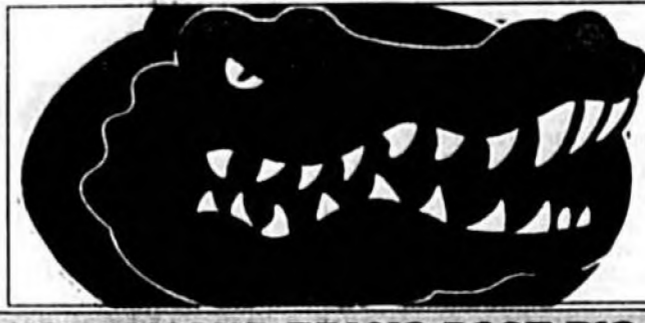

Prowling for stolen cars County C.A.T. program OK'd

SEMINOLE COUNTY - The Big C.A.T. has been approved. The Board of Seminole County Commissioners passed an ordinance on Tuesday to authorize a Combat Automobile Theft decal program that has proven successful in other jurisdictions.

Chief Deputy Sheriff Steve Harriett and Investigator Dwayne Johnson of the Auto Theft Unit made a presentation to the board on Tuesday and it was accepted by a 4-1 vote.

Commissioner Grant Maloy voted against the program because he was hesitant to endorse a program that he said put people in the precarious position of being judged guilty

unless they can prove themselves innocent.

The C.A.T. program is optional and free of charge to interested car owners who rarely, if ever, drive their cars between the hours of 1 a.m. and 5 a.m. Should anyone steal one of these cars with a highly visible C.A.T. decal, they will not get too far.

Law enforcement agencies in all the cities in the county and neighboring counties are part of the C.A.T. program. The decal authorizes these officers to stop a car bearing the decal when the car is operated between 1 a.m. and 5 a.m. - the hours when the majority of car thefts occur.

"It isn't for everyone," Johnson said. "People who work

late or are out early in the morning might find themselves inconvenienced. If stopped, they would need to prove the vehicle was theirs before continuing their way."

Harriett told the commissioners that 422 people had applied for the program and that he expected more with the approval by the board. It is a voluntary program - designed for those who rarely drive their cars after midnight.

Each decal is 2 1/2 by 5 inches. It is yellow with a big black cat. They are to be placed on the back window. The AAA of Florida purchased 10,000 of these decals.

A second set of reflective decals for the front window is expected. Please see CAT, Page 3A

Planning runs in his family

Lake Mary's new city planner grew up at P & Z meetings

LAKE MARY - Picture an 8 or 9-year-old kid coming home from school.

Most kids do their homework or go out and play, and at night, maybe watch some television.

Not Juan Omana. "In my case it was a little bit different. I would come home and do my homework, but I wouldn't get to watch TV at night, because my dad would drag me to public hearings."

Omana, the new city planner for the city of Lake Mary, and the son of a planner and ar-

chitect, grew up in city commission meetings and planning and zoning hearings. "I was exposed to city planning and zoning...at a very early age."

"I distinctly recall," said Omana, "as a little kid, people discussing and arguing over heights of trees and fences and barriers and the land and so forth, and I've had an interest in it ever since."

It runs in the family, said Omana, whose brother is also in the business. Omana came to Lake Mary, just over a month ago, from Palm Beach County, where he was a senior planner in the planning division. He grew up in West Palm Beach, but was born in Colombia, South America. (His name is Juan, but ask for John if you call city hall. "Everybody calls me John, it's easier!")

His first job in the public sector was for the city of Green Acres, population of 15,000 in 14-square miles. He also worked for the city

Board dumps school site near toxic storage

SANFORD - The Seminole County School Board dumped plans Tuesday for building two new Oviedo schools next to a wastewater treatment plant and upheld the ban on pagers and cell phones in the classroom.

A new middle school will be built on property the school district owns across the street from Carrillon Elementary in Oviedo, instead of adjacent to the Iron Bridge Water Recla-

mation Facility. The property had been purchased in anticipation of the need for another high school.

The Iron Bridge site was suggested by the district's facilities planning team because it was large enough to build a much needed middle school, and an elementary school, on the same site, saving some construction costs.

Another site will have to be found, in the Oviedo area, for the elementary school. The district will eventually need

Meet the top 9 candidates for Sanford city manager

SANFORD - The selection of a new city manager is now in the hands of the city commission. The City Manager Selection Advisory Committee officially turned over its findings during Monday afternoon's commission work session.

"It was the easiest committee I've ever chaired," said George Wallace, who headed the 11-member committee. Wallace said each member went over the 135 entries which had been submitted, judged their individual merits, then submitted a list of what they considered their top 10 candidates. "Some submitted less than 10," he said.

Wallace said with that many on the committee, he expected to receive very diverse lists and expected to have several more meetings before the number could be narrowed down. "I was pleasantly surprised how smooth it went," he said. They seemed to be in agreement

quite often and we had no trouble compiling this final list."

Wallace submitted a list with a total of nine names for consideration. Explaining that they were not ranked in order of preference, but in the order they were received by the members of the committee.

The top nine on the list are as follows:

* PAUL A. STEINBRENNER, of Columbus, Ga. He listed 20 years experience in city and county administration in such areas as Wichita, Kansas; West Palm Beach; Jackson County, Oregon; Newport, Rhode Island and Des Moines, Iowa.

* RON H. RABUN - Former Seminole County Manager, lists his home in Lake Mary. His resume lists over 18 years in government administration/management. In addition to Seminole County he lists previous employment in Clearwater, Lecburg, Manatee County, Henry County, Georgia. See Candidates, Page 2A

City may demolish unrepaired structures

SANFORD - Owners of at least two dozen structures within the city of Sanford were put on public notice Monday. Either repair their structures as soon as possible or face demolition. Some of the homes were cited because of major code violations including excessive debris on the property, faulty electrical wiring, having no utility connections and other difficulties which make the homes unlivable in the eyes of city inspectors.

Several others were also suggested as abandoned and being used as centers for drug activities or derelicts. The matter was discussed extensively during the Sanford City Commission meeting.

The public hearing was the first step required by the city, toward demolition. Owners who proceed to make reasonable progress toward correction of deficiencies can generally expect to be allowed time to make corrections, upon written request.

Community Development Director Charles Rowe led the discussion, informing the commissioners that three of the proposed demolitions should be taken off the list prior to consideration, with indication that the structures were in the process of being brought up to adherence with the city codes.

When public input was requested on each of the proposed demolitions, seven members of the audience stepped forward to submit

their appeals.

One, at 701 Pine Avenue, has been a Masonic Lodge. Ted Davis, a member of the lodge stepped forward to discuss the matter, informing the commissioners that the lodge does not have the money with which to bring the structure up to codes. Davis asked if there would be any funding available which might be used, but Rowe informed him that the deadline for applications for such funding for this year had expired. "You could apply for state help for next year," he said, "but even if it was approved, you wouldn't be getting the funds until October of 1999, which would be too late."

The lodge secretary also spoke on the matter to the commission, explaining that the structure has historic sig-

nificance in the city, but the membership had dwindled and suitable funds for repair would not be available.

Following their appeals, the commissioners voted to table the matter, with Rowe to look into possible funding with which to assist in a restoration project.

Owners of other structures, all residential, also appealed claiming efforts were under way toward restoration and asked that they be taken off the demolition list.

It was explained that placing a structure on the demolition list was only the first step undertaken by the city. It would require 30 to 60 days before final demolition would be called for, and most of the time, those structures which were indeed

under repair could be granted an extension or be taken off the list.

Five residences were granted a stay. A title search, required prior to any demolition, would be placed on hold for 30 days, pending promised improvements. These were for structures at 546 Plumosa Avenue, 1713 and 1711 W. 14th Street, 701 Pine Avenue, 218 W. 12th Street and 720 E. Ninth Street.

Persons speaking on behalf of some of the residences indicated that sales were in progress, which would lead to im-

mediate improvements after the paperwork could be finalized.

In cases where demolition is called for, it is the responsibility of the owner to arrange for contracting for the work. If this is not accomplished, the city undertakes the demolition, then places a lien against the structure in the amount of the demolition cost.

A representative of Jim Walter Homes spoke regarding a residence at 1001 Pine Avenue, telling the commission that the owner was presently working for the Department of Defense in California. "He would prefer that the city demolish the building right away and he will reimburse you for the cost. The owner was born in Sanford and considers this his home, so as soon as he retires, he plans to move back," Jim Walter Homes plans to build a new home on the property after the demolition is completed.

The selection committee only found it necessary to hold three meetings before the final listing was determined. Following a selection and an agreement with the potential candidate, the person listed as City Manager will eventually replace Bill Simmons, who has announced he will be leaving his Sanford post after 12 years, probably after the commission has fine tuned the beginning of the fiscal year 1998/99 city budget.

where he serves as City Administrator. With 20 years listed experience, he has also held leadership posts in Clearwater, Hot Springs, Arkansas; Indian River County, Florida; Marianna, Hartselle, Alabama; and Port St. Joe, Florida.

*** ANTHONY "TONY" VANDERWOP** - The Seminole County Public Works Director for the past 13 months. Of his 18 years experience, all but one was with Seminole County (The one was on the Mayor's Staff in Detroit, Mich.). In Seminole County he has held posts including Planning and Development Director, and Principal Senior Planner.

*** MICHAEL J. WILKES** has been City Administrator in Alpharetta, Georgia for over five years. His previous government services has been in various county positions in Gwinnett County, Georgia. He lists a total of 16 years in government positions.

During commission discussion, it was noted that both the present city administrator of West Palm Beach, Michael Wright, and his present as-

stant city administrator, Edward Mitchell, had both applied for the Sanford position.

Also, their applications indicate both Rabun and Wright had served as City Manager in Clearwater, in Pinellas County. Rabun lists holding the position from 1988 until 1991, while Wright lists himself as Clearwater City Manager from 1989 until 1993.

In accepting the list of potential candidates from Wallace, Mayor Larry Dale reminded the commissioners there was no legal requirement that they must stick to this list. "But I'd like each of you to study the candidates," he said. "We should act as quickly as we can." Dale said it would be best if the members of the commission could narrow down their selections to the top four or five within the next two weeks before the next commission meeting.

After the commissioners make their top selections, it is expected some of the candidates may be brought to Sanford for personal interviews, although it is also not legally required.

Gator fans may see more of their favorites at lake front

Always an attraction along Sanford's lakefront, gator fans may be seeing more of their favorites this year. Not football team boosters, but people who enjoy watching real alligators in our waterways.

The Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission (GFC) says it's time for the gators to emerge from their winter residences to the warm climate.

"We'll be seeing more alliga-

tors now and for the next few months than we have since last fall," said Lt. Joy M. Hill, public information coordinator for the Ocala office of the GFC.

Although alligators don't actually hibernate, they do go into a dormant period during the cold winter months. When they emerge from this period of relative inactivity, they are hungry and go about in search of food and feeding territories.

"That's when we begin to receive calls from folks who have unwanted visitors in and around their homes and prop-

erty," said Hill. "During all this moving about, alligators will often end up in undesirable locations such as garages, backyards, driveways, even swimming pools."

"So what should you do if an alligator comes through your property," she posed.

"If there's no immediate danger, the best thing to do is leave it alone and more than likely it will leave the area on its own in search of a more suitable location. However, if humans, pets or livestock are being threatened by the alligator's presence, you should call the GFC and file a nuisance alligator complaint," she said.

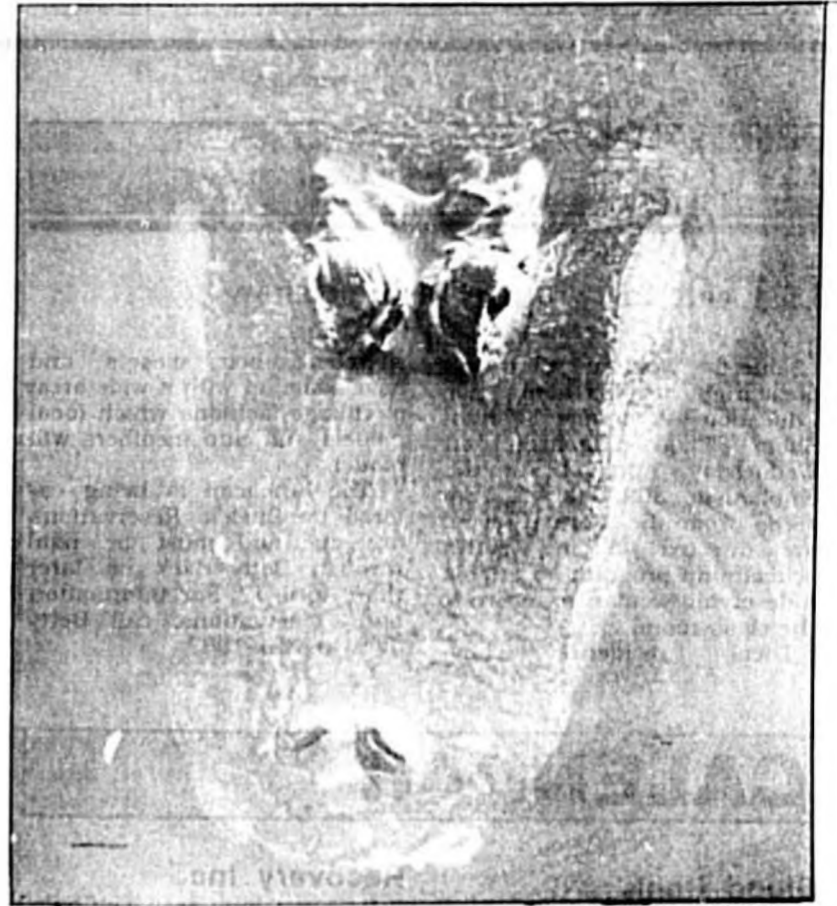
For the next several months, the GFC's Ocala office expects to receive 40 to 50 nuisance complaints a day. They will range from valid reports of an aggressive alligator threatening the safety of children at play, to unnecessary reports of an alligator swimming around in a lake.

One of the dangers occurs when an alligator loses its fear of human beings. "Most alligators will quickly retreat at the approach of a human," said Hill. "If they don't, they've likely lost their natural fear and could become a problem."

Hill said emergency complaints, those where an alligator is an immediate threat to public safety, will be given priority. "But all valid complaints, emergency in nature or not, will be evaluated and if necessary a nuisance trapper will be sent to harvest the gator."

She suggests several methods of preventing problems with alligators:

- * Don't feed or entice them. (It's dangerous and against state law)
- * Don't let pets swim or run along the shoreline of waters known to contain large alligators.
- * Don't swim or allow pets swim in areas of emergent vegetation - plants growing up out of the water. Swim in designated swim areas only.
- * Don't swim, walk dogs or small children along shorelines at night or dusk, at waters known to contain large alligators.
- * Don't remove alligators from their natural habitat or try to keep one as a pet (That's against the law as well).

another high school, but probably not for another six years. Vice Chairman Larry Furlong, who suggested the Lockwood Boulevard site, felt the middle school building could be adapted for the high school when the need became imperative.

School board member Bob Goff had raised concerns over safety and traffic issues related to the Iron Bridge site, but after touring the treatment facility, two other school board members felt comfortable with precautions being taken to protect students from exposure to chlorine leaks and other gaseous emissions. Chairman Barbara Kuhn said the property was attractive because it was available at a good price.

The new middle school will relieve crowding at Jackson Heights Middle School and should be ready for the 1999-2000 school year.

In other business, the board

voted against allowing pagers and cell phones in high school classrooms.

The devices are restricted from use on campuses, labeled as contraband, viewed as tools of the drug trade. Teachers and administrators say the pagers are disruptive but parents, who want to be able to contact their children, argued that setting the pagers on vibrate would alleviate that problem.

On first offense of possession of a pager, the device is confiscated and a parent must come to the school to retrieve it. The parent is advised that the student will be suspended from school if the pagers and cell phones came up in discussion over the revision of several items contained in the student conduct and discipline code. Changes to the code will be advertised by the school board, soliciting public comment, before making a final decision.

pected to be purchased with law enforcement trust funds (Florida Motor Vehicle Theft Prevention Authority). This purchase requires approval by the Board of Commissioners.

Johnson said that Seminole County had 1,302 car thefts in 1996 - an average of 110 a month.

Anyone who is stopped by a law enforcement officer must provide a driver's license, registration card and insurance card before being allowed to go on his or her way.

The owner of a motor vehicle enrolled in the program shall affix the C.A.T. Program Stop Instruction Card to the visor of the drivers side of the enrolled motor vehicle with the results that the instruction card is plainly visible to the driver.

The occurrence of motor vehicle theft has resulted in hundreds of thousands of dollars in property loss to Seminole County citizens, business own-

ers and guests, and has required the expenditure of hundreds of hours of investigative effort by law enforcement agencies at the expense of Seminole County.

Johnson said that car owners still have to be cautious and take their own steps to avoid being a car theft victim. "It's surprising how many people leave the keys in the car. They run into a convenience store and leave the motor running," he said. "The guy who is in the telephone booth jumps in and he has a free ride."

The C.A.T. program is expected to be in force in early May. Plans are to distribute decals at the upcoming Taste of Oviedo and Altamonte Springs public safety show at Crane's Roost.

Commissioner Win Adams said he believes the C.A.T. program is a good one for citizens. "It's free to auto owners and it cuts down on thefts," he said.

of West Palm Beach.

"After seeing the three types of communities, or jurisdictions...smaller, mid-sized and large...I found the most satisfying work at Green Acres, and when I saw the opportunity, here, to work with Lake Mary and essentially try to do the same thing," Omana said he made the decision to move to Central Florida.

What Omana liked most about working with a smaller community such as Green Acres, or Lake Mary, which has a population of 8,000 in 9-square miles, is the opportunity to wear many hats. "Given the size (of the community and) the department, we were involved in everything. You got to take the permit in, and take it through the hearing process, review it at building permit stage, and then go out and count the trees and get the sign off on the (certificate of occupancy). We took the project all the way through and at that stage we got to wear many hats."

Omana approaches his job as a team effort with the senior planners on the city's staff. Susan Deines has been with the city for several years and John Baker joined the staff late last year. "The main role of the

city planner is to provide direction and guidance to the senior planners, technically, and also be a liaison for the city with respect to transportation issues, growth management issues, and land development issues." He has already been appointed to the Sanford Airport Noise Abatement Committee. "It's a two-fold function, to oversee the planning and zoning division, provide guidance to the seniors and keep an eye on and protect the interest of the city."

Omana has 10 years experience in the business, working two years in the private sector as a staff planner for a consulting firm. He has a bachelor's degree in business and master's degree in urban and regional planning, with a little bit of engineering school thrown in for good measure.

It's a big change for Omana, moving inland, but he expects to spend a lot of time kayaking on many of Central Florida's lakes and rivers. "I'm an avid kayaker...given the nature of the area and the layout, I think I'm going to be very busy on the weekends." He also draws ("pencil portraits"), plays the banjo, and golf. He won't miss the beach all that much, he said, "as long as I get my lakes and rivers...I'll be a happy camper."

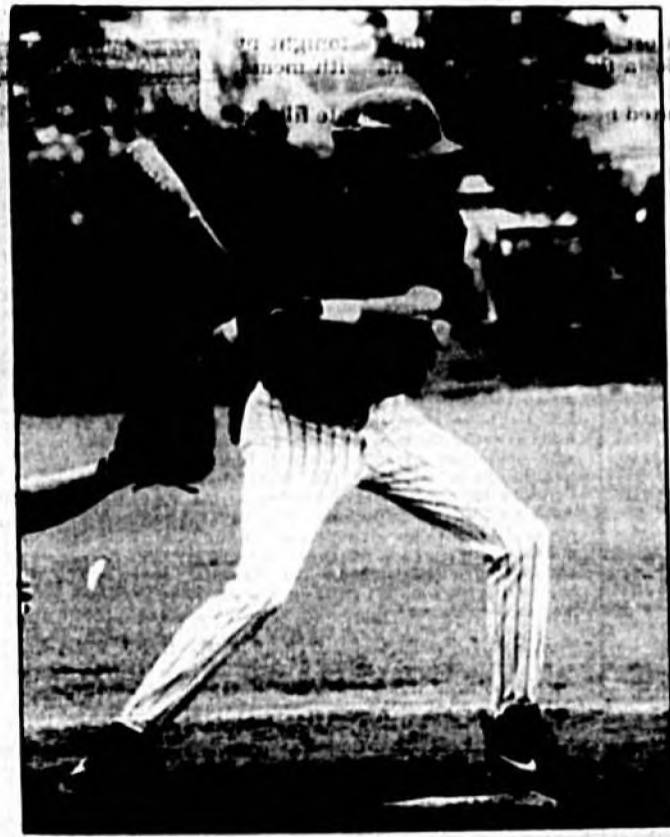
The Class 5A-District 5 Tournament will be held in Sanford from April 29th through May 1st with games starting at 4:30 p.m. and 7 p.m.

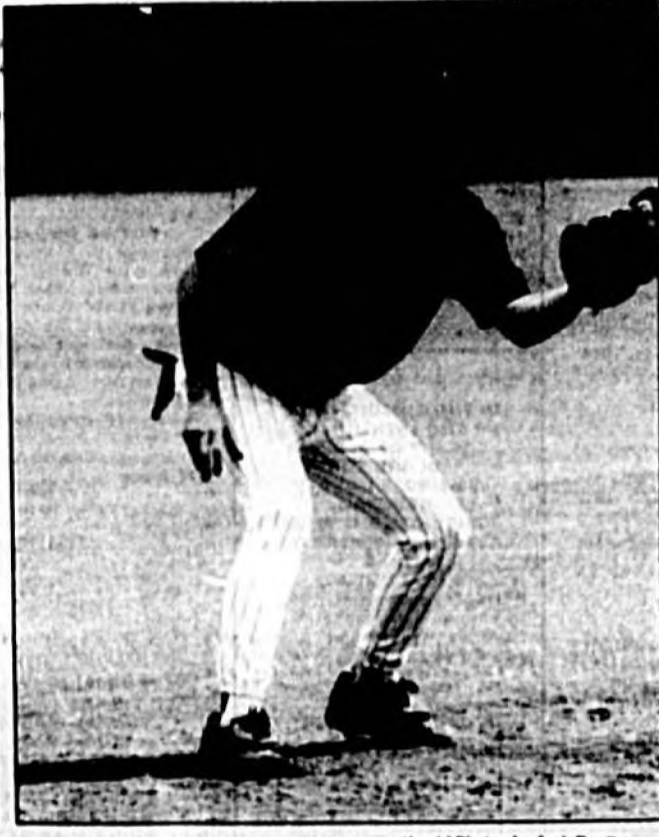

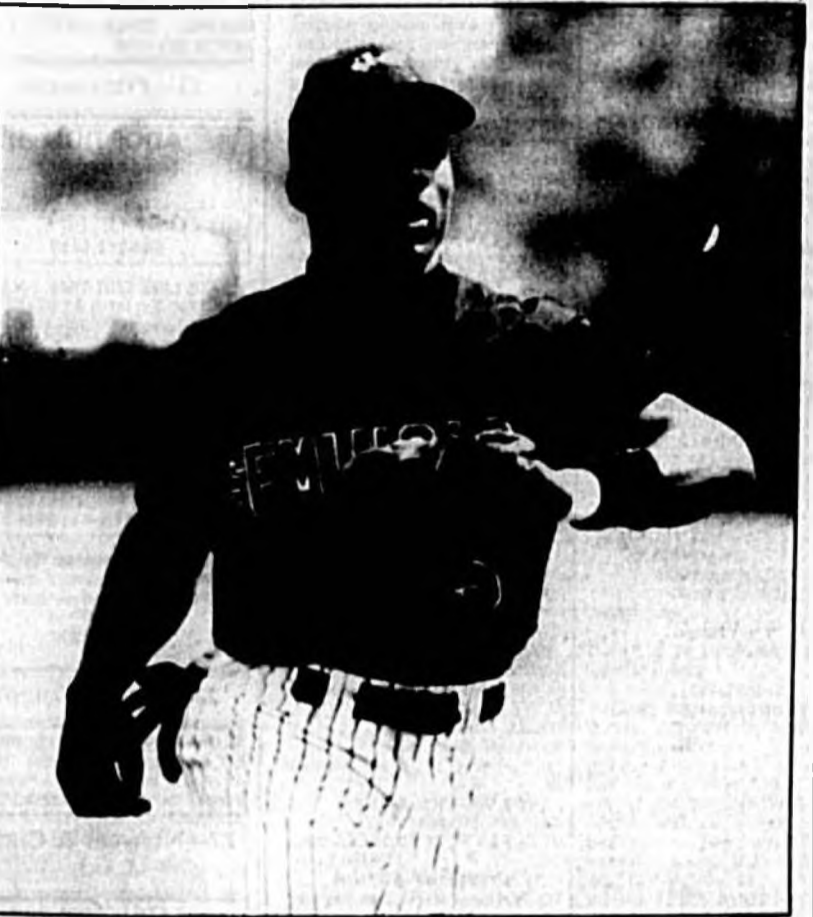

Lions building toward next year

OVIDO - A record of 4-6 somehow doesn't look right when it's posted next to the Ovido boys lacrosse team. The team is full of talent, yet is out of the Central Florida playoff race.

Two of its top players, Taylor Pope and David Walsh, said the team just didn't mesh, despite all of the talent.

Ovido has Senior Night Friday against Lake Howell before one final game against Colonial to close out the season. Only four of the teams in Central Florida head for the playoffs and Lake Brantley, Lake Mary and Lyman have already claimed three of the spots for Seminole County.

It wasn't without a solid effort from Pope and Walsh. Each attackmen, Pope has 29 goals already, and Walsh has added 20 goals and 10 assists. The Lions are a team that graduated the top five scorers last season, but Walsh and Pope have combined for 49 of the team's 73 goals this season, and 67 percent of the scoring. Next on the Ovido list is freshman Dennis Panos who has six goals.

Pope's seasons has earned him a lacrosse scholarship with Ohio Wesleyan, one of the top lacrosse schools in the country at the Division II level. It's tough for anyone to come out of Central Florida with a lacrosse scholarship - the major schools tend to look for talent in the Baltimore and Long Island areas, but the game has grown so rapidly that, when Ohio Wesleyan saw a letter from Ovido coach Ed Norton, the school didn't mind coming down to Ovido to take a look. Ovido gained a solid lacrosse reputation last year when the Lions went to the finals before losing to Lyman, the state runner-up. Lyman

won 11-10 in overtime. Pope said the team took it as seriously as the basketball or football team would have if they had been in a similar situation.

"I take it seriously. We had so many chances to score during that game," Pope said. "It was crazy that game, but I would have rather have had it end like that than to go out and get killed."

Like most of Seminole County's lacrosse players, Pope and Walsh are pretty much new to the game. Norton has an inexperienced bunch compared to last year's team, but Pope and Walsh have picked the game up pretty quickly. Despite learning the game, however, Ovido hasn't come together this season and the record speaks for itself.

"We have a lot of really good players," Pope said. "We just haven't come together on the field."

Despite the record, Ovido has won some pretty big games, including big wins over Central Florida rivals Flagler and Lake Howell.

"We just haven't always played together as a team," Walsh said.

This season, Ovido sports just one player, defenseman John Roth, who has an extensive history of the game. The Lions lost last season's goalie Mason Chickonaki who was replaced by Mike Sheets, an inexperienced sophomore who has performed admirably.

"He's had a better year than anyone could have ever imagined," Norton said.

At least next season, Norton won't have to worry about inexperience. Almost everyone is back including Walsh and the Lions look loaded. The boys and girls teams are becoming much more experienced and are even hosting a lacrosse clinic at Lawton Elementary School today so that the tradi-

tion can continue. It's been a tough year for Ovido lacrosse, but it's been something to build on.

New treatments for multiple sclerosis

DEAR DR. GOTT: My 35-year-old sister has multiple sclerosis. What are the newer treatments for this condition?

DEAR READER: MS is a serious neurological disorder, marked by a wide variety of symptoms that may come and go in an unpredictable pattern.

The most common symptom is fatigue, followed by tremors, weakness and muscle spasticity.

The cause is unknown but is suspected to be related to an overactive immune reaction, aggravated by a genetic susceptibility. This combination leads to nerve damage, the hallmark of MS.

However, the situation is further complicated by enormous variation in how the disease progresses. Some patients may have a mild form that is diagnosed by autopsy only many years later, when they die of unrelated causes. In other patients, the disorder can be relentlessly progressive and unresponsive to therapy. Most cases lie between these extremes and can be characterized by normal periods interspersed with relapsing symptoms that may or may not progress.

The diagnosis is made by MRI scanning.

Treatment is complicated. For many patients, cortisone will reduce the symptoms of acute attacks. However, most experts now rely on medication that reduces the strength of the immune response by actually altering it. Such drugs include analogues of interferon (Betaferon and Avonex), as well as an additional medication, Copaxone, which reduces nerve damage. These medicines are a major advance in the treatment of MS. Ask your sister's doctor about them.

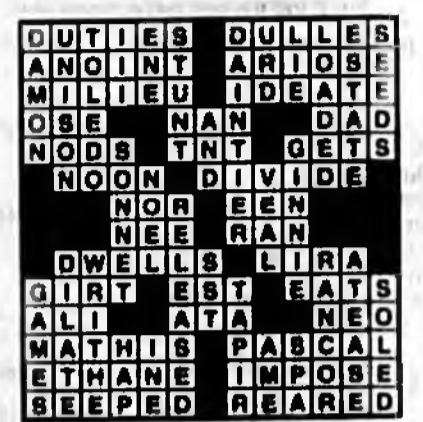

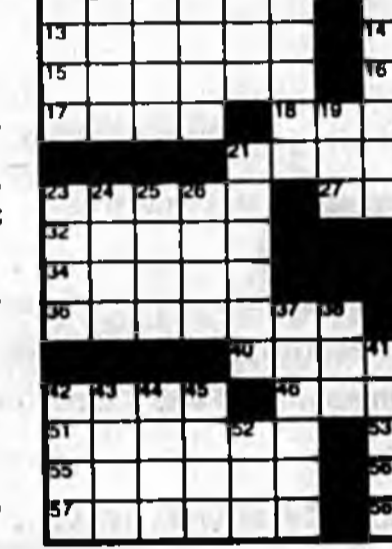

WIN AT BRIDGE

The late-night line

By Phillip Alder

Who pointed out that "when there is an income tax, the just man will pay more and the unjust less on the same amount of income"?

Tonight, many post offices will stay open late to accommodate those who send in their tax returns at the last moment. (And if you owe money, why mail early?)

In bridge, cashing a long suit can be taxing for the opponents. They must make several discards, and perhaps one of them will gift you an "unmakeable" contract.

Today's deal comes from Patrick Jourdain's *Bols Bridge Tips* article, in which he recommended playing off one's long suit early. First, though, what do you think of South's opening bid?

If you are still playing that a two-no-

trump opening shows 23-24 points, please change. Take a rebate to 21-22. Although that South hand contains only 20 high-card points, it is worth more because of the excellent five-card suit plus those aces and kings. The only bad feature is the heart suit: two-honors-doubleton should be devalued slightly. So, two-no-trump is a reasonable bid.

West leads the spade four; two, king, ace. There is a temptation to enter dummy with a club and call for the heart jack, hoping East has the ace and will duck, but here that doesn't work. Much better is to run the diamond suit. West must make three discards. Two hearts are easy, but what then? If West throws a club, South collects an overtrick. But when West pitches a spade, declarer can safely establish a heart trick.

Interestingly, the initial comment was made by Plato, who died about 348 B.C. at the age of 80.
