Baseball is Germania

Sanford is probably the most baseball conscious town in Florida and there is no youngster over the age of four hereabouts who can't tell you all the rules and who doesn't know all the expressions like bingle, bunt, bagger, muff, clout, tag, steal, and others which go along with baseball.

However, after careful research we have found that we have been suffering under delusions, that Americans really don't know their own game. Recently a couple of U. S. teams on tour in Germany played a contest before 100,000 persons—a crowd much bigger than is ever present at our own World Series—and the following is a description of the game by one of the German reporters:

"Baseball began its successful career in the countries surrounding the Pacific Ocean. Both teams appeared with nine players. The team with red stockings attacked first. . . . The thrower throws the ball at a certain height toward the catcher of his team against the hitters of the adverse team. The catcher must catch the ball if it is not captured by the wooden baton of the hitter. The defending team also had four men who guarded the rhombus and tackled runners, as well as three people who guarded the outlying section of the rhombus in order to capture the ball for their own team. . . . After three invalid throws, a player is caught out, and if the ball is thrown into the rhombus before he finishes his run."

We respectfully submit this new interpretation of baseball to the umpire, and the next time one of the players steps up to the plate and knocks the ball into the outer gardens with his wooden baton for a home run, we suggest that the umpire call it a successful negotiation of the inner rhombus.

Optimistic Words

Persons, who would be pessimistic about the outlook of conditions in Florida, should take new courage in the words spoken by Karl Lehmann, secretary of the Lake County Chamber of Commerce, as reported by the Tavares Citizen:

"Florida has not seen such activity in the past ten years as is now evident in every part of the state." In its own words the Tavares paper continues to name some of these activities which Mr. Lehmann mentioned:

"Fernandina has taken on the aspects of a boom community. Two paper pulp mills have been located there because of the deep water and the vast amount of timber adjacent. Ten million dollars will be spent in the construction of these two pulp mills."

"At Sebring the Seaboard Airline Railroad is building a fifteen mile spur out to a 16,000 acre tract of agricultural land at Lake Istopoga and this land will be marketed this winter."

"In the Lake Okechobee section of the state there is new building and construction going on throughout the area, and a spirit of optimism permeates the people of that area because of the recent heavy investments made by the Federal Government in the construction of dikes and canals to adequately drain these rich farm lands and to give protection in case of storms."

"In the greater Miami area there has been two and a half million dollars worth of building permits issued per month for the last fourteen months. Hundreds of new homes, averaging \$15,000 are being built and will be occupied by the owners. New hotels, apartment houses and theaters have made the largest number of accommodations in the history of that area available this winter and they were comfortably filled."

"The highways of Florida are filled with cars bearing licenses from other states," said the Lake county secretary, "and while they come from many states, notably Alabama, Georgia, the Carolinas, Tennessee and Kentucky, there are more Ohio cars than from any other three states which, it is believed, is due largely to the fine advertising and publicity of the Florida Exhibit at the Great Lakes Exposition in the past two summers."

"Florida had the greatest winter in its history last season, and it will be surpassed this season, according to the opinion of the Lake county secretary."

WASHINGTON DAYBOOK

WASHINGTON—We have studied the situation for some time and it seems that if you weigh more than 200 pounds you are not so likely to get to congress.

This is not an invitation to come forward and buy our obesity cure, for we have none, other than the usual caution to avoid trying to eat up the surplus. Secretary Wallace is charged with the task of eliminating the surplus so don't let any feeling of loyalty along that line induce you to eat yourself out of the congressional eligibility lists.

There are exceptions, of course. But the percentage is low. Off hand we would say that Representative Hobbs of Alabama, one time a Sunday school teacher, would exceed 200 pounds by a fair margin. He is both tall and burly. Representative Doughton of North Carolina might also tip the scales about that poundage for which, not so plump as Hobbs, he is tall and full of framework.

Going over to the senate, the spectator's eye is immediately caught by the massive form of Senator Johnson of Colorado, who is not only one of the biggest of legislators, but also one of the newest. He sort of contradicts the 200-pound theory. It is possible some of the other 200-pounders came to congress before they reached the heavy-duty stage. But Johnson had his 200 pounds with him when he left Colorado.

A quick glance around the senate chamber probably will show also Dietrich of Illinois and perhaps still and stately Ashurst of Arizona as above the 200-pound line.

As to what happens to tenth-of-a-ton members after they get to congress, there might be a division of opinion. The really top-flight jobs seem to go in heavy weights. The late Senator Joe Robinson probably did a shade better than 200. So do Senator Barkley

of Kentucky, Robinson's successor as majority leader, and possibly Senator Harrison of Mississippi, Barkley's defeated rival. But often enough important committee posts are held down by Senator Clegg, chairman of appropriations probably never passed 125 pounds. Senator Pittman, chairman of foreign relations, is tall but slender. Chairman Fletcher of military affairs is light enough to dance on a bear drum.

Returning to the house, we find Speaker Bankhead possibly topping 200, for although not corpulent he is lofty. Floor Leader Sam Rayburn of Texas is a solid block and probably 200 or better. But these two have been there a long time and pictures of them in their freshmen years indicate they acquired plump with experience.

It may be that some heavy gentry out in the districts are planning to make a race of it next year but we caution them that in congress their numbers are few, if not far between.

Chinese Defenders Take Bloody Stand At Northern Pass

By The Associated Press Chinese defenders of the ancient great wall of China took a bloody stand at Nankow Pass, 201 miles northwest of Peking, in the unrequited province of Chahar and Suiyuan.

Chinese sources reported a Japanese detachment had been wiped out. A force of 5000 Japanese troops was reported moving against the pass, gateway to Kipling's capital of Chahar, and the front tablelands westward to Mongolia.

Tragedy raged in Chahar, due to the south, where the killing of a Japanese naval officer and a seaman had brought grave apprehension for the preservation of peace. Officials agreed to settle the incident by diplomatic means.

A Japanese and one Chinese cadet were shot down in a clash yesterday at Lungjiao, a suburb west of Shanghai. The Chinese and Japanese versions differed as to which also opened the first.

Automobile Causes Cyclist To Be Killed

ORLANDO, Aug. 16.—(AP)—Frank Lewis, 65, was killed here early Sunday when his bicycle was run down from behind by an automobile.

County authorities said they were holding a girl who gave her name as Hazel Branch, 18, waitress, and a man listed as William Neal, 25.

Neal, who was riding with the girl, told officers he was asleep in the back of the car at the time of the accident.

The bicycle was dragged more than 200 feet from the point where police found Lewis' body.

THOUSANDS RIOT OVER HALTING OF SERVICES. BERLIN, Aug. 16.—(AP)—Several thousand adherents of the imprisoned Rev. Martin Niemoller clashed with police in front of his church in suburban Dahlem last night in protest against cancellation of evening services. Many were arrested and taken away in lorries, among them the confessional pastor, Von Raabenau, and his wife as well as a number of other pastors and women. The church had been closed, presumably to prevent a demonstration for Niemoller, who is to go on trial Tuesday on charges of inciting disobedience in his campaign against nazification of German Protestantism.

CLAREMONT, Calif., Aug. 10.—(AP)—Ten thousand years ago the giant ground sloth—a clumsy bear-like creature—disputed man's claim to a home in the caves which line the walls of the Grand Canyon.
But the sloth couldn't take it. For reasons still unknown it became extinct.

Today, from a cave undisturbed by man or beast in countless centuries, comes evidence from which California scientists hope to reconstruct the sloth's homelife—perhaps to learn the secret of its passing.

Rampart cave, the sloth's prehistoric home, was discovered a year ago by Willis Evans an Indian archaeologist, who has been in charge of excavations this summer. The expedition he guided was headed by Jerome Laudermilk of Pomona college and financed by the Carnegie Institution.

The scientists found the cave in exactly the condition the 20-foot sloth left it ages ago when they went out in the sunlight of a prehistoric day to die.

The expedition discovered sloth excrement, preserved by the desert atmosphere, which will be analyzed at the college laboratory. The analysis is expected to show what type of early plants formed the sloth's diet and thus possibly aid in determining climatic and geologic conditions of the animal's time.

By automobile, boat and afoot, the excavators covered an extensive, little-known area. From

Rampart cave they continued up the canyon by boat in search of other sloth retreats.
They entered cliff shelters and white men until the rising water of Lake Mead backing up behind miles made them accessible.
Scientists surmise that the Boulder dam for more than 100 sloth weighing between 750 and 2,000 pounds, lived at mid-day in the dark recesses of Rampart cave. In early morning and in the evening they believe, it emerged to forage for food.
Reconstructed skeletons of the sloth show it was built like no animal known to modern man. The largest type weighed a ton or more, stood 12 feet high and was 20 feet or more in length.

Revolt In Ranks Of Rebels Reported In Scattered Places

Artillery Of Franco Shells Own City In Effort To Put Down Rebellious Activity

Brisk Conflicts Being Reported

Rebellion Is Said To Be Spreading Thru Several Provinces

MADRID, Aug. 11.—(AP)—Spanish government sources reported today that Generalissimo Francisco Franco's artillery had shelled his own city of Segovia to put down a revolt in insurgent ranks.

The rebellion was said to be spreading through provinces after provinces.

Government observation posts reported a brisk conflict was going on in the city 43 miles northwest of Madrid. The crackle of machine gun and rifle fire with Segovia, observers reported, could be heard plainly from nearby government lines.

Insurgent artillery batteries were said to have opened fire on their own stronghold of Quila Passos.

Reports from far to the south said that the revolt was widespread in the neighborhood of the city of Granada and that Franco's troops were rebelling against his regime and had used rifles and machine guns in an attack on the city.

Fund Raising Help Pledged By Trade Body

Sanford's Trade Body To Assist In Any Practical Plan To Get Trailer Camp

Assistance to any practical plan that might be formulated for the purpose of raising funds through loans for the construction of a municipally owned and operated trailer camp here on the site overlooking the lake between Palmetto and Hood avenues, was pledged by the directors of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce in their meeting last night.

No plan for raising the approximately \$5,000 which will be required in addition to the amount to be furnished by the City was made last night but members of the Trailer Camp Committee with Mayor Edward Higgins and City Attorney Fred R. Wilson were authorized to devise some practical plan and present it at a special meeting of the Committee next Friday night.

In last night's session Mayor Higgins indicated that the City was probably in a position to furnish 25 to 30 percent of the cost of the camp which the latest preliminary estimates placed at \$8,000 and that the remainder would have to be secured from other sources. He, however, indicated the City was willing to secure the necessary money in the form of loans to be repaid in pro rata amounts to the donors from the proceeds of the camp.

The Mayor also indicated that the City might absorb overhead expenses in the operation of the camp so that all cash receipts could be reverted to the donors thus wiping out the debt within a short time.

According to present indications efforts will probably be made to secure the funds through a fund drive in which all of the merchants of the City will be asked to cooperate.

In discussing the benefits that might be derived from the proposed camp which will accommodate 100 trailers and autos, T. E. Simpson, president of the trade body, re-stated his belief that the camp would be a boon to commercial enterprises in this city, and added that he believed \$1,000 to \$1,500 would be spent in this city weekly by the motels of the road if a modern camp is placed at their disposal.

President Simpson also indicated that efforts would be made to have the camp in operation before the first of November so that the influx of early tourists into this State might be accommodated.

G. E. Rollins, superintendent of the Atlantic Coast Line, in a letter to the Chamber members pointed out the possibilities of extending a personal invitation to retired railroad veterans throughout the nation.

This year, he pointed out, large numbers of railroaders had retired on pensions up to \$120 per month and that a number of these aged men wished to spend their declining years in Florida's sunshine, and Sanford, he continued, being the central Florida terminus for the Atlantic Coast Line would offer an environment which would be homelike to the veterans of the rail. Excellent fishing and hunting as well as other sports offered in this locality would also be a considerable attraction to the pensioners.

Mr. Rollins believed that Mr. Rollins by contacting these men were discussed and Mayor Edward Higgins advised the body that the City might be in a position to make those who wish to build homes here a very enticing offer on City-owned real estate. The matter was referred to the advertisement committee and Mr. Simpson indicated that a special meeting will be called in the near future to devise a plan whereby this class of persons might be extended a special invitation.

Efforts To Alter Men's Attire Are Seen As Failure

Some Ingenuity Produced In Move To Rationalize Clothes

LONDON, Aug. 11.—(AP)—An attempt by the Men's Dress Reform Party to "rationalize" men's clothing has produced some ingenuity and considerable disappointment.

A competition sponsored by the party brought out a strange array of "scientific" costumes. They were designed in an effort to eliminate collar studs, pockets and eye buttons—no win prizes.

Contestants marched by in clothing resembling everything from football jerseys to a half-headed woman in a Spanish ruff. In an effort to make the costumes more practical, judges and spectators, who came to be impressed, stayed to be depressed.

The main objective was to get away from tight, buttoned clothes. "Free the neck" was a cardinal rule. The Men's Dress Reform Party wants "fewer clothes, lighter clothes" and so on and so forth and so on. Emphasis was put on convertible clothes, that is, garments that could be put on or turned inside out.

But the parade chiefly indicated that men will go on sweating at collar buttons and grinding himself in with straps and vests and belts.

First prize of \$200 wasn't a waste. The judges didn't see anything worth that much. Second prize of \$100 went to an evening costume consisting of jacket and vest, a light blue silk shirt and a dark blue cummerbund, all very free and breezy.

Third prize went to an evening costume of a black waistcoat lined with white silk, worn with a shoulder-length tunic which could be adjusted as a scarf and a red cummerbund.

The trouble was that some of the costumes had to be worn with "supporting devices" such as suspenders—an idea severely frowned on. But how to make trousers stay up without buttons or belt is just one of the problems.

Other costumes were a sort of safari outfit of shorts, jacket and knee-length socks; a green dress-like jerkin with a buff blouse; an evening costume that might have come straight out of the eighteenth century—crinoline, breeches and black silk stockings that didn't stay up any too well. One costume can be described only as that of a Hamburg butcher's dress coat with the sleeves cut off.

Nelson Brothers Raise Reward To \$1500 From \$1000

Emphasize Fact That Money Is In Bank And Is Guaranteed

Brother of the late Chamberlain H. Nelson, who died in the local hospital recently as the result of injuries inflicted by an unknown assailant, today hiked the reward for information leading to the apprehension and conviction of the attacker from \$1,000 to \$1,500, it was learned today.

J. P. Nelson of Baton Rouge, La., stated that there might be some doubt in the minds of people in his vicinity as to the payment of the reward to any one who had earned it. To this he replied that the five surviving brothers had already deposited the required funds in a Baton Rouge bank exclusively for this purpose and that the fund was guaranteed.

He also pointed out the fact that under the law of this State any person deserving an advertised reward might force his claim for it.

Soviets Liquidate 72 More Alleged Enemies Of State

MOSCOW, Aug. 11.—(AP)—The execution of 72 alleged "enemies of the state" was reported today by the Russian newspaper, "Izvestia."

The executions followed others in a series but this group was one of the largest to be executed in Soviet Russia's far-flung Siberian purge. Now the total of known executions in the Far Eastern campaign to root out spies and wreckers is 220.

The Iltukh band was identified as made up of Trotskyist rightist terrorists, who wrecked trains along the Siberian Railway at the height of the Japanese intelligence service this week.

Japanese Naval Ships Anchored In River At Shanghai's Door In New War Crisis

Many Blue Jackets Patrolling Roads

2 Aircraft Carriers Stand By Off Forts Protecting Harbor

By The Associated Press—Japanese dispatches reported a Sino-Japanese battle at the ancient Nankow pass resulted today in a rout for the troops of China's central army.

A heavy Japanese artillery bombardment set the Nankow city afire, said the dispatches.

In the newest war crisis Japan checked Shanghai's Whangpoo River with a score of warships, scattered others to the mouth of the Yangtze and poured between 600 and 1,000 bluejackets into Shanghai.

Two aircraft carriers, said unconfirmed reports, were waiting beyond the Wossung forts which lie at the confluence of the Whangpoo and Yangtze rivers.

Japanese naval authorities said events that were brought to a head by the Hung Jan airport slaying of a Japanese naval commander and his officers "mean that Japan's navy effort in China must be increased."

After sharp fighting with considerable losses to both sides, the Chinese troops were reported to have fled northward tearing up the tracks of the Peiping-Suiyuan railroad as they went to hinder Japanese advances. The railroad runs through Nankow.

The Chinese troops were from the 89th Division of the central army. Other troops of that division were reported to be threatening an attack along the southern western frontier of Jui-chi province about 150 miles east of Peiping.

Candy Production Shows Large Gain

WASHINGTON, Aug. 11.—(AP)—Americans ate more candy last year than in any previous year on record.

The Commerce Department said today consumption last year averaged 16 pounds for every person in the country, compared with the former record high of 15.7 pounds in 1929.

Candy production last year was set at 2,841,000,000 pounds, valued at \$309,291,000.
