

# Sanford Takes 6th Place On 12-3 Blasting Of Cocoa

## Redbirds Invade Cocoa Seeking 3rd Straight Win This Evening

 The blazing bats of the Sanford Cardinals shelled the Cocoa Indians into submission, 12-3, here last night to advance the Redbird front line into sixth place. Dave Leonard, 19-year-old Cardinal rookie from Jacksonville, N. C., made his second start of the year and went the distance, distinguishing himself with a fine seven-inning performance.

Last night's game, played in the Memorial Stadium before a good turnout of 637 fans, boosted Sanford's home paid attendance over the 10,000 mark and raised the season's total to 11,444 in 14 games here.

The rollicking Cardinal Gas House gang showered a flurry of base hits and runs on a top contending team for the second straight night, leveling DeLand, 16-8, Monday and blasting Cocoa with 12 more tallies on 13 hits last night. In winning the last two games, Sanford has exploded for exactly 28 runs on 28 hits.

## McCarthy Exhorts Britain Apologize For 'Cheap' Attack

### Senator Denies Slur At Ike And America

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) asserted today that a "sizeable number of 'cheap' flying British flag and 'cheap' flying Red China are actually owned by Chinese Communists."

McCarthy issued this into a Senate speech assailing Clement Attlee, British prime minister and former prime minister for what he termed a "cheap" attack on President Eisenhower and the American people. He called the attack a "cheap" flying British flag and "cheap" flying Red China. He said that the value of British trade with Red China jumped from 74,000 pounds sterling last December to 1,200,000 pounds in January. He said that the trade was in "the sleeve of war" and that it was "killing our American young men" in Korea.

Conservative party members of the British Parliament, McCarthy said, sat silently last Tuesday while Attlee made "one of the most insulting speeches ever made in the House of Commons."

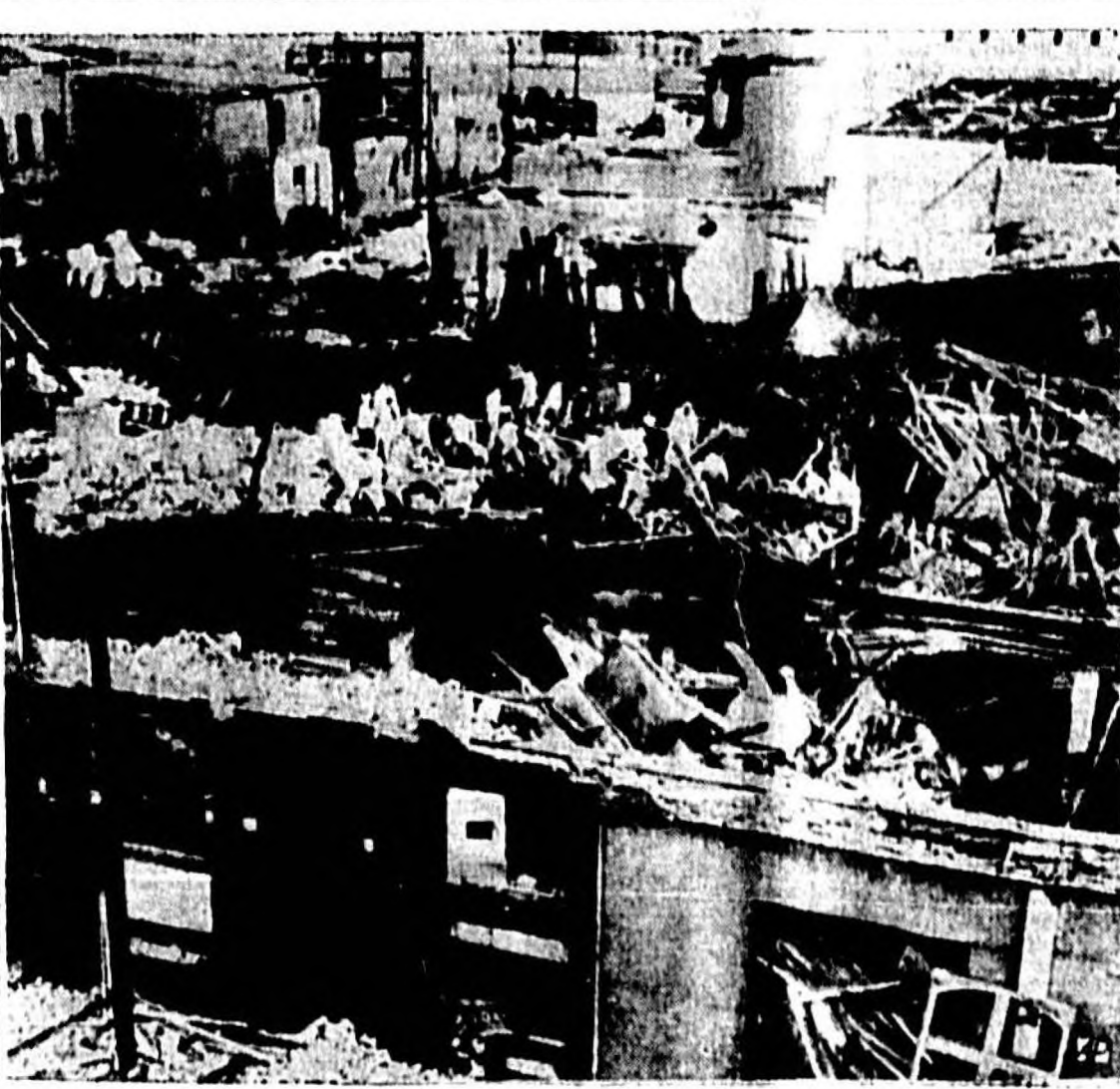

## Senate Passes Bill Increasing Numbers In Teacher Training

### Scholarships' Value Is Also Stepped Up

TALLAHASSEE (AP)—The Senate today passed HB1101 relating to the Sanford city limits, HB1191 relating to the compensation of Sanford Mayor and City Commissioners, and HB1117 relating to Sanford boundaries. And the Senate passed SB655 authorizing Seminole hospital bonds and SB656 authorizing Seminole hospital.

TALLAHASSEE (AP)—The Senate today passed 30-0, and sent to the House a bill increasing the number and value of state teaching scholarships.

The measure provides a total of 500 scholarships for teacher training and gives them an annual value of \$200 each. Holders of the scholarships must agree to teach for at least five years in Florida schools.

**Hal Boyle's Column**  
By HAL BOYLE

**KANSAS CITY (U.)**—Once a girl is a mother she just has to keep on growing something.

Well, if you ever bought a house and tried to grow grass around it, I'd like to have you meet my mother.

She has been trying to grow grass around a house for more than 30 years. You can't sell her the Brooklyn Bridge, but if you can convince her you grow grass on that bridge she will bargain for the seed.

All Mom started with was the fact of a fair, green, clean lawn—or, in her time, a meadow, quiet and undisturbed. And I suppose she has always had a yearning to get back to the peace of it. So she goes on planting... some day it will be back.

She was the eldest of nine Irish girls and an Irish boy, born on an Irish farm where Irish pride jutted above the stones of Irish poverty. The girls came over to help with the heathen Americas, all nine of them. It was the boy who stayed at home to keep England from owning his Ireland, and killed the stony land and did it there, while his sisters lived across the seas.

And there was a great crowd to greet the girls when they reached the United States—all gathered at Ellis Island, and all trying to get in, too.

I have passed the Statue of Liberty many times in my life, going and coming, and think I own a pass on it. My mother has never taken it for granted. She has never passed it going the other way, and doesn't want to. When she mentions the Statue of Liberty her mouth frames a kiss.

But Mama did bring from Ireland something she is always reaching back to—in her the dream of the fair lawn of youth. She has always kept a green farm thumb in the city, and a sweet growing mind. She has liked to see things come to flower, including her five children, and has never lacked the energy to kick a bud into bloom.

But it is that fair green lawn she yearns for. And so for 30 years she has fought to make a lawn before, behind, and around an eight-room, old-fashioned house here which Dad bought for \$5,000. Mom now threatens to give it away and actually is willing to part with it for a million dollars—cold cash, no sentiment involved.

The spring has been rainy in the Midwest, and the grass has come up in patches. All dogs and children in the neighborhood are afraid of Mama, and they love her, too, because when she is strong she orders them off the patch of lawn of her dreams, and when she is tired she sits down in the old seamy back yard and will talk to them.

Mama has always been that way. When she raises her voice, everybody runs away. When she is weary, everyone wants to situate around her. This is the hardest single fact about one human being: I have ever tried to figure out. She is 65 and I am 42, and I still don't know how she can boss children

and dogs that way, and make them all love her.

She fights that lawn so hard we have to forbid her the lawnmower. She says you can't hire kids today to mow it, but she has always attacked that grass herself, though her face grows red and she has been told not to do it. My sister, Dolores, when she hears her pulling the lawnmower out of the basement, goes down and says, "Mama, don't you know better; stop it."

But nobody can stop Mama from pulling in her tomato plants. Wonderful crop last year. I have offered to take her back for a visit to Ireland, and see again the farm she was born on. She says: "Ireland isn't modern. I would rather see the rest of America."

But you know how passionate a feeling for growth the people from the Old Country have. Mama has had five children, she has been a widow for 15 years, she is 65 years old, and she is down to "a green thumb." But she has to go on raising something.

Just the other day she was tired and sat down on a bench in the back yard. And the things that understand Mama, the children and the dogs that ruin the lawn she is trying to bring back from an over-wet spring, clustered around her.

There is within her such a mixture of "eat-you-get-out-of-here" and "Come-back-you-know-I-love-you." And a little girl from the

# Lake Worth Sues Auditor, Dade Jury Finds Sum Missing

The City of Lake Worth sued a former auditor for \$252,000 Tuesday and at Miami a Dade County Grand Jury asked the city to locate a "missing" \$22,000 from a fund for educational television.

Lake Worth filed suit against J. P. Cochran, its former controller auditor, for \$225,000 damages. It alleges Cochran or his employees negligently failed to show irregularities in city accounts in the audit of Oct. 31, 1952.

The suit was the latest move by Lake Worth to recover \$252,000 which the city commission claims was paid Truman A. Liffey, a broker, for bonds that were never delivered.

It charges that because the audit failed to divulge to city officials a shortage of \$158,172 which they now claim existed at that time E. C. Ewing, city clerk, was permitted to deliver checks for an additional \$100,000 for additional bonds that never were received.

Ewing has since been suspended and the city terminated its contract with Cochran last week.

The Dade County Grand Jury asked the governor to make a detailed audit of the school board particularly regarding school operation and the "missing" \$22,000 from a \$100,000 fund for educational television.

The jury did not go into detail about the \$22,000.

The jury also criticized "unlawful procedure" of ball bond practices in Miami Municipal Courts, charged that some ball bond men and certain attorneys had engaged in "fee splitting" and that certain police officers had been known to "steer" business to them.

It charged that the Miami City Commission spent \$200,000 "illegally" during 1952 by making outright gifts of money to various organizations for conventions and similar purposes.

# Higher Postal Rates On Papers Suggested

**WASHINGTON** — A request to Congress for higher postage rates on newspapers, magazines and advertising material appeared to be in the offing today.

Postmaster General Summerfield, without saying so flatly, indicated to a House appropriations subcommittee that studies now being made pointed towards a recommendation for higher rates on second and third-class matter.

"For a temporary period of at most two years,"

He also indicated, in testimony made public yesterday, he would not be adverse to an arrangement under which the postmaster general, rather than Congress, would fix postal rates.

The department has a current annual deficit of \$42 million dollars and, he said, expects to run \$60 million in the red next fiscal year.

He said only first class mail and the postal savings system show profits.

# Trouble With Ike's Golf Thought Solved

One of his top aides who may not be named tells this story:

Just as the President was about to leave for Burning Tree Golf Club one day his acting special counsel, Bernard M. Shanley, hurried into his office with a matter that demanded immediate attention.

The President dealt with it and when they had finished Shanley said:

"I'm sorry to have held you up, Mr. President. Have a good game." "Thanks, Bern," Eisenhower replied. "My golf would be a lot better if someone would do something about the price of beef."

# ACQUITTED OF MURDER

**MIAMI** — Romer Talamer Johnson, 56, Miami, has been acquitted of murder in the slaying of his estranged wife's sister outside a bar Sept. 12, 1950.

A 12-man Circuit Court Jury brought in a verdict of innocent Tuesday after Johnson testified that Robert Bruce Beaudry, 40, also of Miami, "swiped at me four times with a knife before I shot him."

# Tongays Continue Tour While Police Pursue Evidence

**MIAMI** — The Tongays continued to tour in their yellow Lincoln Convertible today while Miami authorities sought evidence to justify their taking under protection the 30- and 40-year-old members of the couple's three children.

Russell Tongay, husky 36-year-old swimming instructor, is free under \$5,000 bond on a second-degree murder charge in connection with the death of his five-year-old daughter, Kathy. With him are his wife, Betty, and their son, Bubba.

The family drove into Tarpon Springs, on the Florida West Coast, late Tuesday but stayed only an hour and then headed north. Kathy, who died in convulsions last Wednesday, was buried near Tarpon Springs secretly Monday night after private funeral services Saturday.

Meanwhile, Miami Detective Charles H. Sapp and Juvenile Court Probation Officer W. Ira Hazlit sought legal testimony to show that Bubba had been beaten or otherwise mistreated by his parents.

Sapp spent Tuesday out with a police stenographer, ostensibly to gather evidence to support an affidavit he filed with juvenile court last week stating he felt Bubba was in danger of bodily harm and should be taken under the court's protection.

Sapp had no comment on his findings but other officers said the detective felt satisfied he had sufficient testimony to support his request.

Hazlit said so far he had been unable to find any sufficient legal evidence.

Sapp said an autopsy report showed Kathy died of a blow to the stomach but Tongay said the child was injured in a dive from a 33-foot tower.

The Tongays first child, Russell Jr., died in 1945 at the age of 18 months of a head injury. Mrs. Tongay said the child fell down steps in their apartment.

# Attack On Revenue Men Proves Costly

**PENSACOLA** — A former Florida legislator and a Crestview woman drew two-year federal prison sentences today on charges of assaulting and threatening four internal revenue agents.

Federal Judge Dorian A. Devane imposed the sentences on Herbert C. (Hub) Barnhill, 1945 Okaloosa County representative of Crestview, and Mrs. Evie Johnson.

They were convicted by a federal court jury Monday.

The government charged they assaulted the agents with a shotgun at the Johnson home last July when they attempted to collect \$311.51 in back withholding taxes from Barnhill, and to seize his car.

Barnhill said he grabbed the shotgun when he feared the agents might harm Mrs. Johnson.

The Farrages were led to the cave Monday by the whimperings of the colt's mother, a draft horse named Queenie.

"At first we thought the colt was dead," Mrs. Farrage related. "And then we heard him squeal when his mother would nicker."

"He's been moving around down there since we can glimpse him walking past the opening now and then at least we could go in late yesterday."

The colt apparently is about 30 feet from the opening of the cave. Meanwhile, Queenie is standing vigil at a pasture fence nearby but far enough away so that her calls would not further agitate her trapped baby.

# Plot Is Charged To Ruin "Voice" Effect

**NEW YORK** — A witness testified today that cancellation of all Voice of America broadcasts to Latin America at the end of this week was "part of a plan" of William C. Johnson, the Voice's assistant program director who resigned last Friday.

Stephen Balaban, chief of the State Department's Latin America division, told a Senate Foreign Relations subcommittee the scheduled cancellation was "part of a concerted plan of certain persons in power to destroy part of the effect of the Voice."

This is part of a plan, Balaban continued, "of a man who decided that the so-called free world should not be called free world by the Voice of America. That man resigned last Friday. He was Dr. William C. Johnson."

Balaban said the cancellation would mean that radio frequencies assigned to the United States would be open and that "the Soviet Union or any hostile power can seize those frequencies and use them for their own."

## House Group Slices Funds For Agencies

### Labor Department, Welfare Get Cuts

By WILLIAM F. ARBOGAST WASHINGTON (AP)—The House Appropriations Committee today slashed deeply into funds both President Eisenhower and former President Truman requested for the Labor Department and the new Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

It sent to the House floor for debate next week a bill to appropriate \$1,065,581,750 for the two departments and related agencies for the 1954 fiscal year, which starts July 1.

Without counting such fixed expenditures as \$1,340,000,000 for public health, the bill cuts \$100,000,000 from the \$1,340,000,000 total and \$9 per cent from revised estimates of the Eisenhower administration.

The new funds recommended by the committee compare with \$2,096,002,861 requested by Truman and \$2,027,913,470 sought by his successor.

By agencies, here's how the money would be distributed:

Labor Department — \$251,424,000 compared with \$298,818,800 requested by Truman and \$284,915,800 by Eisenhower.

Department of Health, Education and Welfare — \$1,065,581,750 compared with \$1,786,528,701 requested by Truman and \$1,722,844,870 by Eisenhower.

National Labor Relations Board — \$75 million requested by Truman and \$55 million by Eisenhower.

National Merit Board — \$10,000,000 compared with \$11,000,000 requested by Truman and \$1,000,000 by Eisenhower.

Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service — \$3,210,000 compared with \$3,747,500 requested by Truman and \$3,470,000 by Eisenhower.

No cuts were recommended in the \$1,000,000 for grants to states for public assistance payments which are fixed by law.

Compared with the current year's appropriations, the allotments over which the committee had discussion in the Senate are \$100 million less in a report drafted by Rep. Busch (R-Ill), the committee said the affected agencies have been upgrading jobs—giving employees federal titles and more pay for the same work—and demanded that the practice be stopped.

It found fault with handling of the seasonal re-employment program, particularly spending money on a young man who became

## Freedom Gets Boost In Talk By President

### Eisenhower Is Given Degree By College

WILLIAMSBURG, Va. (AP)—President Eisenhower said today "the true way to uphold communism is to understand what freedom means."

Speaking to an audience of about 3,000 persons at the College of William and Mary, the President declared that upholding communism in that way would help give this nation an impregnable defense against it.

Eisenhower also told his audience there is "no security for a free nation in the sword alone." He said security must spring from free hearts and free minds.

The President spoke after receiving an honorary Doctor of Laws degree at ceremonies inaugurated by Alvin Luke Chandler, a rear admiral, as the 22nd president of William and Mary, the nation's second oldest college.

Eisenhower came to historic Williamsburg after a week-long cruise aboard the presidential yacht Williamsburg, and a short motor trip from nearby Yorktown.

He planned to utilize the last cruise of the yacht for a week-end on Chesapeake Bay, including a visit to the Norfolk Naval Base and the Naval Academy at Annapolis, Md., and a chance to confer with staff advisers on the radio address he will deliver Tuesday night on taxes and the budget. The yacht will be turned back to the Navy after this trip for decommissioning as a needless luxury.

## Man Acquitted On Rape Count Jailed Again For Offense

OCALA (AP)—James E. Deas, 20-year-old married man who was acquitted one month ago today by a Circuit Court Jury on a charge of rape, is back in the county jail this time charged with raping a 14-year-old girl Thursday.

Sheriff Don McLeod said the girl and her mother reported the crime to him, advised that the girl was "conditioned physically and emotionally" and is under a physician's care.

When he saw her, the sheriff said, Deas' eyes were bruised and swollen shut and she had other bruises on her face.

She told him Deas struck her in the eye with his fist, and slapped her about the face as she struggled.

She had accepted an offer from Deas to take her home from a local dining place, Sheriff McLeod said, but instead of taking her home Deas drove out on a lonely road. He took her home afterward, McLeod said.

Deas is a draftsman in an engineering firm and the father of two children, one three years old and the other an infant.

The earlier charge against Deas on which he was acquitted, was made by a 15-year-old high school girl.

## Capt. J. L. Chittenden To Be Transferred

Capt. John L. Chittenden, who has been commanding officer of the Sanford Naval Auxiliary Air Station since its reactivation April 26, 1951, has received orders which will transfer him to the Naval War College at Newport, R. I. on Aug. 13.

According to Capt. Chittenden, no replacement has yet been named.

When Capt. Chittenden assumed command of the Air Station two years ago, the field was a home base for propeller-driven, carrier-type fighter planes. Later the station was home for jet fighters and more recently has undergone expansion to accommodate the larger aerial reconnaissance aircraft.

WASHINGTON (AP)—James P. McGranery told House investigators today the Justice Department dismissed a big mail fraud case in 1946 without his knowledge although he was top assistant to attorney General Tom Clark at the time.

## Legislative Leaders Mum On Strategy

Dr. Charles L. Park has been recommended by the Seminole County Medical Society for appointment as trustee on the Seminole County Hospital Board.

Dr. Wade H. Garner, chairman of the Society, who made the announcement, said members of the group felt "every effort should be made to appoint a doctor to the board" to fill the vacancy created by the death of Dr. F. F. Seaman.

## McGranery Says Crummer Case Was Out Of Line

WASHINGTON (AP)—James P. McGranery told House investigators today the Justice Department dismissed a big mail fraud case in 1946 without his knowledge although he was top assistant to attorney General Tom Clark at the time.

He declared the case was not handled in a "normal" manner and expressed the opinion that the department made a "mistake" in dismissing it.

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## RAMPAGING TORNADES

Scientists Don't Know Why But U.S. Is Taking Beating From Bad Storms

By ROBERT GOLDENSTEIN CHICAGO (AP)—Scientists don't know precisely why, but the U. S. is taking a heavy hitting from tornados this year.

The season for twisters, generally running from April through July, got off to a roaring start when tornados struck somewhere on 14 days during April. Another rash, including the disastrous twister that crushed the Waco, Tex., business district, followed in early May.

Since 1916, April has had an average of 8 1/2 tornados days. The last record of a tornado was May 23, 1951.

Tornados are the smallest—but sometimes the most violent—and death-dealing of all storms.

Experts know the weather conditions favorable for breeding these ominous black funnels, but they don't know the exact cause. The U. S. Weather Bureau and Air Force are conducting studies to help them in forecasting their occurrence.

Generally, an explosive situation occurs when a layer of cool, dry air spreads over a thick ground layer of warm, moist air. This warm air is lighter and creates a turbulence when it attempts to rise suddenly.

Affecting a much larger area than the tornado, a Spanish word meaning "twister," are the hurricane or typhoon and the cyclone.
