The Seminole Expressway has announced the closure of several roads for construction of the six-mile Seminole Expressway Project 2 beginning Friday, March 17. These will be PERMANENT closures: Bevier Road at Country Club Road, Bungalow Boulevard just east of Bevier Road, and 2nd Street at Bevier Road.

The closures result from the construction of the northern portion of the Central Florida GreenWay to connect the highway from I-4 just south of the Seminole Towne Center Mall.

Coming May 6: Stairs Theatre

SANFORD — Grand opening ceremonies for the Helen Stairs Theatre are set for May.

A reception will be held at the former Ritz Community Theatre May 6, kicking off a mini-season featuring a play and two concerts.

"We're real excited that we've finally come to this point," said Helen Stairs, President of the Ritz Board of Directors. "We're appreciative of everyone who has

done so much to help us get this done."

The main season will begin in September, and last through April, 2001. The season will include three plays and three concerts.

Nearly \$2 million in public and private funds have been used toward the resus-

vation of the theater, located at 213 Magnolia Avenue.

Members of the non-profit Ritz Community Theatre Inc. have gathered \$978,000 in public grants and \$400,000 in private funds to renovate the theater.

The theater, also previously known as

the Milare Theatre, was constructed in 1921. It housed a state-of-the-art theater with a 30-by-40 foot stage.

The downstairs area will have a total of 311 chairs when the theater opens. Another 641 padded, folding bleachers will be placed in the upstairs balcony area until additional theater chairs are purchased.

Programming at the theater will include touring stage productions, children's theater, film series, musical performances, meetings and training seminars. See Theatre, Page 12A.

Lake Howell student dies in car crash

WINTER PARK — Students at Lake Howell High School consoled each other the day before spring break when they learned another classmate had died.

Joshua Sweetney, a 16-year-old Lake Howell High School sophomore, died at 10:30 a.m. Thursday morning from injuries suffered about 17 hours earlier, after he pulled his sport utility vehicle in front of a garbage truck.

It is the third time this school year a Lake Howell High School student has died from injuries suffered in a traffic accident.

In addition, Joshua is the second Seminole County student

who has died as many weeks in a traffic accident. Both accidents were nearly identical.

Two weeks ago Friday, Seminole High School senior Ryan McCool, 18, was killed when he pulled in front of a dump truck on State Road 66 near Sanford.

"Parents kiss their kids good-bye in the morning, and they assume they'll be home at night," said School Board member Larry Furlong. "I'm not sure if any parent, student or teacher is ever prepared to learn that someone isn't coming home."

Furlong said he is not sure what steps schools can take to try to help students avoid traffic accidents, other than mock DUI crashes and similar steps. See Crash, Page 1A.

Firefighters to get detection devises

SANFORD — Seminole County's EMS/Fire/Rescue is asking for \$270,000 to add a strengthening strut to the vertical stabilizer of its new Air Rescue 3 helicopter and for the purchase of thermal imagers - helmet mounted infrared detection devices.

Commissioner Grant Maloy, who earlier voted against the acquisition of the helicopter, said that he probably will

approve the \$17,000 for the stabilizer and definitely give the go ahead for the helmet mounted infrared detection devices.

"The thermal imagers are high tech breakthroughs that can save lives — those of our fire-fighting and medical personnel and those of residents," Maloy said Friday. The County Commissioners will authorize the purchase when they meet Tuesday.

County Fire Chief Terry Schenk said that Rescue 3 was See County, Page 12A.

Doctors gave Flannagin 'zero chance'

SANFORD — Dana Flannagin was thrown 80 feet from her car in a traffic accident, and doctors initially said she had little chance of survival.

The 22-year-old remained in a coma for six days, and was in the hospital for almost three weeks. But on Friday, Flannagin returned from Orlando Regional Medical Center to her Sanford home on West 5th Street, where she lives with her parents Dixie and Joe Flannagin.

"They told us at the Intensive Care Unit that night she had zero chance of survival, zero," said Dixie Flannagin. "But, she's a fighter. How she survived, I do not know, other than God."

Dana Flannagin requested a walker rather than a wheel chair when she arrived home. Ever the fighter, she wanted to come home on her own terms.

More than a dozen family and friends gathered to welcome her. Flowers and teddy bears decorated the railing of the home's front porch. As she crossed through a paper banner that read "Welcome Home Dana, We Love You," she received a hug from cousin April Raulerson. "Girlfriend, you're home," Raulerson said. "You are home."

A long recovery period is ahead for Flannagin.

Five days a week she will undergo speech therapy, occupational therapy and physical therapy. Doctors do not know at this point See Homecoming, Page 11A.

Jim Perry goes to court Monday

Seminole County's first black judge to be sworn in

Florida Gov. Jeb Bush has appointed Longwood resident Jim Perry to the 18th Judicial Court.

Perry's selection for the bench is significant locally because he will be the first black judge in Seminole County. He'll be sworn in at 9:30 a.m. at Courtroom E of the Seminole County Courthouse. There will be a formal investiture — open

to the public — at 4 p.m. on March 31 at Seminole Community College.

A well-respected attorney with offices in Orlando, Perry's selection is notable for one other reason — he's a Democrat, while the governor comes from the first family of the Republican party.

"I was watching a basketball game on TV the night the governor called," Perry said. "He told me the appointment was mine. He said party affiliation was not important to him. Neither was race. I thanked him for having the courage to choose me."

Perry, 56, leaves the Orlando law firm of Perry & Hicks to enter the judicial field. He

knows most of his fellow judges and has tried cases in their courts.

"I am not a stranger," he said. "My appointment has been received with respect and kindness."

Being the first black judge in Seminole County is "very significant" said Perry.

"It is 2000 and it has taken a long time," he said. "But I'm hardly the Jackie Robinson of Florida judicial life. There are other black judges. There just haven't been any here."

The judge said that he eagerly awaits serving in the judicial system.

"I'm totally aware of the enormity of job. Gov. Bush has See Perry, Page 11A.

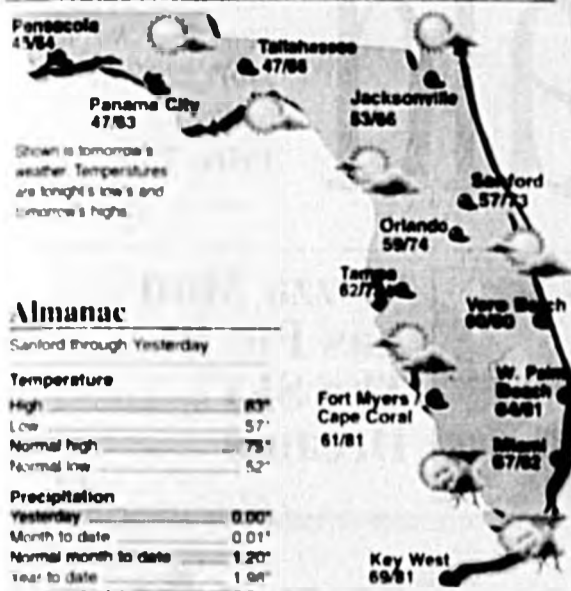


Jim Perry, a respected Central Florida attorney, will become Seminole County's first black judge when he bangs his gavel to order Monday morning.

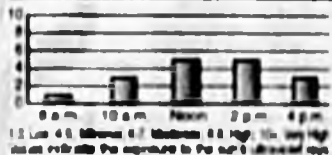

Today's tip: Let the carjacker pay for gas

Gas stations are the car bars of America. We go in thirsty and come out all pumped up — ready to see the U.S.A.

We expect a good deal, of course.

For awhile the good deal was a gallon of gas in the mid-80-cent range. Pump today and it's \$1.65. Pump in June, and it could cost more than \$2 a gallon.

If I'm going to pay \$2 a gallon for gas, I expect someone to check the oil and clean the windshield — courtesies the old-fashioned gas stations gave customers. I used to trust the man who wore the star. Now, I can't find him. It costs 50 cents to pump air in your tires. Sure, air will cost a dollar or more.

Some people are car jacking me. They're suggesting a "Gas Out" — a nationwide gas boycott. They used an AAA Auto Club fax machine to send out an "unofficial" press release. Our fascination with the automobile is under attack. It was once a great moral force in our lives as it

almost entirely eliminated horse-stealing.

Little else today is as American as the automobile. We see the U.S.A. in a Chevrolet. We elected a president named Lincoln. We promoted another one named Ford. In the late 1990s the T-Bird all but replaced the Bald Eagle as national symbol.

Most of us went to drive-in movies where we would turn off the ignition and by our cloth. Today, we go to drive-in banks, drive-in fast food joints, drive-in pharmacies. There's a drive-in church in Orlando. Racers get drive-in blessings in Daytona Beach.

What scares me most about driving is drive-in crashes. We used to take drives for fun. Now, when we drive it's fun only if we survive. Road rage is so intense, a man begged someone to carjack him last week. That, and pay for the gas.

The only people I know who can afford to pay for gas are the

Markham Woods residents. Right now they're more worried someone will build a Catholic school in their neighborhood. One day they may be praying for a fuel cost miracle.

I'm not sure who to blame. We used to blame OPEC — Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries. You know which ones they are. I'm not sure if the APT — American Petroleum Institute — is with us or against us. Same for our government.

My suggestion to the gas crisis is to develop a formula that would fund some of the lessons we thought were automobiles.

Sooner or later Americans, of course, will lose their fascination for cars and embark on a new form of transportation. The first rational adjustment to the insane world will be the elimination of used cars and used car salesmen. Next will be the elimination of new cars and new car salesmen.

This accomplished, we will wait until all the existing cars run themselves down.

No one will complain again about gas prices.

Please don't feed the 'gators

The alligators are back. Now that the days are warmer, they can be seen sunning themselves on Lake Monroe, many near the Sanford shoreline. At times, only the two snouts can be seen. At other times, the entire top portion of the gator is visible, basking in the warmth of the Florida sun.

These comments are not intended for people who have lived in gator land for many years. Rather, they are intended for visitors and newcomers. Also, as a reminder for residents to tell their out-of-town guests about one of our wildlife attractions.

First of all, and most importantly — don't feed the gators. Youngsters have a tendency to toss bread crumbs or hamburger leftovers at the gators trying to draw them closer to shore or get some form of movement out of them. Of course, there are adults who try to do the same. This is not only dangerous, it's illegal. People can be, and have been arrested for feeding alligators.

Wildlife officials will tell you that alligators who receive food tossed from the shore or a boat quickly learn to depend on humans to supply food. Then, when they see a human, perhaps wading in the water or holding an arm or leg over the side of a boat, they approach quickly, often unseen, and attempt to grab what they perceive as food. It could be an arm or a leg or even a child or pet.

Several years ago, a 15-foot alligator had to be physically removed from Lake Monroe by game and wildlife officials. This particular gator, nicknamed "Old Sam" had been a sight on the lakefront for many years. He could always be seen sunning himself in the boat marina area.

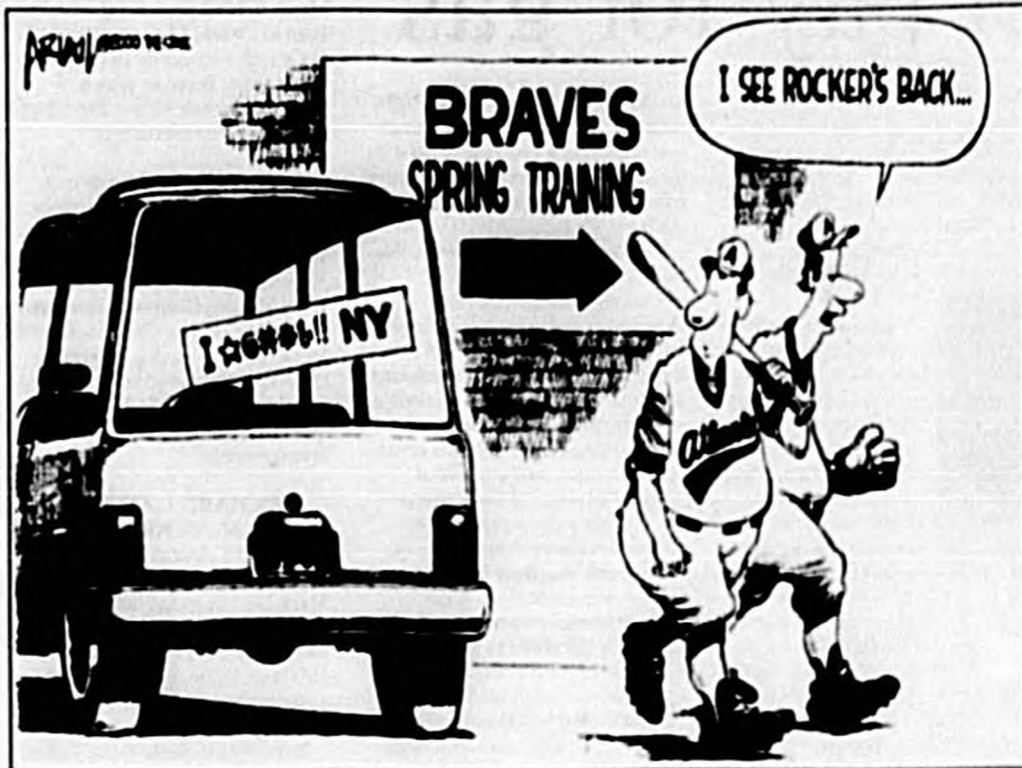
Yet people began to toss food morsels at him. It wasn't long before he came toward a person sitting on the breakwall and appeared ready to attack. All Old Sam wanted was food. Alligators don't know the difference. If it was not common in the water, it must be food.

It cost Old Sam his life, and the Sanford area lost one of its own.

It's a sight to behold, especially in the early morning hours of sunlight. Seeing anywhere from one to one dozen alligators appearing to float on the lake's surface, is something you want your visitors to see.

Many are even surprised to see people windsailing on the lake — often falling in relatively near a gator. Others fish from small boats nearby. They aren't concerned. In most cases, the alligators are more frightened by humans than we are of them. The only thing that will eliminate this fright is the thought of food.

Enjoy our Lake Monroe alligators — but whatever you do — DON'T FEED THEM.

Hedrick offers options for commuter rail

To the editor:

Lately, there have always been locally elected officials who have taken up the cause for public transit when it most needs it, the latest example is U.S. Rep. John Mica, who is recommending the existing rail lines between Volusia and Osceola counties through Orlando be used for a commuter rail operation and utilize existing available federal monies for this purpose. He is to be commended for this bold stand, and even more so for trying to persuade former opponents of light rail, such as the Winter Park City Commission, to change their stand and support this plan. Likewise, there have been officials in Volusia County who have been very enthusiastic about commuter rail recently.

As the organization who almost 20 years ago proposed

using the CSX tracks for a similar metropolitan Orlando system, we have some suggestions to build upon the current endeavor, in no particular order:

- This system should be built in conjunction with the other proposal to have commuter rail run into Lake County and any other proposal which helps build a feasible area-wide system.

- Regarding the route into Lake County, our organization is already backing a proposal to restore the old CSX rail line between Tavares and Leesburg as part of the Orlando-Ocala-Gainesville higher-speed rail passenger service, the commuter system could easily share the new track to run service even deeper into Lake County.

- Regarding routes north into Volusia County, our organization likewise is pushing a proposal to restore the old FEC rail line which ran roughly from near Deltona through Osteen to around Edgewater as part of the Orlando-New Smyrna Beach-Daytona Beach-Jacksonville higher-speed rail passenger ser-

vice, so not only could you have commuter service to Deland on the existing track but also to Daytona over the new track.

- In the south, the system should be extended to run either to Haines City, Winter Haven or Lakeland, where the service can be linked to proposed commuter service out of Tampa.

- There currently exists a rail line running from Taft by the south end of Orlando International Airport over to the OUC power plants; this line could be easily adapted to commuter service and provide a direct rail-air link in our broader community.

- Within our existing communities, bus service needs to be dramatically expanded to interlink with the rail systems as well as provide more frequent service, say at least every 15 minutes during rush hours and more frequently than currently run-off peak. LYNX, for example, would need over 200 additional buses. VOIRAN would need more service as well, not to mention other communities, such as Winter

Haven, who just established a transit system.

- To expand the bus system, as well as do the rail operation likely will require additional dollars from both the state and local governments, which should either come from monies previously designated to build more and wider highways (preferred since you can't build your way out of traffic congestion and urban sprawl), surplus funds or additional taxes/fees, but from somewhere it will have to be paid.

The elected officials and citizens of our area are being given another golden opportunity to solve one of the most pressing problems in the area: there may not be other opportunities for large amounts of federal aid to help in this endeavor. Citizens need to let their elected officials know that this time there should not be roadblocks thrown in the path of these trains and we need to move full steam ahead.

Gore vs. Bush: A prediction of what's to come

battle cry.

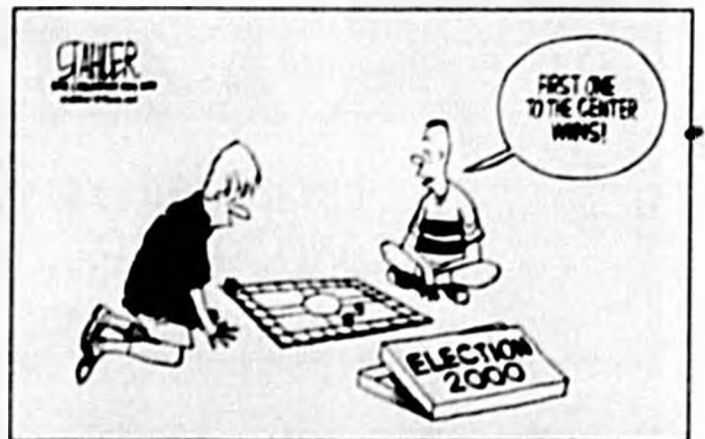

February ends in record numbers for airport

SANFORD — A record number of domestic passengers came through the Orlando Sanford Airport in February. Airport officials announced Thursday that a record total of 12,381 domestic passengers came through the airport in February, an increase of 1.165 percent over February 1999.

Traffic in February alone represented 20 percent of total domestic traffic last year. For all of 1999, 61,051 domestic passengers went through the airport.

Meanwhile, international traffic is also holding steady compared to last year. Total airport traffic so far this year is 86,202, an increase of 26.12 percent over the first two months of 1999.

Airport officials credit much of the

increase to Pan American Airways' service between Portsmouth, N.H., and the Chicago-Gary Airport to Sanford, which was initiated in October 1999.

Flights operate six days per week, using 149-seat B727 aircraft. Pan Am President Dave Fink said the airline's performance into Sanford has exceeded expectations.

"We continue to be impressed with the loads of our flights into Orlando Sanford Airport," Fink said. "Bookings for the rest of March and beyond also appear very strong."

Another new Pan Am route began March 1, with service from Bangor, Maine to Portsmouth, then on to Sanford.

The airport recently began a \$25 million terminal expansion project that will provide Pan Am and other domestic carriers with a two-level terminal and seven gates.

The project is being funded through public and private sources and will not impact the airport's current rates and charges, said airport director Victor White.

Completion of the first wide body international gate position is expected in June, with total project completion expected in December.

"Pan Am's success in serving the Orlando market through Sanford validates the need for a modern domestic terminal capable of offering scheduled airlines and their passengers a very high level of service," said Larry Gouldfroy, President of Orlando Sanford International Airport Management, which operates the domestic and international terminals.

The airport has experienced rapid growth during the last five years. In 1994,

22,679 total passengers passed through the airport. In 1996, the first year that British charter service began, the number of passengers increased to 636,360.

By 1998, 1.3 million total passengers came through the airport, primarily on British charters.

However, in 1999 the airport lost two key British charter services. Britannia and Calsonair airlines departed to the Orlando International Airport. Combined, the two airlines had accounted for 30 percent of the airport's passengers.

Because of the loss of the two airlines, in 1999 the airport served 911,000 passengers.

Calsonair Airlines will return service to the Sanford airport in April.

Meanwhile, airport officials continue to recruit additional domestic and international carriers.

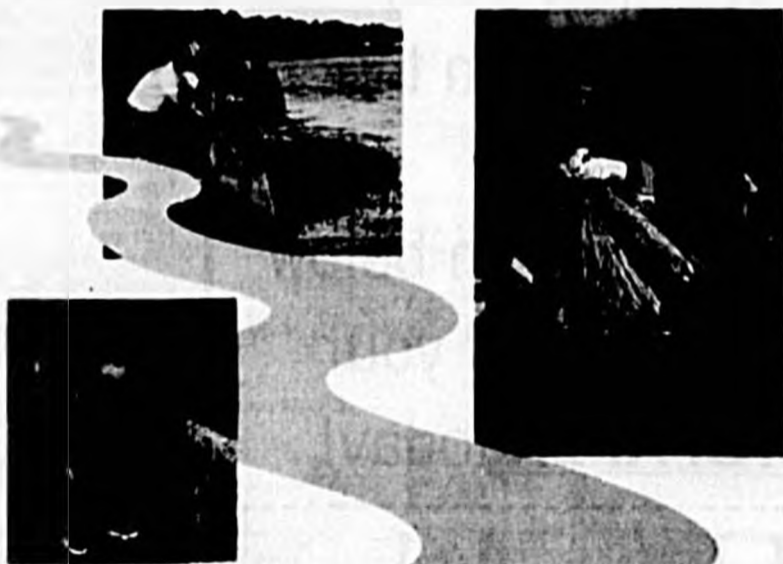

The Way We Were: Sadie Hawkins Day

Many of you who attended Seminole High School will remember the fun we had each year on Sadie Hawkins Day. In fact, some sponsoring groups thought it was such a big success that they held the event on other years, too. The Celery Fed of Feb. 27, 1941, states that "We done had so much fun last year, the Celery Fed staff is gonna run it again this time." The Student Council was also helping to organize it.

In case you don't remember the origin of Sadie Hawkins Day, it came from a story line in the comic strip "Lil' Abner" by Al Capp. These characters lived in Dogpatch, Ky. Sadie Hawkins was unable to get a husband in the usual way, so her father decided to hold a race. The contestants were all of the eligible bachelors of Dogpatch; the man whom Sadie caught was to be her husband. It was evidently a success, so every Feb. 29, the hillbillies held a Sadie Hawkins Day to give their unfortunate daughters a chance to marry.

Seminole High School latched onto this idea, which was a good reason to have a day of fun. The main event was "The Race" with Marryin' Sam there to hitch the girls with their catch. Other events

of the day included a pie eating contest and tug of war pitting the seniors and sophomores against the juniors and freshmen. Classes and clubs would have booths of various types which helped them raise money. Then there was the Girl Break Dance that night.

I remember that there was a teacher walk out in February 1968 so Sadie Hawkins Day was postponed until March 29 that year. And the Girls Future Teacher Club, of which I was sponsor, sold cold drinks at both the 1964 and 1968 events.

The articles in the 1941 Celery Fed telling about Sadie Hawkins Day were written in what the author considered to be a hillbilly dialect. Instead of punishing you with this, I will translate into ordinary English.

Sadie Hawkins Day Rules
This Celery Fed listed rules for Sadie Hawkins Day which was to be held Feb. 28, 1941. Some of these were:

1. Every student comes to school dressed as various Lil' Abner characters. Everyone not dressed as a hick will be punished.
2. All people able to grow beards, please do so.
3. All girls who are fast enough to catch one of the handsome males must make it

official by presenting him to a teacher to receive a certificate.

4. After this official introduction, said gal gives said boy a bouquet of vegetables to wear on his lapel.

5. All you strung gals drag your man to the dance in the gym for only 25 cents.

6. All gentlemen who run too fast for the fair ones to please come to the dance because we want you there.

7. Everyone is allowed to chew his favorite brand; freshmen are limited to bubblegum.

8. No cursing will be tolerated and no spitting where there ain't spittoon.

9. The most important is to mind your manners and try to be the boy or girl your mother thinks you are.

Other Events of the Day:
In a column entitled "Dear Alby" there was further information.

The class periods would be shortened to 45 minutes each with only one lunch period.

In addition to the other activities, there would be a program in the auditorium.

Herman Middleton, Edward Marshall, Mary Lodge and Mary Alice Temple were to present a play "Pink and Patches" and the Pippin sisters (Gladys and Elizabeth) would sing a duet. Nell Stewart was to shine in a hillbilly dance with back up dancers Lois Caldwell, Helen Hitchison, Marcia Proctor, Elizabeth Whigham, Lucille Hall, and Dot Kader. "Basin Street Blues"

would be sung by Norma Wolfer.

The Inquiring Reader
The question that was asked the girls was "What kind of a boy do you want to catch during the race?"

Erma Doudney: "I want to catch a crazy cute little boy that just turned 17."

Nell Stewart: "A good looking brunette who is a good dancer."

Dorothy Kader: "I'm not particular, although a blond about 5'10" tall would fill the bill if he doesn't run too fast."

Elizabeth Whigham: "A blond boy who has Chemistry first period."

Natalie True: "A brunette who was a full back on the football team."

The boys were asked "What kind of a girl do you want to catch you?"

Mack Cleveland: "A crazy cute girl who hasn't much sense and who would be a lot of fun at the dance."

Bill Barron: "A brunette who recently changed to Biology from Mrs. Fort."

Clifford Proctor: "Anybody who is sucker enough to catch me."

1952 Sadie Hawkins Day

I was a sophomore at SHS during the 1952 Leap Year, that year there was a contest during the day to select Daisy Mae and Lil' Abner with the winners being Lucia Goff and Hank McLaurin. Roger Harris, faculty member, was marrying Sam. Wise Hardin won the pie eating contest with Jimmie Fox coming in second. The juniors and freshmen won the tug of war and several on both sides got pulled through the mud puddle.

The girl break dance was held in the gym that year. A note in my diary states that the last dance was a square dance which lasted about 20 minutes. I kept ending up with some fellow I didn't know who would swing me round and round until I got dizzy. I thought it would never end!

The dance and the entire day was loads of fun!

Census 2000 begins gathering information in Seminole County

But sheriff warns citizens to watch out for scam artists

The United States Census Bureau has started the 2000 Census in our area. The Seminole County Sheriff's Office urges all residents to cooperate with this vital process, because the information collected will be beneficial to us all.

However, there may be some unscrupulous people who may try to take advantage of this process by posing as Census Takers. For this reason, the Census Bureau and the Sheriff's Office present the following information and safety tips to remind residents to be on alert and report all suspicious activities.

- THE AUTHORIZED CENSUS TAKER WILL:**
- Wear identification cards indicating they are Census Enumerators.
 - Be working seven days a week and may work into the evening hours in order to talk with residents who are working all day.
 - Have identifying placards on their vehicles when parked in neighborhoods. If they can not make contact with the resident, a calling card will be left at the door.
 - Be interviewing businesses as well as private residences.
 - Be polite and respectful.
- THE AUTHORIZED CENSUS TAKER WILL NOT:**
- Demand entry into your

- home.
- Tell you, "You are required by Federal Law and MUST answer my questions."
 - Ask for your Social Security number.
 - Ask for your credit card numbers.
 - Ask for you bank account numbers.
- When approached by a Census Enumerator, be alert to the above facts. If you doubt the validity of the Census Taker, you can call the U.S. Census Bureau Office located at 1614 W. Airport Blvd., Sanford, at 407-322-9629 any time.
- You can also call the Sheriff's Office Crime Prevention Unit at 407-465-4977 for additional information on this advisory.

placed great trust in me," Perry said. "He has shown that he is committed to diversity and excellence on the bench. I intend to rule in a fair and impartial manner. This is a new level for me."

Perry's journey in life began in Newbern, a coastal town in North Carolina. His dad completed only four years of school, his mom two years.

"We were poor," Perry said, "but not impoverished."

One of three children, Perry was a two-sport star and vice president of the student body at Newbern High School.

He played football and basketball at St. Augustine College in Raleigh, N.C., was commissioned an Army lieutenant and

served in Viet Nam. On his discharge, he went to law school at Columbia University.

In 1974, Perry and his wife, Adrienne came to Florida. She was mayor of Longwood and ran for county commissioner. The Perrys have three children — two boys and a girl.

Perry helped found the Jackie Robinson Little League in Orlando. He sings in the choir at Carter Tabernacle Church in Orlando. At 6-foot-4, he'll strike an imposing figure in his judicial role.

"If anyone deserved a judgeship, Jim was the one," said Reginald Hicks, Perry's law partner.

The Rev. Kevin Sraaj, pastor at Cornerstone Baptist Church and a former member of the 9th

Circuit Court Judicial Nominating Commission, said Perry's appointment was great news for Seminole County.

"It would suggest, too, that the governor is actually serious about diversity and inclusion," Sraaj said.

whether she will fully recover from head injuries suffered in the accident.

In addition, she also suffered a broken left leg, six broken ribs, a punctured right lung, and severe skin abrasions to her back. Doctors had to place 152 stitches in her head following the accident.

"She's come a long way," Raulerson said. "We're just glad she's home. She's really loved by a lot of people, and well liked. She came home a little bit early, but she's a fighter."

Having undergone about six hours of therapy per day in order to come home, Flannagin appeared remarkably strong as she made her way into the peace of the family living room.

"This is a celebration," Dixie Flannagin said. "We're taking her home from the hospital with the balloons, flowers and teddy bear, just like we did 22 years ago when she was born. She's alive, and that's all we care about."

On the night of the Feb. 21 accident, Flannagin had a green light as she proceeded through the intersection of 3rd Street and French Avenue at about 11 p.m. However, Sanford police said Terrence Green, 16, of 112 Castlebrewer Court in Sanford, ran a red light and struck Flannagin's car, causing her to

be ejected.

Sanford police attempted to stop Green for speeding prior to the accident. However, Green, who has a criminal history that includes kidnapping, sale of cocaine and two charges for possession of cocaine, eluded the officers.

Because the speeding infraction did not warrant a high speed chase, the emergency lights of the police vehicle were turned off. Officers notified dispatch that they had "shut down" their attempted traffic stop while at the same time giving the last known direction of travel, authorities said.

Green continued to travel at a high rate of speed and ran the traffic light at French and 3rd Street, striking Flannagin's car, police said.

Sanford police spokeswoman Cleo Cohen said officers do not engage in a high speed chase for a traffic infraction. She said high-speed chases should only occur if officers are trying to apprehend a suspect who has committed a forcible felony.

"People ask us if we are angry with the police, and the answer is no," Dixie Flannagin said. "People need to remember that this boy who did this is a criminal. He took our family, and he turned it upside down. Now, our focus is on putting our family back together again."

A computer dispatcher for Pacesetter Personnel, Flannagin is single, and does not have any children. However, her 18-year-old sister Brandi Flannagin is due to give birth in two weeks to a girl.

"When Dana woke up from her coma she said 'if Brandi had the baby I'm going to kick her butt,'" Dixie Flannagin said. "I was like, 'oh my God, you remembered.' She said 'of course I remember.'"


When Flannagin was ready to leave intensive care, she was transferred to the Hubbard House next to ORMC. Her parents have also been staying at the Hubbard House.

"There's a kitchen where the mommas go to console each other and to cry," Dixie Flannagin said. "We're so grateful to everything they did for us."

Medical bills have reached \$142,000. Insurance through Pacesetter Personnel pays for part of the bills. The company has also been providing transportation and other assistance to the Flannagin family.

The family has established a trust fund in Dana Flannagin's name at First Union.

"It's only money," Dixie Flannagin said. "We're going to find a way through this. We always do."

already being taken.

"With the rapid growth in the county there are more and more cars on the road everyday," Furlong said. "Maybe we should take steps to train kids better, and instill awareness of the need to pay attention on the road."

Chief Deputy Sheriff Steve Harriett said that school resource officers constantly remind student drivers about the dangers on the road. "We drive for survival in these times," Harriett said. "All of us have to be fully alert. We need what I call 360-degree perspective."

He said that adults who learned to drive years ago learned on smaller roads.

"Today, kids have to go out on 6- or 8-lane highways, they go on ramps and in busy streets

we didn't experience until we were much older and wiser," Harriett said. "There aren't safe driving programs and instruction at schools like there used to be. Driver's Ed was mandatory when I went to school."

Winter Springs police said Joshua, who was a member of the school's soccer team, probably never saw what hit him.

The garbage truck driver, Ricardo Rodriguez, 33, of Orlando, and witnesses told police Joshua was turning onto County Road 419 from Edgemon Avenue in Winter Springs. He stopped, but never looked left before pulling into the intersection, according to police.

Police said that it appears Rodriguez, who drives for Waste Management, Inc., was not going over the 55 mph speed limit. The truck had no

mechanical problems that would have contributed to the accident.

Joshua's death gave the day before spring break on Thursday a somber tone for students at Lake Howell. Sadly, the students have dealt with two previous fatal traffic accidents this school year.

When the school year was just beginning, Christopher Jean Baptiste, a 15-year-old Lake Howell sophomore, and his 18-year-old brother Gabriel, who graduated from Lake Howell, died in an Aug. 21 car accident.

Then in December, Braxton Chary, 15, died from injuries suffered when he was struck by a car while riding his bicycle.

Head-on collision with school bus leaves one dead

One woman died and another was seriously injured Friday when their car collided head-on with a school bus. obtained at basically no cost (military surplus) to the county and was refurbished with developer commitment money. The county's costs come from maintenance and for fuel. There was an additional cost of \$34,000

that would be split by the Sheriff's Office and Public Safety.

The helicopter has been in use since April 1999. The additional cost for the tail section of the helicopter came from an "unforeseen" Airworthiness

Directive from the Federal Aviation Agency.

Chief Deputy Sheriff Steve Harriett said that Air Rescue 3 has transported one or more people to Orlando Regional Medical Center.

"A number of lives have been

saved," he said. "More lives and homes have been saved when the helicopter is used during dry spells and there is a threat of wild fires."

The thermal imagers, Schenk said, are devices that are used to prevent loss of lives and prop-

erty. Firefighters who are equipped with these devices are able to locate and rescue victims in little to no visibility fire/smoke situations and to determine if fire has extended into attic or wall spaces.

The imagers are expensive —

the \$260,000 to purchase 14 imagers, with extended warranty.

"Other counties and municipalities are ahead of us — they're using their imagers already," Makry said.

Pie in the Sky

Five years ago, Ted Cranias took up the family tradition. Today, he's got best pizza in town and a restaurant that's attracting people to downtown Sanford.

Take a walk in downtown Sanford, and you see why newcomers are excited about what the future holds for the Celery City. A decade ago, downtown held only memories of its former glory. Sure, Knight's Shoe Store and the Colonial Room continued to draw loyal customers, but like most small towns across the nation, Sanford's "old city" area was dying. Today, downtown Sanford is showing signs of its old hustle and bustle. While it may never regain the vibrancy of the 1950s, the creation of new, high-tech businesses like Miracorn and the variety of shops and restaurants along First Street are pumping new energy into downtown.

One of those making his mark in the downtown business community is Ted Cranias, owner of Angelo's Pizzeria & Family Restaurant. While Cranias is the first to say he is not solely responsible for the rebirth of downtown, his business values and optimism are typical of those who have been successful. The youngest of six children, Ted was born into a family with a long tradition in the independent restaurant business. As close as he can figure, 25 different restaurants have been influenced by the Cranias family. Christo's Family Diner in Lake Mary was just one of his father's popular restaurants. In fact, the Sanford branch of that restaurant — Christo's Classic — was located where Angelo's operates today.

In the early 1960s Ted's father, wanted a slower pace during his golden years, and he closed Christo's Classic. He leased the space to another business that soon closed.

With an empty building and siblings involved with other ventures, the family turned to Ted to carry on the restaurant tradition.

"It was Christmas of 1995 when my brothers came to me and said, 'Someone needs to open a restaurant in downtown Sanford,'" Cranias said. "At the time I was an area manager for Enterprise Rent-A-Car."

"So me and my cousin, Angelo — thus the name — opened the restaurant," said Ted. Though he eventually bought Angelo's share of the business, the duo began, making much needed repairs and renovations before opening their doors to the public. Surprisingly, that's where Ted focused his energy — not the menu.

"The last thing I did was make the menu," said Ted. "In fact, I forgot about the menu until a couple of days before we opened. I had to sit down and scratch one out. But I knew all along that the menu, the food wasn't going to be the problem. Restaurants have been my family's livelihood for so long I knew the food would be easy."

Well, sort of. While Ted had plenty of experience — and lots of expertise — from family members to fall back on — he had never cooked a pizza. But he had several friends who were in the pizza business, and they gave him pointers. He quickly picked up the techniques and was baking quality pies in no time.

There were other difficulties, too, like what to do about the pizza dough. "I didn't have a machine to actually make the dough," he explained. "You ever had to knead dough by hand? It's really hard."

Advice from one of his brothers, led Ted to make a deal to buy dough from Donato's in Altamonte Springs.

"That was kind of a heads-up after a while, though," he explained. "We had to drive to Altamonte every day. Plus, it was costing us a lot more than what we could make our own for. Then there was a couple of weekends we ran out of dough and had to make it by hand."

It took about a year, but Ted was able put aside some and buy a mixer to make his own dough. While the mixer let him create his own special dough and helped boost the profit margin, the restaurant was not yet a success. Lunch crowds were getting bigger, volume was increasing, but bills were beginning to pile up.

"You got to remember, there wasn't a lot in downtown Sanford," Ted said. "And there was nothing really to attract people downtown or to the restaurant. We didn't have an awning. There was nothing to make the building stand out. Basically we just had a door."

Ted knew he needed to get customers through the door, but you can't get 'em through the door if you don't open it.

"I was behind on my bills and it was getting tough," Ted recalls. "I came in one morning, and they had shut off the power."

The power shut down put Ted in a Catch-22. Without power he couldn't open, and he couldn't open without power.

Building a better future

DePew leads the way for Seminole's Habitat for Humanity

Nancy DePew had just returned from church on Ash Wednesday. She had ashes on her forehead and a smile on her face. For the past year, DePew has been the executive director at Habitat for Humanity in Seminole County. She held the same job in Flagler County. An energetic woman, her whole life centers around the Habitat program — building homes, building lives. A Habitat home will be dedicated this weekend in Sanford. As many as eight will be built this year. DePew, her staff and a volunteer force now work in a spacious office at the SunTrust bank building on U.S. Highway 17-92 in Sanford. SunTrust donated the space to Habitat. "We were going to have a \$1 a year deal," DePew said. "But SunTrust gave us back the dollar." Here's Russ White's interview with Nancy DePew.



Q. How did the SunTrust rental agreement come about?

A. When we were told there was space, we asked SunTrust what could be done. Claire Wankel, the vice president of the office here, came back with

incredible news. It happened the Friday after Thanksgiving. They not only gave us the office but they allowed us to use their desks, chairs, everything. These are lovely people. We're very grateful.

Q. When was the Seminole County Habitat for Humanity started?

A. This office was established in 1991. Diann Auker, our director of community outreach, has been here all the time. She was on the original Board. We've provided 39 homes. We'll make it 40 with a home being dedicated this weekend on Cedar Avenue in Sanford.

Q. Where are the Habitat homes in the county?

A. The majority are in the Sanford area — where

there is so much need. There are others in Altamonte Springs, Winter Springs and Oviedo. We'll be building for the first time this year in Geneva.

Q. Who qualifies for a Habitat home?

A. Our families must meet specific financial guidelines. They must have been a resident of Seminole County for six months. You have to be an available partner, which requires 500 hours of sweat equity at the job site or at someone else's site. You may also work in our Thrift Store. You must have the money to pay your mortgage — \$300 or less a month. Each family purchases the house with a 20-year no interest mortgage. Your current housing is, of course, inadequate, which is why you need assistance.

Q. How do others feel about Habitat homes in their neighborhood?

A. They should like it. A Habitat home means more tax dollars. Habitat homes are well built. When Andrew destroyed all those homes two years ago, the Habitat homes in the same area held up well.



Q. How many are on your waiting list?

A. We have eight families waiting for homes but three are going to be available soon. It takes 16 weeks on an average to build a Habitat home. We've had two all-female built homes. This includes roofing, dry wall, painting, the works.

Q. We understand you recently did a Habitat playhouse?

A. Yes, our own Bob Saunders built the playhouse with help and materials supplied by Lake Mary Home Depot. Home Depot also arranged delivery of what we called our Habi"tot" playhouse. Kristen Smith of Orange City won the playhouse for her ninth birthday.

Q. Do you receive anything from Seminole County?

A. For the past two years, the county has given Habitat a \$25,000 grant. County staff and the commissioners have been kind. Sanford Mayor Larry Dale has gone to a couple of our Habitat dedications.

Q. What are your needs?

A. We always need volunteers and we funding. The more we get of each the more homes we can build. Those who wish to help can visit us or call (407) 328-9717.

One of the high points of this year's festival was the Civil War encampment. Company H of the 37th Alabama "Hardy's Brigade," pitched its tents and displayed its canon and their guns. Their clothes were all authentic from 1864 or authentic reproductions. An authentic reproduction is an original made with the same materials the originals were made from. For instance, to be an authentic reproduction, a button must be made from horn, mother-of-pearl, wood, tin or glass. They didn't have plastic buttons in 1864. Company H treated the audience to some authentic drills, including authentic rifle fire with their black powder guns. Joining the 37th Alabama was Civil War surgeon John Higgins. This weekend, he was a Confederate, but he also attends reenactment as a Union officer. His instruments are authentic Civil War medical instruments.

There were other demonstrations at Olde Lake Mary Days. David Wolfe set up his Native American lean to and demonstrated flint knapping. Flint knapping is the art of making arrowheads by hand. George

C. Scott (the carver, not the actor) was once again in the Frank Evans Center demonstrating how to make flowers from wood. He also showed attendees how to weave with palmetto fronds.

For the first year, Olde Lake Mary Days was attended by the Easter Bunny and Smokey Bear. It was quite a coup, courtesy of Lake Mary Historical Commissioner Jan Blackwelder. 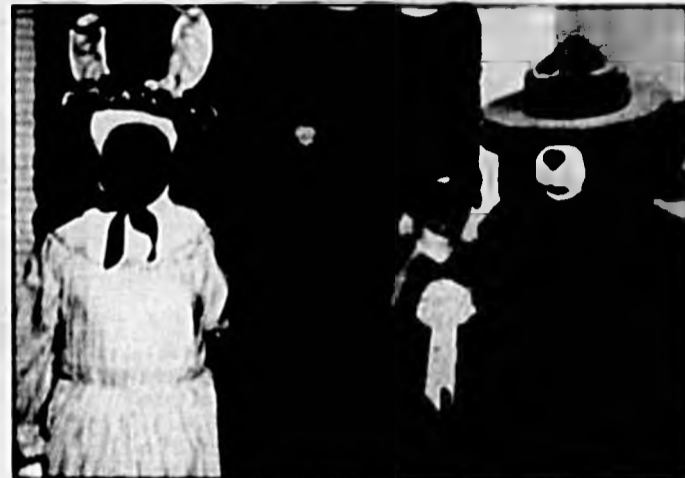
