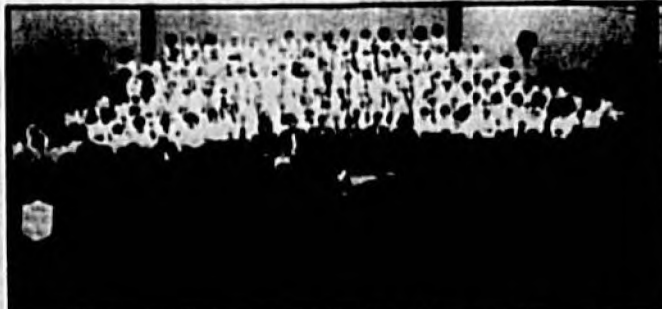

Fast food restaurant seeks final approval

SANFORD - Burger King is seeking final approval to place a restaurant in the historic district of Sanford, modifying its decor to match the surrounding neighborhood.

The restaurant is likely to be placed between Second and Third street and U.S. Highway 17-92. The city's Planning and Zoning Committee will meet Dec. 3 to approve final site plans. The Historic Preservation Board has already approved the site plans.

"This project can be a model for other historic districts to follow," Associate City Planner Andrew Van Gaal said. "The decor will fit with the surrounding neighborhood. Burger King was very good in cooperating with our needs."

Van Gaal said the venture will bring new jobs and economic benefits to the area.

The most likely location of the restaurant is 201 French Avenue, Van Gaal said. The Historic Preservation Board, the city, and Burger King worked closely together to ensure that

Residents oppose two new projects

WINTER SPRINGS - Residents of Tusawilla, who oppose two new projects being developed in the Howell Creek/Vistawilla Drive area, south of State Road 434, spoke out at a recent commission meeting.

One project is an apartment complex, Courtney Springs Apartments and the other is a supermarket, Kash n' Karry.

The items were a request of the Community Development Department and recommended by the Planning and Zoning Board. Also discussed was a development agreement with these two projects. The city will make its formal presentation on Monday.

Though the discussion lasted into the early morning of the next day, commissioners voted to table the issue until a later date to allow the builder time to change the proposed size of the building from three stories to two.

New state bird may be on the horizon

WINTER PARK - The Florida Audubon Society Board of Directors voted to support the effort to make the Florida Scrub-Jay the official state bird.

"Compared with the current state bird, the Northern Mockingbird, the Florida Scrub-Jay offers a much better representation of the uniqueness of Florida," said Dr. Gian Basili, Florida Audubon Ornithologist. "It's Florida's only endemic bird species, its habitat is limited to the unique Florida scrub community, and it exhibits a complex and fascinating family structure."

The Florida Scrub-Jay survives only in the fire-dependent oak scrub habitat, a low-growing shrub community unique to Florida, which is found on well-drained sandy soils. The ancient scrub is a relict dune system once bordered by a shallow sea when only a portion of Florida's land mass was above sea level millions of years ago.

"Unfortunately the sandy soil of the scrub has also made it choice property for citrus, improved pasture and urban development," said Basili. "Loss of this habitat from development or from suppression of the necessary ingredient of fire, has sent the Florida

Scrub-Jay populations plummeting in the last century."

Today, the Florida Scrub-Jay is federally listed as a threatened species and 1993 estimates show that about 3,600 families of scrub-jays remain in the state.

Jays mate for life, and although many live for more than ten years, most do not travel more than a few kilometers from their birthplace. In contrast to their western cousins, the Florida Scrub-Jay exhibits the rare social system of cooperative breeding. Offspring of the mating pair stay with the family from a year to six years and act as 'helpers', raising the young, watching for and mobbing predators and defending their territory.

Florida Scrub-Jays are what scientists call sedentary, they rarely abandon their territory, unless forced to by the death of a mate or the destruction of their habitat.

"They are reluctant to cross through forests or over water bodies to find new territory, so that destruction or fragmentation of their habitat becomes deleterious to the jay," said Basili.

"Making the scrub-jay our state bird will be symbolic of preserving and honoring what it is that makes Florida unique and special," he said.

Dale: SPD may get 200 seeking chief's position

SANFORD - The Sanford Police received a memorandum from Mayor Larry Dale on Thursday, thanking them for their "hard work and support" for the latest critique on the department by an independent review team.

Dale's memo to the department follows not only the critique but the announcement by Chief Dillard on Tuesday of his plans for retirement on Feb. 28, 1999. Cmdr. Ray Bronson is acting chief as Dillard recuperates for knee replacement surgery.

Sanford will conduct a nationwide search for a new chief to replace Dillard, who was with

the force for 27 years - the last two as chief. This was little surprise in his decision to retire. "Nobody in the department has expressed either positive or negative comments," Dale said. Several residents have called to say, what's next?

Dale said the City Commission will discuss the police department and the search for a new chief at a work session on Monday and again at the public hearing at 7:30 p.m. He said the commission also will address the updated critique of the SPD.

"The overall report is positive and shows that the employees are making a concerted effort to improve the department," Dale said Thursday. "He told each

the restaurant would not disrupt the neighborhoods in the historic district, Van Gaal said.

"We got them to come to the table," de Gaal said. "They worked with us. There has been great cooperation between Burger King and the Historic Preservation Board. It has been a real partnership to meet everyone's needs. It's been a positive experience."

Van Gaal said the committee will examine the effects the restaurant would have on traffic circulation and drainage.

The Historic Preservation Board approved the site plan

on Nov. 12. The Burger King sign will be 15-feet, instead of the proposed 25-feet. There will be historic replica light fixtures and Van Gaal said. The internal direction signs will be made of wood, instead of metal.

A historic planter base will be in front of the restaurant, de Gaal said. The roof and windows will be stylized.

Burger King first approached the board three months ago with a site plan that was not approved because it clashed with the surrounding neighborhood.

The buildings size was a major concern of the citizens who spoke up during the audience participation portion of the evening. Citizen's concerns ranged from the possibility of increased crime in the area to decreased property values. One citizen said to the commission, "Tusawilla is really the body of Winter Springs. Please vote this project down."

Michael Jones, an attorney for the developers of the project, started the discussion on the project. Jones reviewed some of the history of the project. He said the 60 acres-property was part of a legal settlement, about 20 years ago.

Jones also said that some of the difficulties with the project were the delays.

"The delays have been attributed to the people we have been dealing with," he said.

He went on to talk about the many changes in the projects plans due to some discussions with citizens of the area. Jones also said that he tried to adhere to a Planning and Zoning meeting.

After a brief video on Kash n' Karry, several commissioners asked questions and made statements. Commissioner David McLeod asked several questions regarding building specifics such as the masonry wall on the Kash n' Karry. There also were discussions between Jones and Company and citizens on the signage of the Courtney Springs Apartments.

Tips for dealing with telemarketers

A Seminole County consumer has been harassed for several nights by telemarketers trying to sell magazine subscriptions. The script of all callers was the same, but the calls were coming from different states. The consumer asked for the company name and was told that the caller did not have to give out that information.

The Federal Trade Commission says that under Federal Regulations the telemarketers do have to disclose the name of their companies and the purpose of the calls. If the offer comes with the promise of prizes or gifts, the sales presentation, must come first. If it doesn't the telemarketer is breaking the law. FTC's advice is to HANG UP!

Center in 1997. Some tips for dealing with telemarketers are:

- If you are not interested and don't want to be called again, tell the caller to put you on the company's "do not call list." If the company continues to call, it is violating the law. Report it.
- If you are asked if the caller can tape the conversation, say no. Later on, the caller may use the tape to "prove" you agreed to buy the magazines, selected payment method and understood terms of the agreement.

• Be skeptical of anyone trying to sell you a "bargain" or offers of "free" anything.

• Don't let yourself be pushed into a hurried decision.

• Always request written information, by mail about the product, service, investment or charity and about the organization that's offering it if you are seriously considering the pitch.

• Ask what state or federal agencies the firm is regulated by and/or registered with.

• Check out the company or organization with the Better Business Bureau or the Florida Department of Consumer Affairs.

• Ask what recourse you have if you make a purchase and are not satisfied.

• Beware of testimonials that you have no way of checking out.

• Don't provide personal financial information over the phone unless you are certain

the caller has a really good need to know.

• If necessary, HANG UP!

There are several agencies that handle complaints about telemarketers: Federal Trade Commission, Consumer Response Center, Drop 1285, 6th Street and Pennsylvania Ave., NW, Washington, DC 20580; Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services, 407 S. I make up lousy excuses every night. My roommate comes back anywhere from 3:30 to 5:30 a.m. Last time she told me she had around 13 beers!

Abby, getting drunk is not my kind of entertainment. While intoxicated, anything can happen, from a car accident to AIDS. Why are people so stupid? I am 18 years old and allowed to drink while on vacations, at weddings and things like that. Why would I want to kill myself or get in trouble with the law when I'm at college to better my future, not end it?

I thank "Grieving and Alone" for her letter. I have it taped to the front of my journal and read it at least once a day to remind myself what life is all about. Thank you, Abby, and thanks to all the people who still believe that there are some teen-agers who don't drink or do drugs.

DEAR ALCOHOL-FREE: If your grades are as terrific as your decision-making about substance abuse, you'll finish college with top honors. My experts tell me that according to several studies, college students who drink excessively tend to earn poorer grades and are more likely to drop out than nondrinkers.

I hope you'll take heart in the knowledge that no matter how much noise those party animals make, you and others like you are in the majority. While it may seem like "everyone" on campus is partying at keggers,

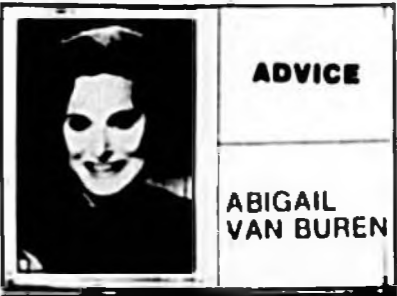
surveys from the Core Institute at Southern Illinois University reveal that on most campuses, fewer than half the students "binge" drink (down five or more drinks on one occasion).

At Michigan State, you can meet other students who share your views on alcohol abuse through Project IMPACT groups at Student Services 101, a social mentoring program for alcohol-free freshmen. Many campuses have similar programs through their student services centers. You might also consider moving to alcohol-free living accommodations to reduce disruptions from intoxicated roommates. That's an option at MSU as well as more and more campuses around the country.

Your roommate who downed 13 drinks in an evening engaged in very high-risk behavior that could have led to injury or even death. I urge you to persuade her to get some assistance through the student health services' "Alcohol and Other Drugs Program" before another campus tragedy occurs.

First Baptist to sponsor prison ministry

SANFORD - Members of First Baptist Church of Sanford are gearing up for their kick-off of the Angel Tree program. Participants will select an angel from the Christmas tree with the gift request of a child. They buy a gift and return it to the tree for distribution.

"We expect to put up the tree on Nov. 29. From Nov. 29 to Dec. 6 you can pick up an angel," according to Anna Marie Amalitano, promotional secretary. "Gifts should be returned by Dec. 13 so they can be prepared, tacked and boxed for delivery on Dec. 20."

The purpose of Angel Tree, a ministry of Prison Fellowship, is to evangelize and serve the children and families of prisoners. This is part of Prison Fellowship's overall mission to exhort, assist and equip the church in its ministry to prisoners, ex-prisoners, victims and their families and in its advancement of biblical standards of justice.

In the beginning stages of this work, inmates in prisons across the country request their children be included in the Angel Tree program. Church volunteers call the adult caregivers in the homes



where inmates' children live to ask for the children's gift wishes. The wishes are written on paper angels and placed on trees by church volunteers. Participants buy new clothes and toy items and wrap them as brightly colored gifts. Some "claim an Angel" and buy specific gifts while others buy gifts for "unclaimed Angels." The gifts are then packaged and delivered to the children's homes or distributed at special Angel Tree parties. The children also receive a colorful, age-appropriate booklet of the Christmas story.

"The First Baptist Church of Sanford will

sponsor an Angel Tree again this year to provide toys and other gifts for the children of prisoners," Amalitano said. "Members of the church will take tags from the tree with the name of a different child on each one, indicating what each child has requested for Christmas. By Dec. 13, members will bring to the church a gift wrapped for each child which will then be delivered to each child in the name of the imprisoned parent."

"Hearts Door," the church's women's organization that sponsored the Angel Tree also provides gift baskets for the caretakers of the children each Christmas," she said. "The church has chosen to do both types of ministry in the spirit of Isaiah 61:1-4, 'To comfort all who mourn and provide for those who grieve,' and to follow God's example of giving hope in Jesus' name. The church is also involved this holiday season in providing meals for Sanford police officers on duty on Thanksgiving and Christmas days and in staffing a Salvation Army kettle at Wal-Mart on Nov. 24.

"We have to check out the information to be sure before we tell them. They may need comfort and counseling after something like that too. We have 1,000 inmates here now. We should really only have 300 inmates per chaplain, but we have 450 male inmates for one chaplain and 100 female for our other chaplain."

Can we distinguish between right and wrong?

Can we really distinguish between right and wrong? Thankfully, yes!

Many people can make this distinction—and that not according to how they might "feel" about the matter but with reference to right principles. However, people also exist in this society who candidly do not, will not, or cannot distinguish between right and wrong even when it comes to murder! Their behavior and lack of lamenting gives the distinct impression that they are natural born killers! A recent article in the *Seminole Herald* ("It's 11 P.M.: Do You Know Where Your Children Are?") referred to two Chicago boys, ages 7 and 8, who were charged with brutally murdering an 11-year-old girl (Ryan Harris) because they wanted her bicycle. "When police found her body, her skull was fractured, clothing was stuffed in her mouth, and leave up her nose...The boys...didn't appear shaken at all. The 8-year-old ran home to watch cartoons when it was all over. In court, he and his friend drew pictures at the defense table and munched on Skittles. One boy cried only when the judge ruled he could not go home with his mother. The defendants were held instead at a psychiatric hospital" (A Podgorski, *Chicago Sun Times*).

Those who distinguish

It is said: Nothing is just right or wrong, it just depends...! Many thinkers (maybe non-thinkers) push for a freedom from any morality. An example of this came in response to caring about moral illiteracy in schools:

"South Carolina's attorney general last week issued a non-binding, 10-page opinion supporting the right of public schools to post the Ten Commandments on their walls.

Charlie Condon, a Republican, said such postings were legal if used as an aid in teaching about law, history, or culture. Posting the commandments for their own sake would probably be unconstitutional," he said.

"Ever watchful for good fund-raising issues, the ACLU promised to defend the rights of students to a morality-free education." (Underlined emphasis mine; "News & Review", World, Aug. 22, 1998).

The stakes are high

Two of the Divine Com-

mandments speak much to the contemporary scene. Indeed, breaking these commands brings debilitating and devastating results. It is sure of the breaking of the 7th and 9th that one will reap what one sows; if not today, payday someday!

To lie or tell the truth

Do we have a problem with "meaning," "semantics," or "interpretation" with the statement of oath... "to tell the truth and nothing but the truth, so help me God?"

"No!" The problem of indulgence is not with the above but with the mood... "So what?"

Concerning the nation's eyes now upon the White House, *Time* relates in "The Cost of It All": "This scandal has scorched everyone it has touched—the President, his family, the prosecutor, the press. Even if Clinton's testimony puts it behind us, the damage is done...The moment Clinton confesses to anything, he loses some magical powers; his decisions during the past seven months have already cost him some actual powers as well...The wreckage spreads across the whole field of battle: his moral authority, his ability to respond to a crisis, his room to negotiate with a Congress that might soon be his judge, and his ability to get the advice he needs."

Character really does count in the White House and beyond. The character of which we speak is comprehensive, covering the whole man in office and out of office. A person with good and wholesome character cannot pick and choose sins. One major area of life cannot leave the other unaffected, but it spreads through the whole personality.

"To lie is to break trust" [says J. Budziszewski, professor of government and philosophy at the University of Texas at Austin]. The more you break trust, the more breaking trust becomes part of your character. In every tough spot, your first impulse is to cheat. At first you cheat only your sexual partners, but pretty soon every relationship glows with the lurid colors of exploitation: with kids, with boss, with country" (J. Budziszewski, "Mix & Match morality," World, Aug. 22, 1998).

Indeed, it is moral insanity to lie, because when you habitually lie, you forget when you are lying and when you are not. You become lost in

your own maze of lying and are trapped.

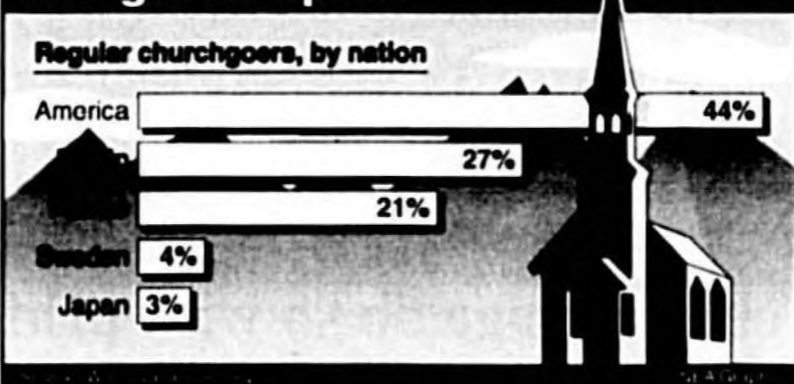
Fidelity or infidelity

"Inappropriate sex" presupposes that there is "appropriate sex." Indeed, there is, but a long standing Divine rule clearly states that adultery is wrong. Adultery is somewhat like lying; it calls for "cover up" and brings "deception." There are those in this society who purport that irresponsible sex is the sin that "doesn't hurt anyone." On the contrary, there is no loving, wholesome, stable family or marriage that is not devastated and hurt by the sin of adultery. "No man can pick and choose his sins, because sin is never satisfied. Like the fire, it spreads; like the leech, it devours" (Ibid.). Is "Right and Wrong" worth discerning? Does character really count? These questions may be debated in society but He who created all of society has said: "There is a way which seemeth right unto a man, but the end thereof are the ways of death" (Proverbs 14:12).

"You got it." Character does count!

How does blindness affect sleep?

DEAR DR. GOTT: I've seen ads for electronic exercise machines that stimulate skeletal muscles to contract by sending an electrical charge through pads strapped to the body. Are these machines dangerous?

DEAR READER: Electronic stimulation to replace exercise is quackery. It's true that certain forms of electrical muscle stimulation are useful in rehabilitation following trauma and nerve disorders. However, such devices should be used only under the guidance of specially trained physiotherapists.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I understand that the human sleep cycle is governed by a balance between melatonin and visual light. If this is so, why don't blind people have trouble sleeping?

DEAR READER: This is a very perceptive question that has stumped the experts for decades. In fact, blind people do exhibit a high prevalence of sleep disorders. More about that in a minute. First, some basic physiology. As a general rule, our sleep cycles follow a circadian (daily) rhythm. Light is the body's principal cue to wake up. Light signals travel from the eye to the body's master biological clock, located deep in the brain's hypothalamus. Among other responses, this light shuts off the brain's secretion of melatonin. Later, after sunset, when natural light diminishes, melatonin production kicks in and puts us to sleep. Given this physiological cycle, how can the blind, who often cannot perceive light, set their biological clocks?

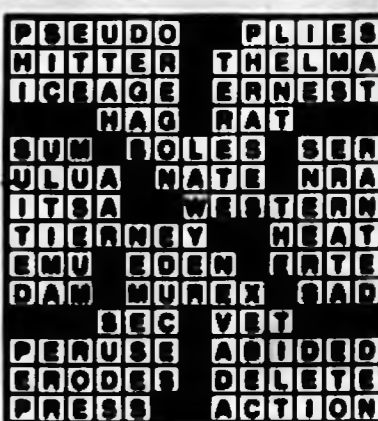
According to reports given at a recent joint meeting of the Society for Research on Biological Rhythms and the Society for Light Treatment and Biological Rhythms, researchers may have discovered the answer to the puzzle. Blind people may have two pathways to the brain — one for conscious vision and the second for circadian vision. Moreover, light exposure to various parts of the skin somehow seems to allow some people to reset their biological clocks.

The natural internal clock follows a cycle that is typically 24 1/2 hours long, 30 minutes longer than the planetary day/night cycle. Thus, without alarm clocks or other tricks to anchor them to a 24-hour cycle, blind persons — if left alone — would have "free run" circadian rhythms, causing them to drift around the real world clock.

In actual practice, more than 80 percent of the blind experience trouble sleeping and maintaining alertness. Therefore, any method to retrain their circadian rhythms would improve the quality of their lives. At present, scheduled meals, regular work hours and other time cues are commonly employed. However, based on recent research, scientists are now considering other options, such as periodic light exposure to other parts of the body, the use of melatonin supplements to reset biological clocks, recycling the circadian rhythm with hypnotic and stimulant drugs, and other effective nonocular time cues. Clearly, extraocular light exposure is the most controversial technique — but, at the same time, it holds great promise. Studies are now underway to investigate this fascinating subject.

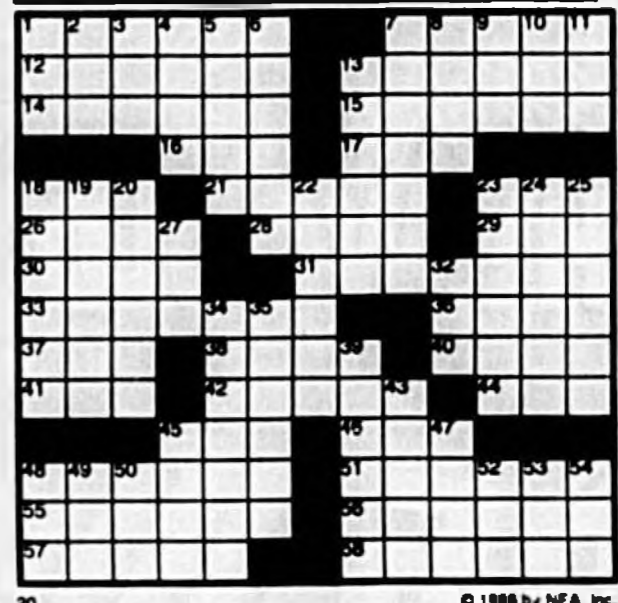

WIN AT BRIDGE

Mnote (sic!) mnemonics

In 1984, Ron Klinger wrote "Improve Your Bridge Memory" (Gollancz). Now he has tackled the subject again, but from a different angle. Do you find mnemonics helpful? If so, you'll benefit from "Better Bridge With a Better Memory" (Gollancz). You might even want to start with the first book, then move on to the new one.

Never tried mnemonics? The best one in the book is ARCH. Analyze the opening lead. Review the bidding. Count. How should I plan the play? Another is Klinger's calling card: SITES TOXIC. That stands for Short In The Enemy Suit? Take-Out X Is Correct. (Double may be written as X in a bidding diagram.) Klinger includes this deal to show the advantage of SITES TOXIC.

After South's two diamond overall, most Wests would continue with two hearts, and South would be off the hook. Presumably, East would convert to two spades. That contract would go one down, minus 50 for East-West. But when West doubles two diamonds for takeout, East is happy to pass.

West started with four rounds of hearts; East followed twice, discarded a spade, and overruffed the dummy. East switched to his remaining spade, taking a spade ruff at trick six. East cashed the club ace, then sat back to await another trump trick. Are you keeping track? That was three down: plus 500 to East-West.

Even if you don't care for mnemonics, you will get lots of useful advice on all aspects of the game, as is the norm from RDK: either Ruling Danish Kings or Ronald Denny Klinger.
