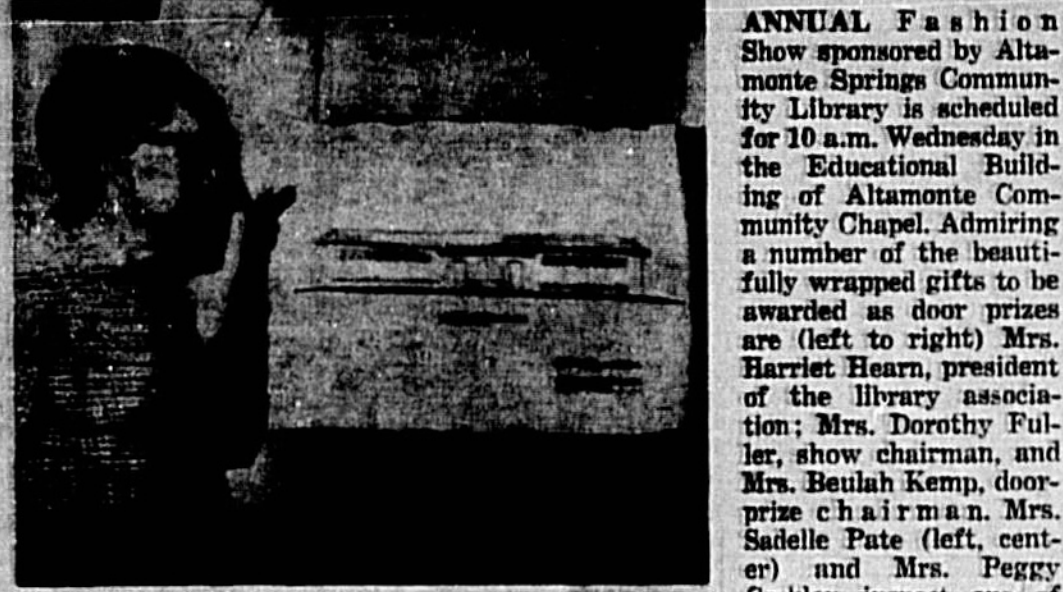

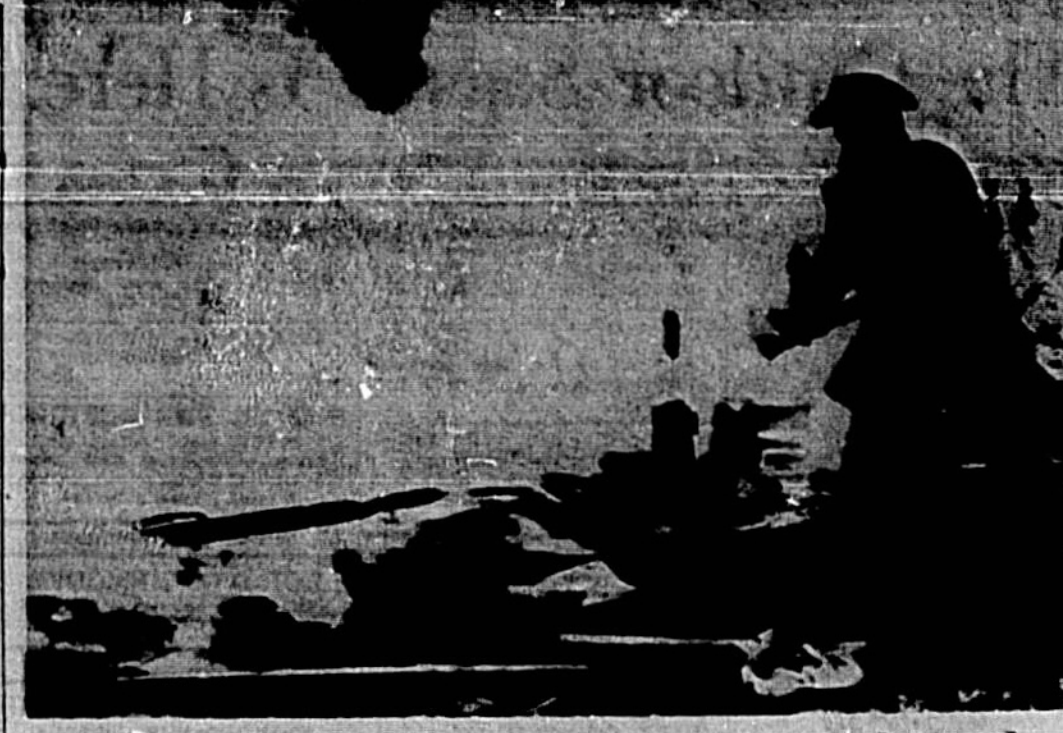

**Teacher Situation Not Settled**  
Sen. Dennis O'Grady of Jacksonville, who received the "silent treatment" when he addressed members of the Florida Education Association in Daytona Beach during the teacher walk-out, received rousing applause and a standing ovation as speaker for the March meeting of the DeLaney Republican Club. The youngest member of the Florida Senate ever elected and the first Republican to hold office in Citrus County, O'Grady said the school teacher situation is "definitely not settled" and predicted a deficit of \$1 billion in the early 1970s. He stated that in his opinion "one of the major casualties today is the result of legislative action in the past 90 years of one party system saying 'We'll do this and let the next legislature worry about it,' pointing out that the 1967 legislature was the "first to adopt intelligent planning for the future." He informed the DeLaney group that the legislature will employ professional auditors and other trained investigators to go into the major counties to study personnel records, expenditures, controls, etc., advising that "checks of various counties have shown classrooms do not contain 40 children to one teacher as claimed, but rather from 25 to 27 students. The teachers' organization did not ask for more classrooms in their budget request to the legislature," he pointed out. O'Grady concluded by citing the John Saitley Education Development Center, a former Junior College, which is serving "a good purpose and could be used for classrooms."

Building permit for the new \$1,067,500 General Dynamics plant to be located north of Lake Mary Boulevard and east of Interstate 4 was issued by the county zoning office today. 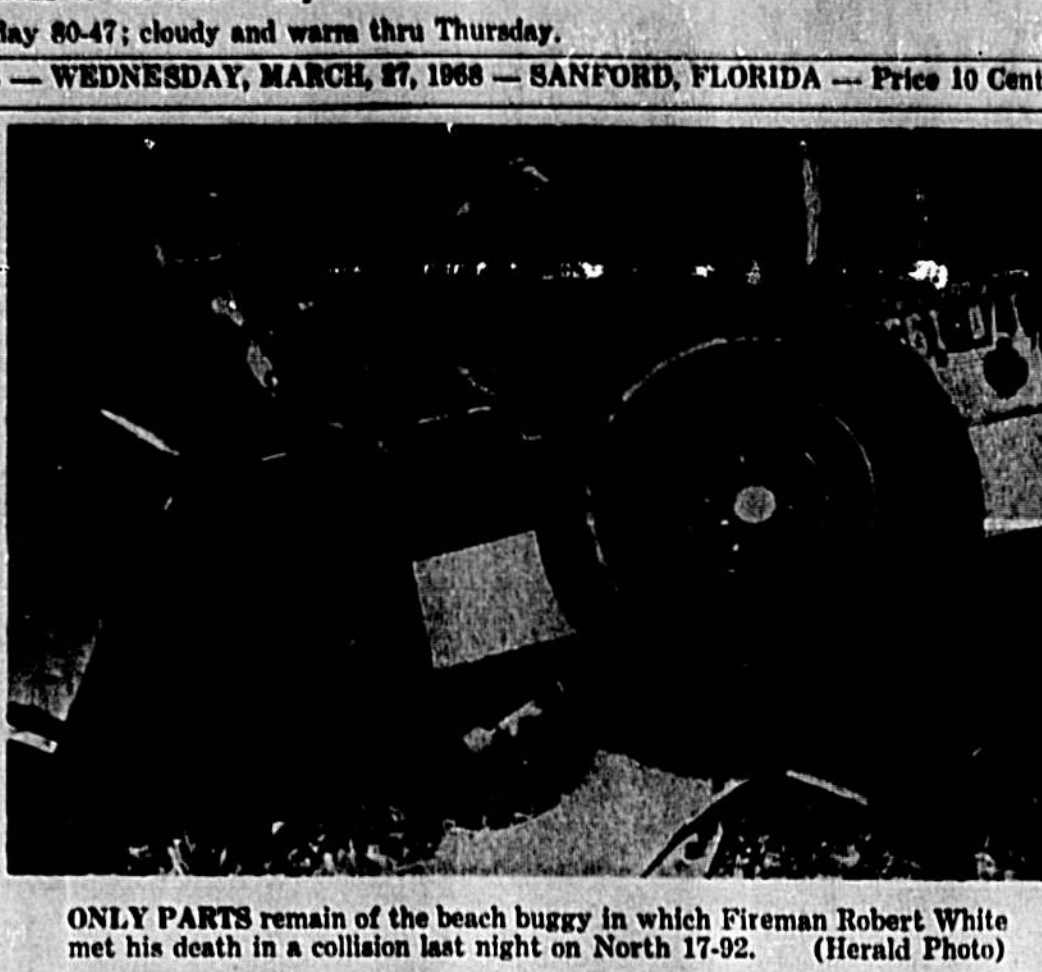
**Thieves Hit Night Spot**

White Jr., 34-year-old lieutenant with the Sanford Fire department, was killed late yesterday afternoon in a head-on collision of his beach buggy and a station wagon on Highway 17-92 at the north Sanford city limits. Driver of the station wagon, Mrs. Lorenna... 2500 Myrtle Avenue, received a fractured left kneecap and was taken to Seminole Memorial Hospital, where she is reported in good condition today. White was reported dead on arrival at the hospital. A resident of 900 Catalina Drive, he was born Jan. 5, 1934, in Zelwood. He was graduated from Seminole High School in 1952 and began work with the fire department in March 1955. He was commissioned a lieutenant in January, 1966. # Demo Governors 'Cool' To Bobby, Gene

NEW YORK (AP)—A survey of the nation's Democratic governors showed scant support today for either Sen. Robert F. Kennedy or Sen. Eugene J. McCarthy. An Associated Press survey found that 11 of the 24 Democrats occupying state house chairs express support for President Johnson for re-nomination. Only one—Philip H. Hoff of Vermont—is unequivocally for Kennedy. One other—Harold E. Hughes of Iowa—may be leaning toward Kennedy or McCarthy. Six of the governors appear uncommitted. Two others stand apart from the party. Hoff stands alone among the Democratic governors in his break with President Johnson. "I have concluded," Hoff said last Friday, "that the only way in which our potentially disastrous national course can be arrested is through a change in our national leadership." Hoff said he welcomed McCarthy's candidacy, but maintained that Kennedy "offers the most realistic possibility for the people of America if we are to achieve the national regeneration that is so desperately needed."

Hughes, a close friend of the President and chairman of the Democratic governors, said he will continue to support Johnson until it becomes clear the President refuses to change his Vietnam policies. "I may reach the point," Hughes said, "of totally and conclusively breaking with the current administration... I have reached a decision that a policy of guns and butter is not feasible." The Iowa governor, who is running for Sen. Burke Hickenlooper's seat, said he's keeping an open mind about Kennedy and McCarthy. Firm support for the President comes from governors in such states as Texas, his home state, and from Tennessee, West Virginia and Delaware. Hawaii's Gov. John A. Burns said he's "greatly sure that Hawaii will continue to support the President in light of Johnson's outstanding record and especially because Hawaii remembers him as a man who brought statehood to us." King, a leader of the controversial Johnson write-in campaign in the March primary there, is solidly in the Johnson camp. Indiana Gov. Roger D. Branigan has agreed to run as a Johnson stand-in in the state's May 7 presidential primary. Gov. Otto Kerner of Illinois says he's with Johnson. So do Govs. Calvin L. Rampton of Utah and John N. Dempsey of Connecticut. New Jersey Gov. Richard J. Hughes says he's with Johnson all the way, charging that Kennedy's entry into the race could cause a "disruptive split" in the party. Robert E. McNair of South Carolina says he favors the President over either McCarthy or Kennedy. One of the 14 counted in the Johnson camp, Gov. William L. Guy of North Dakota, gave this reason: "President Johnson is the elected President of the United States and as such I will support him in that office. 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# GIs, VCs Carry Heavy Fighting Into 4th Day

SAIGON (AP) — American infantrymen supported by tanks, artillery and planes battled the Viet Cong today for control of a tiny hamlet northwest of Trang Bang.

Men of the U.S. 23d Infantry Division called in artillery and napalm air strikes only 50 to 100 yards ahead of them as they advanced into the hamlet of Ap Long Muc about 50 miles northwest of Saigon near the district town of Trang Bang.

U.S. and South Vietnamese forces have reported killing 200 enemy in the Trang Bang area since Sunday. Allied casualties were described as light.

Al Chang, an Associated Press photographer who was wounded slightly by shrapnel as he fled from the fighting, said the Viet Cong were well entrenched in the hamlet and greeted the advancing infantrymen with heavy machine gun fire and a barrage of rocket-propelled grenades.

With the battle still raging, at least eight enemy dead were reported.

Meanwhile, U.S. headquarters said in another fight in the Trang Bang sector, 25th Division units killed 17 enemy after making a helicopter assault Tuesday four miles northeast of Saigon.

As the American infantrymen hit the ground, the Viet Cong were waiting for them. From trenches and bunkers, the enemy opened up with machine guns and rocket-propelled grenades.

By midafternoon today, sporadic fighting was reported continuing. Headquarters did not disclose U.S. casualties but said 22 North Vietnamese MIG-21 interceptors on their radar, but there were no encounters.

In another offensive in the hard-hit Mekong Delta, South Vietnamese troops reported killing 14 Viet Cong in a series of three battles Tuesday.

The heaviest fighting was near Soc Trang, a provincial capital, 100 miles south of Saigon, where Vietnamese rangers and infantrymen claimed 90 Viet Cong were killed in day-long fighting.

Five South Vietnamese soldiers were reported killed and 30 wounded.

In a second action, South Vietnamese infantrymen clashed with elements of the 33rd Viet Cong Main Force Battalion 22 miles south southwest of Saigon. At last report, the fighting was continuing with 21 enemy reported dead so far. Government casualties were not reported.

South Vietnamese forces have been trying to regain the initiative from the Viet Cong in the delta, heavily hit in the enemy's lunar new year offensive.

Elsewhere, North Vietnamese command post for American units fighting along the northern frontier.

Gunsners hit the complex with 55 rounds of rockets and mortars. There was no report of damage. Casualties were said to be light.

## LBJ's Combo Plan Faces House Fight

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sponsors predict the Senate will approve their bid to combine President Johnson's proposed 10 per cent income-tax surcharge with a \$6 billion spending cut. But they concede it's doubtful the House will buy such a plan.

The Senate was scheduled to vote late today on the combination proposal, which is an amendment to the House-passed bill extending excise taxes on cars and telephone service.

Sen. George A. Smathers, D-Fla., a co-sponsor of the tax-spending cut legislation, said key members of the House ways and means committee have told him they would not accept it.

Chairman Wilbur D. Mills, D-Ark., of the Ways and Means Committee has opposed Johnson's tax-hike proposal and exerts a powerful influence over his committee. In addition, the House committee traditionally originates all tax legislation and is not likely to surrender that role to the Senate.

Congress took these key actions Tuesday:

—The Ways and Means Committee rejected the President's proposal for a tourist tax on Americans who travel outside the Western Hemisphere, a plan he said would help cut the balance of payments deficit by keeping dollars home.

A final vote is scheduled today but sources indicated the result would be the same.

The Senate voted 51 to 32 to overrule a Treasury Department order against the increasing use of tax-exempt municipal bonds to finance new industrial plants for private firms.

The Treasury last Friday had canceled the tax exemption privilege for new issues of the industrial development bonds.

A department spokesman estimated the government had more than \$75 million in revenue last year through the issuance of such bonds. The department contends the original idea of tax-exempt bonds was to finance the building of public facilities rather than plants for private industry.

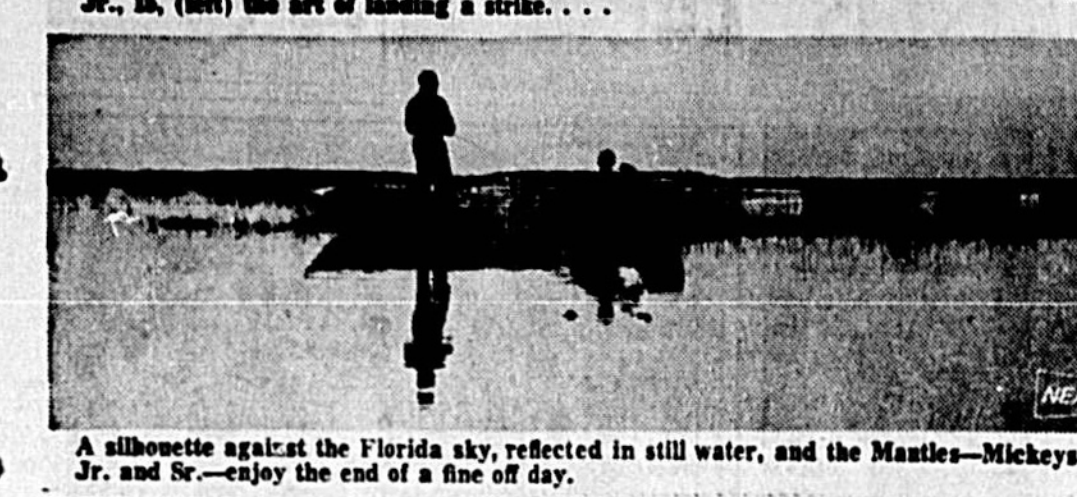

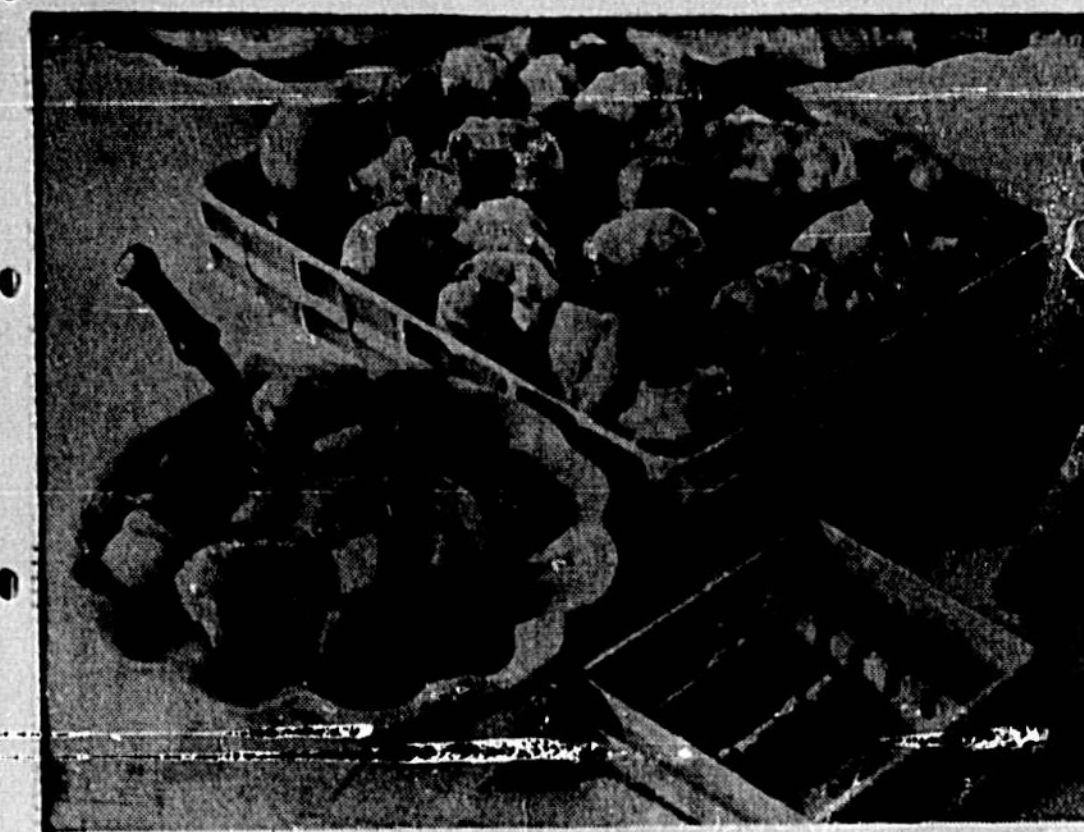

PARTY SNACK—Shrimp, artichoke hearts, mushrooms and green peppers are given a savory marinade, in "Shrimp Potpourri."

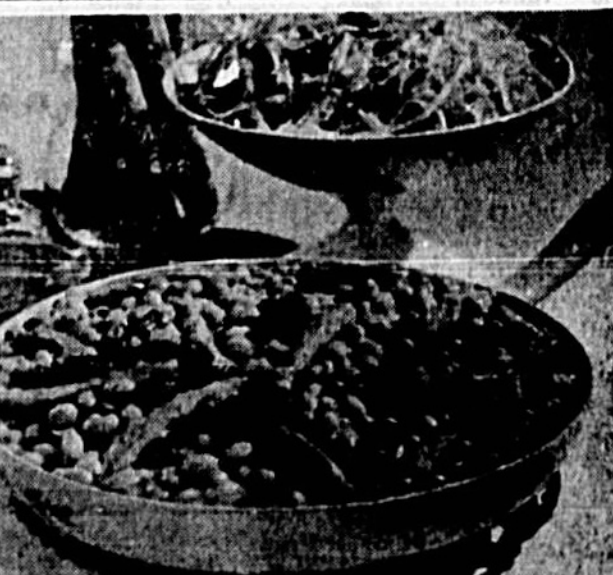

 Using a wooden spoon to work it in, continue to add remaining sugar, about two tablespoons at a time, until mixture is very stiff and not sticky to the touch. Knead mixture in bowl, until very smooth. (Last 1/4 cup or so of sugar may have to be kneaded in.)  
 Place mixture between two pieces of wax paper; roll out to a round that is 4 to 8 inches in diameter and 1/4-to-1/4-inch thick. Tuck ends of paper under and refrigerate for about one hour. Remove top layer of paper. Use a 1/4-inch round cutter, cut out; roll leavings and cut out, too. If necessary, use a small spatula to lift minis from paper. Let stand uncovered at room temperature for several hours to dry. Store in a lightly covered container overnight or for as long as four or five days. Then the day the minis are to be served, use Decorator's Frosting to decorate with flowers and leaves. Store again in covered container until serving time.  
 Makes four to five dozen.  
**TO MAKE CALLA LILIES:**  
 As soon as each mini is cut out, fold in half, inching one end to fold; separate other end by getting back the upper edge slightly. Let stand at room temperature for several hours to dry; store in a covered container. Before serving, use Decorator's Frosting to make stamens and leaves as directed. Serve as minis or use as the decoration for a frosted Easter cake.  
**DECORATOR'S FROSTING**  
 One-third cup butter or regular margarine at room temperature.  
 Two-thirds to 1 cup sifted confectioners' sugar.  
 Yellow food coloring  
 Green food coloring  
 In a small mixing bowl with a wooden spoon, beat together the butter and sugar. If frosting is too stiff, blend in a few drops of water. Divide in half; tint one half with the yellow food coloring; tint the other half with the green food coloring. Put frosting in small decorating bags with appropriate tips as follows:  
 To pipe decoration only round minis: for flowers, use star tip and yellow frosting; for leaves, use tube tip and green frosting.

## New Way To Treat Meatball

**SOUS CREAM SAUCE**  
 1/2 cup butter or margarine  
 1/2 cup finely chopped onion  
 1 garlic clove, peeled and halved  
 2 tablespoons flour  
 1 cup undiluted evaporated milk mixed with 1 cup clear fat-free chicken broth  
 1 can (6 ounces) sliced broiled mushrooms, drain but save liquid  
 1 container (8 ounces) commercial sour cream  
 In a medium saucepan over low heat, melt the butter; add the onion and garlic; cook gently, stirring often, until golden; remove garlic. Stir in flour; remove from heat.  
 Gradually add milk broth mixture, stirring until smooth after each addition.  
 Return to moderately low heat; cook, stirring constantly, until thickened and bubbly.  
 Turn heat low. Add drained mushrooms. Stir in the sour cream and enough of the mushroom liquid—you may want to use it all—to make the consistency you like. Taste and add salt and pepper if needed—seasoning will depend on flavor of chicken broth and how much mushroom liquid is added. Re-heat but do not boil.  
 Makes enough sauce to serve with six to eight servings of meatballs and noodles.

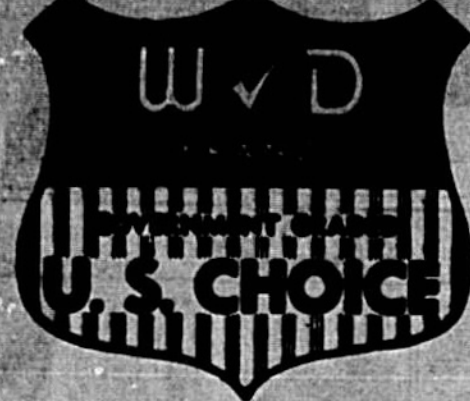

 1 cup sugar  
 1 tablespoon light corn syrup  
 1/2 cup water  
 3 large egg whites  
 1 cup butter  
 2 teaspoons vanilla  
 In a medium saucepan stir together the sugar, corn syrup and water. Over low heat, stirring constantly, cook until sugar dissolves; continue cooking without stirring to 240 degree on candy thermometer or to soft ball stage in cold-water test.  
 In a medium mixing bowl, beat egg whites until stiff; very slowly beat in hot syrup; cool. In a large mixing bowl, thoroughly cream butter and vanilla; beat in egg-white mixture, a few tablespoons at a time; beat thoroughly after each addition. Use as a thick frosting for top and sides of a sponge cake baked in a 10-inch tube pan.  
 Store in refrigerator. Before serving, let stand at room temperature for 10 to 30 minutes—depending on warmth of room. (After frosted cake is chilled, it may be covered with transparent plastic wrapping.)

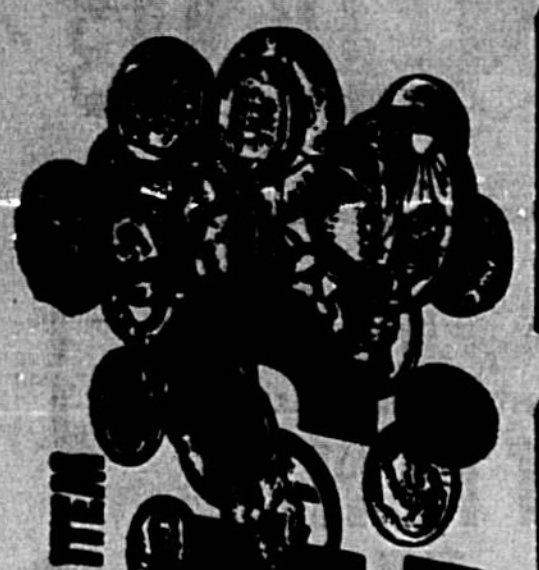
