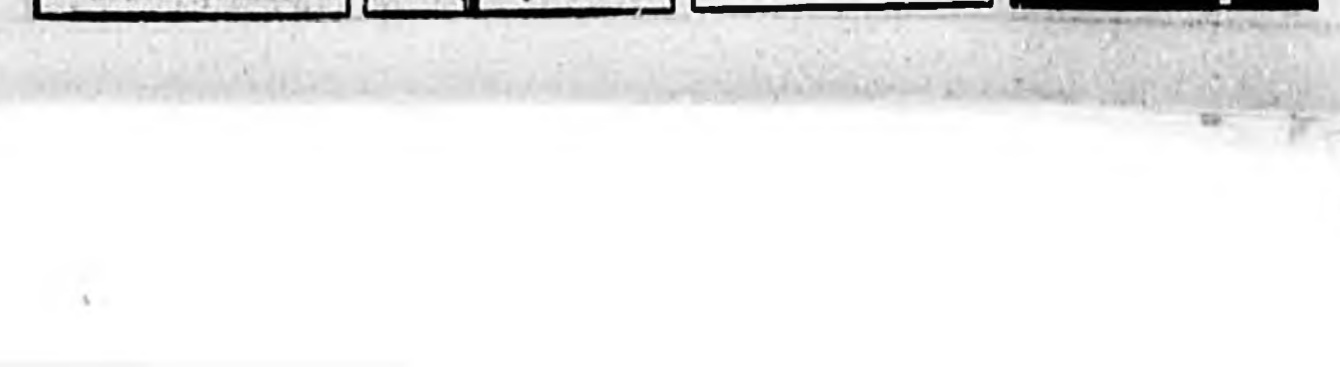

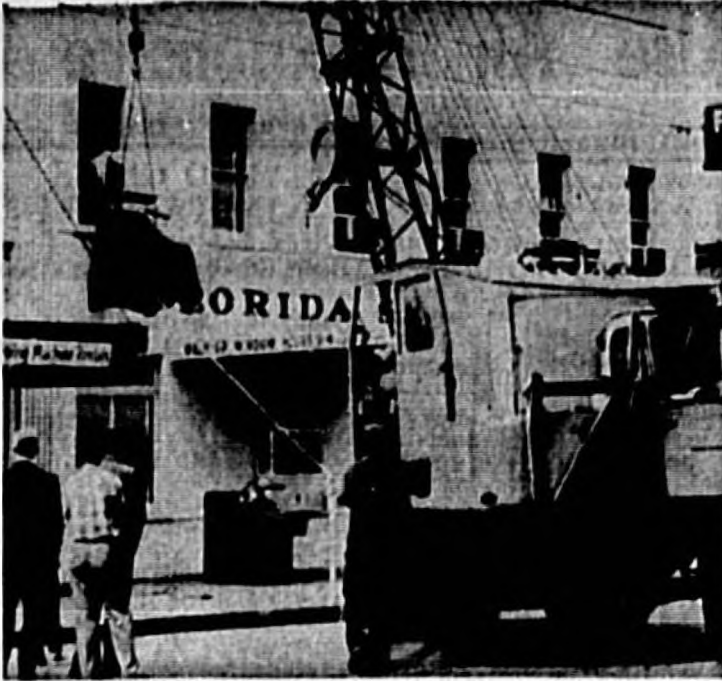
### Machines Hoisted Thru Bank Window

A huge crane lifted two 1800-pound proof machines from the Park Ave. sidewalk Friday afternoon and placed them in the second-story window of the Florida State Bank building.

While a large crowd speculated on the chances of the machines being dropped, or not fitting through the window, men from the Allstate Crane Co., Orlando, efficiently maneuvered them into place.

The two heavy pieces were part of the bookkeeping department, which has been moved to the second floor. Every piece of important bank material must pass through them before further transactions can be made, according to bank officials who watched the proceedings with interest.

Offices below the eventual resting place were vacated while the move was on. All turned out well; the machines went up as scheduled. Traffic was rerouted while the crane occupied the middle of Park Ave.

### Withers Dies In Chair For Child Molestation

**RAIFORD (UPI)**—Dallas E. Withers, 34, walked calmly to his death at this state prison today for the "joyride" slaying of a Panama City youth in May of 1956.

Withers, a Panama City electrician and father of seven children, made no statement before ushered to the death chamber. Prison Supt. DeWitt Sinclair said the switch to the electric chair was thrown at 8:36 a.m. and Chief Medical Officer Dr. Rex E. Ramsey pronounced the condemned man dead at 8:40 a.m.

"Withers was calm. He walked in and sat down," Sinclair said. "He didn't make any statement."

The convicted murderer was accompanied by the Rev. Adolph Bedols, pastor of the Emanuel Baptist Church in Panama City, and Prison Chaplain Rev. J. T. Tompkins.

Withers, a white man, had been convicted of murdering four-year-old Douglas Cecil Wilson in Panama City nearly three years ago. The Purple Heart World War II veteran also was charged with murdering David Wilson, the little boy's seven-year-old brother, the same day. But Withers was never tried on that count.

### Moye Is Selected For Navy School

**M. (Jg) William B. Moye, Jr.**, U. S. Navy, son of Mr. William B. Moye of 232 W. 17th St., Sanford, has been selected to attend the Navy Line School at Monterey, Cal., for nine months of post-graduate study.

He previously commanded the USS Pascagoula, a 180-foot patrol craft which operates out of New Orleans. He had served in the Pascagoula since July, 1956.

Mr. Moye enlisted in the Navy in Sept., 1945. He was promoted to Chief Petty Officer, and selected for officer candidate school, and commissioned Ensign in June, 1954.

His enlisted career included duty aboard repair ships and tenders in the Atlantic-Pacific area. He since has served in the Atlantic.

Following his commission as Ensign he served in the destroyer escort USS Harveson until his assignment to the Pascagoula.

### Audrey Flies Home For Recuperation

**DURANGO, Mexico (UPI)**—American movie actress Audrey Hepburn flies home to Los Angeles today to recuperate from the severe back injury she suffered when thrown from a horse here last Wednesday.

Her husband, actor Mel Ferrer, said Miss Hepburn would arrive this afternoon aboard a special hospital plane which flew here Sunday to pick her up.

Ferrer said his wife would be completely immobilized for about three weeks, but that she probably would be sitting up in about five weeks. She may be able to resume work on the movie "The Unforgiven," about March 7.

### Equality Promised Gotham Minorities.

**NEW YORK (UPI)**—Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller today told the Federal Civil Rights Commission that he intends to make New York a "testing ground and demonstration" for equal rights for all racial and minority groups.

"We still have a long way to go in achieving our goal of making New York state a shining example of our faith in freedom and justice for all men," said Rockefeller in a statement read by Dr. Elmer Carter, chairman of the State Commission Against Discrimination. "We know that we have dark corners of prejudice and discrimination in our midst."

The governor's statement opened a two-day inquiry by the commission, which will also hear testimony from Francis Cardinal Spellman, Jackie Robinson, the former baseball star, and more than 20 other witnesses.

Housing inadequacies, slum conditions and segregated living patterns will be investigated. The inquiry will cover discrimination due to race, color, religion or national origin. Mayor Robert F. Wagner and other city officials are cooperating.

The Rev. Theodore M. Hesburgh, a member of the commission, said a recent study by the Commission on Race and Housing, a private group, indicated that

there is more segregation in large northern cities than those in the South. He said New York had been selected for hearings because the number of races living in the city ought to reflect a national pattern in housing conditions.

### Government Mails Fatter Checks On Social Security

**WASHINGTON (UPI)**—The government begins mailing fatter checks today to more than 12½ million Social Security beneficiaries.

Social Security Commissioner William L. Mitchell said the benefit checks will be about 7 percent higher. They will go to 6½ million age, survivors, and disability insurance beneficiaries.

As a result, the January payments will run about 50 million dollars higher than in the previous month when they totaled about 600 million dollars.

The hikes were authorized by monthly payments to a retired worker, aged 65, ranged from \$30 to \$108.50. The January checks range from \$33 to \$116. The maximum monthly payment to a family-formerly \$200, now is \$254.

### Young Man Killed In Duel With Law

**PORT ST. JOE (UPI)**—A 21-year-old Vernon man who started shooting at a highway patrolman after a traffic argument died in a hospital here Sunday.

Ernest Galtney was shot twice in the close-range pistol duel with Trooper T. O. Alpin.

Alpin said Galtney grabbed a pistol from the glove compartment of the car after he stopped the vehicle for a traffic violation. The trooper said one of Galtney's bullets nicked him in the lip before he cut down the motorist.

**NEW YORK (UPI)**—Gene Tunney former world heavyweight champion, and his family left by plane Sunday for Holland, where his son, John, will be married Thursday to Maria Sprenger at her home in Nijmegen, Holland.
