## Kilgore Declares German Economy Menace To World

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22, (P)—Senator—Harley—Kilgore—has wained that German economy now is a greater menace to the world than it was in 1939.

The West Virginia Democrat's allegation was contained in a statement charging that certain key American officials have boistered up Nazism in Germany's political and economic life. Kilgore is chairman of the Senate Military Affairs Subcommittee which has been holding public hearings on the demobilization of German war industry. dustry.

Kilgore, who did not name these officials, said they were members of the military governmembers of the military government in Germany, and were connected with enterprises that had had close pre-war ties with Nazis. The West Virginian further declared that the reluctance of these persons to carry out the Potsdam Agreement has been demonstrated in the case of IG Farben, whose wartime capacity still is more than 80 per cent
