

Bryant Pledges Fight Against Civil Rights

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Gov. Farris Bryant has already said he'll fight any civil rights proposals at the National Governors' Conference at Miami Beach, but today he listed the things he'll plug.

—Cold war education to teach the nation's everyday citizens the dangers of Communism.

—A state fight against the federal government in its attempt to take over off-shore tidelands from coastal states.

—Seek more volunteer states to help in the Cuban refugee resettlement program.

Another main aim at holding the conference in Florida, the governor said, is to give the nation's chief executives "the kind of exposure we need in order to attract national political conventions and the like." He said the expense would pay off in terms of nationwide publicity.

The conference, for which the past legislature appropriated \$75,000, will boost Florida's tourist and convention potential, Bryant said. The conference will cost much more than \$75,000, but industry from around the state is also chipping in for the July 21-24 gathering.

Bryant, who is chairman of the conference committee on cold war education, will present an action report recommending what the governors can do in each of their states to accomplish the objectives of teaching citizens the dangers of communism.

He said he will report on the progress of a voluntary resettlement program for Cuban refugees and encourage additional help in moving some of the Cubans from Miami where more than 100,000 of them are living.

Also Bryant said, he will push the fight against the federal government which says it doubts that states should have ownership of valuable natural fill lands lying off the coast.

Bryant said he is especially concerned that no civil rights issues be injected at the meeting and will ask that a full vote of the governors be needed to bring up such hot potato legislation.

He said it would pit southern and northern governors against each other and would damage the purpose of the conference. Gov. Nelson Rockefeller of New York is pushing such a resolution and reportedly will ask that it be passed by the conference.

Bryant said that using the conference as a "sounding board" for upcoming presidential elections will cause the chief executives to "stay away if they're going to be browbeaten with controversy."

Seven Fatalities Listed In State Over Weekend

MIAMI (UPI) — At least seven persons died in accidents over the weekend in Florida, including a Miami woman who was crushed to death by her own car.

Mrs. Alice Gomez, 35, was dragged 30 feet and wedged beneath the front end of her automobile Sunday after it was hit from behind by a pickup truck. Police said she had stepped out of her car after stopping for a traffic light to see what was delaying traffic.

Mrs. Carol Easton, 24, of West Palm Beach, was killed Sunday in a head-on collision at Boynton Beach.

Two teenagers were killed early Sunday when their car smashed into a bridge abutment on State Road 35, 10 miles north of Dade City. They were identified as driver Robert Curtis Mason, 18, of Zephyrhills, and Norman Dennis McCarthy, 17, of Dade City.

An eight-year-old Miami boy, Louis Burkett, was struck and killed by a car in Miami Saturday.

John Monahan, 50, of Wimauma, died in a Tampa hospital Saturday, just a few hours after he was injured in a motor scooter accident.

Ira Douglas of Miami died Saturday when a 15-ton road scraper slipped off a jack while he was changing the blade.

Super Highway Joins Florida And Georgia

VALDOSTA, Ga. (UPI) — Georgia and Florida joined hands today in opening 26 miles of Interstate 75 and linking the super-highway systems of the two states for the first time.

Gov. Carl Sanders of Georgia and Gov. Farris Bryant of Florida jointly dedicated the four-lane, limited-access highway segment in ceremonies held at the boundary between the two states.

Sanders, in a prepared text, said the opened segment connecting Valdosta, Ga., with Jasper, Fla., not only formed a physical link but symbolized ties that bind two "good neighbors" together.

The route is already opened north of Valdosta to Unadilla, Ga., and the new addition extends the completed and opened stretch of Interstate highway to 125 miles, second longest in the southeast.

The longest stretch in the southeast consists of 140 miles of Interstate 26 in South Carolina between Orangeburg and Spartanburg.

Sanders said his administration will give priority to completing the entire Georgia segment of Interstate 75 generally following the route of U. S. 411 from Chattanooga, Tenn., to Unadilla.

"I'm sure that we all share the dream that (three and one-half years from now) it will be possible for a motorist to drive all the way from Chattanooga to Miami without encountering a stop sign," Sanders said.

Georgia has construction underway on 32 miles between Unadilla and the south side of Macon and 41 miles from the Tennessee line southward to Calhoun, Ga.

The newly opened segment became the first link of the interstate systems with a neighboring state for both Georgia and Florida.

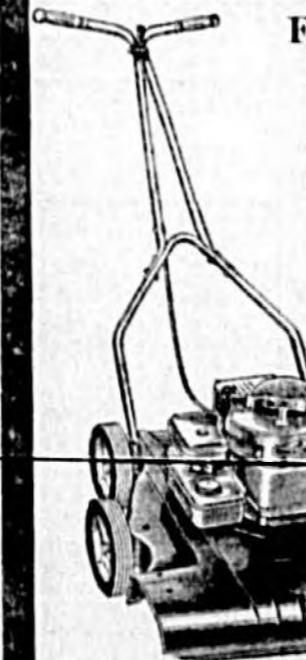

County Gives Two Buildings Top Priority

Sub-Courthouse, Home Pushed

Construction of two new county projects — a nursing home and a courthouse annex — are the prime matters before the County Commission at this time, it was learned this morning.

Commission members have been interviewing architects with the view of erecting a new county home for the aged.

"We interviewed some more architects this morning," said John Alexander, who is the Commission member charged with custodial duties of the county home.

He explained the County already has set aside \$75,000 toward providing residential facilities for the aged. At the present there are 10 patients at the 40-year-old County Home on South Highway 17-92.

In the interviews with architects, Alexander said, Commission members are endeavoring to learn if the \$75,000 already earmarked for a new home will be sufficient, or whether the County must budget more funds.

Commission members also have conferred with Sarepta nursing home officials and officers of the new nursing home at DeBary, to learn whether it would be more economical than to "board" county patients at "board" county patients to construct a new county home. The DeBary home officers have offered to board county patients at \$9 per diem.

County Commissioners also are negotiating with Hibbard Casselberry, real estate promoter of the city bearing his name, for the construction of a courthouse annex.

Howard D. Fiedler, Orlando architect, has prepared preliminary plans for a 80 x 62-foot building to house county branch offices at Casselberry to serve residents of South Seminole County.

Casselberry would construct the one-story building and lease it to the County.

Nasser May Try To Put Satellite In Orbit Tuesday

CAIRO, U. A. R. (UPI) — President Gamal Abdel Nasser may attempt to orbit a space satellite to coincide with next Tuesday's 11th anniversary of the Egyptian revolution, informed sources said today.

There was no immediate official comment on the report.

But it followed a demonstration Monday at which Nasser and his top military chiefs watched the "successful" firing of ground-to-air missiles, built with the aid of German scientists.

Sources said the launching of a three-stage rocket to place a satellite in orbit may now be tried on or before Tuesday. They said such a rocket was test-fired successfully last winter.

A feat of this type would give Nasser an enormous propaganda boost, make Egypt the third nation behind the United States and the Soviet Union to orbit a satellite and cause grave concern in Israel.

The Ginderville Fire Dept. area has been defined as a five mile radius east, south and west of the Old Orlando Hwy. The area covered will extend west until it merges with the area covered by the Lake Mary Fire Dept., which reaches in or near the Five Points area.

30-Day Weather Forecast Given

The bureau predicts below normal temperatures for the Pacific Northwest and northern Rocky Mountain states, and above normal in the southwest central plains and upper Great Lakes.

Subnormal rain fall was forecast for the southwestern states and the upper Great Lakes and east Gulf states. Above normal rainfall is expected in the Northwest and from the Appalachian Mountains to the Atlantic Coast. Elsewhere, rainfall will be near normal, the bureau said.

Casselberry Votes Sept. 5

The date for the special referendum on the new proposed charter for the Town of Casselberry has been set for Thursday, Sept. 5, and the last day for voters to register will be Monday, Aug. 5.

The approval of 51 per cent of the registered voters is needed for the charter to be accepted.

All civic clubs in the community will be asked to assist in a campaign to get residents to register and vote.

An ordinance was passed annexing parts of Seminole Park, Casselberry Heights, Enchanted Manor and all of Edgewood Manor to the town.

Purchase was authorized of a duplicating machine for \$245 and a tape recorder and microphone for \$235 plus three additional microphones and a headset.

The tape recorder will be used to record meetings of the council and will serve as an aid to the town clerk in transcribing her minutes.

An ordinance was passed providing an increase in cigarette tax as passed by the state legislature making the town eligible to benefit from this increase.

A plat for ten lots submitted by Ralph Parks as part of "Land O' Lakes" Country Club on Winter Park Drive was accepted and approved.

The property is zoned R-1A and Mr. Parks has requested that it be changed to R-1AA. A check for \$13.05 was received refunding the town for the operation.

\$500 Grant For Driver Course

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Florida's public schools have received a \$500 grant to finance a teacher training course in driver education.

The courses, to be offered at Florida State University, will be used to acquaint driver education teachers with new training equipment.

The equipment permits students in the classroom to simulate actual driving conditions.

Money for the July 22-Aug. 9 course, was made available by the Allstate Foundation. Driver education will become mandatory for all Florida high school students beginning with the fall term in September.

Under Florida law, all new drivers must have completed a driver education course in order to get a license at 16, or else wait until they are 18 years old.

UF Researcher To Get Award

GAINESVILLE (UPI) — One of the highest honors in the field of medical research will go to a University of Florida Medical College professor.

Dr. Richard T. Smith, a professor in the department of pediatrics, was named Monday to receive the 1963 E. Mead Johnson Research Award for his study of immunity to disease.

E. H. Christopherson, executive director of the American Academy of Pediatrics in Evanston, Ill., said Smith will receive the award for his demonstrations that newborn infants are able to build their immunity to disease from birth and possibly earlier.

Grid Coach Kills Wife In Accident

OXFORD, Miss. (UPI) — University of Mississippi basketball coach John A. Hovious accidentally shot his wife to death here today when a shotgun he was loading discharged, officers said.

Mrs. Hovious died soon after the accident. Officers said she was struck in the stomach.

Officers said Hovious was loading the shotgun to chase away some dogs that had been disturbing the family.

Mrs. Hovious was the former Katherine Tennant of Vicksburg. They were married in 1941 and have four sons. Hovious joined the Ole Miss football staff in 1946.

\$2.8 Million Bonds Sold For State Building

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — The Development Commission Monday sold \$2.8 million in bonds for a new state office building here and announced a "hard sell" industrial advertising program for Florida.

The new building will mainly be for the use of the State Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission, but will also house the Sheriff's Bureau and other state agencies.

The bonds were bought by low-bidder John Nuveen & Co., Inc., of New York. The firm will be paid 3.51499 per cent interest on the bonds. Bids were received from six firms ranging up to 3.67730 per cent interest.

Chairman-director of the commission, Wendell Jarrard, said the fall and winter tourist promotion campaign will be linked with the "hard sell" industrial advertising program aimed at creating 25,000 new jobs in Florida this year.

The tourist campaign will be split into two stages, the first built around package vacations in Florida at a fraction of the cost of mid-summer or mid-winter traveling in the Sunshine State.

Its theme will be "fall sale." The second phase, for the winter tourist, will harp on the bleak northern winters.

Few mothers today train their sons in the thoughtful, responsible ways that help a man to become a husband who is easy to live with, just as few mothers today train their daughters in the homemaking skills that will help them to be good housekeepers and good managers. So the young husband has to be firm in letting his wife know what he expects of her as a homemaker — if he doesn't want to settle for a poorly run house, indifferent meals and more installment payments than he can meet on his salary. Aviation Plan Commission Will Study Field

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Gov. Farris Bryant named two members today to the newly-created Aviation Study and Advisory Commission.

Bryant named B. L. Mullis, Oklawaha, and E. L. Williams, Miami.

Two House members and two Senators are still to be named by Senate President Wilson Carraway and House Speaker Mallory Horne.

The commission was set up by the 1963 Legislature to study aviation and recommend to the 1965 session changes in laws governing this field.

The Legislature said private and commercial aviation are of great importance to economic development of Florida. But, it said, with well over 2,000 aircraft now registered in the state, laws for promotion and regulation of the industry lack uniformity and scope, hampering an effective program of promotion and development.

The Legislature suggested the commission make recommendations on ways of developing airports, including financing and maintenance of an adequate network of aircraft facilities throughout the state, methods of using federal aid, an analysis of the relationships of responsibility and control of aviation between federal and state governments under existing laws and methods for financing of acquisition of aircraft on a more widespread basis.

The development commission will furnish technical, administrative and clerical assistance for the study. The law provides that each member of the commission will have an equal voice and any member disagreeing with the final recommendations may file a minority report.

Life In South Pacific Told By Frank Chase

The living is easy on Cook Islands in the South Pacific and there is an abundance of food, including citrus, Frank Chase of Chase and Company told members of the Rotary Club Monday.

Chase has just returned from a trip to Cook Islands, which are a protectorate of New Zealand, during which he studied the growth of citrus trees there and on other islands, the methods of processing and packing. He showed colored slides of the island and the trip.

The people of the island are Polynesians, he said, and noted that they are tall, heavy people, but happy and very friendly. They bathe frequently with the shower stalls

which dot the island, a popular convenience which always seem to have an occupant.

"They care little for material things," Chase reported, "for they have an abundance of fruit, coconuts, taro, fish to eat and they are very healthy. There is little disease on the island, and the climate is ideal."

However, in New Zealand, Chase found that it was 10 degrees above zero and though there was no snow, even the trees were covered with frost.

Rotarians were amused at Chase's description of the procurement of liquor, which is controlled by the government.

On Cook Islands, the citrus trees need little fertilizer, Chase said, as the soil is volcanic loam of about three feet in depth.

Grain Rail Shipments Hiked By 16 Per Cent

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Interstate Commerce Commission today ordered the Southern Railway and other railroads to increase their rates for some grain shipments by about 16 per cent.

The rates apply only to shipments from Mississippi and Ohio River crossings to destinations in the South.

The commission said the increase still leaves these rates about 23.5 per cent lower than they were before April 15.

The commission originally had authorized Southern to cut its rates by about 60 per cent on grain transported in 100-ton capacity "Big John" hopper cars when the shipments totaled 450 tons or more.

Southern first applied for the rate reductions Aug. 18, 1961. They were suspended for seven months after that while the ICC considered the matter. Ultimately, however, the ICC approved the rates.

That approval brought forth an avalanche of protest from the Tennessee Valley Authority, large lines, and truckers.

Opponents of the lower rates went to court to seek injunctions which would have prevented the rates from taking effect. But on April 15, the Supreme Court ruled that federal courts do not have the power to prevent a railroad from putting new rates into effect after expiration of the seventh-month waiting period.

The Southern put its lower rates into effect immediately after the court ruling.

But the ICC ruled today that the cuts were too drastic and ordered the railroads to increase them by 16 per cent — leaving them at 83.5 per cent below the previous level, according to ICC computation.

ICC Commissioner Charles A. Webb said the commission will require the railroads to submit reports on the impact of the proposed rates for a year. He indicated the commission might take another look at them at that time.

The commission's report said the "practical effect of applying the proposed rate formula . . . to Tennessee River ports would be to build a bank of the Tennessee River to which no ex-barge grain could penetrate by rail."

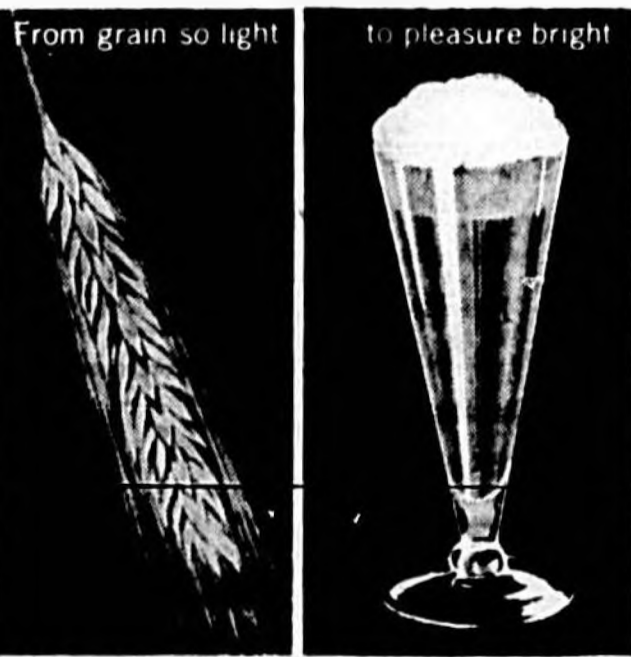

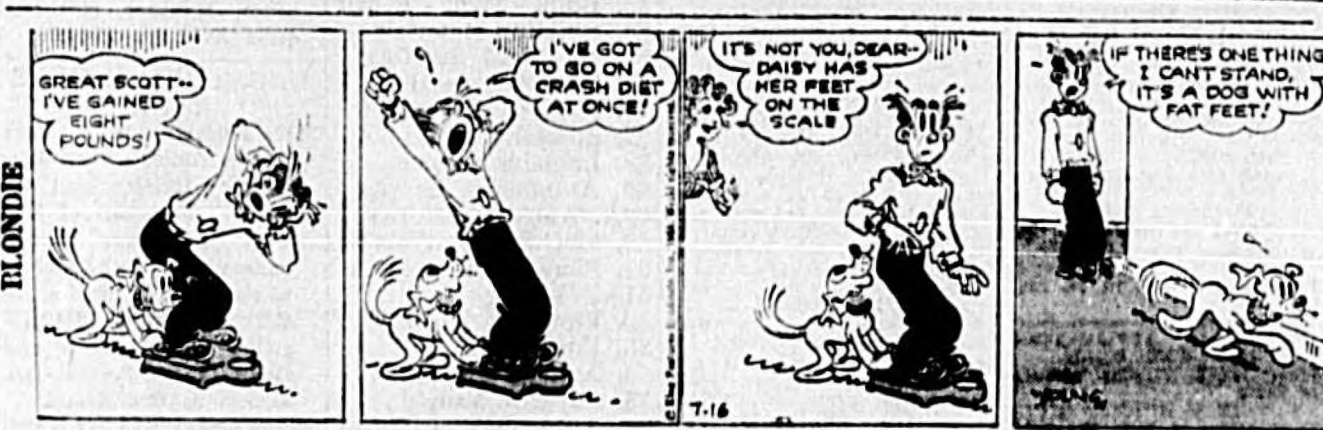
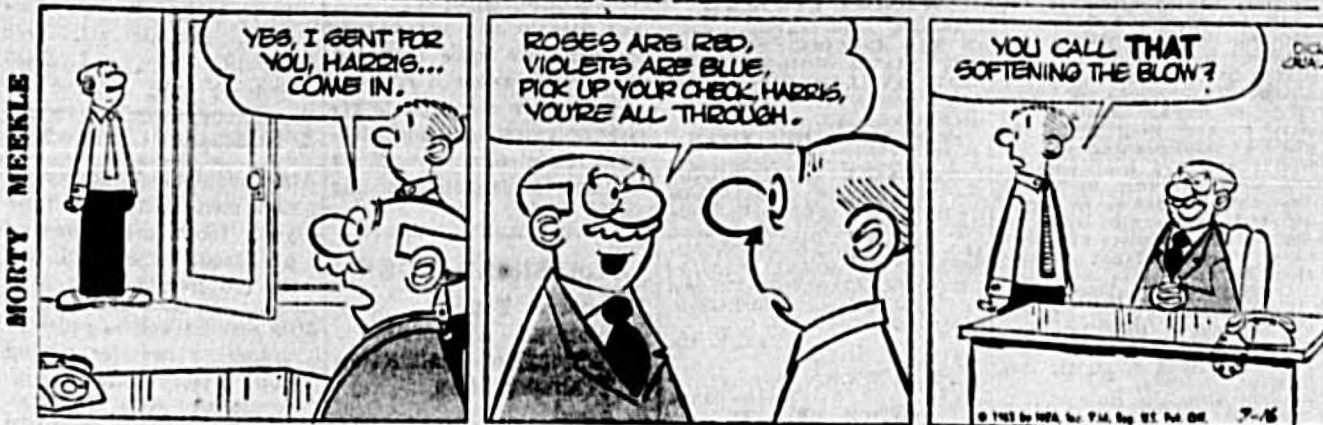
