

American Casualties Set Record in War

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—U.S. forces suffered more casualties in South Viet Nam last week than in any week of the war, the U. S. command announced today. This high toll apparently resulted from the hard fighting south of the demilitarized zone, where American Marines are battling North Vietnamese regulars.

American casualties during the week total 970, the U. S. command said, including 142 men killed and 25 wounded. Three Americans were reported missing in action or captured.

The previous highest number of American casualties was during the week ending last May 21, when 146 U. S. troops were killed and 270 wounded, a total of 416.

Lurleen, George Ready Formal Drive Kickoff

DEMOPOLIS, Ala. (AP)—Gov. George Wallace, campaigning with his wife, Lurleen, in her bid to become his successor as the state's chief executive, said today he decides to run for president and wins, "we wouldn't need a governor in Alabama."

Wallace and his wife made appearances in Demopolis, Greensboro and Marion on the eve of her formal campaign kickoff tonight in Birmingham.

At each stop, Wallace told the crowds, "The best thing that could happen to this whole country would be to have someone from this state running it. I would be a definite improvement, regardless of who it happened to be."

Wallace has been saying for some time now that he might be a candidate for president again in 1968 as an Independent if neither the national Democratic nor Republican parties field a candidate whose views he approves.

The Governor said that "one of the big newspapers" recently expressed curiosity about how he planned to make good his pledge to be his wife's chief advisor if she is elected governor and still run for president. Through the Governor didn't mention it, Mrs. Wallace's Republican opponent, Congressman James Martin, also has pressed that question in campaign appearances recently.

Segregationist Wins Bid For Ga. Governor

ATLANTA, Ga. (AP)—Least-governor Steve Reconstructionist running a segregationist campaign, has captured the Democratic nomination for governor — upsetting a moderate candidate and Georgia's middle-road racial course.

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Maddox, a furniture merchant who quit the cafeteria business rather than serving Negroes, is a former governor. In Wednesday's primary runoff, Arnell had led a six-man race two weeks ago.

"God and the people are my campaign managers," exulted Maddox, 56, after pulling off a major upset without big money backers or the support of high-ranking politicians.

With 1,745 of 1,908 precincts reported: Maddox 419,537, Arnell 356,678.

A fiery opponent of the federal government, President Lyndon B. Johnson, liberalism, socialism and communism, Maddox says he shares the racial views of Alabama's Gov. George C. Wallace. But Maddox said very little about racial issues in his campaign.

Arnell, 59, who scored a major upset two decades ago to win the governorship over the popular Eugene Talmadge, had charged in the runoff fight that Maddox was radical and extremist, a man whose symbols were as handles and pistols.

Maddox, in resisting integration in 1964 and 1965, once waved a pistol to chase Negroes from his place and provided ax handles for white patrons. When ordered by a court to serve Negroes, Maddox quit the cafeteria business.

Arnell met Maddox to concede persons some followers of Arnell said Republicans voted for Maddox as the easier opponent for their nominee in November.

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World News In Brief

SARASOTA (AP)—Gov. Roydon Burns today ordered Dr. Carl Coppolino extradited to New Jersey to face a first degree murder indictment in the 1963 death of a former neighbor, William E. Archer.

MOSCOW (AP)—A 26-year-old American college graduate has been expelled from Russia on charges of working for the Central Intelligence Agency and engaging in "hostile activities." Russian authorities disclosed today.

The Soviet labor newspaper *Trud* said Nicholas H. Ritag, of Concord, Calif., who was graduated from the University of Pennsylvania in 1965, was expelled this month.

WASHINGTON (AP)—The House on Thursday passed a bill that would shift to the Senate today what debate on a \$2.5-billion authorization bill that is \$750 million above the administration budget.

The Senate action follows House passage Thursday night of a bill tailored to the \$1.75-billion budget request but tightening controls over how the money could be spent. The House vote was 210 to 196.

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Inez Zeros In On Cuba

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—Hurricane Inez attacked eastern Cuba today with screaming, 138-mile-an-hour winds, and in her wet, gloomy wake a black-out of communications concealed a possible human tragedy in Haiti's "Valley of Death."

At 11:45 a.m. EST, the Miami Weather Bureau received a report from Guantanamo City, at the eastern end of the Communist island, that Inez had sustained a blow of 138 m.p.h. and that peak gusts might be much more powerful.

High tides swept ashore on the storm felt on the island.

Haiti Faces 'Disaster'

"I don't see how Haiti could have escaped a disaster," said Gordon Dunn, chief of the Miami Hurricane Center.

Weakened in her Titanic bid with the mountains of Haiti, Inez had regained much of her ferocity in the water crossing the storm felt on the island.

San Juan Bay was hammered by sustained winds of 127 miles an hour locally as the great storm crossed the coast of Cuba's Oriente Province, and Fidel Castro's struggling economy faced a disastrous blow.

Haiti's "Valley of Death" is a deep trough between mountain ranges, revealed from the coastal town of Barabona on the Tibouron Peninsula to Port-au-Prince, the capital 159 miles away.

Straight into this trough, Inez hurled the full force of her wind and rain. Fanning in between the mountains, the winds may have built up well beyond the 100-mile-an-hour velocity the storm then possessed.

And Dunn said gigantic floods surely raced down the steep slopes into the valleys and along the tin and thatched-roofed homes of the natives in this poverty ridden nation.

The known death toll reached 29 in the French islands of Guadeloupe and the Dominican Republic, but it was feared that hundreds of others may lie dead along the way.

But as dazed victims of the great hurricane poked through the rubble of thousands of homes, Floridians treated more easily.

State Another Las Vegas?

Rep. W. H. (Bill) Reid today blasted the proposed state sweepstakes charging that "extension of legalized gambling beyond pari-mutuel betting at racetracks would cause a black-upwards in the crime rate, bring an influx of gangsters, hoodlums and organized crime to the state of Florida into another Las Vegas."

Reid declared that contrary to answering the state's problems of financing education, a state lottery would necessitate the expenditure of "tremendous" money for surveilling the lottery in addition to creation of new penal institutions to handle the influx of gangsterism.

"Even the old bingo bill is being revived. While this bill provides that all proceeds are to be used for charitable institutions or purposes, such a law would open the door for further extension of gambling in the state," Reid said.

Reid indicated his interest in studying the costs incurred by the Tax Reform Commission in its investigation of the possibilities of introducing legalized gambling.

Rep. S. J. Davis Jr., in a statement to The Herald said, "My position is the same. I oppose a state lottery which I feel is a further extension of legalized gambling in the state.

"The figures of \$50 million advanced as the resulting revenue each year from a state lottery is inaccurate and I do not feel the state should resort to financing itself by gambling," Davis concluded.

The matter should be given some consideration after all the stakes have been submitted."

Rep-nominee Tom McDonald also preferred to keep an open mind on the matter until he had the recommendations and the report of the committee studying this matter before him.

Sen. Mack Cleveland stated, "I prefer to wait and see the recommendations and the report of the committee studying this matter before I vote."

Sen. B. C. Pearce of East Palatka, chairman of the Florida Tax Reform Commission said he sees nothing wrong with legalizing sweepstakes betting to raise new education money, but stopped short of backing the sweepstakes bill in an interview with Associated Press, Tuesday.

Their dispute sent the \$2-billion defense appropriation bill back toward a House-Senate conference after the Senate rejected it Thursday because the House-passed compromise left out the reserve portion.

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Volunteer Negro patrols, wearing armbands provided by police, walked the streets of riot-shaken Hunters Point today in an experiment to prevent a racial truce from erupting into renewed violence.

City police continued their augmented patrols to the community's business thoroughfare.

City officials had the co-operation of federal authorities in the move to eliminate what they call the cause of the riots—Negro unemployment.

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—B52 bombers delivered a one-two punch today in two raids against North Vietnamese forces fighting U. S. Marines just south of the demilitarized zone.

The B52s unloaded tons of bombs on infiltration routes and supply and assembly areas for the Communists fighting on the southern edge of the zone dividing North and South Viet Nam.

Lack Of Interest Hit Vote Registering 'A Disgrace'

Canilla Bruce, supervisor of elections declared today lack of interest on the part of the public and the low numbers of persons who have registered to vote is "simply disgraceful."

With the supervisor's office being open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. daily Monday through Saturday at both the branch office at Seminole Plaza at Casselberry and at the Court House, only 21,157 out of an estimated 40,000 eligible persons in the county have "bothered to register." Registration books will close Oct. 8 with only 50.6 per cent of the 40,000 persons registered, if the trend of recent years continues. Less than 50 per cent of those registering will vote in November.

The high costs of not voting were shown during the first primary in May when only 9,000 persons out of the 10,821 registered at the time voted registering the cost per vote to an all time high of 86¢. If all of the 40,000 qualified persons had registered and voted the costs per vote would have run less than 5¢.

To date, 17,247 Democrats are registered, 3,558 Republicans, 227 Independents, 82 non-partisan, two Progressive and one Conservative.

Registration in the county is permanent. Checkup and purge of the books takes place every two years, when voters merely sign the card mailed to them to keep their registration up to date.

Mrs. Bruce emphasized the importance of registering but strongly urged, "It does no good to register, if you do not vote."

Fire In Sky

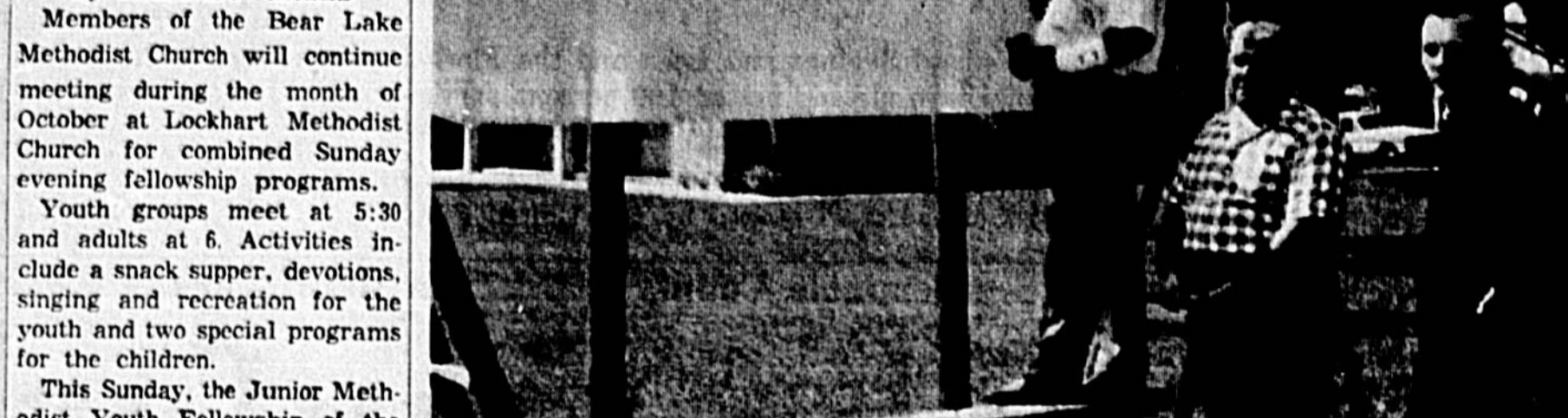

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Repudiate Peace Offer - Nixon

MIAMI (AP)—Richard Nixon has called on President Johnson to repudiate a U.S. offer made in the United Nations to cease North Viet Nam bombings in return for communist promises.

The former vice-president, stopping at Florida on a 24-state speaking tour, said in a statement Thursday that the president should take such a stand before leaving for an Asian conference on Viet Nam in Manila.

Nixon said Johnson should "repudiate U.N. ambassador (Arthur) Goldberg's offer to the communists to cease bombing if they secretly agree to reduce their attacks on Americans in South Viet Nam."

The 1960 Republican presidential candidate added: "Goldberg's offer to unilaterally cease bombing... returns American diplomacy to the naive days of Yalta, Tehran and Potsdam."

Nixon continued: "The United States should never again rely on communist promises alone. We should not stop our air strikes against military targets in North Viet Nam until the North Vietnamese communists quit killing American men in South Viet Nam."

Addressing a rally at the University of Miami, Nixon called Johnson "the most expensive president in history."

Nixon declared: "We can't afford LBJ."

The former vice-president said Johnson has failed to take effective action against inflation and warned that unless something is done a recession could result.

Nixon predicted the Republicans will gain 40 congressional seats in the November elections, and more if Johnson's down-turn in popularity continues."

He said Georgia, Arkansas and possibly South Carolina will elect Republican governors. In Florida, he claimed, Republican Claude Kirk has an even chance against Democrat Robert King High. "And watch Alabama," Nixon added.

Nixon told a news conference that if at the Manila conference, "Johnson makes basically a grandstand play, the American people would disapprove and this would be reflected in the elections."

He appeared in support of the congressional candidacy of Mike Thompson, opposing Rep. Tom Fassel, D-Fla.

Later at Fort Lauderdale where he was speaking in support of GOP congressional candidate J. Herbert Burke, Nixon told an audience of 2,500 that one-party government thwarts good leadership.

"The American people haven't won a hand since Johnson started to deal," he said. "We can't do anything this year about the dealer, LBJ, but we can unstick his deck of rubber stamp congressmen," he said.

Nixon said the president needs a congress of loyal opposition.

"At no time in America's history have we had great leadership when we had one-party government," he said.

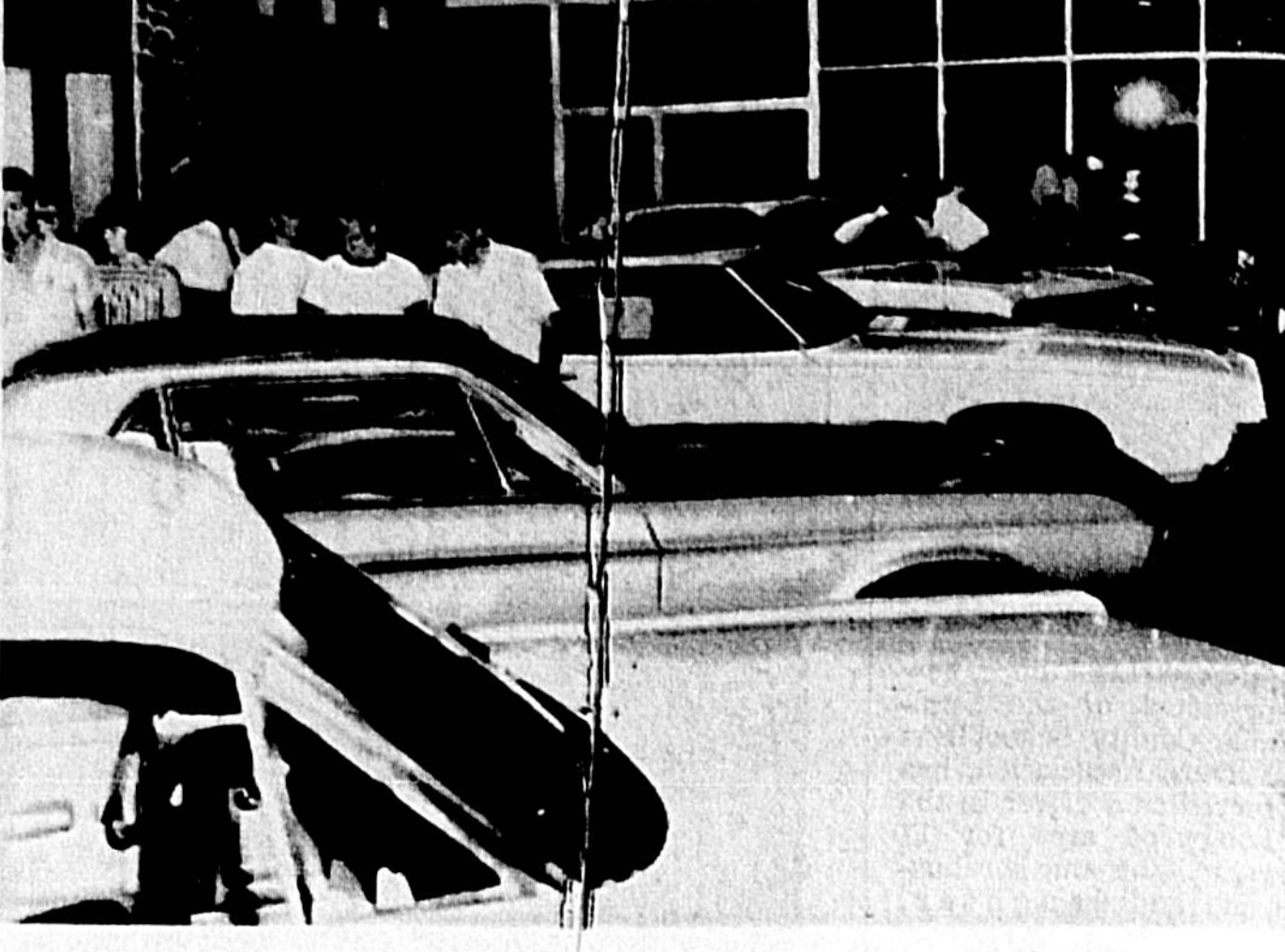

Senate Eyes Education \$\$

WASHINGTON (AP)—Two bills authorizing \$10.6 billion in federal spending for education—about \$2 billion more than President Johnson sought—have cleared the Senate labor committee and may come up for Senate debate next week.

One measure, approved by a 14-1 committee vote, would authorize \$6.2 billion in federal aid to elementary and secondary schools and extend the program for two additional years. This is \$1.9 billion over Johnson's request.

The other bill would authorize \$4.4 billion in the next 2 1/2 years for grants and loans to help with construction of college student loans. This is \$1.07 billion over the President's recommendation.

While the grade and high school aid bill topped administration funding requests, it was almost \$2 billion under the version approved in July by a subcommittee.

The committee averted what could have been a bitter Senate struggle over the bill by removing an amendment inserted in subcommittee by Sen. Edward M. Kennedy (D-Mass.).

Kennedy's amendment would have revised the 1964 Civil Rights Act to provide aid for districts seeking federal help in overcoming racial imbalance in their schools. Kennedy said the provision was aimed at meeting problems of de facto segregation.

The committee agreed, however, to send the Kennedy proposal to the Senate floor as a separate bill.

In approving the higher education bill, the committee rejected Johnson's proposal that the National Defense Act student loan program be phased out. It voted instead to put more money into these loans to students from low income families.

The measure also would revise the matching formula for construction grants first authorized by Congress last year. Presently, the federal government pays up to one-third of the cost of an academic building at a four-year undergraduate school or graduate school, and up to 40 per cent of such costs at a junior college.

The bill would boost the one-third formula to 50 per cent and the junior college figure to 60 per cent.

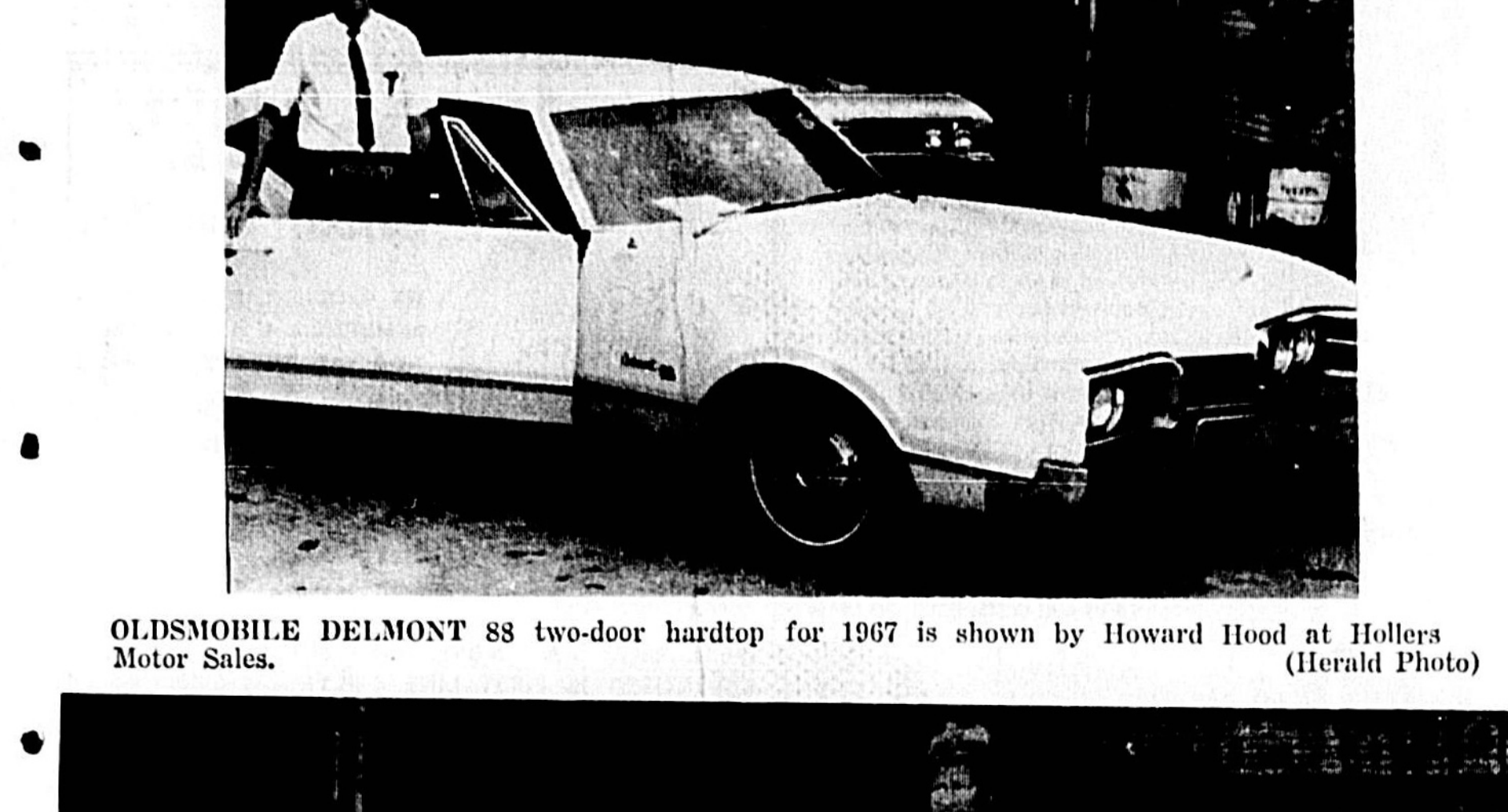

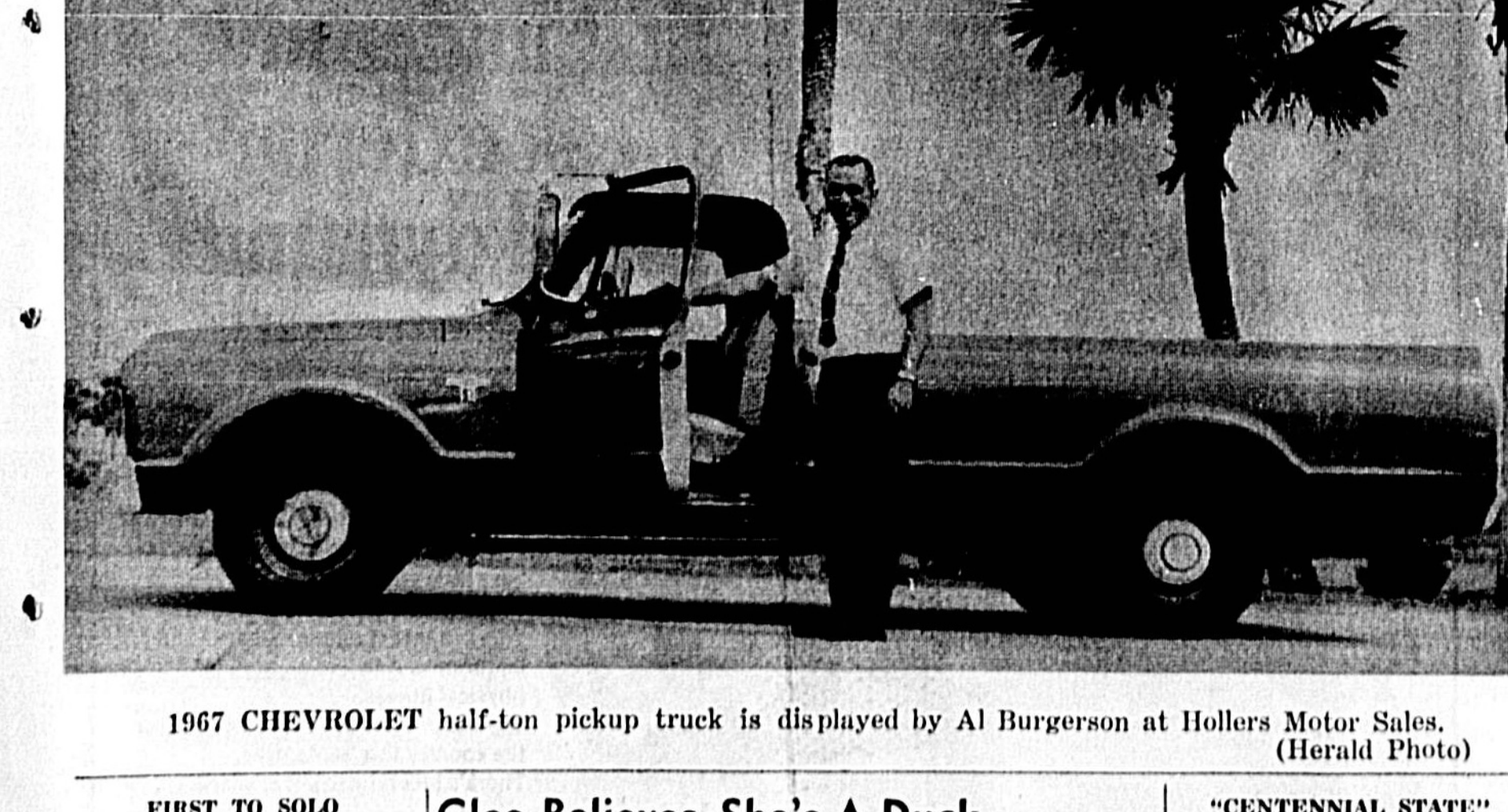

People Sour On Political Parties

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP)—Gov. George C. Wallace, campaigning for his wife for governor, says people across the nation have turned sour on both major political parties.

Still appearing in the role of a "maverick" presidential candidate, Wallace nevertheless promised thousands of cheering, banner-waving followers Thursday night that he will "keep on fighting Lyndon B. Johnson" and do it "in the states where it counts."

It was the formal kickoff of Lillian Wallace's race for governor against a Republican and an independent, and it brought loud and frequent rebel yells from a crowd estimated by Police Capt. George Wall at 8,000 to 10,000.

Wallace divided his criticism between Johnson and former Vice President Richard M. Nixon, choices of many Southern Republicans for president in 1968.

Wallace said more people than ever before are listening to him now when he deplores the trends toward centralized government which he said are prevalent in the nation.

He pointed to segregationist Lester G. Maddox's victory in the Democratic gubernatorial runoff primary in Georgia as evidence the states rights movement is gaining momentum "day by day, hour by hour, across these United States."

He said the "overwhelming majority of the people in this country are not in agreement with the leadership of both parties." In fact, he added, if he had stayed in the presidential race in 1964 instead of withdrawing, "We would have gotten more votes than the Republican candidate (Barry Goldwater) got."

Mrs. Wallace, 46, wearing a white skirt and blue jacket emblazoned with the crest of Alabama, joined her husband in promising an unrelenting battle for states rights.

"What we need is a two party system in the United States," he said. "If there is any difference between a national Democrat and a national Republican, you tell me what it is."
