3-Day-Old Kidnaped Boy Found OK; With Parents

DENVER, Colo. (AP)—A 41-hour search by police and FBI agents for a kidnaped baby ended happily Sunday with the safe return of the 3-day-old child to his parents.

The husky son of Mr. and Mrs. William Bacon of Denver was abducted early Saturday morning from a fourth-floor nursery at Colorado General Hospital.

Police are holding Susan Douglas, 28, of Denver, for investigation of kidnaping. Detective Jack Groginsky said the woman, after being advised of her rights, admitted taking the child.

Bacon, 28, and his wife, Rebecca, were overjoyed with the return of their son. Hospital physicians said the 3-day-old infant was in good condition, but had "a touch of a cold."

Detective Dick Renick attributed the discovery of the child to "good old legwork." Investigators pored through nearly 700 trip tickets from taxi companies before they found one that indicated a trip was made from the hospital area about the time the baby was missed.

Scott Werner, agent in charge of the Denver office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, said Mrs. Douglas apparently lost a baby by a miscarriage recently.

A Shameful Figure

Seminole County now ranks among the top 25. Usually that's a position of considerable distinction — and envy. But, in this case, it is the exact opposite because it means that Seminole has the 25th worst highway fatality rate in Florida.

According to the latest figures on road deaths in all counties in the state, Seminole's comparison on the "most bloody list" includes such population centers as Dade, Hillsborough, Duval and Orange.

This report issued by the Florida Highway Patrol shows that Seminole has had 20 die in highway mishaps through October.

One of the frightening things about this already high toll is that there is a good chance it could go higher. Sheriff J. L. Hobby warns that we now are entering the worst driving months of the year — November and December. Therefore, the stage is set for an even bigger increase in road fatalities — unless every driver and pedestrian makes an extra effort to follow rules of safety.

The driver classification includes operators of bicycles, scooters and motorcycles as well as automobiles. Pedestrians also violate just as many laws as vehicle operators.

The only way we can freeze our already unreasonable highway death toll is for everyone to work at it. Please do — for your sake.

Not very long ago, people didn't worry much about retirement until they were 60 or over. Now, a 21-year-old college graduate is begged by a firm to honor it with his presence from 9 to 5:30 o'clock, he asks, "What is your pension program?"

Home Building Boom Seen In '67 Despite Tight Money

MIAMI BEACH (AP) — The president of the National Association of Real Estate Boards predicts that 1.1 million new housing units will be constructed in 1967 despite a tight mortgage market.

Jack Justice of Miami Beach, president of the 22,000-member national organization, said at a news conference Sunday that there also will be an easing in residential mortgage loans by mid-1967. The easing of mortgage credit will have to be resolved by the 86th Congress, he said.

"If they pass new legislation which will curtail some of the wide spending programs and at the same time increase taxes then we can expect an easing in the mortgage money supply," Justice said.

The association opens its annual convention today with a record 4,000 realtors from 50 states and several foreign countries attending.

The mortgage market will come into sharper focus today when a panel of housing experts discusses, "The mortgage market outlook for 1967."

Panelists include Philip N. Brownstein, Federal Housing Administration commissioner and assistant secretary for mortgage credit of the Department of Housing and Urban Development; Stanley Baughman, president of the Federal National Mortgage Assn.; John M. DeVan, director of the Veterans Administration loan guaranty service; and Benjamin V. Lam, executive vice president of Hurd and Co., New York.

Sen. Everett Dirksen, R-Ill., is scheduled to speak at the first annual convention of the National Association of Real Estate Boards, based his statement on information presented at various sessions. About 9,000 are registered, largest total for any NAREB meeting.

Buyers who are able to make an adequate down payment will find financing available, he added, and added that those buyers able to pay cash are in an even more enviable position.

Many homes are offered for sale each year as a result of owner transfers and other necessities regardless of status of mortgage market, he explained.

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — This capital city continued intense preparations today for an historical one-day special session of the Florida Legislature and a visit from the state's Republican governor-elect.

The legislative halls and committee meeting rooms cleaned and readied, parking signs for lawmakers posted around the Capitol building, and state employees finishing last-minute details.

One of the most important last-minute details must come from the supervisor of election division in the secretary of state's office.

The legislature cannot legally meet until returns from last Tuesday's general election are in and officially certified.

Reports from three counties—Palm Beach, Broward and Suwannee — were missing early today, but are expected in a later mail delivery.

When they are received, the returns will be checked, tabulated and added to a master election sheet. This sheet will be handed to the three-member State Canvassing Board.

Once the board signs the sheet the Legislature can legally convene.

Members of the canvassing board are the secretary of state, comptroller and state treasurer.

The board will set a meeting time today once the returns from the three counties come in.

"We've been here all weekend getting them (returns) ready," said Mrs. Dan Gibson, head of the elections division.

The Legislature convenes tomorrow and it will be a historic session. It is the first such session after passage last Tuesday of a constitutional amendment, providing for a one-day organizational session of the Legislature on the first Tuesday after every general election.

This will permit freshman legislators to get acquainted and be assigned to committees, which do the primary work in studying and preparing legislative proposals.

Also, this will mark the largest Republican lineup in the legislative chambers since Reconstruction days. Thirty-seven GOP voters, elected to the Legislature in a surge of strength last Tuesday will answer the roll calls.

They will be joined by Republican Governor-elect Claude Kirk, the first GOP governor in Florida since the 1870s. Kirk planned to arrive in Tallahassee this afternoon and will hold a reception for GOP lawmakers tonight.

He also will address the Legislature.

The Legislature has many freshman lawmakers. In the House, 46 members have had previous legislative experience. Total members of the House, to be headed by Speaker Ralph Turlington of Gainesville, is 117.

The Senate, however, has 36 experienced legislators out of its membership of 46. Some of the new arrivals in the upper chamber came from the House.

Astronauts Photo French Rocket; Results Doubtful

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) — The Gemini 12 pilots tried today to photograph a wind-whipped yellow vapor stream spewed into the sky by a French rocket, but success of the experiment was in doubt.

"We didn't see the rocket," command pilot James A. Lovell Jr. radioed to the ground.

As Lovell and champion space walker Edwin E. Aldrin Jr. flashed overhead at 17,500 miles an hour, a 16-foot tall French Centaure rocket blasted off at 6:28 a.m. from Hammagrain, Algeria, trailing a yellow tail as a photographic target for Lovell and Aldrin.

The astronauts said they couldn't see anything, and the ground told them to take pictures of the spot where the rocket was supposed to be. They did.

Aldrin, meanwhile, prepared to pad his own record with the last adventure planned by a U.S. astronaut until 1968.

Aldrin, whose success Sunday proved space walking can be made easy and gave America new confidence to go to the moon, plans to poke the upper half of his body out a hatch of the capsule for 40 minutes beginning at 8:47 a.m.

Chaffin and crew, former Air Force combat pilot Aldrin nearly doubled the record time spent outside a spaceship by one man.

City Tables Center Policy

Decision on whether or not to allow use of alcoholic beverages at Civic Center was postponed by City Commissioners, Monday, on motion by Commissioner W. Vincent Roberts, seconded by Commissioner Earl Higginbotham.

Roberts said he had "talked to a lot of people and investigated the situation at length, but do not feel I am presently in a position to make a decision at this time."

He asked that the question be tabled. Discussion ensued between Roberts and Commissioner Joe Baker on whether in view of the motion, a requested report from City Manager W. E. Knowles could be heard.

Roberts first said the motion to table precluded any further discussion, but later changed his mind and permitted the report to be heard, after insistence from Commissioners Joe Baker and M. L. Raborn Jr.

Knowles said he had not completed the report and Baker charged that Knowles had been influenced by certain members of the board and "I don't like it." He demanded to hear the report.

Knowles denied this and said he had not finished the report because he had "been working on bid tabulations and had not had time to check with other cities on their experiences with permitting alcoholic beverages to be served."

Following the meeting Commissioner Baker told the press, "I would like to clearly an erroneous impression that many people seem to have, wherein they think we are going to turn the Civic Center into a bar."

"This is far from true. We are only considering permitting use of alcohol at the Civic Center perhaps in a half-hour period at certain high-level social functions which were formerly held at the Mayfair Inn."

"At the present time, we have no large hotel or any other comparable place which can accommodate a large number of persons for a formal ball or dance, other than the Civic Center," Baker pointed out.

In his report Knowles pointed out that higher insurance premiums would be necessary when use of alcoholic beverages is permitted.

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On Courthouse Jaycees Hold Off 'Drastic' Legal Action

Drastic legal action for the move to relocate the new county courthouse predicted by Tom Pratt, president of the South Seminole Jaycees, in Monday's Herald was deflected by the Jaycees' board of directors, meeting Monday night.

Realtor Cliff Jordan, chairman of the project, stated to The Herald that the board declined legal action in hopes another appeal to the County Commission for a public hearing will bring results. "We will continue the drive to secure as many names of registered voters on the petition as possible," he added.

Speaking for the board, he said, "We do plan to take action but have delayed until we can get complete plans in hopes of a successful meeting with the County Commissioners to determine the most practical location for the courthouse to best serve the citizens of all Seminole County. No attorney has been retained by the Jaycees but they have sought some legal counsel."

A ruling was made that any further statements on the project will come from the project chairman. A committee meeting will be held Thursday night to discuss further action.

Jordan said that he "will endeavor to collect as many necessary facts and figures as possible and will continue to appear before area organizations to discuss the courthouse move."

He voiced his hopes that the issue "will give the people of South Seminole a sense of belonging to the county and create a new interest in county government as well as unify them in a common cause."

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
