





(NEW YORK, July 17.—(A)— The world's light-heavyweight ring own, jolted from championship gads five times in the last six years, found a new resting place today on the head of Jack Delancy of Bridgeport, Conn.

A sensational victory under the unanimous decision of the judges brought the crown to Delaney befor a capacity throng of 45,000 which paid \$420,000 to see the riv als of two years standing grapple Ebbets Field for the third time.

The fight for Delaney, who but seven months previous had failed to lift the champion from his rugred rival, was as popular as any such victory could be for a ring successor who had gathered around his probably the greatest following challenger since the days of Rhockout Brown,

And it came as fandom likes its here's crowned—with a spectacular rally in the last five rounds of the 13-round struggle after Berlenback appeared to be closing in to mide last December against De-

Delaney's impressive exhibition of ring-craft, punching power, and stamina, was a conquest of more than a stout-hearted, from armed gladiator of the old pugilistic school. It was a triumph of a tremendous weight advantage despite the fracturing of a small bone in his left thumb during the second

While officially, the weight of Berlenbach was recorded at 174% and that of Delaney as 166 y, postponement of the fight one day because of rain gave the defending title-holder a margin of 12 pounds over his opponent. When they entered the ring, Berlenbach tipped the scales at 181, six pounds over his class limit, while the challenger's mark was put at 169. Delaney's margin on points was

decisive, in the estimation of critic sat the ringside. Up until the last five rounds, however, there was little to choose between them, as the big advantage of the challenger in the early rounds faded before the dogged, determined attack of the champion in the seventh, eighth, ninth and tenth. Delaney opened with a sensa

tional rally in the eleventh, send ing a thrill through the throng by driving a terrific smash to the pit of the champion's stomach. That blow turned the tide of battle. Delaney had appeared to be tiring under the sledge-hammer body punches of Berlenbach, but at this point he stepped forth with renawed vigor, to punimel the tittleholder with lightning lefts and

Delancy repeatedly, in the last Tive rounds, nailed Berlenbach on thte law with his famous right, and once it appeared as if the passing champion would crumble. But Berlenbach weathered the storm of punches without going down.




