## U. N. Report On Franco May Not Be Ready

Huge Stack Of Evidence Having Bearing On Spain Case Submitted by Three

NEW YORK, May 30 (AP)—The United Nations Subcommittee on Franco-Spain may not be able to report back to the security council in time for tomorrow's deadline. Because of a huge stack of evidence submitted at the last minute by the United States, France and Britain.

The latest material supplied by the United States alone contains a great mass of confirmation plus 50,000 microfilmed pages of documents captured from German archives. This and the information provided by Britain and France, must be sifted by the Committee before it can complete its report. The committee now has closed its books to further evidence on the Franco question.

While the Franco subcommittee may not be able to report its findings to the Security Council tomorrow, indications are that the report will be ready before the council meets again. The council's next meeting may not be held until late next week however. Council members are now studying Shant's protest of so-called unprovoked aggression by French troops from Indo-China. There is no sign that the Chinese complaint will go before the council in the near future.

The Chinese protest was sent to the Secretary General of the UN. Trygve Lie. It is understood that similar protests have been forwarded to President Truman, Prime Minister Attlee, Premier Stalin and Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek.

The French version of the Indo-China fighting is given to night in an official communiqué. The communiqué says French forces recently entered Shan in pursuit of rebels who had raided French Indo-China.

Bowles Oknys Dairy  
Price Increases

WASHINGTON, May 30 (AP)—Starting early next month, the nation's housewives are going to pay approximately a cent more a quart for milk, 11 cents a pound more for butter and an additional six cents a pound for cheddar cheese.

Economic Stabilizer Chester Bowles says these price increases he has authorized will add \$250,000,000 annually to the nation's food bill. Bowles predicts even sharper hikes after July 1 if Congress eliminates or cuts food subsidies.

Bowles says the exact amount of the present price increases will be announced on the date they go into effect.

## Britain Will Keep Drafting 18-Year Olds

Women's Branches Of  
Army, Navy, Air  
Force To Continue  
On Voluntary Basis

LONDON, May 30 (AP)—Britain's Minister of Labor and National Service, George Isaacs, announced today a British policy of continued conscription of 18-year-old men. Isaacs said the policy was to maintain a draft of armed forces until mid-1950. He explained that all men drafted during 1945 will serve two years. In 1946, the conscripts' length of service will be reduced progressively each two months so that those called up in the last two months of 1948 will serve only a year and a half.

Isaacs told Commons that the women's branches of the Army, Navy and Air Force will be continued on a voluntary basis.

He said that all men already in uniform by the end of this year will be mustered out on present age and service basis. He added that all new serving will be released by the end of 1948 and all men were drafted before 1944 will be let out by the end of 1947.

It was declared that the 18-year-old draft was expected to yield 180,000 men a year in both 1947 and 1948. The drafting of married and pregnant heads of households will be delayed long enough after the war to facilitate an increase in the couple's tax deduction.

## Grandstand Falls At Automotive Jubilee

DETROIT, May 30 (AP)—The Grand Jubilee of the automotive industry has begun with injuries to more than a score of persons in the collapse of a section of the grandstand. Four of the injured have been hospitalized as a result of the mishap in Detroit's Grand Circus Park.

Officials said the stand was made of steel-pipe framework with plank flooring. While police struggled through the hysterics to assist persons trapped under the wreckage, the program continued without interruption. As a result, only nearby spectators realized what had happened.

There was said to have been no panic among the 175,000 jammed into the arena to watch the unveiling of a 90-foot transportation symbol.

## Graves Of U. S. War Dead Decorated Today In Observance Of Memorial Day

WASHINGTON, May 30 (AP)—of the graves of those who did not return from battle, the rubble of Manila, Philippines. Commissioner Paul McNutt asserted the need for an end to racial intolerance.

Observances in 36 countries in seven European countries, all bid the familiar stamp of floral tributes and American flags for the 158,920 American soldiers buried there, as well as 18,418 still listed as missing.

From Chief Executive to humble citizen, the nation paused to pay respect to the dead of all wars. President Truman placed a wreath on the tomb of the Unknown Soldier in Arlington Cemetery. Patriotic, civic and veterans organizations likewise placed flowers on the monument erected to the bravery of those who fell on the battlefields of democracy.

Both at home and abroad, small flags were waving over the graves of men who lost their lives in the struggle for peace, security and national honor. This afternoon special Marine Corps observances were held at a monument on Constitution Avenue depicting the raising of the Stars and Stripes over Iwo Jima.

In the Pacific area itself, various American commanders in charge supervised the decorating as being observed.
