

200 Cut in Real Estate Taxes Is Made

Estimated from page one... a one mill reduction in the tax and fertilizer millage... a reduction of 1-4 mill in the millage.

The assessed valuations for 1937 were \$5,342,865 as compared with \$5,729,210 listed on the 1936 rolls.

The taxes collected during 1936 amounted to \$278,237.44, or 4.85 percent of the total amount levied.

The assessed millage this year is as follows: state 5-8 mills, county 29 mills, and maintenance of the county school system 10 mills.

The total millage for 1937 for special school district No. 1, Sanford, is 63-5-8 mills; special school district No. 2, and 3, comprising Lake Mary, Longwood, Altamonte, Forrest City, Slaton and Oviedo, 50-5-8 mills.

The 1937 tax roll was recently completed by the Seminole County Tax Assessor and turned over to Mr. Jenkins, whose staff, at the present, is engaged in the preparation of the tax bills which will be mailed as fast as completed.

The tax collector reminded the taxpayers of the county of the 4 percent discount allowed by law for the payment of taxes in November, 3 percent in December, 2 percent in January and 1 percent in February.

Continued from page one... The present naval strength is unknown to the outside world, but since the new navy was designed along purely defensive lines, it is believed to consist mostly of cruisers and destroyers for the protection of such exposed ports as Vladivostok, Leningrad and Odessa.

The big enigma of Russia's military strength is transportation. The railroad transport has always been notoriously had, its inefficiency contributed to her World War disasters.

The Soviet powers have worked mightily to improve transportation. Railroad lines have been double-tracked and new lines built in such strategically important regions as the Far East and the Ukraine.

However, railroad transportation still is slow and shows defects. Boxes of groceries consigned to foreigners in Moscow recently took three weeks to get there after they arrived in Leningrad, about 450 miles away.

But the Soviet press announces that railroad accidents, so prevalent in Russia, are few. Many persons have been shot for them.

## Denial Of Story Made By Police

## Grand Jury Says Evidence Beyond Question, Asks Penalty

MIAMI, Nov. 6.—(AP)—The Grand Jury today recommended "disciplinary punishment" for police officers responsible for "inhuman conduct" in not permitting W. Vance Harrell to communicate with his family while his three year old son was dying.

The Grand Jury report, which also absolved police of blame in the fatal shooting of Stafford G. Dames, Jr., a negro altar boy, said the evidence showed "beyond question" that Detective L. O. Scarborough was informed of Harrell's desire to get aid to his child. Harrell has claimed the police held him incommunicado 19 hours despite his story that a prescription waiting at a drug store might have saved the life of young Charles Harrell who was suffering from diphtheria.

## Duke Planning Delayed Tour For Next Year

### Hopes Public Opinion In U. S. Regarding His Motives Will Change Before Long

PARIS, Nov. 6.—(AP)—Members of the Duke of Windsor's suite disclosed today the royal party was studying the possibility of making a postponed tour of the United States early next year.

They declared the project was "definitely not cancelled" and described the former British monarch as hopeful that public opinion in America would "change" within a few months opening the way for the trip which was to have started today but was postponed by Windsor because of "grave misconceptions" of his motives.

The decision was made after two days of trans-Atlantic cabling and telephoning during which the duke attempted to gauge the extent of resentment in American labor circles against his personal representative, Charles E. Beaudaux.

Beaudaux, an industrial engineer accused by American labor groups of being an advocate of the "stretchout" system, called the duke today from New York, offering to sever all connection with the tour.

American Education Week

Next week is American Education Week. Seminole County schools will join with schools throughout the nation in drawing public attention to the importance of the schools in the advance of civilization, in the preservation of democracy, and in the development of a finer and richer moral and physical life.

The importance of education to Democracy was indicated recently by John Dewey, who said, "A society marked off into classes need be specially attentive only to the education of its ruling elements. A society which is mobile, which is full of channels for the distribution of a change coming anywhere, must see to it that its members are educated to personal initiative and adaptability. Otherwise, they will be overwhelmed by the changes in which they are caught and whose significance or connections they do not perceive."

And J. E. Seligson says of it, "If we are courageously to meet and cheerfully to overcome the dangers with which our civilization is threatened, it is clear that we need more mind than ever before. It is also clear that we can have no mind more than we already have if we but honestly desire it and avail ourselves of resources already at hand."

That is what the school system in America is trying to do. It seeks to meet the problems of today in educating boys and girls and in developing them into better citizens of tomorrow so that the fullest realization of the fruits of democracy, freedom, and prosperity can be secured for all.

Law-abiding Sanford citizens are glad to see that law enforcement authorities are going after sellers of lottery tickets, as indicated by the report that ten out of nineteen cases tried before Judge Frank L. Miller the other day were violations of the lottery laws.

The Herald has long been aware, as practically every person in Sanford has, that the lottery racket was one of the most flagrant abuses of the laws of Florida to be found in Seminole County. At one time the illegal operation of slot machines, perhaps, constituted a more wide-spread violation, but even then the lotteries were a close second, and today we are inclined to believe they rank first in lawlessness.

All of the old arguments which have been used so many times with respect to slot machines apply equally as well to lotteries. They rob the poor and ignorant, giving them nothing in return for their money. The occasional winner serves only as a bad advertisement for an evil thing. He gets no benefits from his winnings, for in the long run he loses them on other lotteries. They hurt business, taking money out of legitimate channels of trade and forcing it into non-productive uses. And they tend to lower the moral fiber of a community.

We are inclined to believe that the best way of breaking up the lottery racket is to arrest the "big shots" at the top, and to educate the public in the falling and economic waste of buying lottery tickets. In this latter effort, there is a necessary place for all service clubs, women's organizations, churches, and the press. We believe some worthwhile good could be accomplished if a combined campaign were begun.

WHATEVER YOU DO, you need courage. Whatever course you decide upon, there is always someone to tell you you are wrong. There are always difficulties arising which tempt you to believe that your critics are right. To map out a course of action and follow it to an end, requires some of the same courage which a soldier needs. Peace has its victories, but it takes brave men to win them.—Emerson.

## Florida Move To Oust Black Is Defeated

### New Justice Delivers First Decision In Case Involving Federal Trade Board

### Unfair Methods Of Sales Cited

### Encyclopedia Called Free, Only \$69.50 To Keep Up To Date

WASHINGTON, Nov. 8.—(AP)—Three Florida oil companies lost in the Supreme Court today in their effort to obtain a reconsideration of its recent action on the ground that Justice Hugo L. Black was ineligible to sit on the bench.

The Court gave no explanation of its refusal to grant a reconsideration. That was in line with the regular procedure in such an action. The announcement was made after Black had read an opinion which he had written, dissented to another, and voted against the government in a third case.

The Florida firms sought a reconsideration of the court's refusal on Oct. 18 to interfere with attempts by the Security Commission to subpoena telegrams sent and received by the companies.

Not only was the constitutionality of Black's appointment attacked but the petition contended the court's action on the litigation (Continued on Page Three)

## France Is Alarmed By Nazi Warships In Italian Waters

PARIS, Nov. 8.—(AP)—Arrival of five German warships in the Italian Bay of Gaeta for combined maneuvers with the Italian fleet convinced French naval authorities last night that the Italo-German-Japanese pact against communism, signed Saturday in Rome, has secret military clauses.

The combined maneuvers, coming less than 24 hours after signing of the "anti-Com" pact, was authoritatively described in Paris as "more than a mere coincidence" and a grave menace to French and British colonial communications through the Mediterranean.

The French press reported last night that, during Saturday's conversations in Rome, it was decided to make Berlin the capital of the anti-communist front and establish permanent headquarters there for combined consultations of the naval and military general staffs of Germany, Italy and Japan.

The military and naval authorities, it was said, would constantly be alert to meet "any serious world conflict."

Theoretically the three fleets would be unified only in a common effort to crush the spread of communism but French defense authorities feared that the "communist menace" might open the door to various other consultations—Spain, for instance—and constitute a constant threat to European and world security.

The five German warships arriving at the fortified Italian seaport of Gaeta, 40 miles northwest of Naples, were the "pocket battleship" Deutschland and the destroyers Falke, Koonen, More and Grey. They had been reviewed by Premier Mussolini when he arrived in his latest target port with Italian warships.

MIAMI, Nov. 8.—(AP)—Attorneys for Yancey W. Harrell, who said police held him incommunicado for 19 hours while his son lay dying of diphtheria, declared today that they would file damage suits of \$100,000 each against the city and the drug store where he was taken into custody in a mix-up over a 30-cent lunch check.

Attorney Tom Norford said the complaint would charge negligence in the holding of Harrell who was waiting for a prescription which doctors said might have saved the life of the three-year-old Charles Harrell.

## Rotary Heats Conservation Needs In U.S.

### Dr. A. H. Hadley Says Nation Is Wasting Natural Resources; Urges Better Laws

The first sailing southbound will be the SS Agwidale, cargo only, from New York, Wednesday, November 10, with arrival at Jacksonville Saturday morning, November 13, sailing northbound the same afternoon for New York, for arrival at that port Tuesday, morning.

The first sailing northbound will be the SS Seminole, cargo only, from Jacksonville, Friday, November 12, making call at Charleston on Saturday with arrival at New York Monday morning.

The SS Cherokee, with passengers and freight, will sail from New York on Thursday, November 11, making call at Charleston Saturday, with arrival at Jacksonville Sunday morning, November 14, sailing the same afternoon, making call at Charleston, with arrival New York Wednesday, November 17, effective with the sailing of the SS Shawnee, with passengers and freight, Saturday, November 13, regular sailings will be resumed as follows:

## Reds Emphasize Progress In Education And Science

MOSCOW, Nov. 8.—(AP)—Russia's educational, cultural and scientific progress from that of a backward nation of illiterates to that of a country pioneering in flights over the North Pole is being emphasized in the celebration of the Soviet Union's 20th birthday, November 7.

Soviet leaders constantly remind the masses how much better off they are materially and mentally than under the czar. Foreign observers agree that the material and mental lot of the masses has risen from what, before the war, was almost zero.

Visitors who were in Russia several years ago report that the Russian, while far from being well-dressed, now is better clothed. Food now appears sufficient, if not overplentiful. It no longer is rationed.

The average wage of industrial workers has been announced as 2.70 rubles a year, or about \$16 a month at the official exchange rate. With a suit costing 300 to 400 rubles, shoes 150 rubles and butter about 3 rubles a pound, it takes most of the Soviet wage to live.

But the Soviet citizen is able to go to the theater and the movies, he has cheap books; he enjoys amusement parks, rest homes and free education.

President Mikhail I. Kalinin recently wrote: "It is true that we have some 'wickedness' who compare dwelling and food conditions of our workers with those, let us say, of American workers. They scream that the American worker consumes more meat and has a better apartment."

"I believe the skilled worker in America eats more chocolate than the Russian worker. One should not take into consideration chocolate bars alone, but also the material and cultural services enjoyed by workers in the Soviet Union; for instance, rest homes, sanatoriums, kindergartens, nurseries and holidays" (Continued on Page Four)

## Insurgents Report Gains On Aragon Front

HENDAYE, Nov. 8.—(AP)—Insurgent communists reported today that Generalissimo Francisco Franco's forces had maneuvered into several new positions in the Sabinales sector of the Aragon front.

The operation was said to have strengthened the insurgent lines in the northern area southwest of Jaca near French border.

Government sources acknowledged that a series of "minor" engagements compelled the Catalan militiamen to withdraw but asserted that the insurgent advance was limited to less than a mile.

## Post Office Is Set For Work In Jobless Census

### Unemployed Requested To Sign Cards Return To Mails

Plans are being carried to completion for the first national unemployment census to be conducted through the United States mail, local Postmaster R. J. Holly announced today.

Some time next week cards to be used for the census will be delivered to every dwelling or mailbox in Sanford and Seminole County, Mr. Holly stated, adding that most of them will be thrown away since the Federal Government is not interested in those having jobs.

Persons who are out of work or who have only part time employment are requested to fill out the card and drop them in the mails or return them to the carriers. No postage will be required for the cards.

The census was approved at the last session of Congress and through it the President and Congress hope to ascertain as nearly as possible the exact number of unemployed persons in Sanford and Seminole County as well as throughout the Nation, Mr. Holly said.

In conclusion the local Postmaster stated that the following are the persons who should register: Those who have worked for pay, who are able to work and still want work; those who formerly had their own business, farm or professional practice, and no longer work at it, who are able to work and want work; those now looking for their first jobs; those now working part time at regular jobs, who are able to do more work and want time on irregular work, who want more work and are able to do (Continued on Page Four)

## Seven Coaches Destroyed On Express To Nanking Carrying No Soldiers

### Chinese Launch Counter Attack

### Attempt Is Made To Isolate Jap Force South Of Shanghai

NANKING, Nov. 8.—(AP)—More than 200 passengers were killed or injured today, Chinese Ministry of Railways said, when six Japanese planes destroyed seven coaches of the southbound Tsinan-Pukow Express train at Sishipo Station about 150 miles northwest of Nanking. The ministry declared the train carried no troops.

The Chinese declared tonight they had launched a counter-offensive to isolate the Japanese force south of Shanghai, estimated at 25,000 men, from its landing base on the sea coast.

Severe fighting broke out both south and west of Shanghai, in Chekiang province to the south the Chinese declared they had repulsed a surprise Japanese thrust toward Shanghai from the Hangchow Bay area.

The Japanese reported advances south of Bochow Creek on the western edge of Shanghai's international settlement. Chinese reinforcements were rushed to Shanghai, a vital point in the Chinese defense against which one of the 200 Japanese columns was striking from the south.
