

# LIVES LOST AS FLOOD STRIKES IN PORTO RICO

**Inundation Is Caused By Tropical Storm Now Menacing West Indian Territories**

(By Associated Press) Heavy rain in Porto Rico believed there to be due to a cyclone disturbance which has been bringing over that part of the Atlantic for several days, early yesterday caused floods which resulted in a considerable loss of life.

A San Juan newspaper placed the number of dead at 200.

A violent storm lashed the Dominican coast last night, and a heavy rain fell.

The national observatory of Havana said the storm was located north of and near to the Peninsula of Jibacoa, Dominican Republic, and was moving west, with a possibility that it might strike the eastern end of Cuba if it continued its present direction.

The storm has been continually decreasing as mile in intensity and narrow in breadth. The national observatory said the wind velocity has not risen higher than 50 miles an hour.

Father Gutierrez Lanza, in charge of Belen Observatory at Havana, said yesterday the storm was nothing more than "an abnormality," without danger for Cuba or other territory.

Richard W. Gray, of the Miami weather bureau, said yesterday however, that if the storm should continue its present course and progress it would probably pass through the Florida straits sometime tomorrow and its effect would be felt in extreme southern Florida.

SAN JUAN, Porto Rico, Sept. 4.—(A.P.)—Floods rising from heavy rainfall said to have been due to the cyclone storm which has been hovering over the Atlantic in this region took heavy toll and destroyed a large amount of property at Ponce yesterday.

No accurate estimate of the number of people drowned could be made last night, although the newspaper La Democacia placed the number at 200.

Policemen, the national guard and other government agencies who searched for bodies all day were reporting last night to have recovered 20.

The chief of police at Ponce said it was impossible to get to the other side of the Portuguense river, down which the principal flood came, but that it was probable additional bodies had been found there.

The flood came suddenly early yesterday morning, following a downpour during the night, sweeping houses and boats along the river banks toward the sea. Many houses were jammed against the bridge leading to the harbor front at Ponce and some boats were recovered there yesterday, although it was believed others were carried out into the Caribbean.

A total of 2.25 inches of rainfall fell during the 24 hours ending at 8 o'clock yesterday morning.

Gov. Theodore Roosevelt yesterday ordered all government agencies to render all assistance possible. He opened the Red Cross subscription with a personal check for \$100.

## Parachute Jumpers Hurt At Cleveland

CLEVELAND, Sept. 4.—(A.P.)—A sudden wind and rain storm which forced a delay of today's national air race program caused accidents in which two parachutists were injured. John Wickham, Cincinnati, broke his leg and Harry Blodow, Little Rock, cracked his back when gusts of wind struck the chutes when they struck the ground.

## JAMAICA FEELS QUAKE

MONTEGO BAY, Jamaica, Sept. 4.—(A.P.)—A sharp earthquake which lasted three seconds was reported at half past 11 o'clock, yesterday morning, but no damage was done.

## Tropical Storm Is Said Diminishing

WASHINGTON, Sept. 4.—(A.P.)—The Weather Bureau today said the tropical disturbance in the West Indies had moved southward over Haiti with diminishing intensity and apparently was central early today between Guantanamo, Cuba and Navassa Island. It is expected by the bureau to maintain its westerly course. Meanwhile in Havana observers said the storm was diminishing to such a degree that it apparently has passed the island although there will probably be winds and rain in Miami. Government forecasters said the storm is unlikely to pass near the southern tip of Florida since it swung over Haiti last night and is now proceeding westward.

## SUSPICION NOTED AS WALKER AIDE DOESN'T TURN UP

### Personal Accountant Wanted For Questioning By Probers

NEW YORK, Sept. 4.—(A.P.)—Chief Counsel Samuel Seabury yesterday described as "circumstances" the disappearance of Mayor Walker's personal accountant, Russell T. Sherwood who is wanted for questioning by the legislative committee investigating the municipal government.

Seabury referred to Sherwood's departure from an Atlantic City hotel where he was found after it first became known he was wanted as a flight from the state's jurisdiction.

"It is difficult for me to recollect this action," he said, "with the repeated assurances that have been given that those close to the mayor have nothing to hide."

While he described Sherwood as a "personal agent" of Mayor Walker, Seabury said the matter he wanted to question the missing man about did not concern the mayor's personal affairs, but were business affairs.

Sherwood vanished from New York several weeks ago when it was announced the investigating committee was preparing to subpoena him. A few days later he was found in the hotel at Atlantic City by a New York newspaper. He told a reporter he would not return until Mayor Walker was back from his European trip.

It became known yesterday that he had left the hotel and verification of this prompted Seabury's statement.

## CHILE NAVAL MUTINY SAID TO BE ENDED

### Government Reports It Holds Situation Throughout Nation In Perfect Control

SANTIAGO, Chile, Sept. 4.—(A.P.)—A statement saying the mutiny in the battle fleet at Coquimbo has been settled amicably and that only details of the settlement remained to be drawn up was issued today by the Chilean government. Acting President Manuel Troncoso told the press that the government had the situation throughout the country, purportedly fomented by communists, under complete control.

## Long Time Resident Of City Dies Today

Tony Faule, 63, a resident of Sanford for more than 30 years, died early this morning at the home of his daughter, Mrs. N. B. Kennedy, Ginderville. He had been in ill health for more than a year.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 4.—

Lane also may be designated a member of a third committee being formed by Gifford to coordinate administration relief in local communities.

## OVATION IS GIVEN PILOT WHO RACED HOME-MADE SHIP

### Moderate Flier Draws Applause Although He Comes In Third

CLEVELAND, Sept. 4.—(A.P.)

A modest pilot and his homemade plane injected pluck and color into the National Air races yesterday. He is Ben O. Howard, Chicago mail pilot, who drew a rapturous applause from the largest race crowd at the meet to date estimated at 50,000 people by officials.

The spectators gave their ovation in tribute to the sportsmanship and skill of the pilot, though his white plane that cuts the air from the energy of a four cylinder engine, could not nose across the finish line first.

It took the most consistent winner of the meet, John L. Irving, from Aurora, Ill., to lead Howard across the finish line in a 50-mile race.

Lowell Bayles, from Springfield, Mass., announced he would try to set a new world airspeed record Saturday.

An official three kilometer race will be last out by the National Aeromotive Association for the account on the seven year mark of 253.48 miles an hour set by late Admetus Bonner of Erie, Pa.

Bayles, flashing five laps around a 10-mile course, showed the speed of his short stock racer, by beating all comers in a free-for-all race with an average speed of 206 miles an hour.

Again it was Howard in his "Pete" which is so small that the mail pilot takes his shoes off to get in who stood up under the ground though the pace was so fast that three pilots withdrew. He came in third, twelve miles behind the winner.

## Father Of L. A. Tate Dies At Age Of 86

BARCELONA, Spain, Sept. 4.—

(A.P.)—Violent disorders arising out of a general strike yesterday cut off Barcelona from the rest of Spain, and last night had plunged the city into darkness.

One person was killed and several seriously wounded in street fighting that broke out after syndicalists had called the strike in protest against Civil Governor Ansuya de Sol's refusal to release political prisoners.

A mob set fire to a church, causing considerable damage, and a group in an automobile opened fire on police with a machine gun.

Gangs went about the city cutting electric cables and telephone wires.

Long bread lines formed, and authorities requisitioned trucks in an attempt to maintain a food supply. Cafes were closed after a day in which almost all business was suspended.

Policemen made frequent charges on rioters, firing over the heads of the people. Troops were confined to barracks last night.

## Injunction Granted Restraining State Gas Tax Allotment

### OPINION IS GIVEN BY CAREY LANDIS ON SEINE FISHING

#### Temporary Order Issued By Judge Love Following Request Of John Mathews

QUINCY, Sept. 4.—(A.P.)—Circuit Judge E. C. Love today granted a temporary injunction restraining state officials from distributing revenue from the three cents tax of the state's seven-cent gasoline levy.

The injunction was requested by John E. Mathews, Duval Representative, who attacked the constitutionality of the 1931 act which levied a seven-cent gas tax and distributed the revenue to the State Road Department and among counties.

The injunction granted today restrained Comptroller Ernest Amos and Treasurer W. V. Knott from distributing the money "in the state road distribution fund or any part thereof that may have been or that may be derived from what is termed as the second gas tax in the act known as House Bill 65X."

The restraining order was made to apply only to the three cents tax revenue which under the act would go to counties proportionately on a basis of area, population, and money spent in construction of roads later made part of the state highway system. It does not apply to the three cents going to the State Road Department.

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

"I note from your statement that the Board of County Commissioners of Volusia County refuses to join in consent with the Board of County Commissioners of Seminole County for the use of nets in fishing in Lake Monroe and the St. John's River, and other waters lying between Volusia and Seminole counties. I note that you are of the opinion that it is only necessary to have a joint resolution from the counties to fix a closed season, but that the waters of any county may be open to fishing of its citizens upon the request of the Board of County Commissioners or the State Game Commission upon such regulations as he may see fit."


