Britain, Germany is going to try to prevent it. We should know that if we are going to convoy British or American merchantmen our warships are liable to be shot at. We should know that if the American navy is going to be used to drive German submarines from the Atlantic and to spot German warships and planes, the British are liable to "LOR" whereabouts, a crash of some kind is inevitable.

But we should also know that regardless of what we do, the only hope of America keeping out of this war is the defeat of Hitlerism. Other nations have tried the appeasement policy to its uttermost limits and it didn't do them a bit of good in the world. Whenever it suited Hitler's purpose he attacked them regardless of how mild they had tried to avoid trouble. He will attack us in his own sweet time, if he can, whether we aid England or whether we don't.

Mobile Unit Will Be Repairing Bombed Homes Soon After Blitz

LONDON, Sept. 5.—(AP)—Preparing for great intensification of air raids during Fall and winter months, the British Ministry of Works has formed a mobile organization which intends to be repairing damage to homes within 10 minutes after completion of blitzes to come.

During the summer raid half 30,000 workers have repaired 95 percent of the damaged houses in the London area repairable. Costs were borne by the 23 London boroughs.

Almost no repairs have been made to London's historic buildings, except for minor work on roofs and windows. Great holes still gape.

No figures are available on repair of private or public business properties, but informed sources say thousands of laborers have been on that job for months in London's huge business area, temporary repairs have been made to hundreds of damaged business buildings, which again are filled the London area which were repairable. Costs were borne by the 23 London boroughs.

Other crews have been repairing utilities, city streets, sidewalks, and the Ministry says, "the greater part of that task is completed. No London street is closed now because of bomb damage."

The policy of policing the Atlantic and maintaining bases in Iceland under the very noses of the Germans is a dangerous one. So is any other policy we might pursue. The motto of the Germans and the Italians is to "live dangerously." When any two great nations—and we might add the Japanese—are living dangerously and are armed to the teeth, no other nation can live safely and securely.

Inasmuch as the choice is not open to us, inasmuch as we live in a dangerous world, whether we like it or not, we might as well make the most of it. Let those who have made the world dangerous live to regret it, let American warships go any place at any time that they have a perfect right to go. And let German submarines beware if they fire upon them. That is a game that two can play and the Americans have always played it well.

And we can again, whether the Germans call it war or not.

Watermelon Crop

Florida is rapidly becoming known as an important watermelon producing state with our neighbor of Lake County one of the most important in the state. With prices ranging as high as \$5 and the volume reported as excellent, Lake county farmers are said to be well pleased with the results of this season just now coming to a close.

"Major asset to Florida's reputation as an important melon producer," says the Florida Grower, "is the branch of the state agricultural experiment station located at Leesburg, in the heart of Lake County. At this station new and improved varieties, including wilt-resisting sorts, are in constant development. This year 11,000 hand pollinations were made for development of new hybrids. And seven new varieties were released to experiment stations and larger seed firms."

"Lake County melons were exhibited at the Florida exhibit in Atlantic City. Finest melons of the year, no doubt, were produced by R. E. Goddard and Neil G. Brown of Linden, Queens of their crop weighed 95 and 98 pounds, with an average weight of 75 pounds for the melons in their field. The largest melons sold for \$5.00 each.

"While commercial growers look variously on this season in the light of success, Madison County planters consider it a very satisfactory year. With prices well above the usual average of a dollar to \$2.00 per car, J. H. Allen sold melons at \$2.75 a carload. Both volume and quality have been excellent, with shipments from Suwannee County in June totaling 290 carloads."

SUCCESS FOR OUR FISH

EHMAN—Some few months ago I appeared before the U. S. Tariff Commission to testify for an increase in tariff on canned salmon. I am glad to report that the Tariff Commission gave a favorable report and President Roosevelt in turn issued a proclamation raising the tariff from 15 percent to 22½ percent. Oh, how this may not appear to be of much importance, and of little concern to the individual, but we are all concerned since this is a great victory for our Florida fishermen, and for the water foods industry as a whole. In the past years the catching of salmon was an important industry, with little foreign competition. In recent years this industry has almost vanished, as imports increased yearly, and finally the greater portion of canned salmon consumed in this country has been foreign. Ministry reports of these imports were coming from Japan, and upon investigation it was found that the Japanese were operating near North America, employing cheap labor, manufacturing the product under considerable favorable conditions, and placed on the market at undervalued American prices. While the tariff increase will not stop Japanese imports, it will certainly put a great strain on them, and will also put a great strain on the local people who have been so long and so hard working.
