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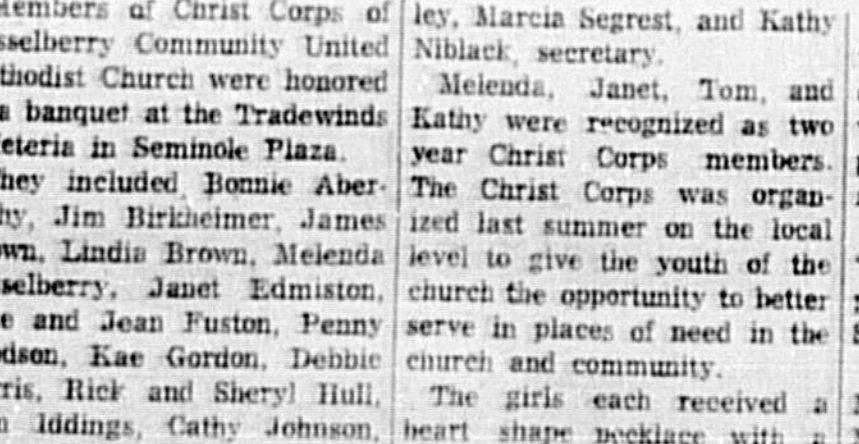

**Don't Wait On 'Fruits' Of Vegetable Gardens**

Now that most vegetable gardens have been planted and are actively growing, you can't just sit back and wait for the "fruits" or your labor to materialize. There are still many things to do before a good harvest is guaranteed.

Watering is most essential. A good soaking once or twice a week is necessary, either through rain or irrigation. Older vegetables need more water than a newly planted crop. It is better to give the plants one thorough watering than to give them a little water each day. Light sprinklings cause shallow rooting.

To keep vegetables growing actively particularly during periods of heavy rain, it will be necessary to fertilize about every two weeks. A fertilizer such as 8-8-8 or 10-10-10 is satisfactory. These should be applied at the rate of about 2 pounds per 100 feet of row. Shallow cultivation is best, especially when the plants get larger. Deep cultivation cuts

**Pesticide Law Tightened**

To lessen the likelihood of more accidents involving highly toxic pesticides, the Florida legislature has passed a new law to keep these chemicals out of the hands of unauthorized users.

The legislation becomes effective January 1, 1970. Pursuant to the bill is to regulate the sale, purchase, use, and possession of certain "restricted pesticides." It will also require dealers and purchasers to have licenses or permits.

Restricted pesticides means any material which the Florida Department of Agriculture finds to be hazardous to man and his environment or to animals or crops, with the exception of the pest or vegetation the pesticide is supposed to destroy.

The list of restricted pesticides has not been determined, but a committee has been named to compile a list between now and October. Parathion and other highly toxic pesticides will be on the list.

When it becomes effective, the bill will make it unlawful (1) to sell or distribute restricted pesticides without a license, (2) to purchase, use or possess restricted pesticides without a permit, and (3) to purchase, use or dispose of restricted pesticides or their container in a manner other than that stated on the purchase permit or on the label.

Persons wishing to obtain such a permit must be certified as a bona-fide user of restricted pesticides necessary for the operation of his agricultural business.

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**The Long View Home Fatalities Rank No. 7**

Home accidents were the seventh-ranking cause of death last year among Florida residents 65 and older, a recent report of health authorities shows. Such accidents ranked second as the reason for people being in nursing homes.

Falls accounted for 95 percent of the home accidents.

Older persons are more accident prone because they have less physical control, their feet are less steady and their homes weaker. Further, more, age affects balance and reaction time. Older persons should therefore adopt a more self-protective attitude. Non-slip shoes are a "must." Children's toys left lying about can spell tragedy for a visiting grandparent.

Homes can present many other boobytraps for older people with failing eyesight. Thresholds, steps, slippery wax floors and throw rugs should be eliminated. Loose stair banisters, insecure stair treads and poor lighting are especially dangerous. In these areas, 30 to 10 foot-candles are minimum requirements—about twice that needed by younger persons. Night lights from bedroom to bath are advisable.

The bath presents another hazard to older folk. They need a sturdy hand-hold in the wall near the bathtub and a rubber mat in it to prevent slips or falls. A railing on the bathtub, attached before the bath and removed afterward, will help an elderly person to climb in and out more easily.

When an elderly person understands and accepts his own limitations and becomes familiar with his surroundings, he'll feel more confident and secure, and he'll be safer, too.

**Hydrologist Condemns Jetport**

WASHINGTON (AP) — A hydrologist's report prepared for the Interior Department says development of a proposed jetport near the Florida Everglades would impose intolerable ecological damage—everglades were limited to training operations only.

Development of the proposed site, now used as a pilot training area by the Dade County Port Authority, would "inevitably destroy" the Everglades and might seriously damage the ecological balance of all of southern Florida, commented water expert Lane B. Leopold, who prepared the report.

"So long as the training airport is in use, pressure and plans for its expansion will continue and will inexorably and surely lead to destruction completely," he said.

The report was made public Wednesday by the Interior Department shortly after Interior Secretary Walter J. Hickel and Transportation Secretary John A. Volpe—later joined by Florida Gov. Claude Kirk—came out against full-scale development of the area as a jetport.

The three, however, said they did not object to its continued use as a training site.

A spokesman for Hickel said the report was not changed the secretary's position.

The proposed site is on 38 square miles of land located 45 miles west of Miami and 9 miles north of the Everglades. The port authority already has constructed a two-mile runway for training flights and had considered using the site for cargo and passenger operations.

The authority says it eventually could be used to handle supersonic passenger jets or six-mile runways. About one million flights a year were envisioned.

Leopold's report says the activities connected with an airport of such magnitude would alter and pollute the area's natural water supply to a degree which would not be overcome.

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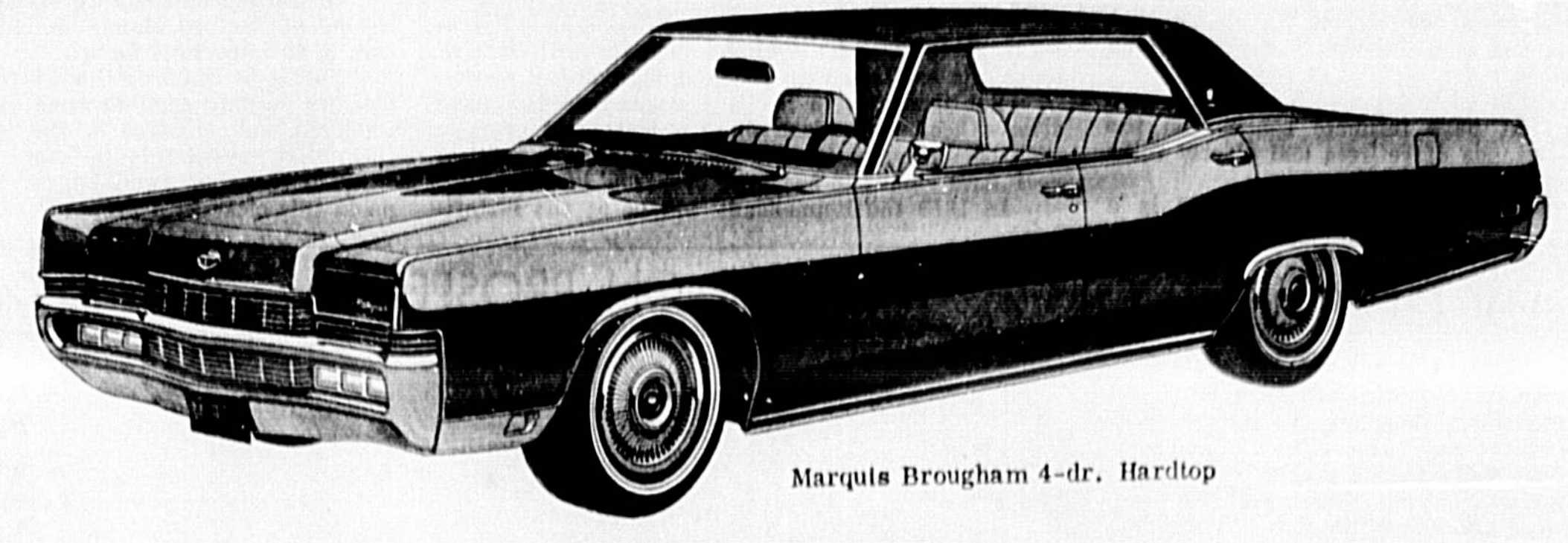
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# Senior Citizens' Problems Are Spotlighted!

Two recent events have caught the close attention of the senior citizens who live in Sanford, Seminole.

One was as far away as the White House and President Richard M. Nixon's announcement of a recommendation for Congress to increase Social Security benefits by ten per cent effective April 1, 1970.

Another was as near as Second Street, Sanford, where the unhappy announcement was made that Sanford Manor, the beautiful and excellent nursing home, would close.

In widely different manner each spotlights two circumstances that have intimate bearing on the lives of the thousands of retirees and elderly folks who are here in Central Florida.

The increase in Social Security benefits is a

move that is long overdue and only partially will help to bring the Social Security payments into balance with those formerly enjoyed before inflation.

As President Nixon put it: "This is a matter of simple justice for those living on Social Security, because as we look at the record of rising costs over the past five years, those who have suffered most are our older citizens who are living on fixed income."

With this assessment we are in complete agreement. Sentiment for such an increase will flourish as this is an issue with considerable political appeal.

Yet increases in Social Security benefits have always been very much more a matter of promise than performance. Usually the pressure of a political year does mount to turn the proposals into law.

In 1970 the Republicans will be at the histor-

ically difficult period of mid-term elections. Thus the senior citizens can logically expect these to provide more support from the legislators in favor and greatly diminish the open opposition from those who would block.

However, it should be remembered that this increase can lose all true meaning should the Nixon administration fail in its drive to control the inflationary tide.

In the second instance already referred to—the closing of Sanford Manor—Social Security's Medicare is an important factor.

For it is the benefits which this afforded the oldests needing such services as this nursing home rendered, and changes in the provisions governing them that caused this decision.

The capable administrator, John W. Jenkins made this clear in a prepared statement: "Medicare

regulations and qualifications have become stricter and are more rigidly enforced since last October and now only 20 per cent of the patients here are Medicare patients."

More specifically he stated: "Many of these elderly citizens receiving only very small pensions would not have come to the nursing home without Medicare benefits and when these benefits are denied they have no money to pay."

Of course this nursing home situation is not peculiar to Sanford or Seminole County but is general to the entire state.

So our senior citizens can chalk up one plus and one minus in circumstances governing their sunset years. The plus is still only a glow and the minus may be just a needed warning.

Each demands follow-through and top level attention!

## Congress-FOI

The Federal Trade Commission has got "freedom of information" turned around a bit. By the FTC's reasoning, Congress has passed an "information of freedom" act.

Rep. John E. Moss of California, chief sponsor of the act, has called attention to the FTC's failure to carry out the will of Congress. The law is designed to provide easier access to government records. But while the law provides that all government records are open unless specifically exempted from disclosure, the FTC says in effect that everything is confidential unless specifically declared public.

The FTC has responded to criticism from Moss by offering some changes in its regulations. One would drop the requirement that a person's written application for FTC enforcement be made "under oath." Another would remove the words "upon good cause shown" from the commission's rules on producing records.

Congressman Moss is serving the useful purpose of needing and prodding federal agencies that chose to give the FOI law the backs of their hands. He has shown good cause why the FTC, for one, should be considered guilty until proved innocent of failing to carry out the letter and spirit of the law. — Charlotte (N.C.) Observer

## Interpretive Report:

### "Dissolving Political Identity"

WASHINGTON, D.C. — The two major political parties are examining themselves to see if they can survive in their present form, in an era of dissolving political identity.

Neither party has yet fully recovered from their 1968 conventions, one a cut and dried, contrived affair, and the other a traumatic experience which would have wrecked a less flexible political organization.

A year after these unsettling events it cannot be said that either party is moving in the direction of real reform. The convention system is not being junked, a presidential primary and run-off is far away. Methods of selecting delegates are not being significantly altered.

The move for reform in the Democratic Party has actually become a power struggle for control of the 1972 convention and nominating process. The opposing forces are the same as in the 1968 convention, with the more liberal's "New Deal" coalition of Eugene McCarthy and Teddy Kennedy.

The party machinery remains under the control of the same forces which nominated Hubert H. Humphrey for president. Battle lines which are now forming hit Humphrey again against the reformers.

At the root of the problem is eliminating the unit rule in the process of selecting delegates to the national convention. Essentially this idea rejects the traditional concept of majority rule and substitutes for it the more sophisticated idea that minority viewpoints should also be represented in the party councils.

This is contrary to the winner take all principle of the American political process which has encouraged the emergence of the boss system, and that is what the reformists are fighting.

The despair of ever getting their way if a group of bosses from key states holding control of their full delegations under majority rule maintain effective control of the national convention. This is the way it has been for many years in the Democratic Party. The reformists did not object when John F. Kennedy exploited this kind of boss control to win the presidential nomination. They were powerless when Lyndon B. Johnson perpetuated himself once by the same methods and prepared to do so again in 1968 with his answer: "The party will support no candidate in the primaries but will unite behind the nominee for the general election."

At first blush, the political onlookers believed there was a rift between Gov. Claude Kirk and his handpicked lieutenant, Bob Dandridge.

Then there were others who believe that Kirk prevailed on Osborne to run for the Florida state seat in order to open a slot for State Sen. L. A. Balfaris. The North Palm Beach Republican has reportedly said he would run for the GOP nomination for governor against Kirk.

This, some Democrats claim, Kirk manipulated Osborne's power of the Democratic organization but it provided the stage for wild scenes of disorder and protest both off and on the floor of the convention.

That fact alone negated the purpose of the reformists and they were overwhelmed in part because they became identified, contrary to their intentions, with irrational disorder and violence arising from causes only remotely related to convention reform.

## Global Comment:

### Kosygin's Peking Meeting

WASHINGTON (NEA) — Some of President Nixon's analysts read a bleak significance into Soviet Premier Kosygin's "summit" visit to Peking.

They see the possibility Moscow was setting up justification for quickie air and missile strikes on Communist China's major nuclear and missile installations.

They think, moreover, that if Moscow is to act this year, it must act fast. The weather starts getting wet in October in the areas of China concerned—and becomes steadily rougher for air operations as fall ends and winter comes on.

All this analysis is pure conjecture, of course. These U.S. analysts have no inside track on Moscow's thinking. And U.S. estimates of what Russia would do were somewhat off for it the more sophisticated Communist parties are likely to be unwilling to follow the leadership of a Moscow that backs down (however much they may urge the Russians to compromise).

Russia's top men know this. Recently the U.S. government has received word that Soviet diplomats, on orders from Moscow, have been feeling out opinion at Red reactionite capitals as to what steps there were a Russian strike against Red China.

We have never lived where we had to be in mortal fear of the secret police, where our neighbor or close friend might be a government spy.

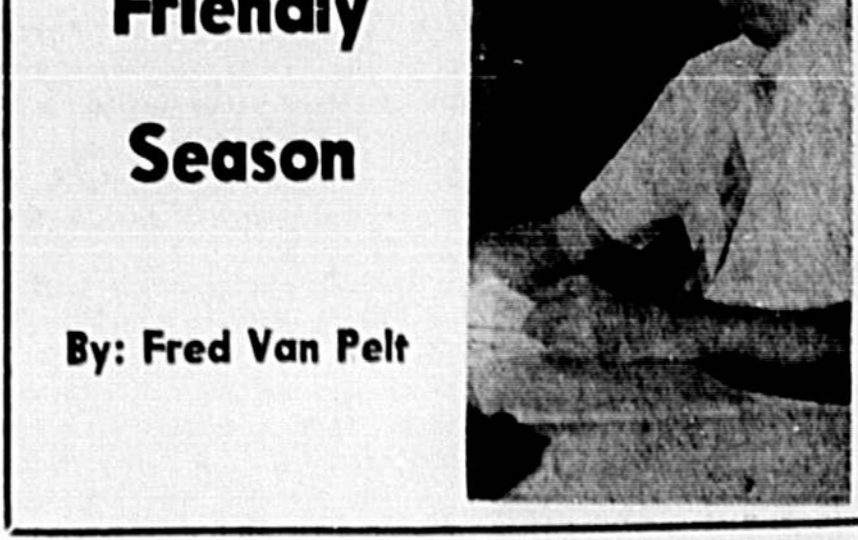

Lt. Gov. Ray Osborne threw a curve to the Republican state hierarchy last Friday afternoon . . . and all the political bigwigs, Democratic and Republican, still are trying to figure it out.

It was supposed to have been a cut-and-dried affair: U. S. Rep. William C. Cramer, who said he was "pushed" by President Nixon, was slated to have clear sailing for the GOP nomination for the U. S. Senate.

It didn't work out that way.

Osborne upset the apple cart by announcing last Friday — too late for the afternoon papers — that he wants the Senate GOP nomination for himself. And he caught the Republican state leaders flat-footed.

Republican leaders were having a strategy session at Orlando. It was closed to the press, of course (who wants to announce war plans to the enemy?). But to appease the press James Allison Jr. and Earl (Duke) Crittenden scheduled a conference at 3 p. m. at the Orlando Press Club.

Allison is deputy chairman of the Republican national committee at Washington and was a campaign chairman for U. S. Sen. Ed Gurney last year. Crittenden is chairman of the Republican state executive committee.

Allison and Crittenden stepped up in front of the television cameras. Duke made a little introductory speech and threw the meeting open for questions. (This reporter was present.)

# Cabinet To Fight Kirk's Building Freeze

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Gov. Claude Kirk Thursday ordered a 75 per cent cutback on construction build and a freeze on funds to build new legislative office buildings, but Cabinet members indicated they would fight him.

"I'm saying we are going to cooperate with the President," Kirk said at a news conference. He referred to President Nixon's request that state and local governments cut back on federal spending as a check on inflation.

Education Commissioner Floyd Christian, who Kirk frequently needles at Cabinet meetings, said he would continue to support the proposed \$10 million legislative office buildings.

"I would like to see the other day and if it was brought again to our attention I would vote again for it," Christian said.

"I hope we can assess the situation and better understand the motive for this action and the projects not to be brought to our attention," said Agriculture Commissioner Doyle Conner. "I would hope we could move

forward on a reasonable schedule," Conner said. "I don't see why we can't."

Transportation Secretary Michael O'Neil, saying he is completely concerned with Kirk, issued a statement explaining what road projects would be halted.

"Specifically this means there will be almost no further construction on Interstate 10 across North Florida, Interstate 85 along the Atlantic Coast and Interstate 75 in St. Petersburg, O'Neil said. "The future of the proposed Tampa Bypass also is similarly affected."

"The remaining federal funds will be used to construct projects indicated in our budget for this fiscal year and in our five-year road construction plan."

"Kirk again called on the Legislature to meet immediately to raise money for road construction. He said the previous day he would fight the legislative buildings project until legislators provided funds for his 16-year road program.

## 'Glades Building Ban Urged

WASHINGTON (AP) — A scientific study team said Thursday that all development, including a proposed giant jet street parking garage, in the subtropical swamps just north of Everglades National Park in Florida.

The group recommended creation of a new water conservation district, including the Big Cypress Swamp, whose restrictions would effectively block any development of the area for commercial, industrial, residential or agricultural use.

If the Dade County Port Authority insists on building its proposed jetport there, projects to handle a million flights a year, the scientists said, it should be no more than a land-strikeoff facility. All passenger and baggage processing, aircraft maintenance, and perhaps even fueling operations should be done elsewhere. In effect, they said, there would be no facility at the airport except runways.

The recommendations were made at a news conference here by Dr. Gordon J. F. MacDonald, vice chancellor of the University of California at Santa Barbara, and Dr. Marvin L. Goldberger, physics professor at Princeton University, as they unveiled a study just completed for the National Academy of Sciences and the National Academy of Engineering. The study group included 26 members plus four consultants.

The academics are private organizations which advise the government on scientific issues. Their study of the Florida situation was initiated on their own.

Secretary of the Interior Walter J. Hickel said Wednesday he opposes a jetport at the planned location nine miles north of Everglades National Park.

Hickel and Transportation Secretary John A. Volpe said a week ago that a jetport training runway already built might be used without harm under appropriate safeguards.

The study group agreed that the training airport alone "would not pose severe environmental problems, provided that flight patterns are carefully controlled, water quality is protected, and that commercial and residential development is discouraged in the vicinity."

## Stetson U. Ponders Stenstrom As Head

Sanford Attorney Douglas Stenstrom today reacted to a published account that he had been asked twice to become Stetson University president.

Said the former state senator and last year's unsuccessful candidate for Florida's Fourth District representative post in the U.S. Congress, "It is true that my name has been suggested, along with many others, to the presidential selection committee.

"For this reason I felt it appropriate that I resign from the presidential selection committee, although they know that I have no real feeling, that I could be receptive should the position be tendered to me.

"It is also true that a number of citizens around the district have urged me to run for Congress in 1970. I must say again, however, I have no plans to seek office in 1970 or thereafter.

"The simple truth is that I am perfectly happy where I am, that I have no further political aspirations and I hope to be able to continue serving Stetson as a member of the board of trustees."

# School \$\$ Jeopardized

Stenstrom, school attorney, received a long distance call from HEW's Washington office wanting additional information on the county's plan regarding whether the board desired the hearing.

Stenstrom spoke with an attorney who indicated a possibility that some of the federal funds counted on this year by the school system as "protected" might not be forthcoming under the government's decision to defer funds not already allocated under a continuing federal program.

Stenstrom told the woman lawyer that the School Board had received an Aug. 18 letter from Don M. Vernon, southern coordinator, education branch of Office of Civil Rights, stating the HEW deferral would have no effect on funds already committed before the effective date of the deferral.

Apparently there is some misunderstanding over just what funds are included in this deferral and Stenstrom asked the federal officials to determine exactly what federal programs are being continued this year.

It already has been established that a health education program, which had been a pilot program at six county schools, would not be among those federal programs to be funded after this year unless there is an approval of the county's desegregation plan.

Stenstrom explained to the caller that if a possibility exists

that some funds would not be forthcoming, then a hearing date inquiring into the allegations would have to be set before an expected suit by William Rowland, Orlando attorney, would place the county into U. S. District Court over the school plan.

Rowland told The Herald he intends to file a suit against the school plan in a week or so.

Stenstrom and the county board had reasoned that since federal funds had been assured for this year, then a hearing might be avoided with HEW, since it was supposed that a federal court suit would have already saved the freedom of choice plan before the 1970-71 school year when HEW funds loss would have been felt.
