

Seminole High Football Squad Is In Fine Shape For Kissimmee Engagement

Terrible Cowboys Are Unknown Quantity But Deadly Rivalry Between Schools Is Assurance Of Great Battle

Following their 3 to 0 defeat at the hands of the Palatka Matrons, champions of the Northeastern Conference, and with one of the hardest weeks work behind them they have known this season, Coach Hugh Welchell's Seminole High squad is in fine shape for the encounter with the Terrible Kissimmee Cowboys which takes place at Municipal Field tomorrow, Saturday afternoon, at 2 o'clock.

The season is rapidly drawing to a close and tomorrow's game will be the next to the last game on the season schedule, Leesburg coming here on Thanksgiving Day for the finale and because some of the hardest fought and most exciting games played by the locals this year have taken place in Sanford, these last two games to be played here will no doubt draw enormous crowds with the Thanksgiving Day game sure to draw around 1500 fans. No other games of importance are scheduled in this vicinity.

High playing at DeLand, Kissimmee, the only serious opponent, and while several local football fans will try to jack-pot on the unbeaten Gators trouncing Washington and Lee's nucleus generally, the local fans will not be about the largest crowd to attend a game in Sanford.

This writer has noticed the work of this man in three of the games this season and his word is highly regarded in sports circles. Minnesota and Wisconsin present a tough selection. They will battle in a game in which the result will probably decide the championship. Yale is picked on a hunch. Yale has a hard assignment in Harvard, its ancient rival, but is slated to cop the honors. Purdue should take Indiana for a 95.

Georgetown will run up a good sized score to beat Fordham handily. Southern will have little difficulty with Rollins but Iowa State will probably be stunted to down Drake. Michigan State gets the nod in its contest with the Wolf-pack of North Carolina.

Critics

There are two very different types of critics in this world. There are those who direct their thrusts at the big and powerful who are well able to stand the onslaught and who need to have some of the conceit taken out of them by just such criticisms, and there are those who attack only the meek and lowly, who are unable to fight back simply for the sake of drawing attention to themselves and of making themselves appear valiant.

Will Rogers provides a very good illustration of the first type. During the boom in Florida he made many people laugh by the satire which he directed at this state. He kidded about it from every angle, and although all Florida people knew he was only joking, his remarks had the effect of making us wonder if we didn't have our feet off the ground. But when the crash came and Florida was going through a period of depression, Rogers never made a single disparaging remark about this state. He confines his criticisms to those who are "up in the world."

But there are not many like him. Charles Edward Russell, in the New York Herald Tribune, says this is the "Age of Detraction." The world is filled with people trying to become famous by jumping on somebody who is unable to defend himself. Witness, for example, the books which have been written in recent years "exposing" George Washington, William Gladstone, and other celebrities of history. "You can use mud-slinging tactics on nearly anybody who is in the grave and sell books by it," says Mr. Russell.

We have another example of this type of critic in those who are having much to say, now that the election is over on the weaknesses of Smith and the boneheads of the Democratic party, but who during the campaign when the outcome was in doubt, refrained from comment. It is easy enough with an issue safely settled to come down off the fence and take a vigorous stand, but it can hardly be called courageous.

If you are a critic at all, to which type do you belong? Do you scoff only at those who are already down and out, or can you condemn also the evil in the big and strong?

We have only the utmost sympathy for the peddler who must in his quest for a living beat his path from door to door in good weather and in bad, in periods of prosperity and periods of depression, in the face of condemnation and at the risk of watchdog bites, but we have even greater sympathy for the housewife who has to put up with these incessant callers who continually interrupt her in the performance of her duties.

This is the time of year when Florida women are put to the supreme test of ladylike conduct. For at this season it seems, peddlers, whether to escape the rigors of a northern climate or to prove more successfully upon winter visitors to this state, come here in hordes. They have every thing in the world to sell from baby rattles to Persian rugs. And whether you want anything or not they take up your time describing the value of their goods.

At this season of the year, and not that there is any connection between them and peddlers, thousands of bandit-pick-pockets, bootleggers, gangsters, wire-tappers, hi-jackers, second story men, and sneak thieves, make their appearance upon the otherwise peaceful horizon of the Florida landscape. They too are escaping the cold northern winters and looking for easy pickings among our more welcome visitors.

It is unfortunate but true that the same temperate climate, the same warm surf at attractive bathing beaches, the same cool but not cold nights which bring countless tourists here to make this state prosperous, also bring hundreds of criminals to prey upon them. It appears to be one of the laws of the universe that Nature unaided, does not seem able to separate the chaff from the wheat.

Since this is so, there is but one thing to do about it. Be prepared. Lock your windows and doors carefully at night. Lock your house securely, even in the daytime, when leaving it. Don't give money to strangers to keep for you, or don't buy gold bricks from questionable agents who guarantee a rich return. In other words, use your head. Don't be a sucker.

Brisbane On Florida

Cuba Doesn't Feel It Has Taken Away Florida's Tourists

"Pearl Of Antilles" Is Satisfied With Tenth This State Attracts 100,000 Hoped For Number Insignificant Beside Our Traffic

HAVANA, Cuba, Nov. 24.—Wide circulation has been given here to the issue of Liberty containing the article by Sidney Sutherland, under the startling heading "Havana Succeeds Florida," but despite this effort to arouse Cuba to its destiny the serenity of the island is undisturbed. There are no hurried preparations for the hordes of Americans promised by Mr. Sutherland, no sudden rise in realty values, no evidence that Havana believes it is about to become the successor of Florida.

Here and there you find those who hope that Mr. Sutherland is right in his prediction, but it is only a hope. A bigger tourist crop is expected this year than last, and a bigger one next year, but there are only smiles for the promise in the headline over the Liberty article. Cubans having to do with the tourist business are inclined to base their calculations on facts and not visionary predictions, however pleasing they may be.

They keep in mind, for example, the fact that Florida last season had more than a million visitors while Cuba had less than eighty thousand.

And they don't forget that of these eighty thousand a good part were week-enders from Florida—regulars from our tourist centers breaking their winter vacation with a trip to foreign shores and a glimpse of a lot of things they have been hearing about.

Satisfied with 100,000. Havana will be satisfied this season if a hundred thousand Americans hop over from Key West and spend a few days on the island. That is the highest estimate I heard, and it is not much more than St. Petersburg expects off and on during the same period.

The majority of those who come will be week-enders here on their first visit. The average visitor to Cuba is not a repeater in the sense that thousands of Florida winter residents are. He comes once to see Havana and this beautiful island as he goes through the Yellowstone park. He is delighted with Cuba—she should be—and he wishes to return, but seldom does.

Palm Beach, in its feverish search for thrills, is little influenced by Havana and its racing and casino. Palm Beach provides for itself everything that Havana offers with the exception of racing, and many things that Havana doesn't offer. She has finer and larger hotels, a more lively social life, the same wines and whiskeys, supper clubs and wilder parties, gambling for even higher stakes.

It is true that occasional parties of Palm Beachers sail into Havana for a few days of play. The city is geared up for him and gives him the thrills as he wants them.

A good many Americans, of course, come here regularly and will continue to come. Mostly these are incurable patrons of racing and the roulette wheel—good spenders, high liveries, easy money for the resorts they favor. These are the real sports who lived up things around Miami during the hectic days of '24 and '25. They had and have plenty of money and their presence is noted in the daily high clearings wherever they happen to be.

No Great Loss to Florida. If these are the tourists Mr. Sutherland had in mind when he spoke of Florida as being the spearhead of Havana, he was undoubtedly right. But he forgot to state that the number is not large, and that Miami is about the only Florida point that misses them. They came to Miami with the opening of racing there and departed in large numbers when the track was closed. And they considered about the only regular source of business which Florida has lost to Havana.

Business is done, but comes in the nature of expense. He has learned that for the price of a week in Havana you can get the same winter in Florida. And he does not mean that Havana is a better winter than Florida. He means that Havana is a winter that costs less than Florida.

but in the spirit that Park Avenue spends an evening on Broadway. For a regular day-long Palm Beacher prefers the excitement of Bradley's to the more democratic casino, the spirited life around his own hotel to the crowded cabarets of Havana.

And the conservative club-going family from the middle west that has been wintering in St. Petersburg or Orlando or any one of scores of other Florida resorts for the past several years is not going to migrate to Cuba any quicker than the Palm Beacher. This is the kind of family that makes up the bulk of our Florida tourist business and the kind that will continue to come in constantly increasing numbers.

Aside from a nightingale tree, Cuba will have no appeal for this class. Expenses would be high here, the climate no better, the distance farther from home and the opportunity for that great American pastime, automobile touring, greatly restricted.

Unique American City. But many will make that one trip, and this they should do. Havana is unique, distinct in many ways the most interesting city in the Americas. It is a place that every one who comes to the American Riviera should see.

For Havana, by reason of its close proximity to a part of the new world Riviera, that is commonly called Florida. And it is no means the least of the many attractions that Florida offers those who visit the country's winter play grounds.

Havana understands this thoroughly and wants to be considered a part of the Riviera picture. She knows that most of her tourist trade comes from Florida, or the way of Florida, and she is interested in any movement for the stimulation of travel in this direction. She offers her own unique attractions as part of the combined appeal, and sees the advantage of cooperative effort. She wants the free spending sporting class to help care for the overhead and the more numerous sight-seekers for operating profit and Florida "killing" that she should have these as her share of the partnership.

The partnership idea as applied to Havana and Florida is more accurate than the suggestion in Mr. Sutherland's headline. Havana doesn't hope to succeed Florida in the tourist business. She does expect, however, that one of every ten or twelve who come to Florida will pay her a visit of a few days, and past experience indicates this is a fairly safe bet.

To help make these figures come true the Cuban government is spending this year \$10,000 in advertising, mostly in the states. This is not as much as Miami is spending this year, or as much, for example, as St. Petersburg spent annually for a number of years. But it shows the right spirit and is an acknowledgement of modern methods. It will help to keep them coming this way, just as will Mr. Sutherland's article which didn't cost anybody anything.
