Paving Problem Up For Consideration

Seminole County Commissioners are expected to again take up the problem of what to do about the unpaved streets in St. Johns River Estates when they meet Tuesday. During the commission meeting last Tuesday, J. Davis Jr., attorney for residents of the area, said developers had failed to perform in the paving of streets, according to an agreement with the county and a performance bond is in existence and they want the best street that can be built. Davis challenged the board that it is its responsibility to take care of the area. He listed as St. Johns River Properties, Inc., and contractor was G&H Construction Company, a new defunct corporation in the subdivision in 1959, the area twice has been flooded due to water backup from the St. Johns River. As a result of this, County Engineer William Bush says only concrete at least five inches thick will suffice for the road surface. The county commissioners have said they do not propose to put any of the taxpayer's money into the subdivision. When development was begun in St. Johns River Estates, a performance bond of \$44,000 was posted with American Fire and Casualty Company at Winter Park. However, a spokesman for the bonding company has said his company is powerless to act until forced to do so. He said the bond does still stand but added "We can afford to take any other stand."

2.39 Inches Of Rain Sanford Doused

A violent wind and rain storm ripped across the area Monday afternoon, dumping 2.39 inches of water on Sanford and causing considerable damage in the DeBarry vicinity. The storm struck about 5 p.m. and lasted about 1 1/2 hours, flooding many areas of Sanford. There was no damage reported as a result of the storm, although there were four minor automobile accidents attributed to the heavy rains, one in the city and three in the county. There were no injuries. In DeBarry the storm brought hurricane force winds and rain and was accompanied by a severe electrical storm which disrupted power service in some parts of the community for at least an hour. More than four inches of rain fell between 5 and 6:30 p.m. and many residents reported property damage from excessive water, split trees and uprooted shrubs. At the Ox Fibre Brush Company plant in Heron Junction, the roof of a 60,000-gallon, 108-foot-high, water tank was ripped off and blown away, the tank coming to rest against a vat shed. F. E. Roumillat Chairman Of Port Authority
Francis E. Roumillat Jr. was elected chairman of the Seminole County Port Authority Monday night at the board's first organizational meeting. Roumillat has been serving as acting chairman and was chairman of the board of the County Chamber of Commerce's port authority committee. "I appreciate the vote of confidence," Roumillat told the board following his election. "I have been involved in this project for more than a year and a half and will continue to carry on." Andrew Carraway was elected vice chairman, Byron Kimball, secretary, and John Fitzpatrick, treasurer. The Authority will serve until June 30, 1966. The Authority agreed to contact Gordon V. Frederick, Sanford's attorney, to ascertain if he would be available to serve as attorney. Frederick drew up the bill under which the Port Authority was established July 1. The Authority already has approved a budget of \$101,000. A public hearing has been set for Aug. 2 at the courthouse. The board voted to meet the second Monday night of each month at 8 o'clock at the courthouse. Other commissioners also reported receiving complaints about high water.

Lake Jessup Recreation Area Revived
A proposal for a county recreation area on Lake Jessup was revived at the Board of County Commissioners today. A. Speer, Sanford attorney, appeared before the board on behalf of the Seminole County Sportsman's Association, to plead for the establishment of the park. He said an 8 1/2-acre site on Lake Jessup at the foot of Seminole Avenue has been offered to the county in exchange for paying one-half mile of an existing road. Speer said the park would be a "natural" with a "rest" area on Lake Jessup, which he said was the "most" fishing lake he knew. "Very little has been done in Seminole County in the way of recreation," Speer said. "I urge you all to consider this matter." The original offer for the park was made in 1963 but was not accepted by the County Commission because a matter of eminent domain rights and other issues were not resolved. Speer said the tract of land probably is worth \$10,000 and would be more valuable in the future with residential development in the Lake Jessup area and with the possibility of a causeway across the lake. Several members of the Sportsman's Association supported the project. The Commission deferred any immediate action until the County Engineering Department can check on the "fairly good" road construction figures.

Goldberg Tapped For UN Post
WASHINGTON (UPI)—Supreme Court Justice Arthur J. Goldberg will succeed the late Adlai E. Stevenson as U. S. Ambassador to the United Nations, President Johnson announced today. Goldberg, 56, in response to Johnson's remarks, promised to pursue Stevenson's message to the world "peace" through the United Nations. Goldberg, former labor secretary in the Kennedy administration and one-time general counsel for the United Steelworkers Union, stood in the White House when the Chief Executive made his surprise announcement. Flanking the President and Goldberg were secretary of State Dean Rusk, Undersecretary of State George Ball and presidential assistant MacGeorge Bundy. Goldberg was the late President John F. Kennedy's first appointment to the Supreme Court. Johnson said he had called upon Goldberg to leave his lifetime post on the nation's highest tribunal because there was no more important task now before this country than achievement of "a world where all men may live in peace and justice under the rule of law."

Floodwaters Hit Missouri
KANSAS CITY, Mo. (UPI)—Rivers and normally trickling creeks flashed from their banks over hundreds of miles in western Missouri, driving thousands from their homes, cascading into business and residential districts of a dozen small towns, and blocking highways. 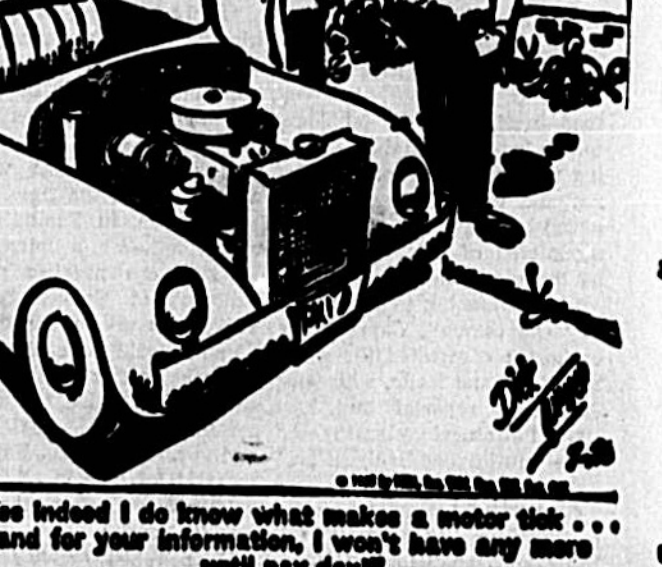

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Nuclear 'Watchdogs' Now In Orbit

CAPE KENNEDY (UPI) — The Air Force orbited two new atomic watchdogs early today to bolster the U. S. defense force policing space for boogie nuclear explosions.

Scientists estimate the satellites could detect detonations as small as 10 kilotons—half the force that destroyed Hiroshima 20 years ago—more than 100 million miles away in space, possibly as far as the planet Mars.

Today's satellites were streaking away from earth on a path planned to reach about 23,000 miles out in space before looping back toward the globe.

The mission of the 324-pound Vela satellites is to watch for nuclear test violations of the nuclear test ban treaty.

The pact, signed in Moscow two years ago, outlawed all but peaceful uses of nuclear energy.

The space craft, each equipped with unique gas-electric jets, are part of the Defense Department's Vela program designed to keep tabs on all nuclear activity in the atmosphere and in space.

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Two Sanford Navy Flyers Killed In South China Sea

Two Sanford-based Navy flyers, returning from a combat flight over North Viet Nam, were killed Tuesday when their reconnaissance aircraft crashed during a carrier landing in the South China Sea.

Killed were: Cdr. Valentin George Matula, 41, pilot, of 148 New Upala Road, commanding officer of Reconnaissance Attack Squadron One.

Lt. Carl Eugene Gronquist Jr., 32, flight officer, of 113 East Coleman Circle.

The two-man RA-3C Vigilante jet plunged off the carrier angle deck when an inverted control surface jammed during a carrier landing in the South China Sea.

Both men were attached to Reconnaissance Attack Squadron One, based at the San Antonio, Texas, Naval Air Station, now operating from the Independence off the coast of Viet Nam.

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McNamara Back Troop Buildup Is Pictured

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Johnson today called in top military and diplomatic officials to hear a report on Viet Nam from Defense Secretary Robert McNamara and Henry Cabot Lodge.

McNamara and Lodge, newly named ambassador to Saigon, returned early today from Viet Nam with recommendations for a U. S. troop buildup there that could forestall increased draft calls and a call of reserves.

Johnson asked McNamara to send him immediately a written preliminary report.

After looking over the report, Johnson called the conference at the White House.

White House Press Secretary Bill D. Moyers said that he did not expect a public statement until after the McNamara and Lodge will make.

Nor did Moyers anticipate decisions from the White House meeting, he said, "is a deliberation session."

Among officials at the meeting were Secretary of State Dean Rusk and Under Secretary of State George Ball and Deputy Defense Secretary Cyrus Vance.

Gen. Earle Wheeler, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, was not present.

Wheeler said that the U. S. military command reported that the Viet Nam situation was "serious."

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Soviet Space Spectacular Seen

MOSCOW (UPI) — Another Russian space spectacular loomed in the not-too-distant future today, there was some speculation it might come off as early as next month.

In quick succession on Friday, the Russians orbited five satellites with a single rocket and then blasted space history's heaviest working payload—12.2 tons—into orbit with a "new powerful booster rocket."

The weekend space activities were capped with the launching of another probe into a solar orbit about the same time America's Mariner was launched.

But there have been repeated hints in the Soviet press that the Russians are thinking about an attempted rendezvous in space.

Informed sources said such a spectacular can be expected before the end of the year. They pointed out the 1965 space launching season has three, possibly four, months to run and the most advantageous.
