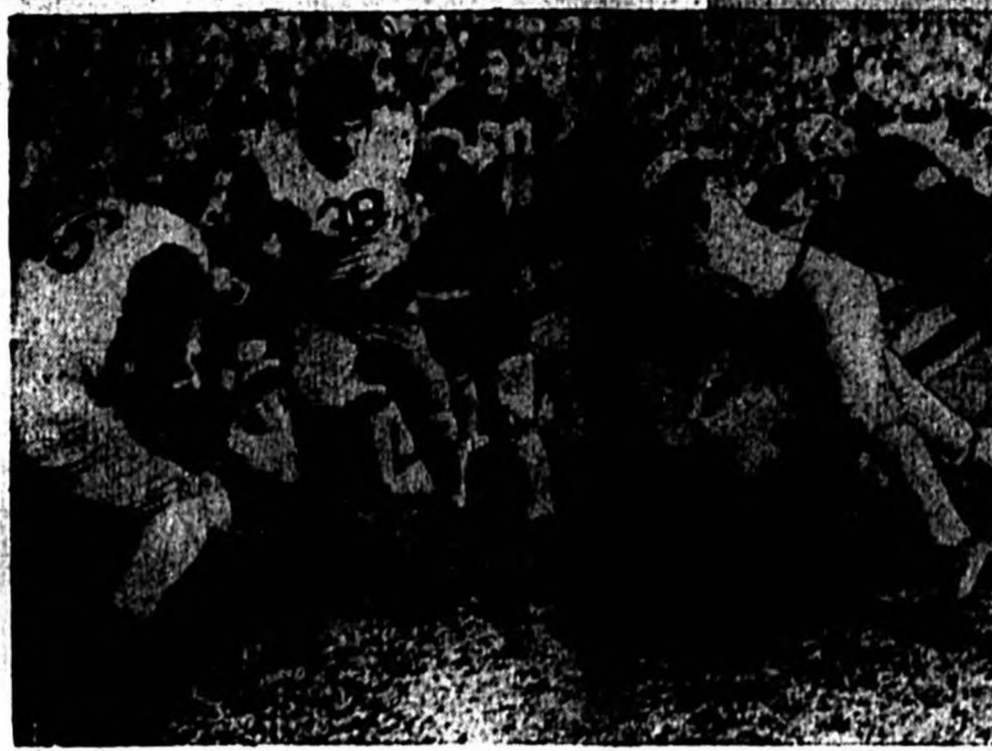


Boy Scouts Invited To Hear Col. Scott of Army Air Force

Pacific Signs Point Toward Crack At Japs

American Forces Are All Set For Attack Upon Japanese From Three Directions

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12. (AP)—Signs from the South Pacific point toward an imminent assault against the Japanese from three quarters—all aimed in the general direction of Tokyo.

American forces are in the final stage of preparations for a coordinated drive to slash off the southern and richest half of the enemy's conquered Burma and at the same time gain new footholds for further strikes toward the Japanese mainland in two areas other than South Pacific Australia.

Allied leaders have been making their striking power for months. One is the Central Pacific under Admiral Nimitz; the other is the India Burma area under Lord Mountbatten. Informal belief is Nimitz and Mountbatten will strike in co-ordination with major operations by General MacArthur in the South American Theater, reinforced by Army troops definitely have won the first round of the vital battle for Bougainville and attempts of the Japanese to recoup that fact will cause a heavy and bloody battle in the area, and "without any basic whatsoever," Gen. Douglas MacArthur's spokesman said yesterday.

In announcing that the six-mile-long beachhead at Empress Augusta Bay—the opening wedge to drive the Japanese out of the last Japanese island before Rabaul was "firmly secured," the spokesman took cognizance of repeated Tokyo broadcasts that the Japanese had suffered their most crushing defeat since Pearl Harbor.

Jap Claims Unfounded

"Japanese claims of sinking warships and of a naval battle subsequent to the naval action reported at Bougainville the night of November 12 are without any basis whatsoever," the spokesman said.

In the event of action referred to, a Japanese cruiser and four destroyers were sunk, two cruisers and two destroyers damaged with loss of a single American warship, headquarters previously had reported. The battle presented a Japanese task force getting closer than 40 miles to the Marine beachhead, established several hours earlier.

Boyle Warns Of Nazi Propaganda In Armistice Talk

A warning that the German people, as soon as they find out the same kind of propaganda to fool the people of the United States that they passed out to the Allies in the last war, is being given by Lloyd F. Boyle, local attorney, Legionnaire and commander of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, who addressed American Legion members of the Campbell-Lossing post and Auxiliary, the Seminole High School Band and an audience that crowded the Legion Hut to capacity at Armistice Day. J. B. Kirkpatrick, of Euclid, Legion district commander, greeted the gathering. Honoring the dead of the present war, old star medals were presented by Post Commander Wayne to Mrs. Mary Miller, mother of the late Capt. Horace P. Thomas, and to the following ladies as representing nearest of kin to the deceased: Mrs. Charles Swinney in behalf of the late Lieut. Jack Gillon; to Mrs. J. B. Cagburn for seaman J. C. Arant; and to Mrs. J. G. Sharon for Lieut. Stanley Adams of the Army.

Veteran's Commander Principal Speaker In Legion Ceremonies

"We were fooled once—we learned our lesson at tremendous cost," said Comdr. Boyle in his talk. "The cost of freedom is high and not fully paid for yet. When we have paid that cost in full, we will be able to say to the unknown soldier: 'We have won the war; we have won the peace; we have kept the faith—you did not die in vain.'"

Today, as 55 years ago, Germany would have us believe that the friendly, kindly, peace loving German people, as they term themselves, have an ambition to conquer the world; that they were forced to fight to preserve their country; that there is no need to continue the slaughter and destruction; that an enduring and honorable peace can be worked out. "They even hint that Germany will change her form of government and again become a respectable pillar of international society—(we will only forgive and forget."

"There is no word of truth in any of these statements," said Comdr. Boyle, as applause rang out. "The vast majority of the German people approved this war just as they have always approved her ways of action, because they have a fanatical belief in the supremacy of their race and its destiny to rule the world."

"Today, when they know they are doomed to defeat again, it is characteristic of the German people that they would prefer to withdraw rather than to surrender. Then, in a few more years, perhaps in a generation or two, you can see Germany again in the same position as she is today."

Sensational 24 Day Trial Closes With Innocence Upheld

NASSAU, Bahamas, Nov. 12. (AP)—Alfred De Marigny, 36, last night was acquitted of the murder of his wealthy father-in-law, Sir Harry Oakes, by a jury which deliberated one hour and 50 minutes.

The tiny courtroom was packed with spectators as the jury of 12 Nassau businessmen filed in to pronounce their decision.

The spectators cheered loudly as Jury Foreman James Sandis, vest and glasses, announced the verdict: "Embrace Wife."

De Marigny left the cage-like prisoner's dock and embraced his wife, Nancy, 19, in front of the judge's bench.

The French count had seemed disinterested during most of the 24 days of testimony and had a wistful, dejected, and angry expression on his face as he sat in the dock of the courtroom when the verdict was announced.

Several hundred spectators milled around the little courthouse, held back by police who had taken extra measures for protection against possible demonstrations after the decision.

Since he was arrested and charged with kidnapping and burning to death the wealthy gold prospector, De Marigny has maintained a cheerful attitude, telling reporters early in the case that he was optimistic of acquittal.

Last night his long green automobile, with the chauffeur at the wheel, waited outside the courtroom door as though it was a foregone conclusion that he would walk out a free man.

Jurors Marched Out

At 8:37 last night the jurors marched out, taking with them two copies of the voluminous testimony of 55 witnesses, 30 of whom testified by Attorney General Holliman as a "lead, a liar and a fortune hunter."

Spectators, some of whom paid 50 cents for their seats during the high points of the trial, remained in the courtroom after the jurors left.

Justice Sir Oscar Daly, after asking for a unanimous vote, and saying that "there is no halfway measure in this case, it is your duty to find the accused guilty of murder or not," retired to his chambers. Geoffrey Higgs, defense attorney, also left and was, presumably, in the courtroom.

Justice Sir Oscar Daly pronounced the prosecution's chief witness in a five-hour review of the evidence.

"There is no halfway measure in this case. There is no evidence of insanity. It is your duty to find the accused guilty of murder or not."

He explained that a unanimous verdict was necessary and that the jury should be sure that they were satisfied that the accused was guilty of the crime.

No Action Is Taken On Plan To Buy Citrus

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PUT KITCHEN FATS TO WORK



With fats and oils rendered, America's housewives have a valuable source of cooking fats in meat drippings, fat trimmings from uncooked meat, cured pork rinds, and fat skimmings from soups and stews. They can be saved and used for baking, frying, and seasoning.

HOW TO RENDER FAT
1. Trim excess fat from all uncooked meat and keep in refrigerator until ready to render.
2. Chop fine or grind.
3. Render in double boiler.
4. Strain through cloth.
5. Cool to room temperature.
6. Cover tightly and store in refrigerator. (May be combined with other rendered fat or drippings which have been strained.)
7. Use for baking, frying, and seasoning.

Use of these fats is vital to the government's fat conservation program. If all cannot be used in the kitchen, the surplus and waste fat should be sold to a retail meat dealer as fats are a valuable source of glycerin used to manufacture ammunition. One pound furnishes enough glycerin to fire four 37-millimeter anti-aircraft shells. Kitchen fat can be valuable in the war effort. Save it! Use it!

P.W. Stevens Returns After Work In North

Details of the construction at Adrian, Mich. of the \$17,000,000 aluminum plant now being operated by the Bohn Aluminum and Brass Company to produce aluminum parts for plane construction, were told recently by P. W. Stevens, construction engineer, who lives at Clarence near Orlando, and who recently visited Sanford.

Mr. Stevens, who is expected to report after 90 days to Washington for further duty, stated that he had started work, March 1, as a supervising structural engineer on the project, and completed his work last Friday.

The plant, a single angled affair 90 feet high with glass walls, covers 17 acres, and is the largest of its kind in the world, he stated, having required more than 10,000 tons of structural steel for construction. It is equipped with the largest aluminum press of its kind and when in full operation is expected to turn out more than 3,000,000 pounds of aluminum shapes per month, he said.

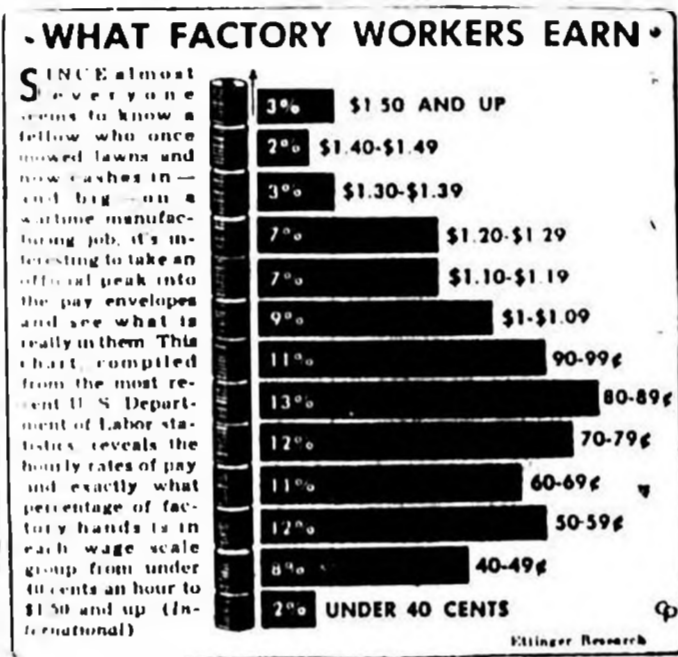

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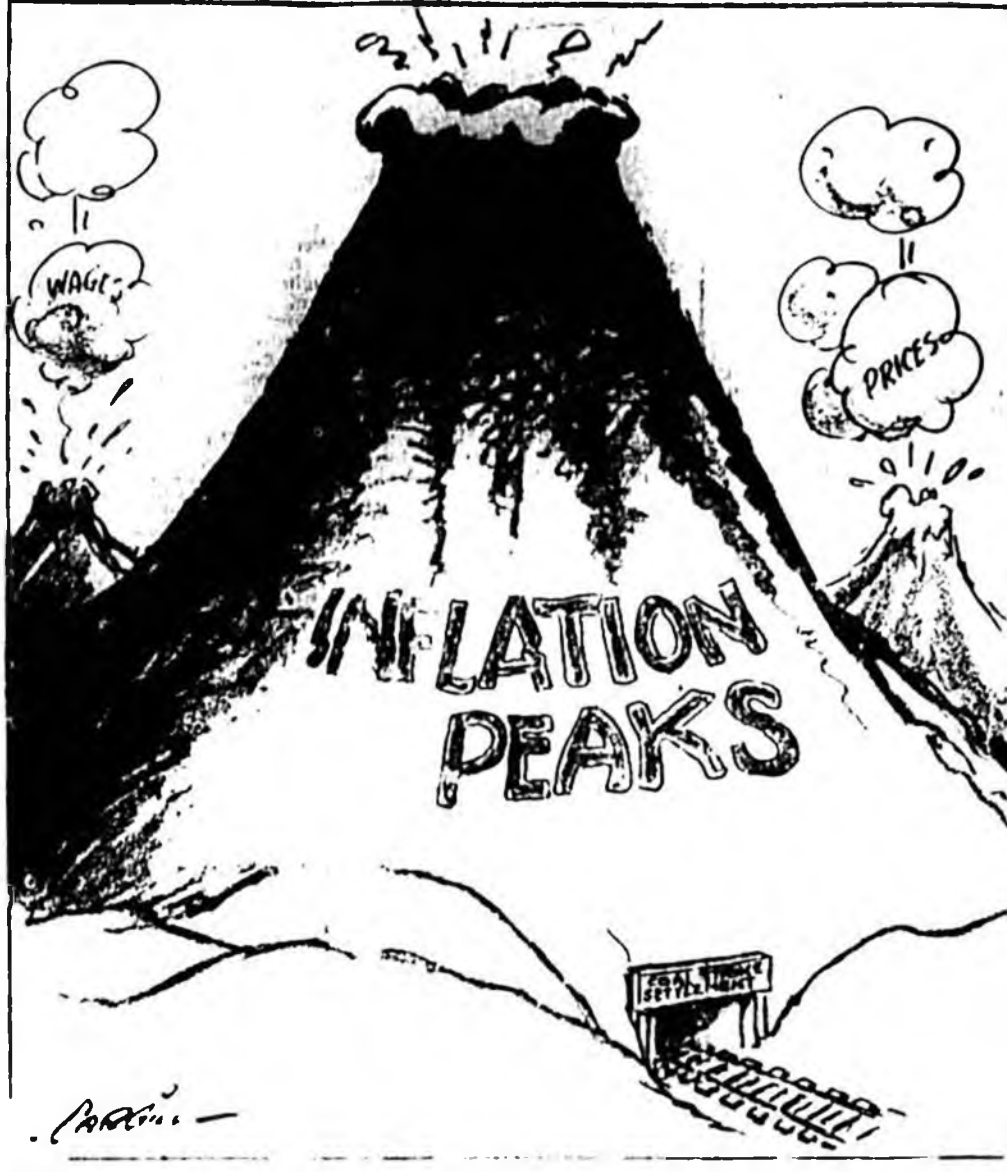

Czarist General Burns To Death In Bronx Room

Potenbauer Sets Self Afire Smoking in Violation Of Rules

NEW YORK, Nov. 12.—A dignified but willful old gentleman who was registered at the Andrew Freedman Hotel, 1112 Grand Concourse, the czarist general, John Potenbauer, was burned to death last night in his room at the institution.

There are not many house rules at the hotel which was founded by Andrew Freedman, a former owner of the New York Giants. Only elderly persons with the usual impeccable social and professional careers behind them could entrance and more reliance is placed upon their sense of decorum than upon regulations to make things run smoothly in the home.

There is, however, a rule against smoking in the rooms and Mr. Potenbauer, who was eighty-seven years old and had white whiskers and a compelling blue eye, chose to ignore it. He liked a pipe before he retired.

He was returning from a bathroom to his own quarters last night, clad in a bathrobe and pajamas and lit his pipe in the corridor. He discarded the match with a vigorous, sweeping gesture as though he were discarding the anti-smoking rule at the same time and the match caught in the tail of his flowing bathrobe.

It had not been extinguished in flight and Mr. Potenbauer strode on in magnificent unconsciousness of the fact that flames were creeping up the back of his bathrobe. Still ignorant of the fact that he was trailing fire as he walked, he scolded himself on the sub-committee, resulting from its investigation of Key West's bond refunding difficulties.

United States Is Studying Results Of Tree Drinking

AP Features FRASER, Colo.—How much water does a tree drink?

That's the question the United States is attempting to answer for a hundred Amer'can cities and villages from Maine to California, plagued by thirst or by floods.

Announcing the results of a six-year experiment on a 2,600-acre watershed of sparkling water, the U.S. Forest Service, under Dr. H.D. Wilim, station silviculturist here, concluded:

"Timber cutting definitely regulates the amount of water available for stream flow from a forest. The purpose of a forest, whether for flood prevention or for water production, should determine how much timber should be cut."

"Careful timber cutting can increase by more than one-third the amount of water that a forest stream makes available for stream flow."

"At \$2.50 an acre foot, Dr. Wilim says the increased yield of water from watersheds of the Central Rockies region alone under his system would be in excess of \$15,000,000."

"Our results indicate that the more trees there are in a forest the more moisture they will capture in their branches and evaporate into the air, and the more moisture they will draw from the ground and transpire into the air," says Connaughton.

"Specifically, timber cutting permits more moisture to reach the ground and become available for stream flow. We have found this increase to be as much as 40 percent in dense forests of lodgepole pine."

"This means that in the semi-arid west where water is the life blood of agriculture and where it is so badly needed by cities such as Los Angeles, Salt Lake City and Denver, proper handling of forested watersheds is an important water-saving and flood-fighting measure."

"Where floods are a problem, whether east or west, the results indicate that the forest should be managed and kept full and complete canopy of trees."

"Finally, these studies show that cutting down trees in the war and postwar periods can, if well regulated, improve watersheds and help the war effort by saving timber in the high-altitude forests of the Cascades and in all other high-altitude forests of the nation where cutting can be done without serious, America therefore may have to revise its policy that 'trees' save and that tree if it drinks too much water."

Brickley, Dropkicking Genius, Fitting Pipes 'To Help His Boys'

WILMINGTON, Del., Nov. 12 (AP)—Charlie Brickley, whose phenomenal dropkicking placed him on Walter Camp's All-American football teams of 1913-'14, has only one regret as he goes about his work in a shipyard here.



"I wish they had taught pipetting at Harvard," laments the man who once booted five field goals to beat Yale, 15, to 6.

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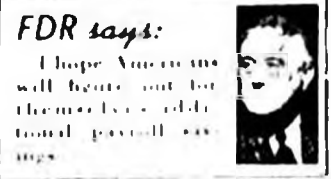

Funds To Aid Foreign Relief Asked By FDR

United Nations Relief And Rehabilitation Administration Is Established

COLUMBUS, O., Nov. 15. (AP) Governor John Brickley of Ohio today announced formally he was a candidate for the Republican presidential nomination and said in a statement he was "confident of the fact that the Republican party will be called upon to lead our nation at the next election."

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15. (AP) President Roosevelt today asked Congress to authorize appropriations for United States participation in the activities of the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration saying he would ask specific sums after the UNRRA meeting ends.

He said each nation would determine its own contribution and UNRRA would make only a beginning in the work among the war victims.

Senator Charles McNary (D-Ore.) first and only woman elected to the United States Senate and the only one to have a tie in the Senate post-war, today said she would not be able to attend the UNRRA meeting.

"As long as there are two men in the world there will be a fight," she said in an interview. She spoke from the depths of 12 years of legislative experience with 36 men, one of them the Vice President.

Arkansas' gentle little senator, McNary, said she would not be able to attend the UNRRA meeting because she is in the hospital.

"There will be scraps here and there and no country, especially an idealistic one, should not be in a place where she is unprotected," she said. "Prevention of war must become a daily task in the post-war era. War must be outlawed and then forgotten."

A mother of two sons, both lieutenant colonels in the army, she never seemed to be preoccupied for peace moments and was an unwavering supporter of all preparedness measures.
