WASHINGTON-In response to our appeal, documents of "incalcuable value" stolen from the Library of Congress have been mailed secretly to us in five anonymous manila

A light-fingered scholar made off with hundreds of pages of irreplaceable diaries, memos, letters and notes from the collection of the late Justice Felix Frankfurter. It was perhaps the most serious robbery in the library's 173-year

The thief stole with meticulous discrimination, carefully selecting items of huge autograph value and others of

Among the purloined items were personal letters to Frankfurter from President Lyndon Johnson and Chief with Justice Louis Brandeis and intimate recollections on President Franklin D. Roosevelt, Secretary of State Dean

The library discovered its grievous loss a year ago and quietly alerted the FBI. A secret search has been going on

We learned about the theft in September and published an appeal to the master-thief's sense of history. The intelligence and taste with which he stole convinced us he could be persuaded to share at least copies of the Frankfurter documents with history. If he would get the documents to us, we promised to return them to the library, protect his identity and request Attorney General Elliot Richardson to call off the FBI's nationwide manhunt for him.

A few days ago, five brown manila envelopes arrived in the mail. Each contained a huge batch of copies of the remarkable papers. Only the valuable Frankfurter diaries and a few other papers still have not turned up. For the sake of history, the scholar-thief has taken a

considerable risk to copy and return the documents. We, therefore, are keeping our bargain. We have destroyed the manila envelopes without examining them for clues to the sender's identity and we are appealing to Richardson to end his manhunt. Now we urge the thief to complete the restoration and send us the missing diaries. A small sampling from the stolen papers gives a hint of

ADVICE TO CHURCHILL

-Eleven months before Pearl Harbor, Frankfurter arranged for then Australian Ambassador Richard Casey to send a "Personal Secret" cable to London for Winston Churchill's eyes only. Although it was a serious breach for a Supreme Court Justice to meddle in foreign affairs, Frankfurter urged Churchill to butter up President Roosevelt as a means of bringing the U.S. over to the British side in World

Churchill immediately took Frankfurter's advice and tailored his famous January 9, 1941 speech to FDR's vanity. -In intimate letters over the years, Lyndon Johnson and Felix Frankfurter counseled one another on how to take care of their cardiac illnesses. Wrote Johnson to the ailing Frankfurter: "I have been sitting down here on my ranch watching the Pedernales ... and cleaning my gun for the quail and deer hunting season...The important thing is to keep yourself in shape...so you can get back to work."

—Brandeis confided in his talks with the young Frank-

furter more than 50 years ago that he was worried about 'restrictions of freedom of speech." Brandeis also warned with great foresight against an energy crisis.

BACKBITING

But he also stooped to gossip and backhiting. He complained, for example, that one of his colleagues "bordered on being crazy" and needed "an electric treatment." -Frankfurter, while his letters soar with the grandeur of

poetry and legal philosophy, was also an unrepentant gossip.

Privately, he called the New York Times' Arthur Krock a "pretentious ass," lobbied to keep his former law clerk, Phil Elman, on the Federal Trade Commission and suggested that his fellow Justices leave the "garish luxuries" of the Supreme Court building and do their law work at home.

The Ford Tapes: The Senate Rules Committee has asked the FBI for a full field report on vice presidential nominee Gerald Ford. It will be interesting to see whether the FBI tells the senators about the incident in 1963, when the FBI inadvertently eavesdropped on a telephone call that AVCO official Earl "Red" Blaik made to Ford.

Blaik was seeking Ford's intervention to block an investigation of AVCO's handling of an Army contract at its

The FBI had planted a bug in the hotel suite of lobbyist Fred Black. The hidden device recorded Blaik's end of the conversation with Ford. We have had access to the FBI's classified internal report which referred to the listening device as "informant WF 1441-C."

"Say, Jerry," began Blaik, "I want to cut you in on this one thing. Out at Crosley's yesterday, they had an FBI man." Responding to a remark from Ford, Blaik said someone "must have made some complaint to the Department of Justice. Wouldn't you think so?...That's what he is trying to do, trying to show that there is some stuff in here other than

Ford acknowledged that had received a number of calls from Blaik on his troubles with the Army contract. Ford explained he and Blaik had been close friends since their coaching days more than 35 years ago. Blaik coached at Dartmouth while Ford was an assistant coach at Yale.





Hoping that maybe a few breaks and a good game would alter the direction of the SHS season. But with the attitude I have noticed on the sidelines, and been told about my more than one coach, the time has come to tell it

After the opening game of the season Woodruff gathered the players around the goalposts and chastised them for halfhearted play. It is not the ability that is (or was) concerning the coach, but the mental framework from which many of Woodruff's older boys operate.

"The seniors have failed to lead this team," said Woodruff after almost every Seminole game. The man has a tough job to do coming to this town after a 1-9 ledger. OAKLAND (AP) — Old Casey Stengel loves the Mets because he's on their payroll but he loves Yogi Berra because

"If you had three suits, Ycgi wouldn't look good in any of them, like me," the crusty, 83-year-old baseball Methuselah says. "Put a bat in his hand, he looks pretty well dressed." Stengel, winner of seven World Series as manager of the New York Yankees and first skipper of the fledgling and once futile Mets, is crossing the continent to watch every pitch in the ultimate Series between the Mets and Oakland Athletics. Once manager of the old Oakland Oaks in the Pacific Coast League, the spry and garrulous octogenarian has no mixed

loyalties insofar as this World Series is concerned. "Mrs. Payson (Joan Payson, owner of the Mets) pays me good money so there's no secret who I'm for," Stengel said here on the eve of today's sixth game of the 1973 Series.

Old Casey rocked the cradle when the Mets were born in 1962 and he led them until 1963. He is paid \$50,000 a year as onsultant and vice president.

He has been a familiar figure at all the Series games this year-both here and in New York, At Shea Stadium, where the weather was blustery and biting, he watched on television from the press communications room, standing much of the time against a wall with a crumpled cloth hat on his head and a tattered scorecard in his hand.

He is beginning to show his age. But he walks with a bounce and talks in a loud, busky voice, rambling on in unending sentences and baffling rhetoric.

The guys still gather around to probe his active-if unbridled-mind and Casey never tires of onliging. His high regard for his protege, Berra, is unconcealable. It's as if he sees much of himself in the stubby, pock-faced

(In a recent column, Lew wrote that "what the American public is forced to pay for food is definitely obscene." The esponse from an Illinois farm wife was quick and direct.) I would like to invite Mr. Koch to visit a real working farm where people labor an average of 70 hours per week in all kinds of weather with no assurance they will have a net profit at the end of the calendar year. In return for our labor, he consumer gets a wide variety of nutritious food, available at all times, for a smaller percent of his pay check than ever before in history or anywhere in the world. For the consumer to complain about the price is absolutely obscene." I took Mrs. Mildred Conn up on her invitation, much to her surprise, and spent a day on the 450-acre cattle farm in Thawville, Ill., where Mr. Conn, 53, and Mrs. Conn, 46, work from five a.m. to dark, with only an occasional helping hand from Mr. Conn's 77-year-old father. (The Conns' three grown children, like many a modern farmer's offspring, have all

Most of the soybeans, corn and alfalfa the Conns raise goes to feed the 350 head of cattle they purchased at about \$300 a head. They fatten their Montana steers for about nine months and then sell them at the current market price. If the steer should die of "red nose" or sleeping sickness, their in-

They can make money on their crops, but not as much as one might expect. (Soybeans this year sold for a record \$12.00 a bushel. The Conns received \$4.16 a bushel, having sold too early in an unpredictably rising market.) Even when the market price is up, there's the weather. The winter mustn't be too cold, the spring too wet, the summer too dry, the fall too hot. So dependent are the Conns upon the caprice of the weather, that almost every conversation they have begins or ends with, "depending on the weather...


When the vicissitudes of weather, cattle disease and market prices allow them to make money, they use the profit for farm equipment that has increased in cost almost as quickly as hamburger. All told the Conns have about \$200,000 invested in their farm - excluding the cost of their labor, rising at five a.m. or earlier and working until dark - and sometimes late into the night.

Fresh corn, squash, tomatoes, apples for their table? Yes, because Mrs. Conn spends long hours in the hot sun planting, runing, weeding and harvesting her own garden.

It was nice of the Conns to ask me down to their farm. But

Griping about food prices was my only comfort in the face of rampant inflation. Now, every time I feel like complaining I have to think of the hard-working independent farmer. And that takes all the fun out of it.

Call Ins Complain

When the City Commission passed on the first reading of Sanford's proposed new Animal Control Ordinance Oct. 8, it was anticipated-by us at least-that we would get a number of calls from citizens who would not be in favor of a leash law. Strangely enough the calls we have received-as a member of the Commission-have been complaints all right but not what we had expected.

Most of the calls received to date have objected to the provision that the new ordinance will go into effect Jan. 1,

Backaches Attributed To Matresses

Morning Backache? Check Your Mattress—If you awake in the morning with various aches and pains, you probably need a new mattress.

Mattresses have built-in obsolescence; they don't last a life-time. To judge whether or not you need a new mattress, assess the kind of rest you're getting on it. You likely need a newmattress if your present one: is 10 or more years old; has bumps, hollows, broken stitching or springs that you feel through the ticking; sways from side to side when you roll

You can choose among four main types of bedding: innerspring types, latex or plastic foam, water beds and solid opholstered. Of these, the inner spring types are possibly the

Innerspring mattresses come in two basic lines - those with open coils and those with individually wrapped coils. In open-coil construction, the springs may squeak if they touch. However, some manufacturers use vinyl-coated wire to cut In a standard, double-size mattress, the number of

springs can vary from 180 to 1000, depending on the size of the coil. Generally, a higher number of coils gives a better Since innerspring mattresses need to be turned occasionally for even wear, check for handles on each side.

Preferably, they should be attached to the frame rather the to the eyelets in the ticking. The foam mattress does not need to be turned, and is available in a range of firmness. Since it doesn't collect dust, it's great for persons with allergies. And a foam mattress is

moth-and mold proof. The solid upholstered mattress is filled with cotton padding or animal hair. It's often subject to mildew problems and may lump easily if filled with loose cotton pauding. Animal hair mattresses may need to be special

Water beds are huge vinyl bags filled with up to a ton or more of water. The water is pumped into the bed through a hose. To avoid deterioration, the water is to be changed regularly. Be sure that your bedroom floor can support the weight of a water bed before purchasing one.

Mattress coverings come in a variety of colors, stripes and prints, as well as the deluxe-looking quilted covering Keep in mind, though, that those bright, attractive designs add to the cost, but not the quality, of the mattress.



Question Box

I am comtemplating the purchase of a home located in a residential area. The present owner, a widow, operates a one-chair beauty salon in the home. She has been operating this salon since the early 1940's. If I should purchase the home and desire to continue the operation of the beauty salon would I have to apply for a variance before I could purchase an occupational license?

Dear Mrs. LBD: No. You would not have to apply to the City of Sanford for a variance, provided that you - within six months after the date of purchase - continued the operation of the beauty salon. If you should wait for more than six months to obtain your license you would have to go before the planning and zoning board and request a variance which you may or may not obtain. Consequently, if you should purchase the property and you should wish to continue the operation of the salon be certain that you purchase your occupational license within six months from date of buying the property.

By the way, this same procedure is applicable to other type businesses and professions in Sanford which were subject to zoning changes when the City Commission adopted the new comprehensive zoning ordinance last year.

Not too long ago you answered a question in your column concerning open end mortgages. You explained that if a mortgagor has an open end mortgage he can go back to his mortgage company and add on the mortgage for such things as an addition to the home. If I have an interest rate of 7.25 per cent on my existing mortgage what would be the interest rate on the addition to the mortgage?

We find that while this lending institution will lend additional monies the interest rate on the new money being borrowed will be pegged at the current interest rate on loans being made. But that's not all. The lending institution will also hike the interest rate on your existing mortgage from 7.25 per cent to the present rate which is now at 9.00 per cent.

Therefore, it would not seem to be good business to disturb an existing mortgage at 7.25 per cent by borrowing a small amount for an addition to your home at this time. Perhaps when — and if — mortgage rates are once again comparable to your present 7.25 rate on your existing mortgage you could arrange for the additional funds you need to construct the addition to your home.

I saw in The Herald where the City of Sanford is going to have a leash law. My question is: Do dogs have to be licensed

now, and, if so, will they have to be licensed under the proposed leash law? Dear Mrs. KER:

Yes, dogs are now required to have City licenses and under the new Animal Control Ordinance they will again be required to have licenses. Believe it or not, only 55 dog licenses have been issued in Sanford during the present

Under the new ordinance, which in all probability will be enacted on fianl reading Oct. 22, will go into effect Jan. 1, 1974. However, dog owners will be able to purchase 1974 licenses for their animals starting Dec. 1, 1973. However, before you can purchase a license for your dog the animal will have to have his shots.

The City Commission has anthorized the employment of two animal control officers with police authority. Effective Jan. 1, 1974, you will not be permitted to allow your dog to be off your premises without being leashed.

In today's editions, the St. Petersburg Times said Nixon should resign or be impeached. 


