

Education Notebook

Court Highlights School Problems

The U.S. Supreme Court has focused attention on the public schools' most critical problems by rejecting the education establishment's conventional solutions for them.

This is a bonus from the high court's recent ruling disagreeing with the contention that pupils are denied equal protection under the law as guaranteed by the Constitution's 14th Amendment if local school financing is based on the wealth of their school district as represented by property values.

While reversing the U.S. District Court for western Texas in the Rodriguez case, Justice Lewis F. Powell Jr., who wrote the five-member majority opinion, called for a revision of school financing.

The court also showed considerable insight into the problems of measuring school and teacher effectiveness, the goals of education and control of schools.

The court squashed one of the fondest liberal dreams, that a public education is an inalienable constitutional right, "Education, of course, is not among the rights afforded explicit protection under our federal Constitution. Nor do we find any basis for saying it is implicitly so protec-

The crux of the argument for equalizing educational expenditures within a state in Rodriguez and similar rulings in seven other states is that there is a direct relationship between money spent on education, educational quality and the amount of knowledge in a pupil's

"...One of the hottest sources of controversy," the court explains, "concerns the extent to which there is a demonstrable correlation between educational expenditures and the quality of education - an assumed



Soviets Drag Feet

Force Reduction Talks Faltering

Earlier this year a world weary of war and ideological conflict welcomed the news of practical steps being taken to reduce world tensions so that nations could presumably live together in peace.

Among the pragmatic efforts were the second round of strategic arms limitation talks which convened in March in Helsinki, the European Security Conference preliminaries which began at the end of February and the procedural discussions for a mutual and balanced reduction of forces which have been in progress since the end of January.

Little is heard of the strategic arms limitation discussions these days. Hopefully the silence is indicative of some sincerity on the part of the Soviet Union as well as a businesslike approach to the matter of reducing the threat posed by its intercontinental missiles.

The European Security Conference is a horse of another color. The Soviet Union is taking great pains to trumpet the advantages of calling 34 nations together, including the United States of America, to discuss the reduction of tensions in Europe, Indeed, Soviet Party Chairman Leonid Brezhnev insists that the conference is so important that it must get under way in June regardless of the progress in talks for balanced reductions of arms.

The Soviet Union, it must be remembered, has consistently opposed any linkage between European security talks and mutual arms reductions. It agreed to hold them on a parallel basis only at the insistence of the United States which quite accurately insisted that to talk about peace without talking about the weapons of war would be a meaningless propaganda carnical.

Brezhnev now has told French journalists, "The question of the reduction of forces will be discussed concretely later, after the European Security Conference. That problem is a separate one, a delicate and complicated one."

Indeed it is. In fact it is the central question so far as the survival of Western Europe is concerned, as the Soviet Union knows. Having promised to address the arms reduction question at the same time it talks about European security, the Soviet Union now is dragging its feet. It will not even agree as to which nations should take part in the arms reduction talks.

While it is stalling on talks the Soviet Union has moved 1,200 more tanks into Eastern Europe and at least two more infantry divisions. It now has three times as many tanks in the region as the North Atlantic Treaty Organization nations have. Its troop levels in its European satellites are at an eight-year peak.

These are not acts of good faith. They do not enhance the security of Europe. They deliberately strengthen the hand of the Soviet Union if serious arms reduction talks are held at a later date by giving it more bargaining chips.

The sound position for North Atlantic Treaty Organization members, we believe, is not difficult to perceive. They should insist that the Soviet Union live up to its previous bargain and hold meaningful arms reduction talks parallel with security talks - and exhibit its sincerity by its

Bishops of the United States relaxed the church's ban on eating meat on Fridays. Predictions about the imminent demise of the fishing industry have proved to have been somewhat exaggerated.

Today. Americans are eating more fish than before the Friday rule was lifted (and they were also long before 2 . soaring meat prices entered the picture), so much so that the U.S. fishing fleet is unable to meet the demand. In fact, a record 64.1 per cent of the fish and shellfish consumed in the country last year was accounted for by imports. In 1967, the first full year following the ecclesiastical decision, annual consumption of edible fishery products did decline slightly to 10.6 pounds per person, down threetenths of a pound from 1966. In 1968, however, consumption rose to 11 pounds per

person and has stayed above that figure every year since then. According to the National Marine Fisheries Service of the Department of Commerce, it may reach 11.6 pounds per person in 1973, a full pound higher than when the abstinence rules were changed Provided, of course, that the fish don't start making like the cow that jumped over the moon, pricewise.

The Brazilian bee is a hybrid that resulted from interbreeding between the local bees and an African type that T

was imported into Brazil in 1956. The hybrid flies faster and works longer to amass honey than the native bees. But it is also highly aggressive. swarms in larger numbers and is much more easily aroused to attack. So far it has killed and injured a number of people as well as much livestock.

Plans to check this undesirable immigrant are in the research stage. One idea is the possibility of creating a genetic barrier in the region of Panama using a yet-to-be developed strain of bees so mild and inoffensive that any crossbreeding with the Brazilian interloper would create a new generation much less prone to attack. 



Deliberations

Those in the know are saying that it should not be a surprise if the Orange-Seminole-Osceola Transportation Authority is finally designated as the organization to conduct the feasibility study on the tri-county beltline.

Since the beltline does encompass the three counties, it would appear reasonable that this group do the study rather than the Orlando-Orange Expressway Authority. At least with the tri-county group Seminole and Osceola will have

If this does come to pass, it will certainly make Seminole's member, County Commissioner John Kimbrough, happy. He bit his lip rather than answering a remark made by Altamonte Springs Mayor Lawrence Swofford concerning the transit authority at a CALNO meeting earlier

Swofford told Kimbrough the commissioner's belief that the tri-county group would be allowed to undertake the project showed his complete "ignorance of politics." Kimbrough, despite a middle-ear infection and suffering

with some sort of allergy or cold, displayed his patience again at the Longwood City Council meeting Thursday night. Requested to attend the meeting to explain the county's policies in road participation projects with cities and told the meeting would begin at 7 p.m., Kimbrough sat attentively until 8:40 p.m. before he was recognized.

Since a public hearing was scheduled to begin at 7, the council obviously could not call on him until its conclusion. But rather than the brief recess between the hearing and the regular meeting, the board could have recognized the commissioner then and let him go home. The council also has the irritating habit, especially while

Duerr Runs Show

Earlier this week, in Casselberry, Edith Duerr sat in as acting council chairman to replace John Leighty who was serving as acting mayor while Mayor Bill Grier was in New York on matters concerning the \$4 million bond issue to acquire and improve the CASSUCO water and sewer system. Duerr made a short statement before discussion ensued on the annexation of 14 "islands" completely surrounded by city territory. She said news reports of the parcels to be annexed implied that zoning on certain of the islands would be changed and insisted this was not so. She said the or-

dinance as posted had no changes in zoning. Descriptions of the parcels, which incidentally were not received from the city, but rather from an informed source, noted changes in zoning in some instances had been recommended. The changes were recommended by City Manager Ron Bergman. And one should not be surprised when the annexations are accomplished if the zonings are changed, as recommended by Bergman, shortly thereafter.

It appeared or rather it was made to appear that the annexation of the parcels is now a dead issue since it was not approved by the council Monday night. However, this is not Since the ordinance has been posted and other

requirements of the law fulfilled, the council need only vote to have the item placed again on the agenda and proceed to pass the ordinance. It is still interesting that the Seminole Legislative delegation has not repealed Casselberry's charter amendment which allows annexations of "islands" without

property owner's consent when it vehemently declined to give the same authority to the City of Sanford. Surely the delegation does not follow the old bromide of greasing the squeeky wheel, i.e. residents of the Sanford "islands" made a lot of noise opposing giving the county seat additional annexation authority while city officials of

Casselberry opposed the move to strip them of this authority. Wouldn't it appear that right remains constant? If it is wrong for Sanford to have this authority, it is also wrong for Casselberry. Or, if it is right for Casselberry, it is also right

Squeaky Wheel

Speaking of the squeeky wheel getting the grease-

Casselberry Mayor Bill Grier several weeks ago at the CALNO meeting said that his city was willing to provide maintenance of a traffic signal at the intersection of Red Bug Road and SR 436 if the county would pay costs of the installation and the signal. Swofford advised Grier and members of the Casselberry

council present that he will not allow his city to pay costs of a signal on a primary road and that Casselberry should not either. Casselberry's official attitude changed. Now the county is considering a change in its policy in

light of the fact that the cities receive gasoline tax rebates and further that no other county in Central Florida has been found, as yet, that funds traffic signals, regardless of location within cities.

Mosquito Control

Casselberry residents can look for the mosquito control program to start anew within the next few days. The city has accepted the low bid of Jet-Back Sanitation Service for a heavy duty mosquito fogger at cost of \$2,530. The bid also provided for a one per cent discount if the bill is paid within 10 days after being rendered.

The Longwood Council also discussed the possibility of purchasing a mosquito-fogger from federal revenue sharing funds, but decided instead to look at moneys released in the annual budget from items now to be purchased from revenue


Casselberry still does not have the required easements on Lake Ellen Drive to permit improvement of the street. The easement is needed to channel drainage into Lake Ellen. Grier said last week that he favored the joint meeting but since a CALNO meeting is scheduled for May 2 could not be present at that time.





Yarborough Closing On Hylton In Point Race

Winston Cup Standings

The NASCAR Winston Cup Grand National points standings tightened as a result of last weekend's Rebel 500 at the Darlington International Speedway in Darlington, S. C. James Hylton is still the leader, despite a 23rd place finish, and Cale Yarborough, currently second in the standings, missed a chance to pull ahead when he finished 19th. Hylton, in the 1971 Hylton Engineering Enterprises Mercury, has 2,038.75 points, followed closely by Yarborough in the 1973 Kar Kare Chevrolet with 2,000 points.

Richard Petty is third in the 1973 STP Dodge with 1,965.25 points, and defending NASCAR "Driver of the Year," Bobby Allison, is fourth with 1,949.3 points in the 1973 Coca-Cola Chevrolet.

David Person claimed the win last weekend, driving the Wood Brothers Mercury. It is the third consecutive win in races he has entered. He isn't battling for the points title, and is currently 14th with 1,410.4 points, despite all the wins. Benny Parsons drove his 1972 Chevrolet to a second place

finish Sunday and is fifth in the standings with 1,937.55 points. Pearson held a 13-lap lead over Parsons on the 1.366-mile course at the end of the race. Allison, who dropped out with a broken rocker arm after only 349 of the 367 laps, still managed to place third.

Richard Petty, who was involved in a seven-car tangle as the green fell after the 10th caution flag of the race, was seventh, forced to drop out because of the wreck. There were 11 caution flags for 71 laps, slowing the winner's average speed to 122,655 mph.

Manufacturers' Championships

In the manufacturers championship race, Dodge and Chevrolet are currently tied with 44 points apiece, although Dodge leads in wins three to one. Mercury, also with three wins, is third in points with 29. Ford, winless after eight races, has 20 points for fourth; AMC Matador has nine points and a win; and Plymouth has two points and no wins.

Next action on the circuit is April 29, when a 506-lap race is scheduled for the .525 mile track at Martinsville, Va. After that, they head to Talladega, Ala, for the May 6 running of the Winston 500.

Hylton will be returning to the scene of the greatest moment of his career, when he goes to Talladega early next

It was there that he surprised racing fans with a win in the Talladega 500 last August. The consistent Grand National regular turned in a flawless performance on the 2.66 mile

Hylton will be in the same Mercury that won the August race when he roars off the line at 1 p. m. Sunday, May 6. He's still got that points lead, but holding on to it will be tough. Three times he has had to settle for second place when the points were tallied at the end of the season.

Qualifying begins May 2, and continues through Saturday morning, May 5. A 16-lap consolation race is scheduled for later that day, with the field made up of non-

The starting field for that race will be 60, largest in the modern history of NASCAR.

Granatelli Honored

Andy Granatelli, who directs the world wide activities of the STP Racing Team, has been named Auto Racing Man of the Year by the Auto Racing Fraternity Foundation, Inc. The award, which has been given annually since 1953, was made to Granatelli because of his widespread support of U. S. racing activities in areas such as championship cars, stock cars, road racing and drag racing, Granatelli also

fields the cars of his company's racing team in Formula events held throughout Europe and Austria. Last year, the STP Racing Team claimed four national and world titles, and Granatelli became the only car owner to have machines with both the Daytona and Indianapolis 500s. Incidently, Granatelli recently praised Hulman for his decision to back a new management group at the Ontario Motor Speedway in Southern California, Granatelli called it "one of the best things that has happened to auto racing in this country in a long time."

"This decision by Hulman, at age 72, to lend his knowledge and support to the Ontario Speedway, will do more than anything else to insure the success of this racing plant which is so important to the future of professional automobile racing in America," Granatelli added.

Charlotte Purse Posted

The World 600, set for May 27 at the Charlotte Motor Speedway, is the richest race remaining on the NASCAR schedule for 1973. Posted awards for the 14th annual running of the event were listed at \$174,735, including more than \$20,000 for the winner. That figure is an increase of more than \$21,000 over last year's purse.

Nearly \$14,000 will be awarded in time trials, which begin May 23rd, with the pole winner claiming a \$1,000 bonus. A field of 40 cars will start the 606-mile race on the 1.5 mile

There is posted lap money of \$5,000, and if the winning car is a Ford, the driver will pocket a \$10,000 check from that company. The five fastest drivers in qualifying will receive 20 tires each from Goodyear, while the second five will get a

In the 1972 race, Bobby Allison won the pole position in Junior Johnson's Coca Cola Chevrolet, but Buddy Baker piloted the STP Dodge to a victory. Allison qualified at 159.162 mph, while Baker's average winning speed was 142.255, a new track record.

Things have changed a lot this year. Allison is still driving the Coca Cola Chevrolet, but it's not Junior Johnson's car. Cale Yarborough picked up Johnson's ride, the Kar Kare

Baker is no longer with the Petty team, and is driving the K and K Insurance Dodge, Bobby Isaac's entry last year. Isaac, instead, will be behind the wheel of the Bud Mooreprepared Sta-Power Ford.

Veteran fuel dragster driver Tony Nancy of Sherman Oaks, Calif., will appear in Japan May 2-3 for a series of exhibition runs, at the invitation of the Japan Automobile Federation (JAF).



Question Box

The other day we had an occasion to read the deed to our homesite. The deed refers to a replat. Would you tell us exactly what a replat is? Mrs. TAL

Dear Mrs. TAL:

Some years ago the subdivision in which you live was platted. It was presented to the County Commission and accepted by that Commission. However, the subdivision was never developed in accordance with the plat. The land changed hands several times and not long ago the owner discovered that the manner in which the subdivision was now platted would make it difficult to develop and produce a profit. Consequently, he went back to the County Commission and requested that the plat be vacated and a replat be accepted. The County Commission did so and now the lots you own in that subdivision are identified as numbers thus and so, Block umpteen, Blank Subdivision, according to the replat thereof . . .

In other words, replat means that an original plat once existed, was vacated and a new plat substituted for it.

I enjoyed your article jast week about mobile homes. You did not say one way or the other whether mobile homes were real or personal property. Would you tell us if they are considered real property or personal property and, if so,

They are both! Now, that really confuses you, doesn't it. But let me explain:

In some states a mobile home is personal property if the wheels remain on the home. If the wheels are removed the mobile home is considered real property and is taxed as However, in Florida a mobile home - wheels or no

wheels - is considered personal property. It is not taxed as real property at all. But the mobile home owner does pay a tax by having to purchase an annual license tag. By the way, the property is not eligible for homestead

I called a real estate broker the other day about getting

n appraisal on my property. He agreed to make the ap praisal and gave me an estimate on what he would charge. called another real estate office and a real estate salesman said he would make the appraisal and the estimated fee he said he would charge was about one-third of the amount the first broker would charge. I'm still wondering why the dif-

First of all, real estate brokers in this area - even members of the Board of Realtors - are under no fee schedule. Each broker may set his own percentage fees on sales commissions and his own fee schedule for appraisals.

ference in the charges. Could you possible expalin?

Secondly, the first broker you called undoubtedly was experienced as an appraiser and he has set his fees in accordance with his background. The real estate salesman you talked to in the second office you called may have been a newly licensed salesman or at least not fully experienced in the appraisal field.


Any licensed real estate salesman or broker in Florida can appraise property for a fee. However, few salesman and even brokers - engage in appraising until they have become experienced in real estate listing and sales. Once they have several years under their belts they gradually enter the appraising arena. After all, appraising is an art and, in my opinion, it takes an artisan to do the job correctly.

Finally, the purpose of your appraisal should be the prime consideration. If you're just curious to find out what your house might be worth you might let the inexperienced man do it. But if it is for the purpose of determining market value for some prime and specific purpose I'd suggest you go with the experienced appraiser.

Per Serving **'Computation** Will Save \$\$

MEAT-Are you wondering how you can get the best value for your food money these days, especially at the meat You can save money by selecting meat by the cost per

serving rather than the cost per pound, and using proteinrich plant foods as a cheaper alternative to meat. Selecting meat on a cost-per-serving basis is a more realistic way of evaluating its actual cost. Some cuts of meat-even expensive ones-have a lot of waste. Loin steaks and chops of beef, pork, lamb and yeal, for instance, all have a lot of bone and fat on them. This means they cost even more when you figure out how many servings you can get from a pound of one of these cuts. On the other hand, hamburger,

beef liver and fish fillets have very little waste. As a rule, a pound of meat without bone gives three to four servings. Meat with some bone and fat (like chuck steak or chicken) yields two to three servings. Very bony meat such as spareribs gives you only one serving per pound. Consumers who want to cut meat costs should remember this when they are buying meat.

Turkey and chicken are among the best protein buys on the market right now. Whole chicken usually is more economical then chicken pieces in terms of the amount of meat you get for your money. Large turkeys are often better buys than the smaller size. They have more meat proportionately to the amount of bone. You can have the turkey cut in half or in quarters and freeze part of it for later use, if a large one is too much for your family's immediate needs.

Some meats and meat products are definitely not protein bargains. A three-ounce serving of lean meat provides about 20 grams of protein-a third of the daily recommended allowance for a 20-year-old man. To eat enough bacon or bologna to provide these 20 grains, you could spend more money than you would on an equivalent serving of rib roast or round steak.

But there are ways to get the quality protein you need and still keep food costs down. Combine cheaper protein-rich plant foods with more expensive animal foods like milk, eggs, cheese, fish and meat to get more protein for your





Ecology building

By JAMES M. WOODARD The current environmental protection movement is good and healthy for the inhabitants of planet earth. In fact, it's overdue.

New housing is a prime target of ecology-minded crusaders. The key question at this point is where should the "control line" be drawn in fitting new housing developments into its proper environmental role.

Some ecologists go to the extreme point of advocating no growth or development i their areas whatsoever. Oth ers take a much more flexible and objective stand, often suggesting a carefully pre pared environment-oriented master plan for their area and a more thoughtful analysis of each newly proposed develop

Pressure from the extreme or emotional ecologists car result in serious problems and hardship for large segments of our populace. As a case in point, the California Supreme Court handed down a decision last September requiring environmental impact reports on newly proposed construction projects. The ruling virually stopped the state's construction industry dead in its tracks. Loans were not approved. Building permits were not issued. Thousands of workers suddenly found themselves without jobs. Construction of much needed new

WASHINGTON (AP) — White House Counsel John W. Dean III, who has declared he will not be made a scapegoat for the Watergate affair, appears ready to implicate other presidential aides, says a source close to him.

In another development, The Washington Post quotes sources today as saying President Nixon was told by members of his own staff last year that former Atty. Gen. John N. Mitchell and Dean probably were involved in both the wiretapping of Democratic party headquarters and a subsequent coverup.

Nixon, said the Post's sources, responded, Give me some evidence.

High Court Denies Appeal By Scribe

WASHINGTON (AP) - A Baltimore reporter, faced with jail for refusing to answer a grand jury's questions about a news source, today lost his bid for a hearing before the Supreme Court.

David M. Lightman appealed his potentially indefinite contempt sentence to the high court with the contention that the grand jury probe was motivated by a desire to harass his newspaper, the Baltimore Evening Sun, for publishing articles implicitly critical of law enforcement in Ocean City, Md.

The justices declined 8-1 to hear Lightman's case. Justice William O. Douglas Mandel added. said he would have heard the issue. In a 1971 article, Lightman wrote that he was

offered marijuana by the operator of an Ocean City pipe shop while a uniformed policeman was in the "Don't worry about him," the story quoted the Shevin Proposes

Lightman was later called before a Worcester County grand jury where he answered some questions, but refused to identify the shop or the operator, citing a state law shielding news sources.
