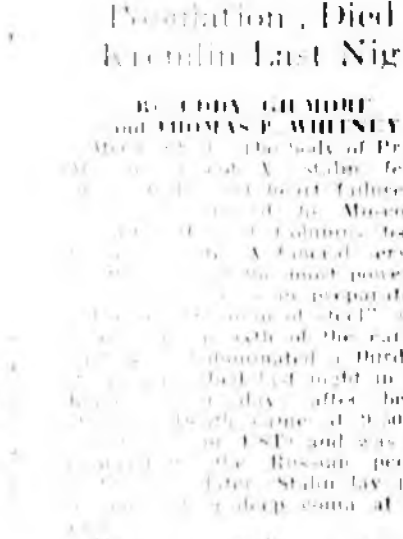

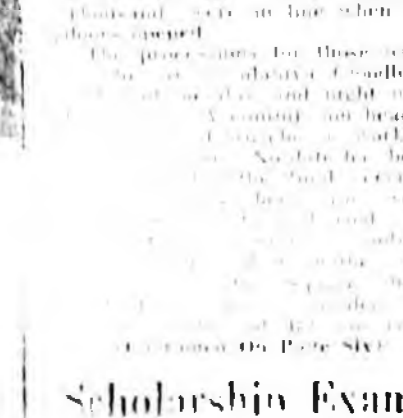

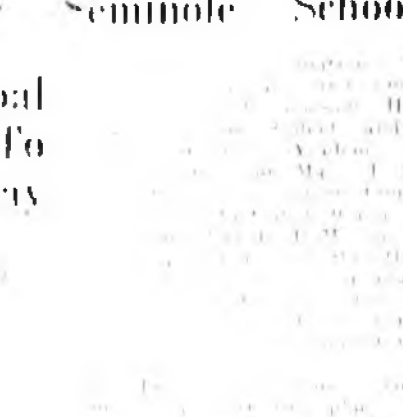

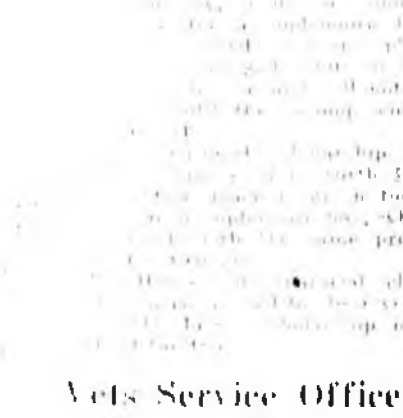

## Stalin Buried In Red Square Next To Lenin

### Eye Witness Account Given By Reporter Of Dramatic Event In Russian History

MOSCOW (AP)—The body of Joseph Stalin beside Lenin today.

So now the two great figures of the Russian Revolution of the 1930s that shook the world lie side by side in the big marble tomb in old Red Square.

Here is the way Stalin's funeral went.

Georgia Malenkov and other top men of the party and government gathered early at the Hall of Columns where the dead leader's body has been lying in state since Friday.

Chou En-Lai, the Chinese premier and former premier of the party and state leaders from Eastern European and other countries were there too.

And the Moscow diplomatic corps was there representing their governments or the leaders of their governments.

Chattering in Red Square beside the tomb.

The troops in long gray overcoats stand motionless on the cold sidewalks.

The tomb is too silent.

Thousands of civilians holding black-bordered portraits of the dead leader are in the square. They are very quiet and it is difficult to imagine how 25,000 can be quiet.

At 10,000 people are on the stands where I am standing stamping, stamping, stamping to keep our feet from freezing.

At 10:30 a.m. in Moscow time (7:30 a.m. EST).

Long black cars roll out of the Kremlin and head toward the Hall of Columns.

At 12:20 more automobiles roll by.

Everything is still. The great gilded clock on the Snyasky towers chimes every 15 minutes. At its first note, a military guard before the tomb changes every 15 minutes.

The slug, slug, slug from their booted feet is the only sound in the spacious distances of Red Square.

In the distance comes the sound of music. It is the stately and awesome Chopin funeral march.

The music swells. It is in and up the slight hill into Red Square there comes a procession from the Hall of Columns.

The leaders form a line at the big band before the tomb plays in the dirge-like music which now fills the square.

The red flag of the USSR flutters over the Kremlin just behind me. The mourners with their black and crimson banners of death blowing in the cold March wind.

The procession marches very slowly while Chopin's music rolls through the square.

Flats in line, the masses of flowers. Wreaths 10 feet high.

Bill Kirk Motors new showroom building at 200 East Commercial Avenue is having its grand opening today, and early visitors to the new building and seeing a type of construction usually found only in Miami and Tokyo, Japan.

According to Mery Oiler of Oiler-Weller Homes, Inc., a general contractor, the basic concrete block structure reinforced throughout with steel was built according to the Miami Code, which because of the hurricane threat is far more rigid than any other requirements governing construction.

Mr. Oiler declared the new showroom building which has 6,000 feet of floor space is three times safer than is required for this area and made it withstand earthquakes, windstorms and fire. In fact, the contractor asserted it was "initially indestructible."

No wood is to be found in any part of the construction. Material used were concrete, steel, and reinforced concrete. The roof is made of Pyrofer, a gypsum product. All windows are of double-strength glass with steel frames.

Construction started the first week in December.
