ALKER PUTS PETUS INTO MURDER PROBE

Nice Smarting Under Rebuke Of Mayor Re-Doubles Efforts To Get Rothstein Killer

Drug Ring Is Said To Be Implicated

Scathing Attacks By Newspapers Help To Arouse New Activity

NEW YORK, Nov. 16—(INS)—While the police smarting under a rebuke from Mayor James J. Walker, put fresh impetus today into the search for the murderer of Arnold Rothstein, master mind and white light millionaire, the general inquiry is closer to the drug ring which some of Rothstein's associates are alleged to have been identified.

We were two developments indicated that some of Rothstein's underworld "business associates" or friends had been connected with the illicit importation of narcotics.

U. S. Attorney Charles E. Murphy has begun an inquiry of whole "Rothstein case," because of his discovery that Sidney Alter, one of the beneficiaries of Rothstein's will, had been arrested last July as an international peddler of opium.

Sarah Graham Mullhall, narcotics investigator, revealed international news service, that L. G. Mutt, of the U. S. Narcotics Bureau, told her that Rothstein's name had been brought into the inquiry through the arrest of several men who said to have been business ends of the murdered gambler.

Rothstein, who is 34, is said by the authorities to have used the name "Samuel Stein" when he was listed in a hotel last summer. In the exception of Rothstein's son and the executors, he was the only man mentioned in the Rothstein will. The gambler bequeathed him the income from a fund of \$75,000 for 10 years in the face of scathing newspaper comment upon the inability of the police to run down the killer of Rothstein. Mayor Walker gives the detective bureau four days in which to find the assassin. He is not in jail by Monday night. The Mayor said he would take upon fresh action.

Rothstein was shot in a room at the Park Central Hotel on Nov. 14, a few days later in the city without revealing the identity of his assailant. His death was first attributed to his debt of \$300,000 gambling debts, the rumor is creeping through the underworld that drug ring members may have played a part in the background of this underworld mystery.

SAVANNAH, Ga., Nov. 17.—(INS)—Speeding toward the balmy gulf coast, where he will spend an extended vacation, Governor Alfred E. Smith and his party traveled by rail today the trail blazed by Ponce De Leon centuries ago.

After playing golf here most of yesterday, and receiving several invitations from the populace, the defeated candidate for the presidency left Savannah in the wee hours of the morning aboard the private car of Wm. F. Kinney, a close friend.

Governor Smith's last vacation was in North Carolina's "land of the sky" back in the summer. At Asheville, the Governor let it be clearly understood he was taking a "real" vacation, and that formal and public appearances were taboo.

His present jaunt is not expected to be any different. Senator Harrison of Mississippi, and other members of his party are being kept busy telephoning the chief executive to stop over at towns and cities enroute to the journey's end, Atlanta.

The Governor is scheduled to arrive in Atlanta at 4:10 this afternoon.

It was understood that while in the Mississippi coast country Governor Smith will stay a few days at the home of J. M. Dickinson, Jr., of Pass Christian. Dickinson is the son of Judge Dickinson, former secretary of war.

While Governor Smith did not stop over at Warm Springs, Ga., to see Franklin D. Roosevelt, New York's governor-elect, it was expected that a stop would be made there on his return.

"POWER TRUST" U. S. RESTS ITS BROUGHT INTO CASE AGAINST RADIO DISPUTE OIL CHAIRMAN

Brookhart And Norris Clain Big Interests Deprise Farmers Of Broadcasting Share

Monopoly Said Mid-West Issue

Brookhart Says Public Utilities Place Radio Costs On Consumers

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16—(INS)—The so-called "power trust," under investigation by the Federal Trade Commission, was brought into the complicated radio broadcasting situation today by Senator Brookhart (R) of Iowa and Norris (D) of Nebraska.

After attending hearings of the Federal Radio Commission involving a number of mid-western stations, both Senators declared that an attempt was being made to deprive the farmers' broadcasters of the agricultural belt of their share of radio time by stations owned by the large interests.

There is a general feeling that the "big fellows" are getting the best of it in the radio set-up," Senator Brookhart said. "I want to study the situation more before I definitely commit myself, but it appears that new legislation undoubtedly will be necessary."

"The public utilities corporations have no business to charge up the cost of their radio broadcasting operations to their consumers," Brookhart declared. "This is now being done. The consumer is actually paying the cost of broadcasting programs."

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Coal Stokers On Vestris State Cracked Sea Valve Caused Mysterious List

Officers On Wyoming Relate Stories Told Them By Crew Who Aver Ship Should Not Have Been Allowed To Sail

NORFOLK, Va., Nov. 16—(INS)—The mystery of what caused the loss of the Lamport and Holt liner *Vestris* soon after she sailed from New York on her tragic voyage was partially cleared up today by stories told naval officers aboard the battleship *Wyoming*.

It was a cracked sea valve in the fire room, according to stokers aboard the *Vestris*. This valve was cracked when the *Vestris* sailed from New York, they said, and it burst soon after the vessel steamed, allowing the sea to flood the hold. This caused the list and with the list came a violent roll, causing the cargo to shift and this shifting weight merely hastened the list of suffering and grief.

The ship started to list badly early Sunday morning, according to what the stokers told me," said Commander Simpson, executive officer of the Wyoming. "They said the valve was cracked when they left New York, and that as a matter of fact there was some discussion as to whether to sail or not.

Undoubtedly, the Wyoming's officers said, if Capt. Wm. F. Carey had sent out his call for early Sunday morning when the list became pronounced it would have resulted in the saving of many more, perhaps, all, the lives aboard the *Vestris*.

The broken valve, through which the sea poured steadily, caused the starboard coal hatch to give way, another of the stokers told naval officers, and this also hastened the end.

As early as Sunday morning, it was reported, one of the passengers became alarmed and went to Capt. Carey, but could get no satisfaction.

"One of the women told me her husband begged the ship's officers to do something," said Commander Simpson, "but nothing was done."

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"Watch The Cubs" Is Word The "Boys" Pass Along As Hornsby Accepts Contract

**Star Second Baseman Is Expected To Put

NEW YORK, Nov. 15.—"Watch the Chicago Cubs," comes the word from the boys who see all, hear all and know nothing. "Watch the Cubs with Hornsby, there."

There's one thing you can always say for the boys. They are never any siller than usual. With Hornsby playing second base and Joe McCarthy running the ball club, no one will have to tell base ball to watch the Cubs. It will be watching because it will be prompted by one of the most impelling of all emotions—human curiosity. No chemical laboratory ever attempted a more interesting experiment than will be sponsored in Chicago next Spring.

There is little of the "clubhouse lawyer" about Hornsby. His emotions are too honest to tolerate even a hint of surreptitious conniving. He simply is impetuous, easy to win. In fact, he is a ball player with only one possible liability. He prefers to do his thinking out loud.

Branch Rickey, Jack Hendricks and Jim Tierney have listened from left to right and some of his most candid thoughts without marked enthusiasm. The first two were managers of ball clubs on which Hornsby worked; the third is something of a one-man "kitchen cabinet." All three are agreed that there is one outstanding trouble with Hornsby, he isn't a deaf mute. Will McCarthy overlook a few frank utterances from time to time? Undoubtedly. Joseph generally is credited with being a man of human understanding and an occasional expression of honest opinion about this and that is only part of the ball game, after all. But Joseph's family name is McCarthy and he comes by it very honestly.

"There's one thing you can bet on, no matter what happens," an American association man told the writer recently. "Joe McCarthy will boss any ball club he is managing."

This man knew McCarthy through all of the latter's year in the association. But he doesn't know Hornsby or he wouldn't be thinking along the lines his remark called to mind. Hornsby is no man to consciously and deliberately try to undermine another's authority. To all outward intent, he reported to Jack Slattery in St. Petersburg last Spring with nothing on his mind except the matter of getting himself ready to give the best he had for the ball club. It is natural to suppose that Hornsby had something to do with or was behind the belittling of Slattery and his own elevation to the job of player-manager. There is nothing in the evidence to sustain this notion.

Hornsby, however, did say a number of things to the boys in his role of field captain and his tone never was the kind that lacks authority. Hornsby's talk with the club three days before he had called some of the players off the gallows for smoking in the dressing room. That's Hornsby. Intolerant of carefree spirit, out of patience with mediocrity. He loves baseball; he breathes it. To those who don't share his enthusiasm, he becomes something of a fanatic, a pest.

Watch the Cubs? The next thing you know somebody will be telling us not to forget to breathe.

of the shipwreck. Some of the passengers who survived the disaster, which cost more than 100 lives, already have told their stories. They stated that the ship listed badly hours before it sank on Monday, that women and children were jammed into two lifeboats which were left dangling over the side of the ship for two hours, and that officers failed to take charge in the situation in the crisis.

Capt. William J. Carey is not yet able to answer the charge that he could have sent out an SOS Sunday when the Vestris showed a warning list. He is dead, with his broken vesting his coffin. But the officers who survived will tell their side of the story today, if they can be served with subpoenas.

U. S. Attorney Charles H. Tamm, conducting the inquiry before the U. S. Commissioner Francis A. O'Neill, said that subpoenas had been issued for Frank Johnson, chief officer, and his mates. But none of the officers did not appear in the courtroom nor at the hotel where they had been staying and it was not learned whether subpoenas had been served upon all of them.

3 Slayers Sentenced For Memphis Murder

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Nov. 16 (UPI)—Three convicted slayers of John E. Levy, Memphis "hat bandit king," today were sentenced to die in the electric chair on Dec. 22 by Judge Tom Harsh in superior court.

The three men, Freeman T. Gosden, George Washington House, and John Edwin Grimes, were convicted following a lengthy trial on the testimony of Miss Elizabeth White, Gunion's alleged paramour. The sentence follows an overturning of a new trial motion by Judge Harsh.

MAN KILLS SELF

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla., Nov. 16 (UPI)—Gordon R. Branner, formerly of Jefferson, Tenn., shot and killed himself in the home near Ormond yesterday, according to reports received Daytona Beach today. Members of Branner's family could assign no reason for the man taking his life. No body was taken today to his former Tennessee home for burial.
