

Bank Prexy Howard Hodges says the action was initiated by the holding company (Atlantic Bancorporation of Jacksonville). Hodges told The EAr it was a statewide move affecting many of the 31 banks in the

Bill Brown worked 221/2 years. He worked in customer service. Marjorie Morgenstern, a teller, had about 18 years service.

Lee Moore had served in the U.S. Army for a total of 12 years when he tendered his resignation in 1956. He had been where the action was in Europe with the 17th Airborne Division during World War II and again during the Korean Conflict. But, he didn't plan it that way.

He was separated from the Army as a first lieutenant after four years service in 1946 and planned his college education at the University of

Two years later, only 26 hours short of his degree, he found the only jobs available paid \$200 a month and he could earn that much in the military.

He re-enlisted as a staff sergeant, but was a captain by the time he resigned eight years later.

During his first tour of duty, in 1945, he was introduced to Ann, the woman who would become his wife a year later, at a sorority house on the campus of the University of Georgia. Their first date, the weekend after they met, was the Georgia-Florida football game. He was stationed at Fort Bragg at the

Moore was born in Palmetto and grew up in Kissimmee. Because his wife had lived in Sanford for many years, the couple made their home here. He Moore considers golf his hobby, and plays twice weekly, once with "the boys" and on Sundays with

The Moore's have five children ranging in age from 27 to 11. Their children are: Kathleen, 27, married and with two children, in Clarkesville, Ga.; Analee, 25, who is working on her PhD at the

Top spot on the ballot for Sanford's Dec. 7 municipal election will be occupied by the mayor's race, featuring incumbent Lee P. Moore and Harry Skop. Moore, who is to celebrate his 53rd birthday next month,

is completing his ninth year of consecutive elective service to the city, having been elected to a two-year term as city commissioner, and four and three-year terms as

Skop, 60, is making his third bid for election to the mayor's office, having waged two prior unsuccessful

The city polls at the civic center will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. election day. The city has 8,278 qualified voters. The mayor in the City of Sanford, in addition to having the usual responsibilities of a chief executive, acts as chairman of the city commission and has the same authority and power as a city commissioner.

The proudest thing in Harry Skop's life are his three sons, two of them are grown and pursuing successful careers and his youngest, the child of his later years, Nathan, nine years old.

Skop's oldest son, Richard, has a PhD and is a physicist with the Navy Research Lab in Washington, D.C. Richard has three children, Skop's only grandchildren.

His second son, Arthur Lloyd, who also has a PhD, is in the foreign service in Ghana and was formerly chief liaison officer and head of protocol for Shirley Temple Black when she was the United States

ambassador to that African nation. Nathan Andrew, a fourth-grade student at All Souls Catholic School, was born in Charlotte, N. C. where Harry Skop was the chief salesman to Sweet

Tree Mills, a sweater manufacturing concern. Skop, his wife, Fredi, and Nathan moved to Florida when the firm offered him a transfer. He picked Sanford as his base of operation because of its central local location. "It was only 21/2 hours from the furthest point I had to travel here, meaning I could be home every night.

"In Charlotte, I had to be away as many as three days at a time," Skop said.

Skop was born in Providence, R. I. and he and his family moved to Baltimore when his father died. He was four years old. He went from grade school to city college in Baltimore and among his classmates were the man, who is now Sen. Hubert Humphrey's personal physician, and Marvin Mandel, who is now the governor of Maryland.

Before leaving Baltimore, Skop said he was active

Hope Of Gaining Influence **Determined Angola Decision**

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) - The United States decided not to block Angola's second attempt at U.N. membership to increase U.S. influence in black Africa and avoid damaging the stalled Geneva talks on Rhodesia, diplomats said, U.S. representative Albert W. Sherer Jr. told the 15-member Security Council on Friday that while the United States will not support Angola's application, it "win not stand in the way." This indicated a U.S. abstention when the council votes Monday. The United States vetoed Angola's first try at U.N. membership last June 23, citing the presence of 12,000 to 15,000 Cuban troops in Angola.

Rhodesia Blamed For Bombs

GABORONE, Botswana (AP) — Botswana has blamed Rhodesia for planting suitcase bombs that killed a child and injured four other persons in the offices of exiled black nationalists opposed to its whiteminority regime. Friday's blasts also destroyed a truck, showered the street with glass and tore roofs from houses near the African National Council offices in Francistown, about 25 miles from the Rhodesian border. "We have reason to believe that this last diabolical act was intended to be in retaliation for the Botswana government's refusal last week to return a number of schoolchildren who fled Rhodesia to seek refuge in Botswana."

Court Battle Over Land Due

MEXICO CITY (AP) - Wealthy landowners cried "robbery" and promised a court battle to reclaim nearly a quartermillion acres of rich Mexican farmland that was seized and turned over to peasant farmers by the government of President Luis Echeverria. The landowners also predicted a drastic drop in production on the farms seized Friday in Sonora state, which borders Arizona in northwestern Mexico. The farms account for half the nation's wheat and much of its

Canada Fears Retaliation

CALGARY, Alta. (AP) - Agriculture Minister Eugene Whelan says fear of possible retaliation by the United States is the main reason why Canada has refused to impose an import tax on potatoes

Canadian potato growers have been asking for such a surtax to protect their market from the American crop.

University of North Carolina; she got her masters degree at the University of Florida; Tommy, 22, a junior at the University of Florida, College of Engineering; Carolyn, 15 a sophomore at Seminole High School and Jere, 11, a sixth grader at

Sanford Middle School. In their home on Mellonville Avenue, the Moores proudly display a painting by Ed Stowe of the original Fort Mellon which was located at about where Mellonville Avenue and Second Street intersect. Moore said the painting was patterned after a sketch of the original fort.

In the backyard of their spacious house is a swing and picnic table made of old cypress beams and subflooring from the two Chase buildings, constructed in 1905 and 1907, and razed last year. Moore is president of Chase and Co.

In 1967, Moore was elected to the city commission and during his second year in office, his colleagues selected him as mayor. A local act was then passed by the Legislature requiring that the mayor be elected directly by the people and Moore ran for mayor successfully for a three-year term and is now completing a four-year term.

He considers major achievements during his time in public office, the city-wide street paving program, the proposed new city hall, secondary treatment at the sewer plant and the fact that the city has maintained itself in a sound financial

position and has a very good credit rating. The mayor pointed out that, although the bond issue needed to construct the police station a couple years ago was relatively small, Sanford was able to command a better interest rate -one-eighth better - than received by Daytona Beach at the same

Among his goals, if re-elected, is a solution to the drainage problems in the city. He said that the city under the federal public works law has applied for grants to solve the drainage. But, he said, the city has been led to believe that drainage is considered a second priority in approved projects.

City voters have twice turned down referendums to finance the drainage solution with property taxes.

Skop calls himself a "workaholic," saying he enjoys his work, the newspaper business, collect? coins, a hobby his young son also participates in, and that he is a philanthropist on a small scale. "It's always been my hobby to help the 'un-

derdog'," Skop said. "In a small way, I've helped a lot of people. He has been publishing a weekly newspaper, the Metro News, which he owns in partnership with Mrs. Skop, for the past eight years.



Pact Will Add Billions

To GM Costs: Bargainer

DETROIT (AP) - The tentative agreement between the United Auto Workers and General Motors will add \$5.8 billion to GM labor costs. says the company's top labor bargainer. But he said he does not know whether that also means higher car prices.

George B. Morris Jr., GM's labor vice president, called the settlement terms "inflationary" and said they would increase labor costs for the average GM hourly worker about 33 per cent, or \$3.75 an hour, by 1979, including projected inflation raises.

Nuclear Report Stirs Doubt

WASHINGTON (AP) - The head of a federal nuclear safety panel is skeptical of a government report that concludes the risks are negligible in known methods of nuclear

waste disposal. David W. Moeller, of Harvard University's School of Public Health, said Friday he was "just not convinced" that there are practical solutions to the dangers of storing nuclear material for thousands of years.

Moeller is chairman of a subcommittee of the Advisory Committee on Reactor Safeguards, which held two days of meetings to consider a Nuclear Regulatory Commission (NRC) staff report on nuclear reprocessing and waste disposal.

Murderer May Go Free

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) - The man who prosecuted Gary Gilmore says the convicted murderer may have to be freed on a legal technicality if he is not executed by Dec. 7. Utah's attorney general-elect says he agrees. "This case could come to an extremely llogical conclusion," said Utah County Atty.

Noall Wootton. Wootton, who prosecuted Gilmore for the July 20 killing of a Provo motel clerk, told George W. Latimer, chairman of the state pardons board, in a letter Friday that state statutes require a death penalty to be carried out within 60 days of the date of judgment.

extreme northwest Florida. In other parts of the country, snow flurries dusted extreme northeast Minnesota, eastern upper Michigan, Iowa and extreme western Illinois. Rain and snow showers were reported in northeastern New York. Fog increased along the California coast.

Seniors To Lay Pipeline

HOPE, Idaho (AP) - Almost all the 94 residents in this northern Idaho town are 60 years old or older. But they need a new water line and money is short so they plan to do the work themselves.

The townspeople have formed a senior citizens' brigade to lay three-quarters of a mile of pipe from the town's spring, high on the side of 6,149-foot Roundtop Mountain. The alternative is hiring someone, and the estimated \$80,000 expense would empty the Hope treasury.



The Peso's Future Far From Certain

The repercussions from two devaluations of the peso are adding to the problems which Jose Lopez Portillo must face when he becomes president of Mexico on Dec. 1. The fact that he is a former finance minister is considered a plus. He can be expected to understand the importance of sound fiscal and monetary policies.

As president, however, Mr. Lopez Portillo must find a way to blend his financial wisdom with the political necessities of governing his country. He is in the same boat with Britain's Prime Minister James Callaghan, who is having trouble persuading his own Labor Party to accept the kind of medicine that might save the British economy and restore confidence in the pound sterling. Under what is virtually a one-party system in

Mexico, Mr. Lopez Portillo is pledged to keep the government on basically the same course it has followed under President Luis Echeverria Alvarez. Nevertheless, if the new president does not somehow modify that course there is not much

chance that the recent devaluations of the peso will have the economic benefits the government is looking for.

The devaluation is supposed to stimulate tourist business and exports, thus easing the severe deficit in Mexico's balance of trade and reversing a flight of capital from the country. Whether this happens depends on how well Mexico can control the tendency for wages and prices to rise sharply to compensate for the reduced buying power of the peso. Obviously if wage and price increases should equal the amount of the devaluation, the whole exercise has come to naught.

Different schools of economists are poles apart on whether letting the peso float to a new valuation against the dollar was a good strategy or not. Leaving that argument aside, we can observe that monetary policy alone is not likely to cure the problem of capital flight from Mexico. That problem reflects a growing uncertainty, both among Mexican citizens and foreign investors, about the political and economic stability of the

The Echeverria government had taken the attitude that if private investors were not happy with conditions in Mexico, including some highly nationalistic controls on foreign investment and a leftward drift in foreign and domestic policies, they could take their money elsewhere. A lot of them did, and this has aggravated Mexico's problem of sustaining economic growth.

Faced with a drying up of private capital for investment, the government made up the difference with public funds, printing pesos recklessly to do so. The result has been a government role growing lopsided in an economy that is supposed to be "mixed" — and rampant inflation.

What Mexico is suffering now is a crisis of confidence in its currency and its economic future. The peso will remain intrinsically stable only if it represents a Mexican economy that has the ingredients of stable growth. Mr. Lopez Portillo is not likely to accomplish much in that direction unless his policies toward investment in the private sector become more hospitable to both Mexican and outside capital, and the government's ambitions become more modest. The question is whether he and his party are willing to accept the necessity of those changes in the legacy of the



Well, Since You Asked ...

Q. What has happened to Joe Washington, who looked like he was going to be the rookie of the year for the San Diego Chargers? I haven't heard of him since the season started .-- W.H., Oklahoma

For good reason. The shifty Oklahoma graduate, so brilliant in the early exhibition games, hurt his knee. The Chargers nursed him along, hoping he'd recuperate by mid-season, but now it's obvious Washinton is going to need surgery and won't be available

Q. What players do you consider the outstanding quarterbacks in college football and which ones are the pros going to draft?-

From a pro standpoint, I believe the top three are Joe Roth of California, Vince Ferragamo of Nebraska and Steve Pisarkiewicz of Missouri. The pro scouts. like Jack White of San Francisco, agree with me. Ferragamo is the only one who's operated healthy this fall. From a college standpoint, the top quarterback might have been Nolan Cromwell of Kansas, one of the great athletes in America, who went out for the season with a knee injury. The pros



Q. When a safety man signals for a fair catch on a punt, doesn't he actually have to catch the ball?- R. D. Cincinnati, O. He does, if he wants to prevent its sailing or rolling deeper into his own territory. Then if he bobbles, it, it's a free ball. However, the rules specify that he is not required to catch the ball (if, for example, he sees it's going into the end zone for a touchback). Q. What was the surgery performed on Randy Jones and how will it affect his career? - G.G., Oceanside, Calif.

The surgery was on a nerve in his left arm, and the doctors project full recovery for the Cy Young Award winner of the San Diego Padres. The initial prognosis of surgery on a bicep tendon would have been far more serious. Q. How did they happen to come up with the name of Super Bowl

for the championship game of professional football? - T.R., Springfield, Mo. In the summer of 1966, Lamar Hunt was on a committee arranging the merger of the NFL and AFL, with a championship game between the leagues on the agenda. "There'd be a reference to the 'final game," ' he remembers, "sometimes the 'championship game,' but we never knew for sure which chamionship." At the time his daughter Sharron, then 8, had a rubber sphere with terrific bouncing qualities. They'd bounce it on the driveway and it would go over the house. It was called a "Super Ball." "In a meeting one day," continues Lamar, "the term Super Bowl just popped out of my mouth — I guess I was thinking about Sharon's ball — and everybody smiled. That's what we started calling it." By Super Bowl III, the designation became official.

Q. When do the Washington Redskins get to pick a No. 1 choice in the pro football draft again?-L.M., Alexandria, Va. They're not due until January, 1979, because they gave up the top picks in the '77 and '78 drafts to get defensive tackle Dave Butz from St. Louis. And if George Allen is till running things, don't bet on that No. 1 pick for '79 staying with Washington long.

Do you know of any Athletics team before the 1901 Philadelphia A's? Please answer - I'm an avid fan of the broken up A's.-Todd Guy, Walnut Creek, Calif.

It is recorded that the Brooklyn Atlantics played the Philadelphia Athletics in 1866, with 40,000 people swarming to the site an, in fact, over-running the field so that the clubs were forced to call the game.



Q. Because of the great number of injuries to quarterbacks in pro ball this year, do you think that some special rule should be put in to give them extra protection? And what might they be? — J.P., Oakland, Calif.

To the first question, no. The quarterback is part of the game and takes the same risk other players do. The officials ostensibly are there to protect him from late hits. John Madden of the Oakland Raiders has suggested that the referee blow a horn to warn off defenders after the quarterback has released the ball John Brodie has suggested that "grounding the ball" be taken out of the rule book to give the QB a release valve. I personally think that quarterback injuries are cyclical.

Q. I read that Notre Dame recently tied its NCAA record of not allowing a touchdown in 22 straight quarters. Yet I have often read of the Duke Blue Devils of 1938, who came to the Rose Bowl unscored upon, only to lose to USC, 7-3. - Robert Anderson, Ventura, Calif.

What you read pertains only to Notre Dame's own school records, not to a collegiate record, and in fact pertains only to modern football because the 1903 Irish went through the entire slate of nine games without allowing a point. Tennessee in regular season play did not allow a touchdown from Oct. 29, 1938, through the first quarter of the Alabama game on Oct. 19, 1940 — a total of 71 scoreless quarters. (The Volunteers did lose bowl games after both the '38 and '39 seasons.)

Q. Who is George Foreman's manager now, the one who makes all his fights? Is it Gil Clancy, who has managed Emile Griffith? - R.T., Corpus Christi, Tex.

No. The fact is, George Foreman has no manager of record. He claims he doesn't need one, having learned the hard way how to get bilked. Gil Clancy serves mostly as a special handler who sets up his training and handles all other details before bouts. Eddie Shipes conducts his training.



CBers Saving Lives Via 'Skip'

By INK DIPPER

(EDITOR'S NOTE: Ink Dipper (KYZ-3916) is the handle of the editor of The CB Times-Journal.) CBers are saving the lives of people hundreds of miles away, thanks to "skip," a phenomenon caused when radio signals bounce off the earth's

The Federal Communications Commission has a regulation prohibiting CBers from talking to anyone more than 150 miles away. But it has taken no action against people involved in these long-distance rescues.

Skip fluctuates during the year, usually peaking in the summer months when the atmosphere picks up extra energy and becomes reflective. But skip can also be caused by sunspots, erup-

tions on the sun's surface which grow more intense every 11 years. The sunspots shoot out extra ultraviolet rays, charging the atmosphere with more energy and making it reflective. Sunspot activity is just around the corner. The high activity, which will last three to five years, starts in 1978 and will probably peak in the early

More people in trouble will be relying on skip to contact emergency aid. One of the most dramatic skip-related rescues

came recently when a group of North Carolina CBers monitored a distress call from a sinking pleasure boat in the Bahamas.

The boat, with four persons aboard, was going aboard the boat. down fast when Jocelyn "White Widow" Goodwin picked up the call. 

A CBer, before he shoots skip in an emergency, should ask himself if the end justifies the means. Is the situation dire enough to justify breaking the law and bothering people hundreds of miles away? A flat tire on the interstate wouldn't qualify, but an automobile wreck - with injuries - would if

CBers shooting skip in emergencies should forget everything they know about 10-codes and slang expressions. Both vary from state-to-state and even county-to-county, so a person six states away might use different codes and slang. Skip signals are fickle, so messages should be short and clear, giving the nature of the emergency, location, extent of any injuries and who to telephone

there was no other way to send for help.

The police in the nearest town are usually the best perople to suggest for sending help. Even though the emergency may be out of their jurisdiction, the police would know to whom the

message should be routed. Like any other call for help, a skip call should be made on channel nine, the emergency channel. If no one can be raised on channel nine, other frequencies might be tried, but with frequent rotation back to nine. People trained in handling emergency calls monitor channel nine from Maine to California, so no matter where a skip signal falls, there's a better chance on channel nine of finding someone who knows what he or she is doing.

Skip should always be a last resort. Try to contact someone locally so the message can be relayed by a person familiar with the geography and who to call in emergencies. Constantly punching away on skip might break through to a local CBer, and no matter how weak his

DALLAS (AP) - Dallas was to briefly and silently mark the anniversary of the assassination of President John F. Kennedy today - two blocks from where shots shattered the calm of a sunny November day 13

Meanwhile, Dallas police gathered records of the killing, subpoenaed by a House committee investigating assassinations.

A short prayer and a moment of silence were scheduled at the Kennedy Memorial. close to the spot where - according to the Warren Commission — Lee Harvey Oswald, acting alone, shot and killed Kennedy on Nov.

"There will be no speeches," Dallas County Democratic Chairman Ron Kessler said of the short service.

The Rev. Zan Holmes, a former Texas legislator, and Dr. Paul A. Stauffer, executive director of the Greater Dallas Community of Churches, were to officiate at the memorial

Sunday that the department's records had been subpoenaed. He said he presumed the records would include those detailing the killing of Oswald by Dallas nightclub owner Jack Ruby two days after Kennedy's death.
