MIAMI (AP) - Democratic Sen. Lawton Chiles' decision to go along with Republican Sen. Edward Gurney's recommendation for an appointment to the federal bench has put off a confrontation between the two, but probably not for

With Gurney's Pick

While agreeing to support Gurney's recommendation of John A. Reed Jr. of West Palm Beach for appointment as a federal district judge, Chiles said "for the future I intend to insist that we find a better way than political patronage." But Gurney said he had no intention of supporting Chils' proposal to create a nine-member judicial selection commission, composed of appointees of the two senators and the Florida Bar, to recommend judicial appointees to the "Because I do not want to cloud the issue of fin-

ding a better way to select our federal judges and because he seems to be qualified," said Chiles. "I am going to support Judge John A. Reed for the vacancy left by the death of Judge William McRae.

Under Chiles' proposal, the selection commission would screen applicants and submit five names to the senators. From these Gurney and Chiles would make a joint recommendation to the President for governors of the Florida Bar Association

"If I knew for certain," observed Henry David Thoreau, "that a man was coming to my house with the conscious design of doing me good. I should run for my life."

No one in the Eisenhower administration in 1953 gave much thought to this truth of a 19th Century thinker like Thoreau. Nevertheless, the creation by the first Eisenhower administration of the Cabinet post of Health, Education and Welfare (HEW) two decades ago and its record over the last 20 years bear out in brutal terms that Thoreau was trying to tell us.

In its desire to do good works, HEW has grown into a bureaucratic monster of proportions that stagger the human mind.

HEW's budget for fiscal 1973 is estimated to run ahead of defense expenditures with a total outlay of \$79 billion - one third of the entire federal budget! Since its creation in 1953 its budget has increased 14 per cent, employing today 108,000 individuals and administering some 250 to 300 separate programs. In 1960 it had 100 programs; today the total is 300.

Former HEW Secretary Elliot L. Richardson confessed before he left to become secretary of defense that the taxpayer is not getting from HEW his or her money's worth. However, Richardson placed the blame on Congress for creating in HEW a massive, unmanageable bureaucracy. He faults Congress for creating, for political profit, programs "with big price tags-and much publicity" to demonstrate that a Senate or House member "cares about solving problems." As a consequence, HEW's budget and number of programs have grown to the point where billions of dollars are wasted and duplication is the rule rather than the exception.

#### 'Finest' Fail

The disappearance of heroin seized in the famous "French Connection" case gave one black eye to the New York Police Department. Now the report of an investigating commission has blackened the other, painting a shocking picture of corruption at all levels in the city's 29,600-man force.

New York's streets are not safe enough for its citizens to venture out at night with any sense of security. It is hard to see how the city can make headway against its crime problem if more than half its policemen are involved one way or another with corrupt practices.

New York's "finest" are no contenders for the title of the worst example of what maladministration and demoralization can do to a law enforcement agency.

Amnesty Delay Needed

#### Let Our War Wounds Heal First

The question of amnesty for draft evaders and deserters from the U.S. military forces is a sensitive subject that tears at the emotions of advocates and opponents after every war. But the controversy that swirled around the entire issue of Vietnam adds to the bitterness of the debate over forgiveness and pardon for those who refused to serve or fight in the nation's most recent conflict.

And efforts to stir up sentiment for a blanket amnesty under current conditions are ill-timed. The heroes' welcome given to returning prisoners-of-war reflects the public mood. The American people at this time are not ready to be tolerant of those who ducked their country's call to service

There are indications, however, that President Nixon's firm opposition to amnesty may in the future be balanced by the nation's tradition of compassion While more than two-thirds of respondents to the most

recent Gallup Poll agreed that some form of punishment is demanded for the resisters, only about one in eight would insist on a fine or jail sentence as a penalty Almost one-half said a period of some public service

should be an acceptable condition for forgiveness, a concept rejected by the President The ideal blend of justice and mercy may be achieved

when the still tender wounds of Vietnam have been given the opportunity to heal.

Meanwhile, responsible leaders are endeavoring to sort out the facts about deserters and draft dodgers in terms of numbers and to clarify some of the myths on precedents in regard to amnesty While estimates of youthful "exiles" in foreign countries

range into the hundreds of thousands, Department of Defense figures tell a different story For example, more than 90 per cent of those accused of deserting the armed forces since 1966 - some 400,000 - have

been returned to military control. About 14,000 men are listed as true draft dodgers, including 6,800 who have been convicted of evasion and 5,851 under indictment. Another 1,000 reportedly face indictment after investigation is completed. Of the 4,500 considered fugitives, only 2,400 are known to be abroad.

The statistics, of course, do not reveal the number of youths who fied merely to dramatize their "moral objections

Between the extreme positions of those who would shoot draft evaders and deserters at sunrise and those who would give them a blanket pardon is the reasonable conviction that cases should be examined on their individual merits.

widening. The ratio was about two to one in 1850, near the beginning of the industrial revolution. It may reach 30 to one by the end of the century. Unemployment is increasing in the underdeveloped countries-another consequence of the population explo-

· The world's people are becoming more urban and less rural. This is not necessarily an undesirable thing. but it is currently causing serious social crisis in the poor · The world's natural environment is steadily deteri-

orating as a habitat for living things, including man. Environmental crisis results when expanding economic activities exceed certain capacities of the natural system One solution may be a new social ethic which emphasizes economic and demographic stability and the recycling of raw materials to replace present economic values based on perpetual growth.

Other trends lend some brightness to the picture · The world's transportation systems are rapidly improving. Distance is losing much of its meaning as the worm is woven together by increasingly efficient means of transportation

 The world's people are becoming better educated. The illiterate share of the world's adult population de clined from 43 per cent in 1960 to 39 per cent in 1965 and is concentrated largely in Asia, Africa and Latin America. Due to population growth, however, the actual number of illiterates is greater than 20 years ago. The world's communications system is rapidly improving, putting people everywhere in touch with each



The minutes of Oct. 14, 1971 show that a variance of the lot size requirement of the zoning ordinance was granted for the development of Westview Subdivision (since renamed Winsor Manor)

However, the property was not annexed until two weeks after the variances were given. In addition, although the zoning ordinance specifically requires public hearings on zoning variances, no such hearing was held, according to the

The plat of record for the first addition to the subdivision-Winsor Manor-certifies that it was approved by the Longwood City Council on Nov. 30, 1971, almost five months fore the tract was surveyed on April 17, 1972. The plat was filed with the clerk of the circuit court's office on April 18,

Responses from several officials in other area cities and the county zoning office were that it is near impossible to have a final plat before surveying is done. In fact the officials stated they have never heard of a final plat being approved before surveys were complete.

The plat for the original Winsor Manor, to the contrary of the first addition, also certifies it was approved by the City Council on Nov. 30, 1971, but it was surveyed more than three weeks previously on Nov. 4, 1971.

On May 18, 1972, the city council, according to the minutes, also did not hold the required public hearing before it granted zoning ordinance variances on lot sizes in Shadow till subdivision being developed by Trim Tic. The city council, the minutes reflect, on March 9, 1972 accepted the preliminary plat of Skylark while the Skylark





Heading up the Chevrolet Camaro entries is Orlando's own Vince Gimondo who this year is taking advantage of expanded rules in Touring Class put into effect by IMSA. The rules allow for 427 Cublic inch engines in Camaros this year and Gimondo has purchased a 4271-88 Chevrolet engine from engine builder John Zorian of Tampa, the same man who builds engines for Dave Hienz.

Carter won the 1972 IMSA Championship in Touring class in a Camaro. Carter has raced in SCCA Trans-Am competition. He has

been considered out of the top independents on the circuit. Another Orlando entry in a Camaro will be the car of Bill McDill which also will have a good chance because of the experience that McDill has had in driving at Sebring. His codriver is yet to be named.

#### 25 Can Win

The 12 Hours of Sebring this year maybe the most competitive Sebring race ever with at least 25 entries quite capable of winning the event. In this race as is true in stock car racing, the fans will be able to easily identify with their favorites. Because of the closeness of the competition this may well be the greatest 12 Hours of Sebring ever witnessed.
