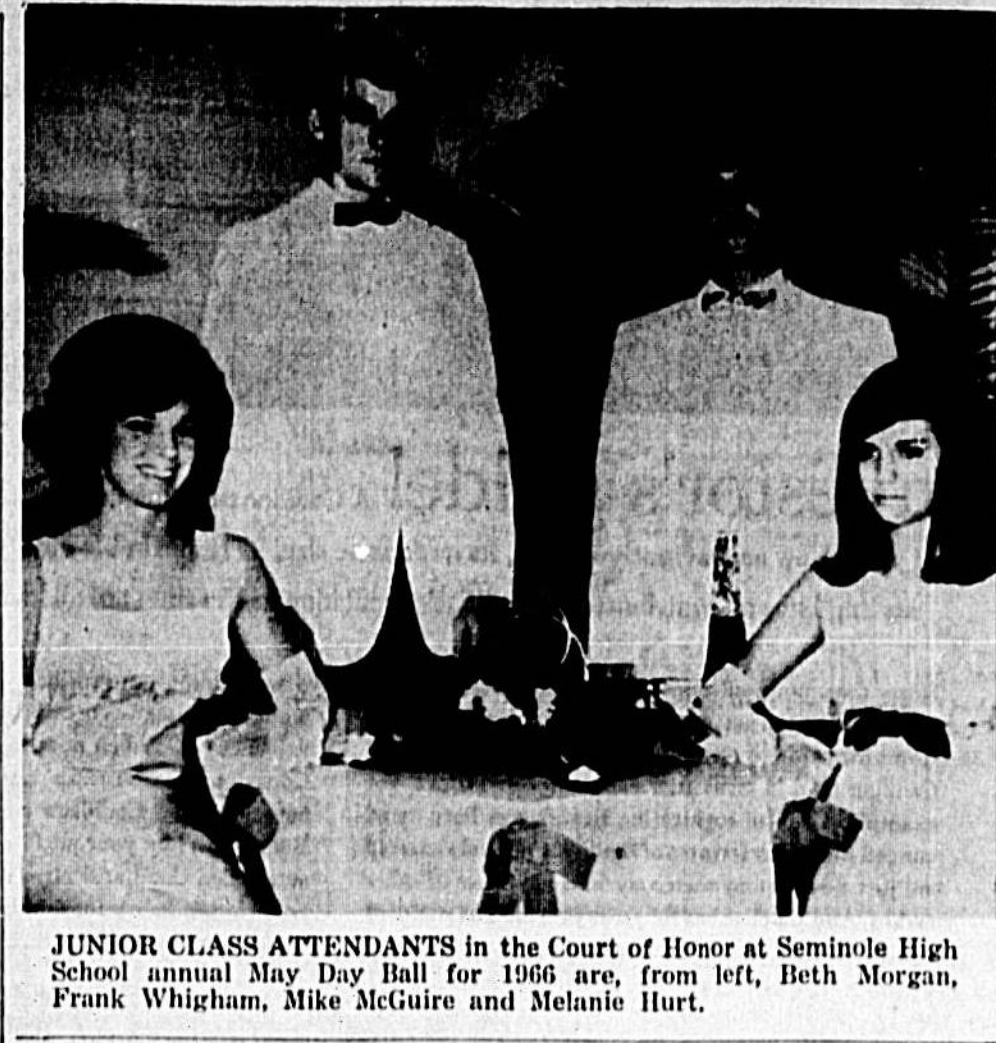

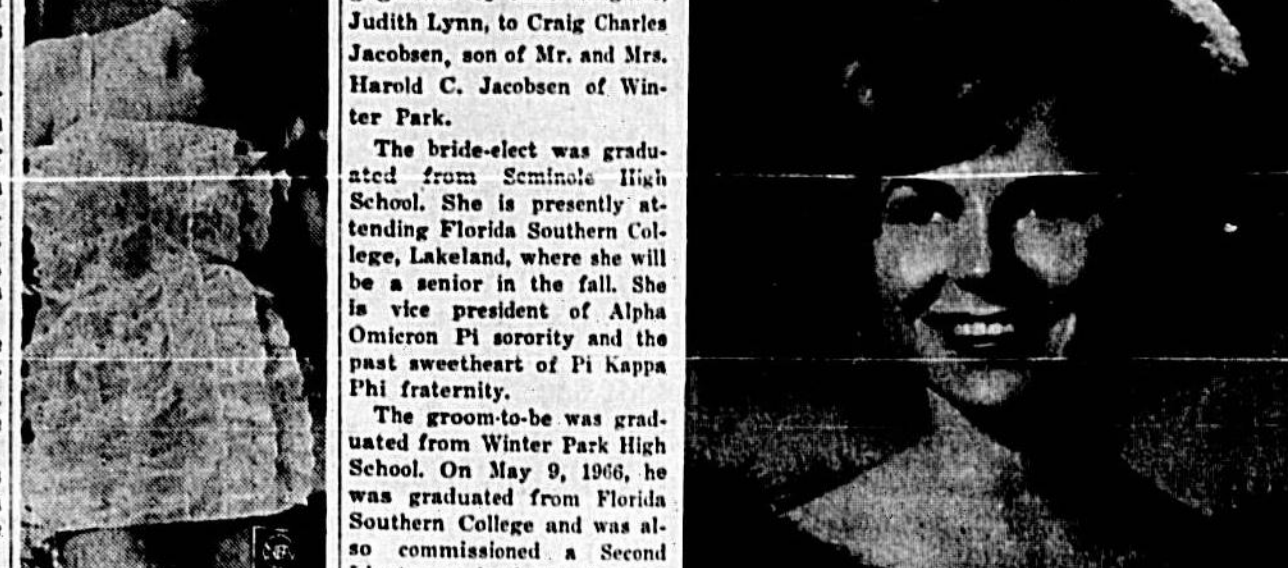

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Bobby Aids High, Burns Reiterates

PENSACOLA (UPI)—Gov. Haydon Burns showed north-west Florida voters material today that he said proved his opponents' campaign was being run by the same backers that helped elect New York Sen. Robert F. Kennedy.

The Governor told an early morning coffee crowd of about 250 supporters that campaign brochures for Miami Mayor Robert King High were nearly identical to material used by the successful campaign to elect Kennedy.

Burns took every speaking opportunity in this last swing through northwest Florida before the governor and Bobby Burns launched into a round of hand-shaking at industrial plants and shopping centers. With the election only six days off, the Governor posted it up one side of the street and down the other, shaking every hand in sight.

"I'm going to slug it out like anybody else slugs," he said. "I'm not going to let anybody else slug me."

He said Kennedy was interested in the Florida governor's race to further his own desire to become president. He said Kennedy hoped to elect High who, as governor, would head of the delegation to the National Democratic Convention, could influence Florida's delegation to back Kennedy for the presidency.

"But that will never happen," Burns told the wildly applauding and cheering crowd. "Robert King High will never be governor and Bobby Burns will never be president."

He said the state could not afford to turn its affairs over to "radical extremists" under High. "We have come too far under the tradition of progressive conservatism in this state to make a change now," he said.

The Governor criticized High for injecting the race issue into the campaign, showing an April news story from a wire service that High brought up the race issue in a Miami speech to a Negro teachers' union, showing that Burns had accused High of being the NAACP candidate in this campaign but High brought it up.

He renewed his criticism of High for introducing a "known Miami gambler" to Atty. Gen. Earl Faloah in an effort to find a loophole in the state gambling laws.

"A man is known by the company he keeps," Burns told the crowd. Faloah acknowledged that High brought each and every person in question to a hotel room in Sarasota and asked Faloah to help him if he could and that the man asked him for an interpretation that would permit some types of gambling on midway concessions at fairs and carnivals.

The man in question announced in Miami that he will use Burns for stender and denied he is a gambler or tried to get Faloah to do anything clandestine or illegal.

Kidnaped Girl Freed

SHADE GAP, Pa. (UPI)—Peggy Ann Bradnick, 17, kidnaped and held in chains for seven terrifying days by a long-sought deranged sniper who turned killer, was rescued unharmed today. The kidnaper was shot to death by a 15-year-old farm boy.

"Thank God... Thank God... I'm safe... I'm safe..." she cried, blue-eyed, brown-haired high school junior cried over and over as she ran into the arms of Pittsburgh Press reporter Scott Romback, who pushed her to the ground to avoid being hit by bullets.

The kidnaper, William D. Hollenbaugh, 44, was shot through the neck, State Police said he was hit by the farm boy, Larry Rubick, who fired a .22 caliber rifle through a closed window of his home at nearby Post Littleton.

A short while before he was killed, Hollenbaugh shot and critically wounded a deputy sheriff.

The dramatic events outside the Rubick home took place only a few minutes after a heavily armed force of 675 men began an assault on nearby Mountain where the kidnaper was trapped with the girl Tuesday night.

Almost unbelievably, the wild, armed kidnaper—who killed Edith Turner Anderson from ambush on the mountain Tuesday—allegedly through the large posse, which had maintained an all-night vigil around the mountain.

At about 4 a.m. today the kidnaper surprised Deputy Sheriff Francis Sharpe at a roadblock. He forced Sharpe at gunpoint into the driver's seat of the deputy's car, got in beside him and made Peggy Ann lie on the floor in the rear. He then ordered Sharpe to drive to the Rubick home. A few other state troopers were manning a roadblock at the house last night.

The kidnaper, Sharpe got out of the car to tell the troopers, Hollenbaugh got out of the car and, holding the girl in front of him, began firing. One of his bullets hit Sharpe, wounding him critically.

As the kidnaper moved toward the porch of the Rubick home, a trooper returned his fire and the Rubick boy ran from a barn where he had been doing chores inside the house. The boy shouted to his mother:

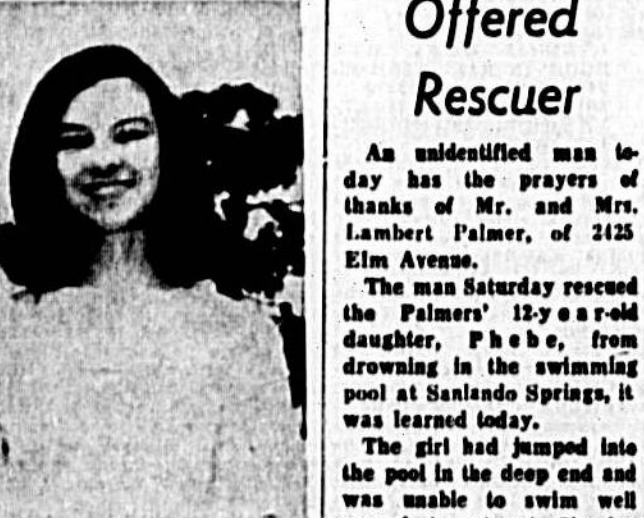
Rebels Down Yank Airplane

SAIGON (UPI)— Rebel troops at the Dien Hoa Buddhist pagoda in Da Nang shot down an American observation plane out of the sky tonight and cheered as it fell from the sky trailing heavy black smoke. Premier Nguyen Cao Ky had just left the city.

Ky made a dramatic flight to the anti-government city of Da Nang and installed a new military commander from the five rebellious northern provinces.

But rebel troops there circulated petitions demanding his overthrow and loop up positions opposite loyal troops flown in by Ky.

Both the U. S. Army pilot and the U. S. Marine observer aboard the C-124 (Birddog) observation plane shot down in Da Nang escaped serious injuries and were picked up by a rescue helicopter after they made a crash landing on a wide dirt road outside the downtown area.
