"Souls At Sea" to Show At Ritz On Sunday And Monday

Intensely Dramatic Tale Of Maritime History Features Gary Cooper, George Raft In Plot Based On Truth

An intensely dramatic, all-but forgotten piece of maritime history that was an international sensation nearly one hundred years ago is being brought to the screen by Paramount as further evidence of the apparently growing conviction among film producers that truth, in the hands of a good rewrite man, is better than fiction.

The picture is "Souls at Sea," which will play Sunday and Monday at the Ritz Theater, with Gary Cooper and George Raft in the leading roles, supported by a brilliant cast.

Behind the screen play of rewrite man Grover Jones is the tale of an actual shipwreck and of a man who "played God" with human lives on the brink of disaster and got away with it.

Here is the story, as gleaned from United States Circuit Court testimony of the survivors, reported in the Philadelphia Public Ledger for April, 23, 24 and 25, 1842:

On the night of April 19, the previous year, the Yankee packet "William Brown," Liverpool for Philadelphia, with eighty-two souls aboard, struck an iceberg off the coast of Newfoundland and stove in both her bows.

Captain George L. Harris ordered the lifeboat lowered—a jollyboat and a longboat, with safe room for no more than thirty persons between them.

The skipper took eight with him into the jollyboat, seven of them members of his crew. The mate, Francis Rhodes, commanded the longboat, containing the nine remaining sailors and thirty-two passengers. And while both boats

sloped by the "William Brown," with thirty-one remaining passengers huddled in terror on the quarterdeck, capstern and plunged head first to the bottom.

That night the boats lent together. The overcrowded longboat began shipping water, but because

the sailors had no room to work the oars she swallowed like a tub, unable to make headway. Day dawned bleak and cold; the survivors looked in vain for a sail.

"Before the boats parted on Tuesday morning," reads the testimony of Julia McAllen, one of the passengers, "the mate repeated that they would have to cast lots. The captain replied, 'I say no more about it. I know what you will have to do.'"

The earliest known express service was organized in 1826 to operate over the Boston-Taunton "railway."

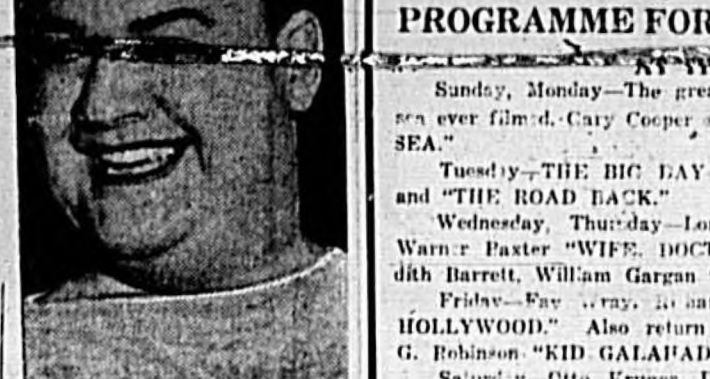

Sequel To All Quiet On Western Front Tells Of War Love

Love-hungry soldiers, hardened by four years of battle, yearning for the touch of a woman's hand, for her tender lips and her smile, eager for the escape from the memory of days and nights in the trenches, tread the road back to their homes. It is their story that Rich Marina Remarque penned in his world famous novel, "The Road Back," a sequel to "All Quiet on the Western Front." His tale disclosed to the world no pomp and glory of victory, no glorification of uniform.

Remarque's book dealt with the period following the close of the World War when the German people cast out their leaders and groped for relief from the line and hardships which had been their lot during the four-year conflict. The novel proved a political bombshell and the author was forced to flee from his native land. It dealt a blow at militarism which was again becoming a specter on European horizons.

Universal Studios has now screened this powerful story. James Whale was selected to direct it, for he had proved his ability with "Journey's End." R. C. Sherriff, playwright who wrote "Journey's End" was assigned to write the screen play with Charles Kenyon.

"The Road Back" comes to the screen of the Ritz Theater on Tuesday. The dramatic narrative concerns the experiences of the returned soldiers as they try to adjust themselves to peacetime conditions, and to find love and happiness to supplant the hate and misery through which they had struggled.

A few days ago Americans were warned they would see to China of their own risk; that the American navy would assume no responsibility for them. A day or two later came an official statement from the Navy Department that as long as a single American vessel remained in China the U. S. navy would be there to protect them. And so on. Thus they have the 200 of American destroyers, floating below the surface of the sea, and the 10,000 of the navy.

Japanese Savagery

Latest reports of Japanese depredations in China are convincing evidence that savagery has been thrown to the winds and the Japs are prepared to do anything which in the opinion of their case-hardened war lords might prove of assistance in forcing the submission of the Chinese. Japan is evidently encountering more opposition than originally anticipated to its conquest and in a fit of desperation is resorting to the most fiendish methods in order to achieve its greedy and unlawful objectives.

During the past few days Japanese planes have unmercifully bombed non-military areas in Shanghai, Nanking, Canton, Hankow, and no less than eighty-three other Chinese cities crowded with defenseless men, women and children. The total of civilian dead has risen to the appalling figure of 7,563, while thousands and thousands of others have lost arms, legs, or been otherwise critically injured in the frightful carnage which followed the frequent visits of the bombers. Cities within reach of the battleships in the rivers and along the coast have been shelled indiscriminately by naval big guns.

This promiscuous slaughter of non-combatants has taken place under the eyes of if not under the actual direction by Japanese military leaders who have promised first to confine their attacks to strategic military areas, have lamented the loss of civilian lives, and apologized for damages to other nationals, only to resume their attacks in other densely populated areas far from military bases or the actual seat of war. The only conclusion that can be drawn from their tactics is that the Japanese propose to continue their slaughter of helpless civilians until the forces of the government surrender.

Most of those who have been killed so far are poor people, peace loving Chinese, who had lived quietly and peaceably in their homes with their families without a thought in the world of harming anyone else, or of anyone else harming them. Then suddenly out of the night have come the Japanese raiders, dropping tons of incendiary and incendiary bombs on them, destroying whole sections of houses, as well as numerous hospitals, recreational centers, schools and places of business, and killing and wounding wives, husbands, sisters, brothers, and little children.

It is incredible that such things could happen in this day and time. It is unbelievable that civilization could have progressed no further since the days of Rome when Christians were fed to the lions, or the Middle Ages when enemy leaders were broken on the rack. Yet even in those days the spectacle of such wholesale slaughter was lacking. Men fought each other, the leaders of the vanquished were tortured to death, but women and children, and the aged and defenseless, very largely were un-molested.

The Passing Of Nudism

Whether it is because of a growing tendency toward modesty, or an inherent distaste for mosquitoes and red bugs, or nothing more nor less than a national awakening to the fact that the absorption of the sun's ultra violet rays can be overdone, the fact remains that nudist camps are going out.

"So highly publicized was the advent of nudist camps in America five or six years ago," says the Palm Beach Post, "that there was reason for advocates of nudism to hope—and others to fear—that the movement might attain sizable dimensions. Instead, there now is little to indicate that the fad has spread far beyond the ranks of the pioneer nudist camper."

The nudist cult in the opinion of the Post, has a particular appeal to any one endowed by nature with a perfect physique and imperfect mental equipment, whose number is legion; affords a means of exhibition to those with exhibitionist tendencies; and sounds like a good idea to some health fanatics, of whom there are quite a number—it would seem that the movement should not be suffering from lack of adherents.

"Despite all this," says the Post, "only a few more than 300 delegates attended the recent convention. A more goodly crowd undoubtedly would attend a call to national meeting of American collectors of paper-match covers. Perhaps there are even enough zealots of the paper stick of 15 years or so ago to stage a more impressively attended national gathering.

"Obviously there was some error in the calculation of the expected spread of nudism. The error need not be sought deep in the volumes of psychology. A commonplace explanation suggests itself. It is easy to imagine that after a week or so, life in a nudist camp would become pretty monotonous."

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75 Percent Of Welfare Cost Is To Assist Aged

11,000 Old Folks Receive \$17,000 In Month Of August

JACKSONVILLE, Sept. 27.—(Special Service)—Five percent of the state's welfare program will be devoted to the aged during August, according to a statement just received by the State Welfare Board.

The cost of the old age assistance program, it was announced, will continue for the next several months in the effort to get eligible persons on the pay roll as quickly as possible. Approximately 27,000 applications for old age assistance are yet to be cleared up, it was announced, and an effort will be made to handle them as expeditiously as possible. There were 11,000 old persons receiving assistance in August and total payments to them amounted to \$17,000.

Total expenditures of 110,000 in August for the administration of all welfare programs and services were \$2,125,235, according to the statement. Of this amount, \$2,125,235 was expended in servicing cases of the aged already on the roll and in determining eligibility of those who have applied. The cost of servicing the cases after they are put on the roll is less than the cost of determining eligibility, it was stated by C. C. O'Connell, State Welfare Commissioner.

There are 110,000 old persons on the pay roll as of August 31, according to the statement. The total cost of the old age assistance program for the month of August was \$17,000, or 75 percent of the total cost of the welfare program for that month.

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McLucas Explains Grid Fine Points To Rotary Club

Closely Following Sino-Jap Crisis Is Emperor Hirohito

From behind the mirrored walls of his palace in Tokyo, Japan's 33-year-old Emperor Hirohito—the man on the white horse—follows the progress of his armies in China.

Defied by his people as the Son of Heaven, Hirohito is more than a figure-head. He brings his influence to bear on state affairs and tries to break through the barriers of 2,500 years of tradition to know his subjects.

Hirohito acquired firsthand knowledge of western ways when, as Crown Prince, he spent six months in Europe. Today, as Emperor, he keeps in close touch with European and American events by interviewing Japanese and foreign diplomats, and travelers returning from abroad. His daily routine includes reading of foreign as well as Japanese newspapers.

The Emperor keeps fit by playing golf and tennis. He neither smokes nor drinks, and keeps a diary illustrated with pictures made by his own camera.

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McLucas Machine Begins Four Day Grind To Prepare For Eustis Tilt

Celery Feds To Meet Memory Martin's Panthers In Night Contest There Friday Evening

Seminole Outfit Will Be Rated Over The Eustis Eleven After Fine Showing In Tilt With Landon Lions

Head Coach Leonard McLucas of the Seminole High School Celery Feds will take his proteges out this afternoon and start a four day session that will prepare them for their next game of the schedule with the Eustis Panthers in that city Friday evening.

Sanford will be rated over Coach Memory Martin's outfit and the Celery Feds are going to attempt to even up the count of victories in the past three years. Eustis has beat Sanford twice while the Feds have been victorious only once.

In 1934 the Panthers and the Feds opened a series of games and that season, in Sanford's opening tilt, Eustis emerged with a margin of 6 to 0. In 1935, Coach McLucas took a new heavy eleven to Eustis for the season's opener and were beat again by Martin's outfit by a 13 to 7 score.

During that game Sanford had held the Panthers scoreless for the first quarter but Eustis started a passing attack that put over the initial touchdown and the extra point failed. The Feds came back with a 6 to 0 lead with the half nearly over. Eustis tried to complete a pass but it was intercepted by Roland Merchant who raced 65 yards for a touchdown. The pass for the extra point was good and Sanford went into a 7 to 6 lead.

The game progressed in the third quarter and in the closing minutes of the time period, Eustis blocked a punt and took the ball over for a touchdown and made the extra point going into a 13 to 7 lead which remained that way for the rest of the game.

Last season, with one of the best squads that McLucas has had since 1932, opened with the Panthers in a heavy rain and play was scoreless for the first half. Eustis kicked off to Sanford at the opening of the second half and Landon McClelland made a thrilling 84 yard run for the only score of the game and Sanford won their first encounter from Eustis by a 6 to 0 score.

During the coming week McLucas plans to give the first stringers a great deal of defensive work and the second stringers will get another chance to see what they can do on the offense.

Fred Ganas, Celery Fed center, was the only Fed injured in the Landon tilt but it was not harmful enough to keep him out of the game with Eustis Friday night.

Myers, in at fullback, ran for three touchdowns, one on a brilliant 77-yard gallop, and Watson Ramsey, a Jacksonville boy playing at end, blocked a punt for a touchdown, caught a pass for another. While it was a rather warm October afternoon, the game was interesting and enjoyable, and afforded some 5,000 fans a delightful gridiron spectacle.

While Florida will take their home field next Saturday in the favored position, there is always that chance that the underdog will toss a surprise. Brady Cowell, one-time successful freshman mentor here in Gatorland, is sure to have a stronger club this fall in his second year at the head of the Hatters, and it is felt that the DeLand team will give the Florida club a much closer game this fall.
