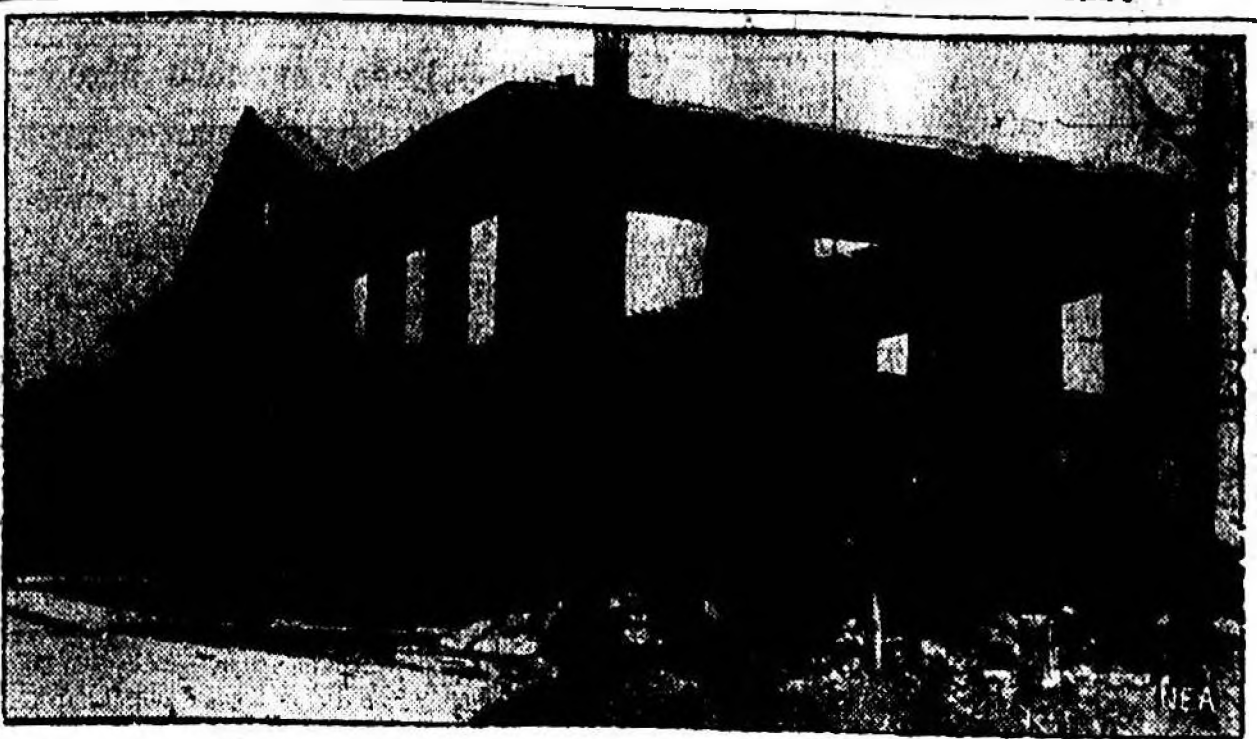

# Railroads Add To Facilities For Moving Materials As Fast As Possible In Winter

PALM HARBOR, Fla., July 16. The railroads of Florida are increasing their facilities in the winter, and are bending every effort towards seeing that road building materials are moved as fast as possible this winter.

This was the gist of letters received by the Florida Railroad Commission from the Atlantic Coast Line, Florida East Coast, Seaboard Air Line and Louisville and Nashville. The communications were in reply to questions propounded by the commission as to what the carriers were doing toward ensuring a better movement of road building materials this winter than was the case for 1925-26, when an extensive embargo was placed over the state.

The Atlantic Coast Line, according to J. P. Walker, Jr., Jacksonville, superintendent of transportation, during the week ending July 3, furnished 100 per cent of the equipment ordered for handling lime rock, crushed stone and sand. During the previous week, that railroad furnished 78.7 per cent of the equipment ordered, Mr. Walker stated.

Notwithstanding the fact that the Atlantic Coast Line furnished 100 per cent of the equipment ordered during the week ending July 3, compared with 78.7 per cent during the previous week, the superintendent stated, there were loaded only 23 more cars during the week ending July 3, than were loaded during the previous week. Eighty three and one-half per cent of the equipment furnished, he added, was loaded during the week ending July 3, against 99.4 per cent the previous week. This indicates, he stated, that only 75 and 20 per cent of the cars ordered can be loaded.

The facilities of the Atlantic Coast Line are being increased at all points, Mr. Walker said, which will place us in infinitely better position to handle more of this business than was handled last year, but the exact amount cannot be stated.

The Florida East Coast, J. H. Owen, general superintendent of transportation, advised, is now filling orders for movement of rock

from pits on that line 100 per cent, and is moving it with no delay. With the present facilities and additional facilities to be placed by the time the winter passenger service is begun, including double tracking with automatic signals all the way from Jacksonville to Miami, and new large yards, the Atlantic Coast Line, Mr. Owen added, will have no trouble in moving all of the business either on that line, or connecting lines.

At the present time, the Seaboard Air Line, according to C. E. Hix, superintendent of transportation, is furnishing 100 per cent of the equipment to all operations, and is moving the material to destinations without delay. The railroad is now receiving from its builders, 2,400 new 100,000 pound capacity solid flat bottom gondolas, Mr. Hix said, with delivery to be completed with 30 to 45 days. The majority of the cars, he said, will be put into Florida trade. The Seaboard, he stated, expects to be able to currently move all business offered this winter, but he suggested that buyers of road material provide storage space, and have shipped during the light summer months a good proportion of what they will require during the winter, putting it in storage near the point of consumption.

"The requirements for the transportation of road building material on this division are being properly taken care of," wrote E. O. Saltmarsh, superintendent of the Louisville and Nashville. "We have not as yet any movement of crushed rock, but it is expected that shipments of the limestone rock deposits on the eastern part of the P. and A. division will be made shortly."

## AMERICAN MATE FOR PRINCESS IS GIVEN APPROVAL

Match Between An American And Rumanian Princess Is Not Objectionable If Love Reigns, Says Queen Marie

BUCHAREST, July 16.—(AP)—Queen Marie of Rumania would like to have Princess Ilyana, her youngest daughter, marry the Prince of Wales, but would have no objection to her marrying an American if she really loved him.

The queen, who has decided definitely to spend three or four months in the United States this fall, will be accompanied by the princess and, possibly, Prince Nicholas, her youngest son. If King Ferdinand does not make the trip with her, he probably will call at New York at the conclusion of her stay for the return voyage.

"Of course," the queen told The Associated Press correspondent, "I would like Ilyana to marry the Prince of Wales, but that young man doesn't seem to be of the marrying kind."

"Certainly, no one could afford to spurn the throne of England, least of all one who is so thoroughly English as myself. But as I said before, I don't think the Prince of Wales is seeking a partner for the throne. And then, who knows whether he actually will ever take over the throne? Perhaps, his brother will get it."

The queen also denied rumor that the princess intended to marry King Boris of Bulgaria, or an

Italian or Belgian prince.

"As a matter of fact, she still is only a child, as you can see," she said, pointing to the seventeen-year old princess sitting nearby. "She can afford to wait. My dearest wish is that when she does marry, she will be as happy as her sister, Marie, who is now queen of Yugoslavia. Marie and the young Yugo-Slav king love one another truly and are superlatively happy."

May Write Scenario

"If it were," the correspondent asked, "that you are writing a scenario for a film to be produced by an American company and that you may appear in the picture yourself?"

"I may write a scenario some time in the future, if I get the time," Her Majesty replied. "But certainly I shall never be so vain or so foolish as to appear personally in a film."

"You must remember that I am now fifty. What part could I play in a film even if I had the desire to appear?" The only role would be a "grandmother" or a "mother-in-law." And I am sure Americans haven't much use either for grandmothers or for mothers-in-law. They want young people."

The queen now is completing a romance based on Rumanian life and soon will start a new series of articles which she receives on an average of one letter a day from American correspondents.

## Irvin Cobb Tells World's Greatest Historical Events

### When The Christians Lost Jerusalem

IRVIN S. COBB  
Perhaps no single isolated event of the World War was completely unparalleled in the history of the entire world. The taking of Jerusalem by the Allied forces under the gallant British commander, General Allenby, is one of the most dramatic episodes of the present city of the world. It is the first time in the history of the world that a city of 1,000,000 people was captured by a single force. There was a parallel, too, except that the main intent of Allenby's campaign was to break the power of the Turk in the Near East, whereas those original invaders were inspired by a motive of piety. It was the difference between a modern military project and an ancient religious devotion.

When Europe waked from the bud dream of the Dark Ages, a universal desire for the possession of the Holy Land from the hands of the infidel hordes sprang up. The belief that the place where the Faith was born would confer spiritual benefit upon those who visited them was an essential phase of the theological teachings of the time. Pilgrims who won their way to Jerusalem were, in the popular estimation, regarded as saints. When the self-chosen captives of the Crusade offered the prospect of lost in the event that their expedition should succeed, the ungodly as well as the godly huddled in confusion. There was a choice for the fool to worship before the shrine of the Christ here also was a cause for the greedy to shed the blood of unbelievers and accidentally to despoil the heathen.



When the Crusaders first took Jerusalem, our anonymous chronicler would have made an excellent staff of position of a modern daily. He incidentally incorporated into his story a description that his reader might get a picture of the greater drama. After the lapse of more than eight hundred years his narrative still appears to us in undimmed power. It is a tribute to any author's powers and a thing which may be said of but few of all the thousands of writers who, since the world began, have recorded in written words the history of their own time. It is thus that the records of the arrival of the expedition which, within the bounds of a reasonable comparison, was to have its parallel in the Great War considerably less than a decade ago.

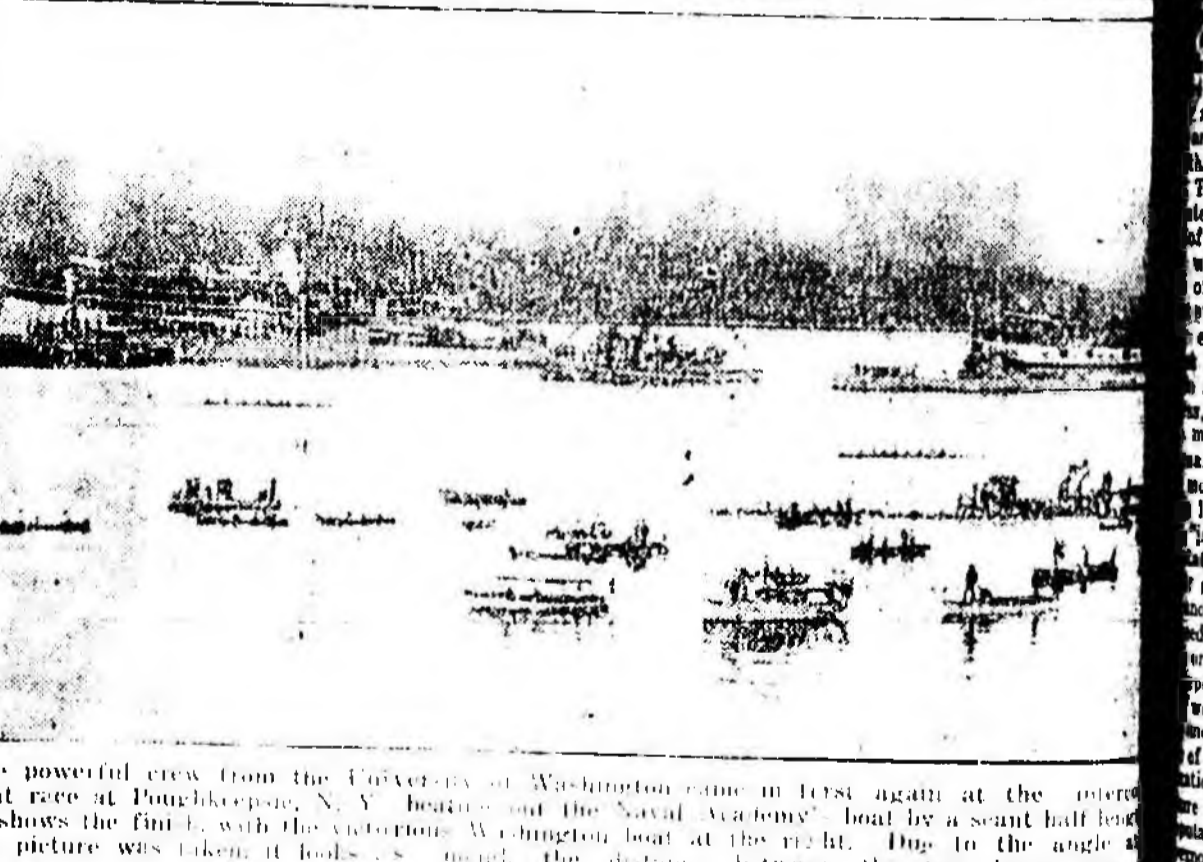

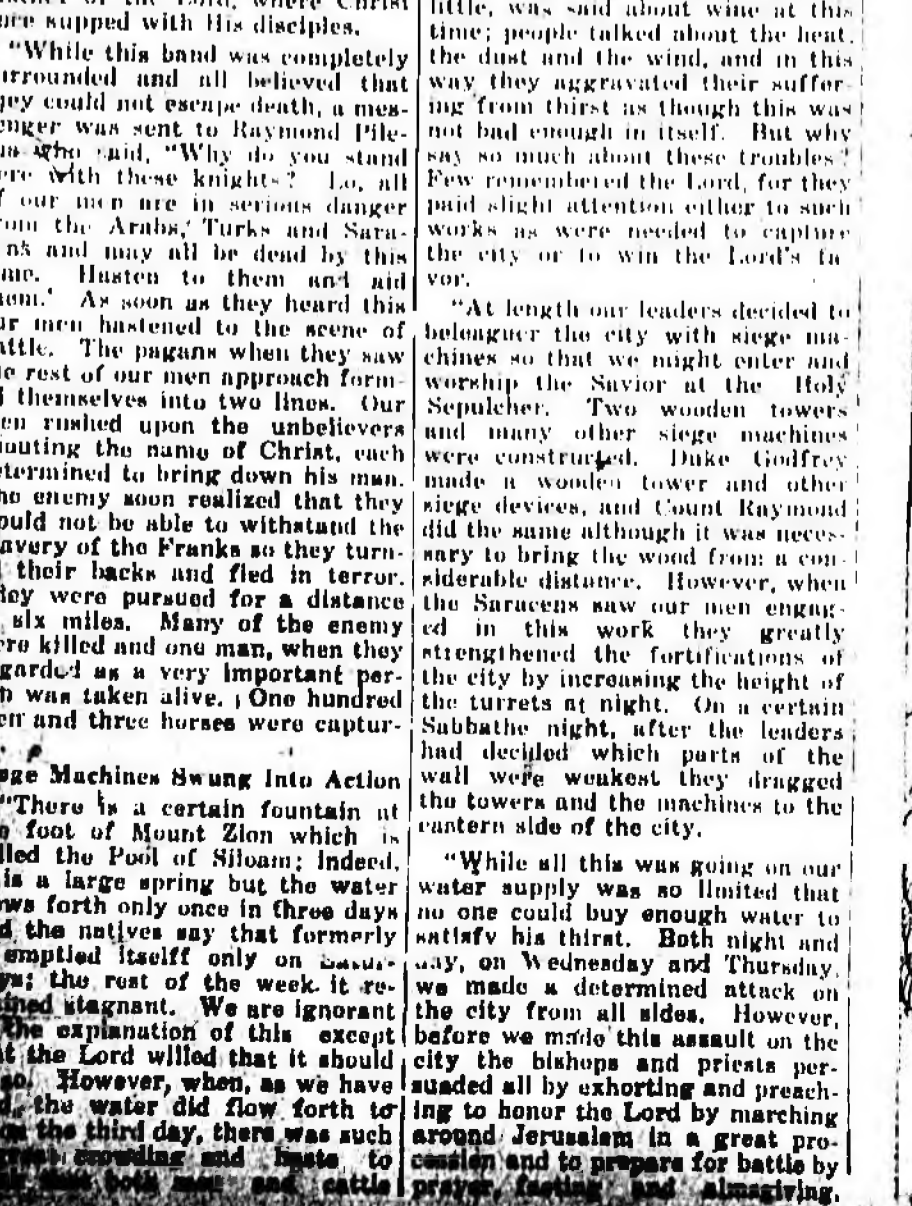

## Dr. Harper Gives Interesting Statistics On Population

FLA., July 15.—The population of Florida had a slight increase in 1923, according to the statistics given by Dr. M. Harper, local statistician, today. He stated that the population of the state in 1923 was 1,100,000, an increase of 60,000 over the population in 1922. The population of the state in 1920 was 1,040,000, and in 1910 it was 900,000. Dr. Harper's statistics are based on precincts, and city boundaries do not always coincide with precinct boundaries. The difference, however, he says, is small. In the case of Miami, nevertheless, there are some other uncertainties, which make it impossible to get the exact percentages for 1923, the statistician says. The table follows:

Continuing, Dr. Harper says: "St. Cloud and Lynn Haven are both old soldiers' colonies, and may not rank so high in adults at the next census, but the high rating of Palm Beach and some of the others is probably more or less permanent. Very few cities anywhere in the United States have over 75 per cent of adults. Among the highest are Lowville, N. Y., with 74.5 per cent in 1920; Pasadena, Cal., with 73 per cent; Bronxville, N. Y., 72.5 per cent; San Francisco, 72.2 per cent; Los Angeles, 72.1 per cent; San Diego, 72 per cent; Venice, Cal., 70.4 per cent, and Washington, D. C., 69.7 per cent. Boston, New York, Philadelphia and Chicago have between 61 and 65 per cent. "On the other hand, very few cities in Florida or elsewhere have less than 50 per cent of adults, though some rural communities run as low as 40 per cent. Some of the ratios for Florida cities may be even higher now than they were last year, on account of the great influx of adults since the census, but they cannot increase indefinitely, and they probably will not change much in the next few years. It will be very interesting to see how they come out in 1930."

## Columbia County National Guard Unit One Of Oldest Companies In The State

LAKE CITY, Fla., July 17.—(AP)—Among the troops at Camp Johnston, where the annual encampment of the Florida National Guard is in progress, is Company H, of Columbia county, one of the oldest units of the state. Company H which is under command of Captain E. A. Wright, First Lieutenant W. H. Gregory and Second Lieutenant R. B. Harkness, Jr., was organized at the beginning of the war between the states, under command of Captain J. M. Scheffeld, father of J. C. Scheffeld, president of the First National Bank. Under his command, the Lake City troops won a loving cup, presented by Major Y. O. Brown to the best

company in the battalion and also won the national loving cup for machine marksmanship. 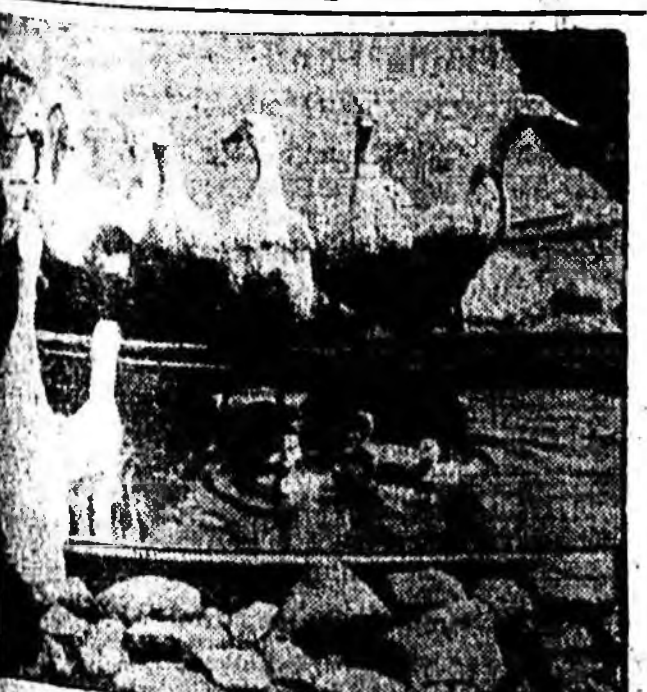

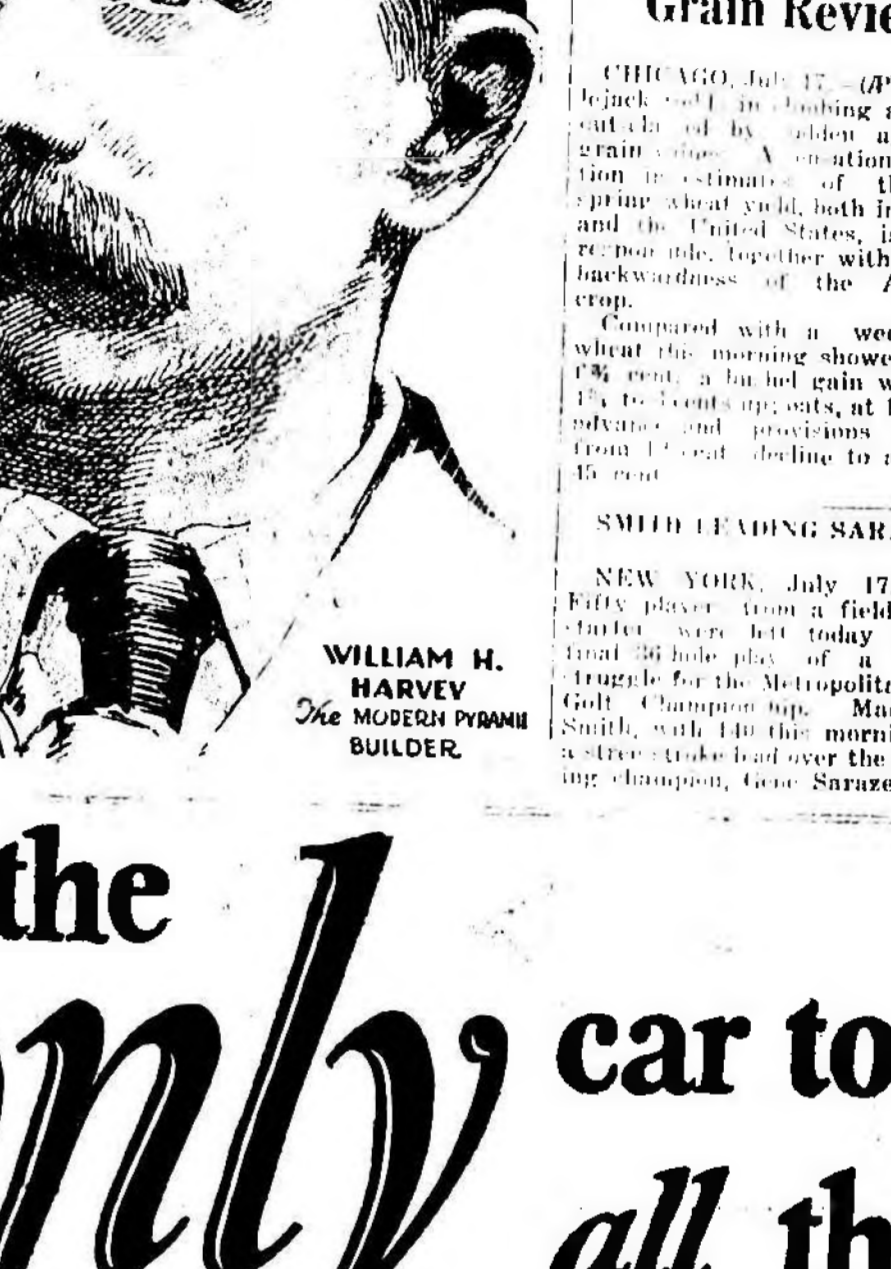

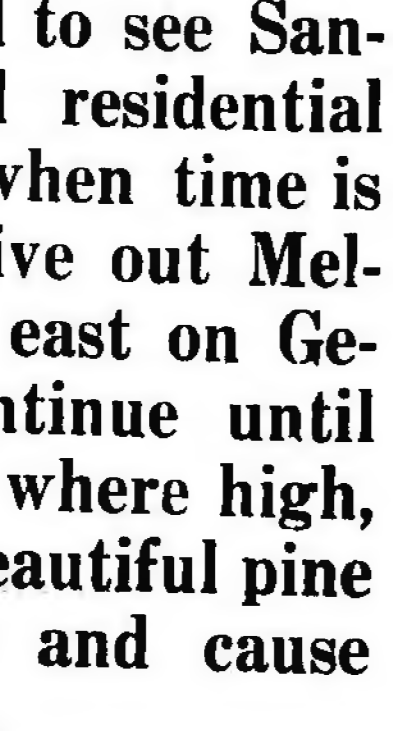
