Sheriff's office investigating East Altamonte death

A victim of an early Tuesday morning shooting has died overnight at Orlando Regional Medical Center. The death was reported by the hospital to the Sheriff's Office at around midnight. The Seminole County Sheriff's Office is now investigating the case as a homicide.

The shooting was reported at about 5:15 a.m. at Jackson and Oak streets near Altamonte Springs. When Seminole County Sheriff's Office deputies arrived, a male was found lying at the intersection. He appeared to have suffered a gunshot wound to the head. He was taken to Orlando Regional Medical Center for treatment. He was identified as 36-year old Troy Bouey, a resident of the East Altamonte area.

Later Tuesday morning, investigators got a tip that an individual, by the name of Russell Richardson, 21, might have some information about what happened. Authorities already had warrants for his arrest on other matters, including aggravated assault on a law enforcement officer.

When plain-clothes deputies stopped by Richardson's girlfriend's house at 501 Wayman St. in Longwood, Richardson took off running before investigators left their car. He ran through yards and hid in the garage attic of a home located at the corner of Orange Avenue and Lakeview Drive. A neighbor pointed out his whereabouts to deputies, who placed him under arrest.

Richardson is being held on the unrelated charges. He is a person of interest in the iting case, but is not being

Meals on Wheels breaks ground for new facility By Christopher Patton Managing Editor From Oviedo to Lake

Mary, government officials and dignitaries converged Thursday in unincorporated Seminole County to celebrate the ground breaking of a new facility for Meals on Wheels, Etc.

With its kitchen tem-porarily located at Heritage Woods of Lake Mary and its offices at Florida Hospital in Altamonte Springs, finding a new home for Meals on Wheels was paramount. The service distributes 700 meals a day to area senior citizens and recently had to scramble to find temporary facilities when their Lake Mary building they were leasing sold to another

Its future facility was made possible by a host of private and public partner-ships and is located off Ronald Regan Boulevard near U.S. Highway 17-92. The facility is due to open in April 2004.

'We've been looking for a permanent home for a long time," said Sherry Fincher, Meals on Wheels executive

The Altamonte Springs Police Department is the first municipal law enforcement agency in Seminole County to form an economic/computer crime division. investigators Seminole County — with the two others working for the sheriff's office.

Gibb, who has worked the past dozen years as an economic crime investigator, says Chief Robert Merchant is to be rewarded for his foresight to start the division.

A GLANCE AROUND OUR COUNTY

There's grumbling downtown over the appointment of two new members to the Sanford Downtown Community

Redevelopment Agency (CRA).

The city appointed Charles Rowe to fill the spot of Chairman Larry Strickler, whose term expires in December. Tom Ball, a county appointee, also will see his term expire in December. Seminole County commissioners appointed Jeff

Triplett to fill Ball's position.
Rowe served as Sanford's community development director for more than a decade before taking a job in the private sector. He still works with several community organizations in Sanford. Triplett, a vice president of Community United Bank, was a president of the Sanford Chamber of Commerce executive board and served on the Sanford Airport

Authority. He resigned from that board when he moved to Volusia County but recently became a resident of the Celery City by purchasing a

home in Mayfair. While both Rowe and Triplett are qualified to sit on the CRA, the downtown crowd is steamed that one of their own wasn't selected to sit on the

board. Theo Hollerbach, owner of the Willow Tree Cafe, and Bart Peterson, owner of St. Johns Realty, were among those who applied for the position. The argument is that while both Rowe and Triplett should do a good job, neither lives or has an investment downtown. That's true, sort of.

Except for Barbara Ferrell (who has done a marvelous job renovating the old fire station into a New York-style loft) and the occasional homeless guy who sleeps in Magnolia Square, no one lives downtown. As for investments, Triplett's bank is on First Street, just five blocks from Magnolia Square.

Furthermore, folks downtown sometimes forget that the CRA is much larger than a few downtown blocks. It extends out to Seminole Towne Center Mail and includes Central Florida Regional Hospital, the Preserve at Lake Monroe and, for that matter, The Seminole Herald. The point is downtown doesn't exist in a vacuum. The CRA needs to focus on redeveloping the core downtown, and that's where all the money will be spent in the coming years. However, success or failure of that mission depends on the city as a whole developing. In fact, the CRA's bank account has swelled solely because of development out west State Road 46. Until the new Eckerd drug store at First and French opens in a few weeks, the core downtown will have added little in the way of incre property values during the CRA's eight years of existence.

My read on Rowe's appointment is city commissioners are tired of the infighting downtown. I think Hollerbach or Peterson could be an asset to the CRA, but commissioners selected a known entity in Rowe rather than picking a member of the downtown community that could ignite more bickering among the cliques. Is that the right thing to do? Probably not, but until a bona fide leader emerges from that group, city commissioners will be wary of selecting one of them to serve in an official capacity.

What do I mean by a leader? Someone who can build consensus downtown, and someone who isn't looking for a free handout of city money for his or her pet organization. This person doesn't have to walk in lock-step with the city commission, but he or she must have a working relationship that produces tangible results because that's what will move downtown forward.

It's not too late for someone to step up to the plate. Word Around The Clock is Linda Johnson may not finish her term, which expires December 2005. Johnson was appointed by the county when the CRA was first created in 1995. She's busy running a successful business (William Howard Jewelers) and may look to resign sometime in 2004. Downtown needs direct representation on the CRA, but it's not going to happen until someone proves they have leadership.

Before you shop:

· Avoid carrying a purse, use a fanny pack or deep pockets in clothing to carry what you need.

 Avoid carrying large amounts of cash. Pay for purchases with a check or credit card whenever possible.

 Carry your keys, cash and credit cards separate from each other and be aware of your surroundings at all

 If you're not sure a shopping bag will be available to you, take one of your own to the mail. Consolidate as many packages as possible. While shopping:

 Stay alert to your surroundings and the people around you. If you see people "hanging around" parking garages, parking lots, or the outside of stores, avoid the area. Notify the police or store security department.

· Shop before dark if possible. Coordinate shopping trips with a friend if you plan to be out late. Never park your car in an unlit

area, no matter how convenient it is. Know exactly where you park your car. Make a mental note or write where to go when you leave the

. Lock your car doors and windows even if you are only gone for a lew minutes.

. Teach your children to go to a store clerk or security guard and ask for help if they should become separated in a store or shopping mail. They should never go into a parking lot alone.

 If you have to carry a purse, carry It closes to your body and always zipoed.

After shopping:

. Leave the mail/store well before closing time. This way, there is greater assurance you will walk out with other people. There is safety in

 Avoid shopping until you are exhausted. You are more alert when you are less tired.

. When hurried or in a crowded shop, make sure you get all forms of identification and credit cards returned to you before leaving.

. Use an escort or mail security If you have too many packages or if you are leaving the store after

 Check underneath your car as you approach it. This is a common

ploy of criminals in parking lots and they will take you by surprise.

 Have your keys in hand and remember to check the interior of your vehicle before you unlock the door to get in.

 When going from store to store keep your packages stored out of sight in the trunk of your car. At home:

 Be extra cautious about locking your doors and windows at all times. Don't display gifts and other valuables where they can be seen from a window or doorway.

 After opening gifts, break down cardboard boxes of expensive electronics and fancy stores and put them in plastic bags to hide the fact that you have valuable items in your

. If you go out in the evening, turn on lights and a radio or television so the house looks occupied.

 Beware of package deliveries where couriers have the "wrong" address. Write down the tag numbers of suspicious delivery attempts.

• If you go on vacation, get an automatic timer for your lights. Ask a neighbor or trusted friend to watch your house, pick up the mail and newspapers and park their car in your driveway from time to time.

SANFORD - Millennlum Middle School students are striving to take 10,000 steps a day and Tampa Bay Buccaneer wide receiver Joe Jurevicius believes they can reach their


With more than 150 students assembled at the Millennium Middle School gym earlier this month, the NFL star was at the Sanford school to help kick off the "Step with It" program. The fitness program is a partnership between Coca-Cola, the National Association for Sport and Physical Education Sport and Physical Education, the President's Council on Physical Fitness and Sports and Seminole County Schools.
The initiative challenges students to take a minimum of 10,000 steps a day to main-tain good health and mental fitness.

Students were given small pedometers to help them track their progress each day, and a few encouraging words from

"When you think about it, there is a lot to see in this world," he said. "If you want to be around to see them, it starts with being mentally and

physically fit." The Penn State University graduate said the 10,000-step initiative "is an important message" because "if you are physically fit it helps you to be

"We all need challenges in our lives," he said. "I still challenge myself to this day. I'm currently rehabbing (my knee). I need to get better because I love the game of football, and if I'm not fit I can't do the thing I love to do."

Since a young kid growing up in the Cleveland, Ohioarea, Jurevicius said he always dreamed of becoming a professional football player. While that was a lofty goal, it is important to set smaller goals

exercise classes and meetings. "If they all showed up ft would be pretty hard to put them all in this building," she said. "Of course, we are now hooked up with the state so they'll want to come here and be our guests. We have the hotels and the places, but we don't have a room for them to meet in."

Seniors have researched the possibility of moving into the former fire department building and say the transfer could be made with minimal renovations. However, the building wouldn't fit all the seniors needs such as the smaller kitchen. Bill Carrico, city director of parks and recreation, said the old fire hall might actually be too large for seniors.

Eight thousand square feet is a number we feel comfortable with, but I don't think at this time the use of the building has been defined. That is why our research is ongoing," he said. "If it was designed specifically for the seniors needs, it may not need the entire space.

With renovations happening at city hall and plans to construct a new fire station, Mayor Thom Greene said other opportunities for a senior center location might

"From what I've heard tonight, I think the commission is committed to increasing the space for you all to use in the future. Also, I think we

are committed to make that usage specific to seniors," he said. "As far as if that is going to work with the lifesaving building, it may or may not. There may be another building, since we are doing all these changes, that may fit your needs."


As seniors and city staff collect more information, the city commission hopes the seniors needs can be more defined. In addition, several city officials, including City Manager John Litton, said the old fire station might not simply work for that need.
"I think there are some

alternatives the commission may want to discuss in the future," Litton said. "Giving the existing building and its lay out, it is very chopped up, and I'm not sure how much open space we can create. Certainly, the kitchen facilities that exist are not up to code to serve meals. I think it would take a lot of time and money, but I think there are some alternatives, and I surely support the concept."

Despite the commission's reluctance to move forward with guaranteeing the Rinehart Road fire hall facility to the seniors, they were confident the commission had good intentions to find them a new home.

"I don't think there is anyone on this commission or anyone probably in this room that would think enhancing the lives of our seniors is a bad thing. The question becomes how do we best serve that," Commissioner Mike McLean.





Now, thanks to the internet, we can learn a great deal, and I find myself recalling what I have forgotten about these people and the event we are about to celebrate

Contrary to what my boss believes, I was NOT on hand for that first Thanksgiving. (I was out of town that

According to writings by some of the Pilgrims, the first Thanksgiving feast (though not called that) was held in 1621 near Plymouth Rock, where they landed in November of 1620. One report says that nearly half of the 103 people on the Mayflower died, mostly of starvation, during the first year's cold winter. By the fall of 1621 however, thanks to Indians teaching them how to grow food, the remaining Pilgrims reported an excellent year in their crops. They therefore decided to hold a feast and invite those friendly Indians.

One of my wife's ancestors, William Bradford, wrote about it, bragging about what a great crop they had of Indian corn. But mind you, this was not corn on the cob type — it was more for corn meal used in making bread. Actually, it was considered more like wheat — and one report said they even used it to manufacture beer.

Bradford did mention the food they had for the meal; cod, bass, four wild turkeys, six dear (killed by Indians) and many fruits (mostly berries), and vegetables (peas, squash and beans).

About those turkeys, if you remember, Ben Franklin originally suggested the turkey rather than the eagle, become the symbol of our new nation during the preparation of the Declaration of Independence in 1776. Ben thought the turkey was ideal because it was a proud bird, which strutted with his head held high and was peaceful as compared to the eagle which dives down, picks up small animals and devours them. Naturally we selected the eagle. But let it be known, in addition to wild turkeys, the Pilgrims also occasionally ate eagles,

which one Pilgrim-said "tasted like mutton".
Yes, there were Indians at this event, led by King Massasiot. Approximately 90 of them showed up for the feast, which lasted for three days. (It takes us longer than that to get rid of the left-overs). With 90 Indians and approximately 50 survivors from the May(lower, there were probably 140 possible at the Mayflower, there were probably 140 people at the

event.
What did they eat? While we have pumpkin ples, they had pumpkins, but prepared more as a pudding, sweetened by honey or syrup. They didn't have any

whipped topping for it. Cranberries were available at that time, but they couldn't sweeten them enough for the average palate.

Sweet Potatoes or Yams? No. They hadn't been introduced in the New England area in the 1600s.

Many folks these days have ham, in addition or in the place of turkey. Pilgrims didn't have ham — they didn't have any pigs, which is probably the main rea-

That first Thanksgiving is believed to have occurred in October of 1621. Originally, it was considered a harvest meal, giving thanks for good crops. Eventually descendants of the Pilgrims called it "Forefather's Day," and observed it on Dec. 21. It was Abraham Lincoln who finally called it

Thanksgiving and made it a national holiday.


President Franklin D. Roosevelt, in 1939, changed the date of the event to the fourth Thursday of

Republican paradox, democratic dilemma


I felt hot flashes of anger on Thursday afternoon when cheering anti-Bush demonstrators claimed to be anti-Bush but not anti-American pulled down a 17-foot, gold-painted papier-mache effigy of my president. The idea of the mini-drama was to equate Bush and Saddam Husseln, whose golden statue in Baghdad was similarly toppled last April.

The scene and the comparison literally turned my American stomach. I am anti-Bush and opposed to his stupid war of choice in Iraq. I think he is a lousy president, but he is no Saddam, and Americans

are not a whipped people.

Americans, me among them, intuitively rally round the flag in self-righteous patriotism that makes foreigners crazy. We always have. The worse you do; the more they like you," said President John F. Kennedy after he saw his approval rating jump more than 10 percentage points in the wake of his disas-trous adventure in Cuba at the Bay of Pigs in 1961.

That paradox now applies to a Republican president. In the short run, the worse President Bush does, the better he looks. He, after all, is the one saying terrorists are everywhere, waiting to kill Americans and other innocents abroad. Bad news the latest from Istanbul - the White House for the blunders are the issue next

2002 congressional elections, may have saved Republican control of the House of Representatives by validating Bush's fears and rhetoric.)

In a longer run — the race to Election Day 2004 is as far as politicians can see - the same set of events is helping to create a dilem-ma for Democrats and other Bush antagonists. They secretly have to hope that things go bad (or stay bad) abroad and at home. I have talked with more than a few Democrats of prestige and position who have trouble hiding secret glee over bad economic numbers or even ambushes

That's the way it is in the politics of electing presidents. It's a dirty little secret, but not a new one. In 1970, in the taped privacy of the Oval Office, the war in Vietnam, may be decided by the Republicans would hold Democrats. If Bush and his Republicans would hold

next 50 years.

Part of the Republican paradox and the Democratic dilemma has to do with the great differences in the wars President Bush chose to fight after Sept. 11, 2001. An overwhelming majority of Americans, whatever their political affiliations, understood and supported action in Afghanistan. Taliban rulers had provided shelter and cover for al Qaida and for Osama bin

Laden. We had every justi-

fication for that invasion.

The pity is that we did not

get Osama and more of his henchmen. They were our enemy -- and obviously

still are a danger to us everywhere in the world. America was united then. The world was, too. Then Bush threw it all away. He has many explanations for why we went into Iraq — they change with the weather of events — but what he calls "noble" history is likely to judge him foolish. We are draining our resources and power into desert sands,

Will American voters, too, turn on Bush? Hard to say. The 2004 election, like President Nixon said that if many before it, will begin as a referendum on the sitstood that anti-war ting president. But it may Democrats secretly wanted be finally decided by the United States to lose events unpredictable, or it

and the world has turned

autumn, he will probably lose. If the Democratic candidate becomes the issue - because of his records or incompetent campaigning - then Bush will almost certainly be re-elected easily.

The Democrats have huge political problems going into this election season. Much as Bush has painted himself into a corner in Iraq — how do we get out now? — the Democrats have painted themselves into a political corner by deliberately scheduling more and more early primary elections. The election calendar was designed to produce a nominee late in February or early in March - basically within the next three months — to give that nominee more time to collect money and to attack Bush rather than campaign

against other Democrats.
That strategy, like many other things these days, seems to be backfiring. The front runner now, Howard Dean, is essentially unknown and untested nationally, but because of the front-loading of primaries, he could lock up the nomination before most Democratic voters know who he is or what he is about. Perhaps he will be great, perhaps not. In times of paradox and dilemma, there is no predicting what will happen next.

Separation of church, state is for everyone's protection

It's no wonder that we're having a hard time teaching Jeffersonian democracy to the Iraqis. It's still controversial in America.

Take the precincts where Roy Moore holds sway. Moore, recently ousted as chief justice of the Alabama Supreme Court, has become the standard-bearer for Christian conservatives who believe that the United States is a "Christian nation." He has inspired hundreds of thousands of followers. Never mind that Moore

insisted on placing a 2 1/2-ton Ten Commandments monument in the courthouse rotunda. Never mind that he argued that he's above civil law and ignored a federal court order to remove the monument. (It was eventually removed over the objections of Moore and his followers.) He received plaudits from the U.S. House of Representatives.

How is it that the one of the world's model democracies finds its Bill of Rights so disrespected by its own citizens? Why is it that the religious repression that marks so much of the world has not inspired Americans to value religious liberty more dearly?



supporters are no doubt sincere in their belief that much of what has gone awry in this society over the

last few

divorce, out-of-wedlock births, drug use, abused and neglected children -can be traced to the legal strictures against public prayer in public places. They clearly worry about the consequences of the nation's rapid retreat from traditional morality.

But there is something worse, much worse, than the collapse of the traditional family: the collapse of civil society itself. Doesn't the prospect of stoning a woman to death for adultery, as nearly happened recently in Nigeria, suggest the hor-ror of a state where religious law rules?

(Moore needs to spend some time with members of the Iraqi Governing Council, who have given up plans to start immediately drafting a constitu-tion. Among the Shiites, Iraq's majority, many clerics expect a constitution that will enshrine

Moore their power. Any such and his move would be fiercely resisted by the Sunni minority, who oppressed the Shlites during the rule of their fellow believer, Saddam Hussein.)

It is not just the liberty

of Jews and Muslims and

Hindus that would be trampled by Moore's "Christian nation." So would the religious liberty of millions of Christians who don't accept his theology, including myself. I would be forced to bow to prayers that make me uncomfortable, to salute commandments I consider wretchedly antiquated ("Thou shalt not covet thy neighbor's house; thou shalt not covet thy neigh-bor's wife, nor his manservant, nor his maidservant, nor his ox, nor his ass, nor any thing that is thy neighbor's"), and to condemn good friends. (My neighbors, it happens, are a servantless gay couple.)

Moore's ouster has merely elevated his standing among his fol-lowers; in their eyes, he has been made a martyr, a victim of America's adherence to a secular god. It has become popular among many conservative Christians to claim that they are among the persecuted. (The claim is especially odd given that

the most powerful man on the planet, is a conser-


vative Christian.)
But Moore's ouster merely keeps him from victimizing the rest of us. He is free to put his Ten Commandments mong ment in any museum tha will have it, any private landscape that can accommodate it. He is free to pray in his home, his church, his car (and to pray silently anywhere at any time).

When Thomas Jefferson wrote his "Letter to the Danbury Baptists," where he used the phrase "wall of separation between church and state," he was quieting the concerns of a group of Baptists who feared the influence of a larger group of Congregationalists. Centuries later, the Congregationalists are still here - I'm one of them — and so are the Baptists.

Moore needs to understand that Jefferson's wall has helped preserve both of those great denominations.

back down, but varies from place to place. For the rear echelon troops living in the old palace compounds, morale is much higher. If we lived in Saddam's old palace compound complete with swimming pools, marble bathrooms, good food, and never had to go out on patrol and get shot at, then I'm sure our morale would be higher too. These are the troops that the VIPs talked to when they visit here for an update. Nobody ever talks with us about how things are.

The food is still better than it used to be, and we haven't had T-rations in a long time. Our favorite morale booster is watching DVD movies on a laptop computer. We don't have many DVDs so we keep recycling the same movies over and over again. Some of the troops get newspapers from home which we share. My Seminole Herald usually arrives about two weeks late, but I do look at the Herald webpage when I can get on the internet. Our most current and regular newspaper is the old Stars d Stripes, which every G.I. has read since Moses

was a corporal.
9 Nov. 2003 Today is mine and Joyce's 12th wedding

anniversary. I managed to get on the internet and send 12 roses to her, one for each wonderful year we've been together, although not nec-essarily physically together because of so many deploy-

We lost another military policeman killed by an RPG (rocket propelled grenade) about 30 miles south of Baghdad.

In Sadir City, the east part of Baghdad where we patrol, there was a con-frontation in which a U.S. soldier killed the head of the district's municipal council. This official was like the mayor here. The soldier was one of two posted at the entrance to the public building and did not know that the man was a high official. The man was in a car that approached the main gate to the building. He got out and got into a squabble with one of the soldiers. When he tried to grab the soldier's weapon, another soldier shot him in the hip. He later died from losing blood through a lacerated femoral

A big crowd of Iraqis immediately began to demonstrate in front of our gate at Camp Mariboro. This incident has outraged the Shiltes, which just drives up the risk for us. Now we will probably get paid-back with mortars and road side ambushes again. I know, the President said "major combat is over;" well, try telling that myth to a soldier in this

never-ending mess.
I went outside and saw Richardson flying a kite that he had made out of a garbage bag. I thought that was a pretty good hobby. I walked around the corner of our warehouse and found a full-fledged kite making operation going on with SGT Hunter and a few other soldiers. I like to see these guys doing something constructive like this rather than sleeping. It is good relaxation for them after our

The cement guys came to our camp today and put in a cement pad at one of the doors. The foreman was Iraqi and spoke good English. He had gone to school in UCLA and lived in California for a while. I also saw the new

recruits today from the Iraqi, Civil Defense Corps (ICDC), Remember, I helped recruit these guys in August. They are now in uniform and have weapons and seem to like their work. They are marched around and trained by US soldiers. There are even women in the ICDC.

10 Nov. 2003 It rained "bazoons and chelups" last night (that's Arabic lingo for cats and dogs). So much for me saying it didn't rain much here. It's now very windy outside, but we got our windows put back in and all is back in order (no thanks to the 1st. Sgt.). Our showers were working but now they don't. The food is okay now, but not as good as at RSS or Regiment. Having good food is a morale booster just like power and mail, without It you will have a lot of disgruntled soldiers. Right now we have power and mail but both are sporadic. Mail takes about a week to get here, so it is not too bad but the power still goes off all the time and takes so long to come back on.







Geneva resident flying high with powered parachute

Perhaps you've seen Bob Cloninger sailing overhead in the serene Geneva skies and wondered 'What on earth is that?' as the bright colors of his powered parachute exited the peaceful blue and then ducked behind a section of trees to hide from sight.

Cloninger, a Geneva resident himself, saw a powered parachule overhead at the beach one day, and thought to himself "That looks easy and that looks fun!" Once home, he began researching the machines on the Internet and discovering them to be an affordable pursuit, found a Florida dealer and bought one on the spot

before ever having experienced flight. That was six months ago. These days Cloninger tries to take to the air at least once a week, which is not always easy. "You have to go early in the morning or late in the afternoon when the air is clear and there is no wind," advises Cloninger. He uses wind maps and Internet Information and checks carefully to make sure conditions are right before trailering his chute to Southerland's grass air strip for take off. About a third of the time, they make the trek only to discover winds too brisk for his machine and



return home feet never having left the ground.

According to Cloninger, that is the most difficult part of piloting the experimental aircraft.

"It's all been real-Darla Kinney ly quite easy," Scoles assures the novice pilot when asked about the learning process of flight. "The hardest thing is having the patience and self-discipline to say 'no' when you go out and have

When he does find conditions right to take to the air, Cloninger says the experience is "everything I thought it would be and more.

to abort because of wind."

"It's so beautiful seeing the rivers and lakes," he offers. "You see eagles every time you go up - and lots of deer. Near the landfill there are thousands of birds. The scenery is really

Until recently, Cloninger's wife Karen stayed firmly on the ground waiting patiently at the airstrip while her husband glided about 200 feet above, wondering (even though she admits not wanting to think this way) "Is this the last time I'm going to see him? Or maybe even 'Surely he'll get tired of this soon."

But he never came close to either end, and Karen began to think instead, "I think I'd rather be up there!" She has taken one jump seat flight and thoroughly enjoyed the experience.

Her pilot however, requires more

training and certification before he can officially carry passengers into the air. Meanwhile, he's learning all about the nuances of takeoff and landing the effects of air currents, propeller hazards (Once he encountered a flock of buzzards and wondered if one might end up in his blades!), air space restrictions, instrument gauges, engine features, equipment safety, scheduled servicing, throttle, thrust and even aerial photography.

All this is done within a five- to sixmile, 25-minute loop from the Geneva airstrip at an average speed of 28 to 30 miles per hour. With a global positioning system (GPS) and aviation radio on board and a cell phone just in case, Cloninger cruises at 400 feet or less,

well below other aircraft.

"Up at even 100 feet," describes Cloninger, "you can see the Cape, the Lake Monroe power plant, Orlando International Airport, and downtown

His 10-gallon gas tank allows about three hours of flight, although he has never stayed aloft that length of time. He's grateful to have an airstrip so

"Many parachute owners travel an hour or more to attempt takeoff and then have to go back home if the

weather is not favorable," he says. "I can go fly for an hour and still make it to work by 9 a.m.," chuckles Cloninger, a financial planner who is in the enviable position of having his office at home.

Involved in his insurance and investment work with obvious risk, he down plays the hazards involved with his hobby.

"If you lose your engine," he advis-"you simply land like a regular parachute."

Crashing in the roll cage he assures, would be no worse than "a car wreck

His accomplishments include a joint operation with the National Marine Fisheries Service, which resulted in three arrests for violations of the federal Endangered Species Act; numerous hunting-related arrests; rescuing eight people from two separate vessel accidents; and a near-perfect conviction rate.

He is a skilled vessel operator and regularly boards offshore fishing vessels for inspections - a hazardous assignment that requires skill, composure and physical fitness. He is an instructor at the agency's law enforcement academy and a member of the FWC's newly formed Special Operations Group (SOG).

Shikar-Safari International is an exclusive organization with a worldwide membership of no more than 200. The club began as an opportunity for members to get together and talk about their hunting experiences but has evolved into an organization that ardently supports conservation and education.

FWC POSTPONES RECLASSIFICATIONS

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) Thursday placed a delay until November 2004 on making any changes to the state's list of endangered, threatened or species of special concern. The only exception is for emergency listings, such as classification of the Miami blue butterfly, which is so close to extinction any delay would be extremely risky for the species.

Commissioners voted to classify the Miami blue butter-fly as an endangered species. The species, already classified as endangered under an emergency order by the FWC's executive director, will be classified by rule that will become effective in about 20

The FWC, meeting in a three-day session at Duck Key, had planned to consider moving ahead on a petition to consider reclassifying manatees from endangered to threatened and up-list the Panama freshwater. His work on city crayfish to threatened, snook ultimately filled in After convening a special panel to look at the listing process and after a full-day workshop on the issue, Commissioners felt too many questions and unresolved problems exist in the listing process. FWC staff will continue working to recommend improvements to the listing process for Commissioners to consider in coming months.

Currently, the FWC uses criteria developed in 1996 by the International Union for the Conservation of Nature (IUCN) to classify imperiled species.

CHAPMAN WINS HUMPHREY AWARD

The Wildlife Foundation of Florida (WFF) has honored Phil Chapman, a career fisheries biologist with the Florida and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC), with the 2003 Louise Ireland Humphrey Award. The WFF annually honors former Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission Chairwoman, Louise Ireland Humphrey, by recognizing an FWC employee whose dedication and service has made a significant contribution to the protection and conservation

of Florida's fish and wildlife.

Chapman is widely known

for his efforts to inform the public about resource issues, and for his preeminent leadership in promoting the now commonly accepted practice of catch-and-release fishing. Chapman began his career in 1970 as an assistant regional fisheries biologist Lakeland. In 1971, he coordinated the assessment of Florida's largest pollutioncaused fish kill. That assessment of the destruction of 70 miles of the Peace River, led to the nation's first successful prosecution of a major environmental case involving the destruction of fish and wildlife resources, with fines

Chapman was promoted to regional biologist in 1973 and went on to lead studies and pioneer techniques for artificially culturing and rearing striped bass, sunshine bass, and snook for their use in

totaling over \$900,000.

informational gaps in the life history of the species that provided valuable groundwork for spawning and rearing techniques in use today. One of Chapman's most sig-

nificant contributions from his investigation into the blological impacts of bass tournaments. Though Chapman found that tournaments do not significantly impact the fishery as a whole, tournaments did impact the trophy bass fishery. The finding led to statewide harvest regulations to protect the hallmark resource.

In 1982, Chapman was instrumental in the state's acquisition of Tenoroc Fish Management Area, a 6,000acre phosphate mine. This nationally recognized fishery provides high quality recreational opportunities to thousands of anglers annually. Chapman's creative use restrictive harvest regulatil and the support of fishing as a fun family activity has produced a unique approach to fisheries management at Tenoroc, one that has proved to be a highly successful combination in promoting as well as protecting the quality of the fishery.

Since 1989, Phil has headed the Aquatic Education Project and supervises efforts at Joe Budd Aquatic Education Center in Midway, the Boca Raton Aquatic Program and the statewide Fisheries Outreach Program.

In his career, Chapman has received numerous awards for his work in conservation including: Conservationist of the Year (1985) from the Florida Wildlife Federation, the Diawa Youth Conservation Award, the Polk Conservation Award from the Coastal Conservation Association for efforts to conserve Florida's aquatic resources, the Warm Water Management Award from the National Federation of Fly Fishers, and a variety of recognitions from the Florida Outdoor Writers Association including A. Achievement Award for outstanding service to the outdoor field.

Marshall spotled UCF's first-ever appearance on national television at home with a 21-7 victory over the Golden Knights at the Florida Citrus Bowl. Marshall improved to 7-4 overall, 5-2 in the MAC, while UCF fell to 3-8, 2-5 in the MAC.

"We thought that they (UCF) would play hard," said Marshall head coach Bob Pruett. "We never doubted that they would play with pride. They got some good athletes. We just came out here and gutted this thing out and clinched the 20th straight winning season at Marshall. We're really excited about that."

UCP's special teams made an early impression with a pair of blocks. Following Marshall's first possession, freshman Ron Ellis partially blocked Ben Lewis's punt. On the Thundering Herd's next possession, Peter Sends blocked Ben Lewis's 28-yard field goal attempt to deny Marshall the game's first three points. The block was his second of the

season. "All year the special teams have been a big plus, and our offense is the thing that has been the anchor," said UCF head coach Alan Gooch. UCF would get no closer, however. Marshall closed the scoring on a 49-yard touchdown run on a third-and-inches by quarterback Graham Gochneaur with less than two minutes to play, bringing the final tally to 21-7.

"That was a called play," said Pruett. "They were bringing the safeties down and blitzing their linebackers and packing it inside. We made the call, it was there, and Graham (Gochneaur) made a heck of a run."

UCF finishes its 2003 and 25th anniversary season November 28th when they face MAC Eastern Division champion Miami. Kickoff is set for 1 p.m. at the Florida Citrus Bowl.

"We're just trying to keep this thing togeth-er," said Gooch when asked about the past week. "It's a difficult time in this program with so many kids gone. But we want everybody to understand inside and outside the program that this is not only about football, it's about shaping kids lives.







here is usually a Southeastern Conference title or even a chance at a national championship on the line when Alabama and Auburn hook up for the annual "Iron Bowl." This year, all that's really left to play for is pride. The Tigers and the Tide bring 12 victories between them into this game, the lowest total

Nevertheless, this game means so much in the state of Alabama that a victory on the road at Auburn would wash away the bitter taste that seven losses have left in the mouths of the Crimson Tide coaches, players and fans. It also would give head coach Mike Shula and his staff something positive to build on before heading to Hawaii to close out Shula's first season at the University of Hawaii Nov. 29.

For Auburn, this is it, the final game of the regular season. A victory would give the team seven on the season, with a shot at a decent bowl bid. This will still be a disappointment for a team

picked to win the SEC. Even though the Tigers have home-field advantage in this game, it hasn't meant much in recent history. Auburn looks to make it two in a row after upsetting the ninth-ranked Tide last year 17-7 for its fourth consecutive victory in Tuscaloosa. Before that, Alabama had won eight of the previous 12 in the heated rivalry,

including the last two trips to Jordan-Hare Stadium in Auburn. Both teams need to get back to the roots of their running games. Alabama barely avoided a shutout against LSU, which held Tide tailback Shaud Williams to a season-low 29 yards on 11 carries. Auburn also seemed to shandon the run, with Carnell Williams

LSU's defense held Alabama without a first down on its first five possessions, and held the Crimson Tide scoreless in the opening half for the first time since last year's Auburn game, when the Tide also fell behind 17-0. Only Brian Bostick's 27yard field goal midway through the fourth quarter prevented Alabama from being shut out for the first time in four years.

MAKANSAS Offensive tackle Shawn Andrews, a Lombardi Award finalist, became the first Razorback lineman ever to rush for a touchdown, scoring on a 1-yard run in the second quarter of Arkansas' 48-20 victory over New Mexico State.

The Tigers have the second-best rushing offense in the SEC and the worst passing offense. Yet Auburn came out passing in an attempt to spread out Georgia's defense. The Tigers ran only the ball eight times, and four of those carries were by quarterback Jason Campbell.

GRIDA Ciatrick Fason started slowly, but he kept plugging along until he eventually began to dominate against South Carolina's defense. His first two carries resulted in only 1 yard, but he finished with a careerhigh 190 yards, the 10th-highest total in school history.

GEORGIA Kicker Billy Bennett tied an SEC record with the 78th field goal of his career, but he also missed an extra point in the 26-7 victory over Auburn, ending a streak of 113 in a row the nation's longest active run. His two field goals (of 47 and 18 yards) tied the SEC record set by Alabama's Philip Doyle from 1987-90. And with two games left in the regular season, plus at least one postseason game, Bennett seems assured of breaking the record. He is 78-for-101 in his career.

Return specialist Derek
Abney had 110 total return yards on six chances in the loss to Vanderbilt, and he also extended his consecutive-catch streak to 43 games with a 24-yard reception in the first quarter that set up a field goal.

The Tigers' 27-3 victory over Alabama marked the fourth game in a row that they won by 24 points or more. The Tigers haven't had such a streak since they won the first four games of the 1911 season by scores of 42-0 over Southwestern Louisiana, 46-0 over Louisiana Normal, 40-0 over Louisiana College and 40-0 over Meteor AC.

MGSISSIPPI The Rebels rank 114th in the nation against the pass and, even during what has turned out to be the best football season in Oxford in decades, the defensive backs have struggled. The low point for the Rebels' defensive backs came early in the season when Texas Tech's B.J. Symons threw for 661 yards, the third highest total in Division I-A history. That game doomed the Rebels to finish near the bottom of the national rankings.

With the Bulldogs' loss last week, which was televised on Jefferson Pilot Sports, they have now dropped 11 in a row and 15 of their last 16 on live TV. Their all-time record on Jefferson Pilot Sports fell to an even .500 (15-15).

George Rogers, the South Carolina running back who won the Heisman Trophy in 1980, gets a lifetime vote for the award. Rogers lists his current favorites as Oklahoma quarterback Jason White, Pittsburgh wide receiver Larry Fitzgerald and Mississippi quarterback Ell Manning.

THE Volunteers continue to domina in November, going 71-4 in this month since 1985. The Vols need to keep the trend going, since they have to win all their remaining games to have a shot at the Eastern title. Unfortunately, because of the new tiebreaker rule, they also need to improve their BCS ranking, which won't be helped by their final two opponents having records under .500.

Not only did the Commodores' victory over Kentucky map the nation's longest conference losing streak at 23 games, it was also Vanderbilt's first SEC victory at home since 1998, when it beat South Carolina 17-14.




