Soil Work Nets Future Farmers Large Incomes

TALLAHASSEE, Aug. 19 (Special)—Florida's Future Farmers—scholarships studying vocational agriculture in the schools of the state—earned more than \$700,000 last year from farm work, State School Supt. Collin English reported yesterday.

With a capital investment of \$400,000 in farm lands, buildings and equipment, the school-boy-farmers averaged earnings amounting to \$130 apiece.

And many FFA boys earned as high as \$1,000 during the year.

In an annual report of Florida Future Farmer activities, the state school leader reported 5,617 student-farmers organized in 130 FFA chapters in 55 counties.

The boys practised all types of farming known in Florida—from citrus to watermelons, from raising chickens to breeding Branghams. And all according to the latest and newest farming methods too.

In addition to seven hours a week of classroom instruction in farming practices and methods, the FFA boys spend most of their out-of-school time working on the farm.

Some operate their own farms, share operation with their parents, rent farm land, or work for other farmers. Many of the young agriculture students work on the 25 chapter-owned farms in the

According to English's report the Future Farmers repaired about 861 farm machines and 6,811 pieces of equipment. They grew 1,513 home gardens, canned 324,832 quarts of foodstuffs and saved their money to the tune of \$1,811 in chapter-purchased U.S. Bonds.

In addition, they maintained over 2,000 acres of pine forests, constructed 180 miles of firelines, and had 42,000 acres in gum farms.

Committee of investigating the Bill of Rights in its inquiry into alleged Communism within the government.

He said the only two people whose names have been brought into the inquiry as suspected Communists already were under indefinite leave before the hearing started.

It was learned from another source that Whittaker Chambers has not been a witness before a federal grand jury in New York City investigating espionage.

Chambers has acknowledged to the House Committee that he was a Communist from 1924-1937 and worked with a Communist underground in Washington.

The Justice Department has declined to comment on this in any way, repeated that it will not discuss proceedings still in progress before a grand jury.

Mr. Truman said he could say categorically that the government's loyalty program has been a success.

He added that the Justice Department has been at work for some time on a proposed new loyalty statute.

He said it was a very difficult

thing to get a statute that does not infringe on the bill of rights which is a cornerstone of American freedom.

He said sharply that he does not want any Gestapo law that does infringe on the Bill of Rights.

"Do you consider that the House hearings have infringed on the Bill of Rights?" a reporter asked.

The President replied yes, that he does.

The Congressional spy investigators are going ahead with their search for new evidence. They said they had lined up three new witnesses for secret testimony before the House Committee.

The celery industry is taking a forward step by the Federal Reserve Board as a means of curbing the heavy losses incidental to glutting of the market.

Other proposals were approved which the industry hopes will aid in improving marketing conditions for Florida celery, prices of which were often below cost of production last season because of glutted markets, Mr. Graw reported.

Adoption of a Federal marketing agreement was recommended as a means of curbing the heavy losses incidental to glutting of the market.

Another proposal was to revise the planting schedule reports which were issued by the Florida Growers Association Celery Division in the 1946-47 season; to ask for certain minor changes in rates manufactured for celery shipment, and to ask the Interstate Commerce Commission to require better filing of rail shipments.

Mr. Singer advanced the idea that sending money and armament abroad, or floating propaganda laden balloons over Russia is not the most effective way to meet the threat of world-wide Communism, but that it can be overcome by a spiritual reevaluation of human rights that will lead to economic and social reforms.

"We can destroy Communism through social reform; money alone cannot do it," he declared. "We need a different kind of democracy with more idealism and less profit," he said. "We have become so secure in our democracy that we don't know how lucky we are. More militant, crusading, idealistic democracy can suppress Communism."

Democracy is in danger today through the aggressiveness of the Communists, and another danger is that we don't see our danger," he declared and pointed out the millions in India, China, Russia, the eastern Arab world and some places in South America who are without democracy.

He predicted that Henry Wallace will get from four to five million negro votes in the north, largely because of the slum conditions in which they live, and described Wallace as one who knows what's wrong with America, but not what's wrong with Russia.

Voicing opposition to the Mundt-Nixon bill to outlaw Communism, he said that he agreed with Thomas Dewey that you cannot kill an idea with the law. He discounted the idea that the Bentley revelations before the congressional investigation committee would have much effect in combating Communism, and said that the entire case had been before the FBI nine months ago.

"The FBI and Department of Justice are perfectly capable of dealing with the Communists and do not need the help of amateur detectives," he said. He warned of future destruction by atomic bombs should a third world war break out.

Soviet Police Conduct Raid In U.S. Sector

Black Marketeers Are Object Of Russian Crossings In Berlin; 5 Germans Arrested

BERLIN, Aug. 20.—(AP)—Russian military police and German police they control invaded the American sector of blockaded Berlin today on a black market raid and seized five German police belonging to U. S. sector forces.

An American Military Government official said the action clearly violated U. S. jurisdiction.

It was the second Russian-backed raid near the city zone borders during the day.

Earlier Russian M.P.'s and Communist-controlled German police raided downtown Potsdamer Platz, where the American, Russian and British zones meet, and arrested about 400 Germans without violence. This contrasted to an operation last evening when Germans stoned the Communist police, who responded with gunfire which wounded four civilians.

Ray Ashworth, U.S. public safety chief, said the Russians entered the American zone in the borough of Kreuzberg, where a city street divided the sectors. A similar invasion occurred there last week which required intervention by American Military Police.

Ashworth said about 20 Russians and 50 Soviet sector German police cordoned some 200 Germans on black market charges and pulled them over into Soviet territory to arrest them. An alarm went out for western sector police, four of whom drove up in a jeep. The Russians seized the four and their vehicle.

When the Russian police chief drove up to protest, the Russians called him over, ostensibly for discussion. Then they seized him, too. The five officers succeeded in getting away from their captors and hiding in a crowd of civilians. Three were reported still held, along with their jeep.

Russian Tommy-guns, bolted, pursued Henry Burroughs, Associated Press photographer, when he took pictures of a raid operation at Potsdamer Platz. Burroughs had aimed his camera at a truck loaded with Russian troops preparing to withdraw after the raid. The soldiers saw him, and several left the truck to give chase. Burroughs dodged into a crowd of Germans and scurried to the safety of the British sector.

Soviet secret police, headed by Moscow-trained Paul Markgraf, have been seizing western sector police on sight since the split of the Berlin police department several weeks ago. Markgraf has declared his forces will not recognize sector boundaries in their operations. Thus far, the west has not struck back with any similar action.

Search For Slayer Of Ormond Couple Turns To Georgia

ORMOND, Aug. 20.—(AP)—Search for the moonlit beach slayers of a young couple turned to Georgia today.

But authorities gave no indication they had uncovered leads that might hold a solution to the crime, termed one of the most fiendish in Florida's history.

Gregory Blount, 23, University of Kentucky student, and his date were shot and killed last Saturday night. The girl was raped.

Altogether, more than a score of persons have been detained and questioned.

At Savannah, four men and a woman, held on auto theft charges were questioned today by a deputy from the sheriff's office here.

Still another Georgia angle cropped up when Capt. W. C. McLemore, Georgia bureau of identification chief, announced that agents had picked up a hitchhiker near Outhouse.

Soviet Author Says He Saved Samarine From Authorities

NEW YORK, Aug. 20.—(AP)—Victor A. Kravchenko, author of the anti-Communist book, "I Chose Freedom," says he saved Samarine from falling into the hands of Soviet authorities.

Kravchenko, who has repudiated his Soviet citizenship, told his story yesterday in a 3,000-word statement.

He was the intermediary who spirited Samarine away from a New Jersey farm last Aug. 8 at a time when Soviet agents were overrunning New York and New Jersey on the "trail" of the teacher and his family.

Kravchenko said he then arranged to have Samarine brought under the protection of the house in the American Activities Committee.

The rescue took place, Kravchenko said, the morning after Russian consular officials fetched Mrs. Oksana Kosenkina, another Russian teacher, from an anti-Communist farm retreat in New York state.

"I well understood," Kravchenko said, "that if Samarine should fall into the hands of Lomakin (Soviet consul general Yakov Lomakin) they (the Russians) would duplicate the story of Kosenkina."

He said that if Samarine, who also has repudiated his Soviet citizenship, and his wife were returned to Russia, they would be "disposed of and their children—born in America—would be consigned to the children's prison."

NEGRO BOYS "SORRY"

RENO, Nev., Aug. 20.—(AP)—Two "awful sorry" negro boys were held by juvenile authorities today for starting a downtown fire Sunday which killed five persons and injured 137.

Police Chief L. R. Gresson said the nine-year-old boys told him they started a paper fire in the basement of a vacant building, then tried vainly to put it out as it spread to stored junk.

"I won't play with matches no more," one told him. Both were placed under juvenile court jurisdiction but are being housed temporarily in the county jail.

Defense Chiefs Will Hold Meet At War College

Forrestal To Report On Talks In Ottawa With Canadian Men

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20.—(AP)—A disabled F-17 Fortress carrying General Hoyt Vandenberg, Air Force chief of staff, landed safely at National Airport today. Vandenberg was returning from Europe. With him in the plane were Assistant Secretary of the Air Force Eugene M. Zuckert and Major Gen. W. F. Meeker, assistant vice chief of staff. The pilot of the converted bomber reported one of his four engines stopped while over the Atlantic this morning.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20.—(AP)—Secretary of Defense Forrestal will hold a conference with the joint chiefs of staff at the Naval War College at Newport, R. I., beginning late today and continuing through Sunday.

The Defense Department said the conference follows the pattern established at Key West, Mar. 11-14. Similar meetings are planned at intervals of a few months in the future.

The purpose is to provide an opportunity for extended discussion of important policy questions in an informal atmosphere and at a distance from the routine administrative pressures and interruptions at headquarters in Washington.

Forrestal will give the service chiefs a report on his talks with Defense Minister Brooke Claxton and other Canadian government officials during his visit last week to Ottawa.

Among other subjects to be talked over are: a means of appraising capabilities and performance of present and potential weapons; and the feasibility of their development in terms of cost, time and other factors.

Various problems relating to strategic air warfare will also be discussed.

Guardsmen Request Aid For Club Room

Aid of merchants in donating furnishings for a club and recreation room at the Sanford Armory for enlisted men, was today requested by two National Guardsmen who appeared downtown and carried walkie talkie outfits.

The recreation room will be open in a rear room on the ground floor of the armory not only for enlisted personnel, including National Guardsmen, but for all men, said T. R. C. O. Jones, who with Sgt. Ralph Geiger was making an appeal for the articles.

Articles needed to outfit the room include furniture, floor lamps, radios, etc. It is planned to include games including pool tables and ping pong tables.

CROSS BURNS

ST. AUGUSTINE, Aug. 20.—(AP)—A fiery cross was burned last night on the green of Fort San Marco, ancient Spanish landmark.

The five-foot cross was stuck in the grassy hill leading to the Fort's Moat. There was no sign of a demonstration and authorities suspected it might be the work of pranksters.

3 New Dealers Keep Mum In Red Spy Probe

Lawyers Decline Behind Closed Doors To Answer Questions On Activities

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20.—(AP)—Three former New Deal lawyers—Lee Pressman, John Alt and Nathan Witt—refused today to tell a Congressional committee whether they were members of a pre-war Communist underground.

Rep. Nixon (R-Calif.) said the three declined behind closed doors to answer questions concerning accusations made against them in the Congressional spy investigations.

Whittaker Chambers has told the House Un-American Activities Committee the three lawyers were members of a Red apparatus whose objective was to place Communists in federal jobs in the early 1940s.

Chambers has acknowledged he was a Communist from 1924 to 1937. He now is a senior editor of Time Magazine.

Nixon said he and committee investigators questioned Pressman, Alt and Witt separately behind closed doors for a half hour each this morning. Nixon told reporters:

"Each witness refused to testify on the ground of self-incrimination and on other Constitutional grounds."

Nixon said they also refused to say whether they had belonged to the Red underground as Chambers has testified; whether they knew Chambers and half a dozen other men named by Chambers as leaders in the "underground"; and whether they were members of the Communist Party at the time Chambers claimed they were.

Pressman formerly was counsel for the CIO and Alt was formerly counsel for the CIO Political Action Committee. Witt once was counsel and then secretary of the National Labor Relations Board. All three served as lawyers for the New Deal Agricultural Adjustment Administration.

As this trial was being questioned, Nixon said it has become "imperative" that the immigration witness, J. P. Peters, testify in the spy hearings.

Chambers has told the committee that Peters headed the entire spy network.

James B. Whitfield, Average Florida State Court Justice, Dies In Tallahassee

TALLAHASSEE, Aug. 20.—(AP)—Retired State Supreme Court Justice James Bryan Whitfield died in his sleep early today.

The 67-year-old jurist left the Supreme Court bench in 1933 after 30 years on the state's highest tribunal—longer than any other man ever served.

He began his career in 1885 as a young newspaper reporter covering the State Constitution. His long connection with the Supreme Court started in 1889 when he served as clerk.

In 1907 he became state treasurer and served as attorney general from 1908 to 1914. Earlier, he had practiced law in Tallahassee and served as Leon County Judge.

He was appointed to the Supreme Court in 1904 and as chief justice administered the oath of office to several Florida Governors.

One of his last major public appearances came in September 1915, when he received an honorary doctor of laws degree from the University of Florida.

The academic hood was presented to him in the courtroom in which he had served as a justice. The thin, white-haired former jurist was described then as a "great craftsman of the law."

Justice Glenn Terrell, who served with Whitfield for 20 years, declared at the time that the man who was present at the birth of the State Constitution, interpreted it "by the new light of the present rather than the fallow slip of antiquity."

Whitfield spent his years of retirement in his white colonial home directly across the street from the State Capitol. He had been compiling a history of Florida and was a frequent visitor to the State Library and Capitol offices. The flags on the Capitol's silver dome and over the Supreme Court Building flew at half staff today.

Funeral plans are incomplete, pending arrival of members of family.

Investigation Of Fires At Macomb Farm Is Continuing

Air Force Officials Think Tests May Be On Sabotage Goods

DAYTON, O., Aug. 20.—(AP)—Air Force officials at Wright Field are proceeding on the theory that the fires at the Chadet Willey farm near Macomb, Ill., may be tests of Radioguided sabotage materials.

A technical expert from the office of technical projects at the field has been ordered to the Macomb area to make tests, Lewis C. Gust said today.

Gust is the technician who told State Dept. Marshall John Craig of Illinois that the fires may be caused by "some unusual sort of radioactivity."

The Wright Field radio expert, Gust said, will test radio frequencies in the area to determine if any extremely high or short wave frequencies are being used.

"Suppose you had some material that could be ignited by radio and you wanted to test it for possible sabotage value," said Gust. "Would you pick a city? No, you'd pick some out-of-the-way place like the Willey farm."

Gust emphasized that the theory is just that—that Wright Field is interested primarily in proving or disproving the theory. He said it would be several days before results of the tests would be known.

"Where and when will these results be released he was asked. 'If they're hot, they won't be,' he replied."

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20.—(AP)—The Army said today it is warning business and industry to be wary of requests for information coming from overseas, especially from Russian-dominated areas. The warnings are being given to business and industry.

The average Florida farm had a net income of \$3,720 last year, said County Agent C. R. Dawson. "I know will be news to one of the Seminole County celery growers."

Figures released by the research division of the State Department of Commerce, he declared, show that Florida's net income per farm in 1947 was 18 percent above the national average.

Poultry farming is one of Florida's profitable industries, he pointed out, and poultry nutrition has come a long way since the days when the farm flock was fed largely on table scraps, supplemented with whatever the birds could pick up around the farmyard in summer and a few handfuls of corn or other grain daily during the winter. Profitable flocks today are fed on carefully prepared feed mixtures, and the quantities consumed are enormous.

Quoting U. S. Department of Agriculture statistics, he declared that in a year the chickens of the United States consume more than 20,000,000 tons of feed. Loaded in box cars at 40 tons to the car, this would require a half million cars, or five solid trains reaching New York to Chicago.

This is at least one-sixth of all the concentrate feeds supplied to livestock said Mr. Dawson. It also represents about one half of the total cost of producing eggs and poultry meat in the United States.

These figures emphasize the importance of the proper use of poultry feed to the efficiency of our agriculture, and especially to the efficiency of the poultry industry," he asserted.

ARMY REPORTS POLIO

TOKYO, Aug. 20.—(AP)—The first positive case of sleeping sickness among American occupational personnel and cases of polio were reported today by the Army.

The known sleeping sickness patient is in Okinawa. There are 13 suspected cases in Japan. The polio cases are mostly in the Tokyo-Yokohama area. Three Americans have died of polio this year.

United States Has Given World More Than \$16 Billion In Aid

GINVA, Switzerland, Aug. 20.—(AP)—In the three years since the end of the war, the United States Government has given assistance to the rest of the world totaling more than \$16,000,000,000, exclusive of the European Recovery Program.

Statistics supplied to the United Nations economic and social council showed today that U. S. Government loans, property credits and grants to the rest of the world between July 1, 1945 and May 31, 1948 amounted to \$16,000,000,000. In addition, U. S. government credit and relief grants, not to be utilized, including the ERP, totalled over \$10,000,000,000.

A considerable portion of the utilized total went to countries beyond the Iron Curtain, including \$4,000,000,000 to the Soviet Union.

U. S. grants and loans to countries in the Soviet bloc totalled \$1,457,000,000 up to May 31 of this year, \$1,122,000,000 in 1947, and \$1,122,000,000 in 1948.

The figures were contained in a U. S. report on implementation of a General Assembly resolution, adopted on Dec. 11, 1946, which had urged U. S. members to take all possible steps "which may lead to the early conclusion of the problem of economic reconstruction of devastated areas."

The report showed that of the U. S. grants and loans utilized since the war, \$11,552,000,000, or 85 per cent, went to countries designated by the U. N. as devastated by the war. A total of \$2,100,000,000 or 13 per cent, went to Germany and Japan, and \$115,000,000 or 1 per cent, to the other countries, including Canada and Latin America.

President Leaves On 9 Day Cruise To Map Campaign

Briefcase Full Of Papers And Documents Also Carried

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20.—(AP)—President Truman left today on a nine-day, pre-campaign cruise around the Presidential yacht, Williamsburg. He carried a briefcase full of "documents and papers" on which he said he will work while aloft.

He also said he hopes to get in considerable work on the address with which he will formally open his 1948 presidential campaign at Detroit on Labor Day. He added he likely will speak there "of the call."

Press Secretary Charles G. Ross explained Mr. Truman presumably will talk from notes, rather than from a prepared manuscript. The President's aides think he makes a better speech that way.

Meanwhile Senator Styles Bridges (R-Md.) said in New York "the people are fed up with the inadequacy" of President Truman's leadership.

The predicted Governor Thomas E. Dewey, Mr. Truman's Republican opponent, would be elected in November by "a substantial swing."

Bridges talked to reporters after conferring with Dewey at the New York Governor's Hotel House, which suite.

In Johnston, Pa. J. Howard McGrath, Democratic national chairman, said the Republican party "is still dominated by the moneyed interests and the Congressional leaders who do their bidding."

"The Republican Party surrendered any claim to the leadership in this election year," McGrath declared, "by its record in the 80th Congress."

The Democratic chairman made the assertion in a prepared address before the convention of young Democratic clubs of Pennsylvania.

At the same time, McGrath condemned Governor Thomas E. Dewey.

Dixiecrats Fight For Carolina Ballot Place

RALEIGH, N. C., Aug. 20.—(AP)—States' Rights Democrats opened a court fight today for a place on the North Carolina ballot.

Judge W. H. Harris scheduled a hearing in superior court on an action brought by the party asking that the state board of elections be ordered to give it legal recognition.

The party is trying to get places on the ballot for its candidates—Governor J. Strom Thurmond of South Carolina for President and Governor Fielding L. Wright of Mississippi for Vice President.

The elections board on Aug. 3 denied the party recognition after ruling that it had failed to comply with requirements of law and rules and regulations of the board.

Lomakin To Be Sent From Country For Conduct In Case Of Red Teachers

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20.—(AP)—The United States demanded today that Russia recall Consul General Jacob I. Lomakin from his post because of his conduct in the Soviet refugee teachers case in New York.

The demand was made in a strongly worded note which the State Department published early today after sending it to the Soviet Embassy here last night.

The note said Lomakin has "abused" his position and been guilty of "gross violation" of proper official conduct.

The U. S. fully repudiated Russian charges that the three teachers, Mrs. Oksana Kosenkina and Mr. and Mrs. Mikhail I. Samarin, were kidnapped by the anti-Soviet Tolstoy foundation with the connivance of American officials. The note said the Samarin and Mrs. Kosenkina had declared their desire voluntarily to remain in this country.

While concentrating its fire on Lomakin, the United States declared its report on the refugee teachers case in this country "indicate that officials of the Soviet government have been engaged in conduct which is highly improper."

The note "categorically" rejected all charges made by the Soviets against American authorities.

The United States requested copies of two letters which it said were in the hands of the Soviet consulate general in New York and had been written by Mrs. Kosenkina "that was written at the time she decided not to go back to Russia and one little more than a week ago when she jumped out of the consulate window in New York."

The demand against Lomakin was based on statements given to American authorities by Mrs. Kosenkina.
