SOCIAL SECURITY

Questions and Answers

Q—My husband is 68 years old and has never worked under social security. He didn't sign up for Medicare last year before the deadline, and he is going into the hospital now. Can he still get some help with his medical expenses?

A—Yes. He can still become eligible for the hospital insurance part of Medicare by filing an application now. But, he will not be eligible for the voluntary medical (doctor bill) insurance until next year and then only if he enrolls between October 1 and December 31 of this year.

Q—I have heard there is a lot of paper work to Medicare. I have to enter the hospital shortly for an operation. What kind of papers should I take with me?

A—You will not need any thing but your Health Insurance Card. Just show this to the admission clerk at the hospital. The hospital will file the necessary papers for you.

Q—Is there any place in the community where I can get help in filling out my Medicare claims forms?

A—Yes. Take your bills and receipts to your local social security office. The office for this area is at 1300 East 2nd Street in Sanford.

Q—It was my understanding that Medicare would pay all of my hospital bills. I recently received a bill for \$60.00 from a recent stay in the hospital. Should I pay this?

A—Yes. Medicare does not pay all of your hospital bills. You must pay the first \$60.00 during each "spell of illness." Also, certain items and services such as telephones, television sets, etc. may not be covered at all. If you have a private room, you must also pay the difference, unless your doctor certifies a private room is medically necessary.

Q—I feel that I should enter a hospital for a few days to rest and build myself up. My doctor does not think this is necessary. Can I admit myself to the hospital and just forget about the doctor?

A—Even if the hospital would permit you to do this, no payment could be made under Medicare for your hospital stay. The doctor must certify that hospitalization is medically necessary before any payment may be made.

Q—I have just prepared my Medicare claim for doctor's bills. It is all ready to go. Where do I send it?

A—See pages 25-28 of "Your Medicare Handbook" for the names and addresses of organizations that handle Medicare claims. If you need further help, call or visit your social security office.

Q—I have a part-time maid. Must I report her earnings and Medicare deductions for the earnings?

A—It depends on what benefits you could now receive. We would need to know your earnings and figure your benefit rate. Contact your social security office at 1300 East Second Street in Sanford so this can be determined and you can decide what is best for you.

Q—Can every person age 72 or over now receive the special age 72 benefit social security check?

A—Most persons receiving a benefit from some other Government agency cannot also receive the special age 72 benefit. Get in touch with your social security office for complete details.

Q—I am age 62 and earning less than \$100 per year. Can I receive any social security benefits if I am over \$100?

A—You may be able to receive a private room in a hospital for a few days to rest and build myself up. My doctor does not think this is necessary. Can I admit myself to the hospital and just forget about the doctor?

"Right now," he stated, "I have work crews on several jobs due to a flurry of activity concentrated at this time in commercial projects."

Paving of streets, parking lots and other areas go hand in hand with structures, naturally, and John Wilkins of Wilkins Paving Company said his paving projects have been below normal over the same period last year. His crews are busy most of the time but he anticipates within the year.

"Home loans have waned in Seminole County just as they did nationwide," observed George Touhy of First Federal Savings and Loan of Sanford.

The assembly of the first half of 1967 saw loan applications up 40 per cent over the last half of 1966. This indicates the optimistic viewpoint of builders and people moving into the area.

Tight money situations are easing, Touhy said, though home mortgage money is still moving into the area. This phase of lending seems to be in a let-up in restrictions, thereby aiding the home building industry considerably.

The Israelis claimed to have destroyed 40 Arab aircraft, including 27 Egyptian planes. They also voiced admiration for Israeli intelligence which permitted Israeli pilots to ignore dummy airplanes standing on the Egyptian air strips and to concentrate their fire on the real MIGs.

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Outdoors Folk Should Know Snakes And Their Habits

A coil of three bushy cottonmouth moccasins were barely noticeable until we chased one of its fellows up the drainage ditch culvert and we ran to see where he swam. There in the cool darkness of the culvert they lay. Littering trash was pitched there but one was a bottle made a direct hit, then he, too, dove under the murk.

Nearly every type of terrain in Florida, as well as that of other states, is the natural habitat for one or more types of poisonous snakes with six species found in certain sections.

Now that the exodus of birds and outdoorsmen with every person should be well informed on the snakes, their habits, habitats, and first aid treatment of snake bites.

Two types of poisonous snakes are indigenous to Florida. The pit vipers (Crotalids) include the diamondback rattler, pygmy rattler, copperhead, cottonmouth moccasin, and the copperhead. These all have a pit or depression situated on either side of the triangular head between the eye and nostril and elliptical pupils in lidless eyes.

Their haemotoxic poison is relatively slow in action, with deaths resulting in 24 hours or more. The venom effects the red blood cells and the walls of the blood vessels.

The coral snake is the Elm pine tree and it has a neurotoxic poison which affects the nerve centers in usually rapid and fatal.

In a recent year there were 27 reported cases of poisonous snakebites in Florida with 3 deaths resulting. While the fatalities are nominal in number, the loss of vital tissues, the amputation of limbs, and the disabilities from the venom are giving doctors increased concern.

All persons frequenting the possible habitats of poisonous snakes should wear heavy boots or shoes, and if possible, heavy legging, with pants legs loose on the outside of boots. Children, especially, should be dressed in pants and shoes. If they are in shorts, they should wear a pair of socks and their feet should be protected by shoes or sandals.

If a snake bite does occur, it is essential to get medical aid as soon as possible. A snake bite kit can be readily at hand when in such areas, with tourniquet, suction cup, cutting implement and antiseptic. The tourniquet should be applied between the bite and the

1967 May Be Year Of 'Great Silver Rush'

NEW YORK (AP) — While the value of most securities has been steadily eroding slowly, the worth of one U.S. denomination, the silver certificate dollar bill, has suddenly soared.

This dollar bill guarantees the holder the right to obtain silver at a fixed price, and the demand for the metal, and its rising price, may make 1967 the year of the great silver rush.

Spot silver, one currency dealer recently were offering \$1.10 and \$1.12 for 100-cent silver certificates at \$1.25 a piece. They intend to make even bigger profits later. This is their estimate.

The explanation is that silver certificates guarantee the holder the right to exchange the bill for silver priced at \$1.25 an ounce, although silver prices in the open market have risen to \$1.27 or more.

This price spurt resulted from a two-step government decision to discontinue sales of silver at \$1.20. Freed of restrictions, the price of silver is now determined by supply and demand. And since demand far exceeds supply, prices are rising.

The silver shortage results partly because of increasing demands from industry. Electronic computer circuits, for example, are made largely of silver. And the light sensitivity of photographic film is derived from the metal.

Despite this rising demand, the price has remained stable because the U.S. Treasury had a hoard of the metal and was willing to sell from this pile at the fixed price.

Why should the government have a stockpile? Primarily to assure itself of the raw materials for coinage.

And why should it try to keep the price depressed? Simply to protect its silver coins from being melted down for other uses. If silver prices rise, it might make melting profitable, despite the licensing.

Now the Treasury says so many copper and nickel coins have replaced silver coins that it will be unable to come up with the recommendations of the subject.

In May it began restricting silver sales at the \$1.25 figure to American industrial users only. Previously anyone could buy at that figure.

On July 4 the ban was broadened to exclude almost all sales at \$1.25. Instead, the Treasury said it would sell up to two million ounces a week at free market prices.

This action does not affect holders of silver certificates, who are, in effect, already holders of the metal. By turning

Mixed Photo In Move To Cut Interest

NEW YORK (AP) — Intricate plans for the administration and the Federal Reserve Board to bring down interest rates from their record high of last summer are meeting with some success.

The simplest explanation is that the forecasts and efforts were based on the assumption that the market would react in predictable ways. They are, therefore, borrowing habits changed after last year's experience.

This failure of some federal money policies is illustrated by the whopping 4.16 per cent that a New Jersey utility with a very high credit rating, Public Service Electric and Gas Inc., had to borrow \$75 million.

This rate is slightly higher than another utility paid at the peak of last year's money market. But since then the Federal Reserve has pumped plenty of funds into the market. Why should it be so expensive to borrow?

The answer lies in a change of viewpoint by many business men. Having been caught short last year, they are vowing it will happen again. They are anticipating distant needs. They are borrowing for long terms.

Frictions appear again, however, in the home mortgage market. Rates have been dropping somewhat and are under 6.40 per cent on a national average. But some analysts feel they might not go much lower for a while.

The housing market has been of great concern to the money men. Throughout the year the administration and the Federal Reserve have shown they are acutely aware that the high cost of mortgage money last year was the chief cause of a depression in the housing industry. And so they pumped in money to bring down rates.

LBJ Gets Monkey Off His Back

WASHINGTON (AP) — Seventeen months after pledging to offer legislation dealing with labor disputes in national emergencies President Johnson has confessed failure and thrown the ball back in Congress.

In his 1966 State of the Union message, Johnson said he would submit proposals "which will enable us effectively to deal with strikes which threaten irreparable damage in the national interest."

But Tuesday the President advised Congress, through Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield that this administration has been unable to come up with the recommendations of the subject.

Manlyton after a White House meeting with Johnson, said the President "would be very pleased if the labor committee of both houses would take up the question."

But a check with key Democratic members of the House showed no enthusiasm for tackling such an explosive subject. Chairman Ralph Yarborough, D-Tex., of the Senate Labor Committee would handle any such bill, but a reporter said "Any legislation passed on this question would be a compromise."

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Housing Starts Edging Upward; Price Is Slow

WASHINGTON (AP) — Housing starts, usually an accurate barometer of the nation's economy, are edging upward. But the price is slow.

The Commerce Department said Tuesday that construction of new houses started in June to start a new year.

However, that was only three tenths of one per cent above the May figure.

Construction of new homes slumped last October to a post-World War II low of 848,000 units at an annual rate. Over-all, the year was one of the housing industry's worst since 1945.

But except for February, housing starts have jumped very much since. The department said insurance of building permits indicates that more intensive rates of growth likely lie immediately ahead.

A sizeable jump in July would tend to back up administration forecasts of a new economic surge in the second half of the year, following six months of comparatively sluggish economic activity.

ALBANY, N. Y. (AP)—New York's \$447,000,000 worth of tickets in its first two-day lottery in June, showed \$2.8 million below the State Tax Department's estimate.

The first phase of the three-stage drawing — which will include \$100,000 winners and about 1,000 lesser prizes — will begin Thursday.

The state's last future could have an excess of money to place the lottery, which was designed to provide funds for education.

Bentley College Honors Area Man

Paul J. Kanaly of 160 North Moor Rd., Casselberry, a member of Bentley College's (Boston) first graduating class, was honored during the college's 50th anniversary celebration.

He and his 12 colleagues in the class received bronze replicas of their diplomas inscribed on the reverse side, with an honorary citation to commemorate their roles as founding students of the college which began in 1917.

During the anniversary program before 1200 alumni and guests, the graduates heard Sen. Edward M. Kennedy (D-Mass.), principal speaker, praise Bentley for its half century of preparing leaders in the field of finance and accounting, a national truth-in-lending law, stressing the role of the college and the accounting profession in explaining the law's implications to the public.

The citation on Mr. Kanaly's plaque lists him as a native of Sanoverville, Mass., educated in that city's school system. Noting that he belonged to Bentley's founding class, it cites his 22 years of service in the United States Navy, which he joined in 1947, and his 40 years of membership in the Veterans of Foreign Wars.
