**ANOTHER CANAPE**  
Spread thinly-sliced cheese pie crust with pickle and olive relish. Cut into one-and-one-half inch squares and quickly turn each square half over. Prick the tops with a fork and press the sides together. Bake for six minutes and serve warm.

**PICKLE CANAPE**  
Dip thin slices of sweet pickles in mayonnaise. Then place the pickles on crackers or toast spread with fish paste.

**PUMPKIN PIE FILLING**  
Mix a few raisins, dates, figs, nuts or some coconut in your next pumpkin pie. A third of a cupful will be enough.

**CRUNCHY SAUCES**  
Crush chocolate-covered molasses chips, buttered cracker crumbs, sliced nuts, peanut brittle or any other hard candy and add them to pudding just before serving.

**NUT SYRUP**  
Broken pecans or sliced Brazil nuts in maple syrup make a delicious sauce for frozen, baked or steamed puddings. Use one-third of a cup of nuts to each cup of syrup. Boil the two together for three minutes and serve hot.

**TO DELETE BLUING**  
If your clothing has become too blue from bluing wash it well in plenty of hot water and soap suds. If it is still too blue soak it in three quarts of hot water and to which three tablespoons of vinegar have been added.

## Jap Foreign Office Holds Shooting At Panay An Accident

Roosevelt Serves Notice On World U.S. Not Interested In Peace At Any Price

### Cooperation Seen For World Peace

Landon Joins Roosevelt In United Effort On Aggression

TOKYO, Dec. 22.—(AP)—The Foreign Office, in what it called an "interim report" on the sinking of the United States gunboat Panay by Japanese planes, declared today the Japanese surface boats were machine-gunning Chinese at the time "and there might have been stray bullets flying toward the Panay" from these surface boats.

The report declared also that the Japanese flier, who sank the gunboat in the Yangtze River above Hankow, also bombed Japanese troops killing two soldiers despite the fact the troops waved 10 Japanese flags.

The report said: "So far it is established that Japanese soldiers boarded the Panay with friendly intentions, but no evidence has been discovered showing the ship was the target of intentional shooting."

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22.—(AP)—President Roosevelt served notice on world powers last night that the United States will not remain aloof from international unrest and that it will cooperate and even lead efforts to restore general peace, cost what it may.

The President's views, made known in an exchange of messages with former Gov. Alf M. Landon, of Kansas, 1936 Republican candidate, were interpreted as a warning to so-called "handit" nations that this government rejects a "peace-at-any-price" foreign policy.

The messages were made public at the State Department upon instructions from the White House after Secretary of State Cordell Hull had lunched with Mr. Roosevelt and while the Chief Executive was conferring with Chinese Ambassador C. T. Wang.

Landon Repeats Pledge. The former Kansas Governor reiterated a pledge, made after his defeat by the President, to cooperate with him toward "difficult foreign situations" confronting the New Deal. He also congratulated Mr. Roosevelt for firmly opposing the proposal of Rep. Louis Ludlow, (D Ind) requiring a national referendum before war could be declared.

## 42 Percent Of Year's Tax Roll Paid In November

Jinkins Report Shows \$129,607.27 Is Collected In 1 Month

Through the response of Seminole County residents in early payment of their State and County taxes, over 42 percent of the entire tax rolls for the current year were collected in November, according to a tabulation of collections in the office of the Seminole County Tax Collector Jno. D. Jinkins.

The report shows that \$129,607.27 of the \$307,088.38 assessed on the 1937 rolls was accounted for during the thirty day period and that discounts for early payment were deducted in the amount of \$5,174.05.

## Twenty-Four Are Tried By Judge Frank L. Miller

Twenty-four persons were arraigned before Judge Frank L. Miller in a session of the Municipal Court at the vjkgk vjkgk tion Monday afternoon.

Half of those listed on the docket were vagrants arrested by Chief of Police Roy G. Williams in his efforts to stamp out the wave of stealing in this City. A number of those picked up were held for investigation and released after their fingerprints and photographs were taken.

Elwood Williams and Lester Head were charged with larceny when a stolen cow was found in their possession and they were sentenced to serve 30 days in the City Jail. Silas Reed, negro, charged with vagrancy, was sentenced to pay a fine of \$10 or serve 30 days in jail.

Those who were held for investigation were W. S. Strachan, R. P. Powell, Frank Allen, Carl Lewis, L. Cacconne, Sam Vangallo and three negroes, Little Isaac Jones, Levi Daniels, and Willie Harris.

J. F. Cobb, negro, was sentenced to pay a fine of \$5 or serve 10 days after he was found guilty of disorderly conduct charges. Eva Frierson, negro; Randolph Harrison, Ulysses Jones, Curtis C. Lane and Minnie Harrison, all held on disorder conduct charges received similar sentences. Willie Mae Peoples held on the same charge, was given the alternative of a fine of \$10 or 30 days in jail and Edith Cleveland was dismissed after pleading not guilty.

James Anderson, negro, charged with assault, was transferred to the County courts; W. L. Gladden charged with drunkenness, sentenced a \$10 bond. I. W. Nettles was fined \$3 for improper parking, and Viola Phillips was given the choice of a fine of \$35 or 70 days in jail after she pleaded guilty to charges of possession of liquor, in the remaining cases on the docket.

## Survey Made Of Farms By B. F. Whitner

Crops Valued At 5 Million Raised By 888 Farmers On 27,360 Acres In County

Agricultural crops valued at approximately \$5,000,000 were harvested from the 27,360 acres of land under cultivation in Seminole County in the one year period beginning July 1, 1936 and ending June 30, 1937, according to a recent report on agricultural activities in Seminole County compiled by B. F. Whitner.

Mr. Whitner's survey which was completed about two weeks ago, revealed that there are 864 white and 24 colored farmers in the County, also that these farmers owned 730 farms, while 288 farms were mortgaged and 120 were rented.

Celery production, by a wide margin, is the County's principal crop with oranges following as second in estimated value.

During the past year, 1,935 acres were planted to celery, from which 2,346,577 crates were harvested, valued at \$2,631,488.43. The County's orange crop of 470,390 acres was harvested from 279,741 bearing trees and was valued at \$543,014.21.

A total of 90,232 crates of grapefruit were harvested from 51,890 bearing trees for an estimated value of \$79,536.22. The tangerine crop was valued at \$52,985.53 while the crop of 305 boxes of temple oranges was valued at \$720, and the 132 bearing satsuma trees yielded 116 crates valued at \$101, also 7,700 pounds of grapes valued at \$385.00.

The growing of bulbs and flowers was also revealed as one of the County's major industries. Approximately 6,225,000 bulbs were harvested from 95 1-4 acres for estimated returns of \$90,505.

The flowers sold in the County during the 12-month period were valued at \$72,590.

Raising of ferns has also become an important industry in the County. Over 100,000 sprays and 100,000 crates of ferns were sold for approximately \$96,338.69.

Mr. Whitner found that carotene is one of the leading truck crops. Approximately 190,000 crates of this product were harvested from 357 1-4 acres and the value in dollars was set at \$65,623.75.

The 424 acres planted to string beans yielded 53,682 crates and were valued at \$16,210.72. Approximately 110 acres of peppers yielded 36,045 crates valued at \$40,136.80. The estimated value of the lettuce crop was set at \$39,686.25 for the 66,358 crates harvested from 155 acres. The 445 acres planted to cabbage in the County yielded 2968 tons (sold in bulk) and 24,783 crates for a total valuation of \$37,336.15.

Approximately 11 acres were planted to spinach for a yield of 2,130 crates valued at \$1665; 1 1-2 acres of cauliflower yielded 112 crates valued at \$1120.

## Canning Plant Workers Stage Strike Today

Firing Of Co-Worker Followed By Strike; Company Refuses Wage Hike Demands

A strike was called at the Eckerson canning plant this morning when more than 75 men peelers left their jobs as a protest against the firing of a co-worker and in an effort to obtain higher wages.

Although many threats of violence and destruction were heard from the strikers who left their posts shortly after beginning work this morning, no great amount of damage was reported before the workers were ushered from the plant where City and County enforcement officers frustrated any attempts at picketing or interference with other workers.

Strict surveillance by the peeling foreman who the peelers claimed retarded them in their work was the chief cause of the row, the strikers asserted. Since they are paid on a piece work basis to make a "decent wage".

The labor trouble, however, was believed smoothed out just before noon today even though County officials refused the demands of the strikers, after Bert Cole, superintendent of the plant, conversed at length with those who staged the walkout and told them that their jobs would be open for them next Monday morning when operations in that department will be continued.

C. H. Eckerson, manager of the plant, was apparently unperturbed by the rebellion this morning, but he stated that "the plant will be run like I want it run or not at all."

The Manager stated that the cause of this morning's strike, the firing of a co-worker, will be suspended until Monday but that peeling operations will continue as usual.

Over 100 women were thrown out of work because of the walkout and thousands of boxes of grapefruit will have to be held over the holidays, it was said.

Over 200 men and women are employed at the plant and upwards of 8,000 boxes of grapefruit are used daily in the canning operations.

## Retired Druggist Dies While Fishing

Ralph Barker, retired druggist and tourist resident of Orlando, died enroute to the Fernald Lighthouse Memorial Hospital here late yesterday shortly after he was stricken with a heart attack while fishing with a friend Ira Miller and a fishing guide, Tom Flowers, near Lemon Bluff on the St. Johns River.

Justice of Peace James P. Roberts was taken to view the body but held that no inquest would be necessary. The body was taken to the Erlson Funeral Home from where it will be shipped to his former home in Taunton, Mass. Mr. Barker was 52 years of age and is survived by two sons, Anson Barker of Storm King, N. Y., and Humphrey Barker, of Taunton, Mass.

## British Order Troops To Bolster Hongkong

Drive For Empty Stocking Fund Is By Century Mark

## "Must" Bills Die As Extra Session Of Congress Ends

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22.—(AP)—The five-week old extraordinary session of the Sixty-fifth Congress adjourned sine die at 5:15 P. M. yesterday without having accomplished the purpose for which it was called—enactment of President Roosevelt's seven-point legislative program.

Adjournment came without the usual fanfare after the Senate passed and sent to conference the housing program which is designed to pump billions of dollars into private construction channels to stimulate business. This means that like the crop control bill which both chambers passed and sent to conference, the housing measure will not be enacted finally until regular session convenes in January.

Must Bills Die. The farm bill was No. 1 on Mr. Roosevelt's program and was his primary reason for calling the special session. Wage-hour legislation, which ranged second, was killed when the House voted in recognition to the labor committee. No action was taken on the Chief Executive's other measures—and trust legislation, government reorganization, regional planning, and curbing of Federal aid to highway construction.

### More Warships May Be Sent East

Prime Minister Warns Japs Not To Try Patience Too Far

LONDON, Dec. 22.—(AP)—The War Office announced today that the British garrison at Hongkong would be strengthened as the government dispatched its sixteenth protest-it has made to Japan since the outbreak of the Far Eastern conflict.

Sir Robert Leslie Craigie, British ambassador to Tokyo was instructed to protest the Japanese attack and seizure of a Chinese customs vessel in territorial waters off the British colony of Hongkong on Dec. 11.

The double action followed a review of the oriental situation by the cabinet and the assertion of Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain that Japan should not be deceived by British protests.

The troopship Dunera prepared to leave Southampton to take aboard the second battalion of Royal Scots at Bombay who will go to Hongkong, lying off Canton in South China which reports have indicated the Japanese will attack shortly.

The cabinet is also believed to have approved preliminary plans for 23 more warships to be sent East if developments should warrant.

## Supreme Court Okays "Stork Derby" Will

OTTAWA, Dec. 22.—(AP)—The Supreme Court of Canada today upheld the eccentric will of Charles Vance Millar, the instigator of Toronto's unique "stork derby." Millar's will provided his estate, estimated in excess of \$500,000, should go to the mother or mothers giving birth to the most children in Toronto between Oct. 31, 1926 and Oct. 31, 1926.

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Cold May Cause Jap Foreign Office Premature Seed Holds Shooting At Stalks In Celery Panay An Accident

The extent to which the celery crop of the Seminole County was damaged by the recent cold wave cannot be definitely known at the present, it is said in a bulletin received by County Agent C. R. Dawson from the Truck Crop division of the agricultural experiment station at Cornell University.

After extensive experiments in the growing of the vegetable, the production of which is this County's chief industry, it has been found that subjecting the young celery plants to relatively low temperatures of 40 to 50 degrees for a period of two weeks or longer is likely to result in premature seeding making the product unfit for marketing.

From Dec. 17 to Jan. 1, of that year temperatures in this vicinity averaged below 40 degrees and were followed by the premature seeding in the Spring. Although slightly higher temperatures prevailed during the recent cold wave, which lasted only 11 days those to the industry fear that damage may become apparent before the crop is harvested.

Relatively high temperatures, however, of 70 degrees or above apparently prevent this seeding, regardless of previous conditions, unless the seed stalks are started before the rise in the temperature, the bulletin revealed and also that this probably accounts for the fact that in some seasons no seed stalks develop even though the plants have been subjected to the low temperatures. Those close to the industry expressed beliefs that if relatively high temperatures persist through out the winter any injuries caused by the cold wave will be counteracted and no damage to the present crop may result.

The Cornell University Bulletin also revealed contrary to the belief of most farmers, that a serious check in the growth of the young plants also materially delays seed stalk development. Stunting in the seed beds by crowding and withholding water are methods employed to check growth.

Yeruel Is Captured By Loyalist Troops

HENDAYE, Dec. 22.—(AP)—Government forces have captured Yeruel insurgent officer, said they were advised today by Generalissimo Francisco Franco's headquarters.

The prime minister told the House: "We still are anxious to serve the cause of peace but it must not be thought that our desire for peace and patience under repeated provocation means we either are indifferent to our international relations or forgetful of our duty to protect British interests."

He declared "It is time now for the Japanese government to show they are not unmindful of the rights and interests of foreigners and that their assurance and apologies meant something more than words."

The prime minister discussed in general terms the situation in China and Spain, the talks in Germany between Vicecount Halban, Lord president of the council, and Chancellor Adolf Hitler, anti-British propaganda and the League of Nations.

He agreed with the opposition on three things: That Japan had not tried for a peaceful settlement of her conflict with China; that war was distasteful; and that co-operation with the United States was essential.

Eager and angry laborites interrupted him throughout his speech. When he said the recent Luce conference on the Chinese-Japanese conflict would not end the undeclared war except by force, the opposition raised the cry: "Boycott Boycott!"

The prime minister said the last six months had seen a "perceptible lessening of tension in Europe."

He described the Halifax-Bitter talks as "the first step toward a general effort to arrive at a general settlement" in Europe.

He said Italy's withdrawal from the league made no "real difference."

Clément E. Ailbe, leader of the opposition, described Japan's invasion of China as an attack on the British Empire.

"Nobody is suggesting war on Japan," he declared, "but pressure could be brought to bear."

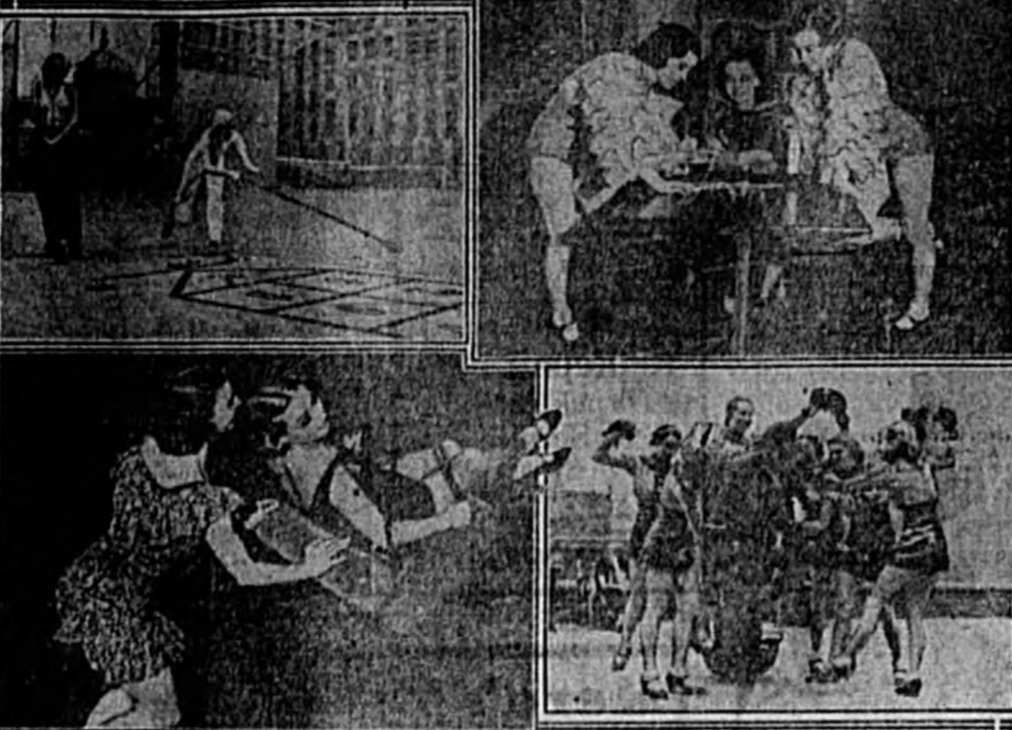

Cone To Request Elimination Of Assault Charge

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., Dec. 22.—As a result of the recent pardon board sessions, Gov. Fred P. Cone has determined to ask the 1939 legislature for a statute eliminating the charge of "assault with intent to commit manslaughter."

In the first place, the Governor said, it is hard to imagine just such a crime.

In the second place, he added, offenses covered by the charge fall almost without exception into the category of aggravated assault for which the maximum penalty is one year in prison or \$500 fine.

Gov. Cone said his objection to the charge resulted from petitions for clemency for several prisoners convicted under the charge and sentenced to serve five or ten years.

"Assault to commit manslaughter," he said, "is so close to aggravated assault you couldn't draw a razor blade between them. But

for one you get ten years and for the other one year." The charge is derived from a statute providing 20 years for assault with intent to commit any felony that is punishable by death or life imprisonment, and 10 years for assaults with intent to commit other felonies. The Governor said he questioned the propriety of charging a prisoner with assault with intent to kill a person because the very fact that intent enters the situation makes it murder or attempted murder.

**HOLLYWOOD, Dec. 22.**—Strange it may be, but the person most vitally concerned in a movie's love scene is neither of the principals but the director.

Your stars, unless they're very new at the business, may be quite blasé about exchanging oscillations and embraces for the camera, but your director never is. His realization of the importance of sincere and beautiful love scenes to his picture makes him, for the time, a Lohengrin without portfolio. He knows so thoroughly the mood he wants that you are sure, watching his headline excitement, he could give a better performance than his stars.

Sometimes he does, too—better and funnier. That is when he undertakes to "show them how." Archie Mayo frequently sets out scenes to demonstrate the effects he wants. Archie weighs around 200, unless he's reduced some more. He did not take Gary Cooper's place with Sigrid Gurie in the "Marco Polo" rehearsal, but he would recite the love lines to himself, and the replies, emphasizing the desired inflection. Archie thinks inflection is the big thing in movie love passages.

ridiculous useful. Busby Berkeley belongs to the set-it-out school. He acts it out in rehearsal, then during the "take" he stands behind the camera, going through the motions while his players perform before the lens.

Irving Cummings, once an actor himself, uses the soft voice method, and beams benignly as he watches his scene, step by step. You can almost hear him as he mentally reads the lines. Mervyn LeRoy's that way too. Ernest Lubitsch lets out the actor in him occasionally. It's funniest when he emotes through a love scene with his cigar in his mouth—to demonstrate an inflection, a matter of timing, a movement of the head or arm he wants.

Gigantic William Dieterle—in achievement as in stature, what with "Zola" behind him—gets excited. He has been known to walk up and down the set, between scenes, waving arms over his head and shouting: "No, no. You luff her. You understand! Make it real, make it honest. Giff me more, more closer, more enthusiasm, more luff!"

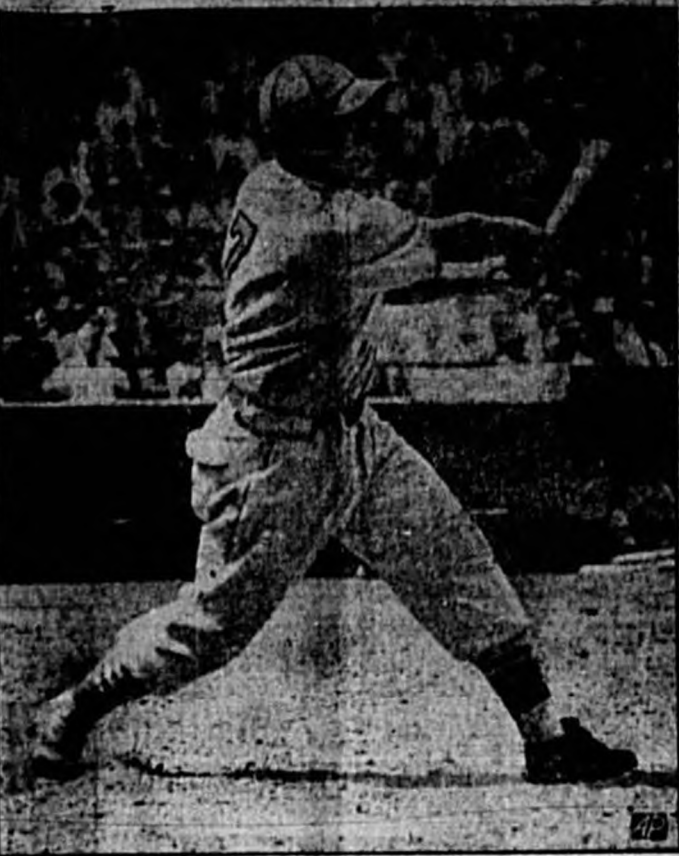

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22.—The Japanese bombing of the American gunboat Panay in the Far East has given American diplomacy the hardest nut it has had to crack since the World war. The catch is two-fold: To persuade Japan not to kill any more Americans or damage their property.

Senate Plans Big Probe Of Trade Slump

Investigation Seen As Furnishing Basis For Dealing With Budget Balancing

Dies Plans Meet To Cut Spending

Roosevelt Warns Of Unbalanced Budget; Blames Congress

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23.—(AP)—Officials arranging for the Senate's unemployment investigation beginning Jan. 4 indicated today it would develop into a broad analysis of the extent of the business recession.

Governmental and industrial leaders will be called, they said, to testify on the present industrial activity and prospects for the next few months. Some informed persons forecast the inquiry, under the direction of Senator Byrnes (D-S. C.) would be one of the most significant events of the 1938 congressional session.

It probably will provide the background, they said, for the dominant issue of the session—government expenditures and budget balancing. Furthermore, the inquiry will constitute the first attempt by Congress to study the relief problem for itself and devise a program of its own, discontinued on page two

15 Persons In County Are Bitten In Mad Dog Epidemic

Following a meeting with C. A. Holloway, an officer of the State Board of Health, and Claude Wolfe his assistant, in the office of County Physician Dr. A. C. Kirk yesterday, a definite program has been arranged to control the spread of rabies in this vicinity.

Members of the Police Department during the past few days have killed more than 30 dogs suspected of having rabies. It was reported, and in addition to this number positive tests have been returned from Jacksonville, where the heads of approximately 15 more dogs have been sent.

Mrs. Roosevelt Flies West For Christmas

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23.—(AP)—Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt was enroute to Seattle, Wash., by airplane today for surprise Christmas visit to her daughter, Mrs. John Boettiger, and family.

This was announced by White House aides, who said the trip was decided last night by the President and First Lady.

Most of the Roosevelt family is scheduled to come to Washington for Christmas, but Mrs. Boettiger is unable to travel because of illness. Mr. and Mrs. Roosevelt decided, therefore, they would "divide" themselves between the two family groups.

Mexico City Is Hit By Heavy Earthquake

MEXICO, Dec. 23.—(AP)—A heavy earthquake shook Mexico City early today, killing at least two persons and crushing the adobe homes on the outskirts of the city.

One report was that Tulancingo in the southern part, was damaged. One woman was fatally injured here when the room of her home collapsed and a man was electrocuted by a broken adobe hut collapsed.

The people were calm, however. A few rock walls also tumbled under the tremor which began at 5:15 P. M. T. and lasted a minute.

Peace Reigns At Eckersons Despite Halt

Meeting Planned For Tonight When CIO Agent Will Try To Organize Workers

Although knotted groups of strikers loafed near the premises of the Eckerson Fruit Cannery today, conditions as a whole were peaceful following a walkout of approximately 75 men pickets yesterday.

Threats of picketing were heard this morning, officials reported, but City and County peace officers who remained at the plant throughout the day frustrated any attempts of interference with workers as canning operations were in both the heat and juice sections on a somewhat smaller scale.

The management also reported that while there was no general walkout on the part of over 200 women employed, there was considerable agitation. This however, is believed to have been eliminated through the firing of a number of women whom officials felt were working to the detriment of the plant.

One of the workers who struck for higher wages advised a Herald reporter this morning that as an inexperienced peeler he had made up to \$2.75 for a nine-hour day and in four days had made \$12. Records at the cannery plant also revealed that some of the experienced workers made as high as \$12.50 a day.

6 Circuit Judges Asked To Decide Murphy Act Issue

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., Dec. 22.—(AP)—In at least six circuits of Florida the courts have been asked to decide whether tax certificates that were two years old after the Murphy Tax Exemption law became effective last June may be sold under its terms.

Attorney General Cary D. Landis ruled that certificates must have been two years old on that day to come under the law.

Circuit Judge J. C. B. Koonce at Tallahassee decided that certificates which became two years old during the period covered by the law ending in June, 1935—may take advantage of the new tax sale procedure.

Attorneys here said the state was not a party to the suit in which Judge Koonce ruled and his decision probably would not reach the Supreme Court.

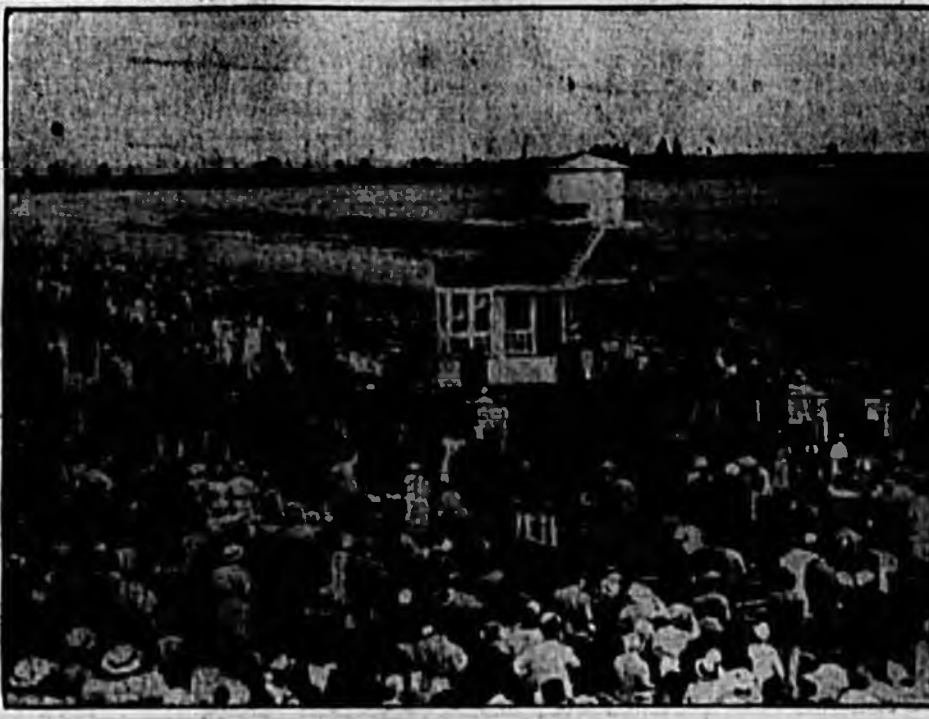
At Clearwater Circuit Judge T. Frank Hobson made a similar ruling in another case.

At Fort Pierce Judge Kiwan Kiwanis agreed with the Attorney General that only certificates two years old on June 9 could be sold under the Murphy law. This ruling probably will reach the Supreme Court, attorneys said.

Two other attempts to force advertising and sale of certificates that only recently became two years old are pending in Broward and Pinellas counties. A similar proceeding was started at Brevard, then dropped.

The law provides that when the Murphy law's redemption period expires, all tax certificates two years old upon its passage shall become property of the state. Lands covered by certificates can come into the state's possession only if the certificate was two years overdue last June, informed sources here said.

On the opening night of the Yuletide season, a patron saint, Night Rupprecht, who was both fierce and good and was much feared by all the children, made a house-to-house canvass of all the villages and towns and put the children on probation until Christmas.

The patron was dressed in sackcloth and wore heavy boots. He also carried two sacks on his back and a large whip in his hand which he kept for bad children.

From the appearance of this patron until Christmas the children were on probation and if they were bad Christ Kinde, meaning Christ Child, who is the donor of all Christmas gifts, would not pay them a visit on Christmas day.

Britain To Delay Naval Movements Until New Year

Russia Is Reported As Having Promised To Assist Chinese

LONDON, Dec. 23.—(AP)—Great Britain took steps today to insure a quick movement of part of her Mediterranean fleet to the Orient in any emergency.

The decision was understood to have been reached, however, against immediate naval commitments in the Far East. Authorities said the cabinet had considered the admiralty's technical plan for naval reinforcements but left further decision to Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain and Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden over the Christmas holidays.

In Shanghai it was learned that China's high command, committed to an "irrevocable policy of fighting Japan to a finish" has begun the task of clearing a military highway route through its western frontier over which Soviet Russia is expected to pour military supplies.

The reports said vast labor army of Chinese coolies was now at work, rushing to completion a 5,000-mile military highway through Central Asia which will enable Russia to supply China with arms on an almost inexhaustible scale.

The new highway will cut the trip by truck to a fortnight instead of two months as now required.

Chinese communist leaders were anxious to retain Chiang as the dominant man in China, because he is regarded as the only man capable of bringing cohesion between "the state and sand" of China's variegated millions.

Meanwhile the "shift to the left" in the Chinese political set-up which began early this week with the ousting of a powerful Kuomintang (nationalist party) leader from Central Government posts, was believed to have strengthened China's hope of aid from its vast western frontier.

Free Show For Kiddies To Be Given At Ritz

Suggesting that drivers of school buses bring their children to the Ritz Theatre, Joe L. Marcellino, manager, again called attention this morning to the annual free show for children tomorrow morning at 10:00 o'clock.

The free show for the young people has been a custom of several years standing and it is an occasion at which the children may bring canned food to be turned over to the Elks for the benefit of the poor.

Japan Forms New Rule For Nanking Area

Three Hundred Americans Flee Hankow; Others Are Warned To Leave Hangchow

Japs Admit Panay Machine-Gunning

Officer Describes Incident Resulting In American Loss

By Associated Press Japan formed its new autonomous government at captured Nanking today, presumably to replace Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek's nationalist government. It was only 10 days ago that a similar autonomous government, headed by a Chinese, was set up by Japan at Peiping, the center of the vast north China region taken by the Japanese army in its latest invasion of China.

The Japanese army appeared today nearer the end of its conquest, however, as it was spreading its reaches over ever-widening front which threatened to encompass all foreigners who were warned to evacuate Hangchow, checking province's capital airport, to escape the danger from an imminent siege by Japanese forces.

Three hundred Americans and other foreigners fled the threat of another Japanese attack at Hankow, a Yangtze River valley city, aboard a special train bound for Hongkong.

TOKYO, Dec. 23.—(AP)—The Japanese army today admitted for the first time the machine-gunning of Americans in the Yangtze River Panay incident, but did not mention firing on the United States gunboat itself.

Lieutenant Colonel Yoshiaki Nishi, a former assistant military attaché at Washington, described the incident after an investigation at Pukow, across the Yangtze from Nanking.

Nishi declared the entire incident resulted from efforts to cut off Chinese troops fleeing from Nanking. Nishi said launches were observed leaving the steamers bombed by Japanese planes. He said one launch escaped and another captured while 11 Chinese soldiers were taken prisoner.

Other troops approaching the wharf, he said, saw Chinese soldiers leaving the launches. "Army patrols opened fire. Another patrol approaching through the fields and intending to cut off the retreat of the people fleeing from the shore found Americans and Europeans among the group and ordered the troops to cease firing."

Nishi stated positively the Japanese troops failed to see any identification or flags of any kind.

A foreign office report was issued in the midst of popular excitement caused by the arrest of 370 suspected agitators, as (Continued on Page Three)
