ST. AUGUSTINE, Aug. 19 (Special)—The Sanford Giants dropped a hard fought 1 to 0 contest to the St. Augustine Saints here last night, and as the result of the Saint victory, the Giants and the Saints were brought one game closer in the battle between the two teams for the fourth place birth in the Florida State League standings. Once again separated the two teams.

Tonight the Giants get the chance to gain ground on the Saints. The Sunbolts meet the Deland Red Hats in a twin bill at the Municipal Park at 6:30 o'clock.

The Saints recorded the victory over the Giants last night in the third inning. Bill Mackel uncorked a wild pitch, allowing Hank Davis to score from third base with the game winning run.

Davis opened the third with a double to left field, moved to third on an infield out by Lyle Judy, then crossed the plate on the wild pitch to Johnny Sebastian.

Stan Karpinski, pitching for the Saints, was nickel for five hits, but the Giants left ten men stranded on the sacks. Mackel went the route for the invaders, and allowed the locals four well scattered singles.

**Moultrie Climbed Soil Work Nets Into Sixth Place Future Farmers In G-F Standings Large Incomes**

TALLAHASSEE, Aug. 19 (Special)—Moultrie split a Georgia-Florida League double-header with last place Americus last night to climb from seventh to sixth place when Tallahassee defeated Cordele 5 to 1.

Busa turned in a five-hitter to give Moultrie the first game 3 to 2. In the second game, Americus scored a run in the tenth inning to win 7 to 6.

First place Valdosta earned a 5-4 triumph over Thomasville and Albany defeated Waycross 5 to 2.

Moultrie had put them in second up the previous. They scored two runs in the second and one in the third. Americus' best effort netted a lone tally in the sixth.

The cellar-dwellers held a 3-1 edge after the sound game until the fourth when Moultrie scored twice to tie the count. The losers went ahead 6-3 by scoring three in the fifth, but Americus rallied to plate three in the eighth and tie the score.

Valdosta trailed Thomasville 4 to 1 going into the last of the sixth. In that frame, however, Thomasville sent four runs across the plate to ice the contest.

Americus allowed the losers eight hits. Valdosta put nine off Henderson and Punk.

Tallahassee showed a lot of power in the first two innings, during which they piled up a 5-1 lead. However, it was necessary for the winners to choke off a Cordele rally in the eighth after three runs had scored.

Tallahassee collected 10 hits off Cooper and Mitschke while the losers got nine off Woodford.

It was one run at a time as far as Albany and Waycross were concerned. The winners scored single in the second, fourth, sixth, seventh and eighth.

The Waycross runs came in the fourth and eighth.

Stigell, Cook and Ingalls kept the winners to seven hits while the losers got to Stevens for nine. Four errors proved costly to Waycross.

#### Hal Shiles Sets New Base Steff Record

GAINESVILLE, Aug. 19 (AP)—Hal Shiles, Gainesville, G-Man and baseball pifler, three bases last night, assisted the Daytona Beach Islanders to set a new Florida State League mark of 61.

The old record of 61 in the Class D league was held by Ralph Hader of Sanford and was set in 1940.

Shiles tied the old mark two days ago. In last night's twin bill, he failed to steal a base but leading off in the second game he received a walk, promptly stole second and third and added another in the sixth after receiving another free pass.



