna, Victoria Marchioness of Milford Haven, Princess of Hess (sister of Czarina) Irene Princess Henry of Prussia, now Princess of Hess (sister of the Czarina), Ernst Ludwig Grand Duke of Hess (brother of the Czarina).

Experts Give Some Hints For Chrysler Keep In Winter

DETROIT, Mich., Dec. 6.—To assure Chrysler owners of maximum automobile comfort and efficiency during the coming cold months, Chrysler service experts have prepared a list of suggestions which cover the essential points of pre-winter car preparation.

Where a motor car is not to be used during the winter, the experts advise storing it in a dry, evenly heated and not too light place. The car should be washed and dried all over, water drained off, wheels jack-tires partly deflated, and unneeded metal parts coated with heavy oil or vasoline to prevent rust or corrosion.

To prevent freezing of rings the cylinder with the spark plugs should be removed and one gallon of oil poured onto each cylinder. Then distribute the oil by turning the engine over a number of times and replace the plugs.

Where it is intended to keep the car in commission, changes in operating conditions call for attention to certain important details. It is important the car be in good operating condition to overcome the rigors imposed by cold weather. Whenever possible, owners are urged to use the facilities of Chrysler service stations. For those who prefer to condition their own cars, these suggestions should be followed:

Remove all accumulated sludge from the oil path and refill with oil of good quality. Frequent oil changes during the winter, with proper adjustment of the crankcase ventilator, will safeguard oil circulation. Lubricate the chassis completely. Change oil in the transmission and differential. Inspect and clean the generator and replace any worn parts. Check the battery and recharge the electrical system, if necessary.
