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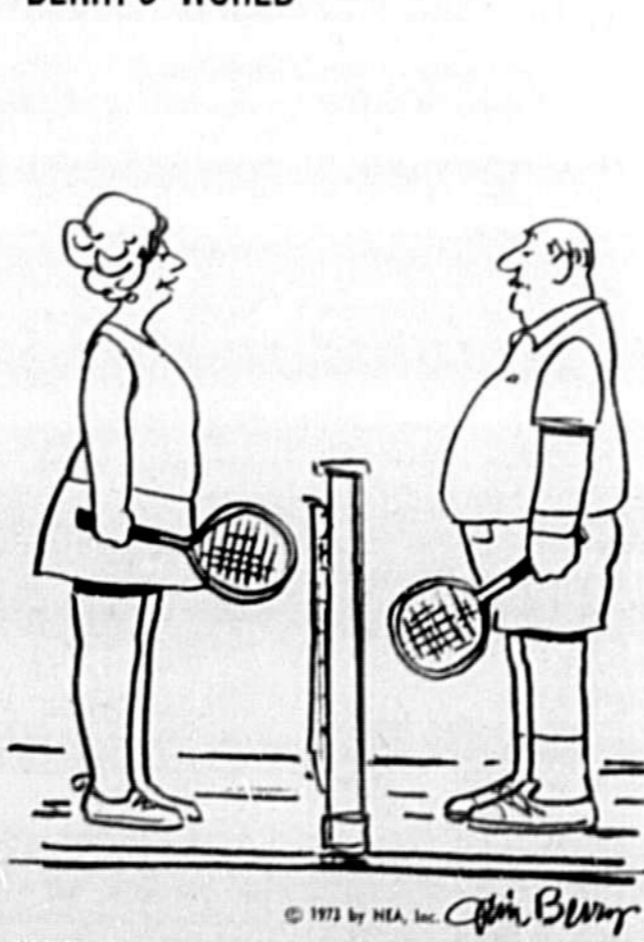

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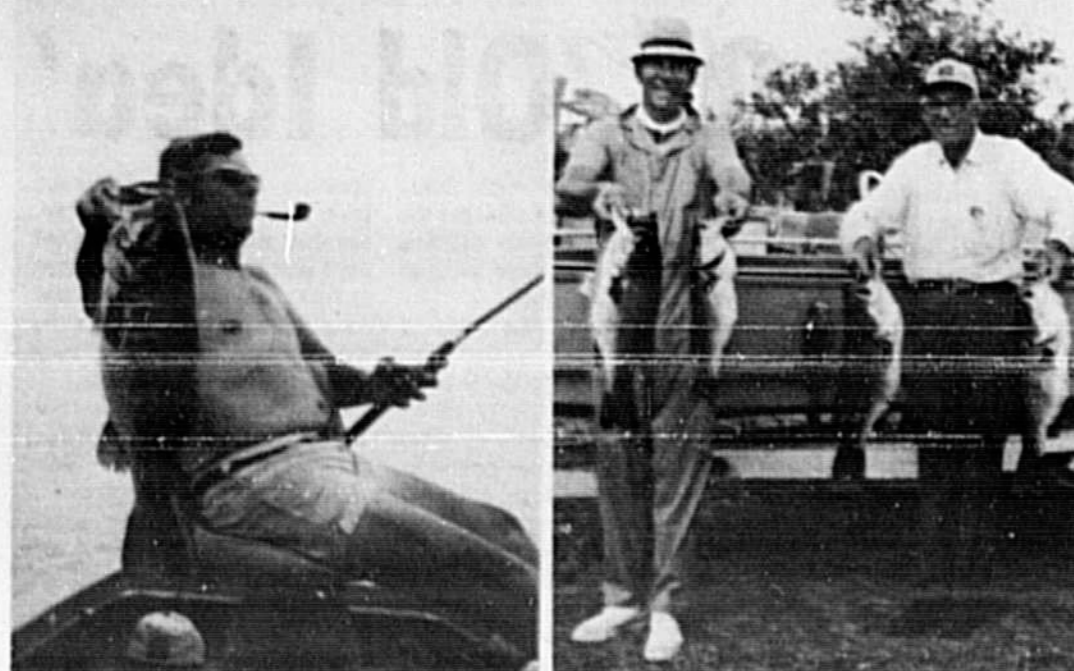

Sanford: Florida Bass Capital?

From the reports of lunker largemouth bass which have been landed in recent weeks, Sanford could (and should) start an advertising campaign designating the city as the "bass capital of Florida."

A visit to Dick Dove's Taxidermy Shop showed 96 big ones mounted and awaiting only the final touches to become trophies on the walls of hobby anglers who visited and fished the area recently. In various stages of readiness, all proof of our claim to bass fame.

And more continue to come in—reports of big bass that is! At the Osteen Bridge Fish Camp catches made by W.J. Grayson, Jr., Bill Grayson, and David Grayson of Chamblee, Georgia. Only five bass, but the combined weight was over 38 pounds. The three were listed the largest one at 10 pounds. A string of seven fish was

landed by Rodney Larson and Bob Fox of Fruitdale, South Dakota, and again the total weight went over 38 pounds. In other action around this section of the river, speckled perch are hitting under the bridge and in the canal and creek while bream and shellecrackers are biting well right off the dock. Jimmy Williams scored with limit catches on four trips out of five last week; the "off" day, he only landed eight bass but the largest hit the 10 pound mark.

Using a "Devil's Horse" plug, John Cullum landed specimen! And Louie Garner, fishing with D.K. McNabb, latched on to a six pounder near Lemon Bluff.

Several other beauties were caught by Tommy Maggard and his Dad, Andy. Tommy got the biggest one, a 12 pounder on a silver "Rapala" plug. Andy used the "Rapala" and a black plastic worm to help round out the string, his largest being a nine and a half pounder.

On another trip to the same lake, Whitey Schweickert accompanied Andy and this time shiners were employed to land four whoppers weighing 12, 11, and two at 10 1/2 pounds each.

A nine pound, 7 ounce specimen was caught by Mike Jones and a string of nine including two 4 pounders were landed by Dave Howell this week.

Can any other city in the Sunshine State boast of bass fishing like that all in one week?

From the Wekiva River, fishing out of Camp Seminole and the Indian River, had seven largemouths, John Hill

landed four toppei by a five pounder and James Williamson and his Dad had six nice ones on their string. Herbert Starnes took a couple also.

The rest of the action at Camp Seminole consisted of a mixed string of catfish and bream totaling 78 for one party and another of 48 for Mr. Green.

Further downstream at the Main Street Pier says weakfish are hitting so well on live shrimp that he ran out of bait one day this week. Whiting, sheepshead made up the rest of the catches but bluefish and Spanish mackerel have been scarce.

The Piers, however, in the Daytona Beach area, had word of fairly good results for the past few days.

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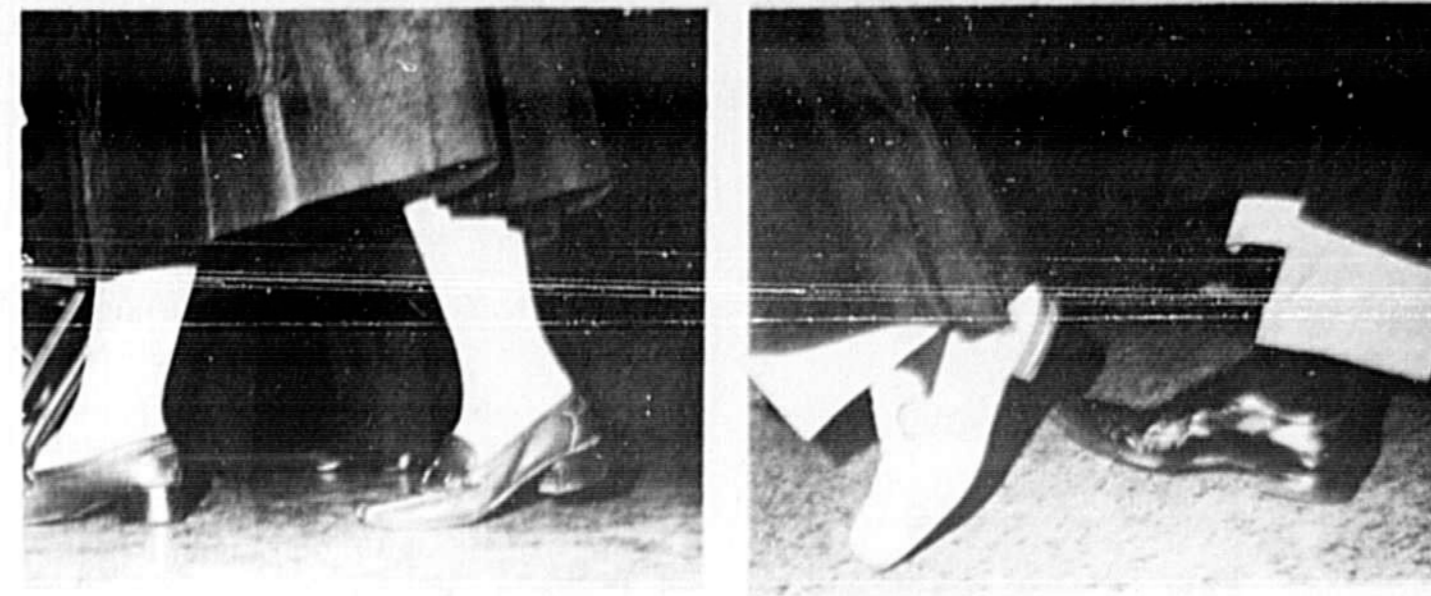

The exercises began with Rev. Harold A. Harris giving the invocation and Rev. Jay T. Cosmo, concluded sixth annual event with the benediction.



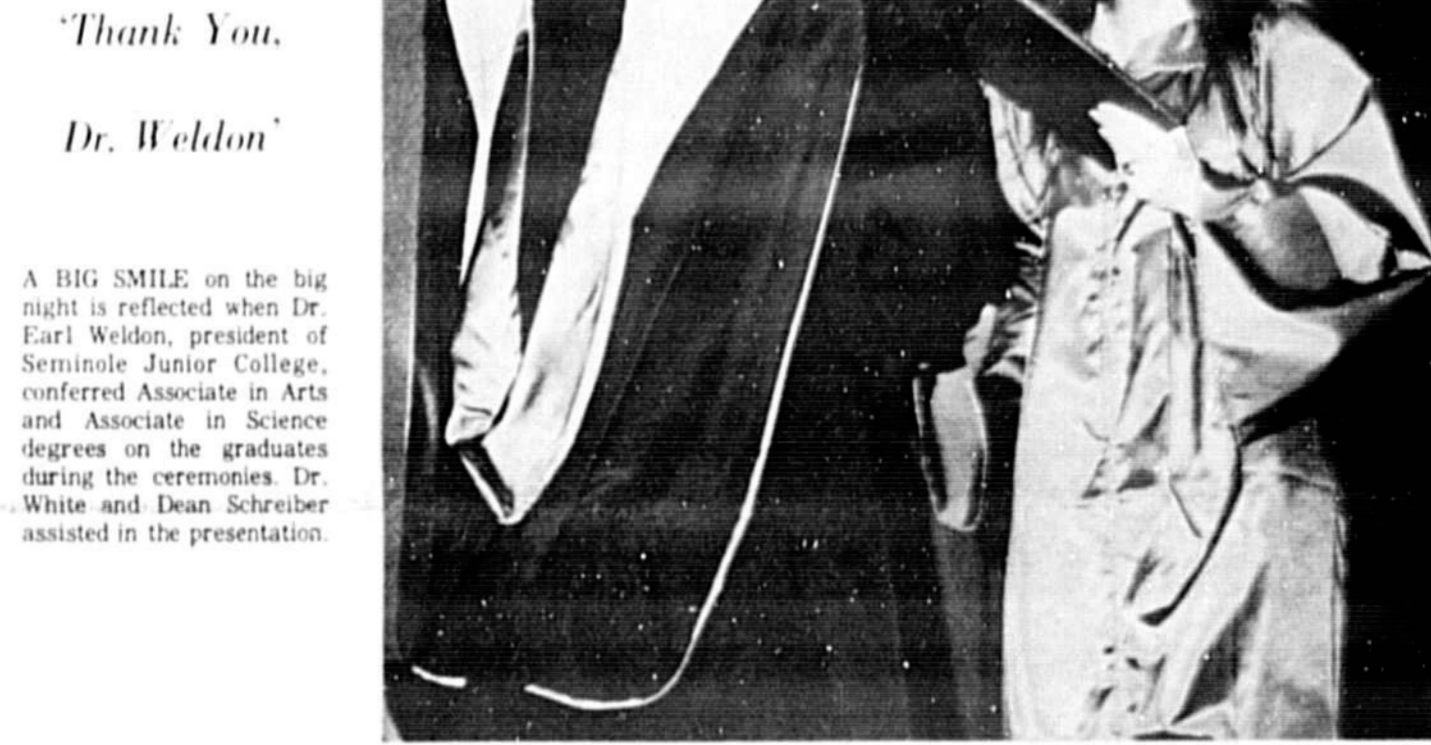

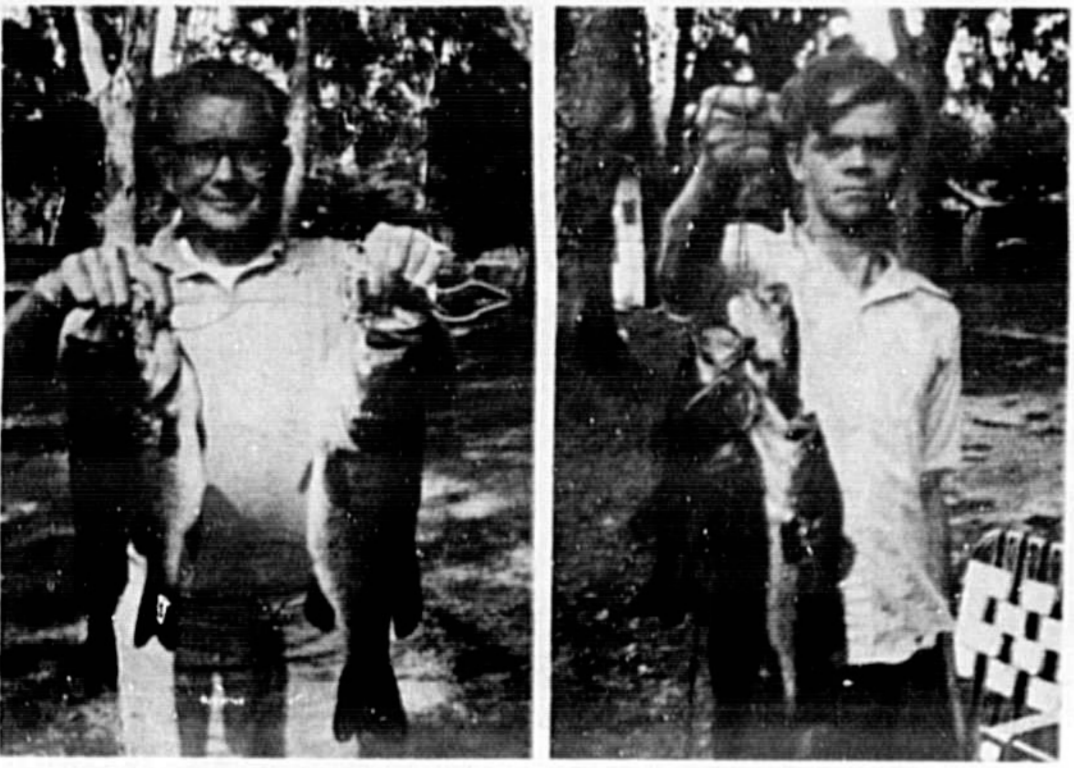

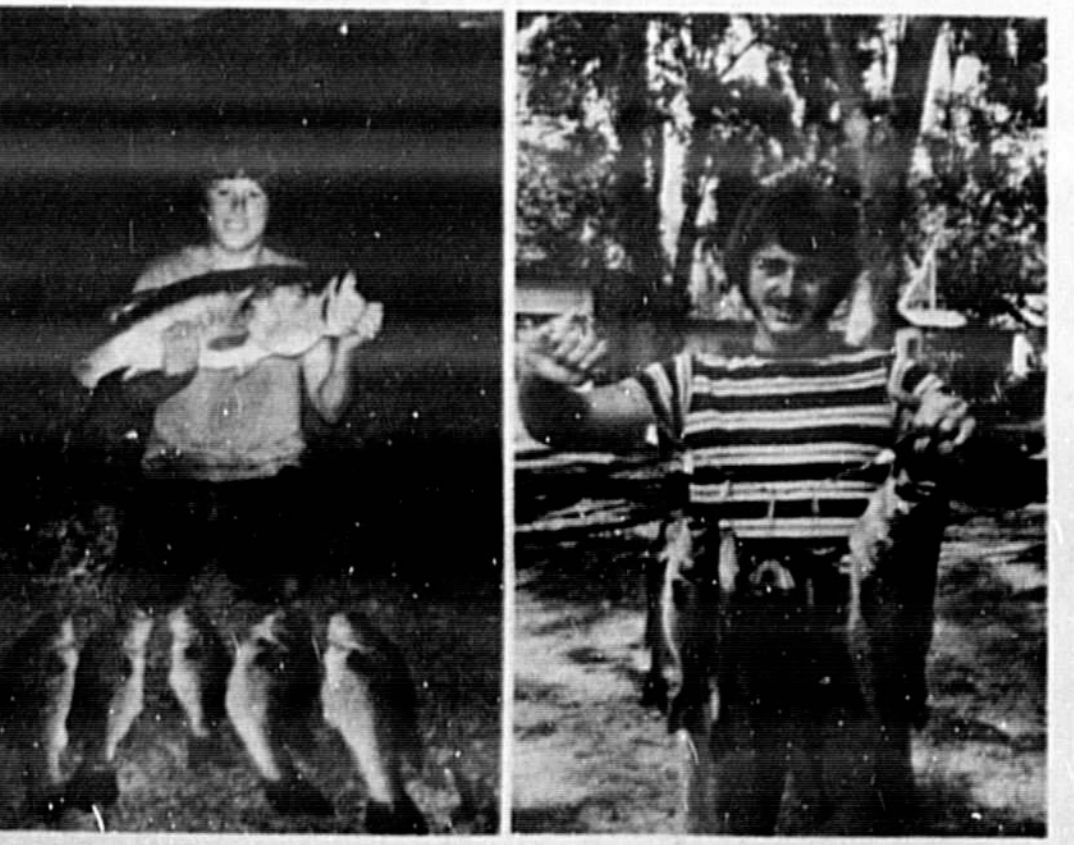

Shrimping Saves Day For Scribe

We (that is, the Orrell Family and another couple) had planned to visit the West Coast and do some Gulf fishing for kings and spanish mackerel last weekend but, with the car packed and ready to go, we received a telephone call from Cedar Key informing us that the flood conditions on the Suwanee River had messed up the fishing for 40 miles around the mouth of the river, the runoff staining the Gulf waters and drying the fish away.

To avoid wasting all the energy required to get ready for the trip, we decided to throw the tent in and hit the East Coast for a couple of nights of shrimping, fishing and loafing.

We selected Riverwood Park Campground near Oakhill for our short vacation and, although the wind was too brisk for daytime fishing, the shrimping and loafing part afforded us a very us a very pleasurable time.

Since our last visit to this park, Milton Lackey and his wife, Elinore, have added tent camping sites that are shaded

by palm trees and each site is arranged to give the utmost in privacy. Clean restrooms, a boat ramp off the main channel, and a camp store with ice, milk and grocery items adds to the attractiveness of the area.

The shrimping tides (high outgoing tide) were running from before midnight to four and five o'clock in the morning but the camp being right in front of some of the best shrimping spots in the Indian River, made it convenient travel the river at night.

The number of boats and people on the water at such a late hour was almost unbelievable but practically everyone who shrimps is out for fun and although boat traffic was heavy, and sometimes pretty fast, everyone seemed to be friendly and tried not to crowd each other.

Some parties would leave the dock before dark, pick their favorite spot, and fish until the tides reached high and shrimp began to run. By high tide, the river looked like a city with every type of lights (Coleman lanterns, battery powered electric lights, etc.) shining in the darkness.

Conversation between people in the boats mingled with shouts of, "There's a big one, get him!" or "Look at that big trout, he grabbed that shrimp before I could net him!" Of course some of the conversation was not so frivolous as shrimpers would miss several in a row and vent their verbal wrath on the hard to catch shrimp.

At the tide reached the low point, and shrimp quit running, the parade of boats back to their launching slips started.

The cold night air made the tent feel pretty good and sleeping until near noon was inevitable.

As we were checking out after two days at Riverwood, we chanced to meet with Tom Calhoun and his family from Matland. They were visiting and learning about the fishing and shrimping to be had and seemed to be enjoying it immensely. Tom said next time he was going to try his hand at shrimping but this time settled for fishing only.

"The biggest trouble is, we can't wait to get back and do it again — LET'S GO SHRIMPING!"

Small Boat World Has Bass Fishing Special

The elusive bass gets hooked in the current issue of Small Boat World, a new magazine devoted exclusively to the interests of owners of boats under 30 feet.

The publication covers many aspects of recreational family boating including articles and departments on new boats and motors, boating safety, boat tests, fishing, skiing, diving and trailering plus special features of particular interest to boatmen.

A good example is a special 16-page section in the current issue which reviews in detail bass fishing as it stands today, from boats to fishing clubs. Of particular interest to anyone interested in bass fishing is an in-depth illustrated article titled, "Bass Pro Tells You How To Do It."

For example, bass pro Roland Martin (a three-time bass tournament winner) tells how

to locate fish, the importance of knowing the right water temperatures, lake and river bottom contours, selecting top water lures, the right way to use a trolling motor, and night fishing.

Other articles in the section include a glossary of bass fishing terminology, unintelligible to the non-bass fisherman. To mention a few, "Bloopers" are top water lures, a "Lunker Gitter" is a bass rod for use with a plastic worm and a "Hawg Stick" is a fishing rod. There is also an article on "ghost motors" (for sneaking

up on fish), plus a comprehensive review of all the new bass boats, which are specially designed to speed the fisherman to the bass-biting areas.

According to Irwin Dornfeld, Publisher of Small Boat World, bass boating has growing appeal to the man who wants more challenge in his fishing. The bass is a very crafty, clever fish so the fisherman must constantly try to outsmart him with determination, the use of special lures and other ingenious methods.

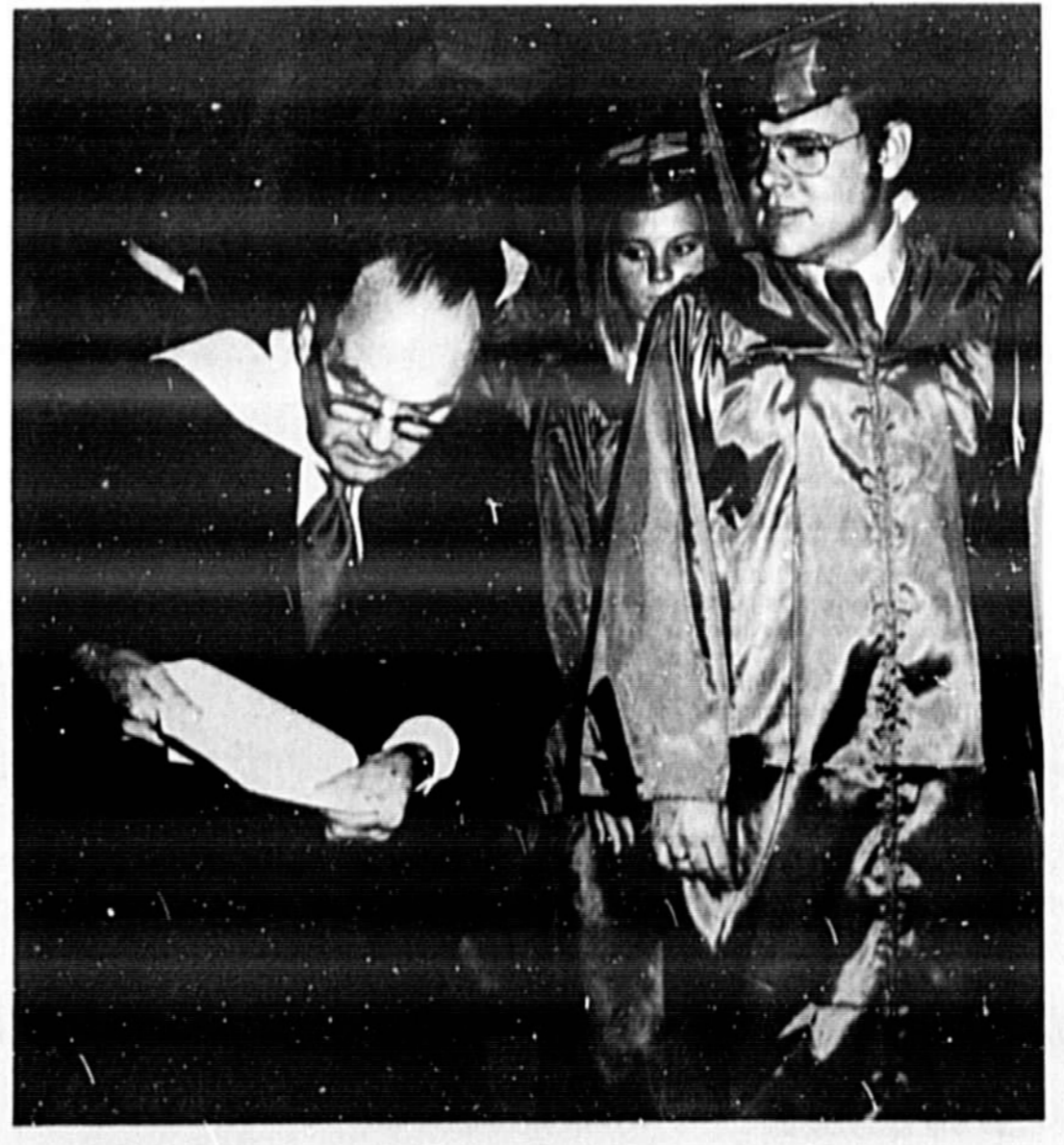

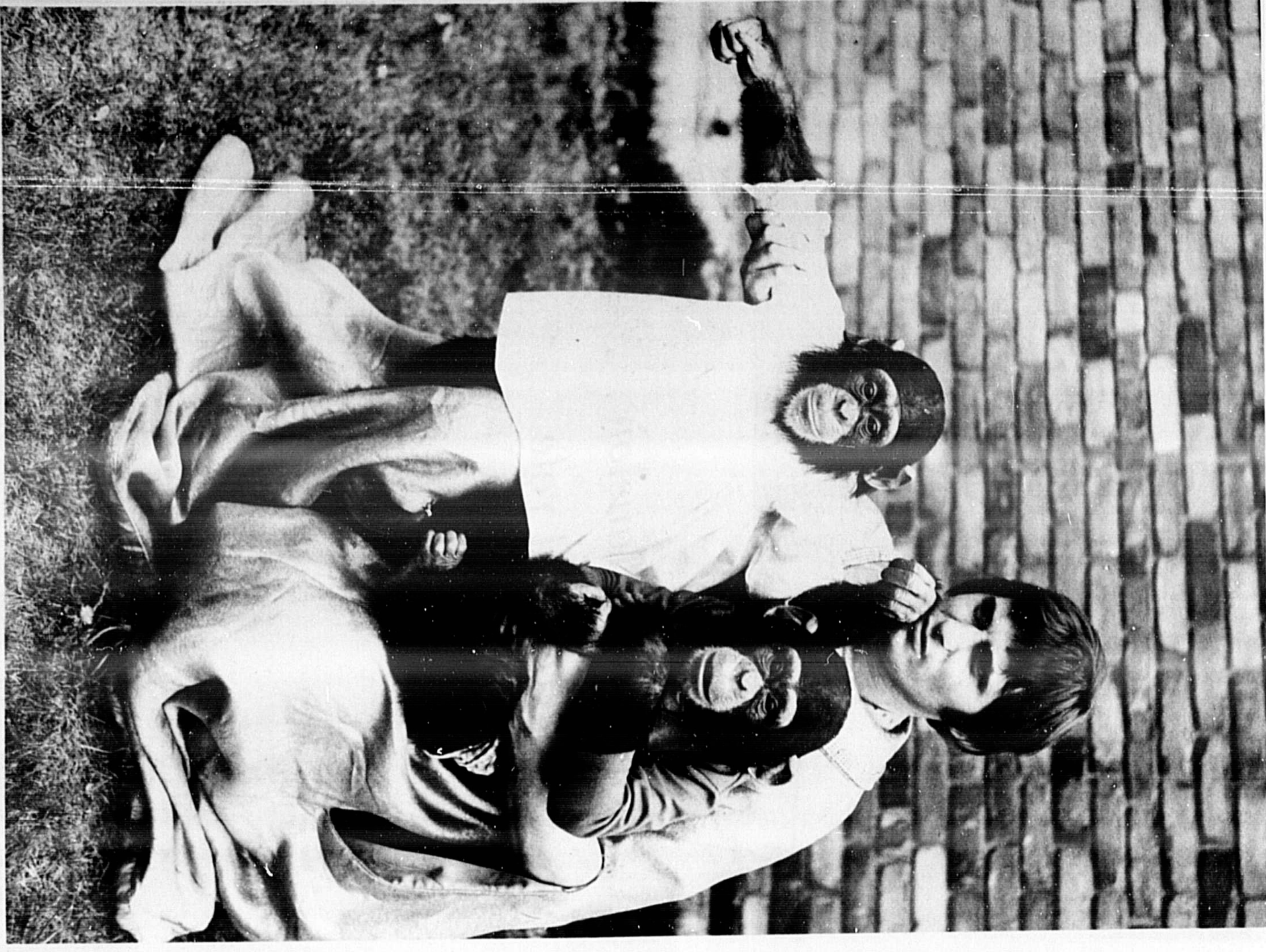

Once upon a time there was a prince who lived in a castle in a faraway land. He was a happy man and a good man and his every desire was answered as he roamed among his subjects.

Then one cloudy day, evil men from another land invaded the prince's country and he fled to the mountains to find a new home.

This is when the adventures of Prince Rudolph (Rudi) Alexander began. As a small lad in Vermont, Rudi's family maintained a small zoo in the mountains of Vermont.
