

Young Mother, Infant Found Dead By Police

JACKSONVILLE (UPI) — Homicide detectives said they found a young mother and her infant daughter dead in their locked apartment Wednesday night in an apparent murder-suicide.

The victims were Corina Kay Smith, 21, and Deva Smith, two months. Mrs. Smith was found in a closet, a thin rubber cord wound tightly around her neck. The child was smothered beneath blankets on a bed, officers said.

Another daughter, Brenda, 18 months, was found alive atop the blankets which covered her sister. Police said they believed the mother may have also tried to smother the older child. Brenda was hospitalized.

Capt. R. B. Whittington said it appeared Mrs. Smith hanged herself with the cord tied to a hook high on the closet door. The hook apparently broke under her weight some time after her death, dropping her to the closet floor.

Police broke in the apartment after neighbors said they had tried repeatedly to bring Mrs. Smith to the door. Whittington said neighbors acted after Mrs. Smith's husband, Donald, telephoned from Charleston, S. C., and told them his wife had failed to answer her phone when he called several times.

Whittington said Smith had gone to Charleston to re-still in the Navy after trying unsuccessfully to find a job here.

The captain said neighbors told him Mrs. Smith had seemed depressed over selling her furniture and moving in Charleston, and the children were to have joined Smith there Friday.

Rev. Grover C. Sewell Becomes First Presbyterian Pastor

Rev. Grover C. Sewell Jr. was received by the St. Johns Presbyterian Church April 19 to become the pastor of the Sanford First Presbyterian Church. He will conduct the regular services this Sunday.

Rev. Sewell and his wife, Mary, and children, Steve and Debbie, will reside in the manse at 2015 Elizabeth Court. Rev. and Mrs. Sewell are natives of Georgia. Before entering the ministry, Mr. Sewell was in business for several years. He was in the U. S. Air Force from 1942 to 1946. It was when he returned to business after this service that he felt the call to the ministry.

After graduating from Columbia Theological Seminary in June, 1949, he was ordained by the Atlanta Presbytery the following month, and served in that Presbytery before moving to Florida.

Mr. Sewell served both the Bee Ridge and Pine Shores Presbyterian Churches for approximately two years, after which the growth necessitated a pastor for each church. On November 15, 1951, the membership of Pine Shores Church was 43 when Mr. Sewell became the first ordained pastor of that church which was first organized on May 31, 1951 with 40 charter members.

The membership has grown to 773 members to date under the leadership of the Sewells. During his ministry in Sarasota, Mr. Sewell served as president of the Sarasota Christian Ministers' Assn. for two years, president of Manasota Presbyterian Council, moderator of Westminster Presbytery, was a member of the Sarasota Bay Rotary Club, and was active in other community service.

Rhee Rejects Resigning Idea To Stop Unrest

SEOUL (UPI) — Both President Syngman Rhee and his controversial vice president, Lee Ki Poong, have considered—and rejected—the idea of resigning to end South Korea's political unrest, it was reported today. Opposition leaders have demanded the resignation of both and new presidential elections to wipe out the memory of the March 15 elections when Rhee was unopposed and Lee was accused of winning through fraud.

Bill Bottled Up
WASHINGTON (UPI) — Backers of a bill proposing a government loan program for areas of chronic unemployment considered several parliamentary moves today to force it out of the House Rules Committee. A 64 to 49 vote by the committee Thursday kept it bottled up.

Actress Jailed

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No Solutions To Problems Offered, He Charges

District 5 County Commissioner Homer Little, speaking at a political rally in Fern Park Thursday night, said he was "tired of candidates talking about better roads, schools and less taxes and not one offering a concrete program on how we can get these things."

"We all would like to see every county road paved, but that takes money and a long range program," Little said. "Thus far at these rallies all I have heard is talk," he said. Little said that the present county commissioners "are not a bunch of supermen but are doing their best to put into operation long range plans to solve some of the problems in the county."

One of Little's opponents, John Fitzpatrick, said "you voters want a new approach to county operations with new ideas, then vote for Fitzpatrick May 3." Fitzpatrick and George Bell, another opponent in the District 5 race, spent their three minutes summarizing their qualifications. In the District 3 County Commission campaign battle, Otis Fouracre answered charges made by Commissioner Lawrence Swofford at a previous rally.

Swofford said at Altamonte Springs Tuesday "it is a matter of record that one of my opponents, while serving as county commissioner, did allow liquor to be sold on Sunday." Fouracre said, "since I am the only opponent of Mr. Swofford having previously served as your county commissioner, these statements appear to be directed at me."

Fouracre charged that these statements were "illegal, false and unjustifiable." He said that the charges were illegal because April 15 was the deadline for candidates to bring any new charges against an opponent at public rallies. Fouracre said it was "false and not justified because I have never given anyone, or tried to give anyone, the authority to stay open after the legal hours set by the board of county commissioners."

Fouracre also said he was never called on by the Longwood Town Council to explain why the ordinance regulating the hours when liquor could be served was not being enforced. Swofford, speaking before Fouracre, did not mention the liquor controversy, but said he stood on his record, as a county commissioner, as "the first commission to do something about eliminating double sessions in the schools and establish flat laws," he said.

Another candidate in the District 3 race, James Avery, said that every effort should be made to bring new industry in the county. "If I am elected I would ask that a bureau of information be set up and a man selected to head the bureau who can bring industry into the county. This is not a job for amateurs," Avery said.

Ed Zimmerman, also running for District 3 commissioner, said that "millions and millions of dollars in contracts have been awarded to outside interests while local people are screaming to be hired." Another candidate in the five-man race, A. R. Lormann, said he would work "to get dollar value for every dollar spent."

Candidates in the District 1 and 2 Commission races spent their three minutes talking about their qualifications. Earlier Thursday, a number of candidates were invited to speak at the Jaycee luncheon at the Civic Center. After candidates for the tax assessor, supervisor of registration, sheriff and Circuit Court Clerk's office spoke a brief question and answer period followed.

Most of the questions were directed at Richard McCanna and Mrs. Mary Earle Walker, both seeking the job as tax assessor. Mrs. Walker told the group that if she is elected, in a reasonable length of time she would check each appraisal and if necessary ask the County Commission to provide funds for the rechecking job. McCanna repeated his statement that "taxation" by favoritism must never return to Seminole County."

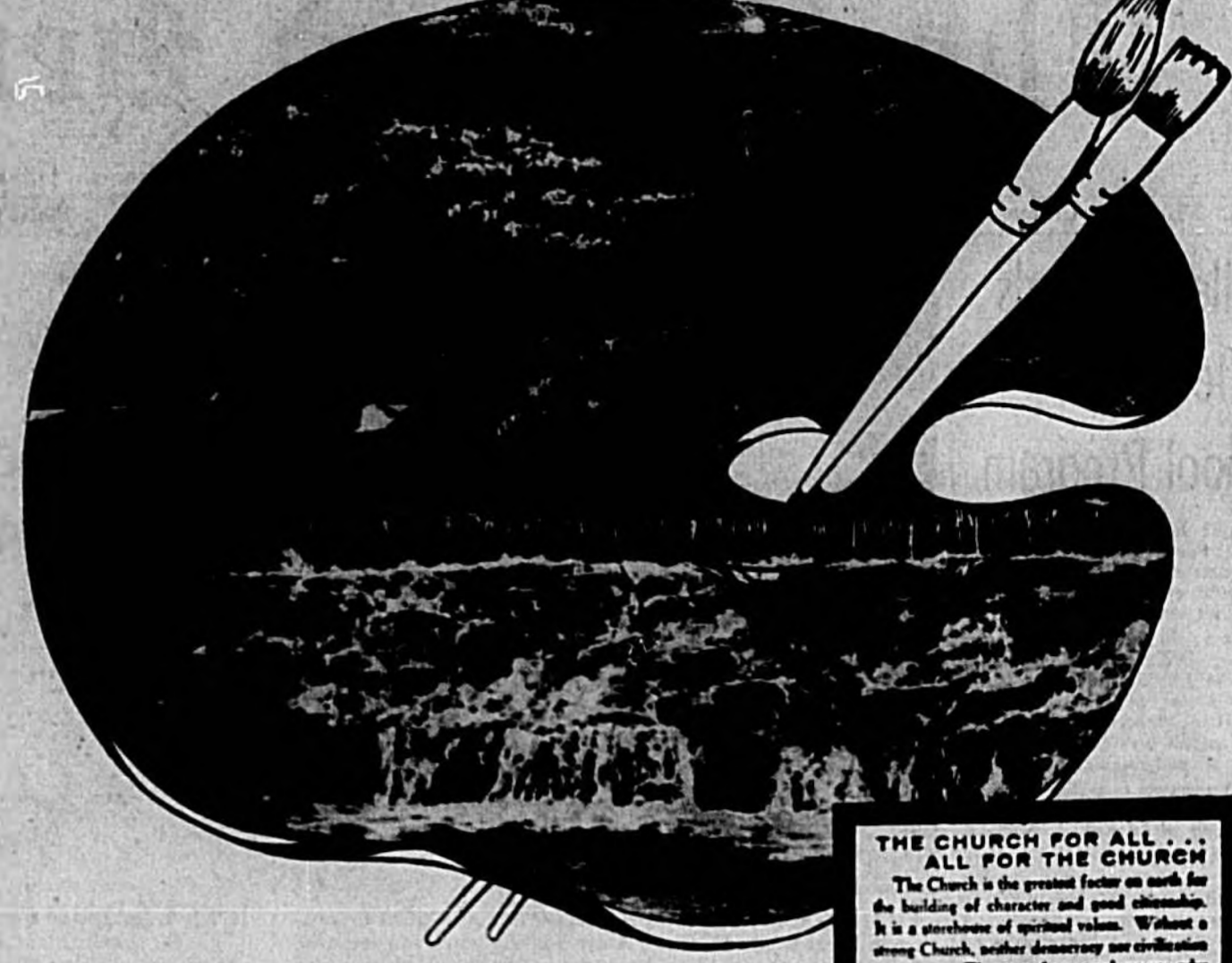

Two Students Die Scaling Colorado Mountain

BOULDER, Colo. (UPI)—Coed Jane Bendixon, 19, of Davenport, Iowa, the lone survivor of an attempt by three Colorado University students to scale freezing, 14,255-foot Long's Peak, was recovering from severe frostbite at the university hospital here today. The bodies of her companions, David L. Jones, 18, of Webster Groves, Mo., and Prince D. Wilmon, 23, of Fort Smith, Ark., were found by U. S. National Park Service rangers and expert climbers from Boulder Thursday. Jones apparently was killed by a 250-foot fall on the south face of the mountain. Wilmon, who had been left in an ice cave, was exhausted, while Jones and Miss Bendixon went for help, froze to death.

A helicopter from Lowery Air Force Base, at Denver will attempt today to bring the bodies off the mountain. If weather prevents the operation, rescue parties which camped overnight on the peak will bring them down in sleds. They started to climb Long's Peak, which is closed to mountaineers at this time of year, early Tuesday, after a snowfall. James A. Craig who stayed behind because he did not feel well, came off the mountain Tuesday night. He reported to rangers at Keota

Park that his companions probably were stranded on the peak. Miss Bendixon, Jones and Wilmon had spent their Easter vacations climbing, and all were experienced mountaineers. Miss Bendixon said they got within 500 feet of the summit Tuesday, but were driven back by icy gales. Then they realized that Wilmon's hands were so frozen he could not make a rope descent, and they were in dire trouble. Miss Bendixon and Jones scouted out a protective shelter for Wilmon in the snow, and headed down the mountain early Wednesday for help. "We decided to go two different ways down the mountain," she said. "I fell twice and bumped my head so hard I blacked out. I must have been out an hour or so." Jones apparently tried to continue for help alone, but died in a 250-foot fall. Miss Bendixon fought her way alone down to the town of Allens Park. She got there exhausted and badly frost-bitten, Wednesday night.

Blood has been flowing again in the streets of long-suffering Seoul, Korea. It was Korean blood this time, but only 10 years ago, American blood was flowing there, too, in the free world's first concerted armed action against the Communists.

Names famous in military annals were gaining more lustre. Here, Col. Lewis B. (Chester) Puller led the U.S. 1st Marines up from Kimpo Airport to help secure the city in bitter street fighting after the American landing at Inchon on Sept. 15, 1950.

Not far from President Syngman Rhee's official Kyung Mu-dae residence in the fashionable western sector of the city, Col. John Michaelis and his headquarters awaiting the next onward rush of the North Korean and Chinese Communists. Out of the fighting, both Puller and Michaelis were to win their general's stars.

Sen. John F. Kennedy, a Roman Catholic, and Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey, a Protestant, two of the rivals for that nomination, both laid out arguments Thursday why there should be no such issue.

Both contended that a candidate's religious faith—specifically, Kennedy's—should not be a factor in the choice of a candidate. Both were applauded by their audience at the annual meeting of the American Society of Newspaper Editors. Neither mentioned, however, that the unsettled question of whether Kennedy's religion would win or lose votes next Nov. 3 would influence many delegates at the Democratic National Convention next July.

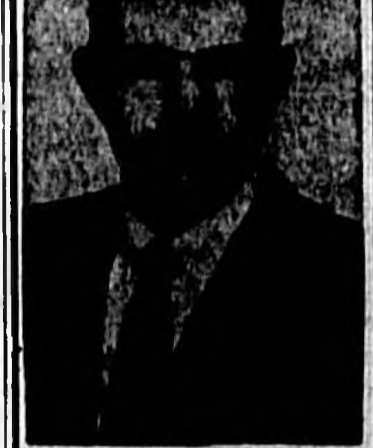

JACKSONVILLE (UPI) — A judge ordered seven teenage boys who formed a Nazi club with plans to take over the country to undergo mental tests.

Capital Airlines Chairman Resigns

WASHINGTON (UPI) — George B. Hans, a Pittsburgh attorney, has stepped down as chairman of Capital Airlines, which is in deep financial trouble.

Capital reported a loss of \$5,418,748 on its operations for the first three months of this year. The company announced, following a director's meeting, that all of its 18 officers would take an immediate pay cut of at least 10 per cent. It was indicated this would save the firm about \$42,500 a year.

The judge broke up the club Thursday and ordered its members, who had picked a 16-year-old as "fuehrer," not to associate with one another in the future. None of the names was disclosed because of the youth of the boys. They range in age from 14 to 18. All are students at Ribault High School.

The club came to light when one of its members went to school authorities and said he decided to tell because the club "had turned a bit pro-Soviet."

The members were brought before Juvenile Judge Marion W. Gooding, accused of belonging to an organization harmful to their own good and to society.

Gooding released all seven to their parents. He ordered them to undergo psychological and psychiatric tests, not to associate with one another, and not to boast of having been in the club. "This hate potential is something we want to kill in children," Gooding said.

The "fuehrer" said they organized the club because "we wanted to start a verbal war to stop integration."

"There's a lot of unrest in this age," another told the judge. "We just wanted to get together to talk and express our views. Teenagers our age don't have too much to say in our government." The members planned to take over the state in four years, the South in 10, and the nation in 20, a red-haired boy said. He admitted the goals were "a little wild."

2 Who Touched Off Mass Protest Are Arrested

By United Press International Two of the four Negro youths who touched off mass protests against lunch counter segregation in the South 12 weeks ago were arrested in Greensboro, N. C., Thursday as the campaign returned to the point where it began.

Exell Blair Jr., 18, and Joseph A. McNeil, 18, were among a large group of Negroes and a few white companions who went through a barrier in the segregated basement lunchroom of the S. H. Kress Co. store. Waiting police arrested two white girls and 45 Negroes.

Blair and McNeil, with two other students from North Carolina A&M College at Greensboro, staged the first sit-down campaign against segregated lunch counters Feb. 1. Since then, the movement has spread throughout the South.

It was the first mass arrest of demonstrators at Greensboro since the campaign started. Police said they expected more demonstrations.

Most of Thursday's activity centered in North Carolina. At Durham, two Negro youths were convicted on separate charges for picketing or seeking service at white-only lunch counters. Two white drug store employees were acquitted of charges of assault and battery on a Negro demonstrator.

At Raleigh, attorneys for four Negroes charged with trespassing on private sidewalks of a shopping center filed a motion to throw out the case on the basis of a U. S. Supreme Court ruling that "ownership does not mean absolute dominion."

In the same court, two other Negroes were convicted of trespassing at a dime store lunch counter.

At Boston, Negro singer Harry Belafonte walked a protest picket line at an F. W. Woolworth store in suburban Cambridge, and later criticized both President Eisenhower and former President Truman for "negative" attitudes on civil rights.

"I think Eisenhower is infinitely more neglectful and infinitely more irresponsible than Harry Truman," Belafonte said.

Venezuela Rebel Fugitives Sought

SAN CRISTOBAL, Venezuela (UPI) — Troops combed the hills of Tachira state today for fugitives from this week's abortive 28-hour revolt — particularly Gen. Jose M. Castro Leon, the rebel leader.

Castro fled before dawn Thursday from his provincial capital, the only place where the revolt enjoyed any success, and he has not been seen since. He is believed to be hiding somewhere in Venezuela.

President Romulo Betancourt has declared that Castro will be court-martialed immediately if he is caught.

San Cristobal was calm in the wake of the revolt, with only the presence of unusual numbers of battle troops in the streets to indicate that anything unusual had happened.

Casualties resulting directly from rebel activity were estimated at three dead and about 20 wounded in a series of skirmishes with loyal troops. A twin-jet Canberra bomber with three loyal airmen aboard was missing, and a half dozen persons were injured in Maracaibo Thursday when rioting broke up a government victory rally.

A general strike called by the nation's unions to indicate their support for the government ended late Thursday, a little over a day after it began.

The only Civil War battle fought in Arizona took place in 1862 at Pecos Pass, southeast of Phoenix.

Future Teachers Get Experience Through FTA Chapter

Seminole High students get actual teaching experience through their Future Teachers of America chapter.

By joining the Seminole High club, students can spend a week as teacher aides in county elementary and junior high schools. They observe younger students for most of the week but get a chance to teach one lesson at the end of the session.

That one program has encour-

aged more students to go into education than anything the club has ever done, chapter sponsor Mrs. Kent Bateman said Monday.

The chapter had 27 teacher aides this year. With Supt. of Schools R. T. Milwee's full support, they went into every school in the county, except Lyman and Oviedo, which have their own Future Teacher chapters.

Teacher aide lessons cover a variety of subjects when they

teach in grades one through six the first one in Florida to let the aides do their observation work for a whole week.

Classroom observation isn't a way to get out of work. The aides have to submit written reports about their experiences—reports initiated by the teachers in the observation rooms.

The purpose of the Future Teachers of America is to encourage more quality students to go into teaching, Mrs. Bateman said. The Seminole chapter was formed in 1954 and named after former county school superintendent T. W. Lawton. It boasts 36 members. They meet twice a month, once at school during the afternoon, and once at a club member's home during the evening.

The club's biggest project this year was sponsoring the coming of the National Honor Society which will start at Seminole High next year. It will be for students who have an A-B average and who meet the highest faculty requirements for character, leadership and courage.

The Seminole Future Teachers sponsored American Education Week in Seminole County last November and sent representatives to a state convention in Daytona Beach. Club member Peggy Westgate was a state officer in 1958-59.

To find out more about teaching, club members use information from the State Department of Education telling about different areas in the profession. Mrs. Bateman has given them personally tests on how to get along with other people and has also helped them try to find the right college.

The Future Teachers chapter serves two purposes. It can confirm a student in his choice of the teaching profession. But

through trial and error, it also helps eliminate the student that should not be in teaching. The second service is just as valuable as the first, Mrs. Bateman said.

She estimated that 10 percent of the chapter's members will finish four years of college and go into teaching. Mrs. Bateman has had at least eight former members that made the grade as teachers come back and tell her how valuable their club experience was.

Mrs. Bateman has sponsored the chapter for five years. She works with Mrs. Hilda Wray, who is county coordinator for the Future Teachers.

Federal Jury 'Deadlocked' On Negro Congressman's Fate

NEW YORK (UPI) — A federal jury weighing the fate of Negro congressman Adam Clayton Powell Jr. (D-N.Y.) on income tax fraud charges reported it was deadlocked Thursday night. It resumes deliberations today.

The eight-man, four-woman panel announced the deadlock shortly after 10 p. m. It had spent more than seven hours discussing the charges.

Federal Judge Frederick Vanpeit Bryan sent the jurors, all-white except for one Negro woman, to a midtown hotel for the night.

Powell, 51, a congressman for 15 years, is charged specifically with willfully filing a fraudulent income tax return in 1951 for his wife, pianist Hazel Scott, who is not a defendant.

The Harlem Democrat and pastor of the First Abyssinian Baptist Church, is a fiery civil rights advocate who bolted his party in 1950 to support President Eisenhower. He was indicted in 1958 on three counts of income tax

evasion. During the trial Bryan dismissed two counts which charged Powell with filing a fraudulent income tax return for himself in 1951 and a similar joint return in 1952.

If convicted on the remaining count, Powell faces a maximum of five years in jail and a \$10,000 fine. His congressional status would be unaffected unless he resigned.

The jury began deliberating at 1:00 p. m. after Bryan's 2 1/2 hour charge. They took time out for lunch and returned to the U. S. district courtroom three times for clarification of testimony.

Jury foreman Harry Erter, an insurance broker, sent a note to Bryan notifying him the jurors had been deadlocked since 3 p. m. There were reports from the courtroom that angry voices had been heard from the juryroom several times. Some of the jurors appeared tense when they filed out for the night.

Rogers Credited With Saving U. S. Millions In Aid

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Rep. Paul G. Rogers (D-Va.), credited Thursday with saving the United States 115 million dollars in foreign aid spending for the coming year.

Rep. Thomas E. Morgan (D-Pa.), chairman of the House Foreign Affairs Committee, said an amendment by Rogers passed last year led the government to cut that much from this year's foreign aid spending.

Pay Raises May Be Given Some Federal Workers

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The second ranking Democrat on the House Post Office and Civil Service Committee said today prospects are good that Congress would raise salaries of some federal workers this year.

Rep. James H. Morrison of Louisiana added, however, that he believed chances were dim that lawmakers would approve a postage rate hike. The administration prefers just the reverse—mail rate increases but no pay raise at this time.

Roger W. Jones, chairman of the Civil Service Commission, was scheduled to testify on the issue today before the House group.

Budget Director Maurice H. Stans told the committee Thursday that a salary raise for postal and certain government white collar workers would be "an unnecessary drain on the treasury." He estimated the annual cost of the proposed increase at \$1,000,000,000.

At the same time, Postmaster General Arthur E. Summerfield urged Congress to approve President Eisenhower's proposed higher mail rates to meet what he termed the "urgent national necessity" of trimming postal deficits. He appeared at a closed Senate post office subcommittee session.

The general feeling in Congress was that postage hikes would be approved only if they were linked to pay boosts. The

committee will wind up hearing on the salary proposals April 30 and then begin hearings on mail rates.

Other congressional news: Sen. Russell B. Long (D-La.) urged drastic cuts "right now" in Cuba's sugar quota. He said "I think that would give us some bargaining power when we try to protect American investments down there." Long criticized Chairman Harold D. Cooley (D-N.C.) of the House Agriculture Committee for opposing any drastic changes in sugar quotas on grounds it would punish the people of Cuba.

The General Accounting Office, financial watchdog for Congress, charged that the General Services Administration, which keeps house for the government, spent \$8,113,000 for metals. It didn't need. GAO also said GSA could have bought the 5,535,000 pounds of cobalt and copper on the open market for \$2,333,000 less than was paid to a lead company.

The House and Senate were in recess for a long weekend. They meet Monday in joint session to hear an address by French President Charles DeGalle.

WORRY CLINIC by Dr. G. W. Crane

The most essential organ in the body is the heart. Give it frequent vacations. Learn how to relax. Don't listen to frustrated radio broadcasts and thus keep yourself constantly agitated. Notice how my heart worked harder under emotional excitement than in strenuous physical exercise.

CASE E — 435: Joanna R., aged 19, is a college sophomore who wishes to be a physician.

"Dr. Crane, you have often mentioned that possibly half of medical practice is psychological.

"Can you give me some examples of how the body and mind interact?"

Recently, I was listening to a radio broadcast of a prize fight. My feet were propped up on a hassock and I sat in an easy chair. In that position, when under no mental or emotional strain, my pulse rate is usually 68 beats per minute.

But I felt excited as the prize fight progressed, so out of curiosity I took my pulse. It was 120.

During the early summer I played some tennis. Being somewhat overweight and out of practice, I was puffing after 30 minutes of running around the tennis court.

So I took my pulse and found that it was 90. Notice the contrast to that of hard physical activity.

While I was sitting in front of the radio, my heart raced at a speed of 120 beats. But strenuous physical exercise brought it up to 90.

The blood pressure usually rises, too, when the pulse rate climbs, so my heart was not only beating faster but also against a greater resistance.

This example shows why business and professional men burn themselves out, so to speak, at an earlier age than the average longevity for Americans.

In "fronting" before the public and engaging in the keen competition of modern life, these men "race their motors" and thus wear out their hearts. So they begin dying of heart attacks in the warty forties.

They don't exercise physically as much as manual workers but they prod their hearts in a possible ratio of 120:90 because of their greater emotional and mental strain.

Besides, their worries carry over into the evenings, for much of their social life involves business contacts.

A laborer stops with the quitting whistle but an employer or business man carries his worries and professional work into his evenings.

There is rest in competition and most business or professional men enjoy the battle, but they should learn how to avoid some of this strain on the heart.

No vacation is completely effective, unless your heart is relieved of some of its strain.

So a shift from business duties or office worries to simple physical work, will often lower your blood pressure and slow down your pulse.

Many high pressure business leaders with blood pressures of 200, will go to Florida or California and soon find that their blood pressure falls to 170.

The essential thing in a vacation is to break your mental and emotional tension.

Getting away from your office or business, will help you forget the many stimuli which habitually prod your heart into its faster speed.

Fear is also one of the greatest causes of strain on the heart. If you carry adequate insurance to protect yourself in old age and if you have an abiding faith in God, you can relax and thus take a great load off your heart.

Clergymen, therefore, can often do more good for your hearts than we physicians. Few heart attacks ever occur in a church.

And don't work on the Sabbath: That's how I break my weekly tension. Regardless of my heavy schedule, I quit work on Sunday.

That relaxation may be a chief reason why God wanted us to cease our labors one day per week.

ASSIGNMENT WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON — Please don't send any more dollars. They've kept two of us busy stuffing them back in envelopes and returning 'em to the senders.

It all started when I told about an Oklahoma City science teacher Bayard Auchincloss, and his one-man campaign for a sound U. S. dollar.

Auchincloss' plan is dramatically simple. I want to collect two million signatures from people who are for a sound dollar. These he will display before members of Congress to prove just how deeply increased our taxpayers are about inflation.

I related this, and the mail erupted. Within a few days the sound dollar man received 500 letters asking for petition-pledge forms (which he sent out promptly). Letters bombarded me, too, at the Capitol, the White House, and the newspapers and at home. They came from the poor, the well-established, the young, the elderly, Democrats and Republicans. So enthusiastic were some writers that they enclosed dollar bills to be forwarded to Mr. Auchincloss.

WASHINGTON CALLING

The irony is that this patriotic patriot hadn't asked for contributions. He's absorbing the expenses himself, as long as his own personal budget can take it.

Already, the science teacher has amassed more than 100,000 "me-too" signatures from all points of the country. He expects to hit his first million in a couple weeks.

Since he can't leave his classrooms for the whole day, he had to hire two helpers at his sound dollar headquarters, 106 W. Main St., Oklahoma City. They've been working overtime sending out the petition-pledge forms and "I'm For A Sound Dollar" auto stickers.

There's another major item in the master plan of the sound dollar man. That is to kick off an avalanche of letters from constituents to congressmen enclosing clips of any newspaper story that tells of government waste or proposed federal inflationary spending.

Auchincloss, a handsome former P-47 fighter pilot and an ace of World War II, has another idea

WASHINGTON CALLING by Marquis Childs

WASHINGTON — President Eisenhower can leave the White House having made even the smallest start—a token beginning—toward ending the nuclear arms race, then in the verdict of history all his failures of omission and commission may be outweighed.

This is one of the elements in the complex play of forces centering around the effort to reach agreement with Soviet Russia on a system of inspection and control to end nuclear testing. In the emotions just below the surface, the drama is beginning to resemble 1919-20 when the Senate hardened against a treaty and a president and the certainty of ultimate tragedy and disaster was written into the record.

A subcommittee of the Joint Committee on Atomic Energy is holding hearings on nuclear-peace detection. The avowed goal is to present as objectively as possible the pros and cons of the comprehensive proposal now being considered at Geneva. Under that proposal, all tests would be banned except small explosions below the earthquake register of 4.75. Research to detect these would go on during a moratorium.

But there is a strong suspicion that the objective of certain committee members is to prove their belief that no control and inspection system that Russia cannot cheat on is possible and that testing must continue for America's security. One observer with close committee ties predicted that the result would be to furnish material to this end.

In a private session recently, physicist Hans Bethe, a former member of the President's Science Advisory Committee and still a consultant to the committee, was berated for calling the Russian compromise proposal of March 19 "a major step forward in the test negotiations" and —"provided the details can be cleared up—a suitable basis for a treaty."

Committee members accused him of having reached this judgment before seeing the text of the Soviet proposal. But Chairman Clinton Anderson had called it a

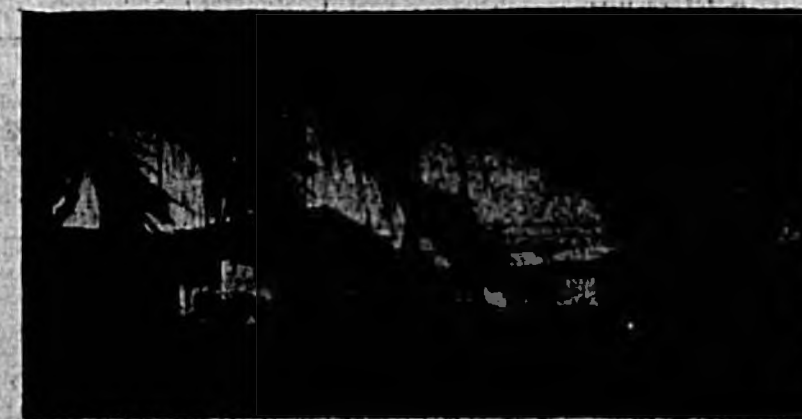

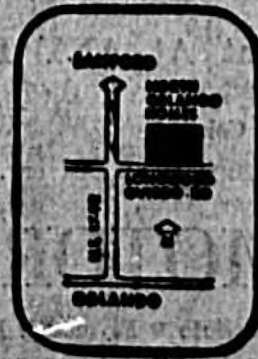

Lynch Attempt Sparks Korean Demonstrations

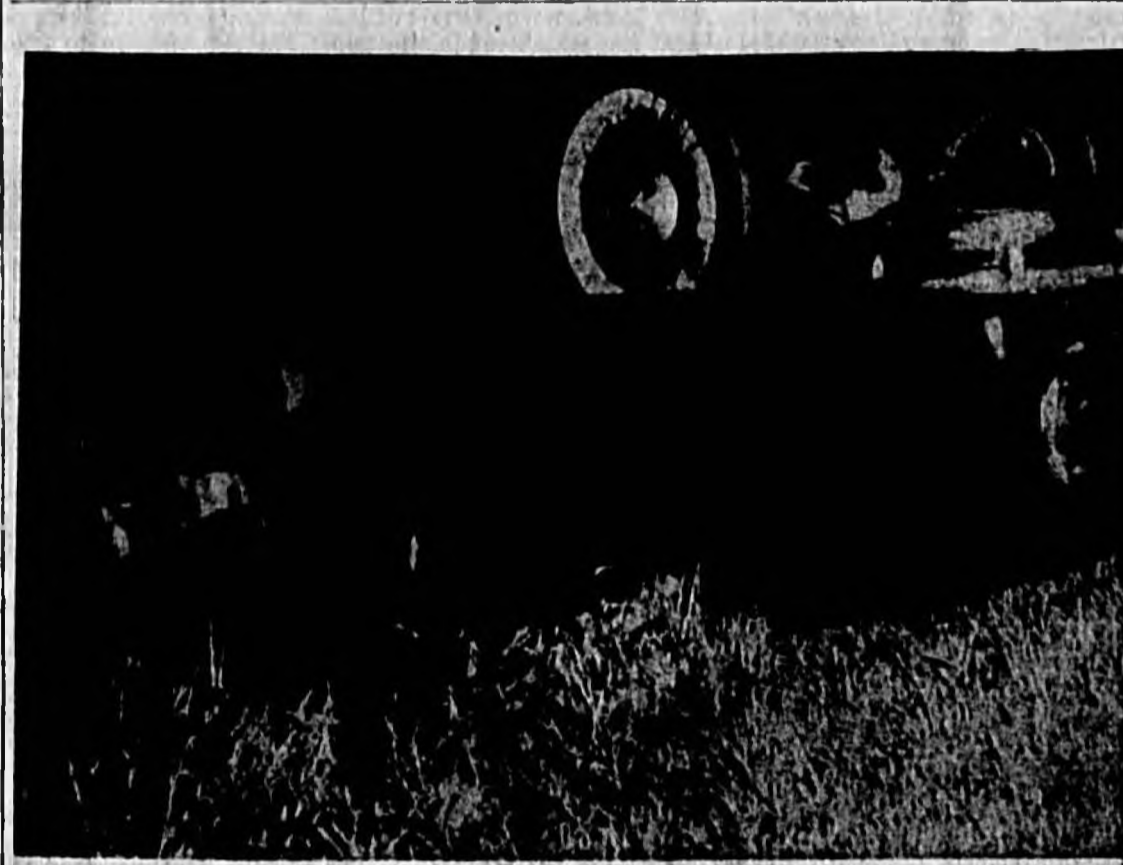
SEOU, Korea (UPI) — Ten thousand angry Koreans pined through the night in defiance of Army troops and tanks in a wild new demonstration in which 500 students tried to lynch Lee Ki Poong, the controversial vice president.

Law commander, said one demonstrator was killed by a policeman in front of the Lee home. He said he had ordered the arrest of the policeman who fired and to resign and give South Korea a real democracy without the graft and corruption the students said brought Lee to office last March.

'Modern' Pirates Kill Boat Captain

NAASSAU, Bahamas (UPI) — A pirate's lady and five other Americans were questioned today by British and American officials about two heavily-armed buccaners who boarded a cabin cruiser, murdered the captain and marooned the passengers on a barren island Sunday.

The pirates, believed to be American bad-check artists, outraced the U. S. Coast Guard into Cuban waters, and were thought to have landed in the general vicinity of Gardens, Cuba. British officials asked Cuban authorities to aid in their capture.

Left behind with the five castaways from the charter cruiser Murel III was red-haired Barbara Tables, 18, of San Antonio, Tex., who said she was the wife of one of the pirates.

She said she and the two men had been stranded on a deserted Elbow Key about 130 miles south of Miami, since the cabin cruiser ran aground and broke up on the rocks Tuesday.

The seaborne fugitives were believed to be Alvin Tables Jr. and Billy Ray Sees, wanted in Texas, Louisiana and Alabama for passing bad checks. They had bought their cabin cruiser with a \$3,000 bad check in Key West, April 17, according to Miami officials.

Doyle Carlton Jr., Ted David and Harvey Belsler all said they think the committees will help. Fred O. Dickinson, Ferris Bryant and Bill Hendrix disagreed.

Collins Hendrix said "anyone who gets Collins tied around his neck will lose this race."

David said Hendrix's remark was "disgusting."

"These committees were set up to resolve a problem about which there is no area for compromise," said Bryant. He referred to anti-segregation demonstrations at department store lunch counters.

"I think there is an area of compromise," David shot back. "Separate but equal facilities in the department stores would help."

Dickinson said he doubted the committees could do much about sit-downs. Hendrix said the committees were composed of "moderates and integrationists and are only a soap box for the NAACP."

Carlton said the committees "serve a very useful purpose. They keep the lines of communication open." Belsler called the committees "very helpful."

At Miami State Sen. Tom Adams called for tax reforms today in pushing his candidacy for secretary of state.

"Equitable revision of Florida's hodge-podge tax structure is one of the most critical needs facing our state today," Adams told the Miami Sertoma Club.

He is chairman of an interim legislative committee set up to eliminate inequities and recommend tax reforms.

Spending in the gubernatorial campaign last week totaled \$174,852 and contributions amounted to \$176,063, reports to the secretary of state showed today.

Ferris Bryant led the pack both in spending and donations. He reported \$49,555 spent, for a total to date of \$346,787, and contributions of \$50,497 for a total of \$407,284.

Carlton said "Citizens are invited from all over Central Florida to this meeting to meet and hear Senator Carlton. A motorcade will leave from the city parking lot behind the school administration office at 7 p. m. Carlton supporters from South Seminole County will join the motorcade at South Seminole County headquarters on Highway 17-82."

"The first primary campaign is coming to an end and we hope every voter will avail himself of the opportunity of meeting and hearing Senator Carlton," Southward said.
