



## Sanford Property Owners Bullish' On Facelift Plans

Downtown Sanford property owners have responded "very positively" to the idea of restoring their buildings to a Victorian motif, according to Winter Park design consultant Chris Raleigh. The designer is working with Downtown Development Corp. (DDC) in the planned restoration of downtown. At the Jan. 27 presentation of DDC's master plan, Raleigh of

for facelifting buildings at a cost of \$175, with DDC paying half. Raleigh was in Sanford Thursday to discuss the renovation of the Welaka Building with Fred Williams, the building's owner. The Welaka Building has the same type of brick and basic design as the privately-restored Pico Building, Raleigh said.

"As of two days ago," said Raleigh, "six property owners have contacted DDC about restoring their buildings." In sketches presented at the January DDC meeting, Raleigh demonstrated how removing stucco to emphasize the original brick and restoring elements such as canvas or tin awnings, Park office (628-4321)

second story porches and shutters could recreate the Victorian image "at a surprisingly small cost, less than \$5,000." His designs emphasize "cleaning up the lines of the older buildings" and "recycling (Victorian) period elements."

Raleigh has conducted extensive historical research into downtown Sanford's buildings. "The Florida Department of Archives and History told me that Sanford has the most perfectly intact downtown area in the state," the designer said.

In other Florida cities, successive waves of "progress" have entirely destroyed the original facades of downtown buildings, but this is not the case here. According to Raleigh the original look "can be brought out rather easily."

And facade restoration is also good business, Raleigh said. If a property owner renovates his building and creates office space on the second floor, the increased rents from new tenants would "more than pay for the renovation cost within a fairly short

Raleigh said, "The small amount of people I've talked to have very positive attitudes toward renovation. The momentum is already starting." Downtown property owners interested in using Raleigh's

## Move To Get SR 46 Overpass Gains Support Of Sen. Vogt

support to secure federal funding of an overpass above the Seaboard Coastline Railroad tracks west of Sanford at SR-

Vogt promised the Sanford Chamber of Commerce Roads and Bridges Committee he would contact officials of the state Department of Transportation's 5th district in De Land and discuss with other local legislators plans for a presentation to DOT Director Tom Webb in Tallahassee in support of the overpass.

The Senator arrived late at the meeting because, "I was stopped by the Autotrain," he told the committee.

Committee Chairman Douglas Stenstrom told Vogt, "I don't believe there's a situation like this in the entire country," referring to traffic problems at the railroad crossing because: -The tracks are the southern terminus of the Autotrain; -The tracks are part of Seaboard Coastline's main switching yard between Jacksonville and Tampa; and -Railroad traffic delays ambulances from reaching Seminole Memorial Hospital in Sanford. "Some could die in an ambulance while the trains are crossing," Stenstrom said.

Sen. Vogt said he "would be glad to" speak for the proposal on the state level and would contact other members of the area's state legislative delegation.

He also said he would request that state DOT 5th district Engineer Bill Benedict prepare a center-line survey and cost estimate for an overpass.

Committee members are seeking funding for the overpass under the federal urban railroad relocation demonstration program in which the federal Department of Transportation (DOT) pays the entire cost of improving unsafe railroad crossings.

Each project under the program must be designated by an act of Congress. "There seems to be a good reception at the national

level" from Florida's U.S. senators and congressmen and from federal DOT officials in Atlanta, Stenstrom said. The Seminole county commissioners and Sanford city commissioners also support the project, he said.

But the project needs the support of the state DOT. Chairman Stenstrom said, before the federal legislators could support the proposal in Congress. Several committee members pointed out that the federal demonstration program requires no state highway matching funds, as are needed under other federal road-

building programs. Chamber of Commerce President Tom Hunt told Sen. Vogt that Amtrak has plans to increase train traffic over the tracks and that the situation is likely to worsen without

an overpass.





ATLANTA (AP) - Because of a White House request, the convicted murderess who nursed Amy Carter while her father was governor of Georgia has been reprieved so she can go to 1600 Pennsylvania Avenue to resume her old job. Mary Fitzpatrick, 33, was to leave today for her new home, where she will be subject to the same supervision given inmates at the minimum-security facility where she has spent the last two years, state officials said Thursday. She was granted the reprieve by the Georgia Board of Pardons and Paroles two months before she becomes eligible for parole from her sentence of life in prison for the murder of Johnny Bynum.

#### Vance Prepares Talks

WASHINGTON (AP) - An ambitious negotiating schedule is outlined by Secretary of State Cyrus R. Vance for his upcoming trip to the Soviet Union, planning talks on general arms reduction and a possible reduction in the number of weapons in each nation's nuclear arsenal. Vance, in an interview, also spoke of the "critical importance" of cutting back arms sales around the world.

#### No Flood Problems Expected

WASHINGTON (AP) - Unless the thaw is accompanied by extraordinarily warm weather and heavy rain, experts say there should be no major flooding problems as tons of snow layering the Northeast melt. Thawing usually occurs from the end of February through March or April, said weather service officials, and, barring unusual circumstances, rivers and streams of the East should be able to accommodate the billions of gallons of water melting off the snow pack.

### **Emergency Powers In Use**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Federal authorities are wielding their new emergency natural gas powers in an effort to keep gas flowing to homes and hospitals throughout the East. The Federal Power Commission's first emergency allocation order Thursday diverted surplus West Coast gas to the Transcontinental Gas Line Corp. of Houston for distribution along the gas-starved Eastern seaboard from North Carolina to New York.

#### **Ethiopian Rulers Executed** In Continuing Struggle

ADDIS ABABA, Ethiopia (AP) — The chairman and six other members of Ethiopia's ruling military council have been killed in the third major power struggle within the ruling group since the overthrow of Emperor Haile Selassie 28 months ago, the survivors announced. An official statement said Brig. Gen. Teferi Bente, the chairman of the council, and six other members plotted to kill "progressive" members of the 40-man Central Committee and move the Ethiopian revolution to the right.

#### Young Dances In Zanzibar

ZANZIBAR, Tanzania (AP) — Ambassador Andrew Young joined 500 merrymakers at a "people's club" and danced some hustle-like steps with islanders holding a week-long political bash. Awaiting the arrival today of leaders of a number of African nations, President Carter's 44-year-old black envoy visited the largest social center in Zanzibar Thursday night and took to the crowded dance floor for a few steps of what one member of his party called "a sort of stiff hustle."

TORONTO (AP) - Ronald Reagan says President Carter's pardon of draft evaders destroyed the process of justice and may

### Askew To Cut Red Tape

### As Migrants Jam Offices

HOMESTEAD (AP) - As thousands of migrants jammed emergency offices to apply for jobless benefits, Gov. Reubin Askew was taking action to try to speed up the process. Askew asked federal officials Thursday to by-pass normal certification requirements for the hard-hit farm workers and set up an emergency foodstamp program.

He sent the request to U.S. Agriculture Secretary Robert Bergland, saying the suspension would allow migrant families to immediately qualify for food stamps.

Even the first migrants who applied for the special \$64-perweek unemployment checks Thursday won't get their first checks until Feb. 14, according to officials at the emergency offices set up in South Florida.

#### Orlando Firemen May Strike

ORLANDO (AP) - A number Orlando firemen threatened to strike today following an abortive attempt by the city commission to hold an emergency meeting on a new pay offer.

"I don't really know what we're going to do," said Willard G. Thomas, president of the Professional Fire Fighters local organization. which has a membership of 331. "There's a lot of hostile feeling among the men."

Thomas accused two of the five city commissioners of encouraging a strike by refusing to participate in an emergency session called late Thursday to try to resolve the impasse over a new contract.

#### School Spending Pushed

The coalition of school administrators, teacher unions and civic groups also announced that Wray Register, head of the Florida Congress of Parents and Teachers. had signed on as co-chairman.

#### Gunter Warns

TALLAHASSEE (AP) - Companies handling workmen's compensation insurance have received a stern warning from Insurance Commissioner Bill Gunter: Either do more for the "little guy" or don't ask for any more rate

Gunter said Thursday that 40 per cent of the state's 100,000 employers have been forced into the assigned risk pool, where they must pay rates that are eight per cent higher.

#### **Brantley Opposes Programs**

TALLAHASSEE (AP) - Senate President Lew Brantley, citing a poll that shows half the state's people don't want new taxes, says lawmakers shouldn't create new programs that would boost spending this year. "Few persons want more taxes and few want expansion of existing governmental services," Brantley said Thursday after releasing the poll.

"That is the view of 48 per cent of the people which the legislature must heed in its deliberations this year on new tax and new program requests."

#### **PSC Staff Urges Rate Hike**

TALLAHASSEE (AP) - General Telephone Co.'s residential customers would pay an extra \$3.25 to \$3.80 a month for service under a proposal by the Public Service

The PSC rate department Thursday recommended that GenTel, the state's second largest telephone company, be allowed to hike residential rates an average of 35 per cent to raise \$45.9 million in additional revenue. That would increase one-party residential

bills \$3.25 for small exchanges and \$3.80 for the St. Petersburg exchange. Currently, St. Petersburg, Clearwater and Tampa customers with one-party lines pay \$9.90-a-month.

### **Mass Poverty** Really A Myth

The American Economic Foundation headquartered in New York, has gathered some intriguing statistics about poverty in America. We

For many years now, and especially since the 1930s, American free enterprise has been attacked on the grounds that it leaves far too many people in

a state called "poverty."

No one denies that the private, competitive system in America generates prosperity for the nation as a whole and produces an adequate living standard for at least 200 million people; but the system currently is faulted because it is claimed that as many as 10 to 26 million persons - according to which statistics you believe - are still

The concept of "poverty" and the statistics used to document it are of great importance: they provide a major justification for the American welfare state, and especially the enormous growth of "transfer payments," the money taken by government from the pockets of those who earn more and transferred to the hands of those who

Hence, there is good reason to ask: Just what is meant by "poverty," and how sound are the poverty figures?

relative. No matter how high the standard of living of any nation goes, a fraction of its population will be at the bottom, economically speaking; and even in the most prosperous countries, at least one-tenth to one-fifth of the population will always be viewed as being "poor."

According to the U.S. Bureau of the Census. any non-farm family of four was "poor" in 1975 if its money income was \$5,500 or less. In most other nations, a family of four with the buying power enjoyed by such an American household would be considered comfortably "middle class" or even

If we accept Census Bureau figures, some 26 million Americans are "poor," but their definition is strictly arbitrary: certainly most of these 26 million persons would not be considered poor in any other part of the world. Prof. S. A. Levitan of George Washington University says, "If poverty is a lack of basic needs, we have almost eliminated poverty in the United States." Prof. Edgar K. Browning of the University of Virginia says, "There is practically no poverty in the U.S. today,

and there has not been for several years." One reason that Census Bureau figures exaggerate the amount of poverty is that the bureau defines poverty in terms of money income alone. The crucially important fact is that the people the Census Bureau considers poor are the prime recipients of many types of non-money in-



This is for all of you fishermen who have always wanted to fish with an artificial worm but were afraid to ask. Most bassmen develop their own method over the years with various lures. My personal method is called the "bump and

grind." It's difficult for a fisherman to describe in words the system he uses to catch fish as most of it is just plain old feel and an inner sense that only he is aware of, hence the name "bump Many of you ladies have often suspected strange goings on

when your man leaves at 4 a.m. on a cold, foggy morning or when the rain is pouring down and heads for his favorite fishing hole. So don't get upset and hit the old man over the head with a frying pan if he tells you he's going out tomorrow and try the "bump and "I'm hitting the First and probably the most important step is placing the

east. Don't just chunk a worm at the water. Look for telltale places such as little open pockets against the shoreline or in the weeds and bonnets or next to fallen submerged trees. Watch for movement in the water; if the fish are feeding subsurface you may not see any surface activity. Observe closely the weeds or anything protruding from the water. When a bass is moving, he may cause a disturbance that will shake or move the

When you see a movement, cast immediately to the general area. Don't hit right on the spot; but try and place your worm within one-foot circumstance of the area, preferably to the side or shot of the day — to finish off a strokes back. back. 



## Religious Lincoln, No Church Member

By GEORGE W. CORNELL

Herald Services Out of his rustic origins, his native wisdom, the Biblical grain of his thinking and the fiery trial of the nation, Abraham Lincoln emerges as the most deeply religious of American presidents. He never belonged to a church. His faith was not a set of creeds or formulas. But his mind and spirit radiated the fundamental essence of religion, an awareness of acting under the surpassing rightness of the divine will.

"If I can learn what it is, I will do it," he said, subjecting himself — unpretentiously — to it. He sensed an overruling objective and way to it that he himself could not fully make out. He saw his decisions measured against a sought-for but unclear greater truth. He was a man "under God." In fact, he first applied those words to the United States in his Gettysburg address in the midst of the Civil War, urging high resolve "that this nation, under God, shall have a new birth of freedom." The phrase now tempers the pledge of allegiance. Lincoln said his aim was to be "an humble instrument in the hands of the Almighty." He disagreed with numerous callers, including clergy,

That wasn't Lincoln's concern, he said, "for I know the Lord is always on the side of right. "But it is my constant anxiety and prayer that I and the nation should be on the Lord's side." It was a perceptive, submissive distinction devoid of the self-righteous postures of those presuming to pinpoint God's way. Yet Lincoln's sense of its elusiveness did not to him lessen its mandate on humanity, nor deter him from hard

who expressed hope for God to be on "our side."

decisions in pursuit of it. A craggy, 6-foot-4 man of brooding melancholy and wry humor, of forbearance and determination, of plain honesty and deep compassion, he saw God's purposes working in the complex events of history. within its mixed fallible motives.

He is "one of the greatest theologians America," writes Episcopal scholar William J. Wolf, "not in the technical meaning of producing a system of doctrine, but in the sense of seeing the hand of God intimately in the affairs of nations.' From the days of his backwoods, rustic schooling in which the reading lessons were from the Bible, he immersed himself in Scriptures, and often had a battered, old family Bible in his hand at the White

"It is the best gift God has given to man." he said Sometimes called an "atheist" or "baboon infidel," Lincoln was alternately pained or amused by it. He fit no doctrinaire mold, but he dwelt steadily on religious principles, prayed much, and his speeches throbbed with the Hebrew cadences and quotations of Scripture.

"No president has ever had the detailed knowledge of the Bible Lincoln had," writes Wolf in his book, "The Religion of Abraham Lincoln." "No president has ever woven its thoughts and its rhythms into the warp and woof of his state papers as he did." Lincoln's perspective was that of the Old

Testament prophets. A "latter-day prophet," he has

been called. An "American Isalah" or Amos or Jeremiah. The "Great Emancipator." The "Great Reconciler." Leo Tolstoy, the famed Russian author of Lincoln's time, was so moved by Lincoln's anguished, dedicated role as to call him, "A Christ in miniature."

He came to see slavery as a defiance of God's justice, subject to his judgment in the tragedy of an internecine war that fell on both sides, but whose useful purpose was national reformation. "The will of God prevails," he often said, yet he claimed no certain knowledge of that will, only a determined striving for it in the conviction that it would succeed, whether he grasped it or not. He recognized the enigmatic elements involved.

He himself had long opposed slavery, which he saw as denying God's intended destiny for the

This, he said, is inherent in "the justice of the Creator to His creatures. . . . Sometimes in the pitch of crises, Lincoln said he would go to his room, lock the door and get down on his knees and pray. His secretary, John Nicolay, reported, "Mr. Lincoln was a praying man." Lincoln's wife, Mary Todd, joined the Presbyterian Church, as she had in Springfield, and he went with her to services, but never joined himself. His great second inaugural address, rooted in a

Biblical understanding of God and history, includes 14 references to God, four direct quotations from the Bible and other Scriptural allusions. In it, he termed slavery "an offense" to God's justice that had brought on this "terrible war" to purge the wrong Yet Lincoln also urged mercy and healing, "With malice toward none; with charity for all; with firmness in the right, as God gives us to see the right, let us strive on to finish the work we are in. .

That spring, the war was over. A few days later, Lincoln told of a premonitory dream about White House mourning over his coffin. At Ford's theater that night, he was assassinated. Shortly before, he had written:

"I claim not to have controlled events, but confess plainly that events have controlled me. . . God alone






