The post commander, dedicated the building, saying:

"In the name of the Campbell-Lanning Post No. 53, of The American Legion, I now dedicate this structure, the embodiment of ideals of justice, freedom and democracy for which the Legion exists. As in time of war we fought for our country, so in time of peace we will serve the republic fearlessly and well. May we bear in mind those comrades of ours who have gone before, that their memory may dwell within this home and be a constant blessing among us. You in peace—gladly, wholeheartedly and unselfishly. Deeming it our highest privilege and our greatest pleasure to render service to our country, the kind of service it requires and at the time it requires it. I thank you."

Following Mr. Hagenard's speech of acceptance, Percy A. Mero, re-elected to the post, dedicated the structure to the purpose of our Post, and with it I dedicate this Post to the eternal service of our nation and preservation of the memory of our heroic comrades.

Rev. E. D. Brownlee then pronounced a benediction and the crowd stood with bared heads while the band played the national anthem.

A moving picture camera mounted on a truck in front of the hut was meanwhile registering the impressive service for distribution to famous news agencies, and it is possible that the film may be nationally shown.

shore to enjoy the thrilling sight. Bombs burst high in the air with deafening noises, and fancy sky rockets and Roman candles set the heavens aglow with many colored lights.

The ball was attractively decorated with colored tissues and flags and a popular orchestra secured for the occasion furnished music of the first order.

ORLANDO, Nov. 12.—Only a brief session of the interstate commission hearing counsel was held today on the front Florida courts to Jacksonville when the work here today.

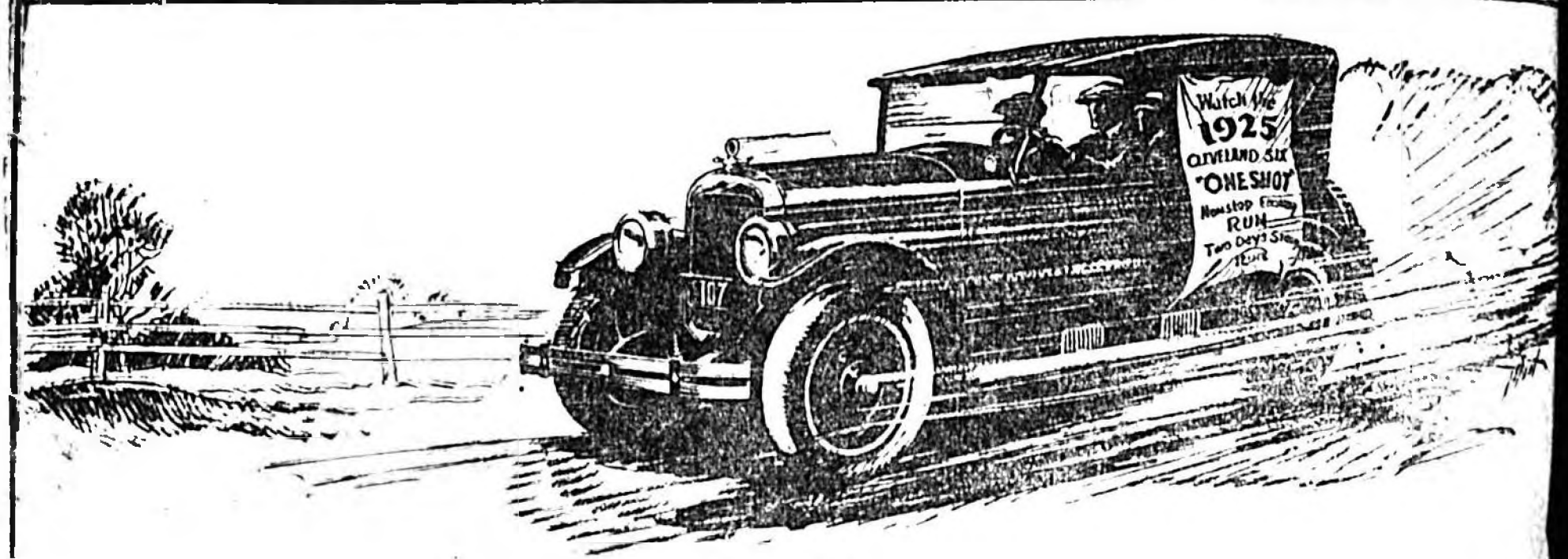

### LINSEED OIL IS BENEFICIAL FOR SANDED ANIMALS

A. L. Shealy, Veterinary Expert, Explains Cause and Remedy of Disease Known As Slow Colic

GAINESVILLE, Fla., Nov. 7.—Raw linseed oil may be used by the farmer in treating his farm animals when they become "sanded," according to A. L. Shealy, professor of veterinary science, Florida College of Agriculture. In discussing this subject, Dr. Shealy says:

Horses become "sanded" when they are allowed to graze over deep sandy land where large amounts of sand are eaten with the grass. This trouble seems to be more prevalent in the fall of the year when the grasses are fibrous, tough and scanty. This colic is often spoken of as "slow colic" in that the symptoms come on very slowly and persist for three or four days, the animal gradually getting worse. At first the animal shows signs of uneasiness, slight colicky pains, and refuses to eat. These symptoms may be overlooked by the attendant for the first day. Then the symptoms of colic become more pronounced, pain more acute, the animal more uneasy and restless, often lying down on the left side and turning the head back, looking toward the right flank. The large bowel is affected and this is located on the right side. While standing the patient will often stretch himself out as far as possible. The temperature is above normal and breathing is faster and more labored than usual; the animal will often appear to yawn. Perspiration flows freely. In the last stages signs of great depression and exhaustion are shown. Death results from inflammation of

the affected intestine. The best treatment is to give the animal a good purge and enema as soon as possible. Give 1 quart of raw linseed oil or 2 quarts of nator or some other mineral oil. This treatment should be repeated within 24 hours. If the desired results are not obtained from the first dose, as it is important to get results immediately. From 1 to 2 ounces of aromatic spirits of ammonia might be given every three or four hours as a stimulant.

#### TO CIRCULATE PETITION

MIAMI, Nov. 12.—The Everglades Development Association has decided to circulate a petition calling for a bonding election for \$300,000 to provide for building roads between the Tamiami Trail and the Pennsylvania Sugar Company's plant. Thousands of acres of fertile land would be opened to cultivation by construction of the road, it is stated. The petition is declared to have the approval of the residents of both the Tamiami trail section and those near the sugar plantation.

#### CREDIT MEN TO MEET

ORLANDO, Nov. 13.—Credit organizations representative of Florida will hold a convention here next Friday and Saturday, with the Orlando Credit Association acting as host to the delegates. More than twenty-five organizations in all parts of the state will be represented at the meeting.

#### SMALL PACKAGES FRUIT

FORT PIERCE, Nov. 12.—Marketing of citrus fruit in small packages is to be tried out by the Fort Pierce Growers' Association. It is announced by Homer Needles, president. The plan is that the fruit be handled in small packages and sold unbroken to the consumer it is stated. Containers that will hold two dozen oranges or one dozen grapefruit will be used. They will be packed and sealed with a guarantee as to genuineness of the fruit.

#### TRAFFIC PROBLEM SOLUTION

TAMPA, Nov. 13.—Lesley Brown city manager of Tampa, believes he has the best solution for the city's traffic problems which have grown to such an extent that the chief of police has been authorized to put on more men, restricted parking, space arranged, and other measures adopted in an effort to make automobile riding and other forms of travel through the congested district safer and subject to the fewest possible delays. His remedy is: "More walking by the public."

#### WOMEN GAMBLERS

BRADENTOWN, Nov. 12.—The number of women gamblers in Manatee county exceeds that of

men, according to an estimate made by Mrs. Margaret Dole, president of the Manatee district, W. C. T. U. Mrs. Dole's charge was made in connection with a pledge of H. J. Stewart, democratic nominee for sheriff, that he would enforce the law against gambling, without regard to color or condition. Mrs. Dole said he might also have applied his pledge to gambling in a social way by women, which she deplored and condemned.

#### PIONEER CITIZEN DEAD

West Palm Beach, Nov. 13.—Miss Ellen Elizabeth Potter, one of the pioneers that raised this city from a wilderness, is dead here after an illness of about two years' duration. Miss Potter followed her

brothers to this section when it was almost a trackless wilderness, when she was in early middle age, homesteaded on a 120-acre tract which extended from what later was Gardenia Street southward bounded on the east by the present Dixie Highway. She lived to see her land change from a tropical morass into the very center of this city of 25,000 now thickly built with business buildings, hotels and residences. It was forty years ago this fall when she came here from Cincinnati.

#### WILL MAKE SURVEY

DAYTONA, Nov. 13.—G. I. Holland, county engineer, has been engaged to make a survey of the proposed Ocala-Daytona highway, and will report as soon as the work

has been completed on the amount of grade and filling needed and the total cost of construction. Afterward, it is planned, according to C. F. Burgman, president of the local chamber of commerce, to call a meeting of individuals and organizations interested in the project to discuss two proposed routes of the highway, which will shorten the distance between here and Ocala by 40 miles.

#### BOND ISSUE UP SOON

TAMPA, Nov. 12.—Tuesday, December 16, has been fixed by the board of public instruction of Hillsborough county for voters of the Tampa Special School tax district to decide whether they want to issue bonds amounting to \$1,000,000 for an extensive school-building pro-

gram. Holding of the election was made possible by adoption of a constitutional amendment in the general election November 4, when the people of the state approved the proposal to create school tax districts and give them authority to bond up to 20 per cent on the dollar of assessed property valuation.

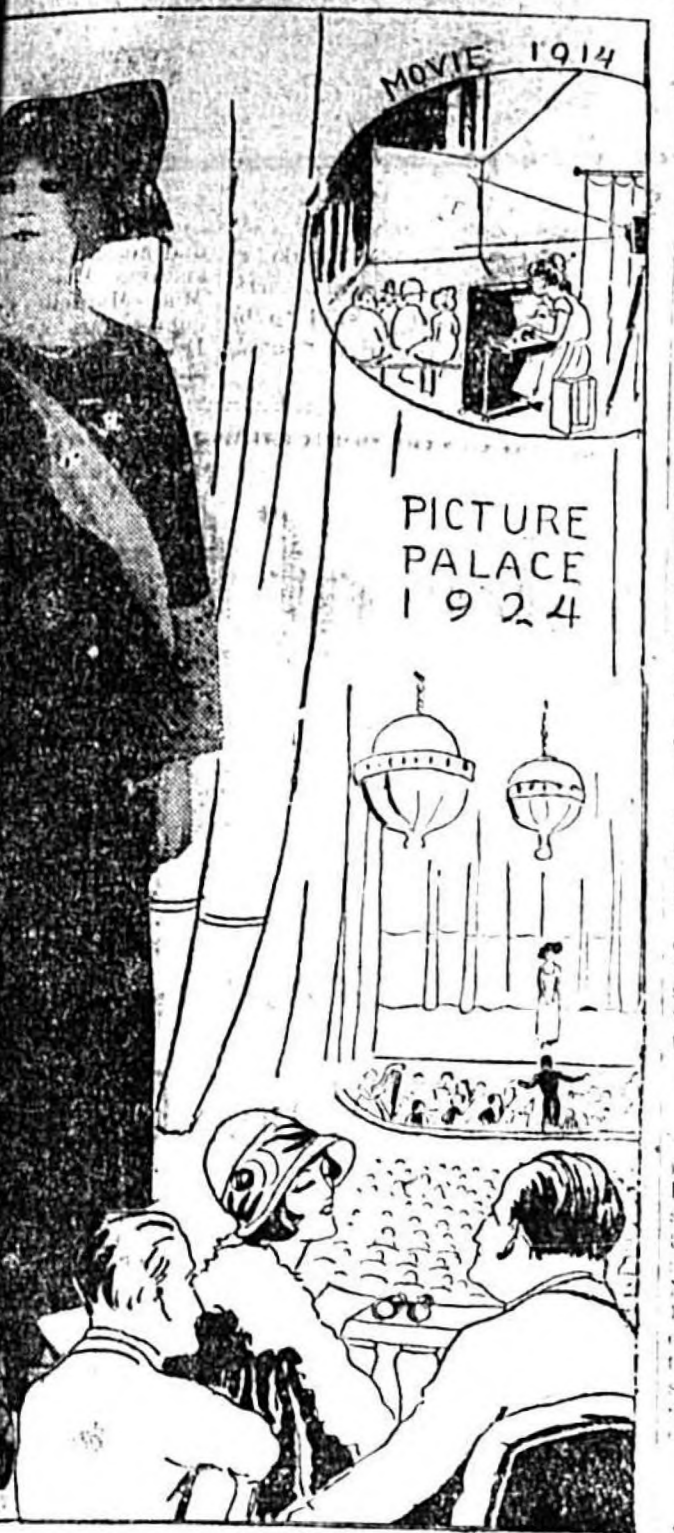

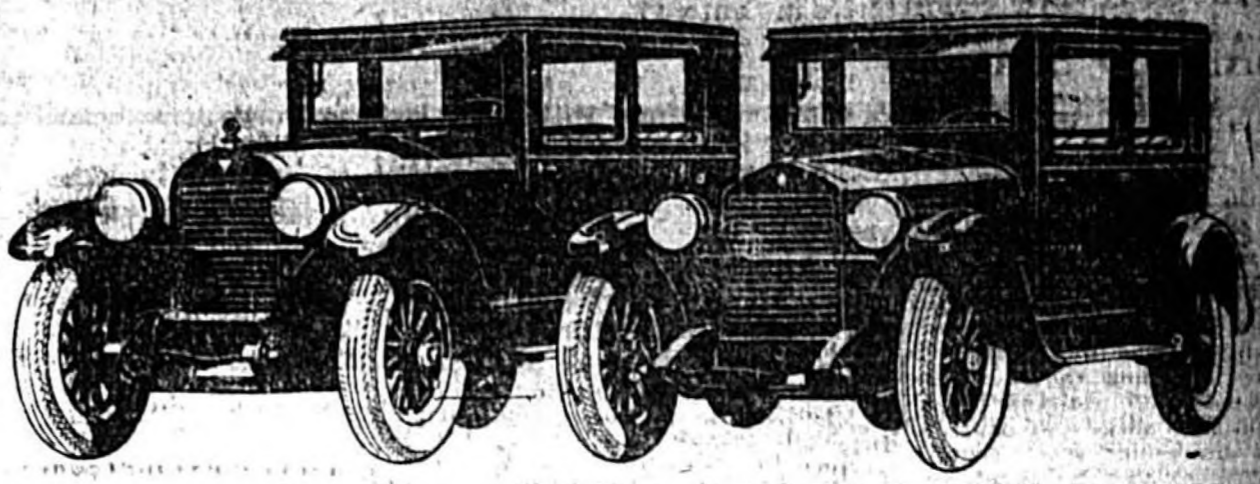

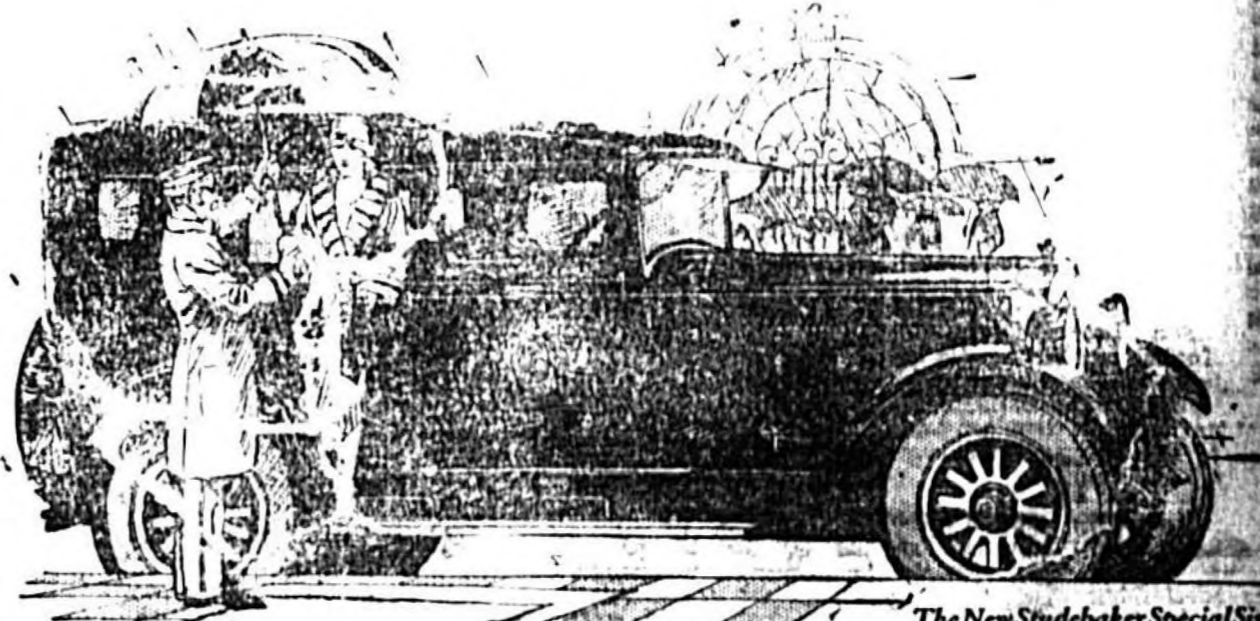

## LARGE CROWD TO SEE MERCER AND FLORIDA CONTEST

Advance Sale of Tickets Indicate That Largest Crowd in History Macon Will Witness Grid Game

More than 3,000 additional seats have been erected at Alumni Field, and it is believed that only standing room will be available by noon Friday.

Coach Van Fleet subjected the Gator squad to a slight workout at Central Park Wednesday afternoon. Three players, Captain Newton, Chaplain and Middlekauff were not in uniform and the Florida coach stated that Middlekauff would not be in shape to play against Mercer Friday. The other two men will don grid togs today when another light session is held.

Mercer continued her period of intensive training out at Alumni Field. With the exception of Eli McDonald, varsity tackle, teams appeared in good shape for the biggest home game of the season. Scully Young, sensational fullback who has been unable to play in previous games on account of previous studies occupying too much time, is scheduled to participate in the Florida clash. Young is recognized as one of the best punters in southern football and his addition to the squad strengthens the Bear eleven materially.

**TO ATTEND GRID GAME**  
ST. PETERSBURG, Nov. 13.—Local alumni of the University of Florida are planning to send a large representation to Gainesville for the Thanksgiving Day football clash between the "Fighting Gators" and the powerful eleven from Drake University of Des Moines, Iowa.

## Walter Johnson Is Expected To Obtain Pacific Coast Club

SEATTLE, Wash., Nov. 13.—Resolutions were adopted today at the annual meeting of the Pacific Coast baseball league here setting forth that no franchise hereafter will be granted to any one to maintain a ball club within the territory now controlled by either the Oakland or San Francisco clubs, without the consent of both these units of the coast league. The resolution was adopted, it was said, as an assurance to Walter Johnson, pitching phenomenon of the Washington Americans, that should he purchase the Oakland franchise he would be secure from territorial encroachment.

At the morning session of the meeting J. Carl Ewing, owner of the Oakland club, had announced that Johnson virtually had agreed to purchase the club, holding off only for assurances that following his succession to ownership he would not be forced to face unexpected competition.

## Walter Hagen Will Meet Cyril Walker In Florida Match

NEW YORK, Nov. 13.—Walter Hagen, British open golf champion, and Cyril Walker, American open golf champion agreed Wednesday to play a 72 hole match in Florida some time in January, according to announcement by Robert E. Harlow, who is to promote the match.

This will be the fourth year in which the winners of the British and American championships have met in a single match. Last season Arthur Havers, the British champion, defeated Bobby Jones, the American title holder in a 36 hole match at Atlanta and the previous year, Gene Sarazen, the American champion defeated Hagen, who also held the title in 1922.

In 1921, Jim Barnes, the American open king vanquished Jack Hutchinson, winner of the British crown.

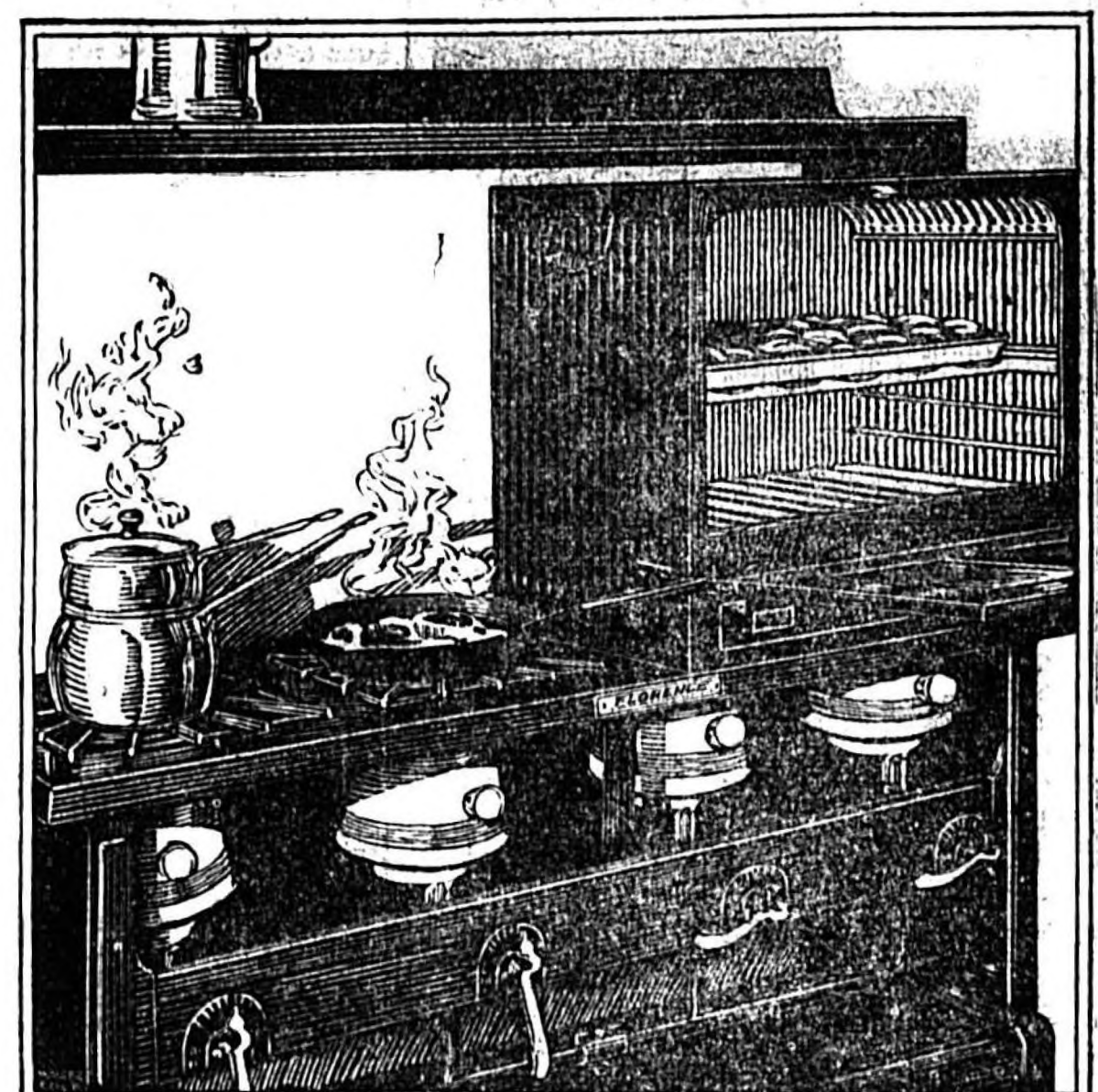
