### Nationalists Give Pledge To Conquer Mainland By 1951

TAIPEI, FORMOSA, Oct. 12 (AP)—Nationalist China observed its independence day today with renewed pledges to sweep the mainland from the Reds.

The occasion was the anniversary of Sun Yat-sen's revolt that overthrew the Manchu Dynasty and established the China Republic in 1911.

Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek charged the Chinese Communist government is "a puppet regime controlled by Russian imperialism."

He said large numbers of Russians have taken control of China's harbors, airfields, railways, and mines.

Pinelion-educated K. C. Wu, governor of this island stronghold to which the Nationalists fled from the mainland last year, predicted a final victory by 1951.

He addressed a crowd estimated at 100,000 outside Nationalist headquarters. Earlier, Chiang read his message to Nationalist officials.

The Generalissimo said the Chinese Reds have an army of 4,000,000, but plan to convert 60,000,000 of the nation's 300,000,000 farmers. Chiang said the Communists are building the army by means of a purge and so-called land reform.

He described these actions as steps toward enforcement of so-called "New Four Points" in the Red treaty with Russia.

The chief purpose of this treaty is to utilize the 400,000,000 people of China as Russia's instrument in reconquering the whole of Asia and 4,000,000 square miles of area on the Chinese mainland as Russia's base for aggression against the whole world," Chiang said.

He asserted that all levels of the Chinese Red government and army "under the strict control of Soviet Russia." Formosa, he added, no longer is in danger of being conquered.

Chiang said the big island's economic strength is another guarantee of victory against Communist aggression. We are prepared to launch a counteroffensive to reconquer the entire people.

The Generalissimo said that on this "double-ten" tenth day of the tenth month, many of our people behind the Iron Curtain are denouncing themselves to fighting Soviet aggression.

We predicted the Chinese Red would be overthrown as were the Manchus 39 years ago. He commended and their leaders the Chinese Communist with that of the Manchus.

### Rural Common Sense

By Spuds Johnson

"A good cover crop will be more beneficial to crop land than any other soil practice or treatment," Dr. George Thornton of the University of Florida College of Agriculture pointed out recently.

And the soils professor's statement is a very opportune one, for it comes at a time when thousands of Florida farmers are or should be planting or getting ready to plant winter cover crops of lupine, clover, oats, and rye. In the southern part of the state farmers are planting vegetable crops for winter and early spring markets, but most of the cash crops have been harvested in the northern section and it is in northern Florida that farmers should be planting winter cover crops.

Most farmers who have gotten the habit of planting cover crops do not need to be reminded that they are very much worthwhile—they have seen the advantage of cover crops in increased yields of cash and other crops—but perhaps they do not realize just how much benefit their soil derives from cover. So to give them full information on the subject and to convince farmers who have not planted cover crops that they can profit from them, Dr. Thornton emphasized these points:

A good cover crop protects soil from wind and water erosion, helps to hold soil in place, and holds rain water on the land for later use by plants.

It prevents loss of nutrients by leaching, retarding downward movement of water and enabling the plants to take up a large portion. When the cover crop is plowed under at maturity, the nutrient elements are released for use by the following crop.

Plowed under, a coverage crop adds organic matter to the soil, brings nutrient elements from below the surface and deposits them where they can be used by other plants, helps to control weeds, and if the cover crop is an inoculated legume, adds appreciable nitrogen to the soil.

A good cover crop enriches and protects the soil and keeps it productive. The soil being his source of livelihood, no farmer can afford to overlook the cover crop for plowing and catching it.

Wage Increases And Rising Wool Costs To Advance Price Of Suits

NEW YORK, Oct. 13—(AP)—Men's clothing workers are getting a pay boost of around \$5 a week next month—as they start work on your next spring's suit.

It's bound to cost you more to get in the Easter Parade, clothing men say. And it worries them. Some think you may be wearing fewer all-wool suits in the future—and more made all, or in part, or synthetic. Perhaps only 30 per cent of the expected price hike of \$5 to \$10 a suit will be due to rising labor costs, suit makers say. World wool shortages and defense stockpiling plans will take a heavier toll of your pocketbook.

The price of raw wool has gone to record highs in Australia. The world is consuming more fine apparel wool than it is producing—cutting away the last of the stockpiles built up in World War II. Now the U. S. government is conferring with Australian and British, trying to get the Australians to let us have first pick of around 1 1/2 million bales of wool for defense stockpiling.

And they are worrying about civilian reaction to rising suit prices. Some say the price of suits will be going up faster next year than the rate of gain on retail sales must fall—if tailors stick to all-wool suits. So they are eyeing synthetic fabrics. J. P. Stevens, Jr., president of the textile firm bearing his name, told the clothing manufacturers' association of the U. S. A. this week: "The next few years will determine whether wool will go the way of silk." At the same meeting Arthur G. Wellman, of Nichols & Co., said world output of wool this year would probably be about 4.2 million pounds, but that consumption would probably run to 4.5 million pounds. He also urged piecing out the supply of wool by mixing synthetic fibers with it in men's suits.
