Bill Guards Debtors Against Collectors

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Beginning today, a new law protects debtors against bill collectors who call them at odd hours, threaten them or use abusive language. The Federal Trade Commission, which oversees it, said the new Fair Debt Collection Practices Act also gives consumers the right to sue collectors for damage suffered, court costs and lawyers fees, if they file suit within one year of the alleged offense.

Farm Price Disaster Warned

WASHINGTON (UPI) — With the Senate preparing to vote on two emergency aid bills for farmers, the administration has warned of possible disaster if Congress ignores farm prices by paying farmers to let more land. Agriculture Secretary Bob Bergland warned of the danger Sunday and also said he believes most of the nation's farmers consider the administration's policies to be "prudent and sound — and effective."

Physicist Better At Hospital

ATLANTA (UPI) — Hunter magazine owner Larry Flynt, hospitalized with two gunshot wounds from a March 6 ambush attack, was removed from the initial list at Emory University Hospital today. A hospital spokesman said Flynt, 36, was in "serious" condition after improvement overnight. "If he continues to show progress during the early part of the morning, he will be removed from the respirator," the spokesman said.

Miners: Little Bitter Talk

Striking coal miners pondered a new contract proposal today with little of the bitter rhetoric that heralded their 3-1 rejection of its predecessor. With the crippling walkout in its 106th day, financial wounds festered with desperation for many of them, and many said they will opt for a return to the pits when the new pact comes up Friday for a ratification vote.

Panel Backs Full-Job Bill

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Joint Economic Committee of Congress today strongly endorsed the so-called Humphrey-Hawkins job bill as a weapon for fighting both unemployment and inflation. The pending bill, which calls for reducing unemployment to 4 percent by 1985, was passed by the House last week. It was endorsed by the joint committee today in a report to Congress on President Carter's economic proposals.

SS Tax Hike Repeals?

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sentiment is growing in Congress to give Americans at least a partial reprieve from rising Social Security taxes. Proposals to roll back the increases voted in December are being framed in both houses. Speaker Thomas O'Neill has told the White House the feeling against the increases is now so strong that unless the administration comes up with a proposal it could live with, the House will write and pass one of its own.

Sanford Woman Succumbs From Home Fire Injuries

Ellie Doris McGriff, 26, burned over 60 percent of her body in a Friday afternoon fire at her Rosemary Drive home in Sanford, died Sunday morning at Orlando Regional Medical Center.

She was trapped in a bedroom in her home from a flash fire that broke out at 12:35 p.m., according to the Seminole County Fire Department. An ambulance, which was unable to free McGriff and was returned by a neighbor, Eddie Matthews, according to county firemen, she was first treated at Seminole Memorial, then transferred to the regional medical center.

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WORLD IN BRIEF

Center-Right Wins Election in France

PARIS (UPI) — President Valéry Giscard d'Estaing's ruling coalition today won France's legislative elections, turning back leftist bid for office that would have put Communists in the Cabinet for the first time in 21 years.

With all 491 election districts reporting early today, the incumbents won 296 seats compared with 200 for the Socialist-Communist opposition. Sunday's voting was a runoff election from the preceding weekend.

It could only be welcome news for the U.S. State Department, which had viewed the prospect of Communists in the French Cabinet with unqualified forbidding. Communists last served in the French government from 1946 to 1947.

Five Hung in Cairo

CAIRO (UPI) — As black flags fluttered atop a prison, five leaders of a fanatic Muslim group, including a self-proclaimed "Prince of the Faithful," were hanged Sunday for kidnapping and slaying a former cabinet minister.

The five had been sentenced to death by a military court, which found them guilty of abducting and killing Sheikh Hussein Al-Zababy, a former minister of religious affairs, last summer.

New Conditions For Cuba

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The State Department has imposed new conditions for improving U.S.-Cuban relations, in addition to the withdrawal of Cuban forces from Africa.

A foreign policy reference paper says Cuba also must improve the domestic climate for human rights, release political prisoners and compensate U.S. citizens and corporations for the \$1.5 billion in property seized by the regime of Fidel Castro.

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As Begin Arrives In New York

U.N. Troops Arriving Today In Lebanon

Israel forces today controlled virtually all of Lebanon south of Tyre and U.N. peacekeeping troops were rushing to take up positions in the war zone.

In New York, the U.N. Security Council Sunday demanded Israeli withdrawal from Lebanon and Israeli Prime Minister Menachem Begin arrived for Middle East talks with President Carter.

In a sweeping offensive Sunday, Israeli forces rolled west on three major roads from their positions in southern Lebanon, driving in within three to five miles of the port of Tyre and cutting the line of a 6-mile-wide "security belt" they had sought, Israeli military sources said.

They also advanced to within 100-mile range of the Litani River, the so-called "red line" that marks the understood boundary between Israeli forces and the 20,000 Syrian troops who ended Lebanon's civil war.

Peacekeeping forces fought a rear-guard action against the Israeli forces at the invasion entered in each day, but Israeli forces controlled the entire deep south with the exception of Tyre.

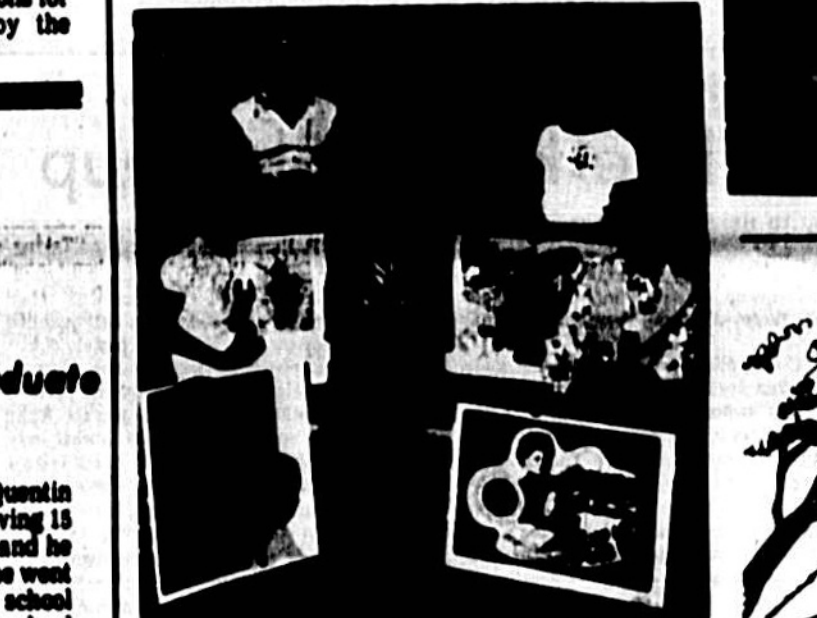
As the Israelis tightened the noose around Tyre, thousands of refugees fled north toward Beirut in panic to escape the bombing and shelling in the town's area.

The Israeli daily Haaretz also reported that "other Arab states" could become involved in the fighting unless Israel withdrew quickly.

Eight Arab states backed an Arab League call for a summit meeting, but Syria called for an Arab hard-line meeting.

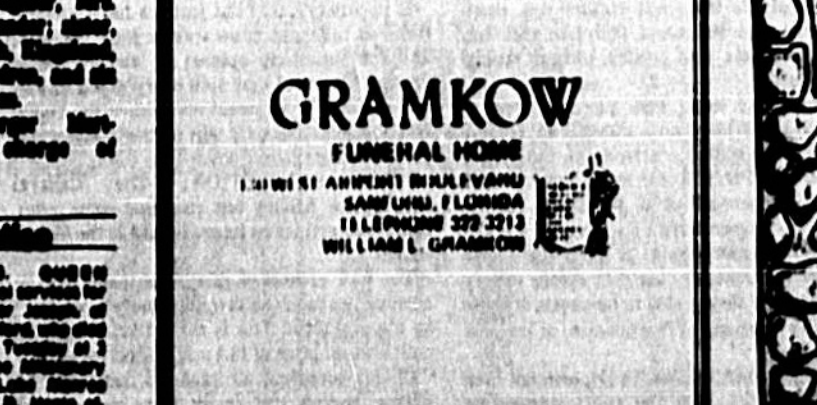

Iraqi, Syrian Trucks Move Towards Battle Positions

The first contingent of troops were in Beirout and Amman today from U.N. forces in the West Bank and Golan Heights. They have a somewhat reversible mandate.

Begin told a news conference on his arrival in New York he had his own proposal for guaranteeing Israeli security, which he would discuss with Carter in Washington beginning Tuesday.

"I understand the Security Council today adopted a resolution," Begin said. "That is, on the main issue in — and we are going to discuss this in Washington as well — how to prevent those trucks which were driven out of southern Lebanon from coming back to Beirut and to the area around Tyre and Sidon."

"That must not happen again," he said. U.S. sources indicate that at least 100 Lebanese and Palestinian have been killed in the fighting in southern Lebanon. PLO officials said 200 guerrillas and Lebanese militia members had died and 400 of its members had been killed.

Some 60,000 Palestinians and 100,000 Lebanese were left homeless. Western diplomats in Beirut feared that the scope of the conflict could be enlarged unless the crisis is quickly contained.

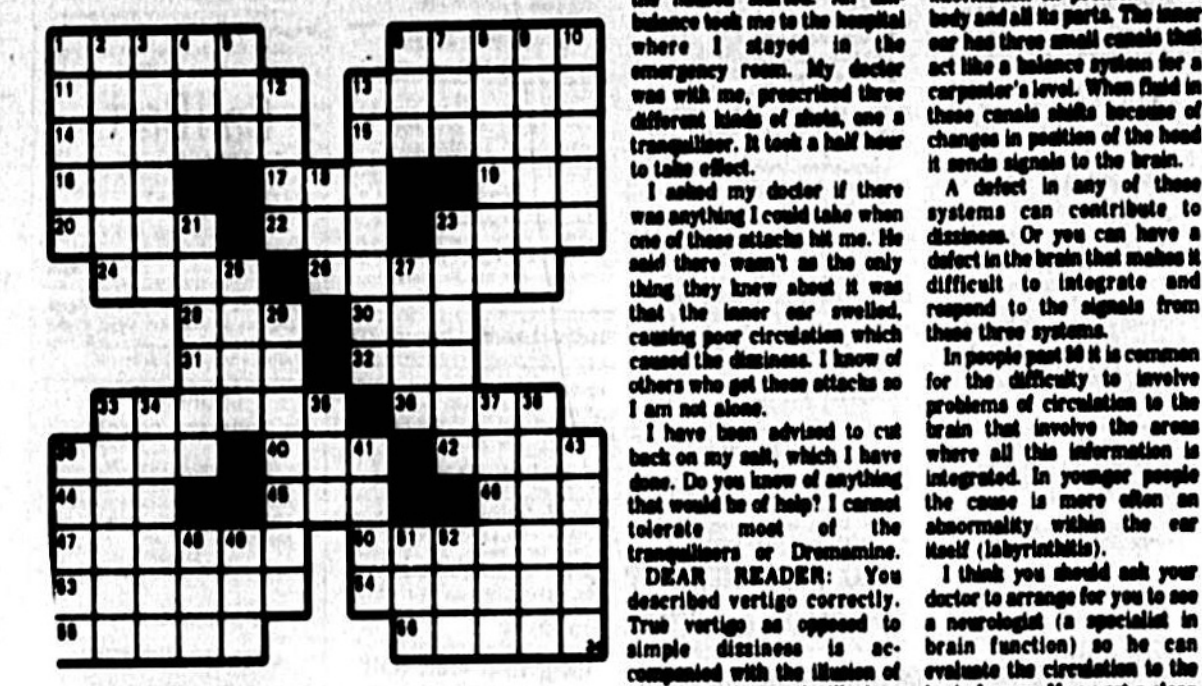

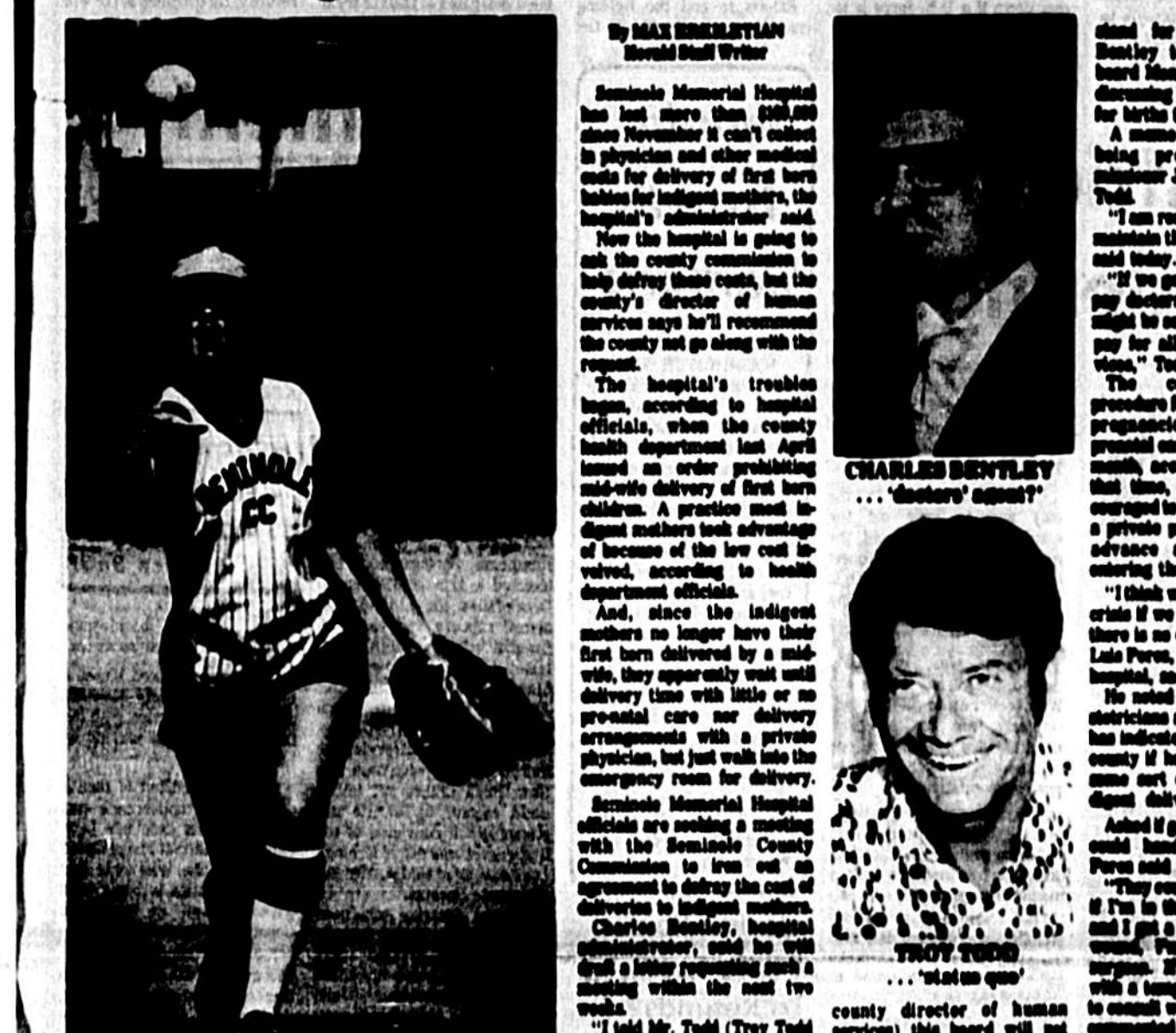

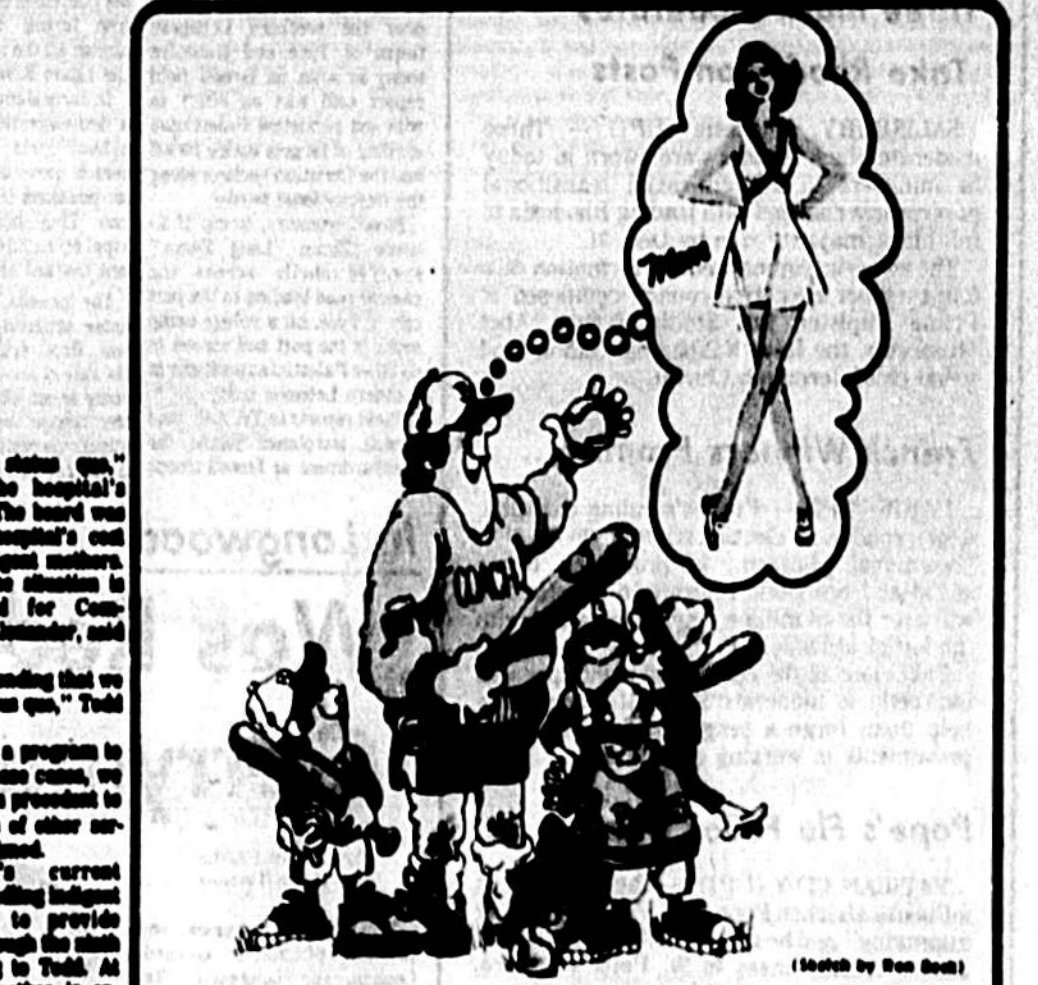
