City OKs \$1 Million Budget

Millage To Stay At 16

The City Commission early this morning added a half of a mill to the general government budget to start the ball rolling for a Goldsboro recreation center and approved a \$1,118,000 budget. The commission, after meeting for close to five hours, added the half mill but chopped off a half mill from the debt service budget, keeping the tax the same as last year—16 mills. Also included in the budget is \$120,000 for paving the lot on the lakefront project and sidewalks along the lakefront at a cost of \$2,500. The board also agreed to install new drapes at the Civic Center and cut girls' cultural activities from the recreation department to make up the deficit. Anticipated revenue of the revised budget is \$12,616,000. The budget ordinance is expected to be drawn up at the regular commission meeting Monday night. Eliminated from the budget are the two city swimming pools, one at E. Mellon and one at Goldsboro. The board cut off \$3,000 from the Industrial Board's proposed \$100,000 budget although Commissioner Al Williams, head of the millage, asked for stimulating the board and letting "the commission handle industrial projects." Voting against the budget was M. J. Raborn, who stated the city had promised a reduction of millage if it passed a budget. 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Dump Closing Angers Oviedo

Scheduled closing of the Oviedo landfill on Sept. 20 by the county raised the ire of the Oviedo Town Council meeting in special session last night. The County Commission last week scheduled the closing when Road Superintendent J. C. Lavender warned immediate action was taken to close the dump state funds for the anthropological program might be jeopardized because of the poor condition of the Oviedo landfill. Acceptance is subject to approval and concurrence of the Department of Housing and Urban Development which has assumed a \$380,000 loan for the project as well as a grant of \$244,000. Adopted a resolution warning Southern Bell Company unless service is improved forthwith in the town, complaint will be made to the Public Service Commission. Took under advisement request of John Evans, vice chairman of the School Board, that roads cutting through the site of the new Oviedo High School be to be built, be closed. A mutual sexual attraction is no proper basis for a human relationship between a man and a woman. It is an organic thing, not personal. What then is the proper basis? Love is Love may or may not include sexual attraction. But sexual desire is quite compatible with personal hatred, or contempt or indifference because it treats its object not as a person but as a means to its own satisfaction. A man and a woman may want one another passionately without either loving the other. There is only one safeguard against self-deception in the face of desire—and that is emotional sincerity, or chastity.

How can a man or woman know whether they love another person or merely want them? Only by integrity of his or her emotional life. If he has habitually been incoherent in the expression of his feelings, they will be unable to tell. They will think they love when they only want another person for themselves. What is usually known as "being in love" is simply being in this condition. It blinks us to the reality of other people, leads us to pretend about their virtues, beauties, capacities and so forth; deprives us of the power of rational feeling and wraps us in a fog of unreality. If you love a person, you love him or her in their stark reality and refuse to shut your eyes to their defects and errors. For to shut your eyes to their defects and errors is to shut your eyes to their reality.

Love cannot abide deceit or pretense or unreality. It reacts only to the reality of the loved one, demands that the loved one should be himself so that he can be loved for himself. Chastity or emotional sincerity is an emotional grasp of reality. "Falling in love" and "being in love" are inventions of romantic sentimentality—the inevitable result of the deceit and pretense and suppression from which we suffer. Emotional sincerity is one of the possible expressions of love—more intimate, more fundamental, more fraught with consequences inner and outer, but essentially one of the expressions of love, not fundamentally different in principle from any others. It is neither something high and holy nor is it something low and contemptible. It is a simple ordinary organic function to be used like all the others for the expression of personality in the service of love. How two people know how to love demands such an expression. Only through a complete emotional sincerity between them.

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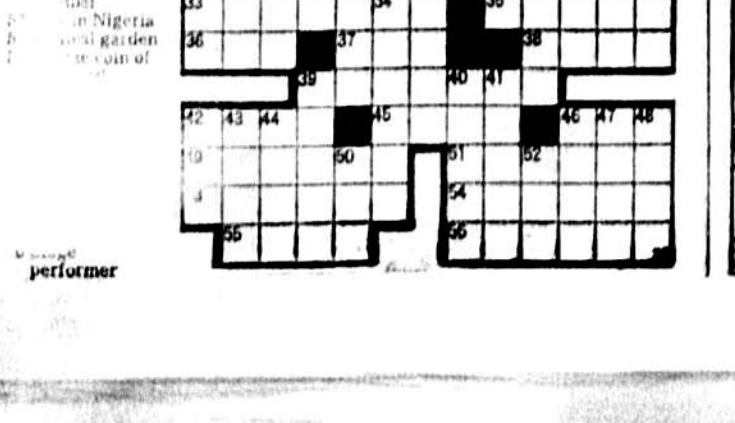
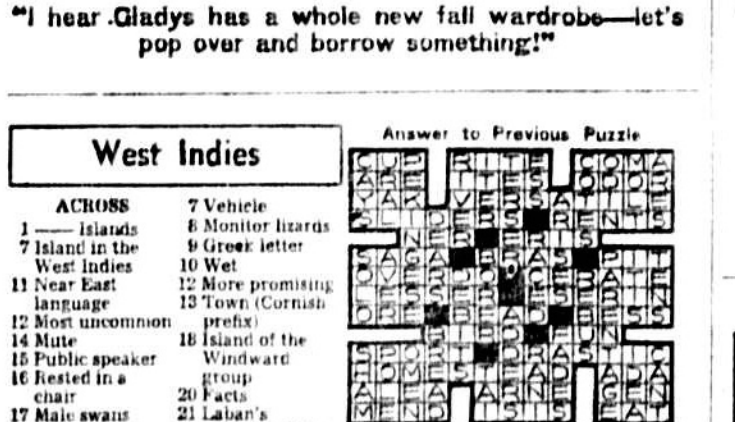

HOLLYWOOD—Florida's unconquered Seminoles will hold their first off-reservation Pow-Wow and Conclave in over 100 years Sept. 30 at Florida's Silver Springs. It was announced today by Tribe Chairman Mrs. Betty Mae Jumper and Joe Dan Osceola, chairman of the board, Seminole Tribal Council. Over 100 Seminoles in full costume will be at Silver Springs for ceremonies dedicating all new glass bottom boats named for famous Seminole chiefs and warriors. According to Mrs. Jumper, the decision to pow-wow at Silver Springs is to return descendants of famous chiefs to an area "steeped" in Seminole history as the camping grounds of famed warrior Osceola.

Employment Dips Here

Employment in Seminole County was off some 400 workers during the month of August over July, William Krievick of the Florida State Employment Service reported to The Herald today. Numbers in the labor force in the county totaled 15,700 in August as compared to 16,100 in July. However, a size of 1,000 persons unemployed was noted over August, 1966. Unemployment declined in August over July by 700 persons. Statistics show total unemployed were 700 for the month, while 800 were unemployed in July and 600 in August, 1966.

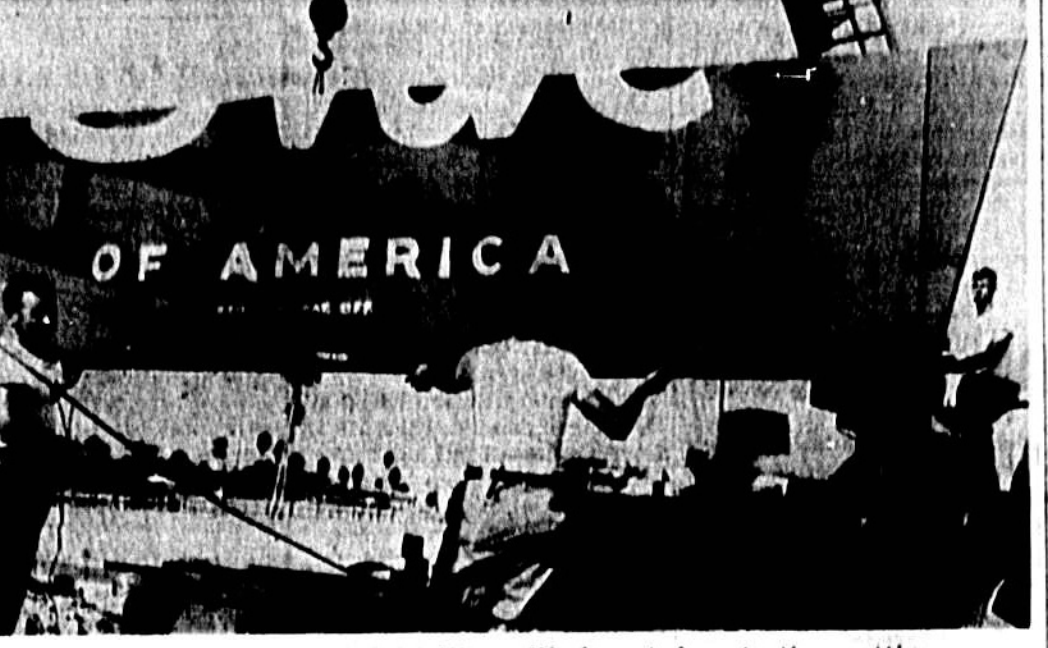
U. S. Would Help In Funding Centers For Depressed Urged Here

Grants in aid totaling two-thirds of the cost of construction, particularly in low income areas, can be obtained from the federal government with major stipulation being that Community Action programs be considered for inclusion at the facilities. Information and ways of applying for the funds were reported to the County Commission during informal meeting Tuesday afternoon by Harry Lindsey, of the Department of Community Development, and Richard McGiffin and Clayton McWilliams, program consultants with the government to assure the building was being operated in the manner for which the aid was granted. E. D. Kirchhoff, Community Action director and Amos Jones assistant director, were also present at the meeting.

Oviedo Demands Action On Dump

Town of Oviedo is demanding immediate action by the Board of County Commissioners to obtain a sanitary landfill area to replace the Oviedo dump which is scheduled to be closed Sept. 20. District Commissioner Robert Parker told the County Commission yesterday. Parker reported he had received a number of calls from Oviedo officials complaining on the scheduled closing and because the town was not notified in advance of action. "Why can't the city re-open the dump when the county moves out?" Parker stated. "I plan to suggest this action to the town."

Predict 6,000 Enrollment At SJC In Near Future

An up-dating and projection of Seminole Junior College in terms of its educational and economic value to this area was given the Lions Club by Vernon Mize, member of the College Advisory Committee, at its weekly meeting yesterday in the Civic Center. Ward Named To Post At Oviedo Citizens Bank

The board of directors of Citizens Bank of Oviedo has elected B. F. Ward Jr. a director of the bank to fill the unexpired term of his father, B. F. Ward Sr., who has resigned. Ward is a native of Oviedo and graduated from Oviedo High School and the University of Florida. He is a former director of the Greater Oviedo Jaycees and has served as a member of the Oviedo Town Council, being its president for two years. He is chairman of the board of deacons of the First Baptist Church of Oviedo and active in the annual payroll in excess of \$100,000. Most of the people live in the county and spend their money here, he emphasized. Over Police Casselberry Stalemate

Action was at a standstill today in the mass resignation "by request" of the Casselberry Police Department members after City Attorney Kenneth McIntosh reported "there is nothing in the charter providing for hearings in case of tendered resignations."

Resigned Police Chief Kenneth Triplet has requested of the Casselberry City Council a hearing to bring into the open alleged charges by Mayor Arthur Wheatley which brought about the resignations of Triplet and four other police officers. Triplet has claimed he offered his resignation one day before Wheatley demanded that all the officers quit their posts or "face a public hearing."

Judge Orders County Maintain Sand Lake Rd.

Seminole County was ordered today to maintain Sand Lake Road in its present location, at least temporarily, until the Circuit Judge William G. Abiding, following a two-hour hearing, in which six witnesses were called, granted a permanent writ of mandamus to south side residents of the road. Effect of the granting of the writ is that the county must maintain the road until judgment is given in the suit over the road's proper location. Appeal on the location is expected to come to trial within the next 60 days.

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
