





**Police arrest  
23 students  
for drugs**

An administrative judge has issued a 90-day stay that suspends a variance the city of Sanford granted Seminole Volunteer Enterprises (SVE).

The stay in effect shuts down the soup kitchen operated by SVE while the city and representatives from SVE participate in mediation sessions with residents from the Sanford Historic District.

Seven residents have filed a lawsuit claiming the city violated its own poli-

cies when it granted a parking waiver for SVE to operate the soup kitchen. Under the city's guidelines, the soup kitchen needed a minimum of 40 parking spaces to operate at facility seating 100 people. However, SVE has only 6 parking spots available, and those are located a public

right-of-way, which violates another portion of the city code.

Sanford City Manager Tony VanDerworp said he sent a copy of the judge's order to Mette Monday, but has not discussed the matter with her.

"I had set up a meeting with her for

tomorrow (Tuesday), but she called me back and said based on the advice from her attorney she had to cancel the meeting," VanDerworp said.

Monday night, SVE was still operating the soup kitchen. Mette was not available for comment.

Sanford Mayor Larry Dale said the city is willing to participate in the mediation process, but was not sure how successful mediation would be.

"I guess it's up to Jean," Dale said. "We're willing to sit down and work with the residents."

## Trash Talk: 196 tons removed from river

**SANFORD** — The St. Johns River is cleaner today. Just under 6,000 people took to the river as part of a giant cleanup sponsored by the St. Johns River Water Management District, (SJRWMD) and Keep Florida Beautiful organization. In all, 15 counties in Florida and Georgia took part in the event.

According to Jeff Cole with the SJRWMD, a total of 392,329 pounds of trash were pulled from the water. The volunteers combed the shorelines of the rivers lakes and streams of the St. Johns River system, and the shoreline of the St. Marys River (Florida-Georgia State line), netting an array of garbage.

**Voluta**  
County, which has a lengthy portion of the St. Johns had 305 volunteers picking up 33,000 pounds of trash.

Among the most unusual items found this year were boats, furniture, wheelbarrows, aluminum siding, a farm gate, beepers, phone booths, box springs and mattress, refrigerators, street signs, toilets, shopping carts, microwave oven,

## Performers say the show must go on

### Some doubt whether they've been scammed

**ORLANDO** — Robin Olive quit her job waiting tables at Planet Hollywood to participate in the failed Juice Tour 2000.

Now struggling to maintain rent payments, the dancer was among more than a dozen performers who gathered at an Orlando apartment complex Monday afternoon in a press conference to say the show, in one form or another, will go on if sponsorship and venues can be found.

"We worked mad hours for this," Olive said. "We haven't paid rent at our house. We have a good show, but we don't have a place to perform."

Suitcases in hand, more 70 models, dancers and singers waited in a hot Wal-Mart parking lot Sunday March 12 in Sanford for tour buses that never came. Many have given up hope on Juice tour 2000 or recovering the hundreds, and in some cases thousands of dollars, spent in preparation for a six month traveling show.

However, others like Olive are attempting to turn the media attention about the scam into positive publicity that could generate sponsorships.

Police and the Better Business Bureau are looking into complaints regarding Sanford-based

tour sponsor Everywhere Promotions and Marketing, Inc. and C.E.O. Tyler Simpson of Sanford. The company does not have a license to operate in Florida. The Orange County Sheriff's Office has now taken over the investigation.

No charges have been filed. However, police want to question the 26-year-old Simpson. His apartment at 2720 Ridgewood Avenue, suite 10, is now vacant. It was listed as the company headquarters. Police believe he is still in the Orlando area, although his whereabouts are unknown.

Kenneth Williams, the CEO of a small production company called Naked Town Entertainment in Orlando, organized Monday's press conference, asking for sponsorship and venues for the tour. Williams said that he has been in touch with Simpson, and that Simpson remains in the Orlando area.

"A couple of us have been in contact with him," Williams said. "We know that he is not allowed to leave the state. He says that it's not true that this was a scam, and that he's still working on putting the tour together. Whether it's a scam or not, we don't care. We need to move on."

Williams, 34, said he has

## Chase Groves residents protest how close GreeneWay is to homes

**LAKE MARY** — Lillian McGill Jordan was among more than 50 Chase Groves home owners who protested Monday night that Seminole Expressway Project 2 is hitting much too close to their homes. In Jordan's case just 94 feet away.

"This is very dangerous," Jordan told Expressway officials who listened to the homeowners cite their concerns at a Chase Groves Community Association meeting. "You've already destroyed a lovely piece of property. We have been terribly misled."

Jordan, who lives on Brightview Drive, is one of the Groves' residents most affected by the \$265 million Expressway project. The backyards of the Brightview Drive homes are all less than 100 feet from where the Expressway will be built at elevations from 22 to 25 feet. Bulldozers have leveled all of the trees and left a half-mile stretch of muck between Old Lake Mary Boulevard and State Road 46A. After clearing this land, workers burned materials on site, causing more alarm.

"I suffer from asthma," Jordan said. "They've been burning as early as 6:30 in the morning. Couldn't they have


done the burning someplace else?"

Larry L. Sellers, the senior project engineer for the project, said that the burning will be over by Thursday. He said that a provision allowed the workers to burn on site but that they had been careful to control the burn. He said that the Division of Forestry had approved the daily burns.

Sellers said that the work crews had a 6:30 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. schedule six days a week. He apologized that residents had been awakened so early in Saturdays. He said he did not

### Stuck in the mud







## Using ground cover can reduce maintenance costs

By definition, a ground cover is any low-growing plant that can be used to cover an area in the landscape. Even though turfgrass is also a ground cover, the term usually refers to plants other than turfgrass, that can be used to cover specific areas where turfgrass is not wanted or will not grow well.

**Why ground covers?** Because turfgrasses do not grow well in shaded areas or where the soil is too wet or too dry, other plants need to replace the turfgrass in those areas to avoid the proliferation of weeds. Ground covers also reduce the high-maintenance costs of turfgrasses, which require relatively high levels of fertilizer, mowing, and supplemental irrigation.

Most ground covers require little or no application of pesticides, but turfgrasses can be severely affected by pests and diseases that require the use of pesticides to control them. Many ground cover plants add color to the landscape with their flowers or colored structures, certainly, a more pleasant view than the green color of turfgrass.

Wedelia and daylily are very good choices because of their beautiful flowers. Carolina yellow Jessamine, liriope and mondo grass add variation to the shades of green to your landscape, especially when flowering.

### Ground Covers Selection

Selecting plants to be used as ground covers will depend on the conditions that exist in your yard. Light intensity, soil moisture conditions, and hardiness zone, are some of the most important conditions that need to be considered when selecting ground covers.

### Light Intensity

While crepe and the dwarf confederate jasmine grow well in full sun or shade, most plants require full sun or partial shade for good growth and development. English ivy, pothos, hiptre and mondo grass grow well in some shade, but juniper, lantana, beach morning glory and scented garlic need full sun for normal growth.

### Soil Moisture

Carolina yellow Jessamine can grow in soils relatively wet, but juniper, fig marigold and lantana grow best in dry, sandy soils.

requiring only occasional supplemental watering for good growth. Watering on an as-needed basis is recommended, but ground cover plants should not be allowed to wilt.

### Hardiness Zones

A common mistake is to try tropical plants that will continue to live during mild winters but with a hard freeze they will be killed or severely damaged. Other plants like winter creeper require chilling temperatures and therefore do not do well in southern areas of Florida.

### Weed Problems

A ground cover is not recommended under or near trees that produce many viable seeds because their seedlings will become weeds for the ground cover. Such is the case of trees like golden rain, cherry laurel and camphor tree. Some ground

covers like dichondra, creeping Charlie and wandering jew, can become weeds in your yard by invading areas where they were not intended to grow. As a general rule, once the ground cover is well established, weed competition is minimal.

### Planting Ground Covers

Loosen the soil and remove foreign objects from the area to be planted by the ground cover. Determine the pH of the soil and correct it, if necessary, according to the plants to be used as ground covers. It is a sound practice to add organic matter to the soil to improve its characteristics.

A layer of about 2 to 3 inches of organic matter incorporated to a depth of 6 to 10 inches should be adequate for most soils. To keep down weeds and avoid soil erosion, space plants in such a way as to cover the area as soon

as possible.

The planting distance will depend on the species of plant used. Individual planting holes should be two to three times the diameter of the root ball and as deep as the root ball. Newly set plants should be protected from drying conditions until their root system becomes established. After four and six weeks, fertilize the plants with a complete fertilizer such as 6-6-6 or 12-4-8 at a rate of 1 pound of nitrogen per 1,000 square feet. Use a slow release formulation if possible for a better utilization of your fertilizer. Three to four applications per year are recommended for ground covers.

# Longwood increases garbage rates

**LONGWOOD** — Residents of Longwood will pay higher solid waste collection rates beginning in May.

The Longwood City Commission on Monday approved a request by Florida Recycling Services to raise the collection rates for solid waste services. The company said the rate hike is necessary because of increased fuel costs.

The company will increase the rate for collection services by 35 cents per household per month. In addition, the rate for rear door pickup service for those who

are not handicapped will be increased 20 cents per household per month. The administrative fee remains the same.

The rate increase will take effect May 5. The contractor will perform the collection services at the rate of \$10.87 per month per residence, including charges for recycling materials. Meanwhile, a surcharge of \$3.95 per month will be charged for nonhandicapped rear door pickup.

"We felt that the cost increase to the customer was a very modest representation of the increased fuel costs we are facing," said Sid Vihlen, Jr., a representative of Florida Recycling Services.

Although the rate increase was approved, City Commissioners also called for collection services in the city to improve.

"The complaint level is just too high," said Commissioner Steve Miller. "Even on my street there have been many things left behind. That is definitely a problem."

City Commissioners and residents said they are concerned about Florida Recycling trucks traveling too fast in residential neighborhoods, and about garbage cans that are not properly returned after trash is dumped into the trucks.

Vihlen said that the company will work with Longwood staff to address any complaints.

"Call us if you find these problems," Vihlen said. "We will be responsive."

Longwood Mayor Paul Lovestrand said that the company is responsive to complaints, and that overall he is satisfied with the level of service.

"We have complaints with this company just like we had complaints with the one before it, and the one before that," Lovestrand said. "When we've made complaints, they've been quick to respond. Service is no better and no worse than it was before."

## Offshore fishing is in the air

**SANFORD** — It will not be long before cold fronts lose their punch and offshore waters subside. Now is the time to begin preparations for this annual event.

I have an annual ritual of preparing my boat for the start of spring. Changing the fluid in the lower unit, replacing the spark plugs, installing a new fuel filter/water separator, and greasing the outboard and the wheel bearings are all a part of this process. This year, I even replaced my two deep cycle marine batteries.

Nothing is more frustrating than outboard problems on the water. It can also get quite costly if Sea Tow is involved—to the tune of \$100.00 per hour, and the clock starts ticking once the tow vessel leaves port.

I am quite a stickler for preventative maintenance because the options are not attractive. I also spend a lot of time examining my boat trailer, in particular the tires and the wheel bearings. It is a rare weekend that I do not see boats pulled off the highway with tire or wheel bearing problems.

I make it a point to replace trailer tires as soon as wear is detected, and replace them with at least four-ply tires rated specifically for trailers. Tension grease fittings, such as "Bearing Buddies," are not an option. Keeping wheel bearings lubricated and under pressure is an absolute necessity.

Enjoy your spring fishing trips by first taking a little time to complete a spring check list on your outboard and trailer. A few preventative steps can save you from some unpleasant situations and make your spring flings much more enjoyable.

### SHUPE'S SCOOP

I keep spare spark plugs and a spark plug wrench in my boat, along with a tool kit. These tools have come in handy on more than one occasion.

### FISHING FORECAST

Bass action is as good as it gets in the river. Low water levels are making bass easy to locate as they are forced out into the main channel. Use small lures for fast action, as bass are typically feeding upon tiny grass shrimp and tiny minnows that move out into the main channel due to dropping water levels.

Sebastian Inlet has good catch-and-release snook action, along with flounder, redfish, trout and a few snapper. Live shrimp or baitfish are top baits.


