

# Supreme Court **Blocks Pipeline**

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Supreme Court today let stand a lower court decision blocking construction of the controversial trans-Alaska oil pipeline.

The high court refused without comment or dissent an urgent government plea to overturn the lower court. Thus, the justices left the future of the pipeline from laska's North Slope up to Congress. The government, the State of Alaska, and a consortium of oil companies had



# Thieu To Get Assist, From Nixon In Talks

Associated Press Writer

SAN CLEMENTE, Calif. (AP) - President Nixon is expected to assure South Vietnamese President Nguyen Van Thieu of continued American aid when the two meet today at the Western White House.

Although U.S. officials often have briefed newsmen prior to such conferences, White House sources were reluctant to discuss topics for the meetings before Thieu's arrival.

However, observers expect discussion of Nixon's repeated warnings that Communist violations of the cease-fire agreement could produce American military reprisals. After arriving in a chartered Air Vietnam

ietliner at Los Angeles International Airport on

Sunday, Thieu's only comment to newsmen was: "I came to say thanks to the American people." A communique is to be issued after the last of their four meetings on Tuesday, and few observers expect it to contain any substantive surprises. They think it will have pledges of solidarity, promises of U.S. aid to South Vietnam, yows of adherence to the cease-fire agreement





# Pacific May Be Concorde's Last Bid

The Pacific area may hold the key to success or failure for the Concorde supersonic airliner. Vast distances over water and the business advantages of halving travel times favor use of the SST-a factor the Franco-British consortium building the aircraft is banking on.

They find the rising business traffic between the four continents comprising the Pacific Basin an encourgaing sign that businessmen soon will accept their tool of progress.

"Our surveys indicate 90 percent of the first class passengers and 40 per cent in coach who pay full fare would switch to the Concorde if they can cut travel time in half," said F.B. Clark, British Aircraft Corp. (BAC) official. "People for whom time is money will be

willing to pay a premium fare for this service." BAC planners and those from Aerospatiale, their French partners in SST development and production, contend time saved will justify the premium to, in turn, pay the \$50 million cost of

each Concorde jetliner. Just how much extra fare is uncertain, but estimates ususally average 30 per cent above full coach fare.

Most U. S. airliners have dropped their options on the Concorde, perhaps sensitive to the cost at a time when they are just beginning to cope with financing a generation of jumbo jets, the Boeing 747s, McDonnell Douglas DC-10s and Lockheed L-1011s.

Biggest disappointment to the Concorde builders was loss of orders from Pan American World Airways and Trans World Airlines, who have wide-ranging international routes.

# There's A Lot To New Moniker

Copley News Service BELIZE — The National Assembly of British Honduras recently voted to change this little Central American

country's name to Belize. It was an understandable act reflecting the colony's yen for separate identity after British colonial rule dating back to the 18th Century. But whether known as British Honduras or as Belize, after June 1, 1973, the tiny English-speaking nation reluctantly clings to British coattails.

Ironically, it is neighboring Guatemala that keeps Belize from gaining full independence and not, as one might suspect, Britain. Guatemala claims that Belize is rightfully The Belizean government, which has controlled its own

domestic affairs for a decade, fears that if the British entirely aban on their country, Guatemala might occupy it. Guatem ala hasn't really tried yet, although it has issued postage stamps showing Belize ensconced within Guatemalan borders. Also Guatemalan officials deliver enough verbal bravado to keep the Belizeans and their British protectors on tenterhooks.

Formerly, Belize hinged its hopes on delicate negotiations with Guatemala. Those talks broke down completely in January, 1972, due to an incident caused by

jittery reactions on both sides. The British began wellpublicized routine naval maneuvers in the Caribbean. Simultaneously, Guatemala raised its troop level in the Peten region along Belize's western frontier. When rumors circulated through Central America that Guatemala was on the verge of invading, Britain rushed an extra contingent of

The problem has historic antecedents. According to Fernando Sanchez, head of the Office of British Honduran Affairs in the Guatemalan Foreign Ministry, the conflict dates back to a treaty Guatemala signed with Britain in 1859.

"We agreed to recognize Britain's claim to British Honduras," explained Sanchez, "but only in exchange for a road which they said they would construct from our capital to some point on the Caribbean near the port of Belize City. The British never built that road, and we feel we deserve com-

Alexander Hunter, minister of Belizean trade and industry, said "it looks as though we've reached an impasse for the time being. Unless we resolve the Guatemalan question, we would not declare our independence without some defense guarantee from Britain and we are not at all sure that they are prepared to promise us what we think would be adequate

The machine is not adjusted right, the tool breaks easily, the lighting is faulty, the ventilation is poor, the fork-lift gears are shot, the candy sticks to the conveyor belt, the parts don't fit, the foremen are abusive and

All these and more add up to the Worker Willies, and they are particularly acute in the automobile industry. Top auto industry executives are production geniuses. 



Pearson traveled the 500 miles at an average speed of 139.391 miles per hour, just short of the record, to put a Wood Brothers car in the Atlanta 500 victory lane for the sixth time

Ironically, it was Cale Yarborough who won half of those six races for the Wood Brothers, and it was his bad luck that assured Pearson of a win in Sunday's NASCAR Winston Cup Grand National points race. The 38-year-old Spartanburg ace picketed \$16,175 for

winning his effort. He's second behind Richard Petty in career wins, pushing his total to 67 with this victory. Pearson coasted to the win, over two laps ahead of second place Bobby Isaac in the Bud Moore-prepared Sta-Power Ford, when Yarborough began experiencing







# Yes, a person does have right to die with dignity

#### By Abigail Van Buren

DEAR ABBY: I hear they are trying to pass a law making it legal to let people die just by discontinuing treatment. They say it will be used so old people who are incurably sick won't have to linger and suffer after all hope for recovery is gone.

The thought of this is frightening. WHO will decide who is old enough and sick enough? If you know anything about "euthanasia"-which in plain English means "mercy killing," please state your CONCERNED IN MIAMI

DEAR CONCERNED: "Euthanasia" literally means "the good death," and I am all for it. I believe it is cruel and senseless to prolong life by artificial means when there is no hope for recovery.

The right to die with dignity should be everybody's right. The Euthanasia Education Council [whose meetings I have personally attended] in New York, has made available "A Living Will." It reads as fellows:

"To My Family, My Physician. My Clergyman. My Lawyer-If the time comes when I can no longer take part in decisions for my own future, let this statement stand as the testament of my wishes

"If there is no reasonable expectation of my recovery from physical or mental or spiritual disability, I [name] request that I be allowed to die and not be kept alive by artificial means or heroic measures. Death is as much a reality as birth, growth, maturity, and old age-it is the one certainty. I do not fear death as much as I fear the indignity of daterioration, dependence, and hopeless pain, I ask that drugs be mercifully administered to me for terminal suffer-

ing even if they hasten the moment of death. "This request is made while I am in good health and spirits. Altho this document is not legally binding, you who care for me will, I hope, feel morally bound to follow its mandates. I recognize it places a heavy burden of responsibility upon you, and it is with the intention of sharing that responsibility and of mitigating any feelings of guilt that this statement is made."

Sign document in the presence of wirnesses, and give it to your family physician, attorney, and-or a member of your family. [Better yet, obtain three copies, and give each one a copy. I did]. "A Living Will" document may be obtained by writing

# Mideast Can Benefit From Peaceful Times

There is characteristic equivocation in President Anwar Sadat's call for Egypt to prepare for "total confrontation" with Israel. This means war, he seems to be saying, but then again it could mean peace. He is quick to add that Egypt is not abandoning diplomatic efforts for a peaceful settlement.

Somewhere Mr. Sadat will find a limit to the number of times he can cry "Wolf!" to regenerate national unity and fervor among his people. Unity is sorely needed right now-not so much because of the Israeli issue itself, but because of the economic penalties of keeping Egypt on a war footing for so long.

Mr. Sadat's assumption of full governmental powers combining his office of president with that of prime minister-a step once taken in time of crisis by the late Gamal Abdel Nasser-may be designed more to placate impatient Egyptians than to signal an approaching military showdown with Israel. Again echoing Nasser, he is casting the United States of America in the role of a villain. This time, Egypt takes umbrage at the recent decision by the United States to sell additional fighter planes to Israel and to supply the technology for her to begin manufacturing

### Now, Who's On First?

Republican John V. Lindsay won an upset victory in New York City eight years ago to succeed retiring Democratic Mayor Robert

Four years later, Lindsay, rejected by New York's Republicans, was embraced by the city's Liberal Party and was elected to a second term. Lindsay, now a Democrat, has declined to seek reelection this year, which avoids a titillating incongruity

The likely Republican candidate in 1973 is none other than Wagner, who already has the blessing of the Liberals and the strong endorsement of GOP Gov. Nelson Rockefeller.

New Yorkers, inured to erosion of their traditions by the wanton retreat of their baseball Giants and Dodgers and appearances of former Yankee greats Casey Stengel and Yogi Berra in Met uniforms, apparently have learned to take such switches in stride.

But interested political observers in other parts of the country are bound to cry out for that ballpark carryover - the scorecard, without which "you cannot tell the players."

This move toward giving Israel greater military self-sufficiency is actually no departure from a U.S. policy in the Middle East which the Arabs have understood all along. That policy calls for military aid to the extent Israel needs it to guarantee her survival. The Israeli armed forces are obviously approaching the point where that survival is assured, so long as the Soviet Union restrains its hand in bolstering the military capability of Israel's hostile neighbors.

The Russians have been exhibiting a certain detachment toward the Arab-Israeli dispute which they once exploited to the fullest to aid their penetration of the Mediterranean. Now, Moscow is giving top priority to smoothing the way for new trade agreements with the United States and Western Europe. For once, the Russians have more to lose than to gain from new disturbances in the Middle East. The real "confrontation" approaching for

Egypt may lie in facing some facts-an Israel more determined than ever to defend itself, a world diplomatic community which is wary of getting involved with the Arab cause in a military showdown with Israel, and a growing awareness among responsible Arab leaders that there is much more to be gained by peace than

Egypt is not one of the oil-rich Arab states. but some of its allies are, and the dependence of Europe, the United States and Japan on Middle Eastern oil has given a new cast to the thinking in Arab capitals. The opportunity to exploit the political and economic power flowing to their countries may be far more appealing than the kind of Moslem holy war against the Jews envisioned by Gamal Abdel Nasser. Whatever else the new politics of oil might bring it could make the war cries of Mr Sudat even more hollow than they have proved to be in the past.

# **Bureaucrats Taking Wrong Tact**

Zealous federal bureaucrats are threatening the nation's private higher education institutions with cancellation of federal funds and tax-exempt status unless schools establish

These attacks on colleges and universities are conducted in the name of "affirmative action" to comply with the Civil Rights Act of 1964 as amended by the Equal Employment Opportunity Act of 1972, several Presidential Executive Orders and guidelines from the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare. These regulations require institutions receiving federal

contracts and grants or tax-exempt status to take "affirmative action to insure that employes are treated during employment without regard to their race, color, religion, sex or national origin.

These requirements have been extended to curriculum. college admission requirements and to student financial aid

According to a recent preliminary report on "affirmative action" impact on nonprofit, private higher education by George C. Roche III, president of Michigan's Hillsdale College, "The principal line of assault on higher education...has come through HEW affirmative action programs governing faculty hiring policies."

Roche's investigation began only last spring and since than it "has revealed an iceberg of government intervention in higher education, raising problems of far greater magnitude than the public, or indeed most of us in higher education, have fully appreciated."

Elsewhere he says, "What ultimately is at stake is the institutional integrity of higher education. "If America's institutions of higher learning lose control of admissions, hiring, curriculum and campus policy and what standards are enforced in the schools - private, in-

dependent higher education will no loager exist." The affirmative action program is guided from Washington by vague, undefinable terms and conditions that Roche found are changed at a bureaucrat's whim. The word "goal" has been substituted for quota, but in a customary bit of double-talk, J. Stanley Pottinger, former director of HEW's civil rights office, told complaining spokesmen from Jewish groups, "While HEW does not endorse quotas, I feel that HEW has no responsibility to object if quotas are used by universities on their own initiative."

One college president told Roche, "Many of us simply do not like the idea that the Feds can come in and demand the personnel files. Nor do we like the fact that the guidelines clearly place the burden of proof ... in our laps. The amount of time and money we have to spend to comply with the order is considerable. If they want to show we are guilty, let them dig



Item - More needs to be done in attacking unemploy-

ment among those who can work but a limited number of hours a week because they're attending school, have certain handicaps or because they have family responsibilities which require their presence at home a part of the working week. Unemployment in this group is exceedingly

Item - Friends who work with young men and women from the slums say that what many of these work seekers need is simple instruction in how to approach employers, what to say, how to write a resume, how to act - and what rules to follow when they do get a job. (Don't take off from work without phoning the boss to tell him why you're staying home. Get to the office or factory on time. Look reasonably neat in appearance.) A bank officer who teaches such a course as an unpaid volunteer in a local high school says he is continually surprised at the lack of knowledge his students have in these elementals and how adept they are in catching on once "the obvious" is point-






